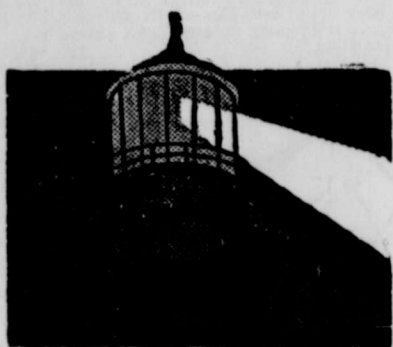

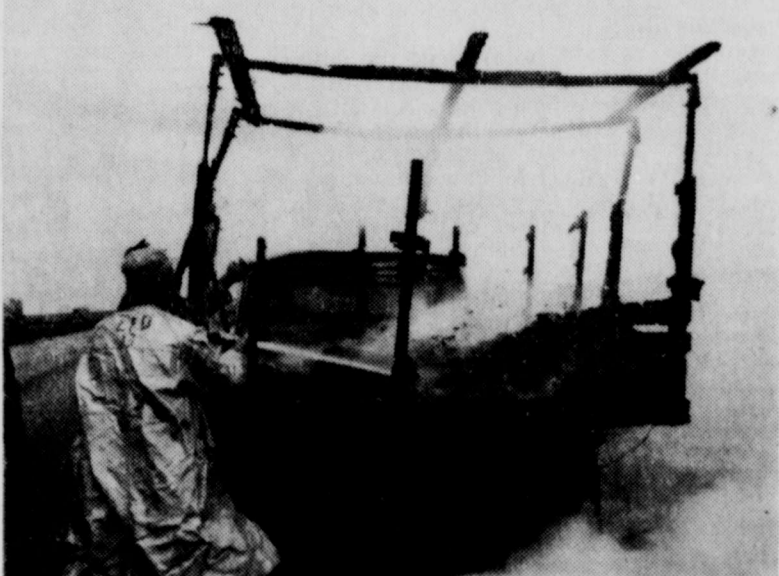
1965 Rainfall Totals Nearly 19 Inches

Official amount for the month of August was 6.40 inches. Rainfall in Loraine so far this year totals almost 19 inches.

35 Predicted To Die

The Department of Public Safety estimates 35 will die in traffic accidents in Texas during the three-day Labor Day holiday. Violations of Texas traffic laws will be apparent in nine out of 10 of these accidents, says Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director.

Garrison pointed out that al-

most all the accidents during the 1964 Labor Day Weekend, which killed 39 persons and injured hundreds more, had violations of the law as contributing factors.

"The most common violation," he reported, "was the failure to yield right of way, followed closely by violations where the driver exceeded a safe speed for existing weather or road conditions."

Other common violations contributing to accidents were:
—exceeding posted speed limits;
—failure to stop or turn in time;
—driving while intoxicated;
—driving on the wrong side of the road.

As part of stepped-up efforts to curb the toll, DPS will add 150 men from other uniformed services to supplement its regular highway Patrol force.

