Hawks Outscore Rebels

The Rivercrest Rebels dropped their season opener to the Hawkins Hawks Friday night at Rebel Stadium 14 to 12 in a game which the Rebels won on the ground but lost on the scoreboard.

The Rebels gained 243 yards rushing compared to 185 for the Hawks, but short punts and bad breaks cost the ballgame. Rebel quarterback Kip Stansell, who handles the ball well and calls a good game, had trouble with his punts, averaging 19.6 for five attempts. All other problems aside, however, it was the two point conversion early in the ball game that put the Hawks on the high end of the score when the game was over.

Stansell is the core of the Rebel offense, but the leading ground gainer Friday night was Jimmy Via, who made two 22 yard scampers on the same play behind blocks by Billy Scales on his way to gaining 75

yards in the first half of the ball game. Via's total for the game was 91 yards.

Awards for the thriller of the game go to Billy Scales, who looked like big brother Milton, a 1978 Rivercrest grad, when he broke a couple of tackles and scampered 66 yards for a Rebel touchdown on the second play of the second half.

The quickness and surprise of the Hawkins offense during the first series of the ballgame caught the Rebels off guard, and it was that early score and extra points that the Rebels were never able to overcome. Hawkins quarterback Vincent Griffin drove through the center of the Rebel line time and again during that first series, calling plays in such swift succession that the Rebels were unable to recover.

The Rebel offense could not

put together a drive on their first possession, but did force the Hawks to punt the ball away on their second possession. A 39 yard punt by Hawk Joe Fleming put the ball in play on the Rebel 14 yard line, and then the Rebels touchdown drive

Via tried the middle for seven yards, then Stansell gave the ball to Scales a couple of times for 10 yards. From the Rivercrest 37, Via scampered around the right end for 22 yards, and three plays later made the same play work for another 22 yards. With first and goal from the seven, Via made the carry for the touchdown, but his try to even the score with the Hawks fell short.

The Rebels took the lead early in the second half with Scales 66 yard effort, but a Stansell try for extra points gave the Rebels only a four point lead.

The Rebels did not hold the lead for long, however, as the Hawks drove from their own 35 yard line for another score, and took the lead that they held throughout the remainder of the game, 14-12.

Rebel Keith House led the Rebel defensive effort, and was in on most of the tackles. Also showing remarkable defensive drive were Edward Deaton, Bradley Smith, Jimmy Smith, Eddie Belcher and Ricky Franks. Jimmy Smith was credited with stopping a third quarter extra point attempt by the Hawks.

The Rebels will meet the Cooper Bulldogs at Rebel Stadium at 8 p.m. Friday night. Seventh and eighth grade games will begin at Cooper at 5:00 p.m. Thursday, September 14, and the Junior Varsity game will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Commissioners Table Increases

The Red River County Commissioner's Court tabled a request for an immediate increase in wages by Justice of the Peace W.M. (Bill) McDonough in the regular meeting of the court Monday, and also tabled a request for a \$50 a month car allowance for Constable Olin Humphrey.

The Court heard, but took no action on a request by County Judge Connie Sullivan to establish a policy of reimbursing commissioners from paid receipts for expenses incurred when the commissioners attend out of town meetings and conventions. At present the commissioners allow themselves a flat amount for expenses incurred at conventions and no receipts or proof of attendance at such meetings is required.

Paul Smith, a resident of precinct two, asked the commissioners to close a road in which he has some interest, and commissioners informed Smith of the procedure to be followed.

Approval was given to the purchase of a demonstrator pickup bought in July for precinct two.

Carolyn Calvert of CETA (Manpower) addressed the court and advised commissioners that two Manpower employees will no longer be funded at the end of the month.

Bill Jennings, with a high bid of \$626, was awarded a 1974 Dodge ambulance owned by the county.

Clarksville city councilman Jerry Ables invited to court to attend a meeting on solid waste problems which the city is sponsoring.

In other business, the court approved payment of \$10 to doctors for examination of mental commitments by the county, approved the continued employment of Diane Whitaker as secretary for tax coordinator Tommy Anderson, and approved the employment of a VOE student for the district clerk's office.

