

U. S. Started Buying Hogs on Wednesday

The United States government went into the hog market Wednesday of this week and will continue to buy until five million pigs and a million sows are bought.

It started buying in the six mid-west stockyards—those at Chicago, Kansas City, Omaha, St. Paul, Sioux City, and St. Joseph, Mo.

Operations in other markets, it was announced at the Chicago office of the agricultural adjustment administration, will start by next Monday.

Farmers who are willing to sell will be given premiums which G. B. Thorn, field representative of the corn and hog section, said would amount from \$2 to \$4 a hundred pounds for pigs. For sows due to farrow, since the hope is to kill off the fall crop of pork, the government's buyers will pay a flat \$4 a head premium. And by not making the usual market deduction on the sows, the government will add another dollar or so to the farmer's price.

The start of purchasing will mean that the value of the small farmer's pigpen will be enhanced overnight, Thorn explained. The farmer who has 15 pigs within the weight limits specified will find they have increased \$3 to \$4 a hundred pounds in value, or between \$30 and \$45 for his lot. Sows he might have sold because of the rising price of feed will be worth from \$5 to \$5.25 more a head.

Precautions will be taken to prevent speculators from mixing very light and very heavy pigs to obtain a favorable average, it was explained. It will be required that individual pigs in each lot do not vary more than 30 pounds in weight.

The actual price received by an individual farmer will depend upon the location of his nearest authorized processing point with respect to Chicago, administrators said in a statement, adding, it will also depend upon the expenses such as local transportation and commission charges by livestock buyers and marketing arrangements which are involved in delivering the pigs and sows to the processor.

FIRST BALE OF COTTON TUES.

The first bale of 1933 cotton was ginned in Loraine Tuesday, August 22, seven days earlier than the first bale last year. Matio Arina, who lives on the H. C. Griffith farm south of town brought in the bale. It was ginned by the Loraine Gin Company and weighed 560 pounds and sold for ten cents per pound. This price was about a cent a pound above the market for that day.

Besides the premium in the price received Senor Arina received several dollars in cash and merchandise and will get a bale of cotton ginned free at each of the other gins.

ARTHUR LIGHT DEATH VICTIM

Arthur Light, 46, died almost instantly about 8 o'clock Sunday night from three bullet wounds, suffered at his farm home near Inadale, 12 miles north of here. His son, Audrey Light, 21, arrested was at liberty Monday on a \$3000 bond.

The well-known farmer, who owned approximately 1,000 acres or land near Inadale, suffered three wounds, one in each breast and the other in his back.

A family quarrel was blamed for the shooting. Young Light had just returned from a trip, which he had taken without consent of his father, it was said.

Funeral services were held at Pyron Monday afternoon. Survivors include his widow and 11 children.

Mr. Light had been a resident of that section of the country for almost 30 years.

BANDIT GETS \$250 IN CASH

Colorado, Aug. 19.—A man who took \$250 cash from the office of the Max Bernhardt department store here late today, fled from the rear of the building while 16 clerks and 24 customers looked on.

Entering the office the man pushed Mrs. Herbert Gunn, cashier aside and opened the cash register after saying to Max Bernhardt, "I know what I'm doing, and if anybody moves I'll kill him," officers were told.

Bernhardt said the man, whom he recognized, held a gun in his right hand, under his coat, and scooped up the money with his left. All checks were left in the drawer.

QUALIFICATION OF VOTER EXPLAINED

Austin, Texas.—Otherwise qualified voters can vote Aug. 26 on the constitutional amendment to authorize state relief bonds without the requirement that they be property tax payers it was ruled here Tuesday.

The opinion furnished by the assistant attorney general held that any person who is qualified to vote for members of the state legislature is also qualified to vote on the bond amendment.

The qualified voter must be 21 years old, a resident of the state for 12 months, of the county where he offers to vote for six months, and must have paid a poll tax or possess a poll tax exemption.

Carpenters and Laborers Got Together Monday Night

Four Million Back on Job

Washington.—Midway in August, as of early morning on August 15, it was estimated by NRA that 11,000,000 American workers were enjoying the benefits of the Blue Eagle. That is appreciably more than a quarter of the nation's 40,000,000 employed in normal times. The incentive for pushing to the earliest possible conclusion the adoption of the emblem by employers whose trade associations have not yet come within the provisions of codes of fair competition is the realization that there are still nearly 10,000,000 people without work who must be provided with jobs before winter.

