Austin. —Constitutional Revision Commission is busy revising or rewriting the basic document which has governed Texas since 1876.

Before it could start, it rounded out its membership by naming five senators.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith refused to name the Senators. He says the Commission was not legally authorized. It was created by a simple House resolution and the Senate did not concur.

Senators chosen by the Commission itself were A. M. Aikin of Paris, Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo, J. P. Word of Meridian, Don Kennard of Ft. Worth and Henry Grover of Houston.

Gov. John Connally opened the Commission's meeting by urging its members "to make some very profound recommendations about the structure of Texas government without removing fundamental safeguards."

Connally said the commission should "eliminate those portions (of the Constitution) which are outmoded and no longer applicable."

Commission Chairman Robert Storey, a Dallas attorney, said the 25-member commission, which will report to the 61st Legislature in 1969, should try to write a brand new constitution.

Recommendations of the Commission must go first to the Legislature. If two-thirds of the lawmakers agree that the proposed revision is worth submitting to voters, a statewide election will be required before any changes can go into effect.

Larry Temple, executive assistant to Governor Connally, was designated secretary and chairman of the drafting committee. San Antonio Mayor W. W. McAllister was named vice-chairman.

Legal or not, the group will devote 14 months to the project. Eight committees were named to study various parts of the Constitution — executive, legislative, judicial, political subdivisions, bill of rights, education, revenue and taxation, and drafting.

HURRICANE ACTION — All available federal aid will be sought by Governor Connally for Rio Grande Valley and Texas coastal areas ravaged by Hurricane Beulah.

Small Business Administration early declared SBA relief loans were available to firms in the hurricane-devastated sections.

State Insurance Board dispatched experts to the Valley to help interpret the fine print of policies. Insurance companies, which paid out \$120,000,000 in Hurricane Carla losses six years ago, moved to implement "catastrophe plans" for speeding claims handling.

Board officials advised that Texas insurance policies do not cover losses due solely to flood waters or wave damage, although some do provide coverage against wind-driven rains, as well as wind damage.

Source of controversy surrounding Carla policies mainly involved losses caused by both wind and water and assessment of that portion attributable to hurricane winds.

Man Killed, Wife Injured In Crash

An Arlington man was killed and his wife injured in an early morning traffic accident Sunday at Sulphur bridge on Highway 37.

Harold Tannehill was killed when the Tannehill car, traveling south, hit bannisters on the bridge. Mrs. Tannehill was carried to Clarksville hospital by Bogata Funeral Home ambulance. Reports this week indicated that her injuries were not serious. Tannehill's body was transferred from Bogata to Mena, Ark., for funeral rites there.

Both of the Tannehills were apparently thrown from the car upon impact. The vehicle then burst into flames. Bogata Fire Department answered an alarm at 8 a. m. and extinguished the fire.

Highway Patrolman Bill Floyd said the fiery, one-car crash occurred when Mrs. Tannehill, driver of the car, apparently dozed at the wheel. Their 1967 Chevrolet struck one guard post, piled into the end of the concrete Sulphur River bridge rail, and turned completely around on the bridge.

Mrs. Tannehill told Patrolman Floyd, who investigated the wreck, that Tannehill was asleep beside her.

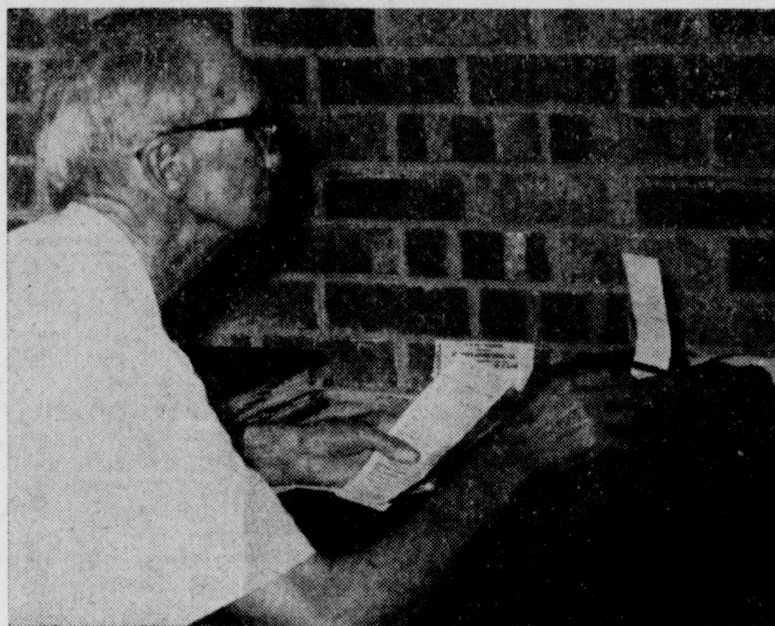
Clerks sort and distribute mail, handle heavy sacks weighing up to 80 pounds, and perform related duties. The work involves continuous standing, stretching and reaching. Carriers deliver and collect mail on foot or by vehicles under varying weather conditions. In most offices they must be able to drive a vehicle under all kinds of road conditions. They may be required to carry on their shoulders loads up to 40 pounds.

FELIX JONES COMPLETES FIFTY YEARS OF BANKING AT TALCO



For 50 years there has been a Jones at Talco State Bank, that is none other than Felix Jones, Chairman of the Board. Mr. Jones, 74, is still active and maintains an office in the bank.

Felix Jones, 24, and ambitious, started it all when he joined the bank as bookkeeper on Sept. 1, 1917. Through the years he has risen to his present position with the bank.

Talco State reflects the years of work by Jones and its other officials. The bank was founded on Sept. 12, 1912—the bank holds the oldest original charter in Titus County. Felix Jones being connected with the bank all but five years since its organization.

When Talco was but a small farm community, the bank prospered, and when they struck oil in the city in February 1936, the bank boomed along with other businesses and industries.

Today, as Felix Jones marks his Golden Anniversary of association with Talco State Bank, he has seen the assets rise from \$67,000 in 1917 to over \$1,343,671 at the last published bank statement in July this year.

Jones became cashier of the bank in 1918 and vice-president in 1936 and named president in 1944, a place he held until succeeded by his son, Jerry Jones.

The bank has undergone numerous remodeling and additions during his 50 years of association with the institution. Located on Broad Street, the bank was remodeled and modernized recently and is an asset which would be a credit to any community.

Stepping down from the presidency, he was succeeded by a son, Jerry. Not only has Jerry Jones followed in his fathers footsteps of banking, but all of his sons have worked in Talco State Bank. They are, besides Jerry, F. A., Billy Gene, John Paul, Lon, Cato, Virgil and Boyd (now deceased).

Mr. Jones also has three daughters living, namely, Mrs. Farris (Anna Ruth) Brown, Mrs. Fred (Wynell) Blackard, and Mrs. James (Nelda) Kelsoe.

Mr. Jones was born in Commerce on Feb. 28, 1893, being the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Jones. He moved to the Talco area when he was two years old, and has resided here since that time.

Not only has Mr. Jones been active in the bank, but has an insurance agency, and is a stockman. Still very active in the civic and church affairs of the community and surrounding area, he is an elder in the Talco Church of Christ. He was married to the former Ruth Cato in March 1925 and they reside at their home southeast of Talco on Highway 271.
