Gas Rate Increase In The Future?

Higher Electric Rates OKed; Sewer And Water To Go Up

The City Council of Colorado City Monday night approved a rate increase by Texas Electric Service Co., and were told by City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr., that the city's water and sewer rates will have to be increased within the very near future.

The Record also learned that Lone Star Gas Co. probably will come before the council within the near future to also seek a rate increase, due to the rising price of natural gas.

The discussion of the water and sewer rates came while the council was talking about the city's needs such as a new trash pickup system for the downtown area as well as remodeling houses occupied by city employees.

Mayor C. C. (Mike) Burt pointed out that the city is several months ahead on spending as compared to income and the budgeted expenditures.

Texas Electric was represented by local manager B. B. Hardee who told the council that the requested rate increase will average about 9 1/2% and will

cost the average homeowner about \$1 per month. Westbrook and Loraine city

councils approved the increase in meetings last week. Hardee said that TESCO must

request the increase in order to continue to provide adequate service in the face of fuel short-

ages and higher costs of construction and financing. It was pointed out that even with the in-

crease, electricity is still cheaper than it was in 1945. The council also talked about

the need for more trash containers in the downtown area and urged the city manager to launch a clean-up drive. Burt pointed out that he hopes in next year's budget that the city can purchase a new trash pickup system that would include large trash containers and a new truck that would lift and dump the containers.

The council approved a lease of parking lots at the Texas & Pacific Railroad depot and the council also discussed how a speed limit could be imposed on trains going through Colorado City.

Sadler read a report from the Public Housing Authority saying that of 50 units available, an average of 49 per month were occupied and that the average rental rate per occupied unit was \$29.01 per month. The report also noted that two tenants bought homes here in 1973.

Sadler reported that plans for the city's new civic center should be here by next week and at that time a special council meeting will be held to review the plans. Sadler said he hopes to be able to take bids in February. The new civic center will be located at 2nd and Oak. Buildings at that site are now being torn down.

The council also heard reports on work to improve operation of the new traffic signal lights and that Walnut between 17th and 21st will soon be paved and that the new Mitchell Council Ambulance service has purchased a back-up ambulance unit from Kiker-Seale Funeral Home as well as purchasing all ambulance supplies from the funeral home at 50 per cent of their cost. The ambulance has also purchased a new ambulance unit which should be delivered in February. The ambulances will be housed in the rear portion of the police station.

Councilman Eddie Piland, the city's representative on the ambulance committee, reported that the committee has estimated it will take about \$19,500 to operate for the first six months, including the purchase of all the equipment, and not including the salaries of personnel who will be paid by each of the three governmental agencies involved.

Two Sessions For Saturday's Youth Rally

A Youth Rally will be held Saturday afternoon in two sessions, the first session at the 22nd and Austin St. Church of Christ, then a break for supper and the evening session at the Northside Church of Christ.

The theme for the Youth Rally is "Jesus is well and alive today."

Registration will begin at 12:30 and continue until 1:30 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 19. Johnny Thompson, well-known youth leader and graduate of Abilene Christian College, in his seventh year as minister of the Eighth and Harrison congregation in Harlingen, will be the featured speaker for the afternoon session of the rally. Thompson authored the "Dear Johnny" column in Teenage Christian for many years.

The afternoon meal will be served from 4:30 to 6 p.m. at the 22nd and Austin St. Church of Christ, with food to be brought by members of both churches.

After the supper, the second session will be held in the Northside Church of Christ, with See RALLY Page 8

Lemons Looks At '74 Chamber

"We have three important resources here in Mitchell County," said Bobby Lemons, "and they are agriculture, minerals and young people."

Lemons was outlining some of his ideas for the coming year for the Chamber of Commerce. He has been elected to lead the Chamber as president during 1974.

"I think the committees that we have had during the past few

years are important and we will keep them and maybe even expand their activities, but an important opportunity is open to us and maybe we'll have a committee or even more than one committee to serve the interests of young people in the county."