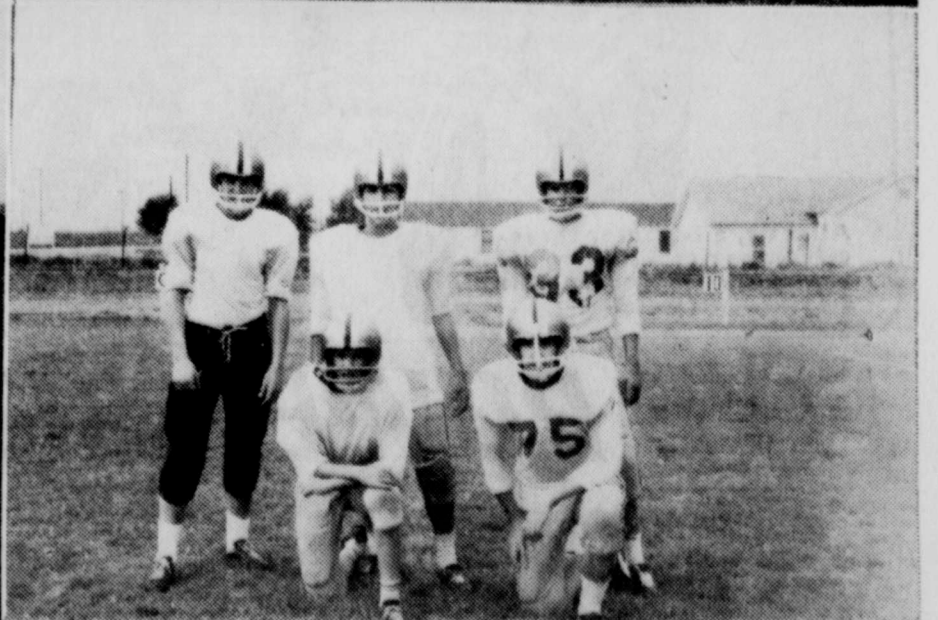
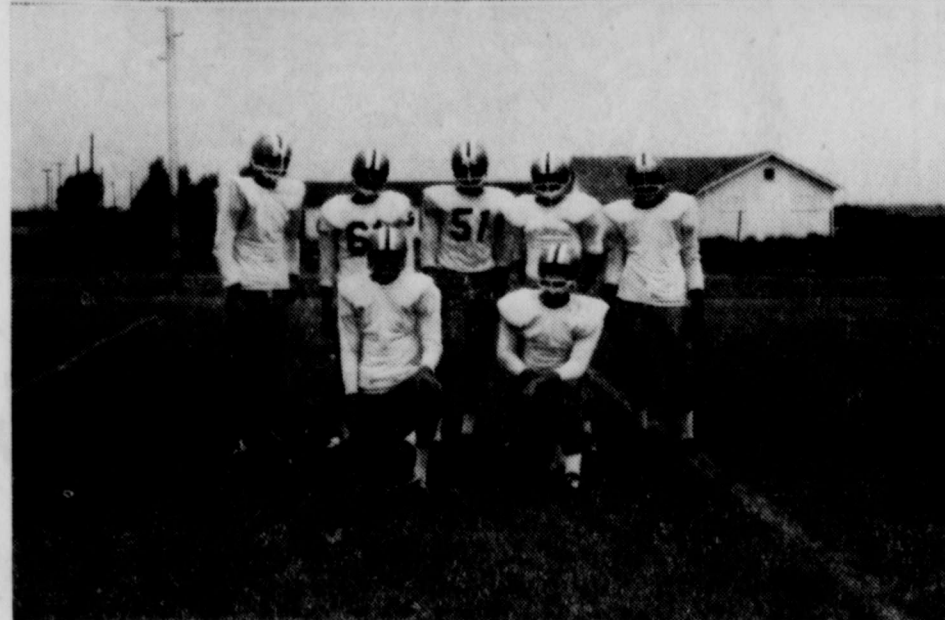
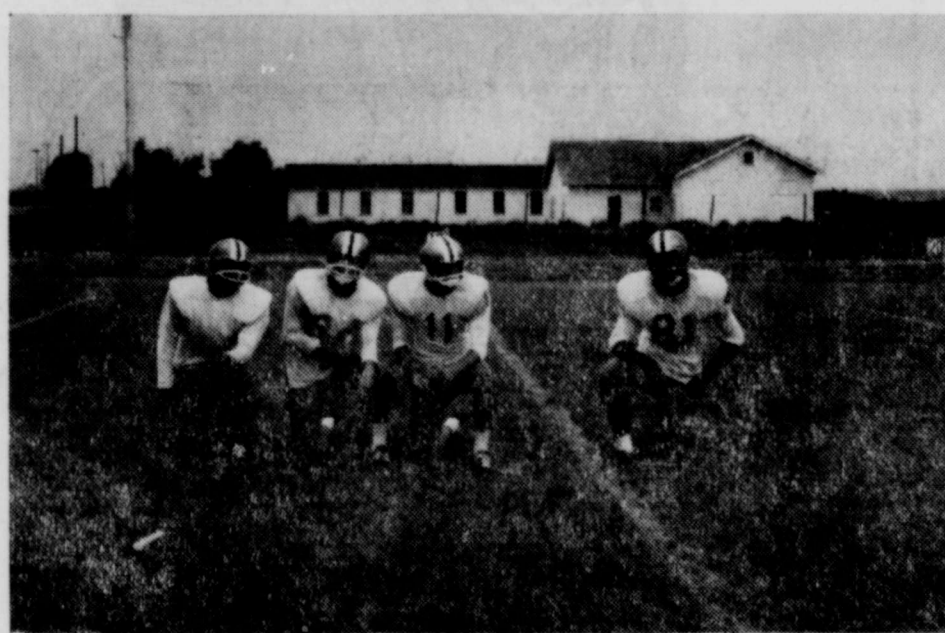

