8 DIE, 10 HURT WHEN REBELS BOMB TRAIN

TEAPOT DOME LEASE UPHELD BY SINCLAIR COUNSEL

MATTER FIRST
MENTIONED ON
VISIT TO FALLGOVERNMENT CALLS ITS
FIRST WITNESS IN
BIG LEGAL TILT

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—Harry F. Sinclair first mentioned the lease of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve during his celebrated Christmas visit to the then interior secretary's New Mexico ranch in 1921, Martin W. Littleton, counsel for the oil operator, declared today before the jury hearing the criminal case against the two men.

In his opening statement to the jury of two women and ten men which was begun yesterday, Littleton said that during the last part of that visit, Sinclair had said he intended to lease the reserve number 3 (Teapot Dome).

Orders Investigation
Littleton testified that he was having an investigation made and that he was concerned he would find no determination about a lease until the investigation was completed, the attorney asserted.

Sinclair went to see Fall about the lease of the reserve in Oklahoma, he continued. The purpose of the visit was not to take up the lease of Teapot Dome, Sinclair testified, leading to the charge that the two men had conspired together against the government and that Fall had received large sums of money as a result of the transaction.

Referring to the plan for expanding naval crude oil for fuel oil in storage, which is intertwined with the whole oil lease battle, Littleton told the jury that Captain John K. Robison, the navy's representative in oil lease matters, would testify that he first suggestion for such exchange was made by him.

U. S. Marines And Constabulary Fight
Way Out Of Bandit Ambush Leaving
67 Irregulars And Four Soldiers Dead

(By Associated Press)
MANAGUA, N.E., Oct. 19.—After severe fighting with a force of 300 outlaws who suddenly closed in on them, a patrol of forty American marines and constabulary has escaped from irregulars operating in the Nueva Segovia department.

Sixty-seven irregulars were killed or wounded and four members of the constabulary were killed in the battle.

Search for Aviators
The fighting occurred when the patrol tried to penetrate bandit strongholds in search of two marine aviators. Second Lieutenant E. A. Thomas and Sergeant Frank E. Dowell, who were last seen running from their wrecked plane near Quilich.

One small patrol led by Private Jacob Treen passing through the brush engaged in a fierce fight with the bandits, killing four of them. The patrol finally managed to cut its way out, but lost horses, mule-rations, blankets and a compass in the encounter.

The report of the fighting sent here by the commanders of the patrol, Lieutenant George J. J. O'Shea, commanding a detachment at Jicoma, and Lieutenant J. B. O'Neil, described two instances which indicated the intensity of the battle.

PAROLE PAPERS
MAILED TO PEN
WILL FREE HIMCURTAIN ROLLS DOWN
ON STAGE CZAR'S
WINE PARTY

(By Associated Press)
ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 19.—Earl Carroll spent today at the Atlanta federal penitentiary awaiting papers that would give him liberty. His parole, recommended by the prison board and approved yesterday by Attorney General Sargent at Washington, was somewhere in the mails with indications that release probably would come tomorrow.

The Broadway producer faced a limited freedom after serving slightly more than four months of his year and a day sentence for perjury in connection with his sensational "bath tub" party on the stage of a New York theatre featuring Joyce Hawley, a charge girl, Countess Cathcart, who gained entrance to the country after brief detention on charges of "moral turpitude" was in attendance, with reported guests including Harry K. Thaw, Irvin S. Cobb, and Al Johnson among others.

Is Paroled To Attorney
The stage celebrity will be paroled to Herbert Adams, New York attorney, whom he listed in his application as his first friend, in conformity with the usual requirements for conditional release. The lawyer will be responsible for Carroll's good conduct during the parole period and subject to the latter's conformity to a list of good behavior conditions.

Carroll, under terms of the parole, must not frequent saloons or other places where intoxicating liquors are "sold or furnished," and moreover must not drink any intoxicating liquors. He will be required to associate with no persons of bad reputation during his parole period, and must conduct himself in all respects honorably and work honestly and diligently for himself and his employer, and to avoid "violating the law." These terms are the customary requirements for paroled government prisoners.