Lemons said that in the last few years there has been a turnaround in the exodus of young people from our county. Some college students are returning and young people are going into business here, either in Colorado City or farming in the county.

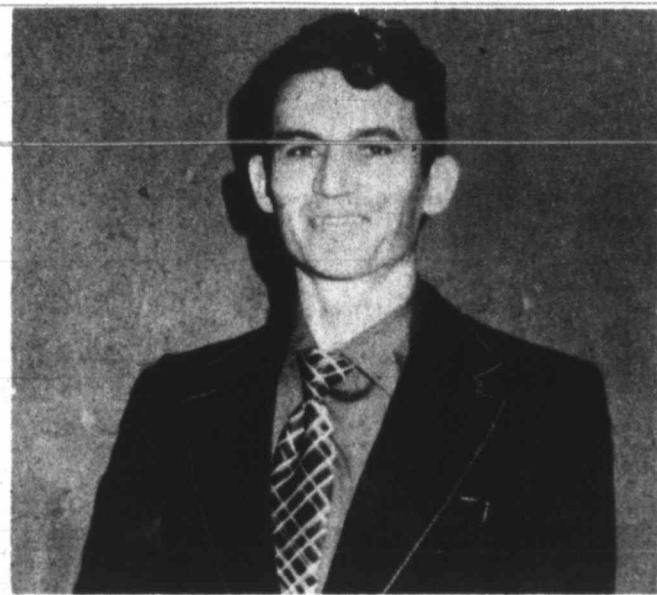
"A new field is open to the Chamber in trying to get the involvement of these young people in activities of the Chamber of Commerce."

He explained that his idea is to use a survey technique to identify the key leaders in the various age levels throughout the county.

Lemons said "I hope we can do this and it will involve a lot of work, but it will be worthwhile if we can get some of these young people to help out with their ideas and enthusiasm."

The next meeting of the board of directors of the Chamber will be the first Monday in February and committee assignments are being made now, with director-representatives being appointed to fill each post.

After the February meeting of the board, committee members for each area will be made public.

School Keeps Same Time

The school board for Colorado City schools discussed changing school starting times since the nation has gone back on Daylight

Savings Time and decided to retain the schedule of 8:30 to 3:30.

The school board met in regular session Monday night at 7 p.m. in the high school library and discussed a number of important items, the possible time change among them.

A number of calls have been received by school officials about the time schedules for the schools, but the percentage was about 75 per cent in favor of the original time schedule. Superintendent Lloyd McKee also reported very little complication arising from the change to Daylight Savings Time. One important point was brought out, the fact that

She has one daughter, Mrs. C. C. Franklin, Jr. of Colorado City and a grandson, David Sanders of Richland Hills, who has two children.

