## Skyrockets Receive Shoes Aug. 6

Skyrocket football is just a week away. Head Coach James Williams reminded as he announced the practice schedule.

Letters have gone out to 78 players and potential players from which the Skyrocket varsity team will be drawn.

At the same time, Williams reminded that the first game is a month away, the Friday, Sept. 5 meeting with the Hollis Tigers.

Players will report Wednesday, August 6, for shoes and they will also pick up insurance forms and bring their physicals.

Seniors are to report from 8 to 9 a.m., Williams said. Juniors will report from 9 to 10; sophomores, 10 to 11; and freshmen, 11 to 12.

"No shave plus no good haircut - no shoes!", the head coach declared.

Two a day workouts begin Monday, August 11, at 6:32 a.m. The afternoon workouts will be announced.

Two scrimmages are

scheduled.

On Friday, August 22, The Skyrockets will meet Stratford at Borger. Coaching at Stratford are a former Skyrocket football standout, Jackie Needham, and a former Rocket coach, Bruce Dollar.

The Rockets will meet Phillips at Powell Field, Wellington, on Friday, August 29.

"And finally, with the band playing and fans cheering, the Wellington Rockets, 1980-style will hit the field under the lights Friday, Sept. 5, to get a Tiger," declared Williams.

The Skyrocket coaching staff is now complete. Ronny Williams is first assistant coach and coaches the backfield and secondary. Ray Bostick will work with the junior varsity and secondary; Mark Reasor, the junior varsity and varsity line; Dale Morris will assist throughout the football program, and Bryan Hill, seventh grade and varsity.

All coaches will also concentrate on the varsity as well.

A new practice field has been completed for the Skyrocket teams, located just south of the field house, Williams reported. It will also be used by the band and is considered one of the major improvements made in recent years at the

football complex.

This year Wellington coaches attended the San Angelo Regional Coaching Clinic during the last week of June, rather than the state-wide clinic held last week in Houston. It was believed that this one more nearly fits the needs of this and other area schools.

## Tournament to Aid Heart Monitor Fund

A benefit Slow-Pitch softball tournament with approximately 18 teams participating will be played in Wellington Friday through Sunday, August 15-17, with all profit earmarked for health care projects.

Ed Hale, tournament director, said funds will go toward the purchase of a heart monitor for Collingsworth General Hospital.

Any money remaining will be given to the Muscular Dystrophy Drive.

Play will begin at 6 p.m. Friday and continue through 6 p.m. Sunday.

There will be a break Sunday morning, and finals will be played that afternoon. Otherwise, it will be around the clock, said Hale.

This is a double-double elimination tournament he said, and a team must lose four games before it goes out of play.

"This is set up for a lot of fun that will help something worthwhile," Hale said. He promises several entertainment celebrities from Amarillo.

Assisting him is Robert Powell.

Wellington players will be divided into two teams, and 14 outside teams will be invited.

The entry fee for each team is \$75. Someone with the tournament will pass the hat among those attending from time to time.

"Wellington has been good to me and it is time for me to do something for the town," declared Hale.

Team trophies will be awarded to the winners, but these will be modest trophies, he explained, so that more of the money can go for the fund for which it is intended, the heart monitor and possibly Muscular Dystrophy.

## Wellington Industries Buys Rail Spike Plant

Wellington Industries, Inc. has purchased Southwestern Rail Products, Inc., from Wayne Smith, and the railroad spike plant will re-open Monday, August 4 under the new name.

Southwestern Rail began laying off employees in February and shut down completely in early April. At the high point of its production, Southwestern employed 80 people in operating three machines in round-the-clock railroad spike production.

Announcement of the change of ownership was made this week by Dwain Marple, president of the new corporation. The sale was effective July 23.

Wellington Industries, Inc., was formed by Marple, Zeb Robertson, vice president, and Brenda Marple secretary-treasurer to purchase the railroad spike plant.

The three were employees of Southwestern Rail Products, Inc.

Wellington Industries, Inc., will re-open with one shift on one machine, said Marple.

The first order of railroad spikes has been received from Southern Pacific,

through its purchasing agent, Rich Albracht, for delivery to Houston.

August 15 delivery is called for.

Production of 2,000 kegs of spikes per month is planned at present.

Enough former plant personnel to complete one crew are being contacted this week to begin work Monday. No new employees are being hired now, Marple said.

