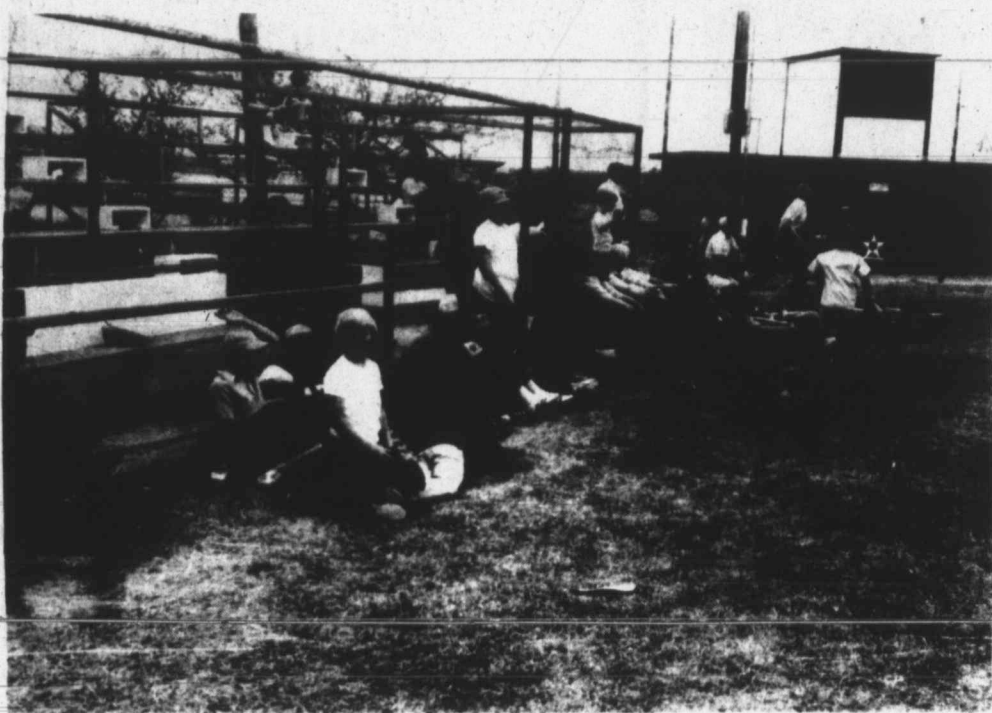
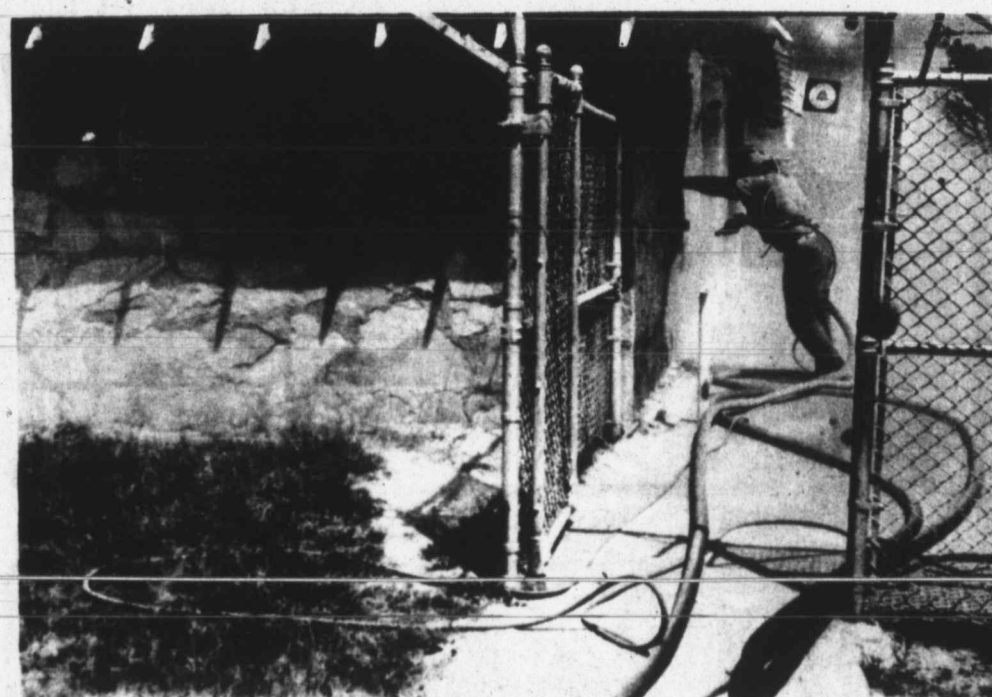




