TSGT. DEWEY G. SMITH AWARDED 4th CLUSTER

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England—With more than two hundred combat hours as a top turret gunner on a B-17 Flying Fortress, Technical Sergeant Dewey G. Smith, 26, of Abernathy, has been awarded the fourth Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal for "meritorious achievement."

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walton Smith, Abernathy. A graduate of the Abernathy High school, he joined the AAF in October, 1942.

Sgt. Smith is a veteran of more than thirty of the Eighth Air Force's large scale bombing attacks on important targets within Nazi Germany.

"I think flak over the oil refinery at Merseburg was the worst I have ever seen," said Sgt. Smith. "I could see Forts going down all over the sky."

Sgt. Smith is a member of the 487th Bomb. Group commanded by Colonel William K. Martin of Ogden, Utah. The group is a unit of the Third Air Division, the division cited by the President for its now historic England-Africa shuttle bombing of Messerschmitt plants at Regensburg in August, 1943.

Cpl. Elmo Webb Is Overseas



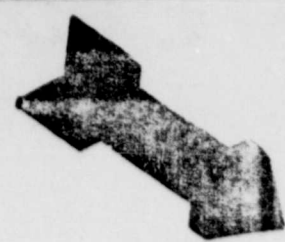