General Johnson's organization has not been counting Blue Eagles until they are actually hatched. It is recognized that the task of drafting codes to conform not only with the law, which is simplicity itself, but with the naturally divergent views of employer and employee and to square with the data accumulated by the NRA's research bureau and also that of the National Consumers' Advisory Board, which safeguards the interests of the public is stupendous.

This was foreseen long before the National Recovery Act was introduced in Congress. Wherever the word "Code" is used in the act, there is reference to "Agreement", as indicative of the forethought in providing a means whereby, during the tedious interval of perfecting the codes, the all important matter of providing jobs and at decent rates of pay could be accomplished, as it has been provided for, through the President's Reemployment Agreement. The mandatory clauses of the codes, with respect to minimum scales of wages and maximum hours of work, are thus taken care of automatically; the employer's name goes up on the honor roll at the post office and the employer is then operating under the Blue Eagle.

AGRICULTURE ADJUSTMENT

Livestock buyers are warned by the administration not to buy up hogs with the expectation of selling them at a premium under the emergency hog control program according to a letter received this week by the county farm agent.

The letter in part is as follows: It seems that farmers and traders who buy up pigs from other farmers will not be able to sell these pigs and collect the premium that the government has offered. A telegram from Washington indicates that pigs will be purchased only from original breeders.

"With only two exceptions, every county in this district that discontinued the services of their county agents during the depression has recently made new appropriations for county agent work." T. B. Wood, District agent stated while here last Tuesday, counties making new appropriations in August are Calahan, Brown and Coryell counties. The other counties in the district excepting two did not discontinue the services of the agents. The district extends from Waco to El Paso.

The secretary was instructed to draw up agreements to be signed by the parties concerned. A committee composed of B. Wilkerson, C. W. Hoek, and Coot Walker for skilled labor and H. A. Patterson, S. A. Brown, and J. H. Gross for common laborers, was appointed to circulate the agreements among the laborers for their signatures, and to also ask the business men and others of the town to sign accompanying with them in the move.

Next Monday night was set for the next meeting at which time the agreements will either be adopted or rejected.

It is urged by those concerned that every business man in town be present next Monday night to lend encouragement to these men in their efforts to better their conditions.

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WILL TEXAS LET WOMEN AND CHILDREN GO HUNGRY

Austin, Aug. 22.—In many counties in Texas the Federal government is now spending more money every month for relief work than those counties would have to pay back in a year in paying off the relief bonds, according to William Strauss, chairman of the committee campaigning for adoption of the proposed relief bond amendment.

"It is primarily a matter of bread and meat for the hungry," said Mr. Strauss. "It is unthinkable that Texas will let its women and children go hungry. But some people may want to know what Texas will get for authorizing a bond issue that may go up to \$20,000,000 if the legislature finds that much is needed."

"In the first place, there is hardly a county in Texas that can care for its own destitute through local taxation. If they could the burden of taxes would fall on homes and farms and be tremendously heavy. By issuing state bonds the burden is taken off homes and farms, for the taxes to fund these bonds cannot be raised on real or personal property. If all the bonds are issued the tax per capita will not average over 41 cents a year for 10 years. Actually it probably will be some special tax that will fall heavier on city people and be lighter than on rural citizens."

"In Mitchell County the Federal government in the past ten months has spent for relief work \$21,437. The county has asked for \$5,000 to carry on the work during August for the benefit of 2443 persons on its relief rolls."

VOTE SATURDAY

Regardless of how you are going to vote on the prohibition, the bond amendment, the home rule amendment, and other amendments and the local option question in Mitchell County, you should go to the polls Saturday and vote your sentiments.

Do not let the prohibition and the bond issues overshadow the other issues for they are of equal importance.

We are not saying which way you should vote on the prohibition question. Personally we are dry and intend to vote to retain the 18th amendment as it is. We also believe that the bond issue is essential to the welfare of thousands of Texans and will vote to authorize the legislature to issue the bonds since no tax can be placed on real or personal property to retire the bonds. This provision is clearly stated in the provisions of the bill authorizing the election.
