DARLAND - HINES TO RETURN AS KNOX CITY'S COACHES

Supt. E. A. Youngblood announced Friday that Ted Darland and Curtis Hines, former coaches at Knox City would return to head coach and assistant coach respectively for next year.

Youngblood said tentative plans call for the coach to move to Knox City after school is out. Assistant Coach Hines will probably move after summer is over due to business in Quanah.

Darland and Hines were coaches here during the 1958 and 1959 seasons and moved to Quanah last year for one season. Both will get two-year contracts at an undisclosed salary.

Norman Roberts, who succeeded Darland for the past season, resigned last week, Youngblood said.

During the two seasons Darland was head coach, the Hounds won 18 games, lost three and tied one, winning one District 10-A championship and a bi-district championship the following season.

Hines is a former coach at Chillicothe, where he spent two years. He was also an assistant at Meridian and Gatesville.

Darland and Hines will begin their duties at the start of the 1961 school term.

Last year the Greyhounds won two, lost seven and tied one game.

Lions Hear Speech On Belgian Congo By Lamesan

Miss Peggy Campbell, Lamesa, was principal speaker at the Wednesday noon Lions Club. Program Chairman J. C. McGee introduced Miss Campbell to the club and said she was a graduate of McMurry College and had made a world tour, as well as spent three years in the Belgian Congo.

Miss Campbell made a short speech of her experiences in Africa and explained how she happened to arrive there.

Miss Campbell said the Methodist Church sends missionaries on exchange basis to all parts of the world and she chose to spend her three year term in the Belgian Congo.

Miss Campbell spent three years in the city of Elizabethville, with a population of approximately 180,000 she said.

"There are only two seasons in the Congo," she said, "wet and dry." The rainy season starts in October and lasts six months, then the dry season starts and lasts six months, she said. During the dry season, there is never any moisture.

Miss Campbell described the Congo as similar to West Texas, in that the terrain was bushy and during the dry season they had sand storms.

Elizabethville, she said was a large and sprawling city, with out any tall buildings. The language there is a mixture of French and African. Miss Campbell said men in the government offices spoke French. The most prevalent language, however, is called Swahili, a mixture of French and African. Regardless of tribe, she said it was the language in which practically all nationalities could communicate with each other.

Miss Campbell said she lived in a dormitory with 40 girls who came from nine different tribes. On her arrival she had three months of the Swahili language and after residing with the native girls was able to learn the language fairly quick.

Africans arise early and go to bed early she said. Her day began at 5:15 a.m. with breakfast served at 5:30 each morning.

Miss Campbell taught English and music at the mission.

Miss Campbell said African girls were not encouraged to go to school after the third grade.

Miss Campbell said she had learned a number of things during her stay in Africa and her tour of Europe and the Middle East.

First, she said, was her respect of the people of Africa and her love for them. "They are backward and uncivilized, but they are people to be respected. They have good ability in music, a feat no other nationality can attain. There are many other things in which they can be respected as a group or as individuals," she said.

Second, Miss Campbell said she was able to see America as other countries see it. "They look to America as being the richest in the world," she commented, "and if we could compare ourselves with them, we would see how rich we really are."

She said they thought we all had enough money to buy anything we desired.

Miss Campbell said the segregation problem in America was one of the real problems in Africa to the Africans. She said they would ask the question, "Why don't the Christian people of America do something about it?"

Miss Campbell said the only way to real understanding of peoples of the world was to show their love for the peoples of the world individually.

Miss Campbell sang a song in the native tongue of the Congo, which was written by an African pastor, entitled "God Is Love."

Miss Campbell then received questions concerning the Congo and answered them from some of the people present.

UNIDENTIFIED FALLING OBJECT

UFO Falls Near Benjamin Ranch

A few Knox County people were running back and forth between Benjamin and Munday late Tuesday night trying to find out where the bright flying object in the sky would fall or land, whatever it might happen to decide to do so.

The object was first brought to the attention of an Abilene pilot (unidentified) who saw the flying object over Wichita Falls and tracked it to Munday. Chief of Police Joe Massey of Munday saw the flying object and thought it had moved to Vera. Sheriff Homer T. Melton and Chief of Police Eddie Carr, Knox City, tracked it to Vera and later back to Benjamin.

King County Sheriff Dub Hollar was brought in on the chase and finally the plane radioed the patrol units it was hovering over a spot approximately 4 or five miles south west of Benjamin. All units then made a quick run to the area the pilot said the object had landed.

