Last Weeks Rain Helps Moisture

The Board re-elected all teachers upon the recommendation of Supt. J. B. Cushing and all are to be assigned classes and grades by the superintendent according to next year's enrollment and the school's needs.

Principals, Miss Edith Wilkerson and Vance Dickenson and coaches, Bobby Dods and Glenn Kinzey were extended contracts for next year at the February meeting of the Board.

At the December meeting the board extended Supt. Cushing's contract for three years to cover the 1961-62, 63, and 64 school years.

Sweetwater Production Credit Ass'n. Saluted

Colorado City Chamber Commerce Asks For Another Livestock Barn

The Colorado City Chamber of Commerce has presented a resolution to the Commissioners Court of Mitchell County asking that the county build another stock show barn to be used along with the one the county has already provided.

The Commissioners Court has before it the resolution requesting the additional facilities but no definite action has been taken on the request.

The resolution, signed by chamber president Dr. Seth B. Cowan stated:

"As the Board of Directors of the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce have noted with interest the outstanding service to the county the Commissioners Court has done in building an agricultural barn."

Mayor Dr. B. H. Johnson Monday received a letter from the Railroad Commission of Texas in which the petition of the T&P to close and dismantle the depot here was granted.

The order was signed by William J. Murray Jr., chairman and Ernest O. Thompson and Olin Culberson, members of the Commission.

The last paragraph of the letter contained the following: "Therefore, it is ordered by the Railroad Commission of Texas that the Texas and Pacific Railway Company be, and it is, hereby authorized to discontinue its agency at Loraine; to make Loraine, Texas, a non-agency station and to retire and dismantle the depot building at that point. It is made one of the conditions of this order that the present schedule of truck service by the Texas and Pacific Motor Transport Company at Loraine shall be continued."

Dr. Johnson called Mr. Owens in Abilene Tuesday to see if the R. R. would give the depot to the Boy Scouts. Mr. Owens told him the depot will be boarded up and help intact for a year before any disposition is made of it.

For many outdoorsmen the hunting season ends too soon. Just about the time they have warmed up to some exciting shooting, closing date rolls around.
A few years ago that meant cleaning and putting up the firearms until the following fall, unless the shooter had a yen for trap or skeet shooting. But many hunters have discovered skeet and trap just don't compare with a day in the field. Except for varmint shooting, rabbits and squirrels in some

counties, Texas hunting season is closed until next fall. But there still are some places in the state where the scattergun artist can legally hunt until March 31.
These places are the "put and take" farms or shooting preserves. At the present time there are 13 recognized shooting preserves in 12 Texas counties. This type of hunting has met with such success that within the next year the number of shooting preserves probably will exceed 20.
Four species of birds are

hunted on these farms—quail, ringneck pheasant, chukar partridge and mallard ducks. A few of Texas' shooting preserves offer all four birds, but most specialize in just quail, pheasant and chukar.

It's strictly fee hunting, with the resort charging a set price for each bird bagged. The bag limit is that imposed by the hunter's wallet.

All birds shot on these farms are pen-raised. That might give the hunter the feeling that the birds are tame. One hunter on a game farm will prove otherwise—particularly in the case of pheasants which seem to revert to the wild in a matter of hours.

In a typical game preserve hunt, attendants release a number of birds in the field several hours before the hunters arrive. This gives the birds enough time to start foraging and work to cover.

Resorts provide dogs and guides for each party of hunters, and the size of a party usually is limited to about four guns. Some resorts will allow hunters to bring their own dogs,

if the animals are well-trained. Texas shooting preserve owners have been aided by Joe B. Davidson, field representative of the Sportsmen's Service Bureau.

Davidson came to the Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana area last fall.

Formerly chief of the management for the Illinois Department of Conservation, Davidson has been working since 1955 with shooting preserve operators.

Shooting preserve promotion work done by Davidson is part of a program initiated in 1954 by the Shooting Arms and Ammunition Manufacturers' Institute.

Two other field men are similarly engaged in this work in other sections of the nation. When the program was started, there were game farms in 22 states. Today these farms offer fine shooting in 41 states, and it is estimated that over one million game birds, artificially propagated and released for hunting under natural conditions, have been harvested by sportsmen on nearly 1,300 shoot-

ing preserves throughout the nation.

Scurry County: Simmons Valley Hunting Resort, at Snyder.

Shelby County: Hawkeye Hunting Club at Center (a membership operation.)

