## Ozona Boy In Critical Condition

A 10-year-old Ozona boy was in critical condition Tuesday in Hendrick Hospital in Abilene where he was taken Sunday following a motorcycle accident here that morning. He suffered extensive head injuries.

William Shayne Layman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Layman, was injured about 11 a.m. when the motorcycle he was riding flipped over. The youngster was riding in the draw when apparently the cycle hit a rock causing him to lose control. The vehicle flipped in the air, throwing young Layman to the ground on his head. Witnesses to the accident said the boy was thrown about 60 feet from the point of the incident and that he was wearing a helmet at the time.

DPS Trooper Joe Miles investigated the accident.

## Tracksters Win Third In Iraan's Cactus Relays

The Ozona Lions picked up a third place Saturday at the Cactus Relays in Iraan behind some stiff competition. Crane won the meet with 129 points, followed by Alpine with 128½ points and Ozona with 120 points. The Lions improved their point production and nearly all times were bettered from the week before.

The Lions scored in 13 of the 14 events with 11 of the 22 team members gathering points. Blake Moody led the Lions with 30 points, Steve Pagan was second with 23, Fred Garza followed with 19 points and Randy Allen with 16. Dan Sewell contributed 11 and Jesse Garza had 8.

Coach Sewell expects the Lions first victory of the season this weekend in Sonora at the Bronco Relays. The entire squad will compete at Sonora because of a Jr. Varsity division being included in the meet. Sewell said this will be a fine time for Lion fans to see the team compete as the finals are set to begin at 6:30 Friday afternoon.

The coaches and Lions are eagerly awaiting completion of the new track facility. Although the Annual Lions track meet had to be cancelled because of the construction, the new track will be an aid to the Lions in preparing for the district meet which will be held at Kermit, April 15.

Complete results of the Iraan meet follows: The 440 relay, Ramos, Allen, Sewell, Moody, fifth, 47.3; Johnny Rodriguez was 4th with 2:11.7 in the 880; Gene Galindo, 5th with 2:16.3 in 880; In the 120 HH, Steve Pagan was 1st with 15.9; Fred Garza, 2nd with 16.3 and Dan Sewell, 5th with 17.3. In the 100 Blake Moody was third with 10.8. Paul Zapata was 5th in the 440 with 55.6. In the 330 IH Steve Pagan was first with 41.3 and Fred Garza, second with 42.3. Randy Allen was 4th in the 220 with 24.7 and Jesse Garza placed second in the mile with 4:55.1. The mile relay team of Allen, Moody, Pagan and Garza was third with 3:40.5. Randy Allen placed fifth with 5'6" in the high jump. Blake

Moody took first in the long jump with 19'6½" and Dan Sewell was third with 17'9½". Moody took first in the pole vault with 12'0" and Sewell was second with 12'0". Javier Reyes placed fourth with 122'10" in the discus.

Local law officers have been kept busy the past week with automobile accidents and vehicle thefts at the top of the list.

## Law Busy With Thefts & Wrecks

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## Court Sets Beer Sales Election In Mon. Meet

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday in regular monthly session with the highlight of the meeting a petition signed by 312 qualified voters asking for an election for the off premises consumption sale of beer in Justice Precinct 1, Crockett County, which, unlike the commissioners' precincts, takes in all of Ozona proper and most of the rest of the county.

The court was also notified by Crockett County Hospital Administrator Keith Peters that Dr. David Blanton had resigned from the hospital staff and would be moving the last of March. Peters said the board had been making inquiries for another doctor for Ozona.

The election for the sale of beer was set by the court for Saturday, April 8. Those promoting the election have deposited a check with the county clerk to pay for the election. The county is only required to pay for one such election each 12 months. Also, as required by law, the court had to set a date for the election not more than 20 days nor less than 30, following the certification of the petition. An election for the off-premises consumption sale of all alcoholic beverages failed here January 10 by a narrow margin.

