WINDOW GLASS PLANT COMING TO WICHITA FALLS

DEAL CLOSED FOR REMOVAL OF
PLANT HERE FROM PRINCE-
TON, INDIANA.

EMPLOY 200 MEN

Messrs. Hudson and Bostock of Chan-
ute, Kansas, Will Be Connected
With the Plant.

Announcement was made by J. A. Kemp this morning that all details had been closed between himself and Mr. Kemp with Messrs. Hudson and Bostock for the removal of a window glass plant from Princeton, Indiana, to this city. The plant is valued at \$100,000 and will give employment to 200 skilled laborers. The work of tearing down the plant at Princeton and loading it for shipment to Wichita Falls is to start at once. A deal has been closed whereby the plant will be located on the Anderson tract immediately west of the automobile factory.

Messrs. Bostock and Hudson are the two Chanute, Kansas, gentlemen who several months ago had up a proposition with the Chamber of Commerce for the removal of a glass plant here from that city, but the consent of a majority of the stockholders could not be secured for the removal. Both are practical and experienced glass men and are putting all their money in the plant being removed to this city. They will be the principal stockholders in the reorganized company. Messrs. Kemp and Kell are providing the necessary money to bring this industry to Wichita Falls and the public or the Chamber of Commerce will not be asked to contribute one single dollar.

When Mr. Kemp made the announcement at the meeting of the directors at the Chamber of Commerce this morning it was greeted with enthusiastic applause. At the same time Mr. Kemp predicted that within less than six months the automobile factory would be employing not less than two hundred hands. Negotiations are also pending with other parties for the location of a big bottle manufacturing plant here, with a promise that they will be conducted to a successful conclusion.

In discussing the business outlook later Mr. Kemp talked in a most enthusiastic and optimistic vein. He said he believed the building of not less than three hundred new houses would be started within less than five months, and that the population of the city would increase fifty per cent within less than fifteen months.

War Cloud Over the Mediterranean.

TO SPRINKLE OIL ON DOWNTOWN STREETS

The City Sanitary Commission, composed of M. J. Gardner, John T. Young and J. F. Reed, have decided that in view of the meningitis agitation, it would be a good plan to sprinkle the downtown streets with crude oil, which physicians agree is one of the best germ killers that can be found. The street sprinkler began this work today, and it is probable that such an operation will be repeated from time to time.

It is believed that one round of the sprinkler wagon filled with oil will be sufficient, after which the city street sweeper will be run over the streets, and will sweep the whole into the gutters, thus leaving the paved section of town coated with a thin covering of crude oil, which while it will not cause inconvenience to those who use the streets, will at the same time effectually destroy any germs which may be lurking there.

BERKLEY SUCCUMBS TO HIS INJURIES

Man Injured in Gas Engine Explosion
at Pond's Laundry Died Tues-
day Morning.

Duke Berkley, the young man injured in the engine explosion at Pond's laundry yesterday morning, died this forenoon at 10:30 from the results of his injuries.

The wound which caused his death was that in the pit of the stomach, or upper abdomen, which was inflicted by the force of the cylinder of the engine striking him.

Berkley showed signs of resting easy and apparently seemed to have a chance for recovery until about midnight last night when he complained of severe pains in his abdominal region which indicated to the physicians a very dangerous condition. Early this morning he became pulseless, and remained in a comatose condition until the end.

No time was he able to tell how the accident happened and seemed unable to recollect any thing about it, although he appeared rational in other respects after he came out from under the effects of the morphine.

But little is known about Mr. Berkley's people here. He is a half brother of Fred Street, a conductor on the Denver, who has been at Benjamin, Texas, all week, but who is expected home today. The father is C. O. Berkley of Peché, Texas, and it is understood there are a number of brothers and sisters. Mr. Berkley had been an employee of the Pond laundry for about three years, and was a fine young man in every way and one who made friends wherever he went. He was a member of the Modern Woodmen of America, and the funeral will probably be held tomorrow afternoon under the auspices of that organization, although definite arrangements to that end will not be made until the relatives can be heard from.

