## Workout Wins District Crown

The Friday night 62-0 win by the Rivercrest Rebels over Redwater was little more than a mild workout, but it was an exercise which was necessary for the Rebels to take the District 20A crown. Hopefully, the exercise helped the Rebels get ready for the Bi-District tilt Friday against Hawkins, who have managed to get the best of the Rebels in the last three outings.

The Rebels and Hawks will settle the squabble in Tiger Stadium in Mount Vernon at 7:30 p.m. Nov. 23. Tickets are available at Rivercrest. The Rebels will be the host team.

The game last week against Redwater became a public practice, with the Rebels scoring at will and worrying more about sharpening a dull passing attack and learning to kick field goals than anything else. Against Redwater, Dale Jean completed 10 of 18 attempts for 294 yards. Jimmy Via attempted three field goals and made two.

Seldom has any football team at any level gone through the maneuvers Rivercrest did to accomplish OJT for field goals. With 35 points already to their credit early in the third quarter, Jean completed a pass to Gregg Norman for 14 yards and another to Billy Scales for 34 yards. (Scales was seeing his first real action since a shoulder injury early in the season.) On first down,

with nine yards to go for a touchdown, Via made his first, and only unsuccessful field goal attempt from the left hash mark. The angle seemed to be a problem, so late in the same quarter a great deal of effort was attached to getting the ball in the center of the field.

Credited with getting the ball in field goal range the second time was Jean, this time on a pass to Brian Roberts who was playing tight end in place of Brian Harville, who had suffered an ankle injury.

With the ball on the 10 yard line, Jean took the ball laterally to the center of the field, but lost five yards on the play. In order to maintain the ball position in the center of the field, but to cut the distance down for Via, Jean carried the ball up the middle to the six yard line. Via then split the uprights for the first field goal in Rivercrest history.

Early in the fourth quarter, Via proved he didn't need the help on the distance when he completed his second field goal from the 27 yard line.

All eight of Via's extra point kicks were good against Redwater.

Recapping the scoring for the Rebels, Via crossed the goal line on a 61 yard run on the first play from scrimmage in the first quarter. A Dragon fumble was recovered by Terry Mauldin, and Billy Scales scored from

the 20 yard line. Gregg Norman scored on a pass from Jean, good for 49 yards, and Jerry Merchant skirted around left end from 21 yards out for the last touchdown of the first quarter.

Another Jean to Norman pass for 27 yards accounted for the first Rebel score in the second quarter. Jimmy Strickland intercepted a pass at the Dragon 44 yard line to give the Rebel possession, followed by the touchdown.

Linebacker Keith House intercepted the pass which led to the first Rebel field goal late in the second quarter.

In the third quarter, Jean passed four consecutive times on the first Rebel drive, completing three of the attempts, one to Norman for 13 yards, one to Scales for 15 yards, and one to Via for 26 yards and a touchdown. Another Jean to Via pass late in the third quarter was good for 70 yards and another touchdown.

Roger Edge put the ball in field goal range for Via in the fourth quarter when he slipped around right end for a 50 yard run. Jean lost one yard running the ball to the center of the field on the next play, and Via kicked his second field goal.

Finally, Merchant intercepted a Dragon pass at the 40 yard line and broke several tackles on his way to

## Happy Thanksgiving

The First Thanksgiving Proclamation

WHEREAS, it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor; and Whereas, both Houses of Congress have, by their joint committee, requested me "to recommend to the people of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness"

Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the twenty-sixth day of November next to be devoted by the people of these states to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be; that we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks for his kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a nation for the signal and manifold mercies and the favorable interpositions of his providence in the course and conclusion of the late war; for the great degree of tranquility, union, and plenty which we have since enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national one now lately instituted; for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and, in general for all the great and various favors which he has been pleased to confer upon us.

And also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions;...to render our national government a blessing to all the people by constantly being a government of wise, just, and constitutional Laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed to protect and guide all sovereigns and nations (especially such as have shown kindness to us), and to bless them with good government, peace, and concord; to promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us; and, generally, to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as he alone knows to be best.

Given under my hand, at the city of New York, the third day of October, A.D. 1789.