Actress' Jump From
Second Floor Fatal

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—Helen McCloskey, motion picture actress who donned her bridal veil and leaped from a window while grieving over the re-marriage of her divorced husband, found the death she sought. She died last night in a hospital, to which she was taken Monday. She came here a year ago from Hollywood, Calif.

Eventual Removal Of Federal Reserve
Bank Governor Seen By Local Bankers
In Commenting On Meeting At Abilene

Commenting on the action taken at a meeting of about 25 bankers of the Central West Texas district held at Abilene yesterday, when the removal of Lynn P. Talley as governor of the eleventh federal reserve district was urged, Lubbock bankers expressed the opinion today that there would be other similar meetings held over the federal reserve district, and that the removal of Talley would eventually be effected. The meeting at Abilene followed one of a similar nature held here last week, when the opening shot to oust Talley was fired.

C. E. Norman, of the Citizens National bank here, stated that there is no personal feeling against Talley held by the bankers, but that his policies of government of the district are entirely out of sympathy with the country bankers, and are detrimental to the welfare

Death Sentence
Of Underwood Is
Affirmed Today

Rehearing was denied W. M. Hoover, under life sentence from Wichita county for the killing of Katie Goodman and also was refused H. R. Carter, sentenced to 99 years from Dallas county for robbing W. C. Jamison of the Garland. While Sullivan, given life from Kerr county on murder conviction in connection with the slaying of David Sullivan, withdrew his appeal.

STINSON SHIP
LANDS SAFELYFORCED DOWN IN STORM
BUT LANDING MADE
WITHOUT INJURY

SHERBORN, Mass., Oct. 19.—Forced down in a storm, Ed Stinson's big yellow, cabin monoplane landed safely in a hay field today. It made a perfect landing last night although a raw "northeaster" for hours led to grave apprehensions that the plane and its passengers might have met serious mishap.

Stinson with his wife, Baroness E. Barnekow, German aviator, Philip Ashby, and J. T. Whitaker and Fred Koehler, two of his factory mechanics, were uninjured. They were driven to Farmington where they took a train to Boston.

Stinson, Detroit manufacturer, was on the last lap of an 18,000 mile tour undertaken to promote interest in airports. He made his landing about 9:30 in the evening but the apparent failure of any of the party to notify friends or airport authorities in Boston caused an extensive search to be started and resulted in many anxious moments until the big ship was finally located in this isolated place.

New Revolutionary
Plot Is Discovered

NOGALES, Ariz., Oct. 19.—Special dispatches to the Herald today say a new revolutionary plot against the Mexican government was discovered at Guadalupe, Jalisco, Monday. Several prominent business men of that city, alleged backers of the plot have been arrested.

Dancer Plunges To
Death In New York

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—Jane Johnson, 18, clad in green silk pajamas, plunged twelve stories to her death from a window of the hotel Claridge in Times Square today. She was employed as a ballet dancer at a salary of \$300 a week.

The girl's mother said her daughter had stepped in front of the open window as usual, to do a series of exercises. She had mentioned that she felt ill and wanted fresh air. When Mrs. Johnson next looked at the window, she said, her daughter had disappeared. The mother was certain that the fall was accidental.

September Births
Outnumber Deaths

Births outnumbered deaths in Lubbock the month of September according to figures from Dr. J. W. Rollo, city health officer. There were 21 deaths and 22 births reported. The ratio among the colored population was even, there being one male birth, one female death, one female birth, and one female death. Among the whites there were seven male births and six male deaths, 12 female births and 13 female deaths. There was one Mexican birth, with no deaths recorded among that race.

OFFICERS FIRM
IN DEMANDS ON
MINE STRIKERSBAN IN COLORADO ON
PICKETING TO BE
FIRMLY ENFORCED

(By Associated Press)
DENVER, Colo., Oct. 19.—Colorado, entering its second day of the I. W. W. coal miners strike today was prepared to enforce an edict issued last night by law-enforcing officials to prevent picketing by I. W. W. agitators of coal mines in the southern Colorado and Boulder coal fields.

