Giddens Sixth At State Meet In Long Jump

Terry Giddens of Rivercrest High School became the only athlete to ever represent his school for two consecutive years at the State U.L.L. meet in Austin when he competed in the long jump May 3. Giddens earned his return ticket to Austin by winning the event at the Regional meet in Arlington two weeks

ago. His leap in Arlington was a personal best and a school record of 21' 10". However at Austin the best effort he could muster was 21' 5 3/4", which earned him 6th place.

Giddens and his team mates did very well in the overall point totals at the Region II Track and Field meet on April 20. The Rebs finished in 8th place among 52 schools represented.

The following boys competed at Arlington: 440 Relay, Glen Fulbright, W. M. Simpson, Randy Jones, Danny Black and Terry Giddens, 4th place; 120 High Hurdles, Ricky Norman, 5th place; 330 yd. Intermediate Hurdles, Ricky Norman, 3rd place; 100 yard dash, Glen Fulbright, 4th place; Long Jump, Terry Giddens, 1st place.

Talco City Democrats turned out 153 voters here Saturday, "a very light vote" according to Mrs. Ivy Smith, precinct chairman. Talco voters refuted the proposal to legalize pari-mutuel betting by a margin of 81 against and 41 for.

P.A. Thomas, Titus County Democratic Chairman, said Louise (Skeet) Brock seemed to have a commanding lead over Marjorie Harper for District Clerk, with 19 of 21 boxes reporting late Saturday.

The tight county superintendent's race seemed assured of a run-off between Willard R. (Cotton) Cecil and Bill Ellis.

In the county treasurer's race, Clarence C. Clark, the incumbent, seemed assured of re-election over Leon Rhea.

In the Precinct 2 commissioner's race, incumbent Bert Parr held a commanding lead of 476 votes to Dean Hopkins' 129, with only the Winfield box containing about 280 votes still to come in by Times presstime.

Buck Self and Bill Reynolds appear headed for a run-off in the Precinct 4 Commissioner's race. Self polled 352 and Reynolds 351. Cookville gave Reynolds 232 votes and Self 46, in late returns.

Titus County voters soundly refuted the proposal to legalize pari-mutuel betting by a margin of 1,941 against and 197 for, with the box from Cookville, where there are 529 registered voters, still out at 10 p.m.

