Sales returns deficit shrinks for 2nd month

For the second month in a row, the deficit grew smaller which has marked Snyder sales tax figures during 1983.

From a deficit high of minus 18 percent, the most recent sales tax figures report it at a minus 12.2 percent for the year. This reflects sales here through October.

In another indicator of improved economic conditions, the month of October resulted in more sales tax dollars than reported for the same period last year.

For the month, the one percent sales tax collected by the state equaled more than \$54,000 in Snyder. The figure last October was just more than \$49,000.

Exact figures for both are \$54,434 and \$49,045 respectively.

The year-to-date figure then equals some \$797,000, down from last year's count of \$908,000. Exact figures for this are \$797,134 and \$908,178 respectively.

The difference between the two with two months still to be counted for 1983 equals a drop in city sale tax revenues of \$111,000.

These are collected by the State Comptroller's office then returned to respective city governments.

A sampling of sales tax returns for area cities includes:

—Lubbock: a plus 4 percent with \$11.5 million reported to date compared to \$11 million last year. For the month of October, \$928,000 was returned.

—Abilene: a minus 4 percent with \$7.4 million reported to date compared to \$7.7 million last year. For the month of October, \$506,981 was returned.

—Big Spring: a minus 15 percent with \$1.4 million reported to date compared to \$1.7 million last year. For the month of October, \$89,731 was returned.

—Snyder: a minus 12 percent with \$797,134 reported to date compared to \$908,178 last year. For the month of October, \$54,432 was returned.

—Sweetwater: a minus 2 percent with \$605,339 reported to date compared to \$622,352 last year. For the month of October, \$37,742 was returned.

—Lamesa: a minus 13.9 percent with \$442,448 reported to date compared to \$514,146 last year. For the month of October, \$23,859 was returned.

—Colorado City: a minus 1 percent with \$225,381 reported to date compared to \$228,032 last year. For the month of October, \$15,510 was returned.

—Post: a minus 19 percent with \$153,707 reported to date compared to \$191,124 last year. For the month of October, \$12,700 was returned.

Guerrillas say....

U.S. copters enter Salvador

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — Leftist guerrillas claim 10 U.S. military helicopters crossed the border into El Salvador from Honduras, while in Mexico City,

Henry Kissinger said the United States should stay out of strictly local conflicts.

In Guatemala, officials say 25 guerrillas and six soldiers died in fighting provoked by an ambush attempt.

American and Honduran authorities denied the rebel claim Tuesday that helicopters from the Big Pine II joint maneuvers in Honduras crossed into El Salvador.

The guerrillas' clandestine Radio Venceremos said the incident took place at about noon Monday in the northeastern province of Morazan, a longtime rebel

stronghold about 105 miles northeast of San Salvador.

"Our forces remain on a state of alert," the broadcast said.

"This situation is not true," a U.S. Embassy spokesman in Tegucigalpa, the Honduran capital, told The Associated Press. "Nevertheless, our military forces are carefully investigating the matter."

Col. Cesar Elvir Sierra, the Honduran armed forces spokesman, also denied the report. The joint maneuvers, involving about 3,500 U.S. troops, began in August and are scheduled to run at least through March.

In Mexico City, Kissinger and eight members of the 12-member U.S. commission which he heads met with Mexican officials, who reiterated their opposition to U.S. military intervention in Central America.

Kissinger's group was going next to Venezuela, which along with Mexico, Panama and Colombia, make up the Contadora group, formed last January to seek a peaceful solution to Central America's conflicts. The Kissinger commission met earlier this year with Panamanian and Colombian leaders.

Kissinger met with

President Miguel de la Madrid, and at a news conference later said outsiders should not interfere with the region's local problems.

"Upheavals caused by indigenous conditions and conducted by local forces with local means should not be a concern of the United States," he said.

Mexican Foreign Minister Bernardo Sepulveda called the statement a "pleasant surprise" and "welcome and important."

The Guatemala army said, meanwhile, its soldiers killed 25 guerrillas who set off land mines.

Goodfellows report here...

Need said up, donations down

A considerably larger number of needy applicants have been reported here following a meeting Tuesday night of the screening committee for the local Goodfellow's effort.

In line with this, local Goodfellow volunteers indicate that donations being secured from customers at local financial institutions are substantially down.

Unless donations improve almost immediately, the end result might equal a lighter Christmas basket of food for needy families this holiday season.

After Tuesday's screening effort, cards were to be mailed Wednesday morn-

ing to some 230 county families indicating they have been selected for the food distribution planned Saturday.

A spokesman for Goodfellows said the same guidelines were followed this year as last, but that the number of applicants was up in addition to "less duplication" of families proposed.

Last Christmas, the Goodfellows aided some 170 needy families here.

The food distribution will go on as planned Saturday, they note, but the box of food — designed to offer a nutritious meal at Christmas — "may be a little less."

Money donations — which are being accepted

at Snyder National, West Texas State, First National and First Federal Savings and Loan — are used to buy meat and produce for the distribution.

As of Wednesday, these donations were estimated at less than \$100.

Donations of canned goods from Snyder school children then balance out the meal. This effort is progressing on schedule, school officials note.

In an effort to facilitate donations for local individuals, Snyder woman Isabell Allen has volunteered to personally pick up either money donations or contributions of canned goods.

Persons wishing to

donate to this effort may call her at 573-6462.

After Tuesday's screening committee meeting, the deadline to apply for Goodfellow food packages has passed.

These will be distributed Saturday from 9 a.m. until noon at the ag annex located on the east side of the Scurry County Coliseum.