With seventeen already in jail for picketing, law officers announced that picketers wherever found would be immediately arrested. Despite this threat the strikers in the Walsenburg district held a meeting last night and announced that men had been selected and that picketing would go on as planned.

The arrest of seventeen pickets in the Trinidad district by Sheriff J. J. Marty, marked the first action of authorities to prevent spread of the movement. The pickets were held without charge last night, but officers said they would be charged with violation of the state law requiring 30 days notice for strike orders. The authorities claim no such notice was given. The I. W. W. leaders maintained the law was complied with.

This new phase of possible trouble between the miners and peace officers combined with rumors current in the southern field that the I. W. W. organization had received a freight carload of machine guns, rifles, ammunition and explosives, as well as four carloads of food and supplies, caused an atmosphere of unrest. I. W. W. leaders denied that arms had been shipped in.

1,180 Miners Walk Out
A check of all mines in the Walsenburg district where the strike is considered the most effective, shows 1,180 miners out of a normal force of 2,584, answering the walk-out call.

Peace officers today are mobilized to maximum strength and are patrolling all districts while heavy guards have been placed around railroad bridges.

Organized labor leaders generally denounced the strike.

Earl Hoage, president of the Colorado Federation of Labor, said his organization would take no part in the movement, although he believes the miners had a just grievance.

Missing Man's Body
Found On Mountain

TWIN LAKES, Colo., Oct. 19.—The body of Richard L. Mather, wealthy resident of Niagara Falls, N. Y., who disappeared October 2 after he had started an ascent of Mount Elbert, was found by a searching party today. Mather had stumbled into a five foot prospect hole while wandering in a blinding snow storm.

His neck was broken by the fall. Mather's body was found about two miles south of the base of Mount Elbert, indicating that he had been forced back by the storm and had wandered in the wrong direction.

Mount Elbert, which Mather was attempting to scale, is over 14,999 feet high.

Labor Bureau Man
Arrives For Duty

R. F. Woodward, special agent for the federal employment bureau has arrived in Lubbock, and is placing cotton pickers on farms needing the pickers. He is maintaining an office in the Chamber of Commerce rooms at the city hall. All farmers needing pickers, and all pickers wanting work can aid in solving the farm labor problem by getting in touch with Mr. Woodward.

Knox-Johnson Suit On

E. E. Knox against J. E. Johnson consumed most of the session of the court today. The suit grew out of alleged trespass of land belonging to Knox by Johnson's cattle, who are alleged to have eaten feed crop on the Knox land.

Pilot And Plane
In Fall Fatal To
Five Unlicensed

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 19.—The pilot and plane in which five persons were killed here Saturday had not been licensed by the department of commerce, P. D. Cramer of that department said today on his arrival here to investigate the accident.

Buel Clark, the pilot, Ed R. Cayanaugh, his wife and young baby and W. B. Winburn, a newspaper reporter, were killed when the plane stalled at 200 feet and crashed.

Cramer will help San Antonio draw an ordinance for the supervision of commercial flying in this district in an effort to avoid similar accidents in the future.

GAS MERGER IN
TEXAS IS MADEAMERICAN GAS COMPLY
GAINS CONTROL OF
LINES

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Oct. 19.—G. L. Ostrum company, owners of the Austin Gas company, have effected a huge merger of natural gas companies in West Texas, by which the American Natural Gas corporation will serve over fifty communities, and will have access to the Panhandle and Oklahoma fields, according to notice received here by A. T. Knies, vice president, from E. C. Deal, president of the local company.

Further Merger Seen

Prospects of a further merger soon or late, of southwest Texas fields and the northwest Texas fields, was seen in the announcement.

The new company has a daily supply of over half a million feet of natural gas, besides control of gas in over 100,000 acres of the Amarillo field, it was said.

The merger brings the new corporation to San Angelo. It also serves Kansas and Oklahoma cities and has 2,275 miles of transmission lines.

