New Jet Strip Site Of Chamber Fly-In

The new jet strip, located 10 miles northwest of Colorado City, should get a heavy work-out Tuesday when the Chamber of Commerce Fly-In is held.

Formerly Webb Air Force Base Auxiliary Airport, the jet strip will be used for the first time as a civilian airport Tuesday. A full slate of activities

has been planned for the Fly-In, beginning with breakfast at 7 a.m.

Serving will continue until 10 a.m. and cost will be \$2.50 per person with fly-ins served at no charge.

Parachutists and sky divers will fill the air from 8-11 a.m. when Lew Sparks and his sky diving team from Abilene present a show. They will be performing every hour on the hour.

An air show with visiting pilots will entertain spectators from noon until 1 p.m.

Contest action will begin at 1 p.m. with three events listed on the agenda.

From 1-2 p.m., the spot landing contest will be held with pilots trying to land as closely as possible to a marked target.

The balloon busting contest will be from 2-3 p.m. Pilots will try to bust helium filled balloons with the propellers of the planes.

The final contest slated is the flour sack bombing contest. Contestants will shoot for a marked target with a sack of flour. Teams will compete with a pilot flying the plane and a bombardier dropping the flour.

Trophies will be presented to winners in each contest, according to J. Q. Dockrey, co-chairman of

the aviation committee.

Throughout the day of air activities, spectators will be offered airplane rides for \$4.

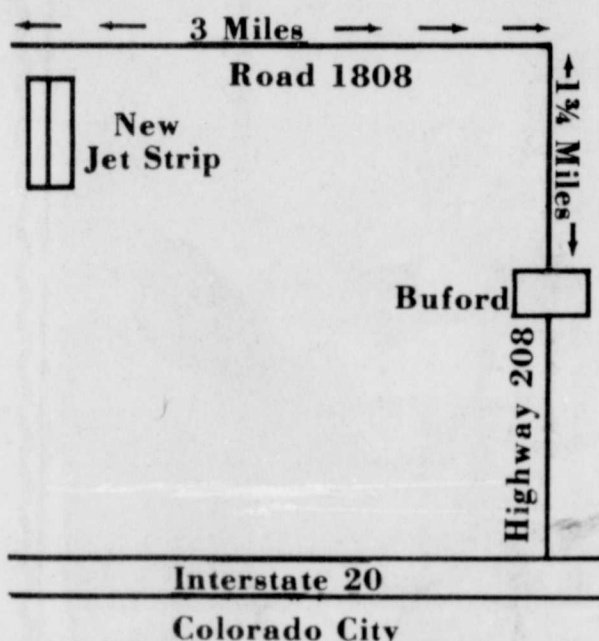
Although waiting lines for the plane rides have

been long in the past, Dockrey noted that this year—because of the longer airstrip—people should not have to wait as long.

Helium filled balloons will be available to the

crowd attending the Fly-In, as well as concession stands.

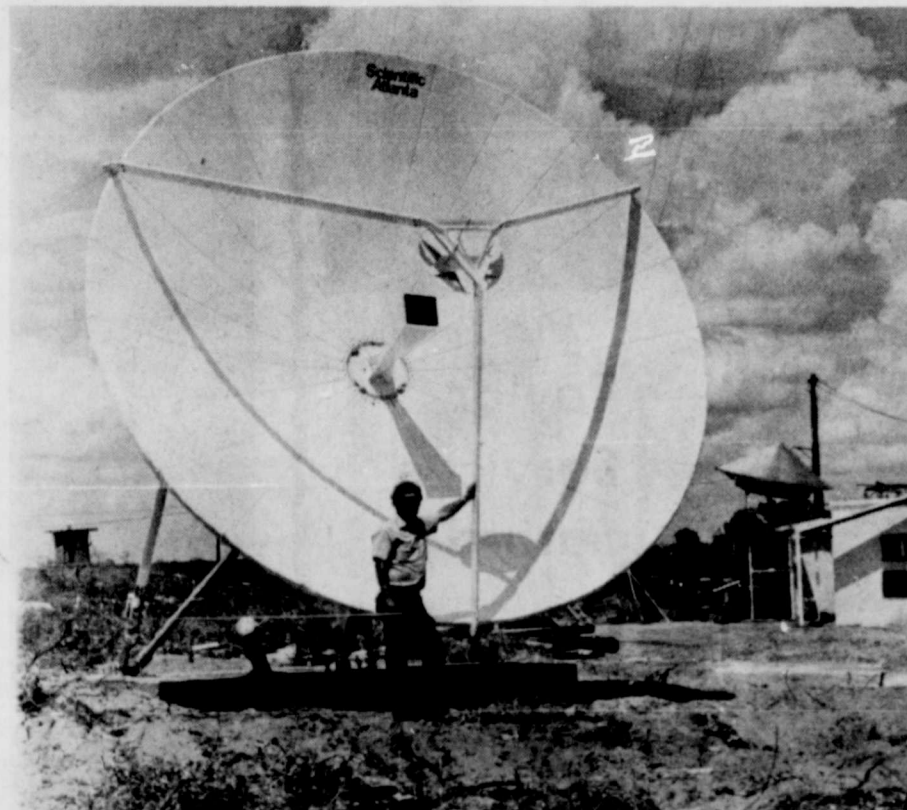

A lot of activities are going on this next week and if you haven't made your plans to participate, now is the time to set your schedule.

