We got hold of a pamphlet last week called "CAUTION," presented in the interest of safety by Raymond J. Graves, Chief of Police, Comman, Texas. In scanning through it we ran across the following article which we thought might benefit some people.

RULES FOR RAISING A JUVENILE DELINQUENT
(Taken from The Eye Opener, official publication, Oklahoma State Penitentiary, February 8, 1960, (Penal Press))

There are 155,414 people in prison in this country. Would you like to see this number rise? Below are listed 12 rules for raising a juvenile delinquent:

1. Begin with infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up believing the world owes him a living.

2. When he picks up "Bad" words or "dirty" words, laugh at him. That will make him think he is "cute." He will run off and pick up some more words that will blow the top off your head.

3. Never give him spiritual training until he is 21, then let him decide for himself. By the same logic, never teach him the English language. Maybe he will want to speak Latin.

4. Praise him in his presence to all the neighbors: show him how much smarter he is than the neighbor children.

5. Avoid the use of the word "wrong." It may develop in the child a guilt complex. This will prepare him to believe that when he is punished later on for stealing cars or assaulting women that society is "against him" and that he is being "persecuted."

6. Pick up everything after him. His shoes, his books, his clothes. Do everything for him, so that he will be experienced in throwing his burden on others.

7. Let him read anything he wants. Have no concern whatever for what goes into his mind, provide him with Lip's cups for his lips, but let his brain drink out any duty container for words and ideas.

8. Quarrel frequently in his presence. In this way, he will be prepared for broken homes later on.

9. Give him all the spending money he wants; never let him earn his own.

10. Satisfy every craving of the child for food, drinks, and everything that has to do with the sense of taste and touch; gratifying every sensual desire.

11. Take his part against policemen, teachers, and neighbors. They are all "prejudiced" against your child.

12. When he gets into real trouble, always defend yourself and say: "I never could do anything with him."

Follow these 12 easy rules, and prison population should rise appreciable in the next 20 years.

Golda Cary, senior and Annette Browning, junior students in Loraine high school, have been recommended by the State F. H. A. degree committee to receive the State Homemakers Degree.

To obtain this degree, which is the highest degree awarded in the F.H.A. work, much work is required.

The first requirements is that a candidate must have received their Junior and Chapter degrees which can be carried on in the F.H.A. chapter in which the individual belongs.

After receiving these degrees they began work toward the State Degree.

In the degree, which is of notebook form, there is the candidate's life, family, and community story. She must set up goals which must be carried out in detail. Recommendations of six or seven people must be in the notebook plus a transcript of grades.

These factors among many others must be evaluated by the F.H.A. State Degree Committee before the candidate can receive her degree.

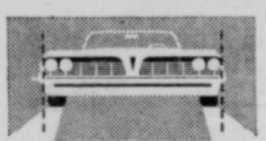