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TWO DYNAMITE
BOMBS PLACED
BY SMALL BANDLOOTING FOLLOWS BUT
NONE OF PASSENGERS
ARE MOLESTED

(By Associated Press)
LAREDO, Texas, Oct. 19.—Eight persons were killed and ten wounded when a band of about one hundred Mexican rebels, well armed, attacked and looted a south-bound passenger train 30 miles south of San Luis Potosi Tuesday morning, according to information from passengers arriving here today from Mexico City.

Two dynamite bombs were placed on the tracks by the rebels, passengers said. One of the bombs exploded as the second class coach was passing on. Another bomb tore the tracks and the train came to a halt.

Passengers on the pullman and first class coaches were not molested by the rebels.

Express Car Looted

The express and mail cars were looted. It is believed the rebels took between 10,000 and 100,000 pesos.

The name of the chief rebel could not be learned, passengers said. After the attack the band went into the mountains.

As a result of this attack the northbound train from Mexico City arrived today six hours late.

Britisher Is Held
For Big Ransom

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Capture by Mexican bandits of W. E. Mitchell, general manager of the Amalgamated Mining corporation in the Mexican district, Nayarit, was reported to the state department today by the consul at Mazatlan. Mitchell is a British subject and is being held for 5,000 pesos ransom within five days under threat that he will be shot.

The British minister in Mexico City has made representation to the foreign office.

Seize Mail Pouches

The consul also reported that bandits had seized the mail pouch and payroll of 2,000 pesos for the Amalgamated Mining corporation. Soldiers of the small military escort had been killed. He added that the military protection afforded to the mines was still inadequate and that Mexican authorities had been requested to increase the force.

By direction of the state department, the embassy in Mexico City made similar representations to the foreign office.

Dallas Policeman
Held For Shooting

DALLAS, Oct. 19.—J. H. Dowdy, special Dallas police policeman, was under \$10,000 bond on a charge of murder Wednesday following the death of Rudolph Daniels, 22.

Daniels was shot Monday when he attempted to escape from Dowdy, who was trying to arrest him for threatening pecan trees in Berean Park, the officer said. A bullet lodged in the youth's spine and efforts to remove it were unsuccessful.

Mayor Burt has ordered all special park officers disarmed.

Man Suffers Broken
Limb In Collision

E. T. Hall, of 114 Avenue K suffered a badly broken leg as the result of a collision between a motorcycle ridden by him and another motorcycle here yesterday.

Both bones in the left leg were broken above the ankle, and attendants at the Lubbock sanitarium where he was taken, say that it will be necessary to put in a metal plate.

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—The third in our series of costume designs for special types of beauty brings us to the blonde.

Whenever I hear anyone say, "Oh, she can wear anything, any color," I know the speaker is talking about a blonde.

For blondes come nearer wearing any type of dress, any lines, any color than either the exotic brunette or the temperamental titans. But right there lies the danger. Wearing anything, fairly well, the blonde may forget her birthright.

That is to look dainty. She may be five feet tall or six—as is the beautiful wife of a famous portrait painter—but the blonde just must be dainty to be right. Meticulous grooming and careful choice of clothes achieve this.

Be Fussy, Blondes

Fussy clothes become the blonde more than other women. Such things as ruffles, tiered skirts, flounces and drapes, elaborate yokes, tricky little suits, and all the do-dads that the feminine heart seems to crave, detract less from a blonde than from any other type of beauty.

Pinks, apparently, were made for blondes, they can do so many things to her. A dawn pink enhances her daintiness and adds a modest note. Rose can make her look like a bewitching sophisticated flirt. But red again makes her demure and dangerous.

Blues are good, from the faintest robin's egg blue to midnight. So are greens. Browns are excellent on the demiblonde. Grays on others. Lavenders and purples sometimes are a riot on a blonde. But for yellows—the blonde could forego yellows unless she is a honey blonde, when a daffodil yellow

sometimes brings out the amber of her eyes and is stunningly lovely. The evening wrap shown today is designed with an eye to blonde feminine taste, though it is so skillfully worked that it appears simple. It is a rich cardinal red velvet wrap, fashioned in three tiers with the yoke and Elizabethan collar shirred, leaving plain disc of polka dots of plain velvet, which add a polka dotted motif. It is lined with shell pink crepe and has a spacious pocket inside for the opera glasses, vanity case and what-not a little blonde would need.