MILLIONAIRE AVIATOR KILLED

RUTHERFORD PAGE, TWENTY-
FOUR, ENDEAVORS TO TURN
AEROPLANE "ON PIVOT."

JUMPS OUT OF MACHINE

Had Told Some Friends He Would Ex-
cel Beachy's Work "Or Break My
Neck."

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 23.—Rutherford Page, 24 years old, millionaire, a Yale graduate, registered from New York and flying as one of the Curtiss aviators, was instantly killed when he fell 150 feet on Dominguez field a few moments before the close of the third day's program of the third international aviation meet. Page was endeavoring to "turn on a pivot" when a swell of air over the hangar caught his plane. He made an effort to regain his balance, but evidently fearing the aeroplane was beyond control, gave up, and when about sixty feet in the air jumped clear of the machine and fell flat into the plowed ground. According to the doctors, he was crushed to death.

Page was flying for the first time as a licensed aviator, having been awarded his license Saturday. His earlier flying was one of the spectacular features, despite a puff and treacherous wind. He was one of the first to leave the ground.

In the first heat of the five-mile handicap, in which he and Lincoln Beachy, the Curtiss veteran, were the contestants, Page thrilled the crowd by his sensational maneuvers. All the dips and sharp turns made by Beachy were duplicated by Page, who was even more daring.

The more experienced aviators shook their heads when they witnessed Page's apparently foolhardy evolutions, and when he descended Glenn

Curtiss, who taught him to fly, cautioned him against attempting to perform feats at his first meal, which required much experience to learn.

Page laughed and assured Curtiss that he was "all to the good."

During the afternoon the young New Yorker had told those about the hangars that he would beat Beachy, "or break my fool neck."

Page lived in New York with his mother and two sisters. His father is dead. He was graduated from Yale last year and was a member of the Yale Club of New York. About six weeks ago he joined the Curtiss camp at San Diego, where he received his first instructions in flying.

Curtiss said Page's death was due to lack of experience and his extreme daring.

"He was more than fearless," said Curtiss. "He has been called the second Beachy, and it was predicted by all who had witnessed Page's early flights that he would be a world beater if some such thing as happened today did not end his career."

Immediately after the accident the wreckage of Page's machine was piled up and burned to prevent its being carried away piecemeal by souvenir hunters.

Was New Yorker.

New York, Jan. 23.—Rutherford Page, who was killed at Los Angeles was the son of Mrs. William D. Page of this city. He graduated at Yale in 1910. Page had done some practice flying at the aviation school at Nassau Boulevard, Long Island, in a machine said to have been of his own construction.

According to the Aero Club, its official at Los Angeles telegraphed yesterday that Page had passed his license test and today the club forwarded a provisional license to Page by telegraph. Besides his mother, young Page is survived by two sisters and two brothers.

Page's death is the first aviation fatality in this country in 1912, and is the one hundred and fourteenth in the world since actual flying began nearly four years ago.

Derrick Up For Fowkes Well.

The derrick for the Fowkes Townsite Oil Co. well at Fowkes townsite has been completed, and the men are now waiting for the machinery, which is expected every day. The drilling apparatus was shipped out of Corsicana more than ten days ago, but has since tracked somewhere on the road.

Mr. H. B. Hines says that the contract with the drilling company calls for a well two thousand feet deep, unless oil is reached at a shallower depth.

STEEL CORPORATION NOT A MONOPOLY

Jarrell Enters Emphatic Denial to
Charge Before House Investi-
gating Committee.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 23.—Emphatic denial that the United States Steel Corporation is a "monopoly as charged" was made before the House investigating committee today by President J. J. Jarrell, of the corporation. He declared it was not the corporation's purpose "to gobble the export trade of the world at any cost."

