## Now and Then.

It is an undeniable fact that we have German Democrats in Texas, and this is a little singular considering the treatment the Germans have received at the hands of the democracy, particularly during the days of the democratic Confederacy; even those Germans that threw their whole soul into the lost cause, have had to confess that their efforts received but little recognition from the leaders of the rebellion.

During that disgraceful struggle the best German soldiers were looked upon with contempt and distrust, and the treatment that was dealt out to those who were opposed to the Confederacy is too well understood to require any comment.

There are some events that are written on the brain with a pen of iron dipped in blood and fire; and the treatment of the Germans in Texas by the Confederates is one of them.

The attempt to perpetuate slavery was bad enough, but they clapped the climax of infamy by the means they used to carry out this infamous project. When, in the history of any country, was official corruption flaunted in the faces of the people as it was then, when the concealed counter jumper or professional black leg ruled supreme over the lives and fortunes of the people.

Cotton was King, and we Germans were slaves in the fullest sense of the word. We had the choice of transporting the cotton of the ruling scoundrels (among them Hancock) or to be hunted down like wild beasts. From the Commanding General, down to the tax collector, they plundered without ceasing; and the taxes that were wrung from the people, not only money was demanded, and a large part of the crop, but frequently they resorted to open robbery, and woe to him who dared to raise his hand or his voice against the armed villians.

## Burglary.

THE BURGLAR CAUGHT IN THE ACT, CHAINED AND BROUGHT TO JAIL BY TWO CITIZENS.

Yesterday morning about 2 o'clock the inmates of Mr. John Mockers house on Flores Street, near Schreiner's candle factory, the two Mocket brothers were aroused by a noise about the premises and sallied out to ascertain the cause, and encountered a Mexican, who proved to be Augustine Hernandez. Being an unseasonable hour of the morning for visitors, the brothers Mocket at once seized the intruder, secured him and then commenced search of the house to see if anything was missing.

To their surprise they found in the road near the house a trunk, which had been broken open and most of its contents carefully piled up near by to be borne away by the burglar.

Upon further search it was found, that a second trunk in the same apartment from which the first was taken, was prepared for removal also, and it was upon the return of the Mexican for this trunk that he was discovered and seized.

Upon the discovery of these evidences of the man's crime, the outraged brothers were unable to restrain their resentment, accordingly set upon the thief, and gave him a wholesome drubbing, after which they marched him off to the jail and delivered him over to the authorities.

All the facts show that no policeman was within two miles of the scene at the time of the burglary, and the entire police force were innocent of the knowledge of the affair until the prisoner was safely delivered at the jail by the two citizens whose premises had been entered.

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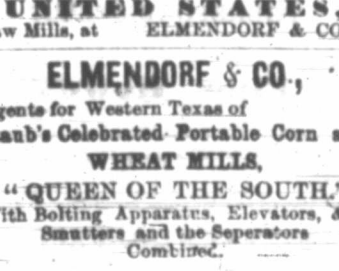

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