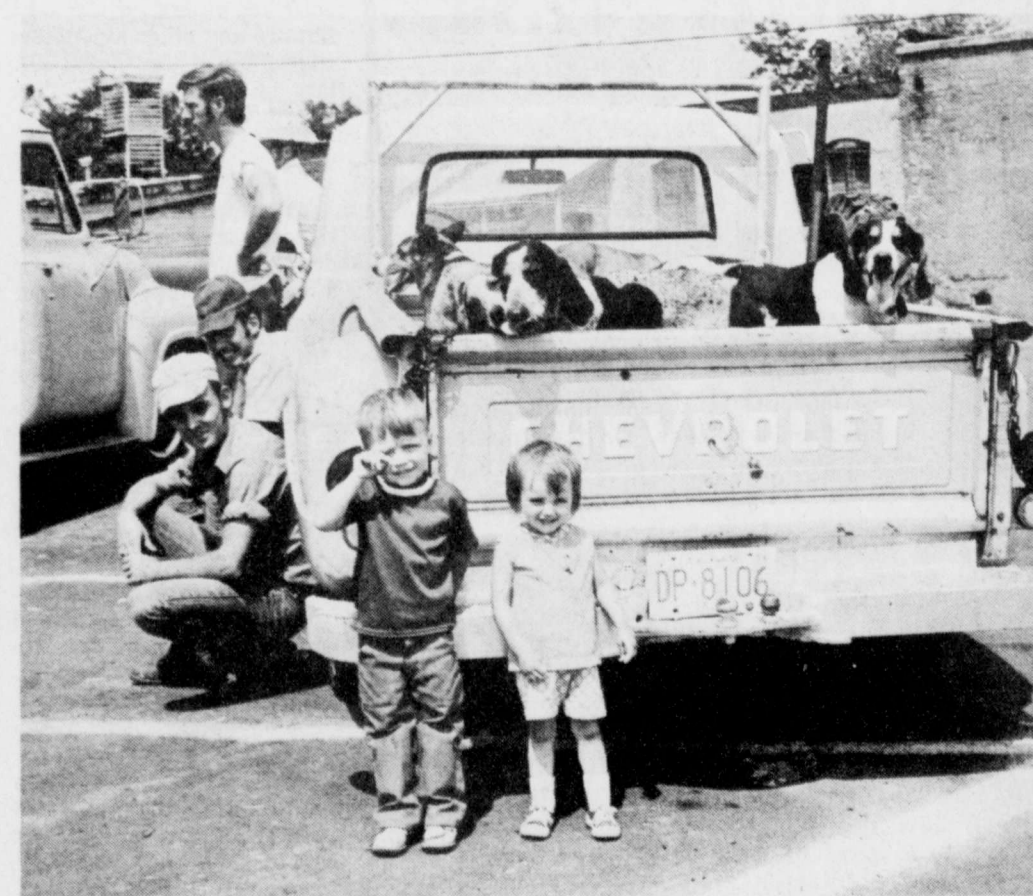

For Jimmy, it is the second such award, having qualified before in 1972.

To qualify for the award, the students must meet the standards set forth by the President's Council on Physical Fitness. They are given a seven item test which serves as the basis for the award. They must score in each of the seven tests to receive the award, which means they must be in the top fifteen percent of students in their age group on a national level.

The program has been an integral part of the physical education curriculum at the Talco Elementary school for the past three years in grades 4-8. All the students work hard each year to qualify for the award or to beat their own previous scores.

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Deport Housing Units House Garden Experts

There are twenty-six units in the Deport Housing Authority located in south-west Deport, and in front of each is a small triangular area for flowers. Of the twenty-six flower beds, not one is empty or grown up, and not one is alike.

The gorgeous display of flowers all up and down the street is proof that gardening doesn't take a lot of money or space, just love.

A random interview of residents turned up several basic gardening tips, which apply to this area specifically. So many things one sees in articles on gardening are concerned with different climates, and soil, but the people at the housing project aren't concerned with those, just in what is right for here. Although some people have had sand hauled in, and other prefer to use the native blackland, all agree that soil need to be loose and deeply spaded. Peat moss or a mold of rotted leaves also is beneficial to hold moisture and keep the soil workable. Another thing is unanimous,

don't skimp on water, soak beds deep, not sprinkled on top often. And of course, fertilize, smile residents, showing off huge blossoms. Ten-twenty-ten commercial fertilizer is what most of them use and several people say that they believe it provides the best balance possible.

Gardening begins in the armchairs, deep in winter. Seed catalogs and plant supply houses all furnish much information needed for the senior citizens to keep a continuous flow of color from early spring until the last frost. It all requires much careful planning.

Earlier this spring there were tulips and daffodils and bridal wreath. Then the bird baths were turned back over and filled with water, and borders, which may be anything from commercially purchased to the tradition "picket brick" are straightened.

Now there are nasturtiums, salvia forget-me-nots, and pinks all beginning to bloom. Bluebonnets and shasta daisies are lovely and the pansies are bigger than most professional nurseries can provide. Since all of the people at the units are retired, many loving hours are spent making the soil yield the best of blooms. But there seems to be no jealousy or secrecy in the gardens. Offers of "starts" were numerous and all agree that one of the most economical methods of obtaining a bigger variety of

plants is in swapping seeds, plants and bulbs with neighbors. Plants and bulbs from all over the United States flourish where grandchildren and relations have given to one individual, who shared with another, who shared when her daughter sent her some bulbs. Petunias, however are a figurative thorn in the flower beds up there. Everyone complained that the petunias grow, and even begin to bloom when suddenly they wilt and die. Research has revealed that the soil is apparently too alkaline for good petunias in this area,

especially the double or ruffled ones.

