## EQUINOCTIAL BLOW TEARS UP CENTRAL TEXAS

### STORM PLAYS HAVOC IN NAVARRO COUNTY WITH HAIL AND WIND

HOUSES OVERTURNED AND TREES UPROOTED AT CORSICANA

STREETS FLOODED

NO CASUALTIES KNOWN, BUT DAMAGE RUNS TO THOUSANDS

CORSICANA, Texas, March 21.—Damages estimated at several thousand dollars were done here Sunday by a hail and wind storm that uprooted trees and took the roofs off of several houses in the vicinity.

The biggest damage was recorded in the oil field section of the community where the hail beat through tar paper roofs and overturned out-houses.

Several miles southeast of Corsicana hail stones as large as golf balls were reported to have fallen and in places were found in drifts one to three feet deep.

Telephone service was greatly impaired.

Several communities in this vicinity reported damage by lightning but no casualties have been recorded. Downtown streets were flooded and street car service was abandoned for several hours when a trolley pole was blown over.

### Control Board Man Is Dead at Austin

CLARENDON, Texas, March 21.—A. F. Tipton, farmer of Hall county, was severely cut on the face near here Saturday night when his car ran into a truck that was being driven without light on the wrong side of the pike. Tipton narrowly escaped bleeding to death before he received medical aid.

### BOTTLES ARE INNOCENT UNTIL PROVED GUILTY

TOPEKA, Kan., March 21.—When does a bottle become a criminal, and when is a cork in contempt of court? The question has been put to C. B. Griffith, attorney general of Kansas by the proponents of the Volstead act who object to his recent ruling that no law exists in the state for the prosecution of firms manufacturing bottles, corks, and whiskey labels.

The prohibitionists feel that these labels, corks and bottles are made for the use of bootleggers and they believe something should be done to stop it. Hundreds of letters reach the office of the attorney general every day telling him so.

They believe if there isn't a law prohibiting the manufacture of bottles, corks, and labels, it is the business of the law makers to get busy and make one.

Attorney General Griffith's ruling was made following the discovery that two bottle and cork companies in Wichita have been supplying the bootleggers.

### WANTS INVENTORY OF UNCLE SAM'S REAL ESTATE

WASHINGTON, March 21.—The largest property owner in the world has one of the most inadequate systems for keeping track of his holdings, in the opinion of Representative Sol Bloom, New York, democrat, who has proposed the establishment of a bureau of property control to handle Uncle Sam's real estate.

A bill to be introduced Monday would call for an inventory of the \$10,000,000,000 worth of real estate owned and controlled by the government as well as the establishment of the bureau.

The full senate judiciary committee will meet to consider the report of its sub-committee recommending hearings on the numerous modification bills before the upper house. It is believed certain that the committee will accept the report of its sub-committee. The hearings probably will begin early in April.

### HE WOULD RAISE STANDARD OF LONDON BY ELEVATORS

LONDON, Mar. 21.—After climbing hundreds of flights of stairs seeking votes in the London financial district G. F. Clark announced that the main plank in his platform would be to require the installation of elevators in buildings.

### Pastor Says he Will Be Dry Law Agent

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, March 21.—Adding his actions to his voice in enforcement of the prohibition law, Rev. M. C. Eldson, pastor of the Beacon Hill Baptist church will become a federal prohibition agent in a few days, he declared tonight during the second of his series of sermons in defense of the liquor law.

### LABORERS LEAVING COUNTRY UNDER NEW LAW

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21.—More laborers are leaving this country than are entering under the present immigration law.

An analysis of immigration figures for the first seven months of the present quota year by the National industrial conference board shows a net loss in common laborers of 8,787, compared with a net loss of 21,245 for the same period last year.

There was a net gain of farm laborers of 4,521, compared with 8,331 in the corresponding period last year.

The bulk of immigration is from Canada and Mexico, the figures reveal, with Great Britain, Ireland and the Scandinavian countries supplying less than their quota allowances.

While 2,714 Italians a great deal less than the quota allowed entered during the seven months period, 21,768 left America for Italy.

### Can't Find Cause Of Alabama Blast

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., March 21.—The cause of the explosion which early Saturday resulted in the death of 21 men and injuries to 12 others had not been determined Sunday.

### Fifteen Dead in Asia Minor Quake

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 21.—Fifteen persons are reported dead as the result of a severe earthquake shock Sunday in Adalia in Asia Minor.

With only two more days left until the third annual South Plains music festival begins, sale of tickets which has lagged heretofore in Lubbock is expected to liven up. The South Plains music teachers' association is presenting the famous artists who will sing and play throughout the four day event, and Miss Mary Dunn, president of the association, said Saturday that only twenty percent of the tickets had been sold.

Lubbock's neighbors have shown interest in the festival than the city itself has, Plainview in particular having sent assurances that a large delegation would be present. The program begins Wednesday at the Tech pavilion, and will continue through Saturday.

The price of season tickets, which are on sale at all drug stores in the city and at two music stores, has been cut to one-half of the price asked last year, and to about a quarter of what Texas cities as a rule charge for similar entertainment.

This is an effort to raise the attendance to the highest possible mark, and disseminate more widely the musical education which is absorbed through the medium of such a program, Miss Dunn explains.