The court spent much of the morning discussing the summer paving with Road Department head Von Parker. Extra help for the summer work was discussed and the court suggested Parker hire summer students who would return to school in the fall since counties now come under the unemployment compensation law. He was authorized to purchase a 4700 gallon asphalt tank in the amount of \$4300. The purchase was approved as an emergency purchase. The court also asked Parker to begin now getting bids for paving materials.

Commissioner Marley had to leave the meeting at mid-morning to attend a pre-trial hearing on a civic suit filed against him by Sostenes DeHoyos contesting the election in precinct 1. He told the court that Evert White, election judge in that precinct, had asked to be replaced and the court agreed to find a replacement. In discussing election judges, it was reported Donnie Laugh-

lin had been appointed judge of the absentee box in place of Bud Hoover. Other than asking Bill Black to find someone to hold the school election in Powell Field in the absence of Nancy Hale, election judges will remain the same.

Dudley McCary reported the concrete ramp at the courthouse had been completed and a 30-minute discussion on what with and how to cover it ensued. He was asked to talk to indoor-outdoor carpet dealers and come up with a solution. McCary reported 29 ceiling tiles had been replaced at the youth center at a cost of \$3 apiece.

Tommy Stokes, chief deputy tax assessor-collector, met with the court and called its attention to the bad condition of the floor in the tax office and hall of the annex. He was asked to get prices on tile and indoor-outdoor carpet. The court decided to have an on-spot investigation before deciding what to do about the hall and a leaky water fountain.

Billy Reagor appeared on behalf of the Lions Club to ask the court's assistance in finding playing fields or improving present locations to accommodate all the summer baseball clubs. He said the Lions were going to sponsor a senior league, which would be an extension of Little League and would take in boys between the ages of 15 through 18. The problem of so many teams and so

few playing fields was discussed and the court suggested all teams get together and work out a playing and practice schedule which would benefit all.

Reagor reported the county 4-H program had had a very successful year, winning many blue ribbons in livestock shows. He said the range and grass judging teams were now organizing.

Keith Peters was on hand to give the hospital report and besides reporting the loss of Dr. Blanton to the staff, he said he had been in contact with two physicians prior to Monday's meeting who had indicated an interest. Peters reported that new laws had caused some complication with Medicare patients in the care center and asked if he should keep affected patients on a partial-pay basis or take other action. The court made a rule when the center opened not to accept partial-pay patients and Peters said he felt the court should decide the outcome of the present difficulty. He was told to just let it go for the next two or three months in hopes the law would be changed. There was no positive action taken.

Peters reported there are presently 32 patients in the care center, the most ever. He said he was presently completing the paper work to turn the four hospital rooms nearest the center into private rooms for care center patients.

At 7:00 Primary school students including kindergarten, first grade, and second grade under the direction of Miss Linda Wylie, music teacher, presented a program of singing and dancing.