## Rebels To Meet Hawkins In Mount Vernon

Sooner or later the time has to come for the Rivercrest Rebels to beat the Hawkins Hawks. The Rebels have been unable to do that in three contests, but the

Rebels have one more chance, and will meet the Hawks for the second consecutive year in Bi-District play at Tiger Stadium in Mount Vernon.

Game time will be at 7:30 p.m. Friday, Nov. 23, and Rebel fans are scheduled to meet at Rivercrest at 5 p.m. to decorate cars and to form a spirit caravan to Mount Vernon. A prize will be awarded for the best decorated car.

The 1978-79 season was the first meeting between the Rebels and Hawkins in recent history, and Hawkins beat Rivercrest in the season opener 14-12. By the end of the season, the Rebel squad

showed a lot of improvement, but Hawkins had improved too, and took the Bi-District title at Tiger Stadium 28-6.

A much sobered Rebel team went to Hawkins at the opening of the 1979-80 season, followed by a grandstand full of Rebel fans, but Hawkins did it again, this time by a score of 14-6.

The Rebel defense was unable to shut down Hawkins' running backs, Richard Woffard, who

rushed for 54 yards against the Rebels in the 1979 season opener, and James Holmes, who racked up 91 yards.

At the Hawkins game, Reben senior Jimmy Via was at the quarterback slot, with sophomore Billy Creelich and senior Billy Scales at halfback, and sophomore Jerry Merchant at fullback. When scales suffered a shoulder injury which required surgery early in the season, senior Dale Jean was moved to the quarterback slot, and Via filled the halfback position.

Now Scales is back to full strength, and according to Rivercrest coach Milford Groves, "Jean has four good backs behind him now instead of three." The configuration may make the difference, with Jean passing 10 times last week against Redwater for 294 yards.

The winner of the Rivercrest-Hawkins match will advance to the Regional Playoff, with the time and place to be set by the respective schools on the morning following the Bi-District game.

Tickets for the Rivercrest-Hawkins match are \$3.00 for adults and \$1.50 for students and are available in advance at Rivercrest and Hawkins schools. Tickets will also be available at the game.

## Trustees Meet In Regular Session

The Board of Trustees met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, November 6.

Matters discussed and or action taken by the Board were as follows:

1. Authorization was given to advertising a one acre tract of land known as the old Lavada School site for an oil and gas lease.
2. The travel policy for school administrators was revised.
3. The Board cast its allotted number of votes for candidates listed on the ballot for the Red River County Tax Appraisal Board.
4. Approval was given to a Title IV, Part B Application for the purchase of school equipment.
5. Authorization was given to the employment of Plan A Aide to work with severely handicapped children.
6. Approval was given to the dividing up of the Franklin County Permanent School Fund between the school districts having property in the county according to the number of scholastics in each district.
7. Various financial reports were approved.
8. The January meeting of the Board will be delayed one week due to holidays.
9. A report was made concerning a recent On-Site Monitoring Visit made of the school district by a team from the Texas Education Agency. It was stated that the team members were very complimentary in their oral report about the over-all school program with only a few areas in need of attention.

The next regular meeting of the Board will be Tuesday, December 4 at 7:00 at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

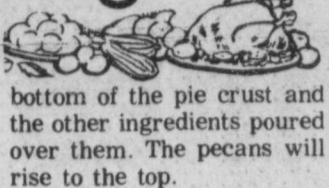

# East Texas Eating

It can't be coincidence that the new crop pecans cure out about the same time that our taste for pecan pie reaches its peak. This makes pecan pie a popular Thanksgiving Day dessert.  
The milk in Southern Pecan Pie adds a mellowness that I find pleasing. It, as most pecan pies, is very rich so smaller servings are usually adequate.

3 eggs beaten  
1 cup dark corn syrup  
1/2 tsp. vanilla  
3/4 cup sugar  
2 Tbsp. melted butter  
1/2 cup milk  
1 cup pecans  
Line a 9" pie plate with pastry. Combine the beaten eggs, corn syrup, vanilla, sugar, melted butter and milk. Blend thoroughly. Pour in pecans. Pour the mixture into the unbaked pastry shell. (The pecans may, instead, be arranged attractively in circles in the



bottom of the pie crust and the other ingredients poured over them. The pecans will rise to the top.