At one time the pilot said one of the cars was within a hundred yards of it. Later it was learned it was Deputy Sheriff H. C. Stone, but the light had gone out.

When asked which unit, he said it was the one that had blinked his headlights.

H. C. Stone was the one who had blinked his lights but he had been travelling and circling a field at the time the conversation was taking place and said he had traveled at least three miles by the time he found out it was him who was the closest to it.

Most of the search was on the Hamilton ranch.

Cidy Williams was on the alert to take his plane in search of the flying object, but as the Abilene pilot circled until the light went out, there didn't seem any point in trying to find it until morning.

morning, but was unable to locate anything.

Visibility was poor on account of a light rain and fog.

Later Wednesday a ground search was in progress.

As far as can be ascertained, the object fell somewhere within a three mile radius of the search carried on Tuesday night.

Since the incident Tuesday night this reporter has heard a number of stories of similar incidents in that particular area.

A month ago, two Knox City women were returning from Wichita Falls late in the afternoon, and saw a bright object in the sky at Goree. At first they thought it was an airplane on fire, but later saw it accelerate up and out of sight.

Many more similar things have been seen, but the ones who saw them were afraid of being called "crackpots" if they mentioned them.

The Tuesday incident has been described as a "meteor," a "flying saucer," or a "weather balloon."

If a meteor, why would it go

back and forth and travel slow enough for a plane with a speed of only 180 keep up with it? The pilot of the aircraft tracked and circled the object for at least an hour and a half.

If a weather balloon, why the bright light? If it was a saucer, where did it go?

These are the questions Knox County people were asking one another Wednesday.

LATEST REPORT

Pilot of the plane which started the search was identified as W. K. Rutledge, a drilling contractor of Abilene and George A. Thomas, attorney, also of Abilene.

The two men were asked to return to Benjamin Wednesday afternoon to help in the search. Several Air Force personnel were also in attendance when the men arrived in Benjamin yesterday afternoon.

A number of aircraft were on hand to help in the aerial search including Cidy Williams of Knox City and Bob Masterson of King County. Williams and Masterson had searched the area early Wednesday morning but were unable to detect anything.

Two airmen accompanied Rutledge and Thomas when they tried to relocate the spot where the object had landed. After a few minutes flying around the area the plane landed and the search was called off.

Law enforcement agencies at Knox, King, and Baylor counties as well as the state patrol were in the search. Scores of interested persons were also seeking the object.

VA In Lubbock Wants Pharmacist

The Veterans Administration Regional office in Lubbock, has a vacancy for a registered pharmacist to perform relief duties.

