DISTRICT MEET RECORDS BROKEN

OFFICER FIRED DONBY GUARD RENDEZVOUS

OTHER AND TWO SONS
RE CAPTURED NEAR
SCENE OF BATTLE

CORSICANA, Apr. 20.—Fires of officers today were searching through the woods near Fairfield,estone county, about 35 miles southeast of here, for moonshiners, one of whom was shot and fatally wounded special Ranger Willard last night.

Boone Anderson and W. Brock, special rangers appointed months ago by Governor Moody, had discovered the rendezvous and were to make a raid. As they approached the place, the moonshiners fled. Willard, sighting an outpost, was shot in the leg and fell to the ground and fired at the assailant, who discharged his gun a second time, the charge striking Willard in the stomach.

Describes Assault
Anderson and Hancock a short time later found Willard. He told what had happened and described his assailant. About an hour and a half later he died.

Anderson and his two sons were later captured near Fairfield. The father of the two sons was discovered by Sheriff Eubank of Freestone county, Deputy Lee and City Marshal Ed Foreman of Teague. He was wounded in the leg with a shot and told the officers that they would find his father's brother. All three were being held at Fairfield.

Three Under Charge
Charges later were filed against E. Fagin and his two sons. The attorney indicated that no further action would be taken until grand jury convenes the second day in May.

Other And Sons
Old In Episode
FAIRFIELD, Freestone County, Tex., April 20 (AP)—Charges of murder and violation of the liquor laws were filed here today against E. Fagin in connection with the shooting last night of Kim Willard, a special Texas ranger, here.

Willard's two sons were charged with the murder.

PLAINVIEW, April 20.—Alvin Wesley, former national commander of the American Legion, has been named as the speaker for the convention which opens here tomorrow.

ROTARIANS TO VISIT CAVERNS IN NEW MEXICO

GIANT DELEGATION TO LEAVE TONIGHT FOR "EIGHTH WONDER"

The biggest delegation that ever visited the Carlsbad Caverns will run out of Lubbock as a post-convention run to the famous caves tonight.

The train will leave Lubbock at 11 o'clock tonight. The Carlsbad Rotary Club and the Carlsbad Chamber of Commerce will be hosts to the Rotarians and will furnish transportation to and from the caves. The Carlsbad hosts will furnish breakfast and lunch, a stop will be made at Roswell, New Mexico for the evening meal.

To Return Saturday Night
The train will arrive back in Lubbock at midnight, Saturday.

Over 100 are to make the excursion trip to see the caves. All the delegates who rode the Fort Worth special train including delegates from Fort Worth, Waco, Denton, Grandview, Arlington, Cleburne, Temple, Brownwood and others will go. Another pullman will be added at Lubbock to accommodate Lubbock people and other delegates to the convention who did not come on the Fort Worth train.

Homer D. Grant, chairman of transportation is in charge of the train. J. A. Rix, general chairman of the convention here will also make the trip to Carlsbad. W. E. Goodie, of Amarillo, traveling freight and passenger agent of the Panhandle and Santa Fe railroad and E. A. Tusha, special agent will make the trip to the caves.

In the length of their galleries and passages, in the height and size of their enormous rooms, in the delicate coloring and bewildering variety and perfection of their formations, the Carlsbad Caverns are without a peer among the famous caves of the world.

The caves known as the eighth wonder of the world have only been explored a few years, and exploration is not yet entirely complete. The caverns were created as a National park in October 1923.

AMARILLO MAN NOMINATED AS DISTRICT HEAD

QUANAH CANDIDATE IS DEFEATED 63 TO 27 FOR GOVERNORSHIP

Dr. Rue P. Parcels, of Amarillo, received the nomination for the office of District Governor of the 41st District of Rotary International for the coming year, the balloting of the voting delegates revealed in the count of the election committee headed by Lewis Fox, this afternoon, as one of the final events of the convention.