The monopoly of the iron and steel trade in this country," he said "is neither possible nor desirable. There is no monopoly or anything approaching it. Since the United States Steel Corporation was organized there has been much new capital attracted to the industry and many furnaces have been built which are not controlled by the steel corporation. It is charged the corporation is seeking to drive other countries out of the export market. That is far from the truth. The British steel industry must export forty per cent of its product to live. Germany must export fifty per cent and Belgium eighty per cent. The product of the United States is greater than England, Germany and Belgium combined, and the domestic consumption is so much greater than that of the export trade that the latter is not so vital. It is true that before the United States Steel Corporation was formed, the United States steel exports were about two hundred thousand tons per year. Last year the exports of the United States Steel Corporation were about two million tons, valued at \$9,000,000, against Germany's \$5,000,000 tons.

SAID HE WOULD "STAND HITCHED"

LETTER FROM CAPT BOYCE CON-
CERNING MRS. SNEED INTRO-
DUCED AT HEARING.

A TELEGRAM IS READ

Outline of Plans for the Defense Dis-
cerned in Testimony Introduced
Today.

Fort Worth, Texas, Jan. 23.—The outline of the plans for the defense of J. B. Sneed, who is charged with the murder of A. G. Boyce, Sr., could be clearly discerned during the hearing of the habeas corpus proceedings Monday afternoon before Judge Simmons in the Sixty-seventh district court, when five witnesses were called by the prosecution to testify and one defense witness, Judge W. H. Atwell, United States attorney for the northern district of Texas, was heard.

"On the night of the killing of Captain Boyce, during the time preceding the tragedy," said Atwell, "I had never before seen Beall Sneed in this mental and physical condition. His clothes were unkempt, his linen was filthy and I noticed a twitching of the muscles about the mouth, and the man wore a peculiar cynical smile."

Judge Atwell read a telegram which he says he received at Dallas from Sneed, as follows: "They are going to try to take her out by habeas corpus."

"Who did you infer was 'they'?" asked Attorney McClean.

"The Boyces," replied the witness. "Did this include Captain Boyce?" asked the defense attorney.

"Yes, Captain Boyce, but not all the Boyces," was Atwell's reply.

Special interest hinges about the supper party that at Joseph's cafe immediately preceding the shooting and a conference held there between Judge Atwell, J. B. Sneed and J. H. Bowman, Sneed's brother-in-law. It was there, according to Judge Atwell's testimony, that certain letters and telegrams were read and the Boyces discussed.

Judge Atwell said that he couldn't recollect all what was said. The shooting followed immediately after the supper party broke up, and he was standing on the corner of Ninth and Main streets and Bowman was near the hotel.

Judge Atwell said that he had met Bowman and Sneed at the Metropolitan hotel something like two hours before the shooting. He said that his companions withdrew while he held a conference with five minutes with A. G. Boyce in regard to prosecution of another case, contemplating against the man's son. Judge Atwell testified that he had intended eating supper at the Metropolitan cafe but when he saw Captain Boyce there he changed his plans and decided to eat elsewhere.

When the hearing was begun Sneed, in charge of two deputy sheriffs, was brought into court wearing a brown suit that seemed sadly in need of pressing and the same light gray alpaca hat that was so vividly described by witnesses on the night of the killing of A. G. Boyce, Sr. All during the proceedings he sat alert and attentive but calmly smoking a French briar pipe, the refilling of which now and then distracted his close attention to the lawyers and witnesses. The usual array of relatives of both sides were present and before the proceedings were begun T. S. Snyder, father of Mrs. Sneed; J. H. Bowman and the father of the prisoner, were ordered by Judge Simmons to leave the court room. It being explained that they would be called upon during the coming trial to testify.

The testimony of E. C. Throckmorton, a real estate man and son of former Governor Throckmorton, was stirring. He was revealed as the missing man who was talking to Captain Boyce when the shooting started. His testimony verified the dying words of Captain Boyce, made to a reporter, that he had seen Sneed in the lobby a short time prior to the shooting and refused to speak.

Throckmorton testified that both men spoke at the time of the shooting. He said that Captain Boyce said: "Oh, my God; there's Sneed!" as the first shot was fired and that Sneed after the shooting muttered, "Now you're done, you're out of it."

None of the other witnesses, however, remembered hearing any conversation. Throckmorton averred that he heard Captain Boyce tell Atwell

Hitchcock For Taft.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 23.—"I am for Taft as strong as a man can be," declared Secretary Hitchcock today. "I did not realize until a day or two ago how far these stories about my alleged differences with the President had gone."