Slaton County: S-Bar Ranch Shooting Resort at Slaton.

Smith County: Duck Creek Game Preserve at Lindale and Quail Hill Farm at Tyler.

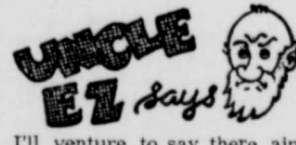
Wood County: Mineola Hunting Club at Mineola.

For the hunter who travels in many states, a complete list of approved shooting preserves is listed in The National Directory of Shooting Preserves. This directory may be obtained free from the Sportsmen's Service Bureau, 250 East 43rd St., New York 17, N. Y.

All shooting preserves require hunters to make advance reservations since only one or two parties are permitted to take the field at the same time. The preserves include in their service the dressing of all game bagged and packaging for quick freezing.

Some of the larger shooting preserves have private air strips for sportsmen who fly their own planes.

You'll find good shooting on the shooting preserves and best of all you know the game is there.



Veterans News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. What kind of prosthetic appliances may eligible veterans receive from the VA?

A. These include artificial limbs and eyes, braces, trusses, orthopedic shoes, crutches, canes, eyeglasses, hearing aids, wheelchairs, and special clothing.

Blind veterans entitled to disability compensation may receive a guide dog and special mechanical and electronic equipment.

Veterans receiving regular aid and attendance support from the VA are entitled to an invalid lift, if medically indicated.

Q. Under the old pension law,

an eligible veteran's monthly payment is increased from \$66.15 to \$78.75 after he has been on the rolls for 10 years, or upon reaching age 65. Does the rate change under the new law?

A. Not because of age or length of time on the pension rolls. The rate may change because of change in the veteran's income, his net worth, or the number of dependents.

Q. Once I have designated a relative as beneficiary of my GI insurance policy, do I have to keep this person as beneficiary?

A. The GI policyholder may change his beneficiary at any time. However, the VA must be notified of the change. You may write directly to your VA insurance office or you may call at the nearest VA office and get a blank form which may be sent.

Q. My sister is a widow of a veteran is planning to remarry.

Will she forfeit her pension payments?

A. The law requires that pension payments be stopped when the recipient widow remarries.

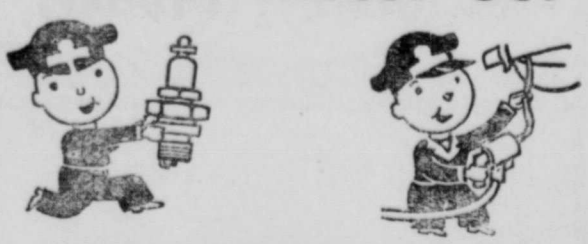

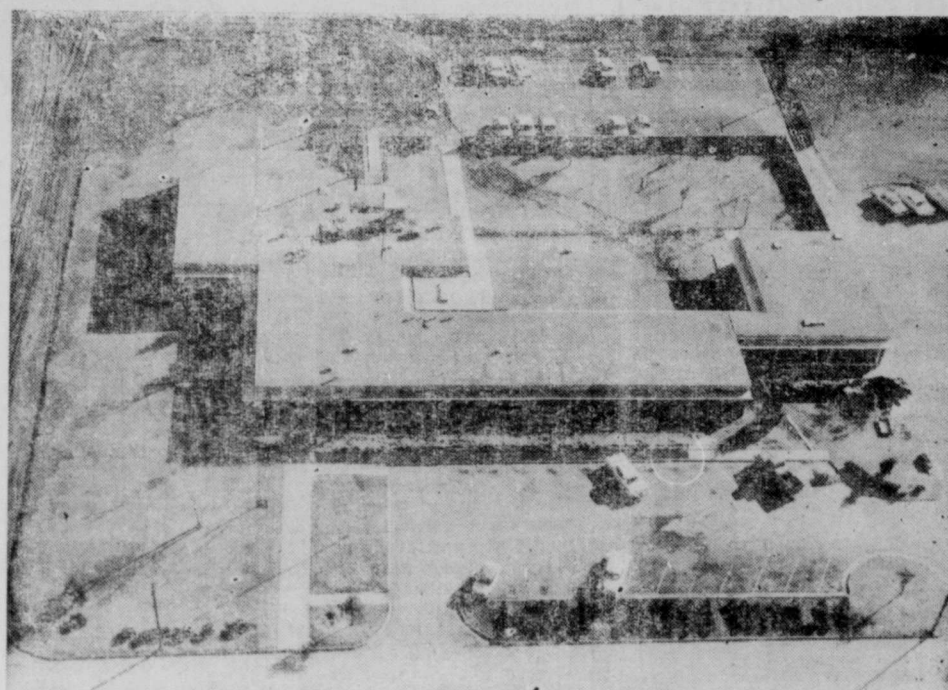

USE OF USDA RESOURCES QUESTIONED

Whether the U. S. Department of Agriculture has been utilizing all of its resources to seek solutions for the growing agricultural crisis has been put to the question in the newest report of the House Committee on Government Operations.