The little hat is another example of the simplest approach the blonde wears may have frills or farbelows added and she can get away with it. The hat is a charming little mushroom shaped of beige felt. Most women, for a daytime hat, would have only a banding. But Miss Chandler chooses an ornate wreath of velvet leaves in rich, dusky autumn reds, yellows and browns—and it makes her look demure!

Period Gowns Perfect

The period gowns, with their tightly fitted bodices and bouffant skirts are perfect on blondes. Nothing on earth is more dainty or more feminine than the fitted bodice of such "shimmering" materials. A flounce to give the grace and charm of old time full skirts.

The evening gown shown today is a Lanvin import—in shell pink, silver and diamante. The little bodice is of satin, fashioned tight, with a quail pointed yoke of silver spangles and diamante. A bow knot of similar trimming is worked in the circle of the bodice, with long streamers of the sparkling ornamentation swinging gracefully.

The bouffant skirt is made in four sections of chiffon, each flaring section double tiered, and all floating softly in rhythmic motion as the wearer dances. No jewels are needed with so dainty a dress as this. More than a tasselled neckline would, in fact, detract from the delicacy of the picture.

For while blondes can wear anything and all the ruffles their hearts desire, the wise blonde knows that the more feminine and child-like she appears, the more appealing she is. And she chooses her dainty costumes accordingly.

The American Interest In Football
By FIELDING H. YOST
(Director of Athletics, University of Michigan)

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Oct. 19 (AP). Residents of the United States are beginning at this time their greatest period of concentration on any one sport.

Continuing on to the end of November almost uncounted millions of people will see a football game at some time during the week and other untold millions will seek the accounts of the game in the newspapers or listen to description of the contest by radio. At the present time there are more than 40 organizations and groups of participation in football games. All most every state also has a high school organization or union.

Good Competition

These conferences and state organizations have helped to promote the highest quality of competition and have assisted in widening the appeal of the game by building up a common interest, a common eligibility as well as competitive possibilities. This latter is especially true of the high schools with their divisions according to their capabilities into A, B, C and D classes.

Why This Intense Interest in the Game?

Every nation has the songs and games that typify the spirit and interest of its people.

Differ in England
The English, pioneering in many of the games that have been transplanted to the United States, have their form of football and cricket. The Americans, developing these games have their form of football, baseball and basketball.

In many ways the games are similar—in one sense, however, they are vastly different.

Any one who knows the English temperament is not surprised that cricket is one of Britain's sports. No normal American, however, would go to a game of cricket, stop for tea, return to the game, spend a night in slumber, and go back the next day to see the first batter put out.

Speed is Added

It is really true that we took English football and cricket, added speed, action and rules that assured a speedy termination and developed our football and baseball. In doing so, games that better suited the temperament of America were developed. It is possible we have not developed better games, but we have developed better players.

Direct Primary Favored In Maine In Vote Tuesday

(By Associated Press)
PORTLAND, Maine, Oct. 19.—Maine has chosen to retain the direct primary. By a vote of nearly two to one the state in a special election yesterday rejected a referendum seeking a return to the caucus and convention system of nominating candidates for public office.

Although an active campaign has been carried on for weeks to bring about repeal of the primary law, the election brought only approximately 60,000 voters. The normal vote of the state is in the neighborhood of 200,000. Newspapers received few calls inquiring as to the result of the poll.

With 49 small points missing out of the 633 election precincts in the state the vote stood:

For repeal 19,586; against 35,357.

MORE MOVIES ABROAD

Reports from Europe indicate that 100 motion picture theaters, having a total seating capacity of 200,000, will be built in the various countries this year. Germany will have half of these, Great Britain 20 and Sweden 16, most of them being of the larger, or de luxe type. Uncle Sam is supplying much of the projection equipment in competition with France and Germany.