That he would not speak to Sneed when the two conversed in the lobby about two hours prior to the shooting.

T. S. Snyder, father of Mrs. Lena Sneed, first witness at Sneed's hearing today said that Boyce, the slain man, was one of his most intimate friends.

"What kind of a husband was Beall Sneed, the defendant?" he was asked.

"He was a very fine husband. I often visited in their home, for extended stays and he provided everything for my daughter and her children that heart could wish. He was always affectionate and kind," was the reply. Snyder said his first intuition of trouble came on October 11th last when Sneed telegraphed to him to come to Amarillo and upon his arrival there he said "Mr. Sneed saw me coming and he and his wife met me in the yard. She was all in a tremble and threw her arms around my neck, he was crying."

A letter from Captain Boyce, Sr., to Snyder's son-in-law, John Pace, was then introduced. It read: "I hereby authorize you to say to Lena I am with her since conditions have changed and that I now sympathize deeply with her. She can depend on me to stand hitched."

Snyder's closing testimony was dramatic. He declared he felt Captain Boyce had betrayed a friendship of fifty years, and had sacrificed the Sneed and Snyder families "to save his drunken son."

Mr. Pace, the next witness, declared the elder Boyce to have been in a conspiracy to reunite his son and Mrs. Sneed.

Pace told of a letter received by Mrs. Sneed through him from Captain Boyce, Sr., and Henry Boyce after Mrs. Sneed had been brought back from Winnipeg, and of a power of attorney Mrs. Sneed had put into the hands of the Boyces to take her away from any sanitarium in which she might be placed, and that Pinkerton detectives had been employed to watch Mrs. Sneed to prevent her from being placed where she could not be found.

14,510,676 BALES OF COTTON GINNED IN U. S. UP TO JANUARY 16TH

Washington, D. C., Jan. 23.—The census bureau's ninth cotton ginning report of the season, issued at 10 a. m. today and showing the number of running bales, counting round as half bales, of cotton of the growth of 1911 ginned prior to Tuesday, January 16, with comparative statistics for last year and other record years, is as follows:

United States—14,510,676 bales, compared with 11,253,147 bales last year, when 97.3 per cent of the 1910 crop was ginned prior to January 16; 12,666,293 bales in 1909, when 96.8 per cent of the 1908 crop was ginned, and 12,767,600 bales in 1905, when 94.9 per cent of the 1904 crop was ginned.

Round bales included were 97,668, compared with 111,097 bales in the 1910 crop, 146,378 bales in 1909 and 232,510 bales in 1905.

Sea Island cotton bales included were 109,592, compared with 85,424 bales in the 1910 crop, 92,191 bales in 1909 and 90,287 bales in 1905.

MAY SECURE OIL FIELD TOOL SHOP

PROPOSITION SUBMITTED FOR
REMOVAL OF PLANT FROM
NOWATA, OKLA.

A BUSY MEETING

Directors of Chamber of Commerce
Also Consider Several More
Propositions.

The Chamber of Commerce is negotiating with W. M. Vandivort of Nowata, Oklahoma for the removal of his oil field tool shop from Nowata, Oklahoma to this city. His plant employs from twelve to twenty skilled mechanics and he places its value at \$20,000. In an offer to the Chamber of Commerce submitted this morning he proposed to remove his plant here for a site 100x150 feet with truckage and the freight on four carloads of freight. The directors of the Chamber of Commerce authorized the manufacturing committee to offer a site if they found the plant a meritorious one.

The poll tax committee reported what they had done in the campaign for the payment of poll taxes. Upon a poll of the directors it was found that only four of them had paid this tax, and it was suggested that a poll tax receipt be one of the qualifications imposed upon the directors before they could attend another meeting.

President Huff suggested that some plan ought to be devised where the members of the Chamber of Commerce could be graded. He said that it was not fair that the clerk earning \$60 or \$100 per month and contributing \$1 per month to the Chamber of Commerce should be placed in the same class with the man having \$50,000 worth of property in the city and contributing the same amount to the Chamber of Commerce.