### LUBBOCK YOUTH IS RUN OVER BY AUTO.

G. C. Barrier, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Barrier of 1802 Avenue I, was run over by an automobile yesterday as he fell from the fender of another car, on which he was riding, at 14th and Avenue I, and suffered two broken ribs. The wheels of the automobile passed over his chest. Attending physicians say that internal injuries are possible, but not probable.

### Wants Czar's Jewels Back in His Family

PARIS, Mar. 21.—Legal action to prevent the sale of \$250,000,000 worth of Russian crown jewels by the bolsheviks will be taken by the remaining members of the Russian imperial family, it is learned here.

Relatives of the former Russian rulers declare that the situation in Germany where the state is considering re-imbursement the Hohenzollerns is proof that the former Russian royalties have a case against the soviet.

### Arson Attempt at Dallas Frustrated

DALLAS, Texas, March 21.—An attempt to ignite a two story office building in Dallas' downtown district was halted early Sunday morning when police sergeant D. C. Garrison found a lighted Christmas candle in a box of excelsior and pine shavings on the upper floor of the structure. A night watchman reported to the police sergeant that he had seen a man running from the building a short time before the conflagration was discovered. He hailed Garrison and an investigation revealed the fire hazard.

### Twenty Hurt When Communists RIOT IN FRANCE, HURLING PAVING STONES AT CHARGING CAVALRYMEN

PARIS, March 22 (Monday)—Hurling paving stone at French cavalrymen who had charged them with drawn sabres, a column of marching communists in Metz fought for an hour with the military Sunday night. Twenty were injured.

The communist meeting in the suburbs which preceded the parade was held in defiance of police orders. The 1,500 people who attended the meeting were mostly foreigners and their program consisted of revolutionary music by a band of singing of communist songs.

When the parade formed to begin the march toward Metz a group of women and children was placed in the lead to prevent an attack by either police or military. The communists were successful in passing the first troops that attempted to stop them and were half way to the center of Metz when the cavalry attack was made.

The soldiers captured two red flags.

### SPRING SPLASHES INTO LUBBOCK IN HALF INCH OF RAIN

OFFICIAL GAUGE READS .54 ON SUNDAY MORNING

VERNAL WEATHER

EQUINOCTIAL EFFECTS DIFFER WIDELY OVER WORLD

Fifty-four hundredths of an inch of rain was the contribution of Jupiter Pluvius to Lubbock's equinoctial storm up to 7 a.m. yesterday, according to official rain gauge reading at the agricultural experiment station.

This was that freshened the air and made the first day of spring one of real spring weather.

In other sections of the world, colds, accidents, droughts and storms are all laid at the feet of the vernal goddess who, metaphorically speaking, is supposed to have come Charleston into the world yesterday scattering each blossoms and such like things around in the wake of departing winter. In some places, according to United News dispatches, she did just that. In others she didn't. In New York Fifth avenue blossomed forth with a pre-Enter display at Coney Island, but in London—well, in London those who came out in spring clothes went back home again to get the old red flannels.

In Chicago it seems that spring sopeped up the autoists that they bagged six pedestrians during the day, while in Cherbourg, France, storms played havoc with shipping. Honolulu yesterday saw the climax of such a severe drought that, presumably, the supply of flowers for the necks of ukelele players, and of grass for hula dancers skirts, is seriously endangered.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., March 21.—Theodore Carle had a good alibi, but was bald headed and that ruined his plausible story.

"Is it a good tonic?" the judge asked.

"The best in the country," Carle replied. "I use it myself, Judge."

But Carle was bald, very bald, and the judge simply would not believe him. He was fined \$500 and given a suspended sentence.

### HUGE SUPPLIES OF ARMS BEING BOUGHT BY MANY NATIONS

EXTENSIVE PURCHASE OF RIFLES AND MACHINE GUNS ALLEGED

PLANES ARE BUILT

RUSSIA, TURKEY, GREECE, JUGO-SLAVIA, CHIEF OFFENDERS

LONDON, March 21.—Alleged secret negotiations for the purchase of arms and munitions by eight European countries have been exposed by the Weekly Dispatch of London. Greece, Russia, Jugo-Slavia, Finland, Lithuania, Poland, Rumania, and Turkey are the nations accused of extensive munition buying. In addition to its charges regarding the purchase of arms and munitions the Dispatch claims exclusive information on "details of extraordinary arrangements by several European nations for purchase of plants for making arms and munitions."

Greece has ordered 200,000 rifles from an Italian factory and Russia is buying huge quantities of rifles which she is re-shipping to China and Persia, according to the report in the Dispatch. The publication also declares that Jugo-Slavia is seeking to obtain 400,000 rifles and that Finland, Poland and Rumania are making efforts to obtain rifles and machine guns.

Orders from China and Turkey have flooded German armament firms, the report concludes.

COPENHAGEN, March 21.—The Swedish works of the German Junker Airplane Company is building a fleet of eighty fighting planes for Turkey. It is also building for an undesignated South American country a gigantic airplane described as the most formidable weapon of the air ever invented. The plane will be armed with numerous machine guns and will be fitted with an armor plated tower which will enable its crew to fire in all directions.

### Rev. Empringham Speaks Up Again

NEW YORK, Mar. 21.—The Rev. James Empringham, general secretary of the Episcopal church temperance society, who recently lent strong impetus to the national prohibition fight attacking the Volstead act, said Sunday night he had made a personal tour of the country buying liquor to gain first hand knowledge of the prohibition act which he has denounced as a failure.