Department Schedules Clinics In Bogata

The Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 7 office announced plans today for the continuation of a series of monthly immunization clinics for all children needing immunizations. The clinics will be conducted at the First Baptist Church in Avery, Texas on September 18, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and at the City Hall in Bogata, Texas on September 19, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Future clinic dates will be announced.

The Health Department emphasizes that these clinics are available to all children, preschool and school age, beginning at two months of age. Immunizations to be offered include Mumps, Measles, Rubella, Oral Polio, Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis and Tetanus-diphtheria. All children must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Parents are reminded to bring the child's immunization record if it is available.

The Tetanus-diphtheria vaccine is also available to adults.

Commissioners Approve \$42,000 In Sept. Claims

Red River County Commissioners Monday approved \$42,285.79 in bills owed by the county and paid from 14 separate funds. In addition, the regular county payroll was made.

The figure included \$3140.94 paid out of the general fund, \$107.05 paid from the probation fund, \$736.65 paid

from the fund for the special investigator for the county attorney, \$1424.97 from the Baker Street fund, \$69.20 from the airport fund, \$19.50 from the law library fund, and \$2572.62 from revenue sharing funds. Ambulance fund bills totaled \$188.40.

Of major interest was the portion of the bills which were applied against the road and bridge funds of various precincts. Commissioner Earl Humphrey's precinct one had claims amounting to \$12,208.09 which were paid Monday. Although this was the largest amount of the four precincts for September, almost \$10,000 was spent on road oil, and this is the first oil purchased this year for precinct one.

Total for precinct two was

\$4438.42. R.L. Edwards is the commissioner for this precinct, and since the first of the year has spent only \$144.55 on road oil.

Claims against precinct three, managed by commissioner Joe Runyan, were \$10,119.11. The September amount included a \$4332.38 claim for road oil, and a total of \$4195.88 has been spent for road oil by precinct three since the first of the year, excluding the September amount. Total for the year is \$8528.26.

September claims in precinct four, Darwin Floyd's precinct, totaled \$7237.84. Since January 1, 1978, Floyd has submitted claims in the amount of \$8966.88 for road oil, excluding the September amount of \$4350.36

spent for road oil. Total for the year is \$13,317.24.

Bills paid by the county are public records and are on file in the county courthouse for inspection by the public.

Farmers Face SBA Filing Deadline

For farmers and ranchers who suffered drought damage to 1977 crops, the deadline for filing loan applications is October 11, 1978, which is six months from the original date established when the disaster was declared by the U.S. Small Business Administration.

So far more than 8,500 farmers and ranchers in Texas have either interviewed or filed drought loan applications totaling in excess of \$125 million and more applications are expected as next month's deadline approaches. There are 13 SBA Disaster Offices located

around the State where farmers and ranchers affected by the drought may apply for loans. The offices are located as follows: Dallas-1100 Commerce Street, 3C36, Dallas, Texas 75242; Houston-One Allen Center, Suite 705, 500 Dallas, Houston, Texas 77002; and San Antonio-727 E. Durango, San Antonio, Texas 78206; Harlingen-222 S. Van Buren, P.O. Box 2567, Harlingen, Texas 78550; Lubbock-1205 Texas Avenue, Room 422B, Lubbock, Texas 79401; Temple-2 North 5th St., P.O. Box 158, Temple, Texas

76501; Laredo-South Texas Economic Development Assoc., 520 Matamoras, Laredo, Texas 78040; Amarillo-Room 326, Federal Office Building, 205 E. 5th Street, Amarillo, Texas 79101; Pecos-Community House, 506 South Oak, Pecos, Texas 79772; Marshall-U.S. Courthouse, 100 S. Washington, Marshall, Texas 75670; Abilene-County Judge's Office, 301 Oak Street, Abilene, Texas 79602; and Sonora-201 N.E. Main Street, City Hall, Sonora, Texas 76950.

SBA Office managers are recommending that the farmers and ranchers come in person to pick up an application and then return it the same way. This assures that the application is complete, which in turn expedites processing of the loan. The loan program for farmers who suffered financial hardship because of the drought includes unrecovered production costs on 1977 crops at 3 percent for the first \$250,000 and 6 percent thereafter.

The drought is widespread in Texas. Approximately 90 percent of the 254 Texas counties are eligible for drought loan programs.



