BANK PRESIDENT SUICIDES AFTER FIRM IS CLOSED

Arlington Man Found Shot To Death; Examiner Had Reported Shortage

ARLINGTON, April 13 (AP)—Funeral services were expected to be held today for Thomas Spruance, 41, president of the closed First State Bank of Arlington, who was found shot to death late yesterday about seven miles south of Grand Prairie, a pistol clutched in his hand.

Open Way For More Revenue

School Tax Move Would Be Placed Before The Voters

School officials said today that the measure introduced in the house of representatives at Austin Monday to permit the Big Spring school district, upon a vote of the people, to raise its rate from \$1 to \$1.50 per \$100 was merely the means of opening the way to increasing revenues.

The district's rate is now \$1, the maximum under the law unless special dispensation is given by the legislature. The proposed measure would not prescribe an increase, it was pointed out. It merely puts the district in a position to like the rate if the people so express their desires through a vote.

Growing demand for additional revenues for the district were shown in the financial statement of the school system at the end of the first six months' period. At that time, and even now, many observers believed that it was too late to get approval by the legislature for a special rate, thus leaving an increase in valuations the only avenue for raising additional tax revenue.

School authorities are of the opinion, if district constituents wish more revenue, that less opposition would be encountered on a higher rate than on increased valuations. On the current roll of slightly more than \$7,400,000 valuations, a 10 per cent rate hike would produce a corresponding \$750,000 additional revenue, granting a perfect collection.

INJURED WOMAN IS BROUGHT BY PLANE TO HOSPITAL HERE

Mrs. B. F. Hines of Wink was brought to the Big Spring hospital late Monday afternoon and admitted for treatment of a broken back, sustained several days ago in an automobile accident near Wink. Mrs. Hines, with her husband, were flown here by ambulance plane from Wink, landing at the Big Spring airport Monday afternoon at 5:30. Ray Baumgardner, manager of the local airport, was pilot of the ambulance ship.

News Briefs On Labor Disputes

WASHINGTON, April 13 (AP)—The house labor committee approved today a senate resolution denouncing sit-down strikes, company unions and industrial espionage. The committee vote was 11 to 4. Chairman Coughlin (D-Mass.) said he would seek to bring the measure before the house next Tuesday.

FORT WORTH, April 13 (AP)—Officials of the Lone Star Gas company agreed today to meet with union officials in an effort to settle differences which have caused a strike of 125 maintenance men. "Time of the conference remained to be set. Gas company officials are studying the terms submitted previously by the two unions. Strikers continued to picket the South Main warehouse and shops of the gas company, where quiet and order prevailed throughout the morning.

KILGORE, April 13 (AP)—The campaign to unionize the vast oil industry under the banner of John L. Lewis and his Committee for Industrial Organization was in full swing today.

At Kilgore, center of the world's largest oil field, and at Oklahoma City, oil capital of the middle west belt, workmen heard plans for the first major campaign to unite laborers in all branches of the industry.

DELAWARE, April 13 (AP)—Premier Mitchell Hepburn of Ontario accused Lewis of trying to become "economic and political dictator" of both the United States and Canada and declared that, if he came to Canada and sponsored any overt act, or if any of his aides should do so, they would be jailed "for a good, long time and there won't be any bail."

SEATTLE, April 13 (AP)—Physicist Hugh Thompson, John L. Lewis' right hand man in the Ohioa strike, asserted the U. S. supreme court decision on the Wagner act would cast the United Automobile Workers union in the role of sole bargaining agent for General Motors workers here and in the United States.

22 Injured In Bus Accident

Vehicle Plunges Into Creek; All Passengers Taken Out

BRUNSWICK, Ga., April 13 (AP)—Twenty-two persons were injured by the plunge of a Miami-New York motor bus into White Oak creek 20 miles south of Brunswick today a fog early today.

Recalled by White Oak Boatmen, passengers said a woman they believed to be a Mrs. Stewart of Charlotte, N. C., was missing. She boarded the vehicle at Jacksonville, Fla.

The bus left the highway at 3:30 a. m. near a small bridge and turned its side in five feet of water.

Mrs. J. L. Drury, White Oak resident, heard the crash and notified other residents of the small community.

A rescue force of eight men obtained small boats and worked rapidly to extricate the passengers. Windows Broken Out.

"We were thrown from one side of the bus to the other," said Galen Thompson of Stirlington, Me., one of the injured. "By breaking windows and opening doors we were able to provide exits. Unable to see whether we were in a wide river or a narrow creek, we did not leave the bus but stood with water reaching to our necks until boats arrived. If the water had been two feet higher I believe all of us would have drowned."

S. L. Matthews of North Augusta, S. C., driver of the bus, received a cut in the face.

Workers And Bosses Study New Status

Upsurge Of Unionism And Industrial Peace Predicted

LABOR LEADERS KEEP EYE ON FORD AFFAIR

U.A.W.A. Chief Predicts Manufacturer Will Be Forced To Act

Thousands of workers and their bosses in the nation's industrial center speculated alike today on how the supreme court's validation of the Wagner labor relations act will effect their positions.