"As sales increase, we will start to increase production and former employees will be contacted," he said.

All machinery and equipment had been kept in condition for immediate resumption of operation, he said.

The Marples and Robertson emphasized that operations will start on a small scale and in the immediate future the company will concentrate on rebuilding the spike customers among the nation's major rail lines.

Marple is the executive officer, Robertson, the plant manager, and Mrs. Marple, the financial officer.

Cynthia Coleman will assist in the office.

"We will start slow and will increase production as

sales are recaptured," said Brenda Marple.

Word of Wellington Industries purchase and of the plant re-opening spread quickly last week in Wellington, whose economy has been feeling the pinch of the plant shutdown.

Marple was with Southwestern Rail from the beginning of its operations at Burns Flat, Okla., in 1975. He was, in fact, its second employee.

He designed and set up the Wellington plant and was responsible for its expansion and for all engineering work.

He installed a new conveyer system and directed setting up of each new spike machine as it was installed in the plant.

Wellington Industries, Inc., now has three spike machines operable, and the fourth machine is partially installed.

Mrs. Marple was with Southwestern Rail in its early years in Oklahoma City as a railroad contracting company. She left the company for three years, then returned to the Wellington operations two years ago.

Her duties have included

locating and purchasing equipment and she served as secretary-treasurer.

She formerly was with a steel mill for 10 years in Oklahoma City, and prior to that worked with the Oklahoma City Journal and the Oklahoma Press Association.

She said the Wellington Industries, Inc., offices will remain in their present location, at the southeast corner of the square.

Roberson grew up in this area, then lived in California where he was employed by Ranchers Cotton Oil Mill for 20 years in supervisory capacity.

He joined Southwestern Rail Products two years ago and later was promoted to plant manager.

His duties are to oversee the day-to-day operation of the Wellington Industries plant.

Mrs. Coleman has been with the company two years in a secretarial and bookkeeping capacity.

## Dogs Need Vaccination Against Parvo

A virus that is killing puppies and dogs across the nation has been detected in Wellington and all dogs and puppies should be vaccinated, veterinarian Mark Fires said this week.

One case has been reported here, Fires said.

The Parvo virus affects dogs and especially puppies and 8 out of 10 puppies that contract the virus die from it.

Fires said puppies 9 weeks old and older dogs and puppies should be brought in for vaccination. The animals must take two shots, two to three weeks apart.

The non-specific symptoms are vomiting, diarrhea and a refusal to eat or drink, Fires said. The virus is an intestinal virus, and it has the effect of lowering the white blood cell count and dehydrating the animal, Fires said.

SAN MARCOS--Fifty-nine women who are pushing citizen anti-crime efforts in their respective communities attended a special crime prevention workshop July 16-17 conducted by Texas Crime Prevention Institute staff at Southwest Texas State University.

Leading Texas Federation of Womens Clubs officers attending the program were President Lennie Sims of Wellington in the Top of Texas District and President-elect Sammie Skiles of Weatherford in the Pioneer District.

Mrs. Sims, a former member of the Criminal Justice Advisory Committee of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, is a member of Wellington 1954 Study Club. Mrs. Skiles is a member of the Twentieth Century Club of Weatherford.

The workshop was planned at the request of the Texas Federation of Wo-

men's Clubs (TFWC), which has historically taken an active role in crime prevention projects.

According to Leland K. Wood, director of the Texas Crime Prevention Institute, the workshop was designed to give the women a greater insight into crime prevention.

## Citizen's Rights

The cobbler's children run around with holes in their shoes. The plumber's wife suffers with leaky pipes. And newspapers often leave their readers without a clear understanding of their rights.

People who communicate for a living have been guilty of failing, when it comes to providing their readers with an understanding of privileges that, attributed to the press, actually accrue only to the people.

The open meeting laws, for example, are considered to be tools of the press that allow access for reporting purposes. Not so. The sole purpose of the law is to grant to every citizen the right to advanced notice of any governmental meeting and the privilege of attending.

The same consideration (and confusion) applies to the public documents. Most often, to be sure, it is a member of the news media requesting access to such information, but news people are not mentioned in the regulations. It is the public which has the right to access, and it is only as members of the general public that news people can exercise any attempt to obtain information.

This is an important distinction to remember, especially when one sees the press bitterly engaged in a battle for access or privilege. While the news media may have a vested interest, the fight is fought for the public, and if there is a winner, it is the average citizen, not the communications giant.

