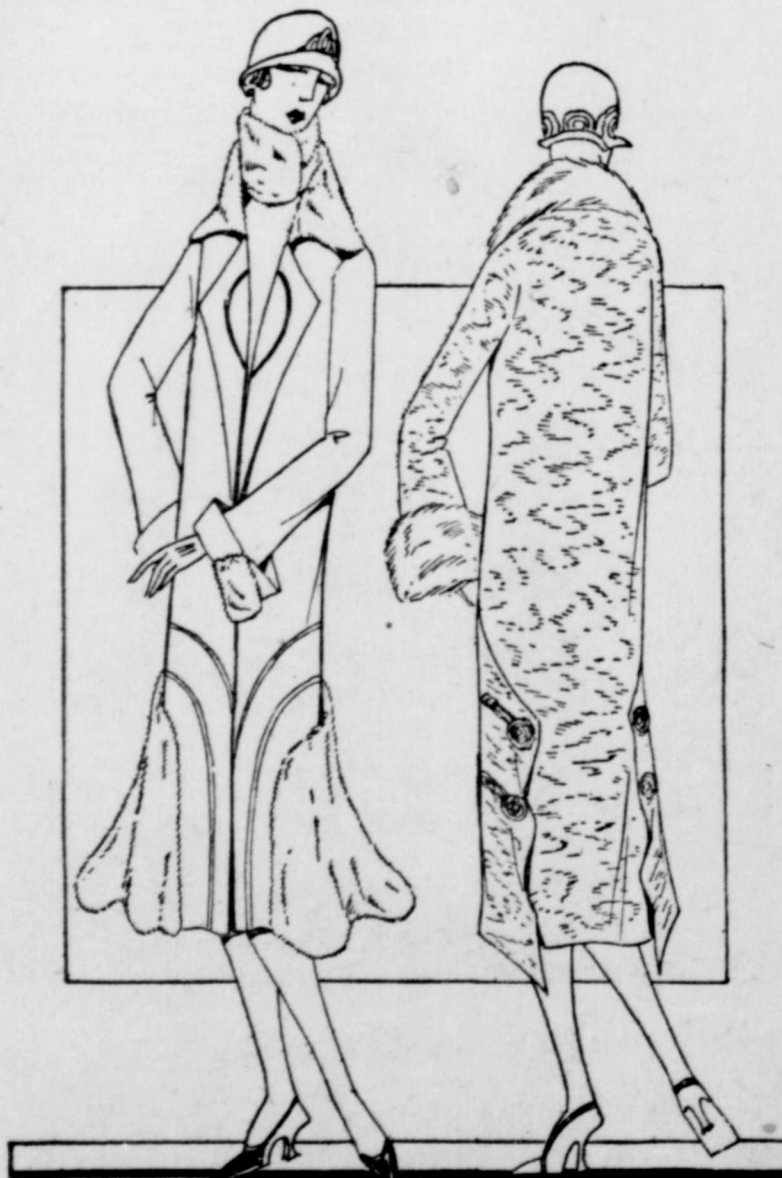

IMPROVEMENT MADE IN MILK MACHINES

The present-day milking machines are such an improvement over the old-time machines that they may now be considered beyond the experimental stage. When first put on the market, they naturally had a number of serious imperfections. These have been almost entirely overcome by the inventive ingenuity of man, so that today it may safely be said that the most modern of them are a success.

The two chief stumbling blocks were keeping the machine clean and avoiding injury to the udder of the cow. It is true that in the hands of a careless operator they are still subject to criticism along these lines, but it is the fault of the operator, and not of the machine. It will no doubt always require more intelligence and judgment to operate them than is generally displayed by a large percentage of our hand-milkers.