Parcels won over Arthur A. Keys of Quanah, who was the other nominee for the place. His nomination will be formally approved in the international convention in Indianapolis. The count was 63 for Parcels to 27 for Keys at the first announcement with a few other votes out of a total of 94 not tabulated. Parcels was nominated first at the morning session closed, by James Toed, of the Pampa club and second by H. C. Pipkin, of Amarillo. Keys was then nominated by Dan M. Crawford, of Childress, his nomination being seconded by Walter Amsler, of McGregor and Butler Butterfield, of Burkburnett.

Governor Boyd then called for the balloting which closed at two o'clock.

Farewells Are Said
Farewells and goodbye handshakes occupied the time and thoughts of the delegates this afternoon as they turned away from the Tech gymnasium following their final conference business session which followed the noon luncheon to close their third annual convention, which has been acclaimed the greatest gathering of the group since its establishment.

A tour of Lubbock and immediate vicinity, including a baseball game at Madison Station, 12 miles north of Lubbock, took place this afternoon and a buffet supper, dance and general "Get-together" marks the final efforts of the Lubbock club to entertain the group, although the special train to the Carlsbad caverns departs at 11 o'clock.

Knapp Speaks
Raymond J. Knapp, of New York, international director, again thrilled the conference with brilliant remarks, with his address at the noon luncheon on "Where Are We Going?" His talk, "World Wide Rotary," was to close the final session this afternoon.

Furnishing the musical numbers for the noon luncheon program were the "Home Brew" quartet and the orchestra of the Amarillo Rotary club and a character quartet, composed of Mrs. Violet Grayum McKnight, "Rotary's Sweetheart of the 41st District," Mrs. W. P. Clement, W. P. Clement and Ed Immon. The luncheon was presided over by District Governor Ellis Boyd.

The attendance of the convention has been the greatest of any convention, the records of the registration committee showed in their report in the morning session. A total of fifty-seven clubs were represented here with 472 Rotarians and 177 Rotary Annexes registered.

Governor Remembered
Rotarians reached for handkerchiefs and wiped away a trace of tears as Retiring District Governor Ellis Boyd, of Fort Worth, displayed gratitude at the handsome electric wall clock presented to him and Mrs. Boyd by the clubs of the district. T. Hunter Foley, of Cisco, made the presentation.

"I just can't say anything now," Ellis said as he attempted to express thanks for the gift. Later he called Mrs. Boyd to the platform and accepted it with her stating that he would always look upon this year with the district with much pleasure.

Inspiring Rotarians to greater work in performing their services, Lamont Thompson, of the Cleburne club, drew the standing applause of the conference with his talk "In His Job—His Vocation," division of the topic of the morning, "The Development of the Individual Rotarian in His Desire and Capacity for Service."

DAUGHTER OF TECH BUSINESS MANAGER DIES

MENINGITIS FATAL TO MARY PROVENCE AT NOON TODAY

Mary Willis Provence, twelve-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Provence of the Tech college, died at the family home here at 12:24 o'clock today of meningitis following an operation performed Sunday.

Funeral services are to be held at the home this evening at 6 o'clock, and the body, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Provence and Prof. Cecil Horne, will be taken to Waco, former home, tonight, where burial will be made Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Developed Meningitis Friday
Mary Willis developed meningitis last Friday, attending physicians said, which time little hope has been held for her recovery. Sunday an operation was performed for removal of an abscess from under the brain, which gave relief from mastoid trouble, but medical skill was unable to combat the ravages of the meningitis.

Mr. Provence moved here with his family from Waco a little over a year ago to assume business management of the Tech following the sudden death of Morton Chitwood. He had previously been connected in a similar capacity with Baylor university.

JACKSON, Miss., April 20 (AP)—A lone, unmasked robber held up the cashier of the Bank of Madison at Madison Station, 12 miles north of here today, secured cash estimated at \$12,000 and escaped in an automobile.

