Tommy R. Morrow On Combat Support Ship With 7th Fleet

Fireman Tommy R. Morrow, USN, son of Ray C. Morrow of 112 S. Ave B., Burkbur, is serving aboard the fast combat support ship USS Sacramento, first of her type, that serviced her 100th consecutive ship Feb. 28th while cruising with the U. S. Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

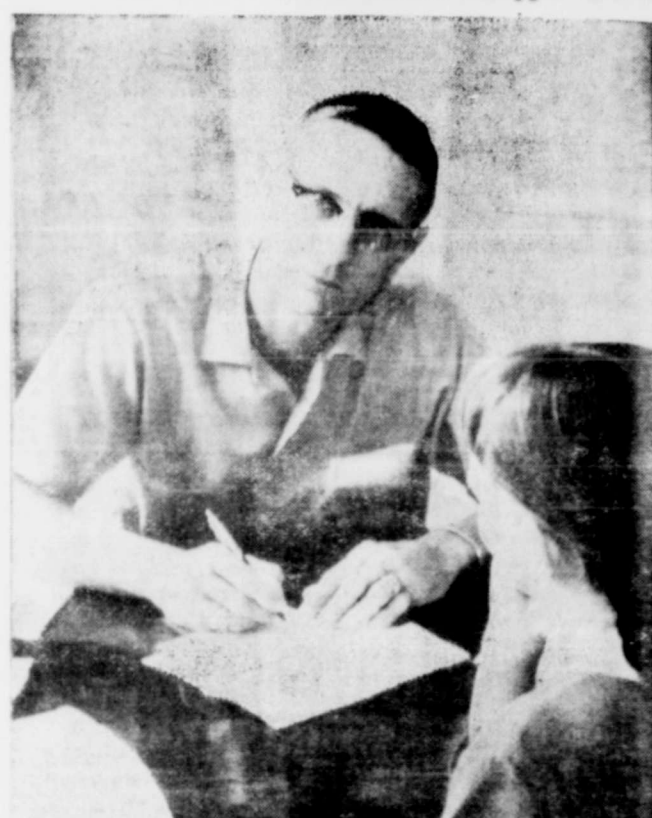
The event marked nearly a month of non-stop mobile logistics support to Seventh Fleet units by the Sacramento as she rounds out her first year in the fleet.

Sacramento crew members worked round the clock shifts for 22 days delivering 11 million gallons of petroleum products, 500 tons of general cargo and mail from home to the men, ships and aircraft of the Seventh Fleet.

With her multi-product cargo, high speed and modern at sea cargo delivery system, the Sacramento adds a new dimension to sustain fleet operations.

During this period, the Sacramento also served as a logistic command and control center for coordination and scheduling of other Seventh Fleet support ships. She is a unit of the Western Pacific Logistic Support Force.

James L. Pearson New Principal At Burkbur High School

State Senator Grady Hazelwood Deplores Favors Shown Criminals

The Senate of The State of Texas Austin, Tex. March 3, 1965

Dear Editor:

The enclosures are for whatever value you may want to give them. All legislative efforts are designed solely for the benefit of the criminal—to the end that many, many criminals are turned out of the penitentiary that should remain there, at least long enough for them to learn the lesson that crime doesn't pay. While this is going on, everyone seems to have forgotten that the people—that the public itself—is entitled to protection from these criminals. Brutal murders by ex-convicts continue on and on, and no one seems to consider the rights of the widows and orphans whose husbands and fathers they had a right to look for companionship, love and affection, and financial support. What about the poor groceryman or business man who is daily victimized by thieves and hot check artists? No thought whatever is being given to the right of the public to be protected from these criminals.

