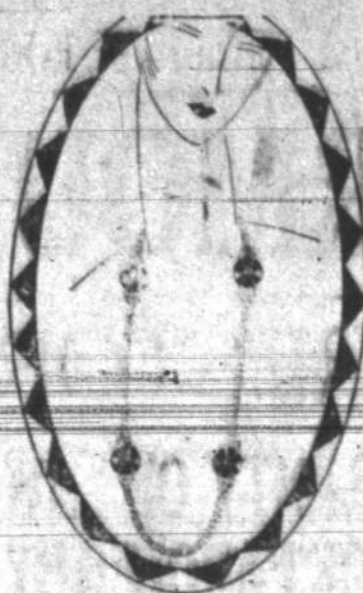

NEW YORK, March 22—When styles are apparently so arbitrary and so erratic it is always time to be suspicious. Then this year, when there are no radical changes in lines, so long as the distinction between clothes for various social functions becomes steadily marked, we pay for everything.

As most may have a couple of sundress suits, a tuxedo and a full dress evening suit and face any social obligations with a fair degree of equanimity.

But woman's sartorial problems are more complicated, since the dominating consideration is a dress for every day of the day and evening.

dinner frock and the gown designed for evening is not so strict as that drawn between other types and occasions it is, nevertheless, well defined. The dinner frock is much less formal than that for evening wear and the materials are less formal.

For the dinner gown printed chiffons, moires and taffetas in pastel shades lead. Of these, printed chiffons lead in popularity. They are soft, clinging and exquisite in coloring. In the main they follow long straight lines, the skirts making lovely drapes.

Constance Talmadge's reputation as a comedienne does not follow her into the pantry. For there she takes art very seriously. Seldom does she attempt to make anything herself, but when she does, her guests are given reason to rejoice. She has several prize, original recipes of her own, and no one can deny that they are easy. One of them is called a Mystery Sandwich. Its name comes from the fact that few ever guess how such a delicious combination can be prepared so quickly, and with so little trouble. According to Miss Talmadge's instructions:

The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Grapefruit sections, cereal, thin cream, crisp fried bacon, soft-boiled eggs, bran muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Clear soup, croquettes, herring salad, rice, rice pudding, still, tea.

DINNER—Stuffed pork tenderloin, twice baked potatoes, buttered spinach with hard-cooked eggs, buttered cauliflower and young onions, dried apple pudding, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

Although children under school age may not partake of the luncheon salad they will find a nourishing and sufficiently hearty meal in the soup with croquettes, rice pudding and lettuce sandwiches, milk and pudding.

The herring salad is so much worth while for adults that the rule follows:

Herring Salad

One cup flaked salt herring; 1 cup diced boiled potatoes; 1/2 cup minced celery; 1 hard-boiled egg; French dressing; 1/2 cup mayonnaise; 1 can tomato catsup; 1-2 cup heavy cream; lettuce.

Pour boiling water over fish and let stand fifteen minutes. Drain and separate into flakes. The potatoes should be cut in 1-2 cubes. Combine fish, potatoes, celery and finely chopped onion. Pour over French dressing, cover and let stand in a cool place for 1 hour. Rub mince through a sieve. Whip cream until firm, add pineapple and mix with mayonnaise.

Add this dressing to fish mixture and pile on a bed of crisp lettuce. Serve very cold.

Railroad Starting Demonstration Farm

PLAINVIEW, March 22.—Under the direction of M. B. Oates, agricultural agent for the Fort Worth and Denver Railway Company, a demonstration and experiment farm will be conducted near Plainview by the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains Railway company. Mr. Oates will take charge of the W. F. Lowe farm about January 1st.

This farm, which is known as part of the Texas Land and Development Company's demonstration farm, has been acquired as part of the necessary ground for the right of way and ultimate terminal facilities of the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains railway.

This farm consists of 120.55 acres of irrigated land. It has a pump and irrigation plant capable of delivering from 1,600 to 1,700 gallons of water per minute.

The owner of the farm has what is generally considered one of the best arranged small farms in this section. It was named by the Progressive Farmer this year as one of the fifteen master farmers of Texas and at the banquet in their honor was selected as president of the association.

That the Fort Worth and Denver will continue to operate this farm under its agricultural agent until such time as the land is needed for other purposes is a pleasing announcement in Plainview.