In a summary of its report, the House committee states flatly that resources of the USDA essential to the development of a workable farm program have not been fully utilized by policy-making officials.

Elaborating on the charge, the report notes that although many variations have been proposed, the basic methods of dealing with the surplus problem which have been and are being given serious consideration are neither numerous nor, in principle, particularly complicated. . . . Among its 85,000 employees, the USDA has experts on almost every conceivable aspect of agriculture — men who have devoted their entire careers to their particular fields. Use of the skills of these individuals is essential in the development of a sound farm program.

"Despite the resources available in the Department, however, it

does not appear that USDA officials on the policy-making level have made a careful objective and coordinated analysis of the effects or probable results of the various price support and production control methods which have been tried or proposed in recent years in order to work out the best possible farm program.

"An example of this is the recommendation by the USDR that the acreage reserved program on corn be abandoned, while the Department recommended a program calling for price supports without acreage restrictions. The Department has claimed that it reduced corn production in 1958 through the acreage reserved at a cost of 37 cents per bushel, its own estimates indicate that it will cost more than double that amount just to store and handle each bushel of corn taken over under the new corn program.

"The committee is calling attention to these facts to point out the lack of analysis of this situation by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, rather than for the purpose of taking a position on the merits of the acreage reserve program."

It was pointedly recommended that "the Department begin with-

out delay a comprehensive and objective study of the major methods which are being used or proposed for the purpose of price support and production adjustment in order that the most complete and accurate factual data possible concerning the advantages and disadvantages of each such proposed method or combination of methods will be available before the next session of Congress."

Field Day At Tech For Young Farmers

A Young Farmer Education Field Day will be held at Texas Tech College in Lubbock on Saturday, March 25, for Young Farmers in north, west, and central regions of Texas.

Approximately 200 Young Farmers from 36 Young Farmer Chapters are expected to attend the field day event. The Young Farmer organization is sponsored under auspices of vocational agriculture departments in the public schools and is for young men between ages 18 and 35 years who are engaged in farming or in farm related occupations.

Several members of the Mitchell County Young Farmers Association are planning to attend the field day.

A program tailored to meet Young Farmer needs has been planned by a Young Farmer committee working with personnel from the Lubbock Experiment Station and Texas Tech College. The first part of the field day at Lubbock will place emphasis on "Managing the Production Factors for Greatest Net Return to the Farmer" and will be presented by a group headed by C. E. Fisher, Superintendent of the Texas Experiment Station at Lubbock. Fisher points out that he and his panel members will attempt to wrap up such factors as fertilizer, cultural practices, irrigation, and varieties into a single management package for cotton, grain sorghum, and oil seed crops.

In the afternoon, two separate programs will be conducted simultaneously. One will be designed for those interested in livestock feeding and will feature a talk on "Farm Feeding of Beef Cattle" by Grady Shephard; the talk will be followed by a tour of Lewter Feeding Operations. The other afternoon program will be for those interested in cotton and will be highlighted by a talk by Dr. Walter Rogers at Texas Tech College and the Lubbock Experiment Station on "Economic Problems in the Production of Quality Cotton." Following the talk by Dr. Rogers, the group will be conducted on a tour of the fiber testing laboratory and spinning laboratory by Bill Crumley, Director of Textile Laboratories.

Economic outlook in farming will be given special attention at a luncheon at noon provided through courtesy of the National Farm Life Insurance Company and Agricultural Workers Mutual Auto Insurance Company. Dr. J. Wayland Bennett, Head of the Agricultural Economics Department at Texas Tech, will be the principal speaker at the luncheon.

During the field day program drawings for door prizes will be held. Among the individual prizes to be awarded will be a pair of shop made boots to be presented through courtesy of the Justin Boot Company of Fort Worth. Cash attendance prizes for chapters will be provided by Grady Grain and Milling Company.