I certainly believe in clemency and parole, and giving any person, young or old a second chance, but when a person has had one chance, I see no reason why the public should be further subjected to his plundering and criminal acts, many of which involve unthinkable brutality. 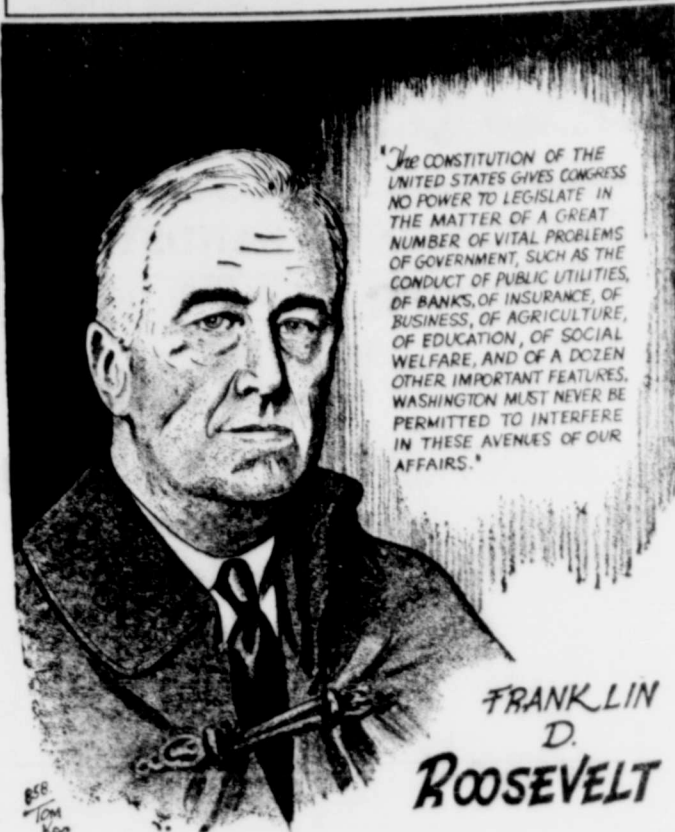

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WASTEFUL OVERLAP!**URBAN RENEWAL AND PIPE DREAMS**

The myth that the federal government's urban renewal program has been responsible for improvement in cities has been exploded by an expert in the rehabilitation of heavily populated areas.

Dr. Martin Anderson of the Graduate School of Business, Columbia University, in a recent speech, declared that it was private enterprise that has succeeded in renewing our cities while the high-cost urban renewal program has been a failure.

In ten years, the federal program has destroyed almost five times as many homes as it has constructed, and even the homes built seldom are available at rentals which can be afforded by those evicted to make room for the projects, he said.

Dr. Anderson pointed out that since 1950 some 53 billion dollars has been spent on new building construction in cities over 100,000 population. Only one percent of this money was provided by the urban renewal program, while the remaining 99 percent was furnished by private industry.

Congress should take a good hard look at the federal urban renewal program to determine if it is deserving of being continued.

PERILS OF MEDICARE

Edward W. O'Brien, of the Portland Oregonian's Washington Bureau, writes: 'An unpublished study by top government actuaries shows that the administration's medicare proposal would cost \$3.8 billion a year by 1975 and that the proposed special health care fund would be just about broke by then.'

'In this study, Social Security Administration experts found that the cost of operating medicare would exceed by 1972 the income to the fund from the new payroll taxes provided.'

These findings square with warnings given by non-governmental authorities of the financial perils that medicare contains. And there is more than theory to back them up. Some foreign countries have imposed various medical benefits plans on top of pension and retirement programs and have invariably found that the actual costs far exceed the optimistic estimates. In France, which took that step, reports indicate that the welfare system is perilously close to bankruptcy.

To make a bad matter worse, medicare is far more limited in its benefits than most people realize. Surveys show, for instance, that great numbers of people think it would pay doctors' and dentists' bills. It would not. Basically, it offers only a restricted program of hospital and nursing care.

Other plans, which would provide much broader and more liberal medical services to the needy and which would avoid medicare's built-in dangers and weaknesses, are proposed. It is the duty of Congress to give every consideration to these alternatives and to see medicare for what it actually is.

**IMPORTANCE OF
OWNING LAND**

Everyone should be interested in building personal safeguards against the future, — for one's self and for one's children and grandchildren. Diversification is one of the most important keynotes in hedging against inflation, deflation, and whatever unforeseeable economic developments may lie ahead. A well-rounded program will, of course, include a bank account, insurance, a comfortable home, carefully selected stocks and bonds, and probably a business interest.

