

## SOIL EROSION WORK PLANNED FOR COUNTY

We are in receipt of a letter stating that all farmers who do not have funds for getting fuel and feed for work in strip bedding the land to prevent wind damage may get as much as 10c per acre from the Relief Office, by putting in an application with the county agent for the funds. This applies only to those who do not have funds for securing feed and fuel for the work on a given amount of acreage. Meetings are being held in the different school districts for the purpose of discussing the problem.

The ones that such strip bedding will not help to prevent the land from blowing, or on farms that the type of soil does not blow or is any danger of blowing will not be eligible for the per acre allotment. A committee will pass on the eligibility of the applicant. All applications must be in the office and approved by May 1st in order to be eligible.

**Soil Erosion C. C. Camp**  
Letters went out from this office Thursday asking all local committeemen to call meetings at the different school districts or where ever they want the meetings held, to determine if the farmers of the county want the Soil Erosion Work. In this plan as we understand it the Government will furnish all the necessary labor and machinery and try to work out some method of partially controlling the wind and sand damage to farms and pastures. This will apply to terracing and contouring, resodding pastures and tree planting to provide wind breaks. The farmers who are concerned in the work will sign an agreement of some kind agreeing to cooperate with the soil erosion service toward trying to get the wind and sand damage stopped.

Seems to be that the farmers of the county will pass up a chance to get some very valuable assistance in our greatest problem if they do not cooperate. I do not say that any plan or program when carried out will stop the sand damage but believe with the united cooperation with the government of all farmers whose lands are being damaged that quite a great deal of good can be accomplished. All men who are interested in cooperating with out any expense to themselves but permitting the Soil Erosion group to furnish all the labor and all expense should see your local committeeman and give an estimate as to the number of acres that need control work.

Unless this county shows a large majority of the farmers willing to cooperate in the program of course this county will be passed up and the Soil Erosion Service will establish camps in counties that are willing to cooperate in the program.

There will be a meeting at the court house, Friday night, April 19, at 8:00 o'clock for all farmers of the Lamesa District on the Soil Erosion Program.

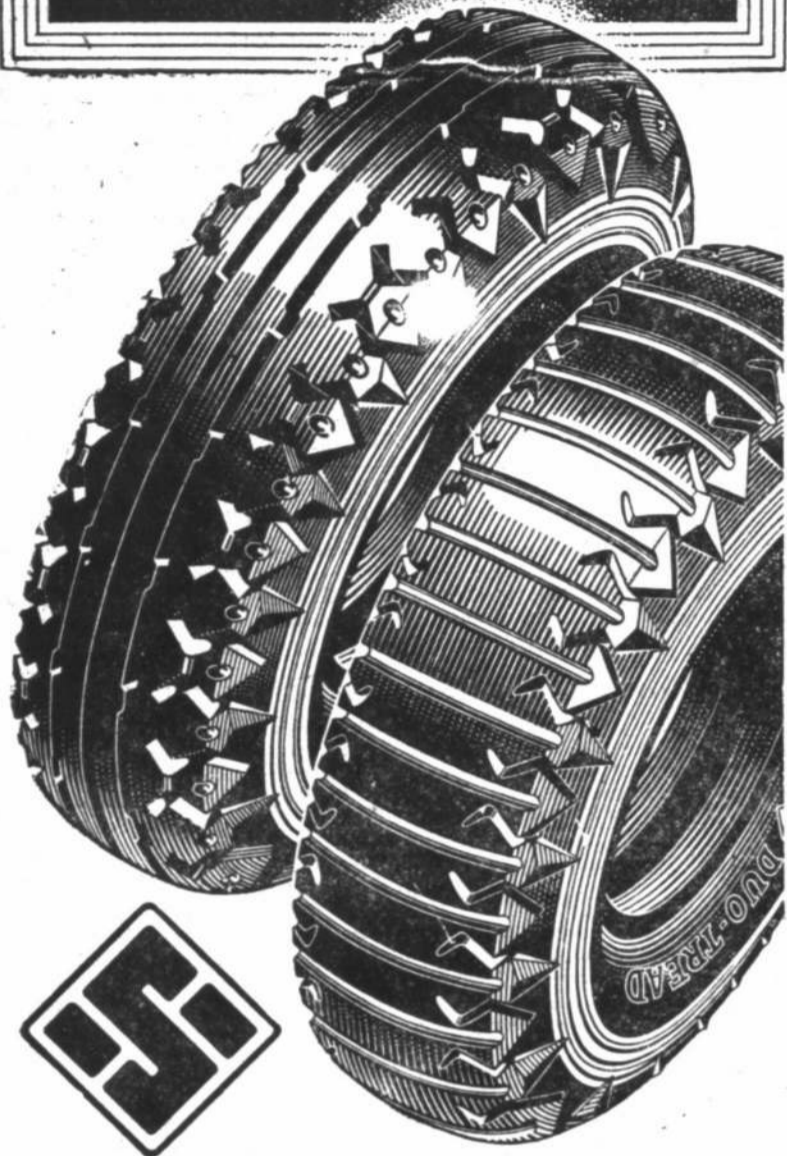

**American Legion Advocates Taking Profit Out of War**

At a regular meeting of the Allen-Houston Post on Tuesday night of this week at which some 75 to 100 veterans were present, resolutions were unanimously passed to ask Texas Congressmen and Senators to support payment of the Adjusted Service Certificates at the earliest date practicable and to give their unqualified support to Joint House Resolution No. 89 which is designed to take the profits largely out of war and to give the American people a voice in saying whether or not we should enter war. The text of the resolution which would amend the Constitution so as to give the people who fight the wars direct voice in declaring wars reads: "Section 1. Except in the event of attack or invasion the authority of Congress to declare war shall not become effective until confirmed by a majority of all votes cast thereon in a nationwide referendum. Congress may by law provide for the enforcement of this section".

"Section 2. Whenever war is declared the President shall immediately conscript and take over for use by the government all the public and private war properties, yards, factories, and supplies, together with employees necessary for their operation, fixing the compensation for private properties temporarily employed for the war period at a rate not in excess of 4 per cent based on tax values assessed in the year preceding the war."

In discussing these resolutions the boys cited the facts that after the last war the railroads of the country were paid cash adjustments of one billion six hundred millions of dollars and that munition makers and others having contracts with the Government were paid cash adjustments of another two billions. They believe that any adjustment due them in the way of wages should not be deferred to 27 years after date of the service rendered as provided in the certificates they hold. They also hold that practically eliminate them, and thus eliminate all post war problems for the future. Is not this logical, and do you not agree? If so join them in their fight for such a program.

**72 Dogs Killed Since Monday**
