FILM ACTRESS IS BRANDED 'K'

Razor Blade Used To Cut Brand, By Unidentified Man Early Today

(By The Associated Press) HOLLYWOOD, Calif., June 9 (AP)—Doris Williams, 21, sage and screen actress, known as Doris Dore upon whose face, arms, hands

and chest an unidentified assailant early today deeply carved the letter "K," with a safety razor, related to detectives a story of having been hounded from New York to Hollywood by agents of a secret organization.

Detectives to whom Miss Dore told her story were openly dubious. 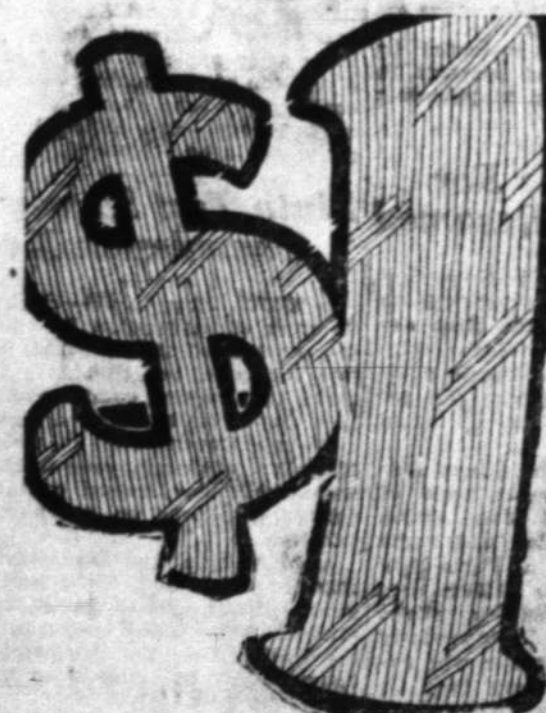

GERMANS HEAP MORE HONORS ON AMERICANS

RADICAL PAPERS RAP FLIGHT AS SHOW OF MILITARISM

NEW YORK, June 9.—(By The Associated Press.)—The June 5-6 flight and landing over since they landed on German soil after their flight from New York, Clarence D. Chamberlin and Charles A. Levine were the threshold today of still further honors. The enthusiasm of the country over the flight knows no bounds and organizations and individuals are competing to entertain the aviators.

Among the many suggestions that have been made is one that Chamberlin return to the United States to be taken aboard a German ship, preferably the cruiser *Derfflinger*.

Fly To Potsdam

On Saturday the two aviators plan to fly to Potsdam in the company of leading German air league officials. Next day they expect to fly to Vienna. They will return to Berlin Thursday, proceeding by air to Bremen to meet their wives, who are expected to arrive from New York next day.

Such enthusiasm which has been expressed over the flight is rarely seen in Berlin. From the time the fliers rose yesterday to keep their appointments with President Von Hindenburg until they returned to the American embassy, their headquarters, to dress for an official dinner, they were constantly obliged to acknowledge greetings.

New Song Is Heard

The populace not only talks about the two Americans, but sings about them. A hastily composed ballad, sung to the tune of a well known German ditty, is heard everywhere. The newspapers are filled with columns of description of the flight and its significance and praise for Chamberlin and Levine. Only a few papers have failed to find the Communist Rote Flieg (Red Flag) describes the Lindbergh and Chamberlin flights as tests by "American imperialism" of the possibility of aviation, with a view to "bombing attacks from the air."

Militarism Shadows Seen

"Unfortunately," says the left Democratic Volks Zeitung, "the bright picture of this great technical achievement, also shows up some dark shadows. Here too militarism will seize upon the crossing of this ocean as an excuse for making military use of the American flight."

German engineers, airplane manufacturers and airmen who flock to the Tempelhof field to inspect the Bellanca plane, Columbia, were enthusiastic over its construction.

Trial Opens For Texarkana Youths

TEXARKANA, June 9 (AP)—State attorneys opened their trial to convict Oval Cooper, 22, and Marvin Petty, 19, for the slaying of Grover Durham, 49, before Judge Hugh Carney in the Bowie fifth judicial district court today and had called seven witnesses to the stand at noon. The father of Durham, found slaying to death on the morning of April 29 near Texarkana, broke down on the stand.