**Land Gives
Excellent Protection**

Do not forget, in addition, the extraordinary value of land holdings as a longer-term investment. Many who long ago bought or inherited acreage that seemed to be situated too far away from a community center to be good for much of anything but farming have profited handsomely from the population explosion and widespread decentralization. Both residences and business plants in recent years have spread out into suburban and rural areas that were almost entirely unoccupied within fairly recent memory. Land values have climbed without interruption.

While many people may hesitate to buy land when prices are so high, there are certain basic factors that make the buying of good, well located land advisable at almost any time. First, there is only so much land in the country, in each state, and in each community. There will never be any more, except for the minor instances where fill-ins form small areas out of watery shallows. There can be more stock issued, more bonds floated, more businesses established — and even more money printed—but the land now existing is the only land we will ever have.

**Hedge Against
Almost Anything**

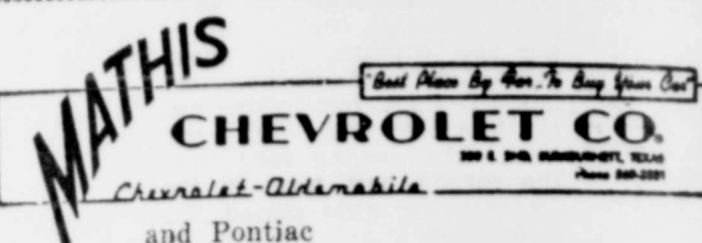
This is no doubt one reason why land prices often tend to withstand the strong downward pressure that recession brings to bear on other holdings. During the 1958 recession, for example, investment prices took a sudden and severe pummeling and general business slipped badly. Land values, however, held up amazingly well, with no real losses in desirable properties.

A severe depression would probably cut into land values to some degree, but even then prospects would favor a more rapid recovery than might be expected in other forms of investment. The basic reason for this is not only the "absolute"

limit to land amounts but also the unparalleled population growth. With more babies being born and people living longer than ever, population should continue to expand for the foreseeable future. Not even a sharp recession would fundamentally alter this long term upturn.

**Buyers Should
Choose Carefully**

While it is reasonable to be bullish on land as a protective holding, buyers should use discrimination in selecting acreage for purchase. No plots should be bought without being seen by the buyer himself, or at the very least by an experienced family member, friend, or trusted associate. Economic trends in the vicinity are often a helpful guide in making final decisions; look for localities close to urban and suburban

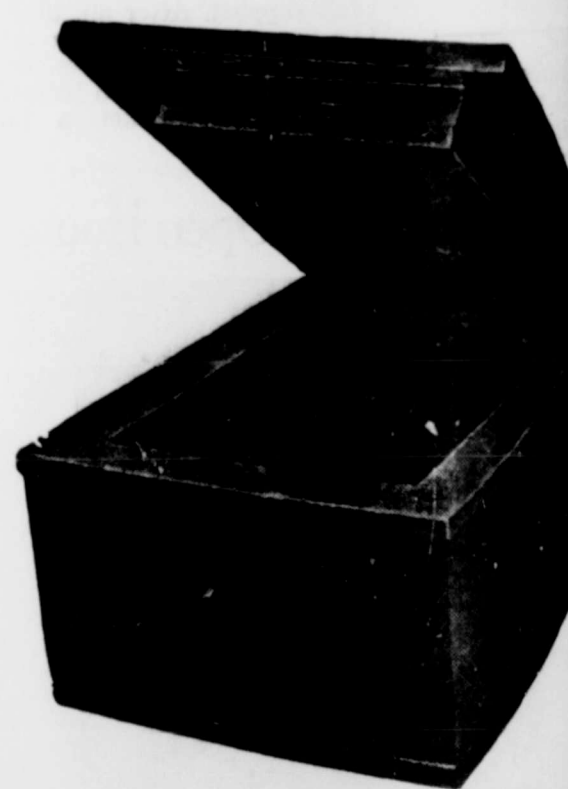

One Month Left To Register Motor Vehicles

Only one month remains for some 1,500,000 vehicles registered in Texas to secure the 1965 safety inspection sticker," Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today.

