Plans Outlined For New School And Improvements

On June 20 patrons of Abernathy County Line Independent school district voted in favor of issuing bonds in the amount of \$64,000.00 to finance construction of a new high school building, a lunch room and improvements on the old building. The new high school building will be constructed north of the Nazarene church. The modern brick structure is to have seven class rooms, a combination study hall and library, two offices, a book room, a work room and basement for the heating unit. School officials expect it to be completed this fall. The lunch room, to be 35x90 feet in size, and of tile and brick construction, will join the gymnasium on the west end. It will have a dining hall, storage rooms and rooms for cooking and canning. Improvements on the old building will include two new rest rooms on the ground floor, repairs to the walls and refinishing of interior walls. Supt. V. V. Swinburn was in Austin this week to confer with state officials regarding the new building.

Two new Chevrolet school buses were delivered here Saturday for Abernathy County Line Independent School. Rev. and Mrs. H. E. McClain, who attended the National assembly of the Nazarene church in Minneapolis, Minn., drove the buses from Lima, Ohio, arriving here last Saturday. J. B. Wilborn, who would have been 64 late this month, died at Meadow Saturday. Funeral rites were held there Sunday. He was a brother-in-law of Mrs. J. L. Porter of Abernathy. Part of the territory west of town received about 1/2-inch of rain Sunday night. In this area during the first six months of 1944 there were 10 deaths, 38 births and 14 marriages. For the same period of 1943 there were 6 deaths, 35 births and 20 marriages. Two men were fined here last Thursday for fighting. Wheat harvest this week goes into the final stage. Yield reports are ranging from six bushels per acre for volunteer crops, to as high as 30 bushels per acre. Late wheat is producing more, bringing the average yield to about 12 bushels per acre for the territory. Rains in this area Wednesday of last week brought moisture ranging from one-eighth to two inches, with the heaviest fall being west and northwest of town. 651 Irrigation Wells In Use In Hale County

Irrigation from wells in the Texas High Plains has reached a new high and the rate of growth during the last ten years is believed to have been unprecedented anywhere in the United States, according to a report released by the Texas State Board of Water Engineers. In 1943 approximately 2,950 wells were operated in 14 counties and about 400,000 acres were irrigated from them. This year the number of wells, and the resulting contribution to the war food program, is still greater. According to the report, in 1943, 651 wells were in operation in Hale county, the largest number of any county in the 14 included in the report. Lubbock county had 428 wells in 1943. The first successful irrigation from wells on a large scale in the high plains was started in 1911 near Plainview. Moderate success was experienced for a few years and by 1914 about 140 wells had been drilled and equipped with pumping plants. Development was rather slow in the next 20 years and by 1934, only 300 wells had been drilled and equipped, and only about 35,000 acres were irrigated from them. The report shows that on the whole the underground water supply has withstood the pumping very well and only in relatively small parts of the more heavily pumped areas has there been a serious decline in the water level. In some regions, in fact, where pumping is light to moderate, the water level was higher this year than it was six years ago in 1938. In 1941, heavy rains in this area replenished the underground supply, it is reported by the engineer board.

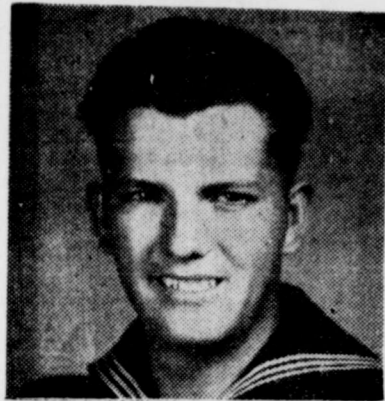

**THE MEN IN SERVICE WRITE HOME**

Aleutians, June 17, 1944

Dear Buford: I have been getting the paper quite often and enjoy it very much even though it is a little late getting here. From what I read in the paper and letters I get from home, things have changed somewhat since I left there. I have hopes of getting home before so very long and I know it will be good to see mother, dad, sis and everyone again. . . . I am sending some snapshots of Olivia de Havilland and the flight nurse who was with her when she was here. She came around to visit the patients and while she was at my ward I took some pictures of them. She is very small and just as beautiful in person as she is on the screen. I didn't talk to her very much for she was here to visit the patients. I would say she is quite different from those USO girls who go around showing off; if you get what I mean. She refused to let any officers go around with her when she made her visit with the patients. . . . Mother sent one of the Albums and I think it is very nice. I can look through it and see all my old buddies that I ran around with before the war. . . . I must close now. Thanks again to those making it possible for me to get the paper. I hope I will be seeing you soon. As ever Douglas. (Sgt. Douglas H. Vineyard.)

Dear Buford: Well, at last I got the long expected Reviews and even though the three were February editions I really enjoyed them a lot. The papers seem almost to come by V-Mail, because it takes them a heck of a long time to get here. Except for packages, papers and V-Mail, we get mail in very good time. Lots of air mail letters get here in 7 days. This place is as quiet as a graveyard almost, so perhaps we will go elsewhere. We are almost on the Equator, but the weather is very cool; in fact, I'd almost bet that it is hotter in Abernathy than it is here. I hate to use a blanket at night. I hated to hear of the passing of some of my good friends and my deepest sympathy goes to their loved ones. . . . I noticed in the paper that Omer Wade was out in this neck of the woods and I'd appreciate it if you would send me his address. Bob DeLaney is below here. I received several letters from him before he came North, but I guess he is too busy to write at the present. Dewey Johnson is here, and believe me, I was very glad to see him. It isn't every day that I get to see someone from home. . . . We were all very happy to learn of the invasion of

France, because it means that soon or later we will be able to get out of these islands. Of course, some of the guys want to get stateside duty, those of us who are in here strictly for the glory wouldn't think of leaving. Ha! . . . We are having stateside eggs, sunny side up, in the morning. Naturally everyone had rather have powdered eggs but we will have to struggle along on fried eggs. Well, I must close. A friend, Pfc. I. G. Holmes. (June 16.)

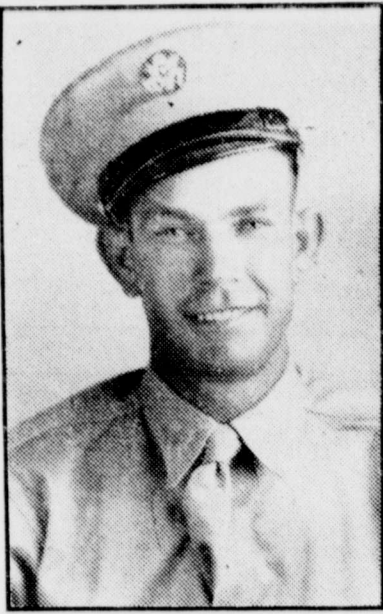