Just as the cobbler never got around to fixing the shoes of his own children, and the plumber didn't have time for his own pipes, newspapers and other communications media often fail to let the public know when they battle on their behalf.

The press has no privilege, except as it is vested in the public.

## STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — The political stars fell on Texas last week.

President Jimmy Carter attended two Dallas fundraisers and Republican presidential ticket team Ronald Reagan and George Bush stopped in Houston on their way home from the Detroit convention.

In Dallas, Carter asked U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen what he could do for Texas (a new anecdote goes) and Bentsen replied all Texas needed was rain to end the drought. Carter reportedly lifted his arms to the sky in silent plea. When rain drops fell on Dallas shortly afterwards, the President was heralded as a rainmaker.

Carter visited a drought-plagued farm with Texas Agriculture Commissioner Reagan, who is predicting that farmers here may lose up to \$2 billion in crops and livestock losses. Reagan is expected to seek federal funds for Texas farmers suffering losses.

### Windfall Burden

Over 4,000 angry Texas royalty owners appeared at Sen. Bentsen's hearing in Austin on the windfall profits tax . . . and they want the law changed.

The new tax causes some royalty owners to suffer 25 to 30 percent cuts in royalty income. The panel was presented a survey showing most royalty owners receive modest amounts of income from their leases, and Bentsen commented the tax hits hardest on the elderly royalty owners.

Bentsen has reintroduced a bill to exempt royalty owners from the tax and to exempt the first 1,000 barrels per day of production from small independent producers.

### Advice to Carter

Besides taking the royalty

owners' message back to Washington, Bentsen last week also released some advice for Carter: enact a tax cut before 1981.

"It's important to have a tax cut before 1981 to increase productivity," he said. Bentsen also said the President's re-election campaign is dragging and the administration should make a firm commitment before the election for a tax cut next year.

### Auto Insurance Hike

Texas motorists may face an auto insurance premium increase as high as 28 percent in November, if last week's witnesses before the State Insurance Board get their wishes.

Spokesmen for the auto insurance industry said increases ranging from \$56 to \$81 per year were necessary to combat inflation.

### Summer Camp Rule

A Houston federal court overturned a University Interscholastic League rule that prohibits high school athletes from attending summer sports camp without losing a year's eligibility. Officials from UIL argued the rule was to prevent some schools from sending its entire team to summer camp and to protect poor athletes from unfairness. The UIL will appeal.

### Brilab Postponed Again

The Brilab trial of Texas House Speaker Bill Clayton and three others has been postponed again until Sept. 8, one week after the Labor Day deadline which Clayton had set for either being cleared or stepping down.

Clayton said he expects to be cleared in a quick trial and still intends to seek an unprecedented fourth term as House Speaker.



### WARRICK'S INC. FIRST HOME

Warrick, Sr., owner, is at center, and the boy is James Lawrence Warrick, now of Eureka, Kan. Meal (cottonseed), wheat bran and chops, also from wheat, were popular livestock feeds.

### Schooling Illegal Aliens

A federal judge has ruled that it is unconstitutional for Texas to deny a free public education to illegal alien children, but Texas Attorney General Mark White will appeal.

White is also considering a lawsuit against the federal government for failing to enforce immigration laws.

the country," White told reporters.

U.S. District Judge Woodrow Sears ruled a 1975 Texas statute is unconstitutional because it denies a distinct group of children the fundamental right to an education.

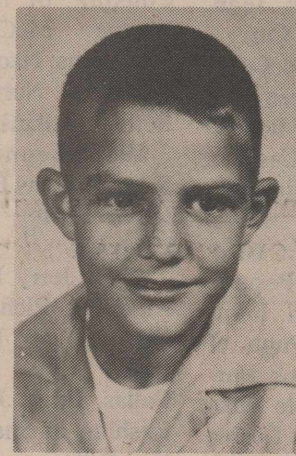

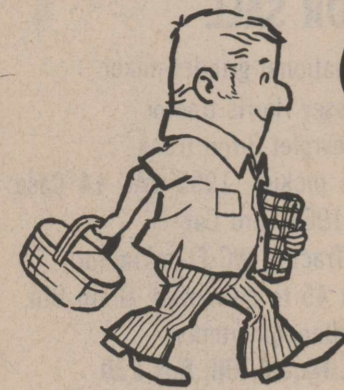