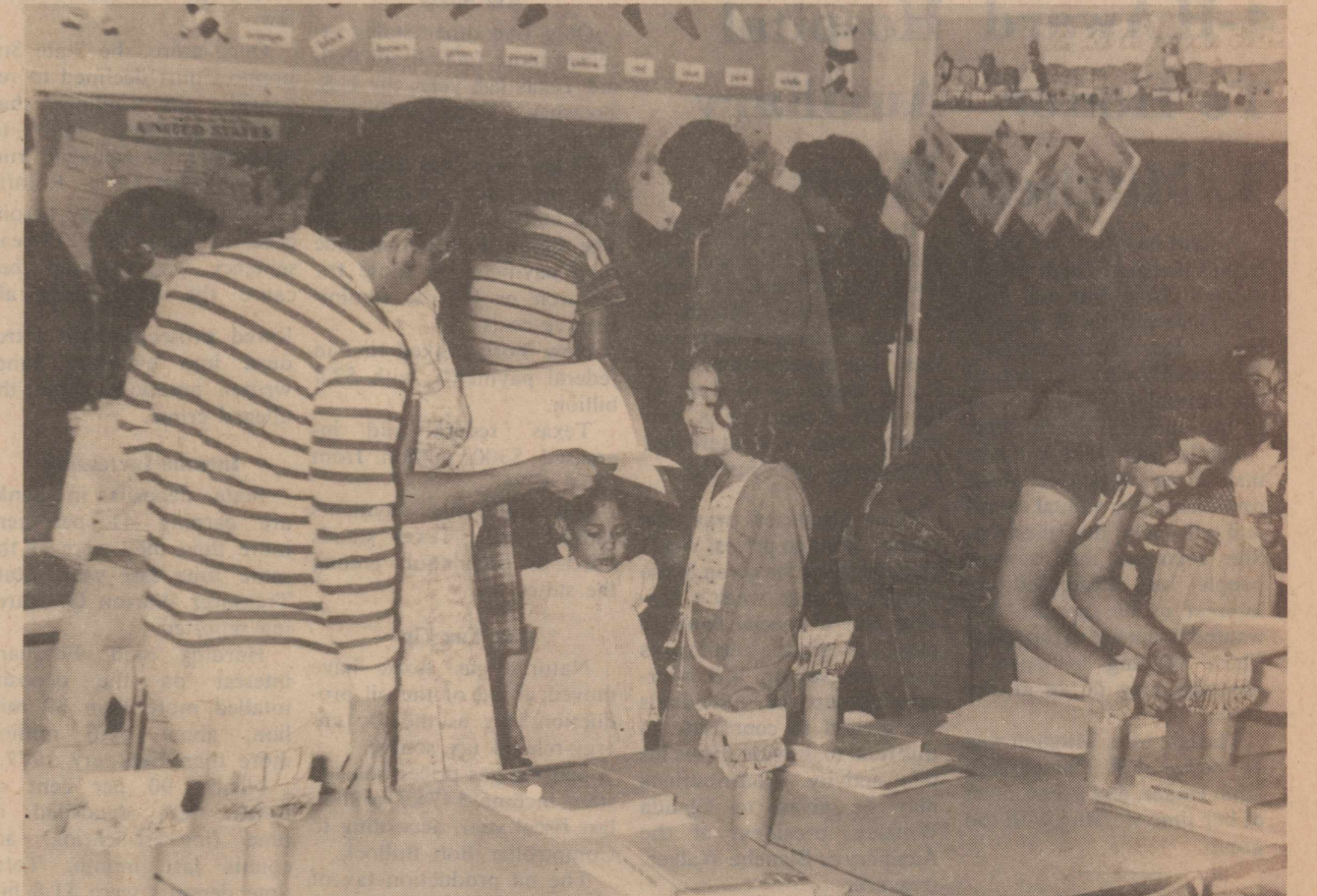

**you and the LAW**

**Q: Is it necessary for me to appoint more than one executor in a will, in case the executor dies before I do?**

**A: No, but under Texas law it is advisable.** If the only person named as executor in your will dies before you die, or dies before your estate has been settled, the court can appoint an administrator for the estate when a qualified person applies. However, it will be much less expensive and much more simple to settle your estate if your will names a person to serve as Independent executor, without bond. It also should name a second person who will take over as independent executor in case the first person dies before your estate has been settled.

**Q: I bought a T.V. on credit but never finished paying for it. The appliance store won a law suit against me but could not get the T.V. back because it was ruined in a fire. Can the sheriff take my car to pay off the judgment?**

**A: No.** The sheriff cannot seize your car to satisfy the judgment since you did not give the store a lien on your car. Texas law exempts certain property from seizure to satisfy debts including two vehicles, clothing, home furnishings and tools of the trade. But remember that this exemption does not apply if you voluntarily give the store a lien or security interest in the property.

**Q: Can a will be written for me to allow my wife and**

**children to avoid inheritance taxes? It just doesn't seem right that they should have a heavy tax burden just because I die.**

**A: Inheritance taxes** which may be imposed on your estate after you die cannot be avoided simply by a provision in your will. However, inheritance and estate taxes can be minimized by proper estate planning. For example, proceeds from a life insurance policy on your life would not be taxed if your wife paid the premiums on the policy. This is because your wife would own the policy and the proceeds from the policy would not be part of your estate and would not be subject to taxes.