"There wasn't a single city I visited where I could not buy liquor," Dr. Empringham told the United News after he shocked the congregation of the conservative St. Luke's church with part of his revelations.

### Farmer Hurt in Clarendon Crash

AUSTIN, Texas, March 21.—Sam H. Carter, 50 years old, secretary of the state board of control, died at his residence here late Saturday night.

Carter, one of the most popular officials in Austin, has served the state of Texas for more than twenty years.

Funeral services will be held Monday.

## At The Churches Sunday

### FIRST METHODIST

Revival services started off in excellent shape yesterday morning at the First Methodist Church. Following an excellently attended Sunday school, Rev. D. B. Doak, Presiding Elder of the Lubbock District, preached the first sermon of the meeting, to an equally large attendance.

Rev. Doak's sermon was given from the text found in Romans 8: 28, which reads: "All things work together for good to them that love God." Scripture lesson was taken from the hundredth and fifth Psalm.

Some excellent singing was had during the service. Mr. Richardson, who is financial secretary of the Church, led the singing, with Mr. Waghorne at the piano. Members of the church headed the plea made by leaders of song for those who could sing to come to the choir, resulting in a large number being in the choir.

Following are some extracts from Dr. Doak's sermon: In beginning, Dr. Doak told of the incident of the man who had a wonderfully beautiful lawn about his home, which he tended constantly, watering when it was dry, and weeding it when it was weedy. In that lawn, he said, lived some red-bugs; and one of these bugs expressed his opinion of his "universe" one day, saying that there was no being who worked with and tended the lawn, making a beautiful place for them and their kind to live—yet all the time he was drawing his life from the blood of the man. He was so small, and his intellect was so infinitesimal that he could not comprehend the nature of his being, and of the being which in reality cared for him.

Then in turn, the man to whom the lawn belonged said one day that there was no power that was over his being—no one who watched over him, and cared for him, and gave him to eat and to drink—no one who provided life for him, and a place in which to spend that life. "Might we not say also that the man's intellect was so dwarfed, and infinitesimal, so little—that he could not comprehend the God who was watching over him?" Dr. Doak asked.

To illustrate his meaning, Dr. Doak took an incident from the Bible which shows the great and perfect order of God's plan, and showed that even in that instance, everything worked for the common good when the people concerned really loved God—that of Martha and Mary, and their brother Lazarus, and Jesus.

He made a very pointed query when he asked pointblank if we really do believe what that text says. "Do we believe it when everything is running smoothly, when the sun of God's kingdom is shining brightly, when the crops and lands of ours have received moisture for the coming season, when health and happiness is possessed—when it is easy enough for one to fold his hands and say that it is all working together for good?"

"The real test of our Christianity is when the sunshine of our life fades; when ice covers the ground," he said, "and the weather is dark and forbidding; when the wolf scratches at the door of our home, threatening to break in and destroy when gloom and despair come down upon us, smothering, as it were, the very life from us; when sickness, disappointments—death—comes. Then we can truthfully pray a prayer of faith, and hope, saying that it is true that everything works together for good, for them that love the Lord! That is when our spirit is tried, and our Christianity is found to be wanting or sufficient."

The family composed of Martha, and Mary, and Lazarus was a happy one. Lazarus was beloved by his sisters, and they by him. He was providing for them, and he was taken into the family, and came often to visit with them. They grew to love him, and the Bible says that Jesus loved them—and where there is love there is happiness.

Dr. Doak went on saying: "Then, one day, Lazarus was taken sick. The sisters sent for Jesus; but Jesus knowing well God's plan, and knowing that everything does work together for good for them that do love God, came not. The sisters despaired, and wondered why Jesus did not come, if he loved them. In that, they were like so many, many people—impatient with the Divine plan. God doesn't say that he will do everything just as we want it done. After some days, Lazarus died; and they buried him. The sisters were prostrate with grief, and could not be comforted."

"Then Jesus came, bringing a ray of hope and of light, as Jesus can do today if people will let him. What took place at this time shows that Jesus was human, as well as Divine—a wonderful revelation."

"Jesus was moved with sorrow and he wept with the sisters; then he asked where they had laid him, and that they lead him to the place. When they had done this, Jesus asked something which, from the human viewpoint, seemed foolish; but it was at this place that the sisters of Lazarus proved their belief in Christ. 'Real love has healed faith'—and the sisters obeyed the wish of Jesus, even though they said 'do, he has been dead four days—he stinketh.' And then, when the tomb was opened, Jesus called Lazarus as a father might call his son in the early morning—it was time for him to arise."

"Then the tears were dried away, and sunshine came to their hearts, because Lazarus did come out from the grave—alive."

"Only a Christian spirit can go through sorrow and heartache and misfortune with the joybells ringing in its heart—only a Christlike faith can be crushed and injured and then

come back with feeling of hope, and elation, and of joy."

"Thru all this story runs the sentiment that if we do our part, God will do his part. The sisters did not understand what Christ was doing—could not see thru his plan; but in their hearts was love, and belief, and trust; and they, too, were enabled to know that 'all things work together for good for them that love God.'"

### FIRST PRESBYTERIAN

Rev. Jack M. Lewis, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, reported excellent attendance at that church yesterday, with a great deal of interest. The rain boosted Sunday School attendance, instead of cutting it; and everyone was ready to really worship the Lord for what he has done, Mr. Lewis said.