Horticulture is by no means confined to decorative plants though. It is amazing how much a small garden can produce. Those who are physically able have dug beds along the sides of the buildings, and mostly at the back, but often mixed in with flowers, one finds a variety of vegetables. Beans, onions, peppers, tomatoes and greens are as productive as could be. One lady jokes "it's hard to tell okra plants from hibiscus when they're blooming".

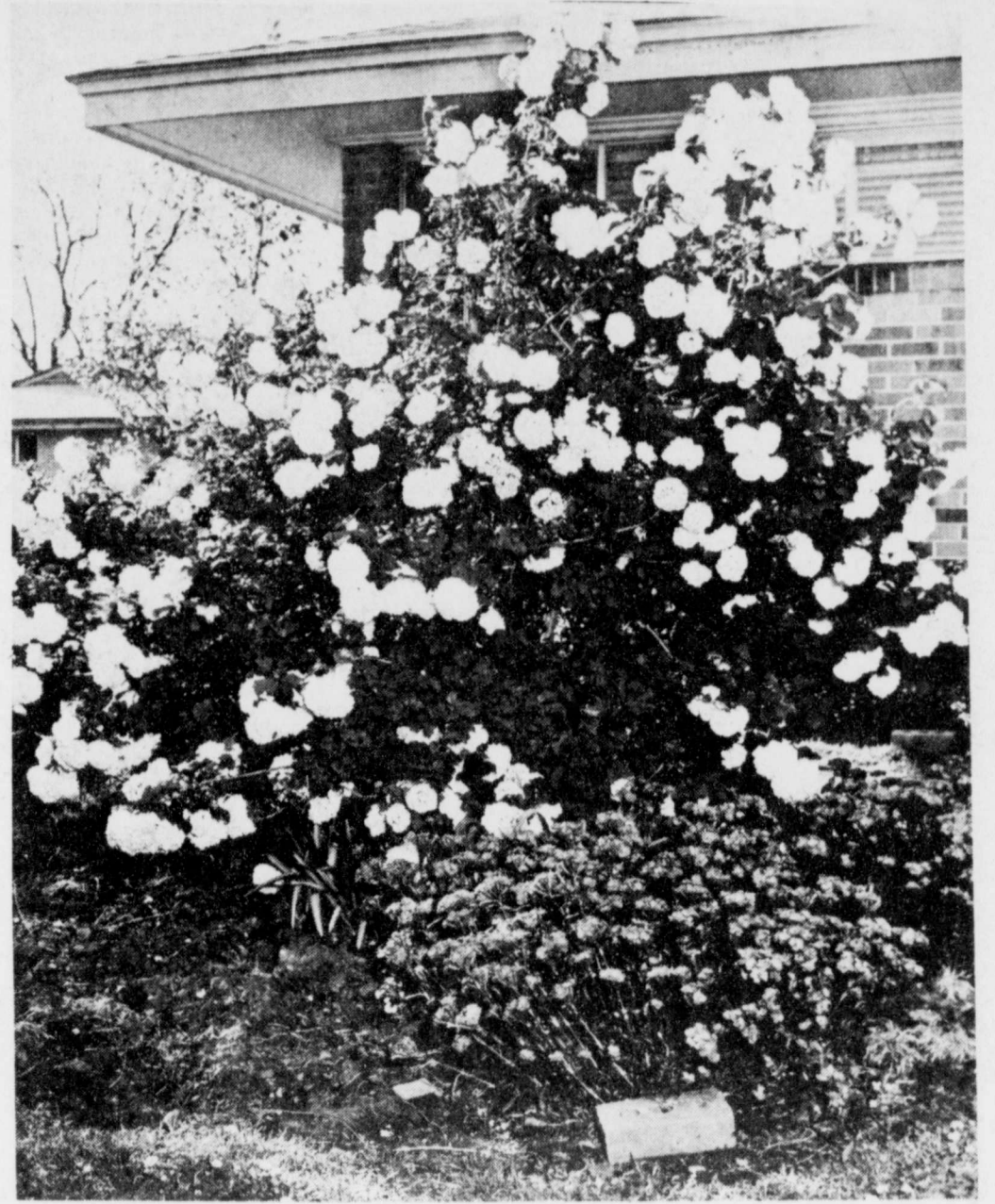
Already the zinnias, mari-

golds and cannas which can withstand the hot summer months ahead are being nurtured, and the chrysanthemums, which will blaze this fall, are being carefully pinched back so that they will bush and produce more blooms.