"The period set by law for securing the 1965 sticker ends at midnight, April 15th, and there can be no extension of that deadline," Garrison pointed out. "Any Texas motorist whose vehicle does not display the new sticker after April 15th is subject to arrest by any sheriff or his deputy, any city policeman, or by officers of the Department of Public Safety."

Garrison said that in the remaining month of the inspection period there is sufficient time for the 5,300 official inspection stations to inspect the remaining vehicles without undue inconvenience to the motorist, provided the vehicle owners act promptly.

From now until the deadline, every minute of the inspection station's time will be at a premium," Garrison warned, "and waiting lines will become general throughout the state."

Garrison suggested that congestion at inspection stations would be lessened if known defects were repaired prior to presenting the vehicle to the station for inspection.

HOW TO GET MORE FUN OUT OF HOME MOVIES

THE ECONOMICS ARE IN YOUR FAVOR

My phone jangled. A reader was calling to ask whether color movies of his family's activities would be more expensive than the kind of snapshotting he had been doing for years with his box-type camera.

Our answer surprised him. It may surprise you. Home movies, today, cost less than snapshotting.

In fact, home movies are one of today's big bargains.

Let's say we're taking pictures of a family picnic. We want to capture the story of Mom packing the picnic lunch, Dad getting the auto gas tank filled, Sis coming downstairs with her arms filled with sunsuit, swimsuit, suntan lotion, anti-freckle cream — and all the other paraphernalia girls deem a "must" for a simple family picnic trip.

En route to the picnic site we pause at a bend in the road for some shots of white geese gliding effortlessly across a country pond. Farther down the road a cow — her face covered with pesky flies — comes up for a portrait.

Finally, there is the picnic itself. And, while Mom and Sis are preparing the food, Dad and Jim toss a baseball back and forth. Later, Jim and Sis go for a swim.

It's a great day. Two dozen pictures tell the story.

Supposing, however, we had captured those images in real-life motion instead of stills. Basically, we would have photographed the same situations. But, instead of having two dozen stills, we would have two dozen action scenes.

By coincidence, this happens to be precisely the average number of scenes taken, per 25-foot double roll of 8mm film, by the average family home movie maker — according to

statistics from the major film processing laboratories.

Let's compare costs. If you pick up a copy of any of the photography magazines, or refer to the ads in this or any other newspaper from time to time, you'll discover that the cost of two dozen 8mm scenes (one roll of 8mm color film, with processing) is slightly less than two dozen color snapshots or two dozen color slides.

How about that? In living action, too!

We would also like to suggest how you can save more money.

One way is to get good, dependable equipment right at the start. Why invest in horse-and-buggy-day equipment when you can have the very best electric-eye exposure control, a sharp zoom lens, electrically-powered film transport, automatic footage indicator and a sharp-and-clear reflex viewfinder?

Another way is to get good, fresh film. Why gamble losing precious, once-in-a-lifetime memories merely to save a few pennies on some bargain-basement, overcooked, outdated film?

You'll save much more money, and in the right way, if you are careful when loading the movie camera. Make absolutely certain the end of the film is caught by the take-up spool. Some modern cameras have automatic-loading devices which make it virtually impossible to load the camera incorrectly.

Regardless of whether you do or do not have a camera that loads automatically, there's another positive way to save money: load the camera only in subdued light. This means positive shade . . . where the film cannot be struck by direct daylight. Failure to do this causes most of the light-streaked home movies we've seen.

Finally, to save money where it counts . . . make every foot of film work for you. Shoot long shots, medium shots, then close-ups, of key events. Especially close-ups. Those are the scenes your friends will rave about — long after they've seen the movies.

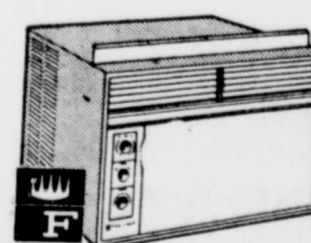

ABOUT SPORTS

Just about everybody likes to go fishing, especially kids. Until now, youngsters were unable to really enjoy fishing, because the only workable tackle was made for grownups, too big for children to handle. There is a lot of years of fishing pleasure your son can enjoy with you, if you can equip him with equipment designed and balanced for the youngster.