The sermon of the morning was on "The Possibilities of the Tithe." This sermon was very appropriate; starting off, as it did, a campaign for "Christian finance" among members of this church. Following an appeal made in this sermon, quite a number of people evidenced their willingness to share in this plan for financing church work.

After the service, some fifty men lunched together in the basement of the church before starting out on their "Every-member-canvas" among members of their church. The luncheon was presided over by the pastor, and interest was kept at high pitch by a number of short talks made by members of the band.

After the luncheon, definite instructions were given to men before they broke up into teams by A. B. Davis, chairman of the project, and by H. D. Woods, who was chairman of the canvass teams.

Between the hours of two and four, then, a thorough canvass was made of the city, every member of the church being visited; and a large number signed pledges insuring their titling for the year. This move insures a great year for First Presbyterian church of Lubbock.

There is no church, anywhere, can really live and prosper if the work of the church is constantly harrowed by financial problems; and the tithe system is the best plan that has been found for carrying on church financial work. It is God's plan, and the plan which God endorses is bound to have some merits not found in others.

The tithe itself, however, cannot be a success unless the people who pledge themselves to it are really honest and in earnest about the work. People asked Christ wherein they had robbed God; and he said, "In tithes and offerings." There is no person who can definitely check up on our contributions, or payments, to the church on a tithe basis; but we know ourselves, and what is more important, God knows also.

## WHAT TEXAS MAKES—MAKES TEXAS.

There is a movement to the South the like of which has never been witnessed in the history of our government. If Texas and the Southwest expects to receive its share of the billions of dollars that are now being poured out by capital of the North into the South, we must not sit idly and hide our wonderful development and resources under a bushel. No one state in the Union has the great possibilities for future development that Texas has. We may follow the sun from our eastern to our western border and travel eight hundred and twenty-five miles, or if we take a flight from our southern to our northern border we will travel seven hundred and forty miles. The boundary line between Texas and Mexico is eight hundred and sixty miles in length. We have a coast line on the Gulf of Mexico 370 miles in length with a tidal shore of 624 miles with a great number of deep water ports. Texas is an empire of 265,896 square miles with an acreage of 170,173,440 acres, or we could give an acre of land to every man, woman and child in the United States and still have millions of acres left. Our soils are the richest in the world, in fact so rich that we help to feed the balance of the Nation and the world. Texas leads the entire United States in agriculture and stock raising and we are rapidly developing as a manufacturing state, for at this time we are producing over one billion dollars in manufactured products annually. Our population is now over five million and we are increasing at the rate of about one hundred thousand each year and that without a boom. We produce one-third of the cotton crop of the United States. We lead in the production of wool and mohair. We have the largest sulphur deposits and mines in the world. We have an unlimited amount of fuels for industrial and domestic purposes in the way of natural gas, petroleum, and our lignite deposits cover 60,000 square miles. Our great oil refineries are the wonder of the Nation. We are great producers of rock asphalt, cement, lime, gypsum and other building materials, including an unlimited supply of pink and gray granite. Our mineral deposits have hardly been touched and within the next few years the United States Government will very likely spend millions of dollars in developing the newly discovered potash fields of West Texas. Our railway transportation systems cover some 16,000 miles exclusive of sidings and the increased development of our deep water ports on the Gulf of Mexico has been without parallel in the history of our State. Texas has now taken the lead of the whole United States in value of products exported. We must show the world that Texas is a land flowing with milk and honey. That our Texas banks are overflowing with the money of Texas depositors. Tell them of our great universities, colleges and schools, tell them of our churches, of our wonderful climate and the living conditions of our people, tell the people that shiver in the cold for over six months in every year that Texas invites them to the land of sunshine and happiness, to the land that is now producing the finest oranges, lemons, grape fruit, peaches, figs and other fruits.

With this in view the Texas State Manufacturers' Association will stage Texas Industrial Week on March 22 to 27, asking the co-operation of all commercial and civic organizations within the State. The leading merchants in all Texas cities will be requested to feature Texas Made Products in their display windows. The slogan for the week will be "What Texas Makes—Makes Texas". The attention of the citizens of Texas will be called to the importance of giving preference to Texas Made Products on the basis of service—quality—price. Our industries that are operating on full time production are successful and if we expect Texas to expand along industrial lines and draw new industries we must stand back of the industries that have been established. The luncheon clubs are to feature Texas Made and Texas Grown products, and the speakers will point out the many opportunities of all sections of Texas that are awaiting capital for their development.

## A NEW EMPIRE.

A new Empire has recently grown up in Arabia in opposition to the plans promulgated by Great Britain. The new empire seems to have achieved political unity over tribes representing 200,000,000 Moslems who have taken their religious inspiration from those Koranic customs discarded by the new Turk's republic. The assembler of this new empire is known as Ibn Saud, Sultan of Nejd. Only a few years ago he was a penniless exile with a price set on his head. Only the other

day, leading the Wahabis of Nejd he swept over the desert from oasis to oasis, took the Holy Cities of Mecca and Medina from old King Hussein (once the Arab pet of the Allies), caused successively his abdication and then that of his son, Ali. On January 11 he proclaimed himself King of their country, the Hejaz at Mecca. The fall of King Hussein, who had been set on his throne by the British was a severe set-back. He was too ambitious and intriguing. Today he is a British guest on the Island of Cyprus.

## CUPID GETS A K. O.

The Italian government proposes to interfere with Cupid insofar as officers up to the rank of Colonel are concerned, and hereafter the young lieutenant, attracted to a beautiful but penniless signorina, will not be permitted to follow the urge of his heart. Because of the small pay to officers his sweetheart must furnish a dowry large enough to liquidate official requirements.