He believed that a roll or honor should be devised to give the proper credit to the clerks and all others who contribute. His suggestion was received with approval and a special committee comprising Messrs. Bland, Bell and Noble was appointed to devise a plan to increase the membership and to give proper recognition to those who contribute in proportion to their income.

It was also ordered that the names of those delinquent in their dues be read at the next meeting of the directors and that in the meantime the acting secretary notify them of their delinquency.

A membership meeting was announced for the night of February 12, and it was the sense of the directors that membership meetings be held monthly hereafter.

Superintendent Toland asked the cooperation of the Chamber of Commerce in the establishment of a summer normal school here. Mr. Toland explained that he had interested the man who had conducted the Standard Collegiate Institute in the operation of a district normal school here at which they hoped to secure the attendance of fully three hundred teachers and is was declared in session of the directors that two hundred dollars be appropriated toward advertising the normal, if it is established.

A RESUMPTION OF HOSTILITIES

OFFICIAL ORGAN OF CHINESE
THRONE SAYS EMPRESS DOW-
AGER REACHED DECISION

PREMIER YUAN IS LOYAL

He Will Support The Throne But
It Is Believed Will Await At-
tack From Rebels.

Peking, Jan. 23.—The following statement was made today by the North China Daily News, which has always been regarded as the official organ of the official board at Peking: "The Empress dowager after carefully weighing the opinions expressed by the Princes of the Imperial clan and leading Manchou officials during yesterday's conference at the palace is inclined to think that a resumption of hostilities is the only solution of the present situation."

It is understood that Premier Yuan Shai Kai has agreed to fight for the throne. It is believed, however, that he will await an attack by the rebels. Foreign legations believe that abdication by the throne has been deferred for some time.

EXCURSION TO ABILENE PROPOSED

200TH ANNIVERSARY OF FREDERICK THE GREAT

All Prussia in Fete in Celebration of Illustrious Patriot.

Berlin, Jan. 23.—All Prussia, and in fact nearly all Germany, is on fete today for the beginning of the great celebration of the 200th anniversary of the birth of Frederick the Great. From the capital down to the smallest hamlet and village business is at a standstill and the populace has given itself up to the joyousness of the occasion.

The celebration in Berlin began today with a lecture at the War Academy on the prowess of Frederick the Great as a general and strategist. The lecture was attended by the Emperor, who was surrounded by ministers of state, generals of the army, admirals of the navy, and members of the diplomatic corps, all in glittering uniform.

Tomorrow will be the big day of the bicentenary celebration. In the morning the Emperor, attended by the high officers of the Prussian army, will participate in a solemn memorial service in the old garrison church at Potsdam, behind the altar of which Frederick the Great lies buried in an iron casket.

Berlin will observe the day as a public holiday. In the afternoon there will be parades, regimental celebrations and historical exercises. The day will close with a military gala opera. One of the principal events will be the fete in the White Hall of the Schloss, which will be attended by delegations representing all of the regiments which can trace their origin back to Frederickian times. Each delegation will consist of the commander of the regiment, one lieutenant, the colors of the regiment, the color bearer and one non-commissioned officer.

The celebration of the day will not be confined to the capital. In all the principal cities and towns of Prussia the municipalities and voluntary citizens' committees have made preparations for the day. In every school the scholars will observe the day by applauding patriotic addresses delivered by the principals and teachers and by recitation and singing. Every scholar will be presented a short history of Frederick the Great.

Frederick, surnamed the Great, whose memory is being honored by the forty odd million inhabitants of Prussia, is one of the dominant figures in the history of Europe. He was born January 24, 1712, and when he was twenty-eight years old succeeded his father Frederick William as king of Prussia. The character of the young king was still very imperfectly understood, when events occurred which exhibited it in a strong light.