**Q: I've been told that banks are the only institutions that have a legal right to demand a service charge for a check that has bounced. If this is true, what gives grocery stores and other businesses the right to charge for bad checks? And, is there any ceiling on the amount businesses can charge for returned checks?**

**A: Texas law** contains no provisions regulating the charges made for bad checks. State law regulates the amount of interest which is charged for credit, but the amount of service charges—such as the charge for a returned check—is not interest and therefore not covered by consumer credit laws.

The late Mrs. Mitchell was an active 4-H Horse Club adult leader, and spent much of her time working with the group.

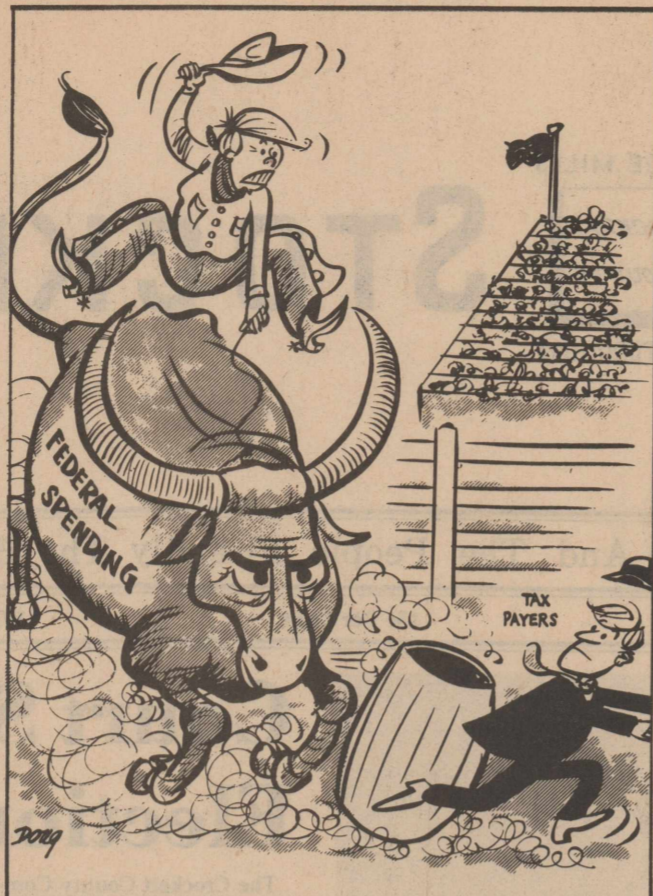

**STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights**

**AUSTIN**—Southwestern Bell is asking the Texas Public Utility Commission for authority to increase telephone rates in the state by \$214.3 million.

The increase if granted would raise one-party residential rates by 75 cents a month in small towns and up to \$1.20 a month in the largest cities—plus the gross receipts levies of most cities ranging from two to four percent.

One-party business charges would increase on the same basis by \$1.60 in smaller towns and \$3.80 a month in big cities, plus taxes. Bell in September 1976 asked PUC for a \$298.3 million rate increase, but the commission granted only \$57.8 million of that. Bell's appeal has been unsuccessful, though the State Supreme Court has set a hearing April 5 on the company's request for clarification of how the rate base was determined by PUC and other related legal questions.

Company officials said inflation and a required \$1 billion a year expenditure to keep up with customer demands for expansions make present rates "grossly inadequate." PUC Chairman George Cowden indicated a pre-hearing conference will be scheduled within 20 days and a full hearing in May. Bell also is seeking increases in one-time charges for installations or rearrangement work done at customer request.

No increase was requested for long distance, pay telephone rates, directory assistance or WATS services. A slight increase was proposed—from \$1.60 to \$1.70 a month—for extension phones.

**Aid Soars**

Only five other states received more federal aid than did Texas last year, the U.S. Treasury Department reports.

Texas' take was \$2.9 billion in direct payments to state and local governments. The figure does not include such payments as those for research or federal administrative costs.

New York ranked first in federal payments, with \$7.4 billion. Texas' federal aid increased \$300 million from fiscal 1976.