To make sure that its officers will be able to live in a style befitting their rank, the army headquarters recently issued an order fixing the amount of dowry. The social prestige of the uniform is to be upheld at any cost, nor does the Government feel that it should be asked to do all the upholding. A sliding scale of doweries has been drawn up, which advances or declines according to the rank, the smaller the salary, and therefore the more rank, the smaller the salary, and therefore the more the officer will need from his wife to enable them to live in proper fashion.

Colonels and Generals may marry anybody they like, the assumption being that a Colonel or a General receives enough pay from the Government to enable him to live up to style on his own salary, without aid from his wife.

Militarism and Communism are not far apart on some subjects after all.

## THE BROOKHART CASE.

Present indications are that the Senate will adopt the report of the Committee on Privileges and Elections recommending the unseating of Senator Smith W. Brookhart of Iowa and the seating of his Democratic opponent, Daniel F. Steck. On the fact of the returns Mr. Brookhart was re-elected in 1924. His election was contested by his opponent who charged fraud. The final count of ballots, as completed by the committee, is said to show Mr. Steck's election by the narrow plurality of fifty-seven votes. Stipulations made by opposing counsel worked out in such a way that, if all the ballots which both sides agreed should be eliminated because of certain markings were cast out, and all counted with certain other markings, Mr. Steck's plurality would have been more than 1,700.

The result will be to add one vote to the Democratic roll of the Senate, but many republicans prefer this to an anti-administration Republican. Indications also point to the fact that Mr. Brookhart will immediately announce his candidacy for the seat now held by Senator Albert B. Cummins who is up for re-election this fall. As a result of the Brookhart-Steck campaign both Republicans and Democratic parties are badly split and anything may happen in that state at the coming primary.

## "BACKWARD, O BACKWARD!"

Among many contemporary movements having received fanciful publicity on the part of the national press, the movement "back to the good old days" seems to be getting over with quite a kick. This is evidenced in the revival of old-time music, as well as in numerous old-time parties being held by various fraternal societies.

We are well acquainted with the proverb, "Distance lends enchantment to the view," and as concerns "the good old days," this proverb seems more than a phrase. It will not be disputed that our modern civilization, with its super-mechanization, lacks a good deal of the old-time neighborliness and sentimental display of humanity, but before we start innumerable revivals of the old times let us pause and consider a few pertinent facts. Would there be any rational basis for returning to the one-horse chaise, to the home without the bathtub or modern lighting and heating facilities? Would there be any justification for going back to the old pony express system of transportation? Would there be any sanity in the movement to restore the individualized hand-production methods of labor in unsanitary and dingy factories? Would the advocates who are so interested in the revival of the old-time idea, advocate a return to the antiquated horse and buggy instead of urging the popular usage of the automobile?

The "good old days" were good enough for those days, but not for today. Modern society is a complex organization of human beings, readjusted in their ideas and relations by new conditions and new ideas. The process of readjustment, which we believe to be progressive, is not yet complete. It is merely a process. It is inevitable that in making our adjustments to the new wonders of electricity, steam, gasoline, railroads, aeroplanes and radio that we should lose some of the old attitudes and ideas; that we should become perhaps over-interested in this marvelous machinery of the twentieth century. In fact, during this period of transition it seems inevitable that we should become more interested in machinery and property than in humanity. But if there are to be any old-time movements at all, it is not to be a movement away from the modern life and modern conditions, but an impulse to inject into contemporary life the old fraternal and mutual feeling of neighborliness and brotherhood.

In this sense, the old-time revivals are merely symbolic of a sentiment that seems to be passing out of our lives. However, we do not view with alarm this situation, because we know that the spread of educational institutions and the increased usage of motor cars and radio cannot help but in themselves restore that community of feeling and of interest which will develop a new fraternalism and education.

**Kerr—1856**  
 Organized March 22, 1856; created January 25, 1856.  
 Built out of original municipality of Bexar.  
 Named for James Kerr, a Missourian, a man of some prominence, who came to Texas in 1825 and became manager of DeWitt's colony on the Guadalupe. Was active for Texas independence. Died at his home on the Navidad river in 1850.

**Llano—1856**  
 Organized April 4, 1856; created February 1, 1856.  
 Built out of Gillespie county and original municipality of Bexar.  
 Llano, the county seat.

The Llano river finds its source in the great plains now known as Schleicher and Sutton counties. The Spaniards called the river "Llano," or the "plains." Thus the county's name.

**Uvalde—1856**  
 Organized April 21, 1856; created February 8, 1856.  
 Built out of original municipality of Bexar.

Named for Uvalde canyon. This canyon took its name from Juan de Uvalde, governor of Coahuila in 1778, who permanently routed the Apaches from this territory, making his last stand in this canyon. This incident gave the county its name.

**San Saba—1856**  
 Organized May 3, 1856; created February 1, 1856.  
 Built out of original municipality of Bexar.

San Saba, the county seat. Takes its name from the San Saba river, whose name comes from far back in Spanish history. In 1757 the San Saba mission was built for the evangelizing of the Apaches. In

the spring of 1758, it was utterly wiped-out the Comanches, a thousand strong.