A few months after his accession died Charles VII, emperor of Germany and Maria Theresa succeeded to the Austrian throne. Frederick set up a claim to Silesia, and in a short campaign succeeded in wresting that rich territory from Maria Theresa and annexing it to the Prussian dominions. His action, however, plunged all Europe into a bloody war. The conflict raged by sea and land in Italy, in Germany and in Flanders. The war lasted till, in the year 1748, it was terminated by the treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle. Of all the powers that had taken part in it, the only gainer was Frederick. Not only had he added to his patrimony the fine province of Silesia, but by his consummate diplomacy he had succeeded as well in alternately depressing the scale of Austria and that of France. At the termination of the struggle he was generally regarded as holding the balance of power in Europe—a high dignity for one whose youth had held forth little promise of greatness.

In 1756 commenced the Seven Years' war, the result of which was to raise the little state of Prussia to the rank of European powers. But it was not in his wonderful military achievements alone that Frederick displayed his greatness. Throughout his career he displayed an infinite genius in promoting the welfare of his country and his subjects. From the commencement of his reign he applied himself to public business after a fashion hitherto unknown among kings. Every department of his government received his personal attention and the highest functionaries were as mere clerks under his direction. In personal and public affairs alike he practiced rigid economy.

As an administrator Frederick the Great was without an equal. He earnestly labored to secure to his people the great blessing of cheap and speedy justice. Religious persecution was unknown under his government. He sought by every means to extend the commercial industries of his kingdom and from the beginning to the end of his career he was a liberal patron of the fine arts.

When he died, at the age of seventy-four, he left to his successor a well regulated state, a powerful army, and a treasury well provided. The great treasurer, however, he left, in the words of the historian Macaulay, was the recollection of his heroic and glorious acts, which in subsequent times has continued to operate upon his nation with all its awakening power and heart-stirring influence.

be the most appropriate day for the

the respect and esteem of all keepers

All who want to vote in the elections
in 1912 must pay poll tax receipts
for the year 1911. It is also well to
remember that this is presidential
year, and unless you qualify as a voter
by paying your poll tax between this
date and Feb. 1st, you can't do any-
thing but talk, and talk don't count
for a great deal when it is votes that
are needed.

In order to encourage further ef-
forts on the part of the tax-payers of
Wichita county to vote bonds with
which to build good roads, the \$150,
000 worth of road bonds recently
voted should be used exclusively for
the scientific construction of just as
many miles of good roads as possible.
Not a mile of public road should be
built or constructed until it has been
properly surveyed by a competent
engineer. An improper use of road
funds will prove disastrous to any
future plans that we might have,
therefore, let us be careful.

It is just as important that you
pay your property tax as it is that
you pay your poll tax. The fact is
that a penalty of 10 per cent is ad-
ded to your tax if not paid by Febru-
ary 1st, and on top of the penalty
the amount you are due the county,
state, district and city draws interest
after February 1st. Of course, every
one should pay a poll tax, and will
have to do that or be disfranchised.

The goosebone weather prophets are
now predicting that another cold spell
is to come in the late spring—or just
after the fruit trees have blossomed
out, and all fruit will be killed. As a
rule, however, that kind of weather
prophets are pessimists of the worst
sort, and if the fruit in past years had
been killed according to their predic-
tions, it would be difficult for the old-
est inhabitant to recall the year when
the fruit was not killed by late frosts
and freezes.

WILSON'S REFORM IDEAS.

From the Waco Tribune.
It would seem that there should be
no misconception or doubt about the
attitude of Governor Woodrow Wilson
as to the initiative, referendum and
recall. No man in public life has
sought more earnestly to take the peo-
ple into his confidence and inform
them, in straightforward, open-manner,
what are his views on all important
public questions, let them know clearly
where he stands.

But it happens that in every state
of the Union there is a goodly number
of citizens who are hopeful that Wood-
row Wilson is to be president of the
United States, succeeding Mr. Taft in
1913. These citizens are talking and
writing of Woodrow Wilson as a man
to whom they look with confidence and
hope to do the country real service,
and thus it happens that the New Jer-
sey executive is in the limelight of
publicity. It is perhaps to be expected,
as something inevitable, that he shall
not only be misunderstood and mis-
represented, but also that he shall be
misrepresented by men who are will-
ing, for partisan political purposes, to
see him discredited—and his words,
spirit and purposes misinterpreted.
That is why, it may be assumed, there
are in circulation so many stories and
theories, essentially erroneous, as to
his attitude regarding the initiative,
referendum and recall. It does not
matter that he has often stated his po-
sition in entirely candid and emphatic
words. The Tribune recalls that it has
reprinted them—such instances of his
fearless candor, and so have other pa-
pers all over the country. But the
misrepresentations do not cease, and
he is quoted as holding views of most
radical nature, even to favoring the
recall of judges.

