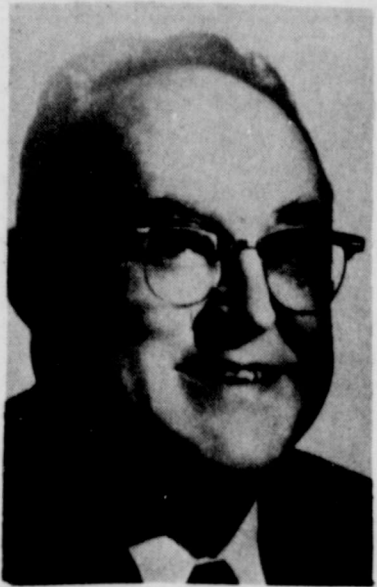

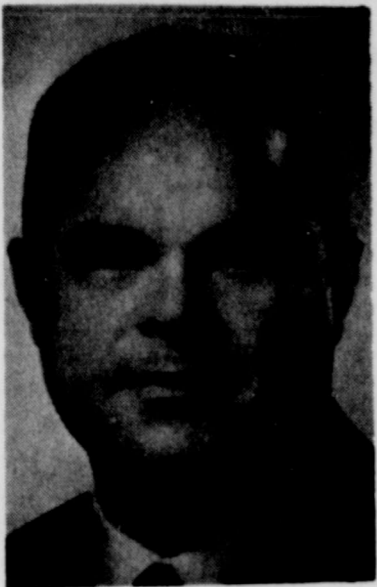

A letter of Commendation honoring him for his high performance on the 1968 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQT) have been awarded to one student at Abernathy High School Principal Curtis Davenport has announced.

The named commended student is Royce Walker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tella Walker, Abernathy.

He is among 39,000 students in the United States who scored in the upper 2 percent of those who will graduate from high school in 1969. The commended students rank just below the 15,000 semifinalists announced in September by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC).

John M. Stalnaker, president of NMSC, said: "Although commended students advance no further in the Merit Scholarship competition, their outstanding record in a nationwide program deserves public recognition. Their significant academic attainment gives promise of continued success in college."

"The commended students should be encouraged to pursue their education since their intellectual talent represents an important and much needed natural resource. Our nation will benefit from their continuing educational development."

The commended students' names are reported to other scholarship-granting agencies and to the colleges they named as their first and second choices when they took the NMQT in February 1968. The reports include home addresses, test scores, and anticipated college majors and career intentions of the commended students.

NMSC encourages these students to make every effort to continue their education.

Each town is expected to contribute their share to keep the council operating. Lubbock meets their goal of \$33,000 through the United Fund. As of Aug. 31 they had contributed \$22,000. Plainview had contributed \$6,188 by Aug. 31 of their goal of \$9,825.

Abernathy has been informed that they have not contributed in five years, this year being six other than a local woman gave \$15,00 last year. No other community who has active scouts has failed more than two years to make a contribution to the total budget. If every community contributed little or none the girl scout program would be discontinued.

Lets do our share for Abernathy Girl Scouts, they are counting on you. Last year there were 92 girls from Abernathy registered as Girl Scouts of America.

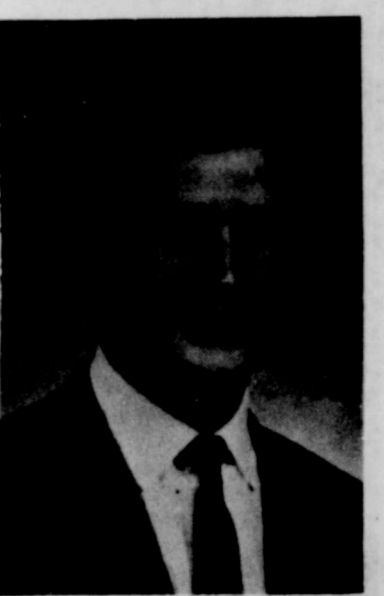

OHS Tips Abernathy 39-6

OLTON — Senior fullback Kenneth Johnson scored three times here Friday night to lead the undefeated Olton Mustangs to a rousing 39-6 victory over the Abernathy Antelopes in District 3-AA opening action.