**Wise—1856**  
 Organized May 5, 1856; created January 23, 1856.  
 Built out of Cooke and Fannin counties, and original municipality of Red River.  
 Named for Henry A. Wise, prominent in the early affairs of Virginia. He rose to high places in our national life. Was a warm advocate for the annexation of Texas.

**Atascosa—1856**  
 Organized August 4, 1856; created January 25, 1856.  
 Built out of original municipality of Bexar.

Jourdanton, the county seat. The Spanish word means "boggy." In the territory is an apparently safe surface underneath which are great deposits of quick sand. History relates that men and animals in both the Somervell and Mier expeditions suffered untold misery in this region.

**Erath—1856**  
 Organized August 4, 1856; created January 25, 1856.  
 Built out of Goryell, Bosque and Bell counties, and original municipality of Milam.

Stephenville, the county seat. Named for George B. Erath of Vienna, Austria, who came to the United States in 1832, and to Texas in 1834. He joined himself to the Robertson colony as a surveyor. Was foremost as an Indian fighter and in the wars for Texas independence. Prominent in the public life of Texas. Died at Waco in 1891.

**Llano—1856**  
 Organized August 4, 1856; created February 12, 1856.  
 Built out of Nueces county, and (Continued on Page 8)

## BENNY HILL BREAKS SPEED RECORD TO WIN 250 MILE AUTO CLASSIC ON CULVER CITY, CALIF., RACE TRACK

CULVER CITY SPEEDWAY, Calif., Mar. 21.—Piloting his Miller Special at a speed faster than any many has ever traveled before in a 250 automobile race, Benny Hill, veteran driver, won the speedway classic here Sunday afternoon.

His time for the distance was one hour 51 minutes 53 3-10 seconds, for an average of 130.59 miles an hour. The old record was 128.82 miles an hour.

Peter De Paolo, 1925 champion, came in second, a lap and three quarters behind Hill.

Eddie Hearne, returning to the racing game after two years' absence, finished third.

Hill went into the lead in the 90th

lap of the mile and a quarter bowl, succeeding Davis Lewis who held the lead from the 22nd lap. Hill drove a non-stop race.

The only thrill in the event was furnished by Bob McDonough when his car skidded on the first turn and turned completely around three times. He kept control, however, and went on with the race after a change of tires.

Fifteen minutes after the race was ended, officials announced there would be a complete re-check all drivers who finished after De Paolo. It was officially reported to the press box after the last laps were ridden down that Eddie Hearne finished third; Ralph Hepburn fourth and Frank Elliot sixth.

### Solving Mysteries of Plants to Aid Human Beings

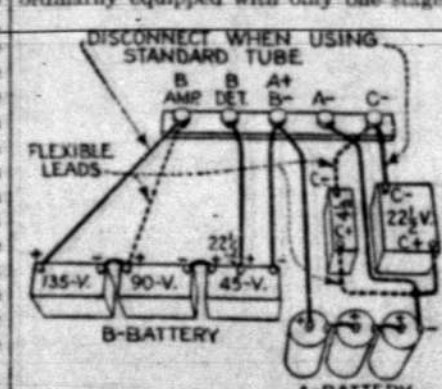
In an interesting laboratory in England, plants are being subjected to a wide variety of tests, while scientists study their growth and how they respond to various lights and different kinds of food. That plant products may be raised more efficiently and, incidentally, that more may be learned of the functions of the human body, for life in plants and in animals is similar in some respects. A geranium with a curved stem is given an electric shock and made to grow in a different direction; certain plants that require light for normal growth are placed in darkness, while others that could do well with little illumination are subjected to baths from colored lamps. To discover how plants feed, the experimenters starve them.

### Simple Battery Changes for New Power Tubes

The installation of the new power tubes seems to offer some difficulties to the average experimenter, particularly in sets ordinarily equipped with only one stage



of a.f. amplification, and those which have two stages but will operate the loud speaker only on the last stage, and even then with too little volume to suit the operator on distant stations. On the other hand, the volume on the last stage may be too great for locals, and some simple means for cutting out the power tube when not required is desirable. All this can be handled nicely by the arrangement shown in the diagram.

A socket of the new standard UX-type, which will take the 3-volt and 5-volt tubes as well as the common type, is provided. Inspection of the diagram will reveal a simple but effective method of changing the ordinary C-battery connections, as well as the necessary shift from 135 to 90 volts of B-battery suitable for cutting out the power tube and replacing it with the standard-capacity tube for local reception on the loud speaker. The diagram shows the 22½-volt C-battery used with the 3-volt power tube; if the 5-volt tubes are used with the 135-volt. It has been estimated that the change C-battery instead of the 22½-volt unit. The writer estimates that the change from power to standard-capacity tubes can be made with this arrangement in less than three minutes. The power tubes are fine for distant reception but for local work the standard tube will give better

quality of tone. The diagram given is suitable for the small-tube super set now in general use, where one stage of audio amplification is used.

### Old X-Ray Plates for Roof Cover Greenhouse

Prisoners working in the greenhouse at the penitentiary on Deer Island, Boston, Mass., if so disposed, can study interesting revelations of the human anatomy simply by glancing upward at the roof. For the covering is composed of discarded X-ray plates donated by the city hospital of Boston. Skulls, arms, ribs, hands and fractured bones are included in the unusual canopy.

### One-Man Barrel Lifter

One man can easily stand or tip a barrel weighing from 400 to 500 lb. by using the simple lever shown in the drawing. It is merely a pick handle, with steel grips bolted on. Applied as indicated,



the handle allows considerable leverage and makes it comparatively easy to manipulate heavy barrels.