The American people are coming to
have some knowledge of Woodrow Wil-
son's ways, and it is pretty well un-
derstood that fearlessness is one of his
chief traits. He is never afraid to
speak out plainly upon his views, even
if his admissions may not be as popu-
lar as he would like. But it is impor-
tant that the people shall know exactly
where he does stand on important
questions, and it is right and fair that
the truth shall be stated as to what he
favors and hopes for. To that end we
are reprinting today, and on this page,
a recent clear-cut expression from Gov-
ernor Wilson and invite attention
thereto. It is a letter he wrote to his
friend, the president of the University
of Virginia, and it sets forth exactly
what his views about the initiative, the
referendum and the recall. It is the
characteristic, fearless expression of
Woodrow Wilson on all public ques-
tions, and it merits impartial, careful
consideration.

It will be seen that Governor Wilson
does not favor, under any circumstan-
ces, application of the recall to judges.
On that point he reiterates what he has
said time and again. His conservatism
is in marked contrast to the drastic
preachments made by Senator La Fol-
lette, a republican, in his speeches in
Ohio last week, and it ought to evoke
the appreciation of those citizens who
like Woodrow Wilson, do not believe
it is wise to include the judiciary with-
in the scope of recall, because of ap-
prehension of the unwholesomeness
and perhaps dangerous tendencies of a
departure so at variance with the
methods that have prevailed from the
foundation of our government, and in-
deed with the English-speaking people
for all time.

As to the initiative and referendum,
it will be seen that Governor Wilson is

equally conservative as to the use of
those measures. He says plainly that
they are not necessary in any common-
wealth or community where the people
are assured of and enjoying real rep-
resentative government. They are
measures and safeguards to be invoked
when boss rule and corruption have in-
terfered to take from the people in-
herent rights and privileges—to sub-
vert rather than promote true repre-
sentative government—and he pays
the southern states generally the com-
pliment of remarking that true repre-
sentative government exists in those
states, has not been flinched from the
people. It is a delicate but splendid
tribute this southern-born man pays
to the civic virtue, the capacity for
self government of the people from
whom he came, and it is an utterance
that ought to be appreciated by that
people. We believe it will.

In brief, it is seen from his own de-
clarations that Governor Wilson regards
the initiative, referendum and recall
as measures for local rather than gen-
eral use, to be invoked only by people
who, out of experience, realize that it
is their duty to utilize those processes
as safeguards in the interest of good
government, the preservation of rep-
resentative government. It is out of
the question, from what he says, to
think of Governor Wilson as an advo-
cate of the measures under discussion
as features of federal or national gov-
ernment.

The statement is, all that the people
could desire in the way of lucidity and
candor. The words are those of a
fearless, patriotic man, and it is to be
believed they will be appreciated right
cordially by the American people, who
Woodrow Wilson holds, are the source
of all political power in this country.

Now that the President has estab-
lished a precedent, would it be right
to commute the sentence of every man
in prison whose health becomes bad?
If not, why not? Is Banker Morse,
because of wealth and influence, to re-
ceive more consideration than others
less fortunate? And isn't it this very
kind of administration of the law that
causes lack of respect for the law and
its supposed and boasted justice? Now
that Morse, who wrecked a large bank,
has been released it is expected his
health will immediately improve, but
what about the numerous poor people
who lost their all because of his specu-
lations? We do not desire to pose as
one who would refuse to release a
man from prison, but if we are to
establish a precedent by releasing one
of Morse's former standing and influ-
ence in the community, why make a
difference between him and any other
convict? Doubtless there are nume-
rous other sick men in the Federal and
state prisons who have not yet been
released. Then why not release all of
them? Isn't this fair and just?—
Weatherford Herald.