Evie Mae Cooper, 16, sweetheart of the slain youth, testified that he showed her a pair of brass knuckles on the night of the killing.

The state is expected to close its case this afternoon. It was indicated.

Brandon Is Elected Head Of Road Ass'n

SAVANNAH, Ga., June 9 (AP)—The report of the nominating committee naming W. W. Brandon, former governor of Alabama, president for next year, Governor Ben S. Paulsen of Kansas, first vice president, and J. A. Broussard of Birmingham, Ala., to succeed himself as making director, was unanimously adopted at today's session of the United States good roads convention.

Definite action on new policies looking toward centralization of highway work and a campaign for more generous federal aid was urged by speakers today.

Refinery Damaged In San Pedro Fire

SAN PEDRO, Calif., June 9 (AP)—A spectacular fire which broke out in the gas agitator of the Union Oil company refinery between here and Wilmington last night was brought under control after raging for almost two hours and causing loss estimated in excess of \$100,000.

Special Session To Be Called Sept. 1

AUSTIN, June 9 (AP)—Governor Dan Moody expects to call the legislature for another special session September 1, or shortly afterward. It was learned definitely today. The governor in a statement yesterday criticized the legislature for its "negative session" just ended, saying that party politics were not carried out. All the major legislation he requested was killed outright or died through delay brought about by opposition.

WOLVES SPREAD RABIES

LENINGRAD, Russia, June 9 (AP)—Twenty-five persons have developed hydrophobia in Russia within the past year, according to figures of the Pasteur Institute, which is unable to accommodate half the patients. Half a million wolves said to be ravaging the countryside are responsible for the deadly scourge.

Lindbergh Tells Of Outwitting Death Parachute Leap Ends On Barbed Wire

Thirteen thousand feet up in the night sky, with perils of darkness compounded many times by dense, clammy fog that no eye or light could pierce—

The gasoline tanks of his airplane drained dry during a vain search for a landing place. Their reason, "Charles" Lindbergh, the boy marvel of aviation.

What happened? Lindbergh himself tells in this second of two articles on how he cheated death while flying the night air mail over Illinois on November 3 last.

in an Official Air Mail Service Report

I took off from Lambert-St. Louis field at 4:20 p. m., November 3, arrived at Springfield, Ill., at 5:15 and after a five minute stop for mail took the air again and headed for Peoria.

The ceiling at Springfield was about 500 feet, and the weather report from Peoria, which was telephoned to St. Louis earlier in the afternoon, gave the flying conditions as entirely passable.

I encountered darkness about 25 miles north of Springfield. The ceiling had lowered to around 400 feet and a light snow was falling. At South Pekin the forward visibility of ground lights from a 150-foot altitude was less than one-half mile and over Pekin the town lights were indistinct from 200 feet above. After passing Pekin I flew at an altitude of 600 feet for about five minutes, when the lights of the haze below indicated that I was over Peoria. Twice I could see lights on the ground and descended to less than 200 feet before they disappeared from view. I tried to bank around one group of lights, but was unable to turn quickly enough to keep them in sight.

On to Chicago

After circling in the vicinity of Peoria for 30 minutes I decided to try to find better weather conditions by flying northeast toward Chicago. I had ferried a ship from Chicago to St. Louis in the early afternoon and at that time the ceiling and visibility were much better near Chicago than elsewhere along the route.

Enough gasoline for about one hour and ten minutes flying remained in the tank.

an effort to disguise. Ray married an Ohio girl, who was unaware of his real identity and was living here with his wife and one year old child.

The two De Autremonts, with their younger brother, Hugh, who already is on trial for murder at Jacksonville, Oregon, were charged with one of the most cold blooded train holdups in the memory of the west.

