Dancing dogs, acrobatic feats, and music of the big highlight a "Safety Circus" to be presented at Hutchinson Elementary School, at 10:00 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Thursday.

The "Circus," a traffic safety program now on a nationwide tour of elementary schools, features 10 trained dogs which do various tricks, each demonstrating how to avoid traffic accidents.

Ringmaster of the show is Officer Ernest Pressley, special representative of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, which is co-sponsor with American Trucking Association of the tour.

Officer Pressley, a policeman for nearly 20 years, began by staging shows for neighborhood children featuring his talented dogs. The show drew such an enthusiastic response that he took leave from police department work to tour elementary schools teaching safety.

While in Colorado City, Officer Pressley's local sponsors are the Texas Motor Transportation Association and the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Slogan of the program, which has appeared in 48 states, is "Walk Safe-Ride Safe-Play Safe." Standout dogs in the show including Elmer, a terrier who manages to do everything wrong at the right time, and Lessie, a collie familiar with safety habits.

Youngsters pay strict attention of Officer Pressley while he stresses the importance of looking both ways before crossing the street, riding bicycles safely, not playing in the street, and other good safety practices.

The "Safety Circus" has been commended by the National Safety Council, J. Edgar Hoover of the F.B.I. and by hundreds of parents, teachers and civic groups throughout the nation.

Boys and girls are told during the program how they can join Officer Pressley's Junior Traffic Club which has more than 3,000,000 members.

A printed safety quiz is given to the youngsters for them to take home. Teachers hold a quiz on safety. Membership in the club is open to those pupils who attain a grade of 100 percent in the test. Certificates are presented to club members.

Officer Pressley, in addition to teaching safety habits, stresses the importance of obeying the Golden Rule and respecting parents, teachers and policemen.

Westbrook Takes Hobbs

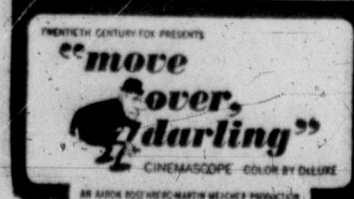

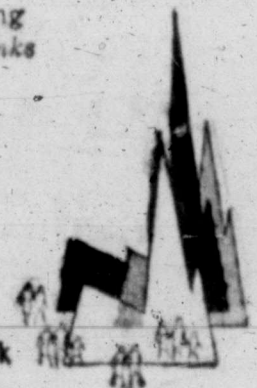

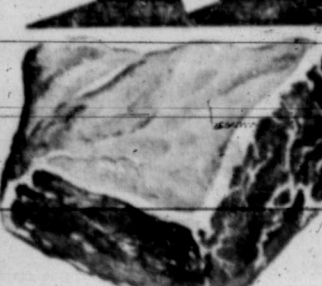