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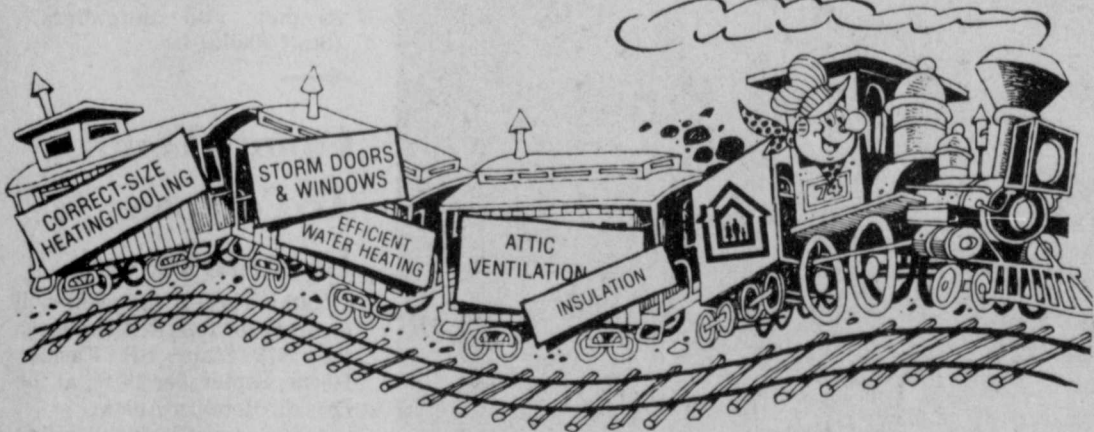
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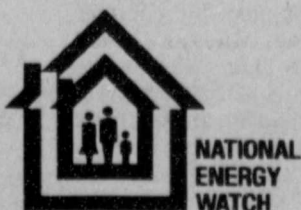

Harwood Joins First City National Bank

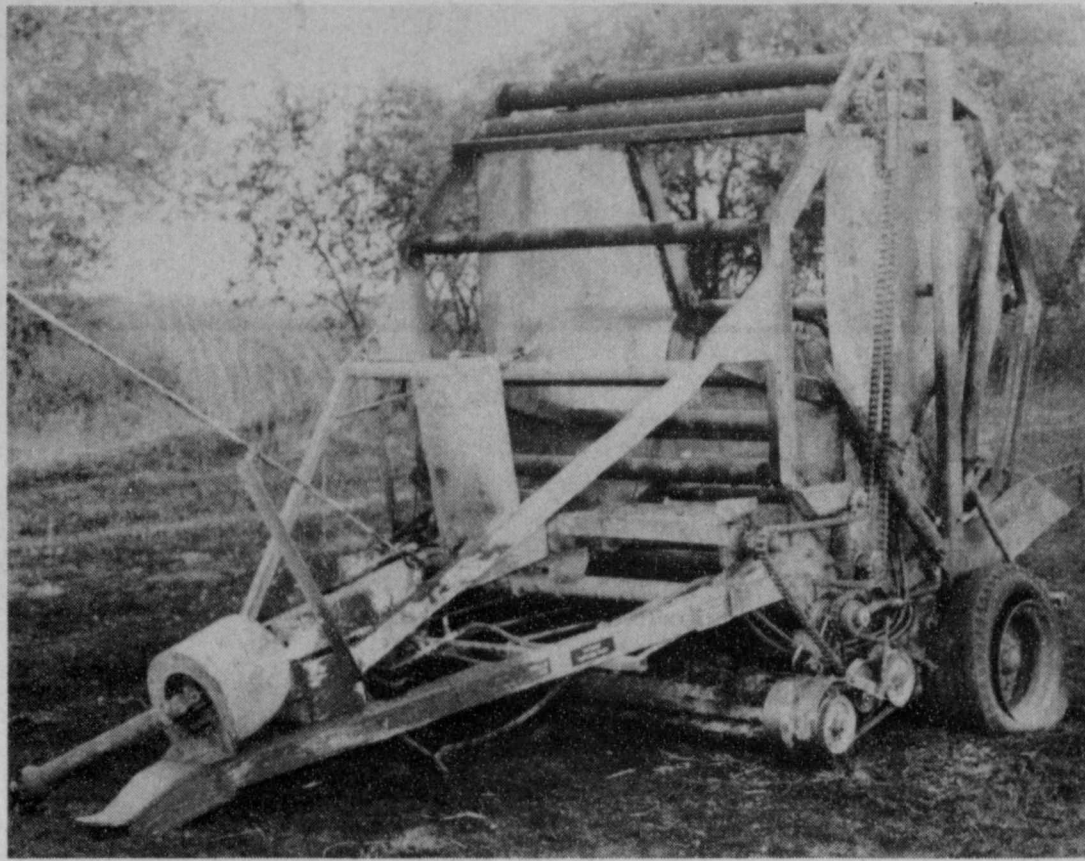
David S. Harwood has joined First City National Bank of Paris as vice president.