M. B. Oates, the agricultural agent, is one of the best known farm authorities in the southwest.

WORK CONTINUED UPON FUNDING OF WARRANTS

Further steps in the plan for funding of city debts and calling a special election to pass upon bonds, were taken by the city commissioners in special session yesterday.

Warrants to finance certain city improvements deemed necessary, including waterworks and sewer improvements and a new fire station for the southwest part of the city, were started in process of issuance.

Marlin H. Smith, city engineer, was instructed to employ an assistant to help him with the paving and storm sewer project now well under way.

The storm sewers have been largely completed, and workmen are now engaged in laying curb on Texas avenue.

Receiving of bids by the commission on the new city warrants will be held on March 31.

Mr. Whitehead spent much of time "just visiting" the business men and discussing with them conditions as they now exist in West Texas.

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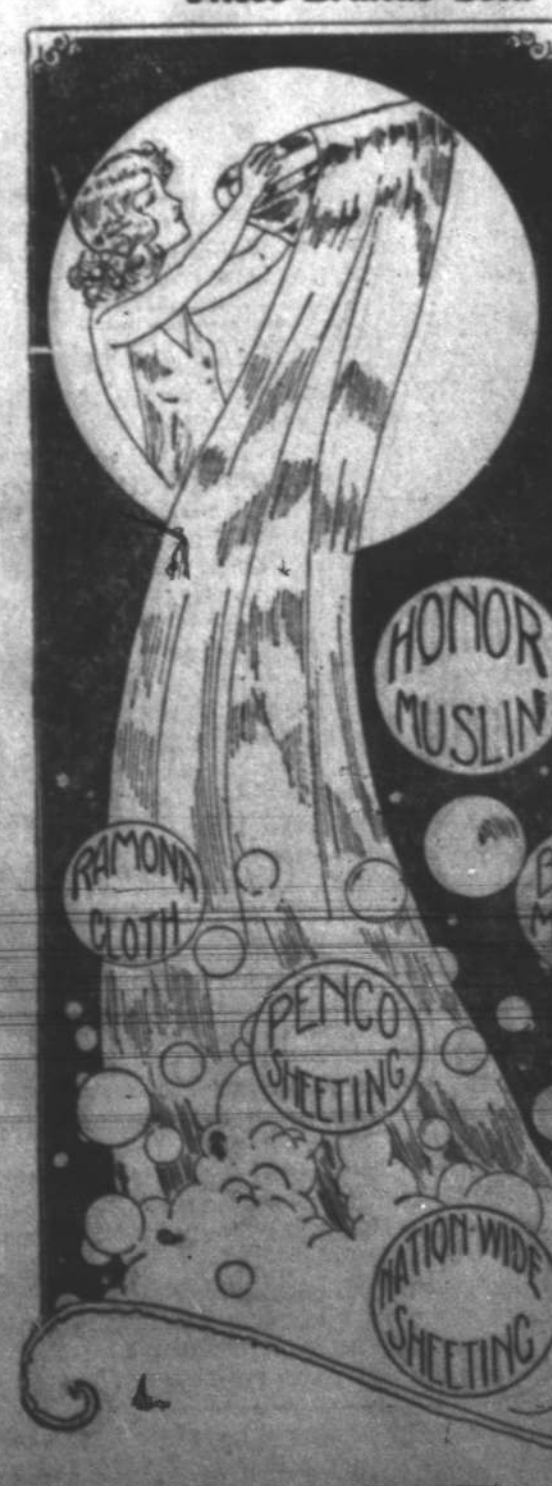

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is a symbol of dependability, of steadfastness. The tree stands today where it stood yesterday. So does the godly man. He does not waver in his allegiance to the fundamental principles of righteousness. He is always to be found on the right side of every moral issue. In his steadfast and unwavering allegiance to truth and goodness he stands out in striking contrast to the godly, who, as the psalmist says in the closing verses of this Psalm, "are like the chaff which the wind driveth away."

There comes a time when righteousness and unrighteousness are tested "in the judgment." Unrighteousness goes down to bitter doom and defeat; "the ungodly shall not stand." But righteousness is vindicated and rewarded, "for the Lord knoweth the way of the righteous."