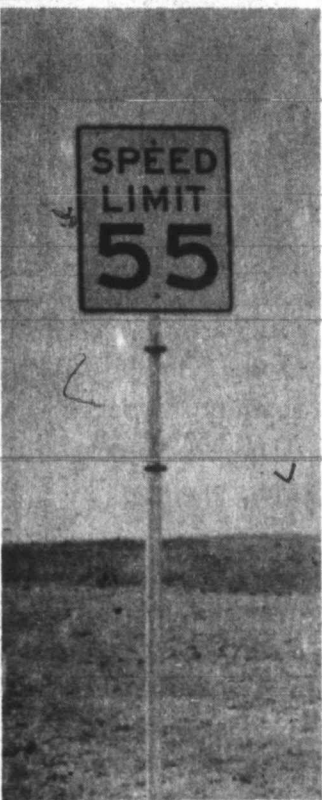

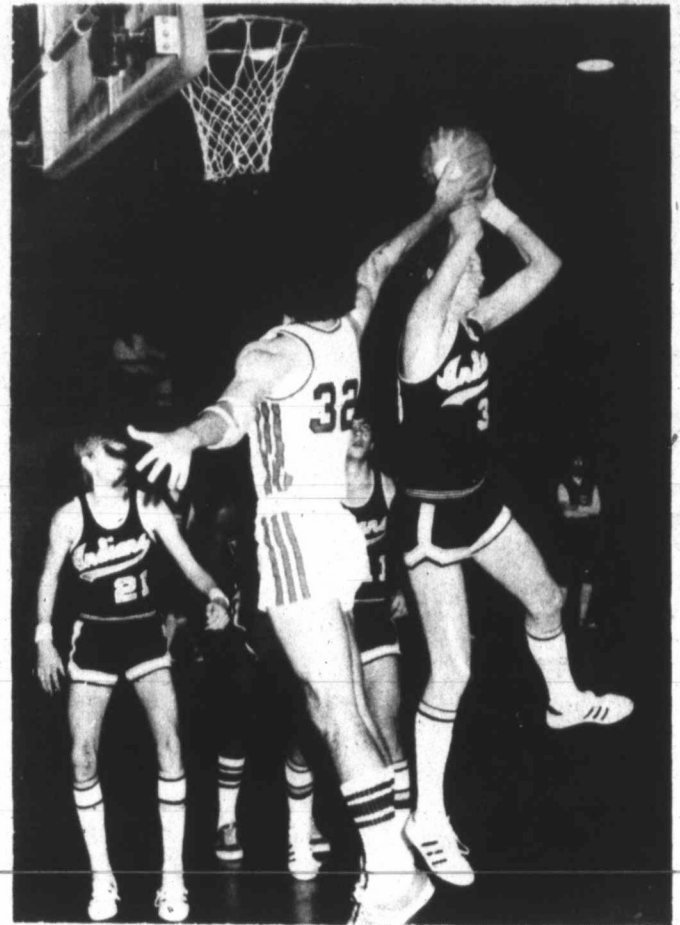

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School Board Met Monday Night

In the regular meeting of the Loraine Independent School Board Monday night the first item discussed was how our time change is working out. Since the time changed the Loraine School classes start at 9 a.m. and are dismissed at 4:05 p.m. each day, Supt. Harkey said comments from the community were most favorable about this schedule.

Members of the Board cautioned the administration to do everything possible in order to conserve energy.

Supt. Harkey gave a report on his attendance at the annual superintendence Mid-winter Conference held in Austin last week.

Mr. Harkey also reported to the Board that our previous Title I funding of \$7,105.00 for 1973-74 school year has been increased to \$18,300.00.

The contract of Tax Assessor-Collector, Mrs. Wanda Hamilton, was renewed for 1974-75 school year.

A review of current salaries for all personnel for Loraine Schools was presented by Supt. Harkey, and a comparison of the 1974-75 professional salaries was made.

The State salary increases for teachers and administrators in the Loraine School for 1974-75 amounts to \$19,992.00. Of this

amount the local School District will be required to pay 10%. The remaining employee's salary increases figured on a 6% annual cost of living raise will require an additional \$1800.00. The combined cost to the Loraine schools of all proposed salary increases amounts to approximately \$3800.00.

Members of the Board also discussed the inflationary prices of gasoline, supplies and materials and operational costs in general.

Supt. Harkey reported that during 1972-73 school year the cost for a ream of paper was 78¢. The lowest price paid for the same ream of paper at the beginning of this year was \$1.15. This same ream of paper currently costs \$1.25. This is only one example of inflation which is severely and rapidly depleting the 1973-74 budget. He estimated that the cost of operation for 1973-74 school year could very possibly exceed the cost of operation by as much as \$15,000.00 to \$20,000.00.

The Board of trustees and administration are making every effort to decrease possible expenditure without adversely affecting the total school program.

Simms was born Nov. 30, 1885 in Robertson County, Texas.