Second Hay Cutting Still Possible

The lingering drought continues to plague Red River Valley agriculture and with the passing of each rainless day it becomes more evident that there will be a severe shortage of hay. There is still time to make another hay crop if everything works like clock work.

Here are the "ifs" required for that cutting of hay...If 200 to 300 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer are applied to grass today, if a good soaking rain is received tomorrow; if producer watches and controls Army worms and grasshoppers; if harvest time weather is received in about a month; and if producers have hay harvesting equipment or can get assurance from custom operators to do harvesting.

It is not an impossible task and it can be done. Some producers do not have other workable choices. But, time is getting short.

Some producers are in the process of establishing some type winter pasture to help stretch the available hay. The type planted will depend on the amount of hay available. A small grain and ryegrass pasture should save approximately 20 bales of hay per cow year when one acre is planted for each three cows.

A ryegrass pasture will save approximately 12 bales of hay per cow per year when planted at one acre per two cows.

The out-of-pocket costs of these pastures will be approximately the same as buying hay at \$1.75 to supply the needed feed.

If one is needing winter pasture grazing this fall and winter, the small grains must be planted by September 20. This is absolutely necessary. Elbon and Bonel rye varieties

have been the top forage producers at the Texas A&M Research Center at Overton. One advantage of rye is early production and more production than wheat, oats and ryegrass.

Coker 68-15 has been the top forage wheat variety during the past two years. It is important to remember that Coker 68-15 produces during the colder period of the year better than some of the other varieties.

Plant 100 pounds of small grain per acre and consider fertilizer rates of 60-60-60 per acre at planting time. It is absolutely necessary to place all of the phosphorus and potash in the ground with the seed.

PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978

"The Tax Relief Amendment" (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing

authority where the property tax is imposed.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for tax relief for residential homesteads, elderly persons, disabled persons, and agricultural land; for personal property exemptions; for truth in taxation procedures, including citizen involvement; for a redefinition of the tax base; for limitations on state spending; and for property tax administration."

NUMBER ONE (S.J.R. 50)

S.J.R. 50 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to delete an archaic reference to the "Deaf and Dumb Asylum." The amendment would allow the State of Texas to purchase products and services done by handicapped individuals in nonprofit rehabilitation facilities without complying with bid requirements applicable to other state contracts. The amendment also would eliminate the formality of the approval of certain state contracts by the Governor, the Secretary of State and the Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment deleting the archaic reference to the 'Deaf and Dumb Asylum,' allowing certain products and services of handicapped individuals to be used by agencies and departments of state government, requiring the procurement of other products and services required in the operation of state government to be made under bids awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, making all such procurement processes subject to laws enacted by the legislature, and eliminating the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller of Public Accounts of Texas be personally involved with such transactions."

NUMBER TWO (S.J.R. 55)

S.J.R. 55 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit local governments to issue bonds for the reconstruction or acquisition of facilities (land, equipment and improvements) designed to develop employment opportunities. These

Aikin Honored By County Ag Agents

Senator A.M. Aikin, Jr. and Mrs. Aikin were honored this week at a luncheon sponsored by the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association. The occasion was to express gratitude for Aikin's many years service to the people of Texas and particularly to agricultural and 4-H programs conducted through the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Association President Billy Percival, Houston County Extension agent, presented a plaque on behalf of the statewide organization.

Senator Aikin, who has served longer in the state

legislature than any other person in Texas and second longest of anyone in the United States, is retiring after the current term of office. He was elected to the Texas Senate in 1936 from Senatorial District 1.