T. L. Leach of the Agricultural Education Department at Texas Tech is in charge of all arrangements for the field day. Master of Ceremonies at the various sessions will be State Young Farmer Vice Presidents N. E. Childers of Quail and D. V. Phipps of Welch.

Registration for the field day

is scheduled for 8:30-9:30 Saturday morning in the lobby of the Agriculture Building. Coffee will be served during registration through courtesy of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce. The program is scheduled to end at 4:30 p. m.

COLLEGE BOARD'S SCHOLASTIC APTITUDE TEST ADMINISTERED TO SENIORS

Ben Clopton, Walter Clopton and Stanley Martin, seniors in Loraine High School, were administered at their request the College Entrance Examination Board's Scholastic Aptitude Test Saturday, March 18, at Abilene. Students entering certain institutions of higher learning require the SAT. Others only require the ACT of American College Tests or no tests.

The SAT is designed to help colleges make sound choices among students applying for admission. The test is not infallible, but when considered together with the student's high school record, letters of recommendation, and interviews it can forecast quite well how each student is likely to do in college.

Since the courses, academic standards, and grading systems of secondary schools, as well as the ability of various classes, differ widely, the SAT scores are a means by which all applicants can be evaluated in similar terms. Thus the scores help colleges to make a fair comparison of the student's records with those of applicants from other schools and to predict whether or not they can undertake college studies successfully.

There is no "passing mark" for the SAT test. Each college interprets the results according to its own standards, which are based on the ability necessary to succeed at that institution.

Because the SAT helps predict college success, the student can use the test results to evaluate his college plans. The test scores will be mailed to the student's school with leaflets explaining how he can interpret the scores. His school advisor is also provided with additional information which will help him understand the meaning of his scores.

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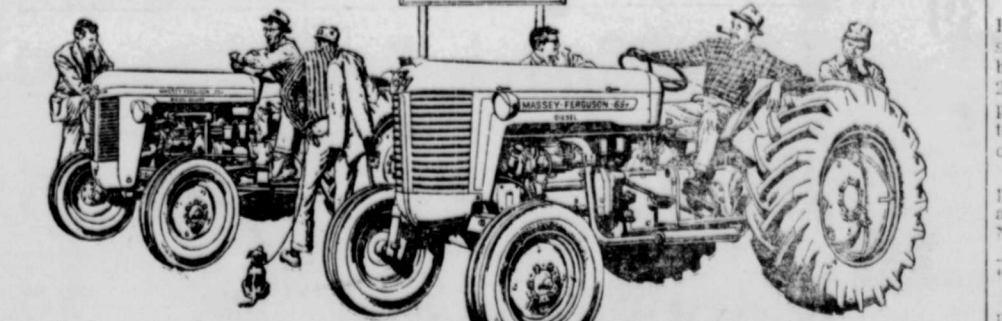

Secretary of State Frank LaSalle announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring reappointment for the new term, ending June 1, 1963 must requalify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of their residence between June 1, 1961 and June 10, 1961.

LaSalle emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for reappointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the necessary checks be made by the County Clerk.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between April 1, 1961 and May 20, 1961. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of reappointing present Notaries.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

Farm Facts

Farm efficiency has increased more in the past 18 years than in the preceding 120.

Productivity of the American farm worker now is growing more than twice as fast as the productivity of workers in industry, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reminds us.

Since 1950, output per man-hour in non-agricultural industry has risen 2 per cent a year. In agriculture the increase has averaged 5 per cent per year.

The USDA cites the broiler industry as a good example of efficiency from farm to supermarket. Research developed a faster-growing broiler and a better diet for it. This new type of bird, fed the improved diet, produces a 3-pound broiler in 9 weeks, as compared with a 1.6-pound broiler in 9 weeks 30 years ago.

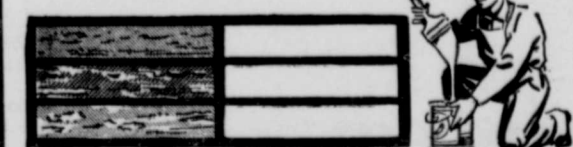

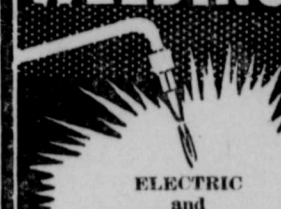
