



Talk about the pot calling the kettle black! Pravda, the official communist party newspaper, published in the USSR, has been critical lately about United States interference in West Europe affairs by warning against communist participation in their governments. The reference was to Secretary Kissinger's comments concerning the dangers of allowing reds to infiltrate the governments of France and Italy.

Pravda says that "This attempt to stop the social and political development of the countries of Western Europe contradicts the elementary principle of non-interference in the affairs of other countries solemnly enunciated in the final act signed at Helsinki and in other diplomatic documents."

How's that for pious preaching by the country that has just sent its own troops and Cuba's to Angola to interfere in that government's affairs and to help their communist stooge take charge of the country? Or, going back several years, we can recall that the Soviet used tanks and troops, not words, to interfere with the governments of Hungary and Czechoslovakia, and it has been quite influential in keeping that wall between East and West Berlin.

The story was the same during all of the Vietnam affair. The Soviets were mouthing off constantly about US interference, but were equally busy helping the other side.

Under the circumstances it's hard to understand how the reds can feel justified in complaining, so we have to conclude, as usual, that the prime purpose is the effect this line of propaganda can have on the rest of the world. The reds are spreading their message to a lot of people who do not get ours, saying that we are the world outlaws while implying that reds are lily white.

Aside from spreading that message, we like to think that USSR is gripping because our "interference" is having some of the desired effect in the countries concerned. People of those countries obviously have non-communist majorities, because otherwise they would already be taken over by the reds, and the Kremlin objects to anything that would tend to preserve freedom.

So, we have to agree with Dr. Kissinger when he says "I have an obligation to make clear what I feel the consequences of certain events are, even if we cannot control them." Regardless of how fussy the Russians get, we really should keep in mind that US has too great a stake in the political future of Western Europe to remain silent.

Referring to the strike in the tire industry, Herb Philbrick of US Press Association comes up with an idea that appears to make a lot of sense. He proposes a law which requires both sides of a labor dispute, union and management alike, to reach a new contract before an old one expires. And if they do not, "then levy a fine" on both sides of such massive proportions that both will be willing to get down to serious bargaining in a hurry. The fine could be levied on behalf of the public, local or general, to compensate for the suffering they have to endure when bargaining fails.

"This approach would not deny collective bargaining, but just put it on a civilized framework. Above all, it would protect the public from being the victims of self-interest and cupidity of both management and labor."

The idea has lots of strong appeal. As all of us know, only the public is the loser in a strike. Workers nowadays seldom if ever fail to get the handsome raise they demand. Pay that is lost during a strike is offset by the higher pay. They are not hurt. Neither is management, because the cost of higher pay is simply added to the cost of the product. Actually the only loser is the public, which has to pay the higher price for the product.

Philbrick says the process of striking is idiotic and barbaric. Both sides of the dispute know the day that the old agreement expires and have no valid excuse for failing to work out a new agreement by then. One has to suspect that a big reason for the drawn-out dickering is to make it appear that union bosses are doing something

Treasurer Albert Lippe reported that not all accounts have been cleared but the indication is that the Chamber of Commerce will have small profit. President Bertha Hamric had a similar comment on the success, saying that apparently all realized a profit, which should encourage local organizations to participate in the next German Week.

Regarding if and when the next one will be held, the members had no definite comment, but it seemed to be taken for granted. It was suggested that the date is probably the best possible, before graduation and harvest and normally the time of year for moderate weather. It was agreed that if the event is held the planning will have to start soon, as it did last year.

Among the comments: the historical pageant and the queen's pageant were two well presented and delightful shows and the Saturday night concert and dance was outstanding. An instrument malfunction was the only blemish on the Sunday night dance, but the square dance exhibition was welcome during the delay and music was great once it got started. Also 93 kegs of beer and 3600 pounds of sausage were consumed during the four days.

Special attention of members was invited to federal Public Law 93-641, which calls for concentration of hospital services in the cities and reduces small town hospitals to little more than first aid centers. Keggereis was a native of Akron, O., born on July 7, 1939. He has lived here for about 2 1/2 years and was employed in the oil field.

Survivors are his mother, Iris; his father Paul Keggereis of El Dorado, Ark.; two sons, Richard Lee Jr. and Mack of New Orleans; one daughter Cathylene Keggereis of New Orleans, two sisters and one brother.

## Small Hospital Survival Threatened by Regulation

The Administrator, D. M. Bright, of Muenster Memorial Hospital, this date, released the third in a series of news releases from the Hubbard Lake Hospital Group, Inc. and Northeast Texas Health Advisory Group concerning PL-93-641, The National Health Planning and Resources Development Act of 1974.

It reads as follows: (Title) Our Medical Care Threatened. It has become obvious over the last several weeks that a very real threat exists to hospitals, nursing homes and the general quality of medical care in Muenster and towns like Muenster.

The threat comes from the National Health Planning and Resource Development Act of 1974, a new federal law that creates an experimental "two-level" system of medical care.

In plain language, what the law sets up is a plan that would force anyone with any kind of serious illness to go

to a "region-all" center for treatment, leaving small-town doctors with hospitals that are only first-aid stations and with arbitrary bureaucratic regulations in place of their own good judgment to decide which cases they can or cannot handle.

First-rate doctors will not move into a "primary care" (meaning simple care only) area where they are allowed to use only a few of their skills and those already here will have little reason to stay.