Bake in a 350 degree oven from 45 minutes to one hour.  
Pastry:  
1 1/2 cups flour  
3/4 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup chilled shortening  
Approx. 6 Tbsp. ice water

Cut the shortening into the flour and salt until half of the particles are the size of peas and the remainder are like very coarse meal. The pea size particles ensure flakiness and the finer ones help make the crust tender. Sprinkle the ice water into the flour-shortening particles, gently tossing the gathering pastry. As soon as the pastry can be pressed lightly into a ball, do so. Another sprinkle of water or so on the drier particles in the bottom of the mixing bowl will help them adhere to the pastry ball. Use no more water than is necessary to hold the pastry lightly together. Too much water toughens a crust and causes it to shrink!

I like, at this stage, to let the pastry rest, covered, in the refrigerator for at least four hours-or overnight before it is rolled out. This lets the gluten in the flour relax and hence makes a more tender crust. The chilled crust is also easier to roll out. Make the crust the day before, chill it overnight, then roll it out, fill with the Southern Pecan Pie filling, and bake approximately three hours before you serve the pie, and you'll serve your Thanksgiving guests a superb pecan pie.

## Cattle Need Protein Despite Grass

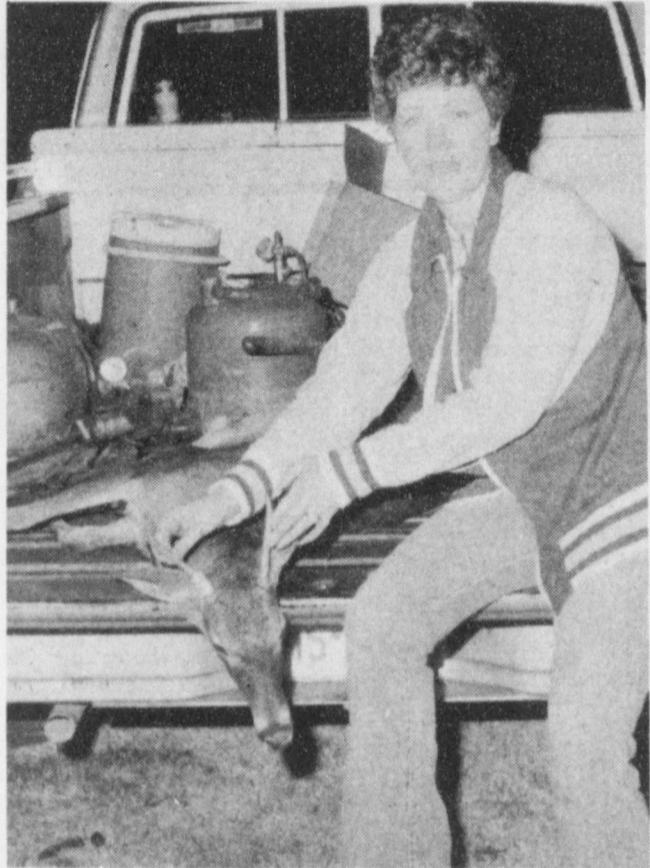
Despite plenty of grass in pastures throughout the county, the seasonal decline in forage quality is beginning to set in. This means that cattlemen should start thinking about providing some protein supplementation, says County Extension Agent Bob Moody.

All warm season grasses lose protein rapidly with the onset of cool nights and the season's first frost. Digestibility of these grasses also drops. As these changes occur, the amount of nutrition that grazing animals get also declines, says Moody. In high rainfall areas, summer grasses deteriorate to the point that they are little more than filler material.

The time required for rebreeding is directly related to the nutritional level and body condition of cows at calving. If cows must use stored body fats due to delayed winter feeding, they will likely take longer to rebreed.

Once grass growth stops, animals are subjected to a protein deficient diet unless supplementation takes place. However, the energy content of grasses does not vary drastically, so energy will not become a limiting factor until cold weather increases the body heat requirements of livestock.

A protein block or liquid protein supplement would provide adequate protein during the fall months before cold weather hits. Once grasses deteriorate due to cold weather, heavier protein supplementation will be needed.

