Law Offers Women Real Change For Social Work

The law remains immutable. But the function of lawyers changes. And in that change woman gets her chance, says Mary B. Grossman, associate judge, municipal court, Cleveland, Ohio.

"Think was when a lawyer was merely a legal adviser to his client," she argued. "But with the rapid growth of population, creating congested districts in the larger cities, problems—social, economic, industrial—have increased to such an extent that the work of the lawyer is no longer merely technical, but social as well.

"The modern lawyer is a 'father confessor' to his clients. He must advise in matters of all kinds.

"As an officer of the court, a woman lawyer can aid in the solving of problems of many unfortunate brought before the court. Wherever social work and advice for the protection of woman and children are required, a woman lawyer's opportunities for service are almost unlimited.

"Then, too, business and professional women seek the advice of those who can best understand their problems and in this field the woman lawyer finds herself greatly in demand.

"Taking into consideration all of these factors, a woman qualified both by temperament and training to practice law can make a real contribution to society."

GOLF TOURNEY FOR SOUTHERN CHAMP STARTS

STARS FROM ALL OVER SOUTHERN STATES MEET IN DALLAS

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, June 19.—Glen Crisman, Selma, Ala., led early qualifiers in the Southern Golf association tournament here today with a 71. Crisman, who won the event in 1925, had a 41 on the first nine, but came in with a 37 to assure himself a place among the 32 players who will square off in the championship flight tomorrow.

High Winds Hamper
High winds sweeping Brook Hollow course caused early scores to mount high. It was predicted that an 82 would suffice to gain the title flight. Approximately 180 of the South's leading golfers are entered.

Jus Moreland, 17 year old municipal product of Dallas, was next to Crisman among the early finishers. He had an 81.

Other qualifying scores: J. L. Taylor, Houston, 82; John Thomas, Birmingham, 82; Charles G. Arrippe, Dallas, 93; Al Badger, San Angelo, 86; John Jester, Dallas, 86; Cruger Smith, Dallas, 90; J. T. Owens, 95.

Lavender Is Leading
With the first 20 starters over the finish line, Dennis Lavender, Stamford, Texas, went into the lead in the race for medalist honors with a 77, one stroke better than Crisman. He had a 37-40.

Lavender is West Texas golf champion and in 1927 was state municipal champion.

Harry Schwartz of New Orleans came in with an 80 to place himself well within the charmed 32. He took 42-38. R. B. Coleman, Dallas, stroked an 82. All other scores turned in were 85 or above.

A HUBBER A DAY

A Series Of Articles On Lubbock Ball Players

BERNARD WILLIAMS
Bernard (Blackie) Williams, infielder for the Hubbers, was the last player to join the Lubbock ranks. Williams came right out of school at Texas Christian University and started with the Hubbers in the opening games of the Hamlin series at Hamlin.

Williams was 22 years of age on his last birthday, March 21, was born at San Antonio where he lived until 1919 when he moved with his family to Fort Worth, at which place he makes his home.

Awarded 16 Letters
During his four years in Central High school, Fort Worth, "Blackie" was awarded a total of sixteen letters, four a year in football, basketball, baseball and track. On the Central High school baseball club Williams played at any position, but preferably at the shortfield. Mark (Lefty) Maxwell, Hubber pitcher, was a high school teammate on the Central High school club.

Graduating from high school in the spring term of 1924 Bernard entered Texas Christian University in the fall of the same year, where he has been attending school ever since and although he has completed his college athletic career he plans to reenter this fall and complete his education.

Outstanding Athlete
Under the tutelage of Matty Bell, Williams has been one of the most outstanding athletes in the Southwestern Conference and was leader of the Horned Frog gridiron machine during the past football year. In baseball his play in the shortfield in conference games ranked him as one of the best in the conference.

Summer months during his four years at college found him spending his time with track semi-professional clubs over Texas. How well will the Lubbock fans remember the time in the Amarillo Baseball Tournament during the 1926 season when the determining game between the Hubbers and Big Lake was played, the last half of the ninth, two were out, and none other than Blackie Williams, then playing at the short-stop position with Big Lake, came in to tie the count 1-1 as he whipped out a homer to centerfield, which was one of the longest hit balls of the tourney. Rufus Hall was on the mound for the Hubbers and in the tenth session after two were out Jackson, left fielder for the Hubbers, romped in for the winning run as Kit Carson, Big Lake third baseman, threw wild to first.

Breaks in With Bang
Williams broke in with the Hubbers with a bang rapping out a pair of home runs and a single in the first game he played with the homebats at Hamlin.

His speed is one of his outstanding features, is a sure fielder, and is accurate with his throw. In the Southwestern Conference baseball he hit around .330 and will no doubt be as equally effective in his hitting in the West Texas League.

bers, by the strong and the weak, by the vigorous and the alling-in fact, by all humanity.

"Speaking of the oil industry, Boyd says production is the alpha of the business, marketing is the omega and refining and transportation are the intermediary divisions.