Ed Miller, the Texarkana attorney who headed the steering system to set up the Northeast Texas Health Systems Agency under this new law, told a public hearing in Marshall last month that there was no doubt it meant "sweeping changes" in the whole health care delivery system. And he rightly added that anyone who didn't like it should look to Washington and try to change the law.

The federal government is reaching out to take more control over people's lives, but access to close-by, first-rate medical care is too basic a need to lose without a fight. So be sure to let congress know your need and wants. Act today for your cause.

The many retired persons who've moved to your County and other rural parts of Texas may be forced back to the cities they left if that's where all the doctors are. And there are many other implications, all frightening to people in rural areas.

If you have a heart attack or a bad accident, you want the quickest medical attention you can get, even if transfer to a larger medical center is indicated.

A town is made up of many services, merchants with a variety of inventories desired by buyers, food stores, drug stores, services of such professionals as lawyers, accountants, insurance agents, and the usual government services. Schools are necessary to make a complete city, too. And certainly adequate medical care is essential to the

make-up of a complete town. Government planners should recognize this! Your reason for residing in or near a town is made up of all these above facilities. There is no reason for the existence of a town or city unless it has a complete range of services and goods to offer its area residents, particularly medical care of the first class.

Doctors, nurses and technicians can go elsewhere to practice their professions. So it's the people — not the medical health team — who have the most to lose.

What better time than the Bicentennial year to see whether elected officials shall pay any attention to what the people want?

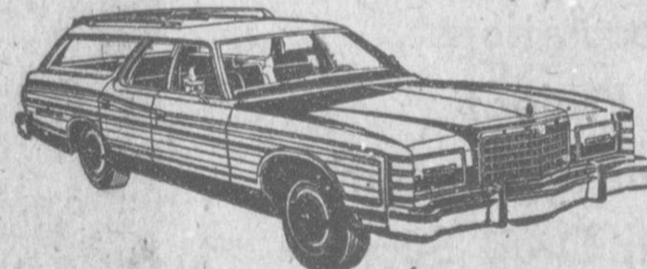

**Clean Air Act to Increase Cost of Electric Service**

The Clean Air Act and amendments now under consideration by the U. S. Senate will add an extra \$2,625 in electric costs to each Texas household over a 15-year period, J. F. Skelton, Texas Power & Light Company president, said today.

Amendments to the existing Clean Air Act are scheduled for debate in the Senate during the first week of May, he noted.

"The Clean Air Act is already estimated to cost every Texas household \$1,765 over the 15-year span from 1975 to 1990," he explained. "We had hoped the amendments in Senate Bill 3219 would reduce this figure, but instead they will add another \$860 to the amount."

Skelton's figures are based on a report prepared by Dr. Lewis J. Perl of the National Economic Research Associates.

Skelton stressed that the charges are in addition to the electric costs customers are now paying and those which will be paid in the future.

"If these amendments become law, companies such as TP&L will be forced to install expensive — and unreliable — scrubbers at its coal-fueled power plants," Skelton said. "Additionally, we could be forced to use imported coal whose delivery costs would be exceedingly high. In either or both cases, our customers would bear the burden of these additional charges."

He said that scrubbers are neither economically nor technologically feasible at the present time. "They do more harm than good to the environment," Skelton declared.

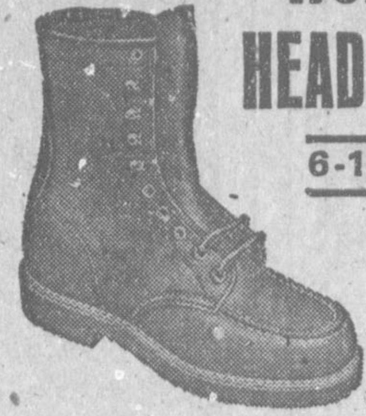
Skelton suggests that Texans immediately write Senators Tower and Bentsen expressing their opposition to Senate Bill 3219 and asking that the current Clean Air Act be amended so that its costs of implementation are reduced, not increased.

Virtually every bank account (savings or checking) in the United States is insured against loss up to \$40,000 for each account by an agency of the federal government. The agency is called the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, or FDIC.

Funds paid into the insurance pool to protect depositors' accounts do not come from taxpayers' pockets, however. The FDIC pool is financed by the banks themselves, who each year pay a certain percentage of funds into the FDIC.

The idea of banks pooling a portion of their funds is not new in this country. In 1819 the Suffolk Bank of Boston began redeeming the notes of other banks, so long as the bank issuing the notes had paid into a redemption fund (like the FDIC pool) established by the Suffolk bank.

The FDIC, which was created after the bank holiday in the early 1930s, also serves as a part of the bank regulatory process, along with the Federal Reserve System, the Comptroller of the Currency and State Banking Agencies.

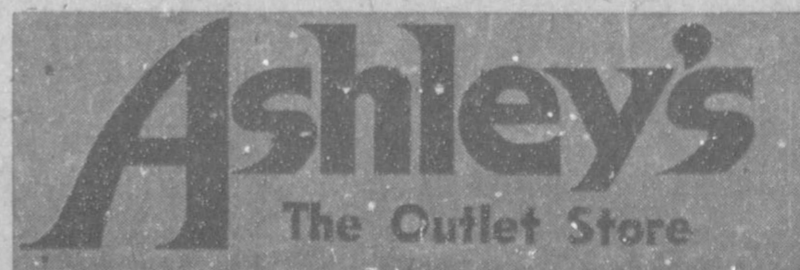