Gene Neal, Harrison County Extension agent and District 5 director of TCAAA, served as master of ceremonies. During the presentation, Dr. Uel Stockard, state agent-agriculture for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service; Robert J. Moody, Red River County Extension agent; Paul Herschler, retired Hopkins County Extension agent; and Paul Payne, Lamar County Extension agent, recalled numerous times that Senator Aikin took the lead in furthering Extension educational efforts.

It was recalled that Senator Aikin made a point of attending as many events as possible throughout his district where 4-H club members were being honored for their accomplishments. His strong faith in the youth body of today is evident when he speaks of their accomplishments and qualifications to become tomorrow's leaders.

Senator Aikin emphasized that the church is the most important institution in any community and that schools are a close second. "County agent work is education," he said. "Therefore, county agent work plays a very important role in every county."

Herschler summed up the feelings of county Extension agents throughout the state when he applied a quote about Abraham Lincoln to Senator Aikin's accomplishments. "He's not a good man because he's a great man—he is a great man because he's a good man."

bonds would be payable solely from the revenue from the sale or lease of these facilities. The building or acquisition of such facilities must be determined by the local government to be necessary to develop employment opportunities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that the legislature may permit political subdivisions to issue revenue bonds to develop employment opportunities for its citizens."

NUMBER THREE (S.J.R. 44)

S.J.R. 44 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would allow the legislature to authorize cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas. The bonds are to be paid solely from revenue from municipal tax increments. Payment cannot be made from the revenue of municipal taxes, utilities, or other services.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize cities and towns to issue bonds to finance the redevelopment of blighted areas and prohibiting any city or town from granting its money or lending its credit for such purposes."

NUMBER FOUR (S.J.R. 53)

S.J.R. 53 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to exempt from taxation solar or wind-powered energy devices.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from taxation solar and wind-powered energy devices."

NUMBER FIVE (H.J.R. 37)

H.J.R. 37 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to grant exclusive jurisdiction to justices of the peace in civil cases where the amount in controversy does not exceed \$200, except where the legislature gives exclusive jurisdiction to another court.

The amendment grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with county courts where the amount in controversy is between \$200 and \$500, except where the legislature gives the county court exclusive jurisdiction.

The amendment also grants justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction

tion with both county and district courts where the amount in controversy is between \$500 and \$1,000, except where the legislature gives the county or district court exclusive jurisdiction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in civil cases."

NUMBER SIX (S.J.R. 45)

S.J.R. 45 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to allow the legislature to expand the number of judges on any court of civil appeals.

Presently courts of civil appeals are limited to a chief justice and two associate justices. The amendment also would allow the courts to sit in sections, with the concurrence of a majority of the judges sitting in the section necessary to decide a case.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to increase the number of justices on a court of civil appeals, permitting a court of civil appeals to sit in sections, and requiring a concurrence of a majority of justices to decide a case."

NUMBER SEVEN (S.J.R. 48)

S.J.R. 48 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution eliminating the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund. The authority of the State Building Commission has been transferred by law to the State Board of Control.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional authority for the State Building Commission and the State Building Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT (H.J.R. 42)

H.J.R. 42 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing certain political subdivisions or districts in the state that can presently issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit to support such activities.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendments authorizing certain districts to engage in fire-fighting activities and to issue bonds or otherwise indebtedness or to issue bonds or otherwise lend their credit for fire-fighting purposes."

SCS Holds Field Day

A field day will be held at the Soil Conservation Service Plant Materials Center at Knox City on September 27, 1978.

Charles Van Deaver, district conservationist for SCS at Clarksville, said the public is being invited to the event. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma.

A.C. Spencer, executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, will be the principal speaker. Spencer will speak at 12:30 p.m.

Guided tours will be conducted through the 90-acre center from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The center is located on FM 1292, 2 miles north and 2 1/4 miles west of Knox City.

A barbecue lunch will be available on a prepaid basis at \$3.00 per plate. Payment should be sent to Ms. Doris Crowmover, Chamber of Commerce, Box 91, Knox City, Texas 79529 by September 15.

Seed or rootstock from native plants that show potential for solving specific soil and water conservation problems are collected, then grown and evaluated at the Knox City Center. The more promising ones are then tested under field conditions on farms of soil and water conservation district cooperators under a wide variety of conditions. Selections which prove superior to commercial varieties are then released to seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

More than 1100 strains of grasses, legumes, forbs and woody plants are being tested at Knox City.