## Start Gathering Tax Records Now

Be prepared—that's good advice for taxpayers who plan to itemize on their 1979 tax returns. "By starting to gather records now, taxpayers can spend a little extra time organizing them and pay attention to deductible items they might overlook later," said A.W. McCannless, IRS Director for the Dallas District. "Sorting records into the categories—medical, interest, taxes, charitable contributions, employee expenses—will also enable taxpayers to locate supporting evidence which IRS auditors may request during an examination."

When itemizing, taxpayers should keep track of interest paid on loans and mortgages, as well as payments for medical insurance which are documented on various financial statements. These amounts are often deductible and easily overlooked by the taxpayer.

Medical expenses, union dues and charitable contributions are a few other commonly-claimed deductions for which IRA auditors often request supporting evidence. McCannless noted that it's a good idea to keep both cancelled checks and bills when possible.

### Diet Important To Dairy Heifers

Shortchanging the diet of replacement dairy heifers will delay breeding, reduce disease resistance and result in poor growth and development, says Dr. Dwight Vines, area dairy specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. All animals require a balanced feeding program to grow and reproduce. The selection of proper feed-stuffs, in the right combinations, is the primary key to a successful feeding program.

At birth, the calf's digestive system functions as a simple stomach, Vines points out. After a period of time, other parts of the stomach become functional. During this early stage of life, the calf must have milk or milk replacer for its total nutrition. If milk replacer is used as a substitute for milk, choose a milk replacer that uses milk protein as the primary protein source. Many less expensive milk replacers use plant proteins as the primary protein source. Young calves cannot utilize plant proteins very efficiently.

Although the young calf starts nibbling on grain within a few days, it normally takes two to three weeks before the calf realizes any significant nutritive value from the grain. The selection of a good concentrate for the growing dairy calf should place high priority on digestibility, protein quality, energy content and palatability.

Feeds that are easily digested are the most desirable. Crude protein content of the feed should range from 16 to 20 percent with the crude fiber content being six to eight percent. High quality hay should be available to calves within the first week of life.

"After weaning, the growing heifer's energy and protein needs change," Vines concludes. "A feed with more fiber and less energy and protein will meet the heifer's needs if she is kept growing at a steady rate and maintains a healthy vigorous appearance."

**Law Changes Interest**

**Rates On SBA Disaster Loans**

Interest rates on Small Business Administration Disaster Loans have been changed by enactment of Public Law 96-38, according to A. Vernon Weaver, SBA Administrator. The Legislation, which was signed into law by President Carter last week, applies to SBA disaster loans which have been approved as a result of disasters occurring on or after October 1, 1978.

These are the two major changes: 1. Interest rates on the first \$55,000 of SBA primary residence and personal property disaster loans are lowered to three-percent from seven and 3/4-percent, except for any refinancing. In the case of refinancing, the interest will remain at seven and 3/4-percent; 2. Interest rates on SBA Business disaster loans where credit is not obtainable from private sources and where refinancing is not involved are lowered to five-percent from seven and 3/4-percent. Interest rates on business disaster loans which in SBA's judgement are obtainable from non Federal credit sources remain at seven and 3/4-percent.

Because of the retroactive feature of the law, SBA officials will review, on a case-by-case basis, loans already made. Administrator Weaver said the reviews will be made as expeditiously as possible. The new law provides about \$1 billion in new disaster funds.

SBA disaster loans are available in areas declared to be disaster areas by either the President or the SBA Administrator. The loans may be used, within certain limits, to repair or replace damaged or destroyed property not covered by

insurance. Physical damage disaster loans on homes are limited to \$50,000. Loans on non-insured personal property loan is limited to \$55,000. Refinancing of existing mortgages is also available in certain circumstances of severe damage, to a maximum of \$50,000. In general, business loans are limited to \$500,000.

Under the new law the SBA interest rate for non-business organizations will continue seven and 3/4-percent. These loans do not require a test to see if credit is available through the private sector. The seven and 3/4-rate is tied to the cost of money to the U. S. Treasury. This rate will be reviewed at the start of the fiscal 1980 year (October 1, 1979). The new law includes this sub-section on obtaining credit from the private sector: "Credit elsewhere means the availability of sufficient credit from non-Federal sources at reasonable rates and terms, taking into consideration prevailing private rates and terms in the community in or near where the concern transacts business for similar purposes and periods of time."