So far this year Japan has bought 254 projectors in this country, Canada 235, the United Kingdom 179 and Australia 156. It is expected total United States exports for the year will exceed 2,500 machines, about half of which will go to the Far East.

AVERAGE MAN IN AMERICA IS IOWA CITIZEN

AVERAGE IS GOOD ON ALL PHASES OF LIFE WRITER ASSERTS

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—The proprietor of a one man clothing store in Port Madison, Iowa, has been chosen as America's "average man" by William S. Dutton, writing in the American Magazine.

Neither a leader nor laggard in the affairs of his town, Roy L. Gray the "average" nominee, has an average car and is the head of a family of four which is the average used by the census bureau.

His is a church member who does not attend services regularly. His tastes in radio music run from current jazz to light classical compositions, and he believes the movies to be not as bad as they are reputed to be. The younger generation does not alarm him. He has an average interest in matters which do not directly affect his home or his business.

A party man in national politics, he is independent of local issues. His attitude on prohibition is non-committal because he believes neither wets nor dries are giving him accurate information on the issue. He is a member of the chamber of commerce, the Rotary club, the Elks and the Odd Fellows.

Interest in Home
"Most of all," he says, "I am interested in my home. And next comes my business and my home depends upon it."

He likes to read the current magazines better than anything else, but he reads the advertisements first because "they keep me in touch with the latest developments. In the newspapers he reads with interest about new inventions, then about great disasters or unusual crimes. Foreign news has no appeal for him, but the speeches of the president or the governor of Iowa he will read from beginning to end.

Nation-Wide Search
The choice of Mr. Gray to wear the title bestowed upon him ended a nation-wide search in which Mr. Dutton used a map, a weather chart and the census report, dividing the number of cities and towns in the country into its population to find that Port Madison was the average town in population, location and climate.

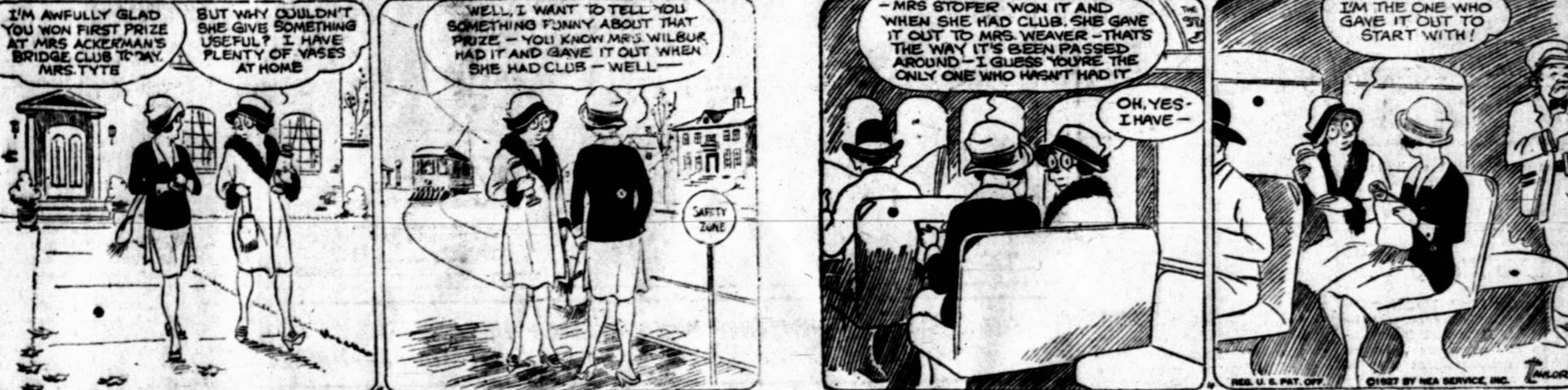

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REMUS, HIS BIG FORTUNE GONE FACING COURTS

COSTLY MANSION ONLY PHYSICAL EVIDENCE OF BIG ESTATE

(By Associated Press)
CINCINNATI, Ohio, Oct. 19.—A costly mansion set deep in the lawns and groves of a suburban estate is the only physical monument to the fortune George Remus reaped from his deals in contraband liquor.