Johnson was joined by senior fullback Charles McClain in contributing to the 300-plus rushing yardage picked up against a stubborn, yet ineffective 'Lope defense. Rain that preceded the contest proved to be a slight factor as fumbles and dropped passes took their toll.

Senior Mustang halfback Benny Akin missed action again due to a leg injury but will be ready to go against Dimmitt next weekend, according to head coach Don Beck.

The versatile McClain proved that he could throw as well as run when he found senior end R. L. Copeland with a perfect 26-yard pass in the first quarter for Olton's initial score. Copeland gathered it in at the two and went in untouched for the TD. Eddie Hooper, senior guard, kicked the point after with 2:44 remaining. Olton led 7-0.

Caps Drive With 11:16 left in the half, McClain capped a 75-yard Mustang drive with a three-yard scoring plunge. Hooper's try for point after was wide.

Alfred Garcia, sophomore tackle, recovered an Antelope fumble at midfield to set up Olton's next scoring punch. Johnson and McClain swanned running chores to set up their offense at the 26. Senior signal caller Johnny Lewis connected with Johnson at the 15 and the fleet fullback rambled in easily for the remaining yards and his first TD. Lewis' passing try for extra points was incomplete. The Antelopes used up almost all the remaining 5:21 in the half and pushed to Olton's 12-yard stripe before losing possession on a fumble.

Abernathy's lone TD came on a four-yard toss from QB Jerry Fuller to senior end Clark Riley midway in the third period. Gary Martin's running attempt at two extra was cut short.

Boost Lead A scant minute and ten seconds passed before the Mustangs boosted their lead to 26-6 as they took the kickoff and five plays later went in to score. Olton, neglecting to huddle between plays and using successive quick counts, caught the Antelope defense with its guard down. Johnson nailed the door shut with a quick 62-yard scamper good for six more points. Lewis passed to McClain for point after.

A four-yard kickoff return gave the Antelopes possession.

at their own nine and the fourth down punt that ensued was returned to the 26. McClain gathered in an aerial from Lewis at the five and cracked over for his second six-pointer on a 14-yard combo to cap the brief effort. The pass attempt for two by Lewis was broken up.

Johnson bulled in from one yard out to round out scoring activity with 9:46 left in the game. Sel Sanchez' try for point after was wide. Leading rusher was Johnson as he gained 140 yards on 13 carries. McClain was close behind as he also carried 13 times for 118 steps.

