Mother Jefferson was one of the sweetest characters that we have been permitted to associate with and the intelligent and kindly chats that we had on her semi-frequent visits with us while in the Echo office were delightfully inspiring. And but for the irony of fate we should, e'er now, have enjoyed another of her visits, for her plans were thus laid. We shall greatly miss her.

Mrs. Jefferson was for long years a member of the Baptist church, always faithful, optimistic and happy. To her death held no terrors, and she fell as a well-ripened sheaf, in the field of human usefulness, before the cycle of the Grim Reaper. Her life's work is a rich legacy to her children, relatives and acquaintances. Though the loss is keen it is consoling to know that she entered into her reward that is commensurate with the sweet life that she lived.

Surviving her are three sons and two daughters, five grandchildren and three great grandchildren. The surviving children are Mrs. S. J. Bureson of San Angelo, Mrs. C. F. Prather of Eden, Guy Jefferson of Menard, O. D. and Neal Jefferson who live in Arizona.

Mrs. Jefferson was 82 years old on last December 14. Two children died in infancy and another child later in life. Her husband died several years ago. The Herald people, together with the other friends of the family extend to the bereaved sincerest sympathy.

At the conclusion of the funeral the remains were accompanied to Richland Springs for interment. Besides the relatives quite a number of friends joined the procession.

A Robot (we believe that is the name) is a mechanical person that with unerring accuracy performs the tasks that are assigned. But as yet there have been no assignments for them to edit and publish a country newspaper. Quite often our imperfection in the use of English and our dexterity in the distortion of facts are sources of embarrassment to us. But we have a lot more fun than a robot. In a large degree our chagrin is compensated for in the realization that our abstractions and illiteracy provokes smiles and even outright laughs, and as Polyanna would say there's some good in that. There are entirely too few of smiles. A few faces are apparently so nearly immobile that if they were surprised into an attempted smile a break would occur. We yearn for higher ground along the road of perfection, but have no desire to be a soulless, smileless robot.

Political schemers realize that the more ways the Democratic vote is split the greater the probability of getting two undesirables into the run off. Then when one is eliminated it will be a cinch for Geo. C. Butte, the republican nominee to rake down the plum. And no doubt but that he would make a more able governor than many of the ones on the Democratic ticket. The "drafting" of E. B. Creeger, the republican National Committeeman, as a democratic candidate is, it seems, being tried to be palmed off as a joke. Though we believe it has a real significance. Were he to receive 1000 votes it might accomplish the end sought.

Lynch Davidson the democrats have a man that all Texas knows has ability far above the ordinary and by rallying to this standard the friends of a stable government can put him in the run off. Once there his election would be assured, over any one candidate that could be trotted out. Let's do that.

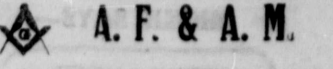