Individuals notified that they qualify must bring the Goodfellows card with them in order to receive their food.

With only a few days remaining, Goodfellow workers ask that residents here consider those less fortunate than themselves and "to give what they can."

Water district's income over cost

The latest report from Colorado River Municipal Water District officials indicates the district is continuing its pattern of exceeding revenue estimates and under-running expense projections.

The latest figures indicate district operation figures through November.

Revenues for the month amount to near \$990,000, making some \$11.9 million for the 11 months. This is about \$100,000 more than estimated for the entire

year. In contrast, operating expenses through November totaled some \$6.4 million. The figure for the month was some \$420,000.

The expenses to date have been underestimated approximately \$1 million, principally due to electric rate increases which have not materialized as expected.

For the 11 month period, the district has transferred some \$2.7 million to debt service.

In Brief

Seek moment's silence okay

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department wants the Supreme Court to approve periods of silence for prayer or meditation in public schools, but school prayer advocates are upset that the Reagan administration is not asking the court to allow teacher-led prayers as well.

In a friend-of-the-court brief filed Tuesday, Solicitor General Rex E. Lee urged the court to uphold the constitutionality of Alabama's moment-of-silence law. "This is a new issue the court has never decided before," said a Justice Department official, who requested anonymity.

Alabama and 22 other states adopted such laws after the high court ruled in 1962 that laws authorizing teacher-led prayers violated the First Amendment's prohibition against establishing a state religion.

Doubts crew is being held

HOUSTON (AP) — An Austin man's claim that crewmen from an American drilling ship are captives in Vietnam will probably prove false, an official of the Houston company which owns the vessel says.

Richard Vermeer, a vice president of Global Marine Inc., said Tuesday he will not discount entirely a claim by an Austin attorney who says a government source told him 21 of the workers are prisoners.

But Vermeer said the company has no information to substantiate the claim and does have several denials.

Douglas Pierce said Tuesday a government official told him two weeks ago at least 10 Americans and 11 crew members from other countries are being held by Vietnamese authorities.

Pierce's 29-year-old son, John, was one of 81 workers lost Oct. 25 when the Glomar Java Sea sank in a typhoon while drilling for oil in the South China Sea.

USS New Jersey opens fire

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — The American battleship New Jersey, the largest warship afloat, fired its 16-inch guns on positions in Syrian-controlled hills east of Beirut today, U.S. officials said.

It was the first time the New Jersey, the world's only operational battleship, had opened fired since it arrived off the Lebanese coast in September.

State-run Beirut Radio said the New Jersey and other American vessels were firing at targets near the village of Tarchich east of Beirut, and north of the Beirut-Damascus highway. There was no immediate word on damage or casualties.

The destroyer Tattnell and the guided missile cruiser Ticonderoga fired their 5-inch guns Tuesday against Syrian anti-aircraft batteries in the same area.

Four injured in explosion

LEANDER, Texas (AP) — At least four people were injured today when a small apartment building near the police station in this Central Texas city was ripped apart by an explosion, fire department officials say.

Ed Keese, dispatcher for the volunteer fire department, said the blast was apparently "a gas explosion." One man who was in the small apartment building was "hurt pretty bad," according to Keese. The man's identity and the extent of injuries was not known.

Cedar Park Police Sgt. Larry Akin said the man apparently was hurt while trying to light a gas heater.

"The explosion completely stripped him," said Akin. "It knocked every strip of clothing off of him and burned him pretty badly."

Police from Cedar Park, about five miles from Leander, were taking Leander police calls because the explosion left police here without communications.

Rewards given for crime tips

Continental unable to borrow funds

HOUSTON (AP) — Continental Airlines asked a federal bankruptcy court for protection because it was nearly out of cash and couldn't get any loans from banks or its parent company. Chairman Frank Lorenzo says.

Lorenzo testified Tuesday that his airline had borrowed \$80 million from Texas Air Corp., the parent company, and \$276 million in all since Texas Air took over the carrier 1½ years ago. "That's how Continental was able to get by even though it was reporting millions of dollars in losses," Lorenzo said. But he said lenders realized it did not make sense to risk money on Continental until the airline's soaring costs were brought under control.

Lorenzo, testifying at a hearing in which unions are asking a federal judge to dismiss the company's request for federal protection from creditors, said officials of his company met with pilots union representatives Sept. 23, a day before filing papers in

bankruptcy court. He said a meeting was scheduled for Sept. 24 at which airline officials were to make a last-ditch effort to reach an agreement under which pilots would give back \$60 million in wages and benefits to the company. "I still held out hope that the meeting scheduled the following morning might produce an agreement," Lorenzo said. He said he viewed the Chapter 11 filing in federal bankruptcy court as "the end of the line and the last resort. I was very concerned that it had never been done before. I was very concerned about being able to hold together a management team."

Lorenzo said a late-night call from union officials let the company know that Larry Baxter, an official with the Air Line Pilots Association, would be unable to attend. The Sept. 24 session was scrapped and that day, the airline grounded its planes

and filed court papers to reorganize its debts. The company resumed business two days later with salaries of some workers cut by more than half, its route system trimmed by two-thirds and only a third of its 12,000 employees. Union attorneys claim that bankruptcy motion was made only to escape the airline's union contracts.

The hearing was continued until Dec. 27. Pilots union attorney Jim Linsey said Richard Adams, Continental's chief operating officer, will probably be called when testimony resumes. Union attorneys, who say that Continental planned for months to file the Chapter 11 papers, have

already introduced into evidence notes from Adams which proposed using the "big stick" of a shutdown to win concessions from labor groups. "Most effective stick may be Chapter 11," the handwritten notes, dated June 14, say. "The risk is substantial."