## HEREFORD BREEDER HANGS UP FINE RECORD

HEREFORD, March 21.—Few Hereford breeders of Texas can boast of a record that will equal the one that D. L. McDonald of Hereford has just hung up. This man has only been in the breeding game for a few years, but is known all over the state for the exceptionally good animals he produces.

At the recent Texas Hereford breeders sale which was held in connection with the Fat Stock Show and Southwestern Exposition at Fort Worth, D. L. McDonald topped the sale with his young bull, Superior 3, at a price of \$1200. This was the third consecutive Hereford sale that this breeder has topped, and incidentally this was the third sale he has ever entered. Last spring McDonald topped the Panhandle Hereford breeders sale at Amarillo with Robert Caldo; McDonald's Super Anxiety 3rd sold for the top price in the Texas Hereford Breeders' Consignment sale at Sweetwater last October, and recently young Superior 3rd topped the Fort Worth sale.

McDonald established a consignment record in the Fort Worth sale when his four bulls sold for an average of \$925 each. This is believed to be the best consignment average that any Hereford breeder has hung up since the drop came in cattle prices some five years ago.

Another record of which McDonald is proud is the exceptionally large average of the calves from his herd bull, Super Anxiety. ## WASHINGTON TRACK TEAM WILL INVADE THE SOUTHWEST

AUSTIN, Texas, March 21.—The Georgetown University track team of Washington, D. C., which will make an invasion of the Southwest during the Easter holidays during which it will participate in the Texas Relay Games and a dual meet with the University of Texas is perhaps one of the greatest college track and field teams of all time both from the standpoints of personnel and of records.

The Blue and Gray one mile relay team has two men repeating this year who last season won for Georgetown the Indoor Intercollegiate championship, establishing a new indoor mark of 3:21.4-5. Jimmy Burgess and Vernon Ascher are the two veterans and it was these two men who were mainly responsible for the Hilltop's victory at the Penn Relay Games last April when the cream of university competition was down before them. The one mile relay team also took first in that event at the Illinois Relay Games, the Ohio State Relays and the Loyola Relays in Chicago. Frank McClain and Edward Swinburne are the new members of the team, both consistent quarter mile performers at less than 50 seconds.

Georgetown is bringing ten men to Texas, each of whom has distinguished himself in his individual event. A brief account of the work of each follows:

Walter Gegan, who in emergency will run on the one-mile team, is a member of the national four mile relay team, took third place in the outdoor intercollegiate mile last May, and is a former national junior 440 yard hurdle champion. He also runs the half in fast time and was captain of the 1925 cross country team. Anthony J. Plinsky, Georgetown's all-around athlete, mentioned for all-American fullback last

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(all, is intercollegiate decathlon and former national decathlon champion. Though strong in several events Plinsky holds the intercollegiate shot put record as his latest achievement.

Emerson C. Norton, indoor high jump champion for 1925 and 1926, was a member of the 1924 Olympic team and runner up to Harold Osborne for the decathlon honors. In 1925 he won the all-round championship at the Illinois Relays, establishing a new carnival record and beating Osborne's old mark. William A. Rowdin, also a member of the last Olympic team, is indoor intercollegiate broad jump champion for 1925-26. He has won several firsts in important relay games in this event and at Ohio State Relays beat the negro Hubbard, the only defeat the negro star sustained during his college career.

Edward Swinburne was a member of the world's record holder two mile relay team of last year and now runs the one mile relay. Frank McClain, running number one in that event now, was a member of the unconquered freshmen team of 1925. Creth B. Hines, of Houston will compete as a freshman in the relay games only, as he can not represent special via the javelin, and he astounded the Washington sport scribes when he tossed the spear 192 feet 8 1/2 inches at the interclass games in October. His place in the dual met will be taken by John Hass, Edward Melton or Raymond Whalen.

Vernon Ascher, mile relay runner, also runs on the half mile relay team and will enter the Texas Relays in the 220 and the 440. He is a former national junior quarter mile champion. Jimmy Burgess, anchor man on the mile and half mile relay teams, will handle the 220 and the 440 in the dual meets. Captain Raymond Hass, former intercollegiate low hurdle champion and present indoor or high hurdle champion, will also run in the medley relay.

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**Home Dressmaking**

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**Don't let Deight-Smart Women**

Trimmed with plain taffeta. The design calls for 2 1/2 yards of the printed crepe, with one yard of taffeta. The skirt is arranged in panel effect in front, the fulness appearing below the hips.

Interesting are the sleeves, which introduce the spauld effect at the shoulders and fulness below the elbows. They are gathered at the lower edge then stitched with a narrow band of self-material. The vest is slashed and bound with ribbon, a note of trimming that is repeated in the turn-down collar.

The diagram shows how to apply the facing to the circular skirt. This must be a perfect bias. Then sew the right side of the facing to the lower edge of the skirt. It is well to turn the upper edge of the facing and baste it before sewing the lower edge to the edge of the skirt. Now, turn the facing to the wrong side and baste. Wherever extra fulness occurs, gently fold it in with a narrow box plait. This is better than a side plait because it makes the skirt hang better. If the material is very thin, instead of turning the upper edge of the facing first, it may be gathered here and there to absorb the extra fulness—which comes as a result of the edge of the skirt being wider than the space above it.