Train Dynamited in 1923

On October 15, 1923, a Southern Pacific passenger train was held up in a tunnel near Siskiyou, Ore., the mail car dynamited, three trainmen and the mail clerk killed. Just after the train had pulled out of the little station at Siskiyou and was entering the tunnel, two men boarded the engine, covered the engineer and fireman and compelled them to stop as the engine emerged from the far end of the tunnel, where a third bandit awaited with a supply of explosives.

The trio shot down Sid Bates, the engineer, Marvin Seng, the fireman, and then pistoled C. O. Johnson, a brakeman. E. E. Dougherty, the mail clerk perished when the mail car was dynamited. The desperadoes were forced to flee empty handed, however, when they were unable to enter the mixing and shattering car, but postal inspectors said they left behind evidence of their identity.

"I landed directly on top of a barbed wire fence," writes Lindbergh of his two-and-a-half-mile parachute drop. But he wasn't injured. Below, Lindbergh at the time he was commissioned as an army air service flier in 1923.

I landed in the main tank and twenty minutes in the reserve. This was hardly enough to return to St. Louis even had I been able to navigate directly to the field by dead reckoning and flying blind the greater portion of the way. The only lights along our route at present are in the field at Peoria, consequently, unless I could pick up a beacon on the Transcontinental route my only alternative would be to drop the parachute flare and land by its light together with what little assistance the wing lights would be in the snow and rain. The territory towards Chicago was much more favorable for a night landing than that around St. Louis.

Flare Fails to Work

I flew northeast at about 2,000 feet for 20 minutes then dropped down to 600 feet. There were numerous breaks in the clouds this time and occasionally ground lights could be seen from over 500 feet. I passed over the lights of a small town and a few minutes later came to a fairly clear place in the clouds. I pulled up to about 600 feet, released the parachute flare, whipped the wing around to get into the wind and under the flare which lit at once but instead of floating down as I expected, it dropped like a rock. For an instant I saw the ground, then total darkness. My ship was in a steep bank and for a few seconds after being blinded by the intense light I had trouble righting it. I then tried to find the ground with the wing lights, but their glare was worse than useless in the haze.

When about ten minutes had remained in the pressure tank and still I could not see the faintest outline of any object on the ground I decided to leave the ship rather than attempt to land blindly. I turned back southwest toward less populated country and started climbing in an attempt to get over the clouds before jumping.

The Last Chance

The main tank went dry at 7:51, and the reserve at 8:16. The altimeter then registered approximately 1,500 feet per the top of the clouds was apparently several thousand feet higher. I rolled the stabilizer, cut the switches, pulled the ship up into a stall, and about to go out over the right side of the cockpit when the right wing began to drop. In this position the plane would either speed and spiral to the right, possibly striking my parachute after its first turn. I returned to the controls and after righting the plane dove over the left side of the cockpit while the altimeter registered about 70 miles per hour, and the altimeter 12,500 feet.

I pulled the rip cord immediately after clearing the stabilizer. The Irving chute functioned perfectly. I had left the ship head first and was falling in this position when the rigging whipped me around into an upright position and the chute opened.

The last I saw or heard of the

D. H. was as it disappeared into the clouds just after my chute opened. I placed the rip cord in my pocket and took out my flashlight. It was snowing and very cold. For the first minute or so the parachute descended smoothly, then commenced an excessive oscillation which continued for about five minutes and which I was unable to check.

The first indication that I was near the ground was gradual darkening of the space below. The snow had turned to rain and although my chute was thoroughly soaked its oscillation had greatly decreased. I directed the beam from the foot spot light downward but the ground appeared so suddenly that I landed directly on top of a barbed wire fence without seeing it.

He Wasn't Hurt

The fence helped to break my fall and the barbs did not penetrate the heavy flying suit. The chute was blown over the fence and was held open for some time by the gusts of wind before collapsing. I rolled it up into its pack and started toward the nearest light. Soon I came to a road which I followed about a mile to the town of Covell, Ill., where I telephoned a report to St. Louis and endeavored to obtain some news of where the ship had landed. The only information I could obtain was from one of a group of farmers in the general store, a Mr. Thompson, who stated that his neighbor had heard the plane crash but could only guess at its general direction.