It would be difficult to foretell what the future has in store for the dairyman with the milking machine to do his milking. Nevertheless, the most difficult problem, that of hired help, should be at least partially solved. If there is any one drawback to dairy farming, it is this one of keeping competent and reliable help. All other irksome farm operations seem to have been benefited by mechanical invention, but milking, the most despised of them all, seems either to have been neglected, or to have been the more difficult to solve. Men hate the monotony and regularity of hand-milking. Perhaps mechanical milking should prove more popular, as the amount of time and physical exertion is greatly decreased. Already a great many have been installed in some of our best dairies, and their success there is being watched with much interest by farmer dairymen.—H. E. Dvoracek, Colorado Agricultural College.

Little Extra Grain Will Give Increased Returns

A little thought to the feeding of fall-freshened cows will be well repaid in increased returns. Too many cows freshen in poor condition and cannot be expected to yield a good return. To begin with, a dry period of least six weeks is essential to enable the cow to build a reserve. How the cow is fed during this interval will largely determine her production after she freshens. A little extra grain at this time means dividends later. Freshening in good flesh the cow starts her lactation at a big advantage.

Production can be held up with economy by supplementing pasture with ground barley, equal parts ground oats and corn chop. This grain should be fed at the rate of one to five pounds of milk as long as the pasture is good. Don't expect the milk flow to increase materially, but it will hold up over a much longer period of time when prices are good, and therefore more than pay for the grain consumed.

Cost of Wintering Young Heifer Varies Greatly

The feed required in raising as well as the cost of this and other items of expense will vary considerably with different localities. In winter there is no better ration than legume hay, silage and sufficient grain to keep them thrifty and growing vigorously, without becoming too fat. The ration should supply plenty of protein and hence unless a liberal amount of good clover or alfalfa hay is fed, a grain allowance in this element should be supplied. Heifers over ten months of age, especially of the larger breeds, may make satisfactory gains on silage and legume hay alone if of good quality. Results of tests conducted at experiment stations give yearling heifers as requiring from 700 to 800 pounds of hay along with skim milk and other feeds necessary to keep the animals in a growing thrifty condition. In regard to the cost of wintering the heifers this will vary according to the conditions in the neighborhood, such as quantity and costs of feeds and other factors.

Dairy Facts

Regularity in feeding and milking is essential to profitable dairying.

Many an epidemic of diphtheria, scarlet fever, and typhoid fever has been traced to a case of illness on the dairy farm.

The various dairy utensils used by the dairyman are probably one of the most important sources of the bacterial contamination of milk.

Adequate ventilation removes foul air, removes excessive moisture and furnishes a supply of pure, fresh air. All three are vital to the welfare of the herd.

In order to do its work properly the cream separator must be level and must be securely fastened to its foundation, the bearings must be well lubricated with the right kind of oil and no accumulation of dirt can be permitted to collect in the working parts.

Disqualified Citizens.



Despite all the urging of the newspapers and the tax collectors thousands of Texans have allowed February to come without paying their poll tax and thus qualifying as citizens entitled to vote. One vote may not amount to much in determining the result of an election, but when that one is multiplied by thousands the result may mean much for the good or bad of the state and community. Texas would not have so much occasion to feel ashamed of the administration of affairs if only all Texans would feel a greater personal responsibility for the right exercise of the privilege of ballot. No state can be better than the intelligent understanding of statehood on the part of those who compose the citizenship.

Texas' Park System.

Turner E. Hubby, the Texas game, fish and oyster commissioner, is correct in the statement that Texas needs a few large state parks, well kept and used as preserves for wild game rather than fifty or more walled-on-yard parks scattered everywhere for the accommodation of our migratory population. When the state park commission was created it set about securing land donations almost everywhere they could be obtained, instead of centralizing on a few really creditable parks offering attractions enough to be classed really as parks. The slow progress that has been made in the Texas park system has been due largely to the mistaken ideas as to the state's needs. Let Texas establish a few attractive large parks, and if many camp grounds are wanted along our highway systems, let the towns along the roads secure and maintain them.

Too Much Machinery.