TAXATION

For centuries that matter of taxation has been a source of much discussion and in Texas especially during the past few years there has been a great deal of comment and agitation on the question. Many people are of the opinion that the system of taxation is not right, and the legislature evidently believes that there should be some changes in the system, as there will be a proposal to change the system of taxation in Texas submitted to the voters of the State soon. This comes as the result of a demand from many sources that the ad valorem tax be abandoned as a source of revenue for the state government. Under the proposed amendment the counties would be permitted to continue the taxation of personal property on an ad valorem basis as at present, but all of the state's revenue would be derived from taxation of intangible assets, franchises, gross production, corporation earnings, severance, and similar assets and commodities.

In support of the proposal it is cited that there now exists an inequality of taxation, due to the varying renditions of taxable property in the two hundred and fifty-odd counties of the State, and it is pointed out, further, that it will give the people of each county complete control of the local tax rates since all ad valorem taxes would remain in the county for its own use. The new system would also provide for the taxation of actual values that have been escaping taxation or have been playing comparatively little in taxes, so that there would be more nearly an equitable tax upon all properties and values within the state. Whether the new system contemplates the taxation of a large number of commodities we do not know, but continued taxing of such commodities as gasoline, tobacco, etc., would probably be included in the scheme.

That there is widespread discontent with the present system of state taxation is apparent everywhere in Texas, and that the discontent is not wholly without cause is admitted by fair-minded persons. The tax rate has been juggled by the politicians and tax levies have been unwisely and unfairly distributed, so that taxation has become a real burden upon the people. Whether an abandonment of the ad valorem system would bring about an improvement we do not know. It seems to us that it might involve further tax troubles in the not far distant future, due to the incessant demand for more revenue for state government purposes and the tendency of the legislature to seek constantly for new sources of revenue. The ad valorem tax, we firmly believe, would provide as much revenue as the state requires if it were applied according to the meaning of the state Constitution, which directs that the tax be levied upon the basis of the actual valuation of taxable property, and which contemplates that all property subject to taxation be assessed for taxes. There are multiplied millions of dollars worth of taxable properties in Texas upon which no tax is ever paid. The state has placed a premium upon tax-dodging and all manner of values are hidden away from the tax assessor in every community in Texas. Taxation of this character of property would make it possible to relieve the tax burden upon real estate and would go far toward solving the tax problem for the state. Obviously, if this can not be done, or if no effort is made to do it, a change in the tax system would be advisable so that some other method of equalizing the tax charges upon owners of property may be put into operation.