"Fifteen years ago, even the art

of finding oil and the production branch of the industry were unbecomingly primitive. Oil men then knew nothing of sub-service geology of paleontology, of geo-physics of modern drilling methods. In that day 4,000 feet was a tremendous depth for a well. Today West Texas can boast the deepest well in the world—considerably more than 8,000 feet in depth and still going down. Yet the man responsible for this deep hole had probably scarcely seen an oil well when he

mustered out the A. E. F. some ten years ago.

Cooperative Trend

"Just as the conservation trend and movement in petroleum was in economic force for some time before the industry fully became aware of it as such, so do I believe that the cooperative trend and movement in oil production is already much stronger and more firmly established than we realize. It is one of the important changes and adjustments that holds great promise for the future. Cooperation is here. Already there is cooperation in production between producers within the industry and between the industry and state and national government officials and agencies on a scale undreamed of a few years ago. It has come upon us without our being fully conscious of its extent. It has been in some cases involuntary, but either way it is here in its physical manifestation, and in my judgment, it has come to stay. As its powerful force is increasingly felt, both the industry and the public will profit from its beneficial effects."

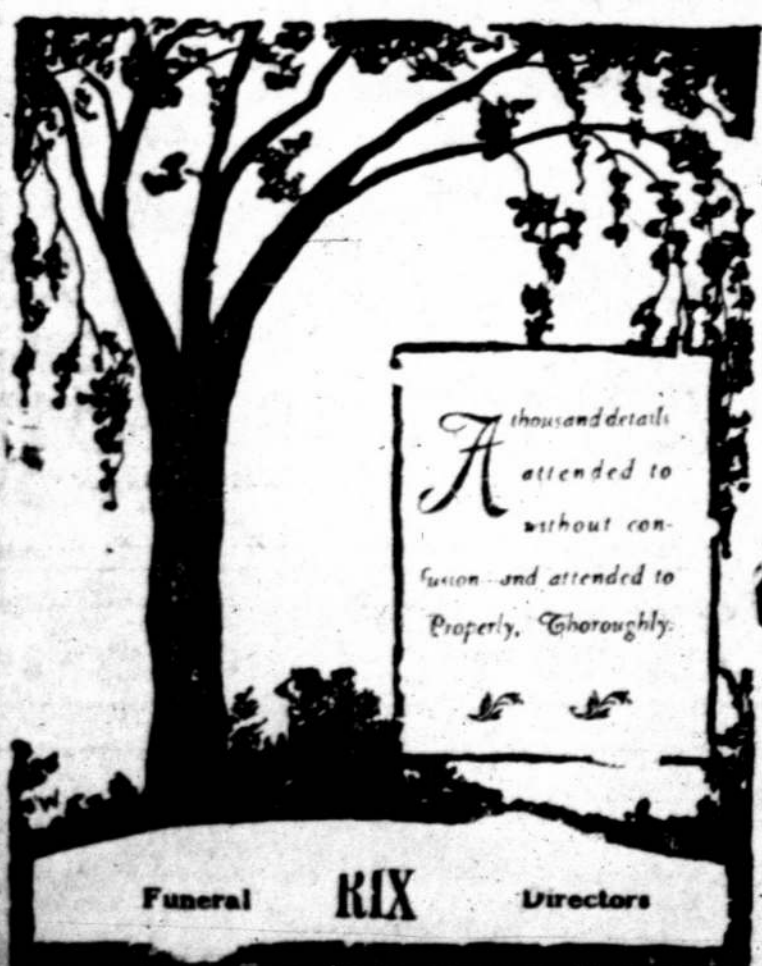

of the White and St. Francis rivers slowly swept downstream. The embankments, weak from last year's floods, were being strengthened by additional sand bags and engineers believed the principal ones would hold.

The White's crest was between Newport and Georgetown with a 29 foot stage expected at the lower point tomorrow. The levee has been raised to 30 feet and its foundations have been braced.

Flood water released by the Kennett, Mo., crevasse was nearing Greene and Craighead counties where 30,000 acres probably will be inundated.

Refugees were being cared for by the Red Cross and were not in danger although there was no immediate prospect of a return to their farms. In Jackson county alone, 200 families were temporarily homeless.

Conditions Some Better On White

NEWPORT, Ark., June 19 (AP).—Flood conditions in the White river valley north of Newport and a short distance south were improved today. The stage of the river here was 31.5, a drop of a foot in 24 hours.

At Jackson Bayou levees, 24 miles to the south, however, water was flowing around the upper end of the dike where it ties into a dike and more than 300 men were put to work there. Considerable acreage in the bayou bottom was under water and residents had left their homes.

The lower part of Jackson county where 1,000 persons were driven from their homes, several of the refugees were able to move back today. Indications pointed to a continued fall of the river from Newport down to Georgetown where the crest is expected Thursday morning. The crest passed Augusta, Ark., early today.

Impetus Is Given Smith By Actions

BALTIMORE, June 19 (AP).—Forces working for the nomination of Governor Smith of New York at the democratic national convention were given impetus today with the withdrawal of Governor Albert C. Ritchie of Maryland as a candidate. Stating that "it has become increasingly evident that the great majority of the democratic party in almost every section of the country are ready and want to align themselves behind the leadership of Governor Smith," the Marylander, in pledging his support to the Empire state chief, said that "Governor Smith embodies far and away the best chance to win."