The historic decision arrested the attention of labor leaders and workers who have been embroiled for weeks in sit-down controversies.

Union Upsurge

Interest turned to the comments by labor leaders on the court's five affirmative decisions.

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, predicted an upsurge in union organization and the end of company unions.

J. Warren Madden, chairman of the Wagner labor board, foresaw greater industrial peace.

Secretary of Labor Perkins said the decisions "in the manufacturing cases are of great significance."

Meanwhile labor generally awaited the outcome of the verbal clashes between Henry Ford, second largest automobile producer, and John L. Lewis, chairman of the Committee for Industrial Organization.

Ford stated he would never recognize "any union."

Lewis replied Ford would in time "change his mind."

THINKS FORD WILL HAVE TO DEAL WITH UNION

DETROIT, April 13 (AP)—Homer Martin, president of the United Automobile Workers of America, predicted today that the federal government would "force" the Ford Motor company to deal with the union under the Wagner labor relations act.

Jubilant over the supreme court decision upholding the Wagner act, he declared "a strike to force Henry Ford to recognize the U. A. W. A. will not be necessary now."

RETIREMENT?

Talk Of Some Justices Quitting Bench

WASHINGTON, April 13 (AP)—Some senators predicted today that one or more of the supreme court's so-called "conservative" justices—McReynolds, Van Devanter, Sutherland, and Butler—might soon retire.

The legislators cited long current rumors that some of the four were eager to quit but had clung to their seats for two reasons:

1. They had no assurance of fixed retirement pay.
2. Retirement might have resulted in a resignation of the tribunal, because it would permit President Roosevelt to name a new member.

The first consideration was removed by the recent passage of the Summers act, guaranteeing full pay of \$50,000 a year to retired justices.

Decisions in the Washington minimum wage and Wagner act cases upholding administration measures, the senators argued, indicate that a realignment on the court already has taken place.

Finances Of County In Better Shape

Balance Much Higher, Income On Auto Registrations Helps

Despite the fact that the road and bridge fund remained overdrawn, Howard county financial condition improved materially during the month of March, the approved report of the county treasurer showed Tuesday.

Total balance of all funds at the end of the month amounted to \$52,848.87 as compared with \$65,713.24 at the same time a year ago. However, included in the current balance is a \$10,000 warrant obligation due April 1.

A decided gain over the \$50,485.80 at the end of February was noted in the report. Most of the gain is attributed to registration of automobiles for 1937.

Road-bridge fund

Disbursement of \$5,758.80 from the road and bridge fund against receipts of \$101.68 left the fund \$5,860.44 in the hole at the end of the month. Included in the disbursements was an item totaling \$926.00 for road gear, presumably the last lump to go for that purpose since the county has replaced its pony graders with diesel powered maintainers.

With the exception of \$928 taxes, all the fund's revenues were from terracing payments by farmers.

The end of March found the officers salary fund tottering on the brink with only a \$371.72 balance as the result of \$3,541.51 expenditures in the face of \$2,615.70 receipts. The month's revenues listed a \$61.30 item, a warrant issued by the state as its apportionment for October, November and December of 1936.

General Fund

Considerably healthier was the general fund with a balance of \$16,547.87, which a year ago had only \$3,888.50 to its credit. During March receipts amounted to \$613.77 and disbursements to \$1,544.64. The amount going out of the fund for charity was noticeably lower. In addition to the \$200 check to the

Man Burns To Death In Car

Another Seen Fleeing Scene Is Held In Lubbock Jail

LUBBOCK, April 13 (AP)—Jimmie Morgan, about 25, of Andrews was burned to death early today in an automobile in west Lubbock and a Lubbock man is being held in Lubbock county jail for investigation into his death.

The suspect was apprehended by Jack Hightower, a nightwatchman at Texas Technological college, when apparently fleeing from the scene of the burning car, and was forced to return to the car. There he was arrested by Sheriff Tom Abel and taken quickly to jail.

A taxicab driver who said Morgan was groaning and lying on the back seat of the car told authorities he was first to the scene and that Morgan apparently made no effort to extricate himself from the burning car. The driver, C. A. Denney, said he tried to pull the man out but flames prevented him.

Several other witnesses were being questioned by Victor H. Lindsey, assistant district attorney.

Morgan, brother of Dr. T. L. Morgan, was not married. He was employed in an Andrews grocery store. His body was taken this morning to Maridian for burial.

Still No Indication Of A Compromise On Court Change

SPECIAL MESSAGE MAY BE DELIVERED

Effect Of Decrees On Reorganization A Topic Of Debate

WASHINGTON, April 13 (AP)—Campaigns to enact wage and hour standards and to outlaw sit-down strikes appeared imminent today in the turbulent congressional aftermath to the supreme court's validation of the Wagner labor relations act.