58 YEARS OF SERVICE

It is always worth while to point out examples of exceptional faithfulness of duty. Perhaps if this were done oftener by the press it would tend to lead the younger generation to higher aspirations and ideals. 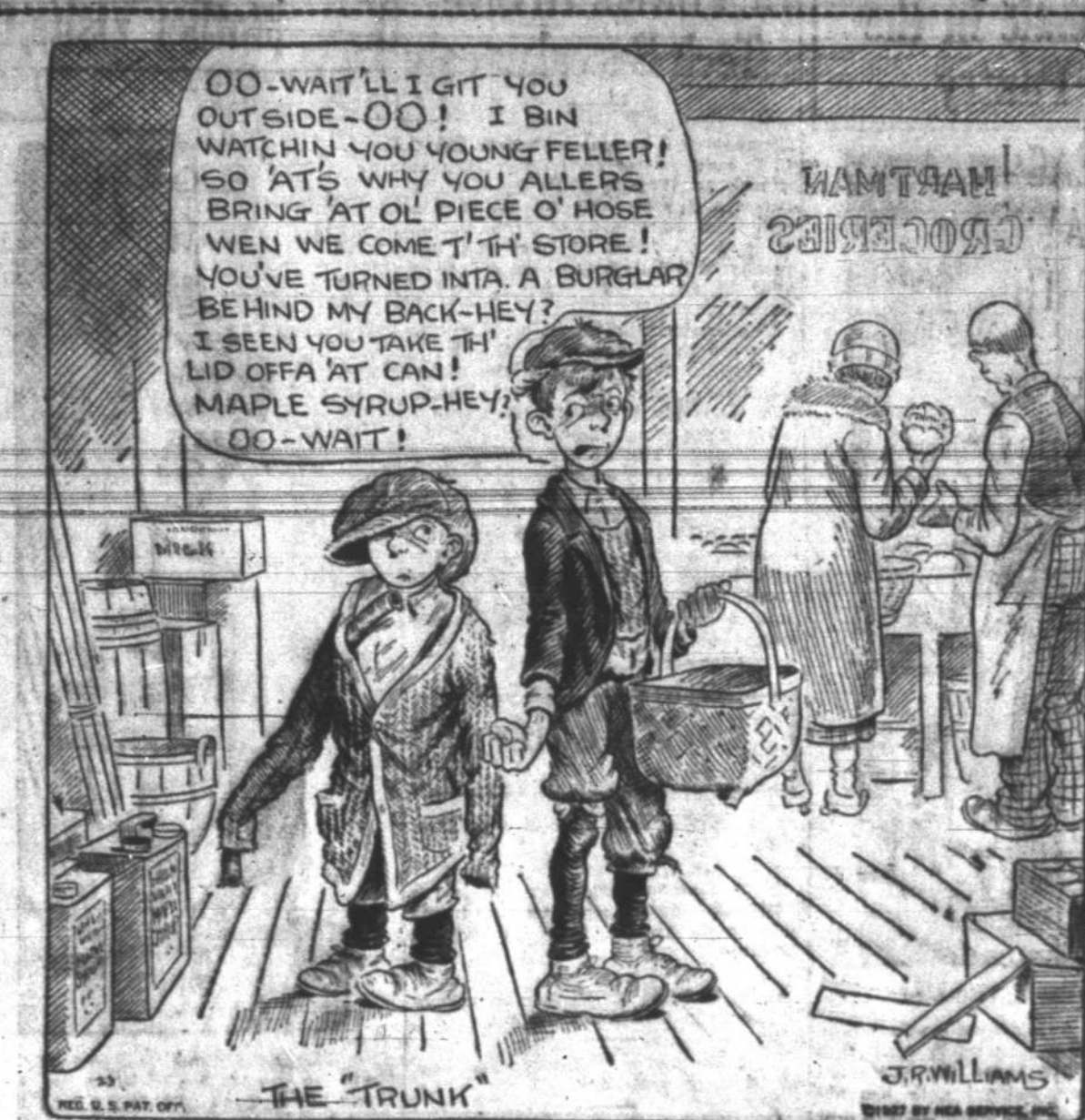

WORTHY OF SUBMISSION

One of the measures lost in the Legislature's final rush was the Floyd Westbrook Bill, authorizing independent school districts whose taxable values are at least 15 million dollars to establish junior colleges and levy a 2-mill tax for their support. This measure had gone into conference over eight hours before it failed to act on the compromise.

Friends of this highly useful educational scheme will regret that outcome. For, although the movement may continue to prosper through the support of the Texas Junior College Association, the Educational Women and other organizations as well as through popular subscription and private philanthropy—like other schools it is a public institution, properly maintained by public funds.

No child education could be raised to a level which is merely permissive in nature, leaving each community to determine for itself whether it should tax its citizens in order to afford young men and women the opportunity to pursue higher education at home.

The junior college has proved quite successful in operation; it has aroused popular enthusiasm; and it meets an obvious practical need. Unquestionably it will become a permanent factor in the educational scheme.

Governor Moody would do well to submit this matter to the special session. Doubtless he will take care of it, for whenever the opportunity has presented he has been heartily friendly to the cause of higher education in Texas.—San Antonio Express.

England Makes Little Use of Trans-Atlantic Telephony

LONDON, March 22.—Americans are just twice as much excited over wireless trans-Atlantic telephony as Britons—according to the figures given out by the telephone branch of the British postoffice department.

The last statistics show that since the service was inaugurated there have been 338 calls, only 125 of which originated on this side. But even those figures—figures—tell the whole story of American enthusiasm for the new wireless miracle.

Of the 125 calls initiated on the British side, probably not half of them were put in by Britons. The others were by Americans of varying degrees of importance.

Some were bankers who called on New York to confirm deals. Some were wealthy Americans who wanted the seventy-five-dollar luxury of saying "Hello" to the wife back home.

One was by F. B. Bankhead, the beautiful American actress, who has been such a knockout over here in "The Gold Diggers." She telephoned to Papa Bankhead, who was called away from his congressional duties in Washington to chat with his noted daughter.