Lorenzo testified he saw "precious few" advantages in the Chapter 11 motion. "I didn't look on Chapter 11 as a way to reduce labor costs," he said.

He also testified during cross-examination that he did not know about the company's policy, instituted when the airline returned to the air, to assume workers who failed to show up for work under the new salaries had quit.

This is Chicago: Within the next two weeks five criminal courts judges and perhaps 10 lawyers will be indicted.

Our government's Department of Justice has been three years quietly investigating allegations of dishonesty among Chicago's judges and lawyers.

As investigation known by the code name "Greyhound" bugged the private offices of at least two judges, planted undercover FBI agents in the state's attorney's office and wired them with body microphones.

Sham criminal cases were created purposely to expose the manner in which a crooked defense lawyer might bribe a crooked judge.

This is Chicago — where for years cynics have insisted you could buy your way in or out of anything — including murder.

It was axiomatic that for one fee you got a "lawyer," for a higher fee you got a "fixer."

Chicago judges spent enormous sums to buy election and re-election to jobs that pay a modest wage. Nobody questioned why.

Some Chicago judges own lavish vacation homes in Florida or the Caribbean and such affluence was nonchalantly "accepted" by media and public as "a perk that goes with the territory."

FBI agents rented an office across the street from a suspect judge and photographed him counting money.

The judge, asked about it, said, "it's no crime to count money."

Much of the alleged corruption of Chicago courts relates to payoffs of "drug money," but one of the judges believed on the take sat in divorce court.

Federal wiretap law requires that notices be sent to people who've been bugged within 90 days of the end of the surveillance, but the judge who authorizes the wiretaps may withhold notification if he believes the investigation would jeopardize the investigation.

Some of the judges and attorneys involved are expected to challenge the constitutionality of the surveillance. One says he recalls no precedent for bugging a state judge's chambers.

You can imagine the chagrin of honest judges,

inevitably stained by these disclosures and the protracted prosecutions which lie ahead.

It is a cloud over the entire Chicago judiciary.

Criminal Court Judge James Bailey notes that even the most highly respected judge rarely gets more than 80 percent approval on Election Day in an electoral process which requires 60 percent.

Next election there will be inevitable tendency for voters to vote the "ins" out — regardless.

Lawmen losing smuggling war

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Texas has neither the manpower nor the resources to slow down the increasing drug traffic into Texas from Mexico and other Latin American countries, the head of the Texas Department of Public Safety has warned.

Col. Jim Adams told a congressional committee Tuesday that his agency has been fighting a losing battle.

Despite cooperation from federal and local authorities, Adams said, "the immensity of the problem sometimes overwhelms us. We're still dealing with only the tip of the iceberg."

He said marijuana smuggling is a continuing problem, but now lawmen are concerned with the increase in cocaine traffic in the state. The illegal trade may be relocating in Texas "because of crackdowns in Florida," Adams said.

More than 140 pounds of the drug was confiscated in two recent cocaine seizures, he said.

Adams testified before the U.S. House of Representatives Select Committee on Narcotics Abuse and Control, which Tuesday concluded two days of hearings in Corpus Christi.

"Large amounts of drugs are coming in," Adams said. He said federal data indicates that "only 10 percent of the drugs destined for the U.S. through the Texas-Mexico border are seized."

"We're getting better every year but we are still dealing with a shortage" of manpower and money, Adams told the panel, chaired by U.S. Rep. Charles Rangel, D-NY.

Adams said the state needs radar facilities to detect low-flying aircraft that are becoming an increasingly popular method of bringing drugs across the United States-Mexico border.

There are more than 700 potential landing sites along the border from Brownsville to Del Rio, Adams said.

Even though unloading and refueling of a marijuana-laden aircraft usually takes only about 10 minutes, Adams said, officials still managed to seize 36 airplanes in 1982. But so far in 1983, only 25 aircraft have been confiscated, he said.