NEW YORK FINANCE

BY E. WALTER MOCKLER  
(Financial Editor New York Com-  
mercial)

NEW YORK, March 21.—Last  
week's development on the stock  
exchange afforded little basis for  
the belief previously expressed that  
prices had touched their bottom  
and there is but scant authority  
for any hope of improvement this  
coming week.

On the other hand, there is noth-  
ing in the evidence to indicate  
that the loss for the move might  
not have been made on Saturday  
when Hudson and General Electric  
went lower trading levels.

The consistent firmness result-  
ing from short covering in many  
of the rail stocks indicated that  
selling in that division has been  
overdone and many industrials have  
rolled down to a point where much  
the same situation may have arisen.  
The larger proportion of trad-  
ing last week, especially toward  
the end of the session was of pro-  
fessional origin. This position is fil-  
led with possibility either way. Al-  
lowing for the chances of no im-  
mediate news of importance, it is  
always possible that the drain of  
selling might encourage a new rush  
of general liquidation, even though  
ment are now viable. Should some-  
the actual basis for such a move-  
ment occur to renew public con-  
fidence in the market, it is entirely  
probable that the professionals, who  
now have extensive short line out-  
standing, might easily be forced to  
cover the market reflective more of  
professional trading factors than of  
fundamental conditions in the na-  
tion's business and industry at this  
time, the market guides are more  
psychological than economic.

Cotton sold off slightly in re-

ponse to the final pricing figures,  
at the end of the week, but the  
showing has been generally antici-  
pated. The final gainings which  
might be accepted as the actual  
cotton crop for the year, brings  
to an end one of the most un-  
certain periods in the history of  
cotton.

Last summer reliable estimates  
were made around the ten million  
bale level and estimates of twelve  
and thirteen million bales made  
in some quarters were regarded  
as fantastic illusions.

Parts of Texas were in the grip  
of the worst drought on record  
while many other sections report-  
ed sub-normal conditions. As the  
season wore on estimates were grad-  
ually raised by the government  
and private reports.

However, Saturday's ginnings of  
16,103,000 running bales or 16,085-  
906 bales of 500 pounds each rep-  
resented an increase of half a mil-  
lion bales from December and is  
but barely below the 1924 crop  
which was the largest on record.

The difference between the two  
big crops is so small as to permit  
the belief that any post season  
gatherings this year might bring  
the actual crop up to or above the  
1914 yield.

In the cotton market, the big  
crop had gradually become ac-  
cepted as actual and traders had  
dropped prices accordingly. The  
main factors bearing on price de-  
termination at this time concern  
the element of demand, supply fac-  
tors having become fully known and  
discussed. The demand factor has  
failed to blossom in consonance  
with the needs of a 16 million  
bale crop. Changes in styles of  
dress, eliminate considerable yard-  
age of finished cotton goods, plus  
the substitution of silk and silk  
substitutes in other lines have  
worked against the interest of the  
cotton manufacturers. The textile  
industry has shown the slowest re-  
covery from the post war de-  
pression of any basic industry. This  
is not being hastened by the  
over production of 1925.

Another development which served  
to discourage active participa-  
tion in stocks or the commodities so  
far as buying was concerned came  
in the week's cables. After Lizarro  
the market was optimistic. After  
Geneva the market was disillusioned.

Various foreign bonds issues ex-  
pected as a matter of course in the  
new future, have apparently been  
postponed. The poor reception af-  
forded the major Italian govern-  
ment financing has probably as-  
sumed an important role in check-  
ing the contemplated Belgian loan.  
These happenings, while bearing  
no immediate influence upon do-  
mestic industrial corporations nat-  
urally play an important part in

shaping sentiment, especially in a  
market already over nervous and  
with plenty of active bears to give  
all discouraging news the proper  
angle to bring out the full meas-  
ure of pessimism.

## SCIENTISTS PLAN TO BOOST SORGHUM CROP VALUE

MANHATTAN, Kans., March 21.—Scientists in five states have been appointed on a committee to draft the national co-operative research project in sorghum in order to place this crop on a more equitable basis with other crops of importance in the southwest, according to E. C. Call, director of the agricultural experiment station, of Kansas agricultural college who named the committee.

The committee appointment comes as a direct result of the recent sorghum conference held at the state agricultural college two weeks ago.

Salmon, chairman, Kansas state agricultural college, Manhattan, Kans.; H. N. Vinall, agronomist and I. H. Martin, associate agronomist, United States department of agriculture, Washington, D. C.; E. F. Chilcote, agricultural superintendent, Woodward experiment station, Woodward, Okla.; R. E. Karper, assistant director, Texas agricultural experiment station, College Station, Texas; C. P. Thompson, president of animal husbandry, Oklahoma A. and M. College, Stillwater, Okla.; and H. L. Kent, president, New Mexico college of agriculture and mechanic arts, state college of New Mexico.

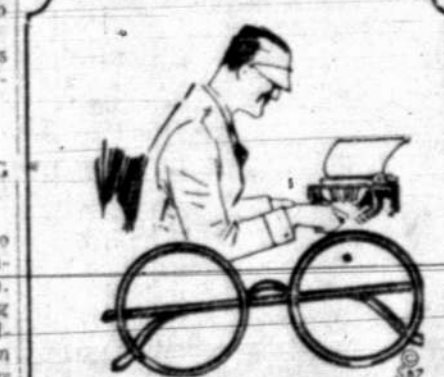