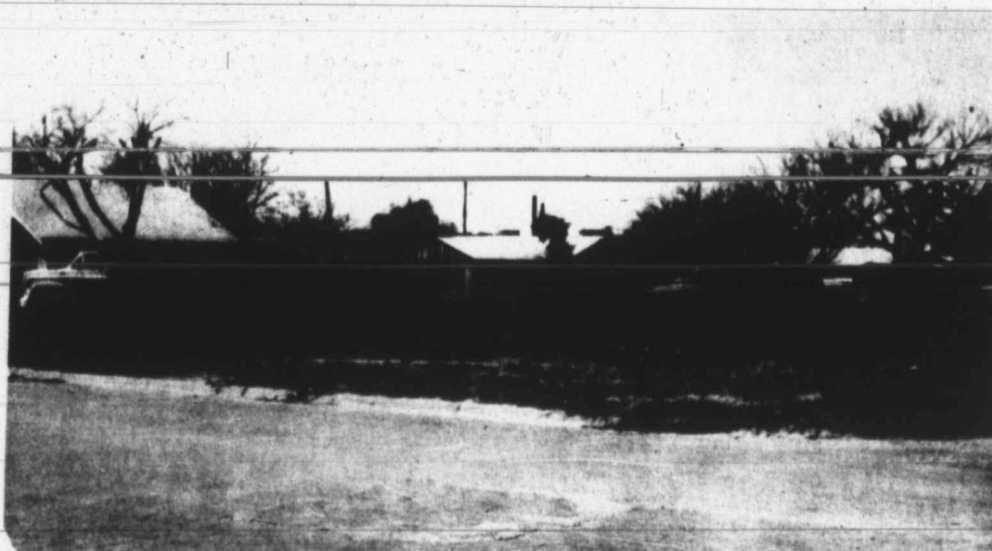
Tryouts

Special Council Meeting

Red Lights, Civic Center To Be Discussed

The City Council of Colorado City will hold a special meeting Friday night to consider taking bids on new traffic lights for the downtown area.

Also on the agenda, provided plans are received, will be discussion of the proposed new civic center for Colorado City.

The tentative plans are being drawn up by Wadleigh Construction of Snyder and are expected to be received in time to be shown to members of the council Friday.

The city passed a resolution, pledging to build a new civic center after the Jaycees sold the present civic center to the Industrial Team to be used for

expansion of Colorado City Manufacturing Co.

Tentative plans for the new civic center include seating for some 500 persons with the auditorium designed so that it might be divided into three sections in order to accommodate three meetings at one time.

Also in the civic house will be kitchen facilities, and a series of small meeting rooms plus storage facilities.

The cost of the civic center is expected to be between \$50,000 and \$100,000. A site for the new facility has not been determined but three sites are under consideration, at Second & Oak,

First and Elm and the 300 block of Walnut.

The city has taken down stop lights at four locations to facilitate the movement of traffic

and plans to install more modern equipment at three locations.

City Manager, J.A. Sadler Jr., has asked for and received a

plan for the new stop lights from North Texas State University. Revenue sharing money will be used to purchase the new lights, See COUNCIL Page 7

TEG Program Aids College Students

Mitchell County has one resident attending Southwestern University with the help of state-sponsored Tuition Equalization Grant.

The student is part of a program instituted by Senate Bill 56 passed by the 62nd Texas Legislature in 1971.

It provided for a maximum annual grant of \$600 per student to freshmen beginning in the fall of 1971; to freshmen and sophomores last fall; sophomores and juniors next fall and all students attending accredited independent institutions in the fall of 1974 and thereafter.

The grants are awarded to students through the colleges and universities by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, based on enrollment of Texas students in each institution.

Statewide, the Tuition Equalization Grant Program awarded about \$1 million to assist 2,511 freshmen in the 1971-72 school year and \$3 million is currently assisting approximately 6,000 freshmen and sophomores during the current academic year.

The economics involved in the grant program are simple. It presently costs the state an average of \$1,200 annually to educate a student in existing public education facilities. This is twice as much as the \$600 authorized in the TEG program.

Texas has a billion dollars worth of educational facilities already existing in the form of independent colleges and universities which may be utilized by the state at no cost under the Tuition Equalization program, as compared with the \$7,000 in capital outlay required to prepare a place for each stu-

A PROCLAMATION

Today more than 20 million Americans have six and a half decades or more of life behind them, and rich years of promise still before them. This distinguished generation grew up with the twentieth century, and they came to the fullness of their maturity at the same time America did. They have stood in the forefront of this country's rise to unprecedented national well-being and to the world leadership role which is ours today.

Our older citizens have given their best to America. Now they deserve the best from America.

Senior Citizens Month each year is a time for all our people to renew the recognition, the respect, and the active concern which properly belong to older Americans.

The theme of this year's observance is OLDER AMERICANS IN ACTION. It points our attention to the basic fact that most older people are not mere onlookers in our society -- nor are they society's wards. They remain vital, versatile, and highly valued contributors to the quality of American life.

Government's actions on behalf of older Americans must never become mere caretaking. Rather they must be designed to free and assist senior citizens so that they can remain active and involved, in ways of their own choosing. This principle has guided us as Federal spending to help older Americans has increased by almost three-fourths during the past four years.

I invite the officials of the Federal, State, and Local governments, leaders of voluntary and private organizations, and all Americans everywhere to join in appropriate recognition of OLDER AMERICANS IN ACTION during this month and throughout the coming year.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this twenty-sixth day of March, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred seventy-three, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred ninety-seventh.