**Bullock Names Burleson**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has named attorney Wm. Daniel Burleson to succeed Walt Lillie as director of the Comptroller's office of Planning and Research.

Lillie, an employee of the Comptroller's office for more than nine years and the director of Planning and Research for the past three years, will resign effective December 31, 1979.

Burleson, an officer of Martin Ryan Haley and Associates, an international management firm and former chief legal counsel and deputy executive director of the Texas Air Pollution Control Board, will assume his new post on November 1, 1979.

Lillie's responsibilities for the Comptroller included revenue estimates and fiscal analysis as well as liaison between the Comptroller and the Legislature.

Lillie, 36, told Bullock his reason for leaving the department was to look at other job opportunities to advance his professional career outside the Comptroller's office.

"Walt's done a great job for me and the people of Texas. I can understand his ambition to reach the top in his field and I wish him well," Bullock said.

Burleson, 36, a graduate of the University of Texas School of Law, was also a former legislative assistant to U.S. Representative Dick White, D-Texas, and U.S. Representative Floyd Hicks, D-Washington.

He was formerly on the staff of the University of Texas in the mid-1960's, including posts as assistant to the chairman of the government department and assistant director of Intramural Sports.

**Drug Abuse Center In Dallas**

A Women and Prescription Drug Abuse Center, focusing on education and referral, has been set up at Methodist Hospitals of Dallas.

The center, funded by a grant from the Texas Department of Community Affairs, is designed to provide a community clearinghouse for information on prescription drug abuse. The center is based at Charlton Methodist Hospital and affiliated with the Alcohol Dependency Treatment Center there.

Marcia Friedman, program director, explains that the center will first try to identify the problem of prescription drug abuse, then move into community education and referral. "We are aware that there is a problem with prescription drug abuse, but the exact scope or extent of the problem has yet to be defined," she said.

The center will provide a crisis hotline, for counseling and referral, a library of information on prescription drugs and set up workshops for community and professional education. "We need to educate women and physicians on the fine line between taking prescribed drugs and stepping beyond the bounds of the original prescription," Ms. Friedman said.