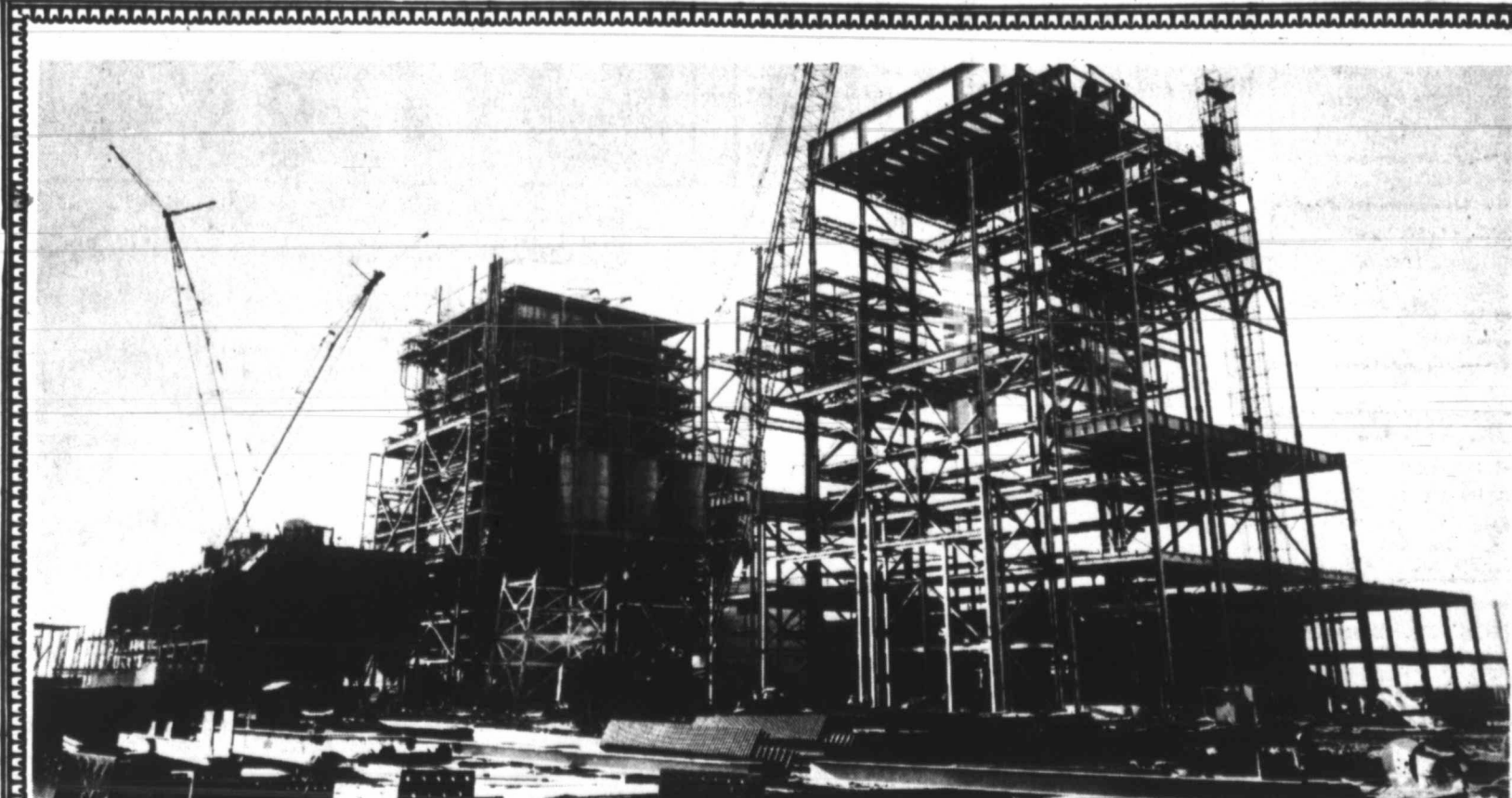

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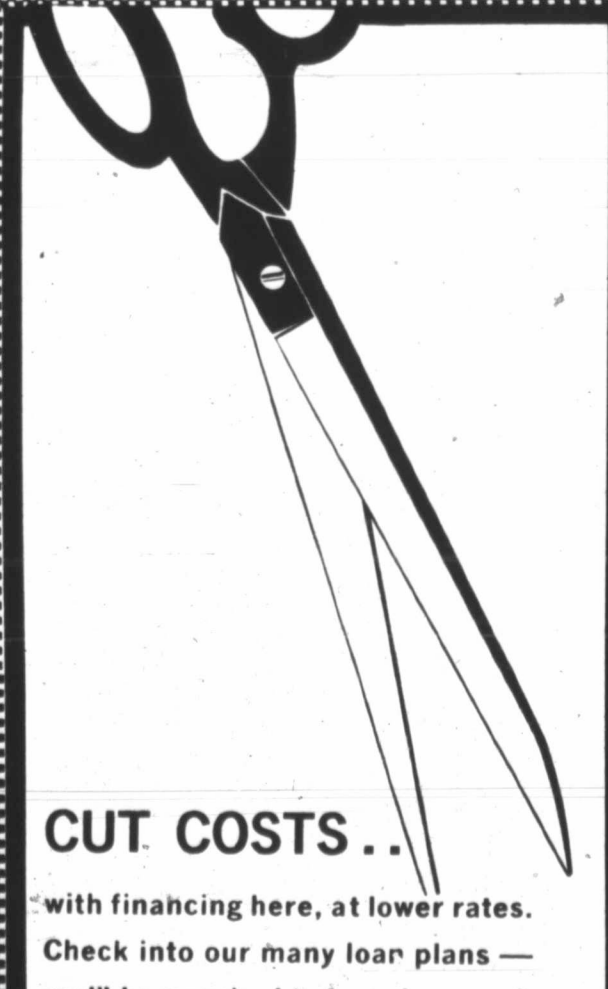

children should be cautioned that they cannot be easily seen by motorists and should be careful about crossing streets.

The board also forgave a delinquent tax of \$1,696.21 plus penalty and interest on the Jordan property (site of the proposed new Civic Center) in the 100 block of Oak Street so that construction can begin soon. The vote was unanimous on waiving the collection of back taxes.

A letter was read from band director Kent Holder requesting that sixth grade be the grade for beginning band after this school year. He gave as his reasons the physical makeup and size of the students, equipment is easier to handle in sixth grade than fifth grade and that the students are less likely to get tired of band and drop out before reaching their senior year. Another consideration by the board was the fact that changes will be made in the location of students after the new high school is built and junior high students, grades 6-8, move into their own junior high complex, the present high school plant. The board voted to approve the request by Holder.