The individual selected for the position will work when the Regular Pharmacist is in leave status or when the workload requires the services of an additional pharmacist. Rate of pay will be \$3.10 per hour unless the individual has prior Federal Service which would justify a higher rate. 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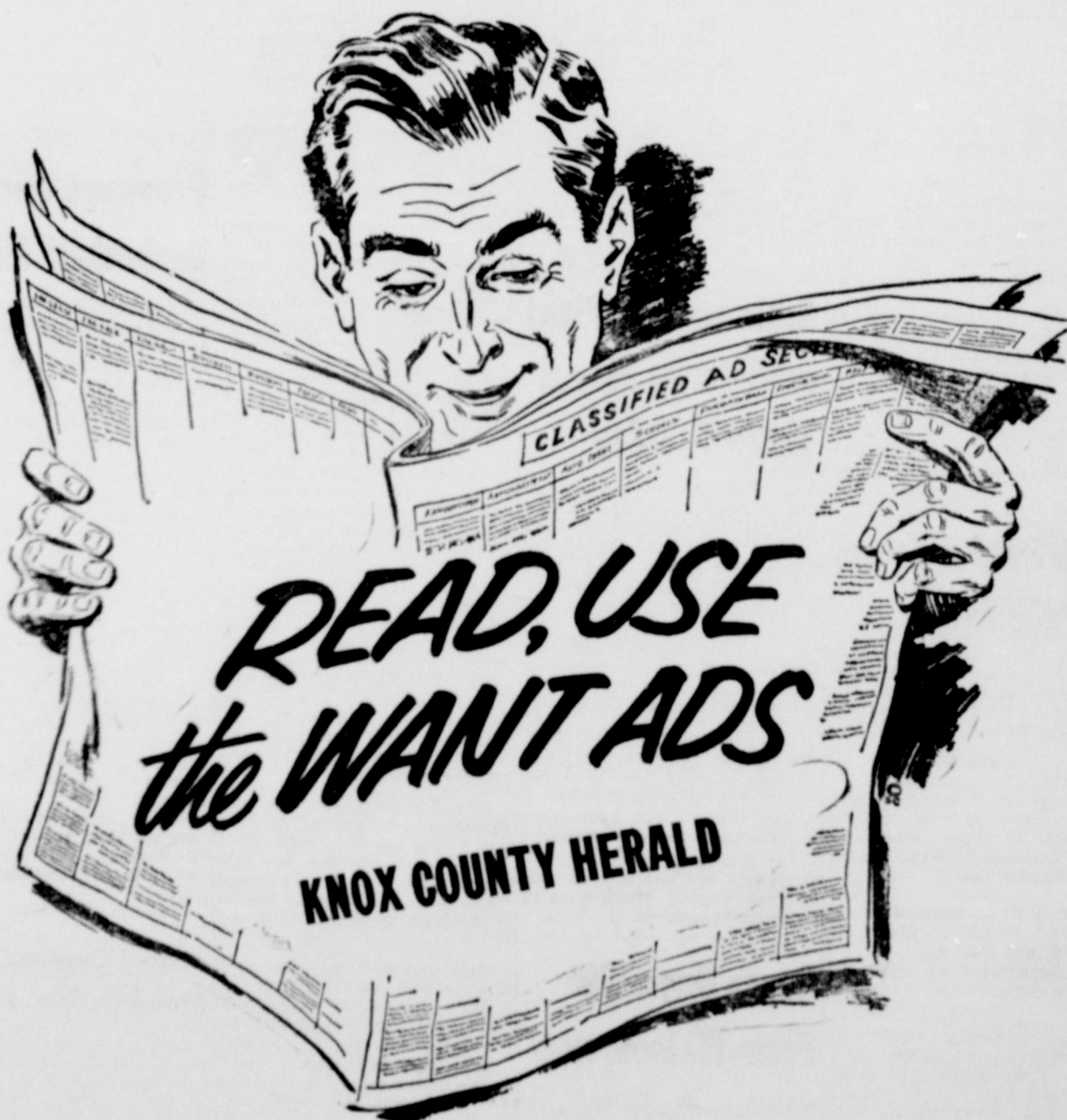

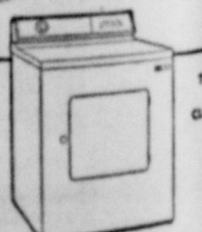

Dear Mister Editor:

I recollect a story in the papers way back yonder 30 year ago about a hunting trip Will Rogers took to Africa. The Saturday Evening Post was paying him \$1 a word for sending back a account ever week of his experiences. Ever time Will got a shot at some wild animal he'd put in his story, "Boom, Boom, Boom!" The magazine editors cabled him to quit shooting so

much, said it was costing 'em a \$1 a shot.

That's peanuts, Mister Editor, to what it's costing us taxpayers fer them Senators in Washington to talk so much. I was reading a piece last night on the high price of talk in the Senate.

I wonder where the folks in that town think we'd be in this country today if our Federal Government hadn't gone in debt fer 285 billion dollars. Where would we be today if we wasn't borrowing money by the billions and raising taxes and gitting someplace? Come to think about

New Vests, Flags For Highway Safety In Effect

The Texas Highway Department today announced a highway safety measure designed to protect the motorist by making him see red—literally.

The Department said it will require flagmen directing traffic at highway construction and maintenance projects to wear bright red vests and to use a flag of the same color.

The men in the red vests will begin appearing on Texas highways by mid-February, when Highway Department employees working on maintenance jobs will don the eye-catching apparel.

Made from fluorescent red nylon, the new vests are designed to make flagmen more easily visible and recognizable to motorists both day and night. At night the vests and flags will be supplemented by flares.

Red flares have been used by flagmen in the past but the fluorescent color and the vests are new requirements, made "to insure added safety and convenience for the public in the move-

rating and instructed Board of Insurance to consider safety incentives and driving records in setting statewide rates. Result was a plan, begun last January 1, basing auto insurance rates on the driver's arrest record for past three years, including traffic tickets as well as accidents.

Drivers whose rates jumped because of minor violations were irate. Those with spotless records got lower rates and were generally happy. A number of lawmakers have promised to look into the matter thoroughly this year.