I spoke with Mr. Thompson to his farm and after leaving the parachute in his house we canvassed the neighbors for any information concerning the plane. After searching for over an hour without result I left instructions to place a guard before I returned and went to Chicago for another ship.

Finds the Wreck

On arriving over Covell the next morning I found the wreck with a small crowd gathered about it less than 500 feet back of the house where I had left the parachute. The nose and wheel had struck the ground at about the same time and after sliding along for about 75 feet it had piled up in the pasture beside a hedge fence. One wheel had come off and was standing inflated against the wall of the inside of a hog house a hundred yards further on. It had gone through two fences and the wall of a house. The wings were badly splintered but the tubular fuselage although badly bent in places had held its general form even in the main pit. The parachute from the flare was hanging on the tailskid.

There were three sacks of mail in the plane. One a full bag, from St. Louis had been split open and some of the mail oil-soaked but legible. The other two were only partially full and were undamaged. I delivered the mail to Maywood by plane to be dispatched on the next ship out.

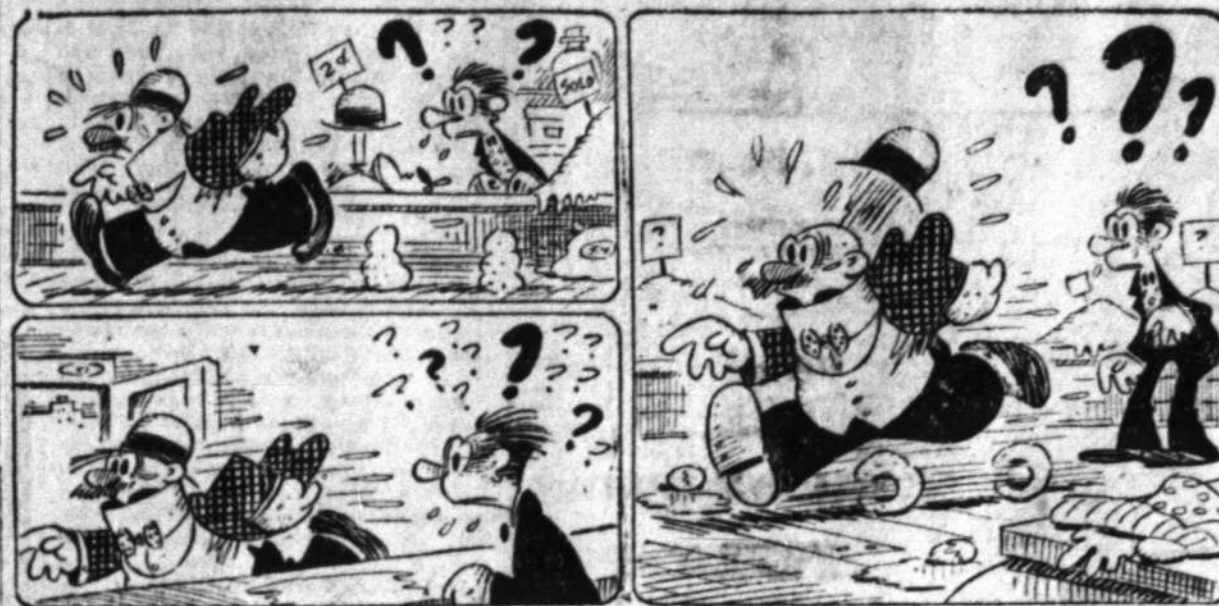

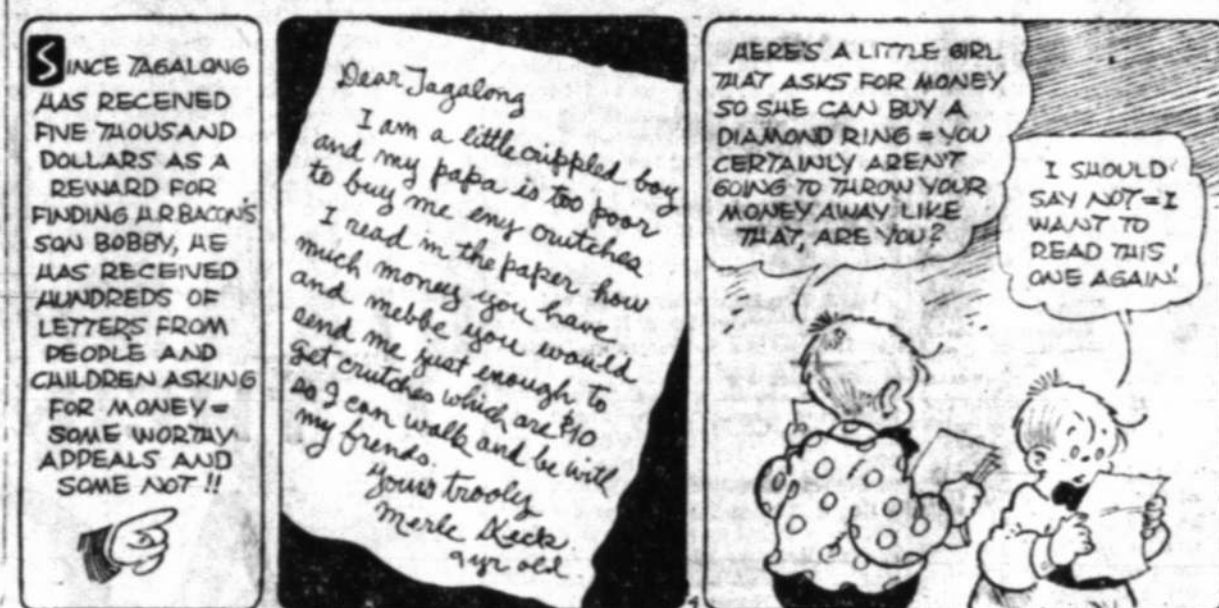

PEKING QUIET AFTER STORM

Removal Of Legation To
Tientsin By America
Is Now Improbable

(By The Associated Press)
PEKING, June 9.—Last week's
uneasiness among foreigners in Pe-
king has abated considerably and it
is most improbable that the Amer-
ican legation and the American res-
idents generally will evacuate the
city in the near future.

A majority of Americans remain
in the city which is orderly and
well policed.

Impressed With Equipment
Brigadier General Smoot, D.