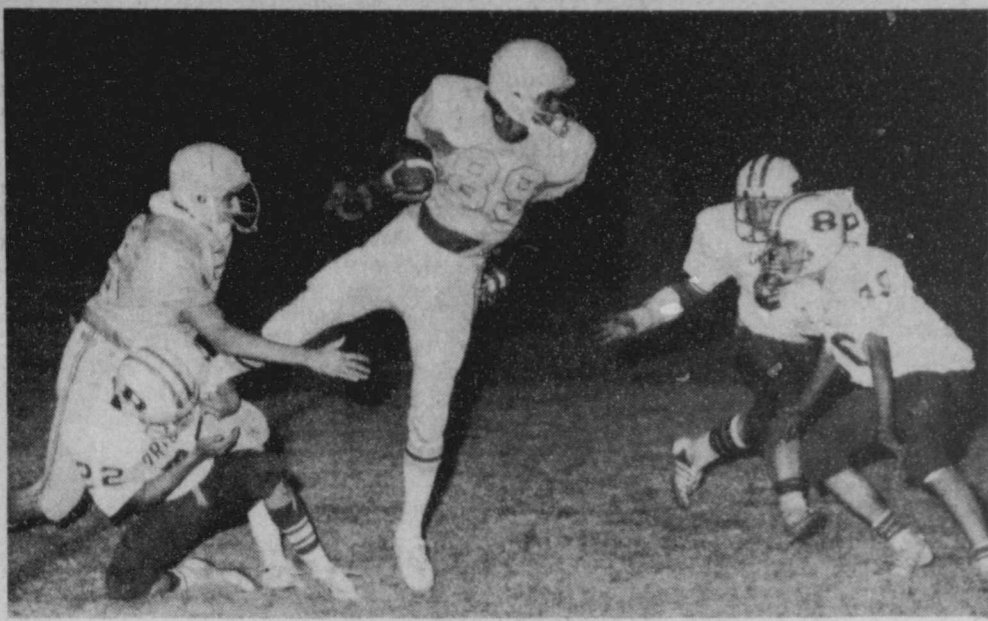

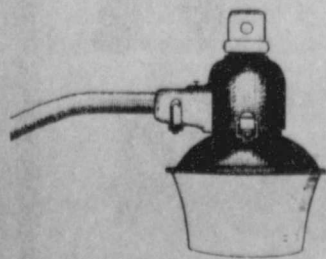

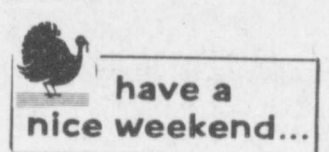

## Social Security Applications Can Be Taken By Telephone

Your local Social Security Office has initiated a new system called "teleservice" by which applications for old-age retirement, survivor, disability and supplemental security income benefits can be taken by telephone.

This new system will cut down on the time it takes Social Security to get the

process started in getting applicants paid. Time will also be saved in the time it takes an individual to file a claim. We can take these claims in about 20 minutes at the most, whereas it probably would take an hour if an individual came into the office.

Also, with the present energy crunch, more people will probably prefer handling their business affairs by telephone whenever possible. So in the privacy of your home or office you can call the Social Security Office and a representative will fill out your application, inform you what further evidence is needed to process your claim, use a computer to order your earnings record and other SSA data, and when everything is in order, mail you the application for your signature.

Special telephone equipment has been added and specially trained individuals in this "teleservice" unit have been placed.

Offices will be open for those who wish to come by in person. This new procedure saves about a third of the time usually required.

### This Man Is Half Retired

Charles "Shak" Shakelton, 81, considers himself "half retired." He still operates a hardware store in Aurora, New York. Up until 1971 he also operated a funeral business, which he had operated with an assistant and his wife, Cora, since 1926.

"I didn't work more than I had to," said Cora Shakelton, about her part in the funeral business. "I did the flowers and played the organ when I was needed."

The Shakeltons' funeral home occupied a house with 22 rooms and 3 floors. "Of course we didn't use all 22 rooms," Cora adds, "The cats had the third floor pretty much to themselves."

Charles Marion Shakelton was born on 11 May,

1897, in Hobart, New York, the second of four boys. As a young man, he taught in a one room country school before moving to Washington, D.C. for a job with the Veteran's Administration.

"I was a clerk in the insurance division. Oh, we worked like the devil in those days. We had a quota to meet."

John, the oldest Shakelton brother, was working at Hines funeral home on 14th Street in Washington and Charles became interested in the funeral business through him. He arranged to work at Hines during his summer vacation.

"The first time they left me alone with two bodies on the table I was scared to death. I began to wonder if I could handle this. But

then, one day, I got a rush call—they had an emergency and I had to work so fast I didn't have time to be scared. I was never frightened after that."

In 1926 Charles and Cora went back to New York to be near Cora's mother who was in ill-health and bought both the funeral home and the hardware business. "... to keep me busy," he laughed.

"Shak" is still busy in the hardware store five days a week and it isn't likely that Charles Marion Shakelton will ever become "fully retired." He will always find something useful to do. Last October the entire village of Aurora honored the Shakeltons at the "Charles Shakelton's Recognition Night..." for their fifty years of service to the Community.

ACCORDING TO a fact book compiled by The National Council on the Aging, since the turn of the century, the number of persons

who continue to work after reaching age 65 has declined dramatically. The trend has been particularly marked in recent years and is expected to continue.

In 1900, two of three males 65 plus were employed; in 1950, less than one in two; and in 1975, one in five. In 1990, one in six is projected.

Retirement from the labor force is taking place at progressively earlier ages. Mandatory retirement policies are a major contributing factor.

IN ST. LOUIS, Senior Home Security, Inc., a non-profit agency, serves older residents by providing low-cost home repair and improvement assistance. The agency also has funding available for insulation materials and, if an older person meets income guidelines, he or she can have their attic insulated and their doors weatherstripped free.