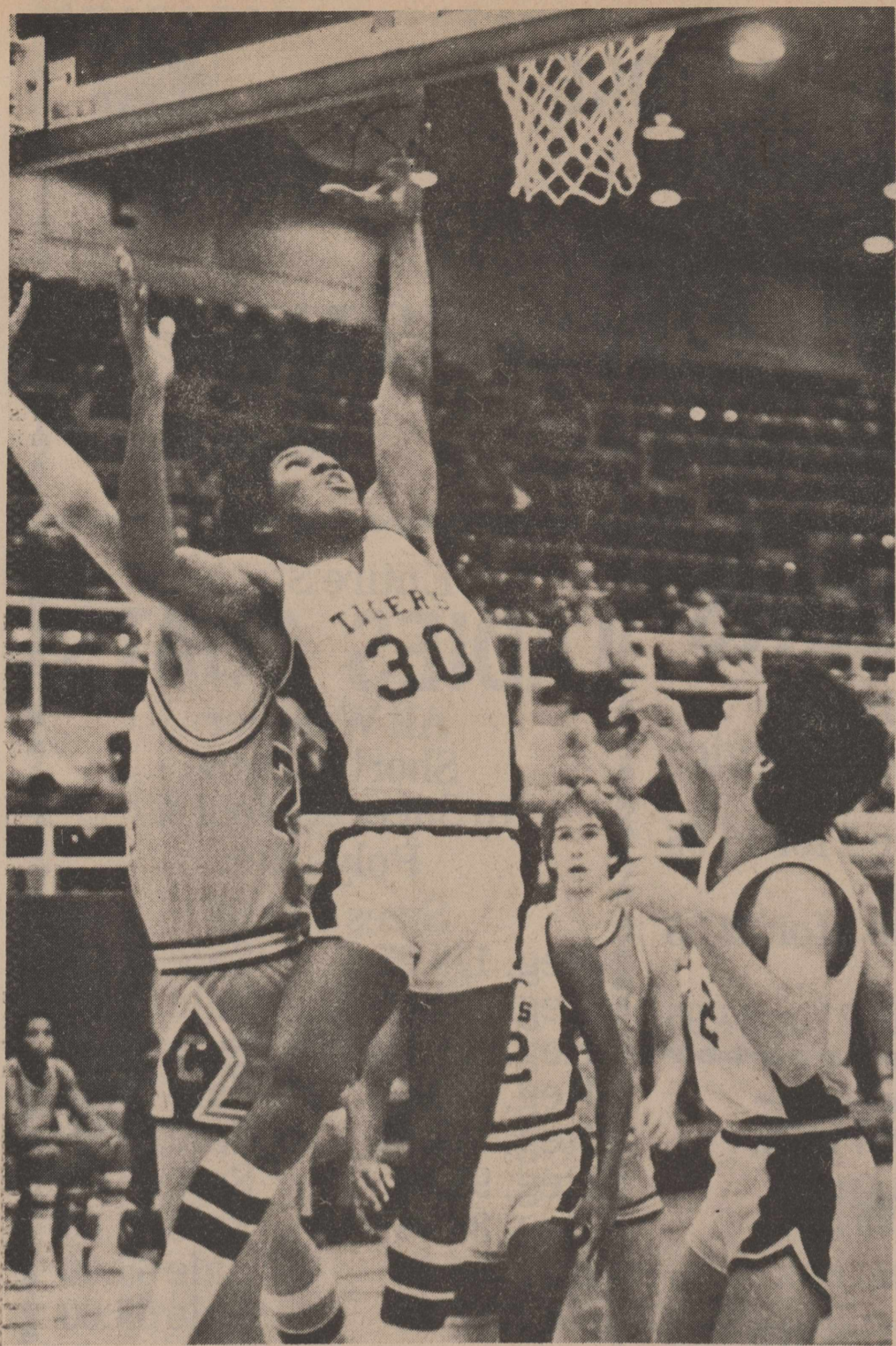

Tigers can't locate bucket; fall to San Angelo here, 55-41

San Angelo Central turned a four point lead into 10 early in the fourth quarter and held on to defeat Snyder High School's Tigers here Tuesday night, 55-41.

The loss was Snyder's eighth of the season to a Class 5A opponent. The Tigers are 2-8.

Snyder had rallied from a 14-point deficit in the third quarter to pull within four, 35-31, early in the fourth period. But this one just wasn't in the cards for the Tigers, who had a terrible shooting night. While Central froze the comeback with six straight points of its own, Snyder missed one layup on the fast break and had another chance to score on a six-

footer. Neither would fall. "We couldn't hit anything," Coach Larry Scott moaned after the contest.

It was true. The Tigers shot a dismal 23 percent for the game; just four of 29 in the first half. They missed 25 shots from within the key and had at least eight layups that toyed with the rim but wouldn't fall through.

"That and our rebounding was the difference in the ballgame," Scott added.

Yes, if Snyder didn't lose this one because of shooting, it was because of a deficiency in rebounding. The taller Central Bobcats only pulled down four more rebounds for the

game, but grabbed 17 defensive boards while Snyder had six offensive. Meaning the Tigers only had a chance at a second shot a half-dozen times.

Looking at those stats, it's a wonder Snyder was in the game at all. But it was scrappy defensive play never let the game get out of hand. While Central eventually won by 14 points, the outcome was questionable with about two and a half minutes left to play.

In fact, Snyder had opened a 7-0 lead at the outset. Both teams missed their first three shots at the basket, but Chad Peterson finally put the hosts on the board with 6:10 left in the first period. Central came

back, however. The Bobcats were led by 6-3 Michael Pfluger, who unlike the Tigers, didn't have any trouble finding the hoop.

Pfluger finally got the Bobcats' first basket with 4:19 to go, and managed two more in the quarter as Central eventually eeked out a 10-9 lead.

Landry won't fault QB for loss to Washington

DALLAS (AP) - Danny White is apparently going to be Coach Tom Landry's quarterback, sink or swim, through the 1983 National Football League playoffs.

Landry said as much Tuesday in the wake of a 31-10 thumping by the Washington Redskins. White was intercepted three times.

"I don't fault him, he's been throwing the ball pretty well," said Landry. "Our inability to move on the ground was the significant thing."

Dallas only had 33 yards rushing, an all-time club low.

Asked if he would replace White should the

Cowboys undergo similar circumstances in the playoffs, Landry said "That would be hard to say."

"When you have the ability of a Danny White or a Roger Staubach, you can pull a game together at the end," Landry said. "Danny could have turned the game around."

Landry said he doesn't like to yank quarterbacks like they are baseball pitchers.

"I don't change quarterbacks too easily," Landry said. "I seldom substitute if we have a chance to win the game."

Landry said media criticism of White's performance "might bother

him." However, Landry added "Any athlete worth anything will overcome the circumstances. Second guessing is the price you pay for being in the limelight."

Landry said it will take time for the Redskin wounds to heal.

"I'm glad we had a one-game buffer into the playoffs, because we would be in sad shape if we had to win this week," Landry said. "It will wear off in time. Right now it's still there and we are embarrassed and our pride is hurt."