Butler has gone to Tientsin where
the American marine force today
was disembarking after its trip
from Shanghai. Dispatches from
Tientsin said that large crowds of
Chinese and foreigners watched the
unloading of artillery, caterpillar
tractors, and tanks, being particu-
larly impressed with the complete-
ness of the American equipment.

Although it is known that the
American military authorities favor
the removal of the Peking legation to
the coast, whereas the diplomatic
reserves feel such a move might be
misinterpreted, advice from Wash-
ington indicates it is felt there that
a wholesale evacuation of Peking
would be necessary only if the sit-
uation should threaten to entrap
foreigners as in the Boxer uprising
of 1900.

Negotiations Continue
Negotiations for a combination
of north and south China military
leaders with peace as its goal are
still in progress, while the military
situation has reached a stalemate.
Marshal Chang Tso-Lin the Man-
churian war lord, General Chiang
Kai-Shek, the moderate nationalist
generalissimo and Yen-Hsi-Shan,
military governor of the province
of Shansi are still in communica-
tion but nothing further of their
plans has been made public.

O'ervers believe that Chang Tso-
Lin will remain in Peking for at
least several weeks and that when
he turns the city over, as is ulti-
mately expected the process will be
peaceable and will be by arrange-
ment by the principal war lords
concerned.

Cigaret Smoking Women Creating Big Fire Hazard

FORT WORTH, Texas, June 9.—
The increase of cigarette smoking
among women has created a serious
problem to which fire departments
everywhere are being called upon
to give increasing attention. Fire
Marshal Claude Ligon said here.
Much of Fort Worth's fire loss of
more than \$629,000 since Jan. 1, a
sum greater than all of last year's
loss, can be attributed to women
smokers, he declared.