FIVE KNOWN DEAD AND MANY OTHERS MISSING OR INJURED WHEN BLAST AND FIRE WRECK DENVER AIRPLANE PLANT

DENVER, Apr. 20.—The bodies of five victims—three men and two women—were recovered early this afternoon from the ruins of a burned section of the plant of Alexander Industries, rocked by an explosion shortly before noon. The women were identified as Effie Harkin and Mrs. John T. White, employees at the airplane manufacturing plant. The others could not be identified.

Fire followed the explosions and several girls employed were reported trapped in one section of a branch set afire by the blast.

Several automobile loads of injured were brought to the General hospital here, but the extent of their injuries could not be immediately determined. Crowds flocked to the scene and authorities had difficulty preserving order.

The explosions are believed to have occurred in the paint shop where highly inflammable supplies used for airplane wings were stored. The Alexander Industries manufacture airplanes in addition to conducting a number of other enterprises at its plant.

NINE COUNTIES ADDED TO ZONE IN WORM FIGHT

COMMITTEE IN SENATE FAVORS \$5,000,000 APPROPRIATION

WASHINGTON, Apr. 20.—The department of agriculture announced today the addition of nine Texas counties and parts of two others to the areas under regulation on account of pink boll worm.

This is the most threatening outbreak of the pink boll worm since its original introduction into the United States more than ten years ago, the department said.

Menacing Situation
The fact that this new outbreak brings the insect into connection with the unbroken cotton belt is the menacing situation, it was added, "and unless drastic measures are promptly undertaken to eradicate the pest in this area, its natural spread will carry it rapidly throughout the cotton belt."

The only known and demonstrated means of effective eradication is by the establishment of a non-cotton zone for one or two years covering the area, and this method has a long record of successes in previous campaigns. An effort is now in progress to get such federal support as will make it possible, in co-operation with state of Texas, to enforce such plans of eradication.

The total territory under quarantine order now includes 21 counties and parts of two others in Texas, seven in New Mexico and three in Arizona.

The senate agriculture committee today approved a measure for the appropriation of \$5,000,000 to fight the boll worm.

Last General Of Confederacy Dies

WACO, April 20 (AP)—Felix Robertson, last surviving general of the Confederacy, died at his home here at 11:30 a. m. today.

General Robertson observed his eighty-ninth birthday on March 9 of this year. Although unable to leave the bed in which he had been confined for months, the aged Confederate general seemed to be in better spirits than he had been for some time.

His health began to fail following his return from the Confederate reunion in Florida last year, where, as the only living Confederate general, he was the guest of honor.

TEXAS CATTLE SALES WILL BE MADE IN CO-OP

ASSOCIATION VOTES TO MARKET STOCK THRU CHICAGO ASS'N

SAN ANTONIO, April 20.—Members of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers association in the future will ship their cattle to market on a co-operative marketing basis, it was decided at a meeting of the association in San Antonio Thursday. The stock will be pooled and marketed through the National Livestock Producers association of Chicago.

The plan came as a result of a committee appointed by Richard Kieberg, president of the association, to investigate livestock sales in Texas.

COLD RETARDS TEXAS CROPS

DAMAGE IS HEAVY AND REPLANTING IS NECESSARY IN PLACES

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, April 20.—Rain and cold throughout the cotton belt have retarded planting operations, and killing frosts of last week no doubt caused heavy damage to the cotton that was up, necessitating considerable replanting.

Railway association says in its bulletin for the first half of April. Although it is not too late for replanting, seed are reported to be scarce.

Prices have reached higher levels but movement of the crop has not picked up materially. Holders are expected to retain their stocks because of the almost certain fact that consumption of American cotton will exceed by three million bales the production of last year, and because conditions affecting the crop are not any too favorable.

It seems certain that the acreage planted this year will not exceed and probably will not equal that of last year.

Northern Part Of State Must Replant

AUSTIN, April 20 (AP)—Much of the early cotton in the northern half of the state will need replanting as the result of changes in the agricultural situation since the reports on which the April 1 crop review was based, H. H. Schultz, federal statistician, said Friday.

Low temperatures have injured cotton, corn, fruit and some of the truck crops, he said. Corn was frozen to the ground in many instances. In the west and parts of the south, more rain is needed and generally warm weather would be highly desirable.