The 12-3 Cowboys play at San Francisco next Monday night. If Washington defeats the New York Giants Saturday, the 'Skins will clinch the National Conference East. Dallas would then be the wild card host Dec. 26.

Landry said he would have taken a 12-4 record before the season started.

"If you guarantee me a 12-4 every season I'll stay until I pass (George) Halas," Landry said.

Landry is tied with Curly Lambeau as the second-winningest coach in National Football League history with 234 triumphs.

That's 81 victories short of the late "Papa Bear" Halas of the Chicago Bears.

Landry said the game against the 49ers "will be a tough outing. They are very good, active and have

DENTON, Texas (AP) — When Ron Fink was a kid, he used to go into the dime stores, with every nickel, dime and quarter he could find, "so I could get me some soldiers."

He's 47 now and a band instructor at North Texas State University, but he's still a nut for toy soldiers and cars.

In slam bidders' heaven not only do suits break and finesses work, but the opening lead is seldom the most unfavorable one. Of course, defenders have to be brought in from the nether regions, since heaven is a happy place for all regular inhabitants.

In this mundane sphere, finesses work exactly half the time, suits break 3-2 just 68 percent of the time and the suit led is almost always the one that is going to give declarer problems.

It was easy for West to find the diamond lead. His diamond holding was almost ironclad.

South took his ace. He noted that with any other lead he could draw trumps and make either six or seven depending on the club finesse.

He drew trumps with two leads, paused to consider whether to try the heart or club finesse, but quickly decided to lead his jack of clubs. After all, if he could run clubs he would make seven, while the heart finesse would only give him six. Then there was a chance that a friendly West might cover the jack of clubs. So South led it. Needless to say, West didn't cover, and now South gave himself an extra chance. He hopped up with dummy's ace, picked up East's singleton king and claimed seven.

Note that if the club king had not dropped South would still have had the heart finesse to fall back on. He had increased his chance substantially from a mere 50 percent.

Pilot never knew he was off course

MONTREAL (AP) — The pilot of a South Korean airliner shot down by Soviet fighters apparently never knew that he was off course, that the Soviets tried to intercept him or that his Boeing 747 was finally hit by an air-to-air missile, aviation investigators concluded.

The 113-page report by eight technical experts on the staff of the International Civil Aviation Organization, also noted "a considerable degree of lack of alertness and attentiveness" by the flight crew of the doomed jumbo jet. The report was released Tuesday night.

Korean Air Lines flight 007 was shot down just before dawn Sept. 1 over the Soviet island of Sakhalin near Japan, killing all 269 people aboard. The Soviets contended the plane was on a spy mission for the United States.

Rather than adopt the report, the ICAO's 33-member governing council voted Tuesday to put off further consideration until Jan. 23 and appeal to the Soviet Union to start cooperating with the inquiry.

The council, in a two-day closed-door meeting, adopted a resolution, implicitly rebuking the Soviets, "exhorting all parties to cooperate fully in furnishing to ICAO without reservation all information at their disposal as soon as possible."

The ICAO is a United Nations agency. The United States urged the council, which adopted a resolution in September deploring the incident, to condemn the Soviet action.

"The Soviet Union must face the condemnation of the international aviation community and the world's citizenry" who benefit from free and open use of the world's airspace," Federal Aviation Administration chief J. Lynn Helms told the council during its private session.

A text of Helms' remarks was made available Tuesday to reporters. Beyond condemnation, the agency has no sanctions to impose against the Soviets. A proposed charter change, to be considered in April, would authorize expulsion of any nation that uses force against a civilian airliner.

An emergency session of the council on Sept. 16 ordered the staff inquiry. Investigators then used a Boeing flight training simulator in Seattle to test theories of how the plane may have veered 200 miles north of its intended path.

A Soviet investigation of the incident was attached as a 15-page appendix to the ICAO report. It said the Korean flight was delayed 40 minutes to synchronize its approach to Soviet airspace with overpasses of a U.S. Ferret-D reconnaissance satellite.

The Soviet report concludes that the Korean flight was "a specially planned intelligence-gathering and provocative operation by the special services of the United States."

The ICAO experts said the daily departure of KAL's New York to Seoul flight from its stop in Anchorage, Alaska, was routinely rescheduled to make sure it did not arrive before 6 a.m. local time, when customs and passenger services opened at the Seoul airport.

Because unusually light headwinds explained the delay, the ICAO report says, the investigators discarded the Soviet spy hypothesis. The report says Soviet authorities, once tried to identify the aircraft

through inflight visual observations." Transcripts of the Korean crew's conversations with air traffic controllers in Anchorage and Tokyo are printed in the report.

The investigators concluded: "There was no evidence to indicate that the flight crew of (Korean Air Lines) 007 was aware of the two interception attempts."

"There was no indication that the flight crew of (Korean Air Lines) 007 was aware of the reason for a rapid decompression."

"There was no indication of a major failure in the equipment of the aircraft..."

Investigators considered — but rejected as "too unlikely" — that hijackers could have taken over the plane, the crew could have been suddenly incapacitated and that the entire guidance system could have failed or malfunctioned.

The two theories that survived the simulator tests were: — The crew could have incorrectly entered into the navigation computer 139 degrees West instead of 149 degrees as the longitude of Anchorage, where the last leg of the flight began.

— The pilot could have set a constant magnetic heading of 246 degrees at the beginning of the flight and forgotten to change it.

Either way, the report says, one has to assume "a considerable degree of lack of alertness and attentiveness on the part of the entire flight crew," which should have had many indications the plane was off course.