If there are men in the penitentiaries
who are sick, and who are able to pro-
cure the affidavits of physicians and
surgeons in the employ of the state of
Texas in whose penitentiaries they are
confined, to the effect that continued
in prison will cause their death within
a few weeks, as was true in the case
of Banker Morse, then it is but right
that such persons should be released
or pardoned that they may stand some
chance of regaining their health out-
side of prison walls. Hundreds of such
cases, similar to that of Banker Morse,
come up and are acted upon, yet noth-
ing is said of them, probably for the
reason that they were never of much
prominence and were not in the public
eye. Banker Morse may recover his
health, and it is to be hoped that he
will, not so much on his own account,
but that he may be given a chance to
make restitution to those whose trust
he has abused, and also that he may
prove that he is worthy of the untiring
efforts put forth by his faithful wife
to obtain his release. She deserves to
be rewarded, as does any woman who
will stick as close to an erring hus-
band as this woman has. If the prison
physicians have been over-influenced
by sympathy for her in issuing certifi-
cates to the effect that Morse could
live but a few weeks longer in prison,
they did wrong, but are not to be too
harshly condemned. If that is their
only sin to be answered for on the day
of judgment the chances are that it
will be blotted out. Doubtless Pres-
ident Taft was glad that such an op-
portunity had presented itself in order
that he might make glad the heart of
the woman who showed every evi-
dence that the imposing of the sentence
on her husband was causing her to suf-
fer fully as much, if not more, than it
was Morse, and the law did not intend
to make her suffer for the wrong com-
mitted by her husband. Neither did
the law sentence Morse to death, and
all circumstances go to justify the
statement that had he remained in
prison he could not have hoped to pro-
long his life but a few months at the
most. Morse owes his liberty to his
wife, and to her he owes all. Even
though he should regain his health,
what man is there who can conscien-
tiously begrudge her the comfort and
consolation that she can get out of
spending the remainder of her life as
the companion of a man who once wore
prison garb? If she is willing to face
such humiliation, and prefers that to
casting him aside and perhaps seek
and find another husband, the credit
is her own, and her act and her con-
duct is to be commended instead of
condemned.

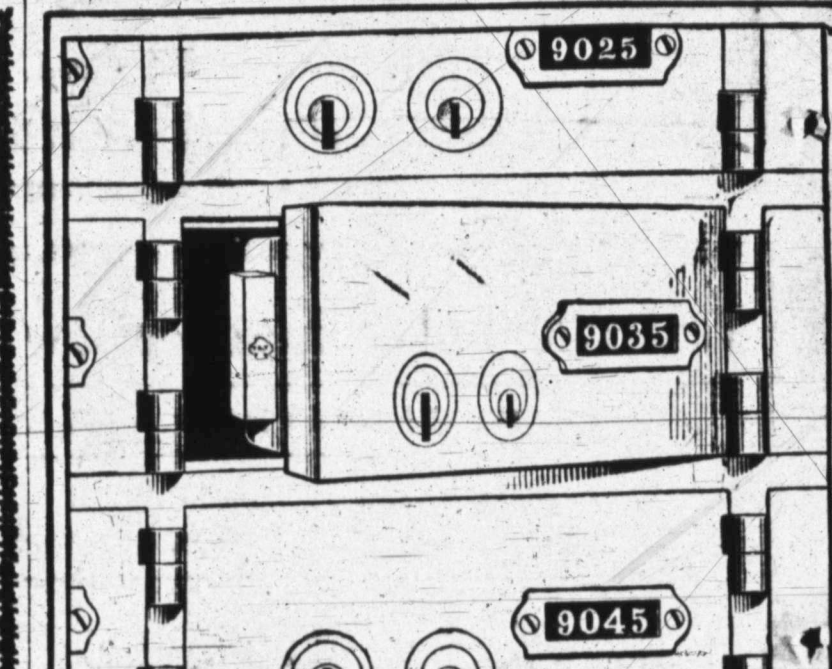