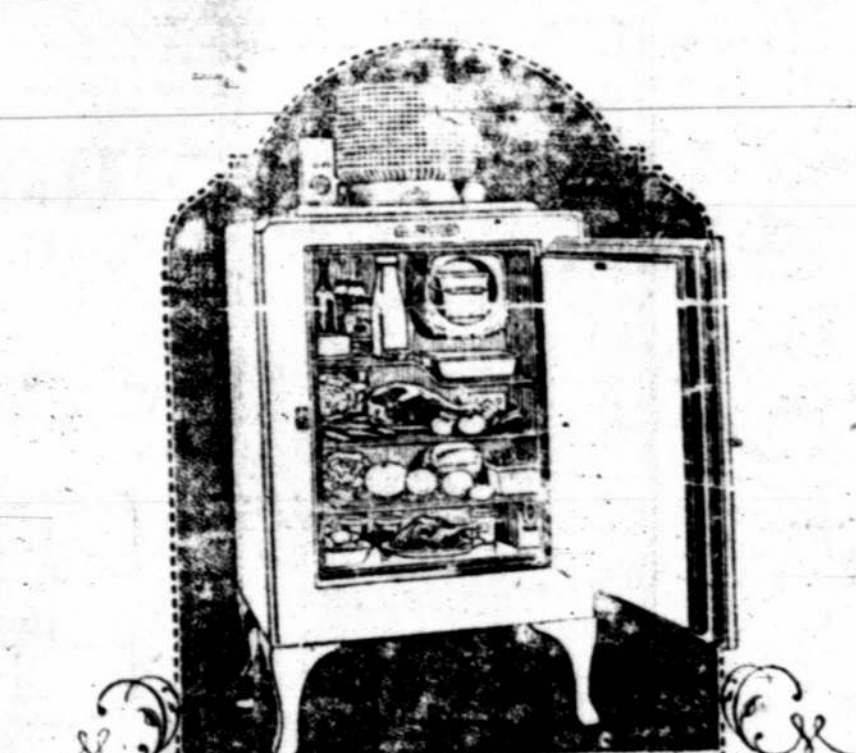

ILLINOIS GOP AND DEMOS IN SESSION TODAY

SMALL, THOMPSON ARE ABSENT FOLLOWING CRUSHING DEFEAT

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 20.—Six thousand delegates, equally divided in number as to party affiliation, gathered today for the state conventions of the republican and democratic parties.

The state's most talked of political figures—Gov. Len Small and Mayor William Hale Thompson of Chicago—were among those absent from the republican convention which, if they had not been defeated in the April 16 primaries, they had hoped to control. Prominently present was Fred Landon, the poor Swede, who not so long ago was a political head and axed when the Small-Thompson alliance was effected last fall.

Harmony is Keynote

"Harmony" was the watchword among republicans anxious to heal the wounds of a bitter primary campaign. Representatives of the defeated Small-Thompson organization assured U. S. Senator Charles A. Deneen, leader of the primary winners, that they would co-operate in putting forward a solid republican front.

Senator Deneen and Roy O. West, secretary of the republican national committee, sought in two conferences last night to induce the gubernatorial candidate, Louis L. Emmert, to agree to a law enforcement plank in the party platform. No agreement was reached. Objection was based on the ground that such a plank might appear as an affront to the defeated faction of the party which was under attack during the primary campaign for alleged laxity enforcement.

Louden Held as Leader

Frank O. Lowden, who was Illinois' war governor and who was given a complimentary vote of nearly a million ballots in the primary election, appeared certain of a solid nomination to urge his presidential candidacy at the national convention in June.

The presidential support of Gov. Smith of New York was a certainty at the democratic convention. George Brennan, democratic leader, as the entire delegation to the national convention would vote for Governor Smith, with the exception of one delegate who is pledged to Senator Reed of Missouri.