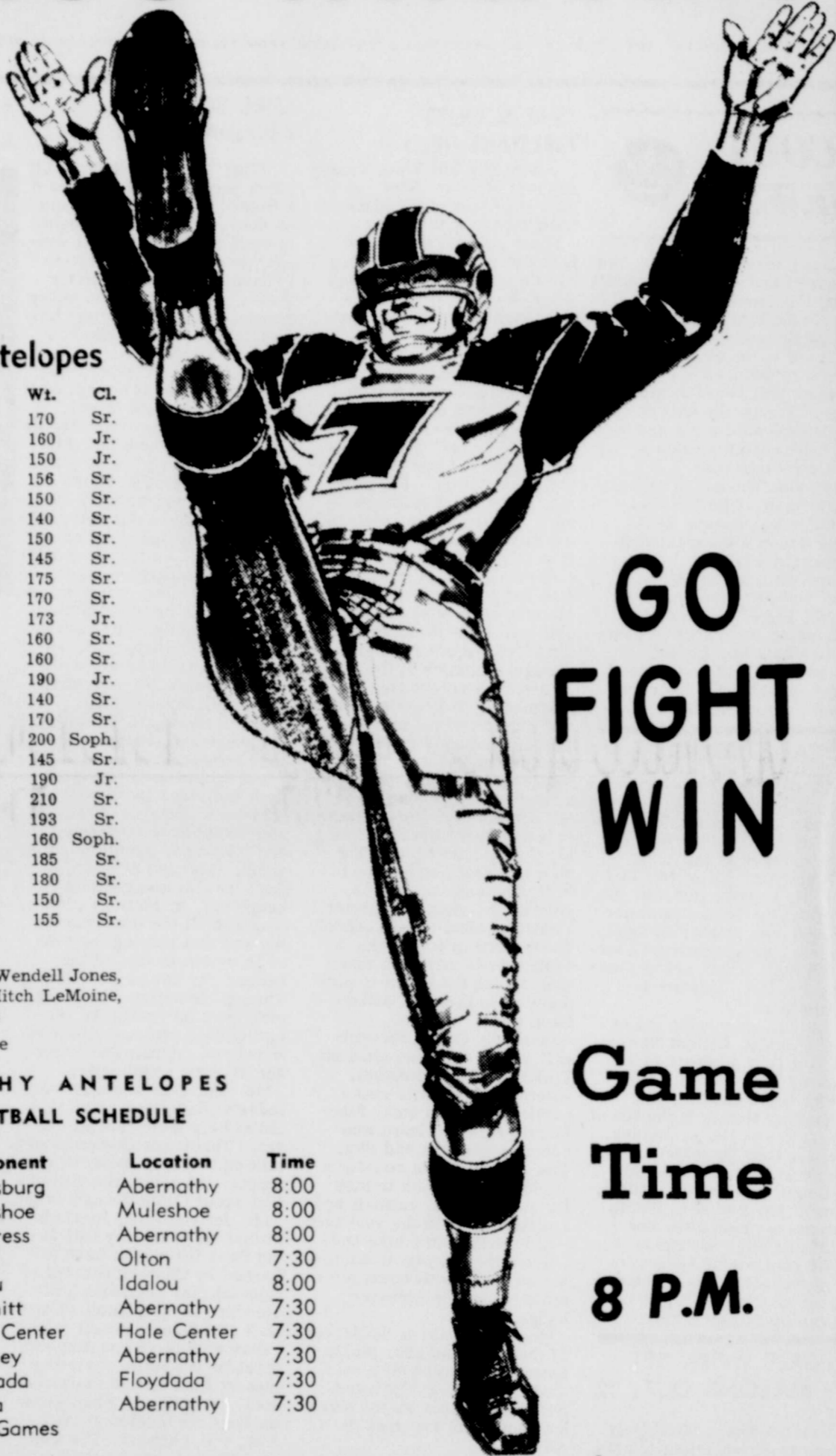

LARRY CROWDER IN TCU BAND

Fort Worth--Larry Crowder, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Crowder of County Line, is among 115 members of Texas Christian University's 1968 Horned Frog Marching Band.

Known as the "Show Window of TCU," the band currently has members from 20 states and three foreign countries.

Under the direction of Dr. James A. Jacobsen, the musical organization practices its routines and precision drills three afternoons each week, putting in about 2,000 man hours toward production of one half-minute show of six-and-a-half minutes.

The band was formed initially in 1905 by some boys who had a little extra time and wanted to blow a horn or to beat a drum.

In 1921 J. E. King formed an organized band and began to hold rehearsals and to play for school functions. When the group had 27 members in 1925, solid purple uniforms with white braid, reflecting TCU's colors, were purchased.

Today the band plays not only for TCU football games, but also for some high school games in route to out-of-town Horned Frog bouts.

Director Jacobsen, holder of B. A. degree from Colorado State College, came to TCU in 1955 from Midwestern Univ-

ersity in Wichita Falls. He has done graduate work at Vandercook College of Music in Chicago and holds honorary Doctor of Music degree from Southern College of Fine Arts in Houston.

The freshman journalism major plays clarinet in the band.

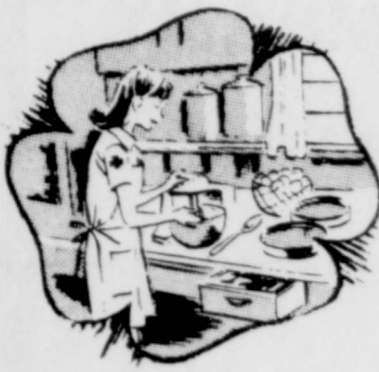