Feels Sense of Duty
Lauding Governor Smith's record which he said "justifies the people's faith in democracy," Governor Ritchie said that his withdrawal from the presidential field was prompted by a sense of duty which he was glad to perform on the basis that "whatever contributes to democratic unity, will, in turn, contribute to democratic victory."

In aligning himself with the Smith cohorts, Governor Ritchie, in response to a question as to whether he would accept the vice presidency, should it be offered, made it clear that he had no ambitions in that direction.

Two oranges and a few tablets of malted milk were her only food during the flight. She did not take the controls once during the adventure because she was too excited. Most of the piloting was done by Smith with Gordon relieving him occasionally.

Fliers Received At Southampton

SOUTHAMPTON, June 19 (AP).—The trans-Atlantic monoplane Friendship arrived at Southampton from Burry Port, Wales, shortly after noon today.

The American plane, piloted by Wilmer Stultz, who flew it most of the way across the Atlantic from Newfoundland to Burry Port, was escorted by two British planes. One of these planes was from the Southampton airfield while the other flew all the way from Burry Port as a guide.

Citizens Turn Out
All Southampton was on hand to see the plane and Miss Amelia Earhart, Boston social worker and intrepid flier, who is the first woman to have flown across the Atlantic.

The Friendship circled over historic Southampton seven times and ran up and down the length of the harbor twice before alighting on the water, giving the enthusiastic crowds plenty of opportunity to see her.

On coming down Miss Earhart and her manager here, Captain H. H. Bailey, were taken off by two fast motor boats.

A crowd lined the quays on both sides of the harbor while American flags flew from the mastsheads of many ships as well as from the docks of the Imperial Airways to which Miss Earhart was brought.

The whistles and sirens of liners in the port sounded a shrill welcome which was added to outbursts of cheers from both sides of the estuary where hundreds of workmen had been let off especially for the occasion.

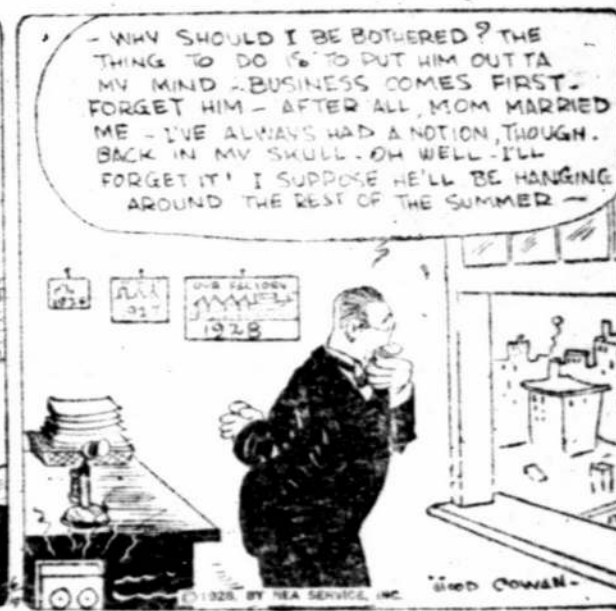

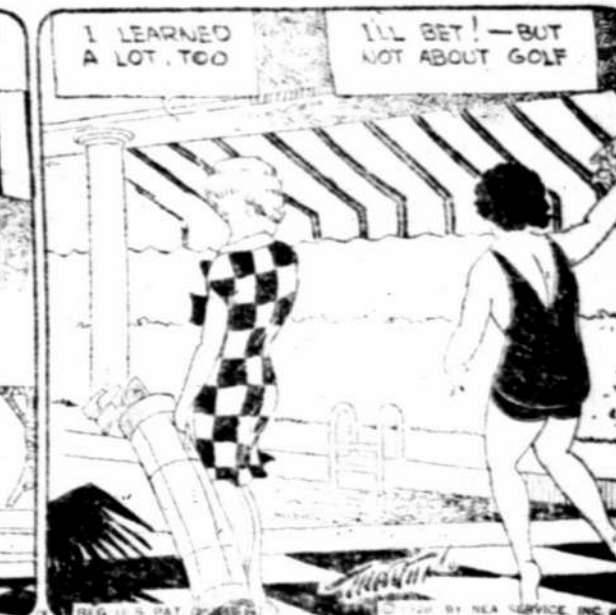

Mr. and Mrs. Stillman, both of whom have flown with the German girl, plan to remain with her in Old Orchard until the "takeoff" for Berlin.

Miss Rasche hoped to fly to Old Orchard today with Mr. and Mrs. Stillman following in another plane.

To Do All Possible

"I will do everything possible to help Miss Rasche fulfill her ambition," Mrs. Stillman said. "She is a wonderful flier and should make a great flight."

Miss Rasche has been planning an ocean flight for some time, and this spring obtained the backing of a group of men whose names were never revealed.

Last Wednesday she announced she had broken with her backers because of delays in providing her with necessary equipment. They had already delivered a specially built Bellanca plane, but there was a disagreement over the inclusion of an earth inductor compass, which Miss Rasche did not want because she did not understand its operation.