"Wet" for Senator

The democrats, with a "dripping" candidate for United States senator in Anton J. Cermak of Chicago, appeared to have settled the substitution plank problem with a statement favoring state's rights. Brennan said each candidate would look for himself.

MEN MADE RICH BY STOCK TRADE HOLD BIG FEAST

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, April 20.—An elaborate dinner of men made millionaires by the stock market was disclosed by the New York Times today.

A group of the biggest operators in the present record activity of the market gathered last night at a private farewell at the Biltmore for W. C. Durant, automobile manufacturer, who is sailing for Europe tomorrow.

Durant has been credited with an important part in the spectacular rise of a number of stocks, including General Motors, Anaconda Copper, International Nickel and United States Steel.

Each guest a millionaire. Every guest at the dinner, the Times said, was a millionaire, many by virtue of the market. Reporters were barred and every attempt made to keep the elaborate but informal affair secret.

While the dinner in reality was a farewell to Mr. Durant, said the Times, it more than that was a gathering of men who are leaders of broad speculative activity in the stock market and have all become close friends during the last year or so, all of them working in the stock market and many times in the same stocks.

This, the Times pointed out, marked a change from the past. Frequently in the past the biggest operators in the street have been at each other's throats, with ruinous results. In the present market they have all been on one side, the bullish side, and they have profited.

"PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN PORTRAITS"

GOV. ALFRED E. SMITH

"NEW AL SMITH" HAS REAL SOCIAL POISE

EDITOR'S NOTE: This, the fourth in a series of Presidential Campaign portraits written for the Journal and NEA Service by Robert Talley, is the third of four articles on Gov. Al Smith of New York. The final article on Gov. Smith will appear tomorrow.

ALBANY, N. Y., Apr. 20.—The job of making "the new Al Smith" out of the former East Side newsboy, fish market clerk, ward politician and Tammany Hall prodigy, began soon after he was inaugurated as governor for the first time on Jan. 1, 1919.

The blue blooded Albany aristocratic Dutch families, descendants of the original owners of the Van Rensselaer patents granted by the Flemish government in the 17th century, boiled in rage at the intrusion. What a disgrace!

And they laughed when the new governor sent out typewritten invitations to the grand inaugural ball at when the new governor's family, occupying a box at the fashionable Hermaeus Bleeker theater, slyly chewed gum throughout the sole performance.

Says Henry P. Pringle, author of recent biography on Smith: "The inaugural ball was a strange action. As the governor-elect appeared in his box, the band played all to the chief and then a series of melodies of old New York. . . . It was the assortment of guests that made the party not a little grotesque. Tammany Hall had lined out in full force and there were hundreds of neighbors from East Side . . . who rubbed elbows with the Dutch aristocracy of Albany, which had condescended to end in order to smile behind its ad at this rough-neck who had come governor. . . . Tom Foley circulated around, shaking hands indiscriminately and beaming that young man whom he had assisted to rise in life had already done well."

Governor Smith soon found that governor's job requires something more than the social graces and a certain amount of dignity, and culture devolve upon the error of a great state like New York. Such is part of the job, part the game.

It did not take long for a man of the keen intelligence of Al Smith to recognize this fact. He immediately, he became more careful in his East Side slang when in public, he submitted prepared copy of his speeches to the newspaper reporters with the request that they revise them and "take out the market language."

Smith was a born actor. He knew the affairs of New York better than any other man ever known them, due to his hard work in the assembly, he has the knack of interpreting so the average human-on-street can understand.

When I'm talking about a housing bond issue," says Governor Smith, "I don't present a string of official statistics that nobody but my comptroller can understand. I talk about beds. Everybody knows what a bed is. It feels good after a hard day's work."

Harding landslide of 1920 the Democrats out of office. York and Smith went down east, running nearly 1,000,000 ahead of his ticket and mis-election by a narrow margin tired from public life for the time since 1903 and entered a trucking business.

1922, Smith became a candidate for governor again and was elected.