One Briton bears the proud record of having refused more calls from our side of the water than any man living. He is the Prince of Wales, a Tennessee editor called me the other day asking to arrange for possible a telephone conversation between him and Her Gracious Majesty, the prettiest girl in Tennessee. The prince's affable private secretary, Mr. Godfrey Thomas, courteously explained to me the prince would have to decline the pleasure, as he had already turned down about fifteen other requests from newspapers in various sections of the United States.

The most interesting trans-Atlantic telephony call yet made has been Jack Hyllion, who has been a famous London dancer band. Hyllion ran in the cable news that somebody in New York had written a new song which was all the rage. So, with go-getter spirit, that is more Yankee than John Bullish, he had come down his private telephone receiver, got the composer on the phone and took down both words and music. It's the first time this has ever been done.

Wilderness Areas Can Still Be Found In National Forests

The day of the "great wide open spaces" is not yet past, nor is it in any immediate danger of passing, according to the Forest Service, United States Department of Agriculture.

Conservation on the part of many nature lovers and outdoor enthusiasts over the invasion of forest areas by highways and summer resorts led the Forest Service to undertake a study to determine just how much of the areas of the National Forests could still be classed as wilderness. The results showed that approximately one-third of the gross acreage of the National Forests is still sufficiently "untamed" to come under that class and that there are large areas which are in no immediate danger of the encroachment of gasoline-fumes, bath-tubs and other marks of civilization.

In making its study of the wilderness areas, the Forest Service adopted the widest possible margin of safety, to minimize the possibility that some person might lay a finger on a part of the map claimed as wilderness and assert that he had driven his automobile to that point. The minimum size of a real "wilderness" area was taken as comprising 10 townships, 360 square miles, or 230,000 acres. It was determined that at present there are 74 areas, ranging from 360 to 19,450 square miles in extent, which, so far as can be determined, are without roads. The grand total area is 85,758 square miles, or an average of 1,153 square miles per area. If the proposed Forest Road System, as at present planned on paper, were 100 per cent completed, there would still be 81 areas ranging in extent from 360 square miles to 1,945 square miles, with a total area of 55,950 square miles, and an average of 338 sections per area. These figures are exclusive of Alaska.

"The situation is not as bad as some have feared," says L. F. Knapik of the Forest Service. "At present one-third of the gross acreage of the National Forests, exclusive of Alaska, is in areas of more than 10,000 acres in extent. After all the roads one field officer has planned to date have been constructed, there will still be approximately one-fifth of the gross area of National Forests in roadless areas of 10 townships or more."

NEW YORK.—Reduced to the simplest figures, here is the material that goes into the construction of a 26-story skyscraper: 4,300 tons of elevator cables, 1,200,000 feet of steel, 100 miles of electric cable, 40,000 feet of electric cable, 2,000 pounds of cement, 5,000,000 pounds of sand, 50,000 square feet of wire reinforcement, 75,000 square feet of glass.

WILL PERFUME SUBWAY
PARIS.—Paris subways, some of them built a quarter of a century ago, have inadequate systems of ventilation. To purify the air, officials have decided spraying apparatus on some of the trains, which release a cloud of disinfectant as they go. In addition to its chemical properties, the spray is slightly perfumed.

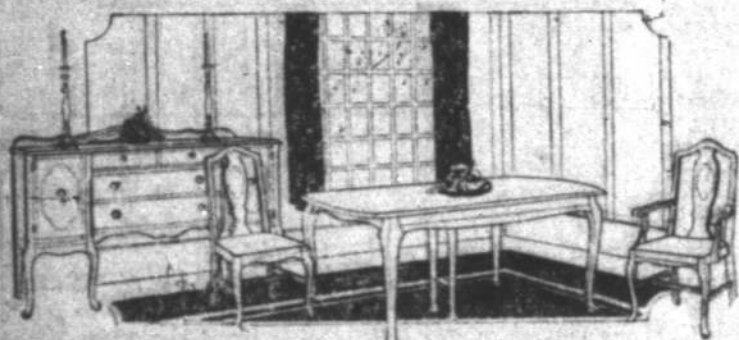

casualties.

Altogether 3,000 northerners sur-
rendered to the British, Italian and
Japanese guards. This is believed to
account for all the northern troops
that remained in Shanghai today.