The board also was informed that raises are in order for school employees in accordance with a bill passed by the Texas legislature requiring a \$60 per month cost of living increase effective Sept. 1, 1974. The board talked about various ways this expense could be met and went into executive session to discuss the elimination of a teacher's assignment that might be an economy measure.

After the executive session, the incumbents Drew Ballard, Truman Bodine, Ed Roach and Bob Motley filed for re-election to the school board in the April 6 school board election. Motley was appointed to fill out the term of Truman Nix, who resigned shortly after his election this past year, but must run for election on his own in the following election.

The board also granted a three-year contract to school superintendent Lloyd McKee, giving him a raise more in line with superintendent's pay in area schools.

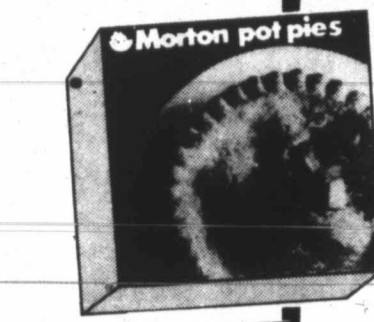
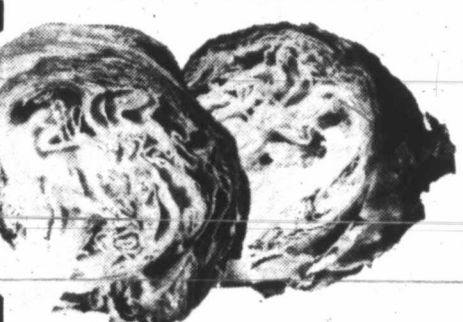