1922 campaign saw a re-run of the bitter personal feud between Smith and William Randolph Hearst, the publisher, who ran for the Senate on a ticket which had Smith as a senatorial nominee, and certain leaders exerted much effort to gain Smith's consent. He refused, recalling in 1919 Hearst's newspapers accused him of being responsible for New York City's poor milk.

Returning to Albany as governor, Smith resumed the urging of policies that he had inaugurated in his first term. These, among others, a consolidation of the state's numerous bureaus and commissions into 18 knif, responsive bodies; the nation of the labor and work.

men's compensation laws; continuation of the building of highways on a strict business basis; passage of a \$300,000,000 bond issue to eliminate railroad crossings; development of a statewide system of parks conservation of waterpower resources; added financial support for education; legislation to relieve housing conditions in New York City and a 48-hour week for industry.

He has almost completely reorganized the state's government on the basis of business-like administration and effected many economies.

Today Governor Smith runs the state with a cabinet of department heads, composed of 12 Protestants, two Roman Catholics and one Jew. His secretary—George Graves—is a Protestant, Republican and thirty second degree Mason.

The governor once took orders from Tammany Hall, but now he gives orders to Tammany Hall. By dint of sheer personality he has risen above his party in New York. The child has outgrown the parent.

DALPASO CAVERN ASSN APPROVES MARKERS FOR ROUTE

AMERICA, JAPAN ARE AFFECTED BY CHINA UPRISINGS

(By Associated Press)
PEKING, April 20.—Two nations moved today to protect their subjects in Shantung as the Nationalists advanced and the Shantung defense collapsed.

Edwin P. Stanton, American consul, advised his countrymen to leave Tsinan with Nationalists in control of Yenchowfu, 75 miles to the south. Japan sent three companies of infantry from Tientsin to Tsinan to protect Japanese lives and property in the Shantung province.

The Northern armies which are arrayed against the Nationalists were driven back on all fronts.

Tsinan Also Occupied
Tsinan just southwest of Yenchowfu was also occupied after a Northern army of 20,000 men under General Sun Chuan-Pang, governor of Shantung, was destroyed by Nationalist troops under Peng Yushiang, once known as the Christian general.

General Sun had hoped to cut the Lunghai railway at Kweichow, about 100 miles southwest of Hanchowfu in Honan province. He thus expected

TOLL OF FOREST FIRES IN THREE STATES IS HEAVY

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, April 20.—The toll of forest and grass fires today reached two lives, thousands of acres of woodlands and close to a hundred homes in central New York. Long Island, eastern Pennsylvania, southern New Jersey and northern Delaware. The flames were spread by winds which at times attained a velocity of 60 miles an hour.

Many of the residents at Barnegat, N. J., loaded their valuables into boats on Barnegat bay as the fire circle closed in on the town, ready to flee if the hundreds of volunteer workers were unable to check the flames.

Two Deaths Occur at Barnegat
The deaths occurred in fighting the fire about Barnegat. Frank Eayres of Waretown, was burned to death when his home was destroyed, and Vincent Clayton, a member of the United States coast guard at Spring Lake, was fatally injured

when he fell from a fire truck.

Fire in the South Mountains near Gettysburg, Pa., was believed of incendiary origin but the others started from various causes, such as sparks from chimneys and untended fires in grass plots.

Miss Annie Wilson, a school teacher at Nanticoke Crossing, near Endicott, N. Y., dismissed her charges when she saw the fire closing in on the home of Charles Ross, nearby, and she rescued five children from the house just as its walls started to blaze.

Miss Ella Brennan, led her 100

people to safety when a forest fire closed in on her school at Yatesville, near Pottsville, Pa.

**French Ship Fails
On Algiers Flight**
PARIS, April 20 (AP)—Lieutenant Michael De Troyat who failed to make a non-stop flight to Algiers and return to test the plane in which he hopes to be the first to fly from Paris to New York was weatherbound at Algiers today. He was forced to land by a gale and it was understood that his backers were disappointed in the performance of his plane.

On the flight, he maintained an average speed of only 9 miles an hour, which was considered too slow for trans-Atlantic flying.