The elderly occupants of the housing units bring more to blossom than just flowers though, for nothing blooming up there is prettier than neighbors sharing and bending backs for those who are unable. They give advice and plants freely, and although proud of the neat appearance of their homes, the most common comment on how they grow such beautiful things is "oh, I just stick it down in the ground and it grows".

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Fashion—In World Of Shortages And Crises

Fashion — everyone talks about it.

Fashion has a new role today — amidst the energy crisis, fiber shortages and delivery problems, coupled with inflation and the cost of living, says Mrs. Becky Culp.

"As a result, consumers prefer fewer clothes — those with year-round appeal and higher quality in tasteful designs," the clothing specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, noted.

"Fashion extremes, dictates and frivolities receive less attention."

Mrs. Culp maintained that a specific garment, design or fabric has lesser importance as a fashion trend. New trends lean on overall categories that have flexibility within — such as the "bare look" for summer '74.

"In addition, fashion promotions by industry have slowed down considerably."

"According to a recent survey of major retail stores, an average store featured and promoted four to 12 major fashion trends during 1973. Of these, half became consumer favorites."

"Stores which were more

selective in their promotions received greater consumer acceptance," she added.

Ten years ago, most fashion trends originated from expensive designer garments. During 1973, in contrast, less than 40 percent of retail sales involved such items, the specialist said.

"Last year also saw an equal amount of all purchases made in dress, sportswear and junior departments — an increase. Experts attribute this change to more fashion information readily available to a variety of consumers — coupled with industry's faster adaptation and production of fashions in all price ranges."

In General, Mrs. Culp predicted "continued excitement for fashion enthusiasts — with clothes that look and feel right for the time."

Express Views On Mail Order Refunds

Consumers have until June 14 to express their views on getting refunds for pre-paid mail order purchases not shipped within 21 days, one authority noted this week.

She's Lynn Bourland, home management specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) has proposed a revision for the trade regulation involving mail order purchases and refunds, Miss Bourland said.

FTC wants to hear opinions concerning the proposed revision, she added.

Basically, the new revision would extend a firm's allowable refund time from 21 days to 30 days, the specialist explained.

"In the new act, if a seller cannot act on an order within 30 days — due to circumstances beyond his control — he could delay shipment."

"However, to do this, he would have to send the buyer a notice and receive the buyer's consent before the time limit expired."

If the buyer didn't respond, the seller would have to send him a refund."

Consumers can send written comments on the proposed revision to: Assistant Director for Marketing Practices, Bureau of Consumer Protection, Federal Trade Commission, Washington, D.C. 20580, Miss Bourland said.

In case of extended credit, the seller would have to credit a buyer's account for merchandise not shipped, the specialist continued, citing other parts of the proposed revision.

"If another business—other than the mail order firm — handles the credit, it still would be the mail order firm's responsibility to have the account credited."

"The regulation would not cover magazines and other serial deliveries except for their initial shipment."

In addition, the new revision would require a mail order firm to keep records for 18 months concerning each "failure to deliver" complaint, Miss Bourland said.

Safe Driving Honors Awarded To Community Public Service

National honors for outstanding safe driver performance were won by Community Public Service Company in the 43rd National Fleet Safety Contest sponsored by the National Safety Council, it has been announced by William L. Frigon, chairman of the contest.

The Community Public Service fleet, consisting of 358 vehicles and 310 drivers was awarded 2nd place in the Public Utility Division, an award based on the Compa-

ny's safety performance from January 1973 through December 1973. During this 12-month period, the firm's drivers operated 5,571,947 miles but had only 4.3 accidents per million miles of operation.

This compares very favorably with the combined average frequency rate of 11.79 accidents per million miles incurred by the 2,500 fleets consisting of more than 300,000 vehicles which traveled more than six billion, eight hundred million (6,800,000,000) miles during the contest year.