Most of the departments of both national and state governments are over-manned, and as a consequence there is more idling than real work. When a new department is established, it usually functions for a while at small expense, but in a little while the employees begin to increase in number. The head of a department must have a secretary to relieve him of his work; the secretary soon finds that an assistant would save him much labor; all of them want stenographers and soon there are assistant stenographers. By this time a few clerks are found convenient to keep the files and attend to the routine matters. To justify its existence in public estimation a publicity director is then employed, who in turn wants an assistant and a stenographer, and so on and on until dozens of people are employed at public expense to do the work that a few might as well do with the right application. If any business was as free in allowing for overhead expense as are most governmental departments it would soon be bankrupt.

Charities Cost Too Much.

The reason that government costs too much is that those who pay the taxes do not feel that it is their business to see that the taxes are spent for the things for which they are collected. The same trouble is found with most charities and other funds collected from the people. Too many half-idle people are paid to collect or to dispense the funds before they reach the place for which they are intended. Most of the money raised from entertainments for charity go to hiring halls, to paying the promoters and professional entertainers, to commissions for many things, and precious little of it gets to charity. This is an evil that appears hard to correct, but in the collection of local charity funds every community should seriously try to protect itself against imposition.

Road Money Badly Wasted.

Enough evidence has been developed in the cases tried at Austin to show that the taxpayers have been getting very little for their money spent in road maintenance work. Probably after the assessors and collectors and disbursers have all been paid and the expenses of the highway commission have been deducted, 10 per cent of the taxes collected for that purpose has been spent for maintaining roads and 90 per cent has gone to "keep" of another kind. These are not an auditor's figures and may not be correct, but they are correct enough to show that Texas hasn't been getting what Texans have been paying for. What are you going to do about it?

Build the Railroads.

If Texas people could have their say about it, every railroad that wants to extend its lines in Texas in 1926 would be allowed to do it. Some of them might possibly build unprofitable lines, but every line built would add to the prosperity and the development of the state.

New Postal Convention.

Washington.—A new postal convention with Newfoundland, effective February 1, was announced Wednesday by Postmaster General New. It places Newfoundland on practically the same basis as Canada in regard to postal rates.

Moscow.—The soviet government has sent \$5,000,000 more in gold to its trade agency in London.

Canada Gets Oranges From United States

In the period from 1920 to 1924 more than 90 per cent (around 1,800,000 boxes) of the total shipments of United States oranges went to Canada, says the government's commerce reports. Smaller amounts were shipped to England, the Philippines, Cuba, China, Newfoundland and Labrador, Mexico and New Zealand. British trade statistics show that for each of the years from 1920 to 1923 imports of oranges from the United States comprised less than 1 per cent of the total orange imports of the United Kingdom. A comparison of United States exports of oranges for the periods 1920-1924 and 1900-1913 discloses that our recent shipments were around 1,995,770 boxes a year, as against prewar consignments of 1,005,247 boxes a year, an increase of around 1,000,000 boxes a year. Canada has always been the best market for our oranges.

THE WHY OF SUPERSTITIONS

ROWAN RUDDERS
 IN SOME places along the Atlantic coast there is belief among sailors and fishermen that if the rudders of their boats are made of rowan wood—that is of the wood of the mountain ash—that the boats will be faster. The Newfoundland fishermen, according to the American Folk Lore society, are especially given to this superstition which clearly originated in the dim regions of Norse mythology. Among the Northern nations the rowan was second in sacred and magical qualities only to the ash, the sacred Isdragel from which the human race descended.

This alone would account for the desirability of having the rudder, the directing part of a boat, made of rowan wood. But the belief that a rowan rudder makes a boat go faster points to something more. The key to this something is apparently found in the ancestry of the word "row" which is derived from the Anglo-Saxon word "rowan" and the word "rowan," like its descendant "row," meant to drive, to push and, accordingly, to the dictionary "hence ultimately, a rudder." Thus a fortuitous combination of mythology and philology indicates the wood of the mountain ash as the proper material for a boat's rudder.