Suit could be settled within days

AUSTIN (AP) — An agreement could be signed in the next few days in the \$1.7 billion lawsuit filed against Mobil Oil Co. last year by the state of Texas and oilman Clinton Manges, according to published reports.

The settlement would net the state about \$100 million, while Manges would receive up to \$300 million, the Houston Chronicle and The Dallas Morning News reported today.

In addition, the proposal calls for Mobil to sell its leases on Manges' property to Shearson-American Express Inc. for an undisclosed amount, the Chronicle reported.

The Chronicle quoted sources close to the negotiations as saying the money Mobil received from American Express would be used to pay Manges and the state.

"I expect this to be settled before the end of the year," Land Commissioner Garry Mauro told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. "Anything else I say, it might have a detrimental effect on the state."

Mauro's office oversees oil and gas production on state lands. All three newspapers said the settlement could be signed and filed in state district court in Laredo either late this week or early next week. Manges initiated the suit

against Mobil in 1982, claiming that the oil company's 1925 lease on 64,646 acres of his Duval County ranch expired in 1932. Mobil continued to produce oil and gas from the land.

The state joined the suit later that year to protect its interest in 14,506 acres of the lease on which the state owned mineral rights.

A spokesman for Mobil's Texas and New Mexico division acknowledged Tuesday that negotiations are taking place.

"They're negotiating," said Mobil public affairs representative Darlene Taylor. But she added, "I cannot confirm that a settlement is near."

Edmund Finder, senior vice president of Shearson-American Express in New York, refused to discuss the company's reported role in the settlement, saying he had "absolutely no comment on that," the Chronicle reported.

A source close to the negotiations told the News that Mauro and other officials were trying to decide whether to make details of a settlement public.

Gov. Mark White, who was attorney general when the state joined Manges in the lawsuit, told the Chronicle he had "heard that they may be very close to a settlement."

Jobless declines spreading; retailers enjoy strong holiday

Unemployment rates are down in all but five states, the U.S. Labor Department says, but a major New York bank predicts such improvement will be hard to maintain next year.

Merchants, meanwhile, should enjoy their best Christmas selling season in several years this month in view of the 1.9 percent rise in retail sales in November, economists said.

But the sales gain, pointing to continued economic growth, helped push bond prices lower and short-term interest rates higher in the credit markets Tuesday.

Some traders believe the Federal Reserve wants to slow the economic expansion to hold off inflation, and therefore might squeeze its grip on credit, lifting interest rates.

For now the recovery appears to be spreading through most of the nation. All but five of the 50 states showed lower unemployment rates in October than a year earlier, the Labor Department said.

Rates were higher in Delaware, Oklahoma and West Virginia, while jobless levels were unchanged in Arkansas and Maine.

But "it is unlikely that improvements in 1984 will proceed at the recent pace," the Bank of New York said in a new report.

"Not only will moderating advances in production temper employment gains, but a cyclical rebound in the number of job seekers could also make additional reductions in unemployment hard to achieve," the bank said.

Retail sales in November totaled a seasonally adjusted \$102.5 billion, up from \$100.6 billion in October, the Commerce Department said.

That included record-high auto sales and gains for stores selling clothing, building supplies and food.

Other economy-related news: —Holiday Inns Inc. plans to develop a nationwide chain of economy-priced hotels under the Hampton Inn trade name, said President Michael D. Rose. The new chain will consist of approximately 300 hotels within five years, he said.

—Pan American World Airways said it will offer a \$99 one-way discount fare between New York and Florida, throwing in a free car for a day. The fare would take effect Jan. 5 and would apply between New York City airports and Miami, Orlando, Tampa and West Palm Beach.

—Snyder police were called to investigate six misdemeanor theft complaints Tuesday.

Gay Hickman filed the day's first complaint at 8:53 a.m. He told investigators that a ladder owned by Western Texas College had been stolen from his pickup while the vehicle was parked at Whataburger on south College Ave. between 7 and 7:10 a.m. Tuesday.

Want no war with Syria

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan said today American forces in Lebanon will continue to defend themselves against attacks by Syrian forces but said the United States wants no war with Syria.

"We're not there to shoot first," he said.

Reagan, in a brief question-and-answer session with reporters in the White House press room, said that if there is a complete collapse of authority in Lebanon and no possibility of restoring order there would be no point in keeping a multinational force — of which 1,600 Marines are a part — in that troubled country.

"There would be no reason to stay," he said.

But Reagan repeated the rationale for keeping the Marines on duty as "peacekeepers" — to create a climate for stability that would allow a central Lebanese government to take hold.

On a matter closer to home, Reagan said the country will learn on Jan. 29 whether he intends to seek a second term. An administration source said earlier that Reagan will run and will announce his candidacy in a television address on that night.

The source, speaking anonymously, said Reagan agreed on the broad outlines of a re-election announcement in a meeting with associates on Tuesday.