There's a spinning combination designed for a young fisherman who wants professional quality tackle, yet can't quite handle big size equipment like dad's. Everything on the junior is scaled down in size. There is all the features of a quality Rod and Reel, adjustable drag, anti reverse and changeable spool. The reel is built into the handle so your tackle is all in one piece and the Rod has the right kind of action for long casts and sensitive response. The grip is just the right size to fit the small hand and he can operate the thumb control with a natural comfortable position.

Fishing is like any other sport. And it is more fun when you have the proper equipment and learn the correct way to fish.

The next problem then seems to be, is dad a good enough fisherman to show Junior the correct way to fish now that he has the proper gear? Well, let's see what the experts say. To get the correct grip, "shake hands" with the grip close enough to the reel to let your thumb depress the thumb control and let your forefinger wrap around the trigger grip under the handle. The grips should be firm, but not tight. Keep the thumb control pressed down, in this position the thumb control holds the line off the spool until you are

to prevent it from spinning ready to release it by removing your thumb.

For youngsters its best to start off with a short cast, not over 25 feet distance. The casting arm should be close to the reel crank handle is on top and sight your target with the Rod tip. From sighting position snap the Rod back with the wrist action until it is straight up. Then without hesitating snap your wrist back down. The Rod tip will follow the motion of the handle until you snap it back down.

As the top springs back toward the target, release the thumb control to allow the line to spin off the spool. After a few tries, experience will tell you exactly when to release. A right handed fisherman must shift the rod to the left hand for retrieving. Your left hand should cup the reel, not the handle, and brace the handle into the mid section above your belt. Your right hand is then free to reel in. As you cup the reel in your left hand, grip the line between thumb and forefinger so the line will wind smooth for the next cast.

Before casting for a fish be sure the drag is set correctly. First loosen the drag until the line pulls freely. Gradually tighten drag wheel until the line can be pulled without breaking. The drag protects the line against breaking when the pull is greater than the line strength. Keep your line tight when you hook a fish and he jumps pull him of balance so he won't throw the play. Keep pulling up on the rod then take in the slack as you lower it. Play in your fish is one of most important skills in fishing.

But, remember, Dad, don't forget the safety rules around water. Keep an eye on that youngster. Avoid getting hooks in your hand. Take proper care of your equipment at all times.

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance 277 Park Ave., N.Y., N.Y., 10017

Q. When I buy additional life insurance under a "guaranteed insurability" rider attached to my original policy, do I pay the same premium rates as for an entirely new policy?

A. Yes, except that some companies may allow you a partial credit toward your first year's premium on the additional insurance. This allowance reflects the company's lower cost of issuing you the new insurance, since it involves no medical examination or underwriting expenses.

The allowance is something like a policy dividend. It is not guaranteed in advance. Any savings in underwriting costs for your new insurance may be offset by higher mortality among policyholders or other factors.

Q. The "guaranteed insurability" agreement in my \$10,000 life insurance policy allows me to buy an additional \$10,000 of insurance every three years through the age of 40 — without evidence of insurability. What happens if I do not buy this insurance at the time it is available?

A. If you do not exercise an option to buy new insurance at the regular time, you simply lose that particular option. You cannot exercise it later on. (Each option usually runs for a certain period — for example, from 30 days before to 30 days after the anniversary date of your policy.) However, failure to exercise an option does not affect your future options to buy more insurance. And, of course, it does not affect any insurance you have already purchased.

She stated that good horticultural practices means that the grower has properly prepared the soil, planted the seed correctly, watered, cultivated, fertilized and sprayed during the entire growing season. After the plant has been properly grown, the blooms will naturally be superior and more

of a flower show quality.

Mrs. Riley stressed that all specimen to be shown should be carefully cleaned and all signs of dust, bugs and spray residue removed carefully. In order to raise the standard of our local flower show and to have a better show each year, each garden club member should strive for quality, she said, rather than quantity.

Jan Bolinger, president of the High School unit, talked on "What club members could do to help keep the litter off our highway and from cluttering our parks."