6. GAS TAX SUIT, begun in early 1960, probably will be in the courts another year. In the past year, gas pipeline companies won rulings that the severance beneficiary tax is unconstitutional in district court and the Court of Civil Appeals. In months ahead, the case will go to the Texas Supreme Court and U. S. Supreme Court. If the tax is upheld, future efforts to raise the rate are certain. If, in the case of the gas gathering tax in 1953, it is held unconstitutional by the U. S. Supreme Court, it is unlikely that even the most ardent gas tax advocates will try again to raise revenue by this route.

7. RACE FOR SPEAKER of the House, as tight and uncertain as in 1959, brought renewed suggestions that "there ought to be a better way." Whether Rep. Wade Spilman of McAllen or Rep. James Turman of Gober wins in the secret ballot of House members on Jan. 10, it will be several weeks before either can get committees organized and ready for business. To add to the confusion, prospective candidates for Speaker in 1963 already are jockeying for position. Some have suggested a constitutional amendment to permit representatives-elect to meet and elect a presiding officer a month or so before the session's actual opening. Another proposal is to let the people decide by making the post an elective one the same as in the Senate. Advantage besides letting the voters have a choice is the fact that the decision would be reached in November and the House could go to work immediately on the opening day of the session. Also it would eliminate all of the bitterness that is created under the present system.

8. TOURIST AND NEW INDUSTRY promotion got under way in 1960, despite penny-auto

budgets. Highway Department brought out its first tourists' brochure, a 32-page booklet in four colors. This year it will ask the Legislature for \$300,000 to place advertisements in national publications. Texas Industrial Commission also produced a brochure but says it cannot compete with other states on a \$43,750 a year budget. It will ask the Legislature for \$427,000 a year. But, the tourist and industry seeking agencies contend that Texas cannot achieve its growth potential in the sixties unless it goes in with six-figure budgets comparable to those of competing states.

9. TEXAS TIDELANDS ownership, a paramount issue in the forties and fifties, finally was laid to rest in June, 1960. U. S. Supreme Court, to the surprise of many, ruled that Texas owns the submerged lands 10 1/2 miles out into the Gulf. If the land is as oil-rich as hoped and if there is a market for the oil, tidelands revenue will augment the permanent school fund in the years ahead.

10. SENATOR JOHNSON'S ELECTION as vice president opened the door for more lively politicking in 1961 to decide his Senate successor. Field is already crowded with the likelihood of a dozen candidates before the filing deadline passes. Conceivably, someone who already holds an office could be elected, setting off a chain reaction of moves up the political ladder.

FARM PRODUCTION HIGH—Texas farm production in 1960 tied with 1958 for the second highest year in history, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported.

Total production was 138 per cent of the 1945-1956 average. Combined value of the principal crops was \$1,400,000,000. This was three per cent less than last year, largely because of drops in cotton and sorghum grain prices.

Cotton is still the leading crop. Texas farmers produced 4,359,000 bales in 1960 for an income of \$711,000,000. Improved conditions and methods were reflected in the 329 pound average yield per acre, up 79 pounds per acre from the 1958-59 average.

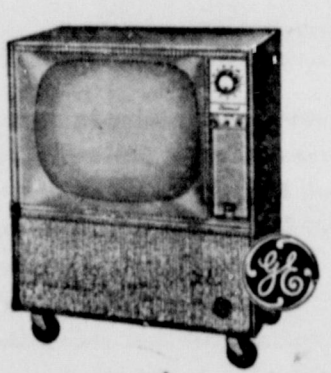

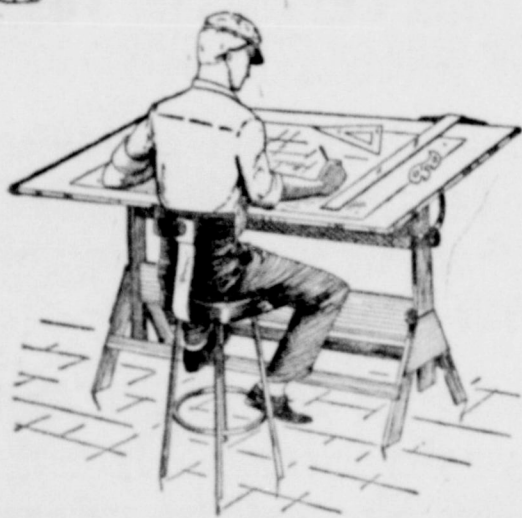