"Several recent fires in Fort
Worth, including one in the busi-
ness district that caused heavy
loss, are believed to have been
started by a cigarette carelessly
tossed aside by a woman," said
Ligon.

Store Catches Fire
In one instance, a clothes closet
in a department store where only
women are employed caught fire
and only the discovery of smoke
issuing from the recess prevented
serious loss. Fire officials believe
that one of the women was smok-
ing when she saw a flower-walker
approaching and threw the cigar-
ette into the inner room.

Women have been known to
throw lighted cigarettes into draw-
ers which they slammed shut when
they heard their husbands' auto-
mobiles coming up to drive or a
knock at the door, according to
Ligon.

NEW ORLEANS—Frogs that
were being raised in captivity by a
biological firm were stolen recent-
ly. Two men, discovered with frogs
in their possession, declared they
had caught them in the marshes.
But an official of the firm demon-
strated to the satisfaction of the
court that they were his frogs, be-
cause their voices were much deeper
than those of their wild cousins.
The frogs were thereupon re-
turned to the biological firm, their
 rightful owners.

Postmaster Very Sorry He Stamped Mail For Bellanca

NEW YORK, June 9. (AP)—Fred
M. Sealy, Hempstead, Long Island
postmaster is "sorry, very sorry,"
that he stamped the mail which was
carried to Germany in the Bellanca
monoplane Columbia by Charles
A. Levine, flight companion of Claren-
ce D. Chamberlin.

Sealy said today that he has sent
to Washington a report on the in-
cident which is under investigation
by the postoffice department.

"Gosh," he said, "I didn't mean
any harm. I felt patriotic and want-
ed to do a personal favor, that's all.
I'm sorry I got into this mixup. I
didn't know that there was any con-
troversy between the postoffice and
Mr. Levine."

Former State Senator Charles C.
Lockwood, counsel for the Columbia
aircraft corporation of which Levine
is managing director, issued a
statement explaining his conten-
tion with the incident. He resented
the implication of "unnamed post-
office officials" that the stamp on
the mail would bring \$1,000 a piece
from collectors and were intended
for sale. He said it had been in-
tended to deliver the cancelled
stamps that came back to the
Brooklyn institute of arts and
sciences as that that institution
could retain as many as desired and
distribute the rest to other mus-
eums.

John Klemann, philanthropist and
official of a stamp company, said
he would not pay \$50 a piece for
the stamps if they were offered for
sale.

Texas And Pacific Stock Hits New High

NEW YORK, June 9. (AP)—The
old stock of the Texas and Pacific
Land Trust, the highest priced
stock listed on the New York stock
exchange, yesterday hung up a new
record for itself when it advanced
661 points, the largest individual
gain ever recorded by any listed
stock. The new high price after the
rise was \$2,501 a share. The new
shares also advanced rapidly from
20 2-8 to 40, the equivalent of \$4-
000 a share for the old stock, which
has been split up at the ratio of
100 to 1.

Wall street was somewhat mys-
tified by the buying of the stock,
but it was reported that the issue
was under accumulation by one
or two more large oil interests.

Congress May Meet In Special Session

WASHINGTON, June 9. (AP)—Con-
gress will be called into special ses-
sion in October, Senator Smoot of
Utah declared today after a con-
ference with President Coolidge.

Upon leaving the White House,
the Utah senator represented the
president as being convinced of the
wisdom of the session.

"Senator Smoot declared that the
deficiency appropriation bill failed
of action at the close of last session,
tax reduction and settlement of
election contests were problems
that must be taken up at an early
date along with flood control mea-
sures."

Continuance Granted In Griffin Land Suit

Continuance of the case of J. R.
Burris, pioneer Lubbock citizen,
against J. R. Griffin of Fort Worth
was granted by Judge Clark M.
Mulligan in 90th District court on
Wednesday, on motion of the de-
fendant. The petition was presented
because of the illness of Mrs. J. R.
Griffin, wife of the defendant, and
motion of defense counsel, Robt.
Griffin.

Burris seeks \$15,000 damages in
connection with alleged irregularities
in a land organization company
owning property in Old Mexico
which Griffin helped to promote.