Conflicting Views

Conflicting predictions of the effect of the decisions on the judiciary reorganization bill also sustained suspense.

President Roosevelt, it was widely predicted, will reserve the legislative situation in the light of the five to four decisions. His only comment was that yesterday was "a pretty good day for all of us."

An informed administration official who declined to be quoted by name said Mr. Roosevelt would go ahead with his judiciary reorganization program.

This official added there was no indication of a compromise on the court plan.

The reference was made to the split decisions. The official said this was no guarantee that future administration proposals, such as minimum wages and maximum hours, would be upheld in the light of the broadened interpretation of the "interstate commerce clause."

Message Hinted

Speaker Bankhead told reporters he would not be surprised to see soon a presidential message on minimum wages, maximum hours and working conditions.

Committees in congress may take up the question even before the message is received.

Supporters of Roosevelt's supporters said the Wagner decisions had broadened federal power over interstate commerce, and in the words of Senator Thomas (D-Utah), "removed a no-man's land of uncertainty."

His "no man's land" reference recalled the president's position, before the highest court recently reversed itself on state minimum wage legislation for women, that some decisions on similar questions

A FORMER Sweetwater Mustang football star—Normal Hall—who played with the Ponies in the days when Coach Edgar Hennig had the boys baffled with his "flanker," will be one of the leaders of Tulsa University's Green Wave next fall. Tulsa will have co-captains next fall for the first time in history. Instead of the customary captain and alternate, the Greenies will have two guards, both from Texas. Normal Buckner of Marshall will be the other captain.

THE NEW York Yankees have almost frightened all the competition out of the American league race. At the rate they have been bombarding the fences in the sunny south, the Yanks appear in no mood to change the tactics that enabled them to make a runaway last year when they finished with a 10 1/2 game edge over the second place Detroit Tigers.

Manager Joe McCarthy is stringing along with the same team that cloaked its way to the world title over the New York Giants. Even the grand stand managers, ever ready with their second guesses, would be stumped if asked to suggest changes. If anything, 1937 Murders' Row should be more potent than last season's Joe DiMaggio, for one, should have more poise and power at the plate as a result of his freshman experience.

In pitching the Yankees are not any stronger. If Red Ruffing fails to come to an agreement, the mound staff will be weakened. Minus the 20 victories Red turned in last season, the Yankees will be likely to find themselves on even terms with the rest of the field. The fact that Ruffing may not come through will not necessarily mean that those 20 games will be lost to the Yankees—it is possible that other members of the Ruppert hurling staff may make up the difference.

The Yankees appear to hold a decided edge over the field in reserves. McCarthy is fortified against injuries in almost every department. That is something to warm the heart of any baseball manager, no matter how strong his first-stringers. The championship race is a long one.

SOFTBALL NOTES — Elbow blanked Lee's Store Sunday, 9-0. Manager Ralph LaLonde expects his TAP Shoppers to be strong contenders for the league championship this year. He has a pitcher from Sherman who has pitched last season, losing three. TAP plays Carter tonight and Lee's Store Friday. Four Mexicans are listed on the roster of the Shopper team—Andrew "Popeye" Cruz, Julian Vega, Elias Gamboa and T. A. Fierro.

The University of Texas has provided the most fertile training ground and this year is represented in the league by four of its former stars. Paper Pleasure
A trade was promoted with the St. Louis Cards. Chicago gave up Pitcher Lon Warneke for First-baseman Jimmy (The Ripper) Collins and Wildman Leroy Parmelee. After that, Grimm sat back to figure how his Cubs could win the National league pennant. On paper that was easy. Collins would cover first, and at the same time would give the Bruins more punch at the plate.

Came spring. And training sessions. Grimm installed Collins at first and told Cavarretta to go chase around the outfield. That's the way things stood until the Cubs broke camp and started the exhibition games that lead to Chicago.

Collins failed to show any great power at the plate, while the supposedly weak-hitting Cavarretta fairly blasted the cover off the ball and appeared to be covering centerfield well. In fact, Phil did so well that he kept Joe Marty, \$75,000 rookie outfielder from the San Francisco Seals, on the bench.

Grimm has given some thought to returning Cavarretta to first unless Collins produces at the plate. Two "Joos," But Different

It is evident that Joe Marty is not another Joe DiMaggio. At least he's not on what he has shown the Cubs this spring. He earned his chance with Chicago by winning the coast batting crown with .358.

The big moment of his career to date came in the 1935 playoff for the Pacific coast league pennant. In the deciding game of the play-off series, two on base, none out, score tied, Marty went up to bat with everyone in the park expecting him to lay down a bunt. On orders from Manager Lefty O'Doul, Marty took a full cut at the first pitch and belted the ball into the bleachers for a home run—and the pennant.