*It Only Hurts When We Laugh Dept.* The following statements are exactly as they appeared on car insurance claims filed by some unlucky — and still dazed — motorists:

- "To avoid hitting the bumper of the car in front, I struck the pedestrian."
- "An invisible car came out of nowhere, struck my vehicle, and vanished."
- "I saw the slow-moving, sad-faced gentleman as he bounced off the hood of my car."
- "The indirect cause of this accident was a little guy in a small car with a big mouth."

Seventy-five percent of all traffic accidents causing death or injury occur within 25 miles of the victim's home. Half of all car accidents occur at speeds below 40 mph. Moral: Seatbelts aren't just for freeways or long trips.

The government claims the 55 mph limit saves gasoline. Does it really make much of a difference? — O.R., Pampa Yes, it does, both to the individual and the nation. As your car's speed increases, so does its wind resistance — a big factor in gas mileage. Most cars can get about 28 percent more miles to the gallon at 50 mph than at 70. At 55 mph your mileage is 21 percent better than at 70. (That's a saving of four out of every twenty gallons!)

If consumers used less gas, demand wouldn't be so great and (hopefully) prices wouldn't rise as high. And we might avoid California style rationing and gas station waiting lines. The Federal Highway Administration says that if everyone went 55 mph, we could save three billion gallons of gas a year. That ain't no drop in the bucket... or tank!

Oh, Well, Back To The Old Drawing Board... The idea of motorized transport fascinated but baffled inventors for centuries. Even the great Isaac Newton couldn't solve the problem. Sometime in the late 1600's, after figuring out the mathematics of the Law of Gravity, Sir Isaac designed a jet-propelled steam carriage. Unfortunately, it would have required operating speeds in excess of 700 miles an hour, somewhat impractical for the muddy roads of the time, so the idea was shelved.

1 pound each of carrots and onions (about 8 medium carrots, halved and about 16 small whole onions)

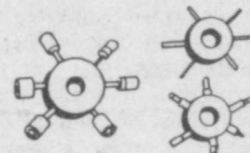
1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup

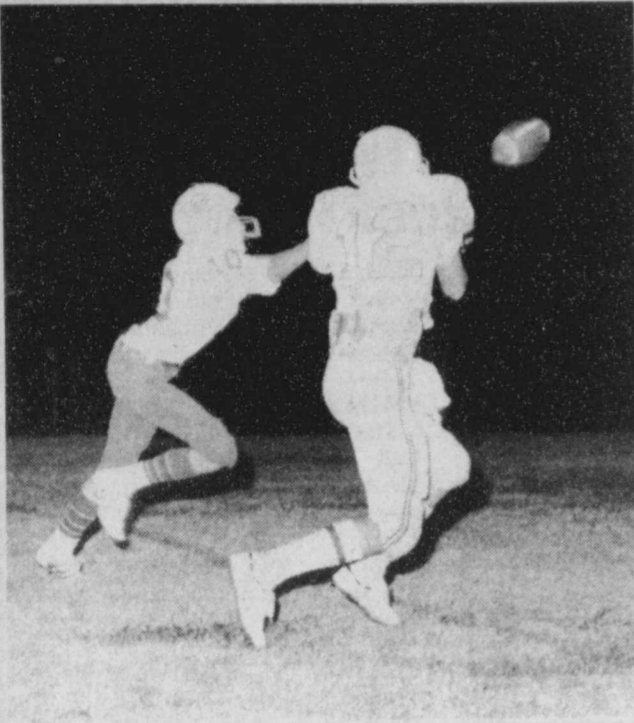

The Texas Arts and Crafts Foundation currently seeks applications from young artists and crafts people for the \$500.00 scholarship given annually by the Kerrville

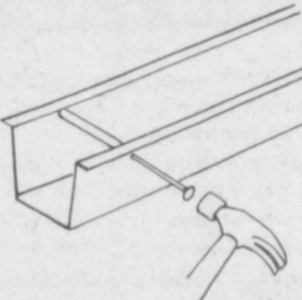
based non-profit organization. The scholarship is for the school of the young artist's choice. Applications must be received by December 31, 1979 to be eligible.

#### Save Gutters

Check gutter hangers for tightness. If they are "strap" type and are loose, re nail with galvanized nail or tighten with galvanized screw. If the hanger is "Sleeve and spike" type and is loose, re nail with galvanized or aluminum spike.