Guerillas Shed Blood

But the blood spilled in the Chi-
nese foreign clashes was insignificant com-
pared to the flow in the district of
Chapel, a comparatively small section
populated mostly by Chinese to the
north of the city, where guerilla war-
fare raged until the Cantonese regu-
lars arrived.

There was still some firing in the
Chapel district tonight, but it was
understood this was being carried on
by the Cantonese against footers. A
terrible explosion also was believed to
have taken place in a northern am-
munition dump, but this could not be
verified because of the stringent
martial regulation in the native dis-
tricts by the nationalists. Chapel, how-
ever, was comparatively quiet.

It was impossible to ascertain the
total number of dead in Chapel, but
unofficially scores of innocent Chi-
nese met death, some by the hands
of executioners and others by wanton
machine-gun fire by soldiers protect-
ing looting companions.

A series of fires, caused by explo-
ding shells increased the horrors of
the day and made thousands homeless. All
day long native refugees streamed in
scores of thousands through the in-
ternational barriers seeking a haven
in the foreign ruled areas which are
crowded to the limit.

Meet Cantonese

The British have already had con-
tact with the Cantonese, nationalist
forces passing by train this after-
noon through the Jessfield station
where there were British pickets on
both sides of the railway. The Tom-
mies and Cantonese eyed each other
at a range of a few feet with natural
curiosity and commented loudly.

Three Britishers, Viscount Gort,
Lieutenant-Colonel Heywood and Con-
sul General Barton, narrowly escap-
ed capture by Cantonese in the native
city while undertaking diplomatic
missions this evening, but returned
safely to the settlement.

A nationalist division also advanced
along the railway encircling the for-
eign settlements and 2,000 nationalists
occupied Chapel and the Shanghai
north station where they were within
a few yards of British outposts.

The United States Marines today
were quartered in their shore batteries
and took up their assignment of main-
taining order inside the settlement
boundary. The areas which they con-
trolled are within range of rifle fire
from the Chinese section and several
spent bullets from the Chapel district
fell in the regimental headquarters,
but caused no casualty.

Murder Confession Revoked By Couple

NEW YORK, March 22 (AP)—Mrs.
Ruth Snyder and her friend, Henry
Judd Gray, a coquet saloonman, were in
separate cells in Queens county jail
tonight after both had recanted, in
court, alleged confessions to the mur-
der Sunday morning of Mrs. Snyder's
husband.

Stock Damage Cause Shown In Picture

Presenting evidence with motion
pictures and with mechanical slides
of the harm done to livestock by us-
ing brutality in loading and shipping
to market, Dr. B. Rogers, representa-
tive of the Western Weighing and In-
spection Bureau, of Chicago, gave
demonstration of how the loss in ship-
ments could be curtailed yesterday af-
ternoon to more than 200 students
of the Tech, mostly agriculture stu-
dents. Motion pictures of more than
thirty phases of livestock raising were
shown as well as slides showing the
bruises and loss caused by careless
loading and shipping.

The demonstrations were given by
Dr. Rogers in the interest of eliminat-
ing losses of livestock in shipping.
The Bureau is receiving cooperation
from the leading packers of the na-
tion in their work. Dr. Rogers is giv-
ing the demonstration at farmers meet-
ings, stock shows, fairs, agriculture
exhibits and agricultural colleges all
over the United States in the cam-
paign.

His pictures shown yesterday included
films of "The Texas Trail," "The
Horse in Motion," "The Cow Busi-
ness," "The Woolly West," featuring
sheep in pen and cage, "Use of
Dynamite on the Farm," "Poultry
Feeds and Their Control," "Meat for
Health," "Railway Crossings Safety
First" and numerous others.

The pictures will be shown again
today in room 229 of the administra-
tion building while the slides are
shown in the downstairs lobby, offi-
cials announced yesterday.

GRAIN TUMBLE

CHICAGO, March 22 (AP)—Grain prices tumbled March 22 and 23 today in reaction to quick tumbling. A rush of liquidating sales overwhelmed the trading during the last hour, and all declines of wheat, corn and oats went back to the lowest quotations yet this season. Lack of adequate buying support was the chief apparent influence.

Wheat closed weak 1-3-5 to 1-3-4 not lower, corn 1-cent to 1-7-5 a 2-cent down, oats 1-3-4 cent to 1-3-5 cent off, and provisions varying from six cents decline to a rise of 10 cents.

Provisions were helped by an upturn in hog values.