About 9,000 pounds of seed were produced at the center last year, mostly for trial plantings across Texas and Oklahoma. Some 5,000 woody plant seedlings were also produced as well as 250,000 rhizomes of plants that have to be propagated by planting underground shoots.

Two new plant varieties, Alamo switchgrass and Aztec Maximilian sunflower, were certified and released earlier this year as a result of work done at the center. These two plants are being grown in the Clarksville area on the C.O. and Tommy Welch ranch. The plants should do well in this area with proper management.

Figures released by the State Treasury Department indicate a sizeable increase in stamp tax collections.

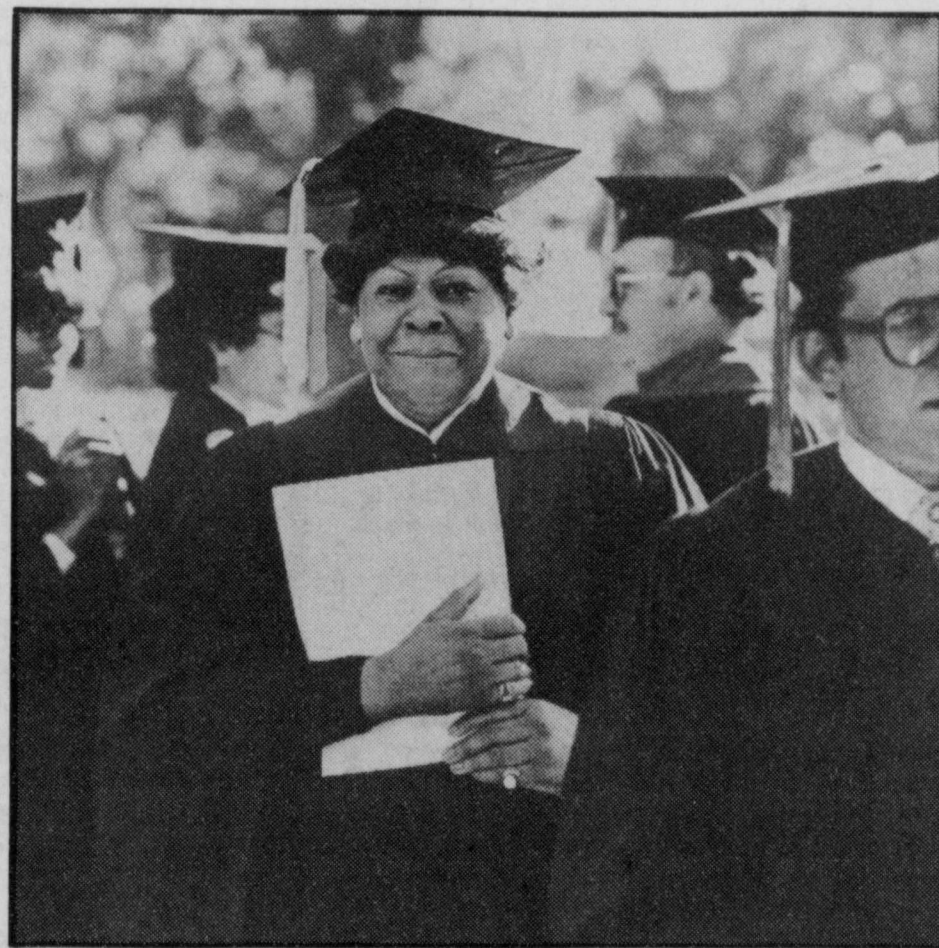
According to State Treasurer, Warren G. Harding, state cigarette stamp tax collections for the fiscal year ended August 31, 1978 amounted to \$289,601,633.42, an increase of \$12,105,664.37 over collections in the previous fiscal year.

Collections hit an all-time monthly high in May, 1978 when \$27,071,882.90 was collected. The increase reflected during fiscal year 1978 averaged in excess of \$1 million per month.

Collections from the sale of stamps on liquor, beer, and wine amounted to \$1,836,206.29, an increase of \$70,959.63. This tax is imposed on tourists who bring alcoholic beverages across the bridges from Mexico into Texas.