But while her payments ranked sixth, Texas stands third in population among the states.

**Gas Tax Up**

Natural gas taxes have moved ahead of the oil production levy as the top energy-related tax source.

Soaring gas prices boosted state income \$474.3 million last fiscal year, according to Comptroller Bob Bullock.

The oil production tax of 4.6 percent of market value per barrel, at the same time, fell to third place among energy-related levies, still yielding \$426.4 million.

Motor fuel taxes, including the five-cents per gallon gasoline tax, climbed four percent to \$444.1 million. The utilities gross receipts tax, increasing 29 percent, brought in \$58.5 million in fiscal 1976.

The sales tax remains the state's most profitable levy, climbing to nearly \$1.7 billion, about \$200 million more than in fiscal 1976.

**Crime Increasing**

Crime continued to increase sharply in 1976, according to a new survey by the Department of Public Safety statistical analysis center.

One out of five Texans over 16 was a victim of crime in the year surveyed, the study showed. Violent crime increased 24 percent, and property crime 16.4 percent. Financial losses from crime jumped from \$850 million in 1975 to \$970 million in 1976, with the average loss increasing to \$109 per person.

**Courts Speak**

The U.S. Supreme Court ruled 6-3 that smaller political units which do not conduct voter registration are nevertheless covered by requirements of the controversial federal voting rights act.

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the death sentence conviction of a San Antonio man, holding a change of venue should have been granted in the case, moving trial from Bexar County.

A State Supreme Court decision found an insurance policy on a boy whose father failed to inform the company his son had a form of anemia did not cover him.

The high state court also determined school districts can force teachers to retire before age 65 under a 1969 law.

Once more, the State Supreme Court declined to reconsider its findings that state regulations apply to the homes for teenagers run by evangelist Lester Roloff.

An Orange county heroin case, resulting in a 25-year sentence was reversed, because the trial judge allowed prosecutors to introduce into evidence handwritten notations about the alleged crime.

**Income Increasing**

State deposits in banks are earning 41 per cent more than they were at the same time last year, State Treasurer Warren G. Harding reported.

Harding said February interest on the deposits totalled more than \$9 million, about \$2.6 million more than February 1977.

Nearly 90 per cent of funds were deposited in time (interest-bearing) accounts last month. Total time deposits were \$1.8 billion, compared with \$1.3 billion a year ago.

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**Tips For Gardeners**

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

When the strong and un-welcome winds hit and leave very little moisture, it is very discouraging to begin gardening, but let a few beautiful, calm and warm days arrive, there is the urge to really get started.

When driving around over our city there is evidence of many busy gardeners hoping to have favorable weather for a beautiful spring. Some bulbs are giving color to the landscape, but the fruit and flowering trees have yet to show color. Maybe this will give them a better chance not to get a freeze, which so often happens here.

All dead leaves should be removed from iris and fed if you haven't fertilized earlier.

Good Friday (March 24) will be here soon, and is an excellent day for planting flower and some vegetable seeds, and usually safe to set out new plants.

Move house plants from stronger sunshine if they prefer subdued lighting. Most plants that do not bloom are in this class, along with African violets. Keep plants turned to avoid all foliage facing one side, and begin grooming for the flower show next month.

If you have a garden that is too shaded for many sun-loving plants, a garden of ferns, either alone or in combination with wild flowers, is a good choice. Early spring is the best time to transplant ferns, when new growth is very young or has not yet begun. Try to retain soil around roots when digging crowns. Look for native species in the woods, maybe friends have some to share, or visit a nursery specializing in ferns and other native plants. There are several summer blooming bulbs that do well with ferns.

Remove all shoots originating below the graft union on fruit trees. The graft union is the small bulge in the trunk, a few inches above soil level.

This knowledge of the balanced diet will help you to fight food fads and "wonder" foods.

Faddism and nutrition nonsense have created a major public health problem, with Americans squandering \$2 billion on food fads. These people are fooled, because they don't know--or won't accept scientific facts about foods and nutrition. Ignorance, indifference and fear are the major factors that contribute to the situation.