Farmers Facing Loss Of Minimum Wage Exemption

President of the National Cotton Council warns that higher costs, not only for farm labor, but for the goods and services cotton producers buy, would result from the extension of the minimum wage to agriculture.

"It is most distressing that so many rank-and-file farmers are not aware that they are facing loss of their minimum wage exemption," G. C. Cortright, Jr., Rolling Fork, Miss., declared in a letter to cotton producer groups urging opposition to the Roosevelt Bill—H.R. 10518.

This bill, Mr. Cortright explained, would increase the minimum wage to \$1.75 per hour and extend coverage to farm workers, workers employed by gins, and to those not now covered who work in warehouses, compresses, and cottonseed crushing mills. The only exemption which would be retained would be the overtime exemption for gins.

If this bill passes, "It would be a question of time before the national minimum would be made to apply to all farm workers. Moreover, political pressures tend to force up the minimum at regular intervals," Cortright warned.

Appointed Manager of Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative, Inc., Colorado City, Texas, in 1954, Mr. Perdue retired on November 1, 1964. His retirement marked twenty seven years of work in the rural electrification field.

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Social Security Changes

(Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of columns by Erven Fisher, social security district manager in Big Spring, Texas, telling what the social security amendments of 1965 mean to you and your family.)

Many people who continue to work after they become entitled to monthly social security benefits from a liberalization of the retirement test in the 1965 amendments.

First, the exempt amount — the amount of earnings a beneficiary can have in a year and still receive all benefits during the year — was increased from \$1,200 to \$1,500. This change also means

that even if a person's earnings \$1,500 in a year. Previously may still receive a full payment for any month in which wages are \$125 or less.

Second, a smaller amount of benefits will be withheld when the beneficiary works and earns over \$1,500 in a year. Previously, \$1.00 in benefits was withheld for every \$2.00 of earnings between \$1,200 and \$1,700. In a year. On earnings above \$1,700, \$1.00 in benefits was withheld for every \$1.00 of earnings. After 1965, \$1.00 in benefits will be withheld for every \$2.00 of earnings between \$1,500 and \$2,700. Benefits will be withheld on dollar for dollar basis on earnings above \$2,700.

These changes will be effective for taxable years ending after 1965.

For example, a man and wife receive a combined benefit of \$150 a month and he works and has earnings of \$2,700 in both 1965 and 1966. Their total possible benefits, if it were payable, would be \$1,800 each year. For 1965, the couple would actually receive benefits of \$550. (\$1,800, less \$1,250 — \$250, withheld for the \$500 of earnings between \$1,200 and \$1,700, and \$1,000, withheld for the \$1,000 of earnings above \$1,700.) For 1966 they would get total benefits of \$1,200. (\$1,200, of earnings between \$1,500 and \$2,700.) If his earnings were \$2,750, for each year, the couple would receive total benefits of \$500 for 1965 and \$1,150 for 1966.

Another change in the retirement test concerns royalties received in or after the year in which a self-employed person attains age 65 on a copyright or patent obtained before the year the person is 65. These earnings will no longer count for purposes of the retirement test. This change is effective for taxable years beginning after 1964.

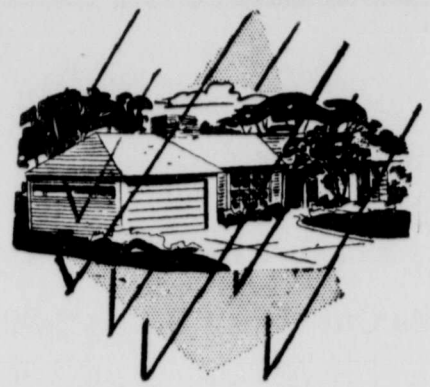