Only half a dozen years ago he bought it after he had married Imogene Holmes in Chicago in 1920 and had left his law practice there to come to Cincinnati and pour millions in the bootlegging business. The \$10,000 nest egg with which he started.

Home Was Rebuilt
The old homestead on Price Hill, dating from civil war days, was virtually rebuilt by Remus in order that he might endow with a setting of splendor the wife upon whom he lavished his wealth and devotion.

Some three years ago Remus went away from the mansion to serve a term in federal prison for violation of the prohibition law, and when he emerged he served another in an Ohio jail on a similar conviction. His wife followed him to Atlanta, to live near him during his prison term—and then, shortly before his release, charged him with cruelty and sued for divorce. Remus countered with the allegation that she sought freedom to wed Franklin L. Dodge, Jr., then a prohibition agent active in gathering the evidence which sent Remus to prison.

Now in Jail Again
Now "Beautiful Imogene" is dead, and her husband, stripped of most of his fortune, is again in a jail cell—this time as the admitted slayer of his wife. He waited for her in a Cincinnati park October 6, and shot her as she journeyed to a divorce court to obtain her final separation.

Prosecution of Remus in his murder trial will develop upon Charles P. Taft II, youngest son of William Howard Taft, who became Hamilton county attorney last January after graduation from a law course at Yale.

Daughters Take Sides
Two girls will be arraigned on either side of the case—Romola Remus, 23, daughter of George Remus by a former marriage, who has sided with her father, and Ruth Remus, 20, adopted daughter of the Remuses and a companion of her foster mother the morning of the slaying, who will testify for the state.

Remus, the stocky son of German immigrants and himself a native of

Germany, predicted his career as a trafficker in liquor upon the twin beliefs that immunity could always be bought for a price and that bootlegging held a fortune, for a man who went into it intelligently on a big scale.

Largest Operator
He soon came to be regarded as the largest operator in the country. Setting up dummy drug concerns to veil his withdrawals of liquor from warehouses, he employed 3,000 persons, and he testified at a subsequent trial that during his career he bought and sold some 3,000,000 gallons of whisky. He paid \$20,000,000, he said, for plants and whisky; spent \$20,000,000 more corrupting officials; and made sales which grossed \$75,000,000. Income tax officials proved that in the summer of 1921 he deposited \$2,700,000 in one Cincinnati bank.

Finally he was convicted and sentenced to the Atlanta prison, after spending \$1,500,000 in his defense.

\$5,000,000 Estate
He estimated his wealth at \$5,000,000 on the day he went to Atlanta in a private car to serve his sentence. Of this he put \$1,000,000 in his wife's hands and "salted away" the rest, some with friends whom he later charged with cheating him.

In all his dealings he never regarded himself as a criminal. "I am only a business man," he said, "and my business ethics are the best."

Shortly before his release from Atlanta he was sued for divorce. He fought the suit for two years, and when it was nearing termination he accosted the motor car in which his wife and daughter were going to court, followed Mrs. Remus as she leaped from the machine, and fired a bullet into her abdomen.

ABE LINCOLN'S LOVE FOR WIFE HELD SUPREME

CONTENTION THAT HIS FIRST LOVE WAS HIS BEST DISCOUNTED

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—In the sense that they had complete confidence in each other, desired each other and that each was supplemented and complemented by the other, Abraham Lincoln and Mary Todd, the woman he married, "loved each other as neither had ever loved anyone else," Dr. W. E. Barton, noted student of the life of Lincoln, has concluded from an examination of the loves of the Civil War president.

Setting the stories of Lincoln's affairs of the heart in a volume just published on "The Woman Lincoln Loved," Dr. Barton dismisses the contention that Lincoln's love for Ann Rutledge, his first sweetheart, was so absorbing that he never was capable of another great affection.

That Abraham and Mary Todd Lincoln had frequent altercations is undoubted, Dr. Barton grants, but "though they were not always happy together, each would have been unhappy with anyone else, and neither would have been happy alone."