The traditional July 4th Fly-In promises to be bigger and better than ever and a lot of work and planning has gone into this annual event.

It should be an event that everyone will enjoy.

Then the day after the fly-in, the first annual Colorado City American Junior Rodeo gets underway. That'll start Wednesday and continue through Saturday.

If you've never seen an AJRA rodeo, you're in for a treat. The youngsters involved give it everything they've got and they can turn in some great performances.

Again, a lot of work and planning have gone into this event and it should be a most enjoyable week. Add these events to all of the regular attractions and events such as baseball and the lakes, and that will result in a lot of people being in the county.

An interesting article was brought to my attention by Bill Lester recently. The article, by Harold J. Haynes, chairman of the board of Chevron, appears in the spring issue of the Chevron magazine, *Chevron World*.

The article is entitled, "A Shortage of Time," and regards the energy issue. To quote in part, the article states:

"Numerous (energy producing) projects have been delayed or jeopardized by a variety of permit disputes, environmental lawsuits, along with conflicts stemming from constantly changing air quality regulations adopted by federal, state and local governments.

"To cite some recent examples:

"The pipeline facilities necessary to transport Alaska North Slope crude to the U.S. interior remain ensnared in a state-level environmental dispute in California.

"A dozen refinery projects along the eastern seaboard have been blocked. These could add two million barrels a day to our nation's refining capacity.

"Since discovery of the Hondo Field offshore Southern California in 1969, the effort to produce its oil and gas has been subjected to an incredible maze of government actions. These include 20 major public hearings, three separate environmental impact studies, 44 consultant studies and nine lawsuits.

"Lawsuits have blocked the Georges Bank offshore lease sale on the New England coast and delayed exploration in the Batimore Canyon area off the Atlantic coast."

Haynes conclusion is that: "The United States cannot afford to allow energy development to be delayed by unnecessary environmental conflicts, procedural red tape and counter-productive economic controls. The results of such policies are now painfully obvious. These restrictions have increased, rather than decreased, America's dependence on foreign energy supplies."

Haynes' conclusion seems to hit the nail on the head. Our government has gotten expensive in more than one way.

To bring the issue home, consider that the nuclear plant being built by Texas Electric near Glen Rose will cost, at last count, more than three times the originally estimated cost and has delayed the production of energy that is vitally needed.

Throughout the nation, government red tape and environmentalists have continually held up work on energy producing projects.

I'm just as much for protection of the environment as anyone else but at the same time, the immediate needs of our nation should be considered.

I believe the nation's oil and utility companies have shown appropriate concern for the environment and have demonstrated they can protect the environment and still produce our needed energy requirements.

But in the meantime, delays on these energy projects are costing consumers untold millions of dollars. It seems that the conclusion that can be drawn from this is that our energy shortage was created by the government to a great extent.

New Physician For Hospital

In Tuesday's monthly meeting of the Root Memorial Hospital Board, the directors approved the application of a new doctor.

Dr. Pat A. Thomas, general practitioner and doctor of osteopathy, will be joining the Root Memorial Hospital staff in late July or early August.

Dr. Thomas' application had previously been approved by the medical staff.

In other business, it was reported that Root Valley Fair Lodge was reviewed

by an inspection team. No deficiencies were noted in the team's report.

The new laboratory at Root Hospital, located in the new Basham addition, was completed for about \$52,000, it was announced.

The area formerly used for lab operations is now being remodeled to make space for respiratory therapy, X-Ray and facilities for visiting medical specialists.

In conclusion of the meeting, it was reported that the ambulance service has made 28 runs since the hospital assumed responsibility of operations June 1.

Board To Consider Applications

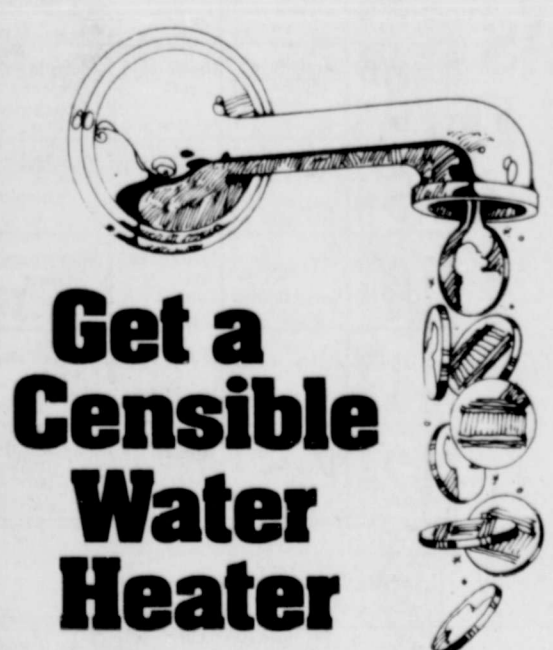
The Colorado City Independent School Board will meet in a special session tomorrow (Monday) to review applications for superintendent.