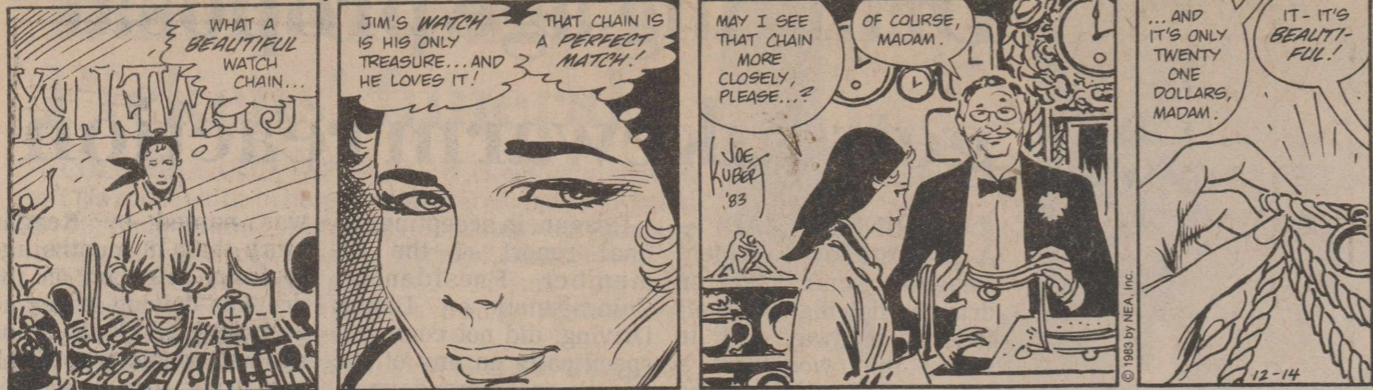

Engineers study fire aboard Columbia craft

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — A fire feeding on leaking fuel erupted in a rear compartment of space shuttle Columbia just as it was landing last week at Edwards Air Force, Calif. and the problem must be studied and understood before another flight of the winged spacecraft, officials said.

Johnson Space Center officials said in an announcement Tuesday that the fire occurred two minutes before Columbia landed last Thursday and that it was followed a few minutes after landing by an explosion that destroyed two fuel line valves.

Neither the six astronauts nor Mission Control were aware of the fire and explosion. The landing appeared normal. The fire damage was discovered on Friday, the day after the landing, when technicians removed a panel while preparing Columbia for a ferry trip across the country.

Astronauts aboard Columbia were not endangered by the fire or explosion, which took place in the stern, far away from the crew compartment, officials said.

The fire extinguished itself when the leaking fuel was consumed, NASA officials said.

Columbia was landing at the California base after a highly successful 10-day mission. It carried the European-built Spacelab in its cargo bay and a crew of six — the largest ever — including the first European member of an American spacecraft crew.

Columbia was scheduled to leave Edwards Air Force Base today on a cross-country ferry trip atop a modified 747 jetliner.

The ferry ship was scheduled to leave California about 10 a.m. EST and stop for refueling at Biggs Army Air Field in El Paso, Texas about two hours later.

Following an overnight stop at Kelly Air Force Base, the ferry ship will fly to Eglin Air Force Base, Fla. for another refueling stop, followed by a short hop across Florida to the Kennedy Space Center.

Officials said the fire sprang from a leak in a line supplying hydrazine fuel to two auxiliary power units. The APUs are high speed turbines which power the shuttle hydraulic system during launch and landing. The hydraulic system is used to move flight control sur-

faces and deploy the landing gear.

NASA spokesman Steve Nesbitt said the fires erupted on APUs 1 and 2 just two minutes before Columbia made an apparently uneventful landing. APU 3 was not affected and only one of the devices is required for landing.

About four minutes after landing, APU 1 shut down, said Nesbitt, and four minutes after that a fuel control valve exploded. APU 2 immediately turned itself off and 15 minutes later a second fuel control valve exploded.

"Both APUs had functioned normally until the auto shutdown," said the NASA announcement. "The fire extinguished itself when free hydrazine was consumed."

Spectators at the landing saw smoke and a yellow flame spurting from the rear of Columbia, but NASA told news reporters then that the fire and smoke were normal venting. Nesbitt insisted Tuesday that the visible fire was not associated with the APU blazes.

Nesbitt said the fire burned paint, glue and wiring insulation in the rear compartment where APU 1 and 2 are located, and two fuel line valves were destroyed.

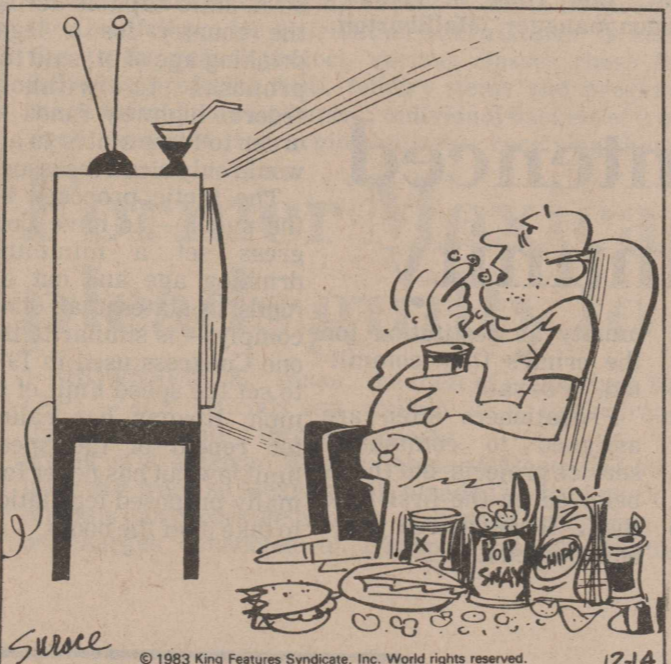
Glynn Lunney, the Johnson Space Center shuttle program manager, said the cause of the fuel leak must be found and corrected, if necessary, before the next space shuttle mission, now set for launch on Jan. 28.

Lunney said he didn't expect the January flight to be delayed because correcting the leak problem appears "pretty straight forward". The leak source, he said, could be as

simple as a failed "O release of an announcement about the fire."

NASA spokesman John MacLeaish said he could offer no explanation for what he called the "slow" He said technicians at Edwards found evidence of the fire late Friday.