"He loved her. She was the only

woman to whom he never gave a ring, and in that ring were the words: 'Love is eternal.'"

First Love Died Early
Ann Rutledge was the attractive red haired daughter of a family at New Salem, Ill., where Lincoln lived when he first was elected to the legislature in 1834. She died in the summer of 1835, and Dr. Barton writes that although there is "no reason to doubt that Lincoln's sorrow was sincere, he was speedily in love again and again."

No one in New Salem suspected that he had loved Ann Rutledge with an incurable affection. Mary Todd, whom Lincoln married in 1842, when he was still a state legislator, was born in Kentucky and came to live with relatives at Springfield, the Illinois capital, while Lincoln was in public service there.

She had many suitors, but she chose Lincoln, and although they quarrelled often and both were minded at times to break the engagement, it led to the marriage which they mutually desired.

Dr. Barton treats in some detail the later life of Mrs. Lincoln—her difficult position during the Civil War, when she was accused by some of disloyalty to the Union while her three brothers were losing their lives in the Confederate army; her great poverty after her husband's assassination; her lapse from sanity in 1875; her release from an asylum in the following year and her death from paralysis in 1882, three of the four Lincoln children having preceded her to the grave.

"Her story," writes the student, "is a sad story, the story of a woman misunderstood and cruelly persecuted. But in the day when her heart was torn asunder, and most of her relations were on the opposite side, she was unflinchingly loyal to the United States. While she sometimes made her husband unhappy, and he not infrequently vexed her, she was an affectionate wife and mother, loving her husband with a passionate devotion and never failing in her faith in his character, his ability and his success."

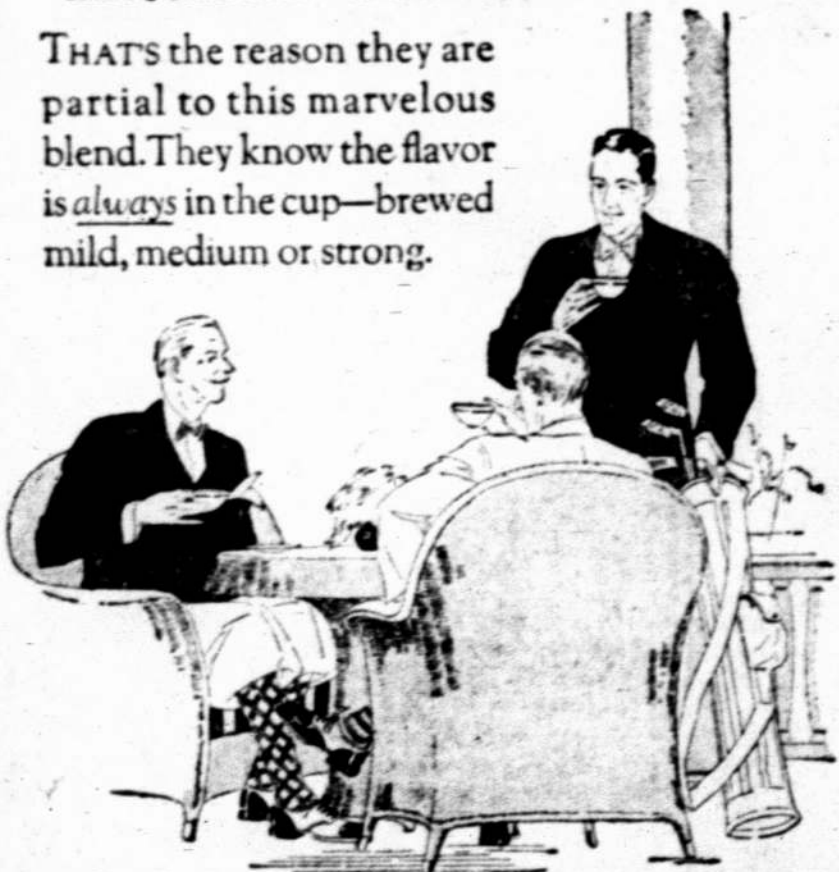