Victims are persuaded that 'health foods, wonder diets, or super pills' can produce magical results. These people accept false promises of the quick and believe they can regain 'youth, vigor and charm'--lose ugly fat, no counting of calories, no exercise. And they believe claims, such as those for having nerves soothed while miraculously being cured of whatever ails them.

Food fads and nutrition quackery are dangerous because essential nutrients may be lacking from the fad diet--malnutrition could result. Instead, a variety of foods will produce a wholesome diet. Also, children following a fad diet may not get the nutrients they need for growth and development.

In addition, attention to a serious ailment may be delayed while a food faddist or quack attempts to treat the condition.

## More Texans Growing Gardens This Year

More and more Texans are growing gardens--or "growing their own groceries."

Gardening fever is again taking hold in Texas as spring approaches. Indications are that almost 60 percent of all Texas households will engage in some type of gardening activity this year--be it a full-fledged backyard garden, a window box or a few containers on the patio. In the U.S., some 51 percent of all households now take an active part in gardening.

What's so alluring about gardening? "It's the challenge of growing your own tasty vegetables," contends Sam Cotner, horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "There's just something about home-grown vegetables that can't be matched with those found in supermarkets. Furthermore, gardening is a wholesome activity that can involve all members of the family."

For a successful venture into gardening, families need to give particular attention to a few basics. Cotner lists these:

**Watering**--Water enough to penetrate the soil to a depth of at least 6 inches. Water in the furrow between rows of crops when possible. When using a sprinkler, water in the morning to allow plant leaves to dry before night; this prevents disease problems.

**Weed Control**--A hoe is the best way to get rid of undesirable plants. Chemical weed control is undesirable and unsatisfactory because of the wide range of crops grown in most gardens.

**Mulching**--This involves

applying any material such as straw, leaves, grass cuttings, bark, sawdust, compost or newspapers on the soil and around growing plants. Mulching helps increase yields, conserves moisture, prevents weed growth, regulates soil temperature, and reduces fruit rot.

**Pest Control**--Diseases and insects are usually a major problem in Texas gardens due to mild winters. Use chemical control measures only when necessary and be sure to follow the manufacturer's directions on the label.

**Harvesting**--Harvest vegetables at their peak of maturity for the best flavor. For maximum flavor and nutritional content, harvest the crop the same day it is to be canned, frozen or eaten.

"Keeping these few steps in mind, gardening can be fun and at the same time can provide tasty vegetables that can help cut your grocery bill," emphasizes Cotner.

The court approved a contract for the sign replacement program, but did not take action on a West Texas Utilities request that 75 street lights in Ozona be replaced with mercury-vapor heads at a cost of \$1,450 to the county. Utilities manager Pat Wester told Jones the new lights would put out more light for less electricity, cause less maintenance and generally improve the appearance of downtown Ozona. The court seemed to feel the lighting was the responsibility of the Utilities company.

The court designated a grievance committee, which law requires counties to have. Members of the committee automatically include the county sheriff, county clerk, county treasurer, district attorney and five names drawn at random from the last grand jury. The county judge is also a member, but has no vote in any action which might be taken. Names drawn were R.A. Adcock, C.R. Fuantoz, Don Laughlin, Leo Cervantez and Clayton Robinson. If these cannot serve, more names will be drawn.

Bids were opened for new fire equipment. Steve Kenley, fire marshal, was on hand. Only one bid was complete, that of Claude Wright and Associates of Houston. Other bidders were Sims Co. of San Angelo, Fire Appliance of Texas and West Texas Fire. After some discussion, the court decided to let Kenley and county auditor Dick Kirby study the bids and called a meeting for Monday for the court to take action.

Judge Jones read a letter from Pritchard and Abbott, county tax evaluators, asking for a date for the court to sit as an equalization board in order they might arrange their schedule. The court tentatively set Friday June 23, at 9:00 a.m. Before adjourning, the court authorized Kirby to transfer \$30,000 to the hospital account and \$10,000 to the care center fund.