Panel sees problems

WASHINGTON (AP) — Members of a presidential task force on hunger in America "all recognize there are serious problems out there," but they are unable to find much data on the subject, the panel's chairman says.

J. Clayburn La Force Jr., dean of the Graduate School of Management at the University of California, said Tuesday that at this point he believes the only recommendation the task force is certain to make is that better information be collected on the problem.

The Task Force on Food Assistance has held seven hearings around the country since President Reagan appointed the group last August, saying he was perplexed and concerned about reports that hunger is becoming a major problem.

Members of the panel reached for telephone interviews generally avoided strong criticism of presidential counselor Edwin Meese III, who said last week some people go to soup kitchens "because the food is free and that's easier than paying for it" and that he had seen no "authoritative evidence" that there are hungry children in America.

"We all recognize there are serious problems out there," La Force said. "(But) we have found an alarming lack of substantive information and data."

John Driggs, chairman of the board of Western Savings and Loan Association in Phoenix, said in a telephone interview. He said Meese "is accurate that there is no national data about the extent of the problem — that's why we're in existence."

La Force said the panel has obtained few facts and figures while logging testimony from food program workers and hungry poor people.

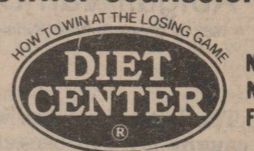

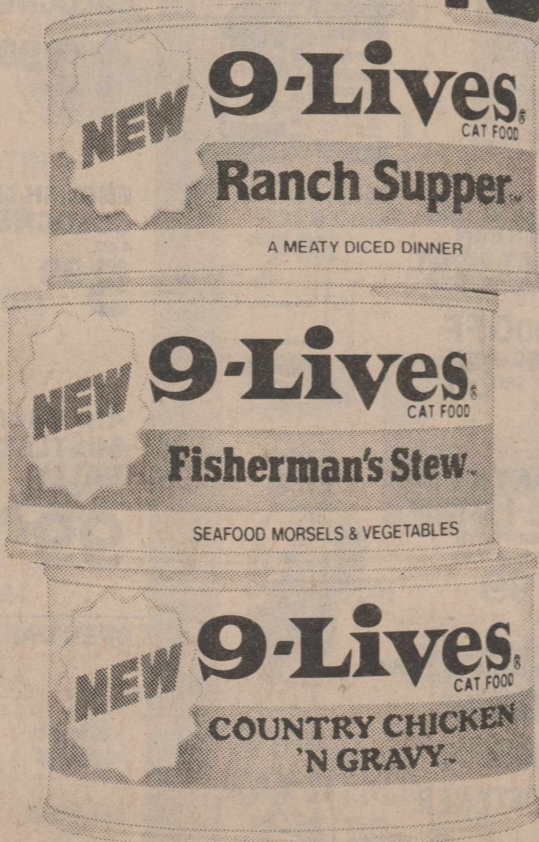

Cirrhosis of liver

DEAR DR. LAMB — I am a 45-year-old woman. Early this year I had an attack of alcoholic hepatitis. Although I feel slightly recovered I still have two or three bowel movements a day, itching and impaired circulation. I also notice small red spots on my body.

How will I know how much damage has been done to the liver and whether I can regain an adequate amount of liver function? How soon? Can you recommend a diet or medication? Will all the symptoms eventually improve and disappear?

DEAR READER — Fortunately the liver has about the best regenerative capacity of any organ in the body. That doesn't mean it will recover entirely, but you do have a good chance of a return to adequate function.

The best index of how you are progressing will be from various blood tests that measure liver function. These may remain abnormal long after your symptoms have disappeared.

The red spots are an indication of active liver disease and as you recover they should disappear.

Not everyone who has damaged his or her liver with alcohol makes a complete recovery. The liver may become scarred and contracted, called cirrhosis of the liver.

You may be surprised to know that a high percentage of the deaths in the United States are caused by cirrhosis of the liver. It is the fourth most common cause of death in men between the ages of 35 and 54 and fifth in women of the same age group. About 60 percent of these cases of cirrhosis are caused by alcohol. But I must emphasize that many people have cirrhosis of the liver and it is not from alcohol.

I am sending you The Health Letter 7-8, Living With Your Liver, which discusses alcohol liver damage and other causes for liver damage. Others who want this issue can send 75 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it to me in care of this newspaper, P.O. Box 1551, Radio City Station, New York, NY 10019.

Let your doctor guide you on your diet as your liver status will make a difference. Obviously you should never touch alcohol again. It is toxic to the liver and you may gain some benefit from additional amounts of the vitamin B group.

DEAR READERS — Now that the cold weather is here, it is important to consider the problem of temperature, particularly as it relates to older people. As a person ages, the cold is difficult to tolerate. Many deaths occur each year because of cold exposure; cold weather is undoubtedly a factor in many disorders.

Cold exposure most often occurs in the home itself. Older people should not be in rooms below 65 degrees. Be sure that is room temperature, not just the temperature where the thermostat is. The bedroom where an older person is staying may be colder than the room where the thermostat or thermometer is located.

While people complain of coldness and may shiver at body temperatures between 95 and 97 they may not feel cold or shiver at lower body temperatures. It is important for older people to have their body temperature measured regularly if there is any exposure to lower temperatures.

Be sure the thermometer is shaken down below 95 degrees. If it reads 98 before you put it in the mouth that will be the lowest reading even if the body temperature is 94.

Personality changes, stiffness and loss of coordination can occur. Cold temperature is a major factor in causing falls in older people. So dress warmly, even for bed and don't let the rooms get too cold.
