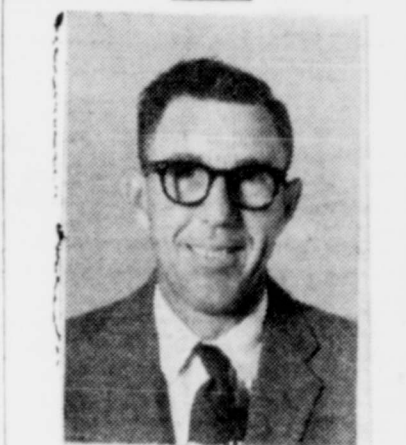
The 21 year old student met with the other AFROTC cadets from more than 170 colleges and universities to discuss Arnold Air Society aims and policies for the coming year.

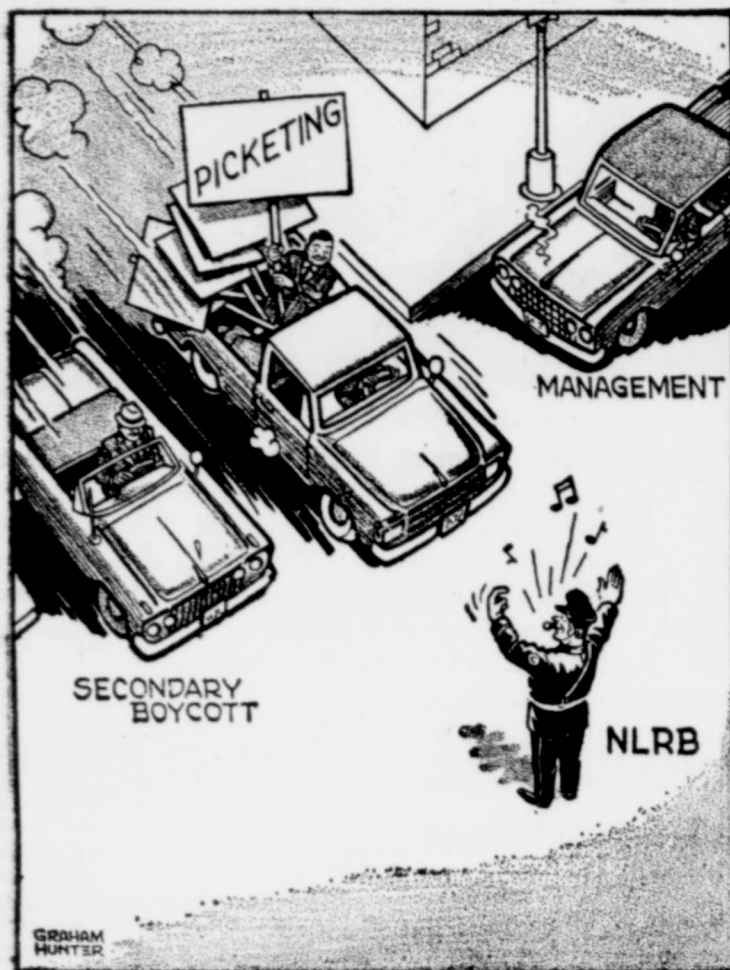

## IT'S TIME TO CHANGE SIGNALS



## N.L.R.B. SHOULD BE CURBED

Everybody knows a worker has a right to quit his job anytime he wants to. It would seem logical that an employer would have a similar right to go out of business if he wants to.

But under the tortured thinking of the National Labor Relations Board, this is not always possible. The NLRB has ruled, "An employer does not have the right to go out of business without negotiating with the union."

To remedy this situation, Senator John Tower (R-Texas) presented a bill to Congress which clearly states management's right to close down a business. The Senator states the case simply: "Just as a worker has the right to quit his job, so the most fundamental right of an employer is that he is free to quit."

There is no doubt that the NLRB has gone far afield of the original intent of Congress by assuming policy-making prerogatives over a business. Concerned also over the NLRB decisions which have permitted secondary boycotting and encourage blackmail picketing, Senator Tower has filed a second bill to "divest the board of its judicial function, and transfer unfair-labor-practice cases to federal district courts."

It seems that in fairness to all parties concerned, this remedial legislation should pass.

## THE LOSER

The annual report of the Rural Electrification Administration shows that, last year, loans to the member co-ops came to \$434 million. They will provide initial service for about 173,000 new customers and improved facilities for 1.9 million users who are already served. This, on the surface of it, looks like a fairly impressive achievement. But the surface is not all — not by a long shot.

To begin with, these are not loans in the generally accepted sense of the term, in which the borrowers ultimately pay them back with interest at the going rate. The co-ops get their loans at two per cent interest, while the Treasury must pay about twice that on its own borrowings. Thus the taxpayers at large subsidize about half the loan costs.

The co-ops, furthermore, are free of all federal income taxes and have other very important tax advantages. This, too, is a form of subsidy, even though indirect. The taxpayers must, one way or another, make up for the loss of taxes that result from the operations of the co-ops.

Finally, now that rural electrification in this country is practically complete, the co-ops are moving or attempting to move into service areas which can't be considered rural by any stretch of the imagination. When this happens, they prevent heavily-taxed development by the investor-owned utilities. Who losses? If you pay a tax bill, you do.

## WHO NEEDS HELP?

I have been advised to tone down "Straight Talk," and not call names, deal in general terms of free enterprise, etc. That approach, friends, is 30 years too late. I've been counseled also to present both sides. Nuts. The other side is already being presented in "Life," "Look," "Post," "Time," "Newsweek," and by most newspaper columnists. Pew Smearson, Frontley Pinkly, etc. etc. etc. I wouldn't believe anything I read in these magazines unless I had confirmed its authenticity with some honorable gentleman like Bobby Baker, the Reverend Doctor Martin Luther King or Alger Hiss. I wouldn't even believe the page numbers in "Look" without counting them all one by one.

January 26, 1965 "Look" Magazine blurb: "The Radical Right's totalitarian methods in the campaign and since, seriously threaten American freedom," reports Senator Church. The mutual confidence essential to free government is slowly being cut away by propaganda. Step by step, decent citizens come to tolerate attacks upon the loyalty of loyal men.

"They spread the virus like typhoid Marys... virulent fanaticism..."

The hate currently being spewed by the anti-hate mongers like "Look" brings to mind L. H. Robbins' verse:

"How a minority,  
Reaching majority,

"Look" continues:

"The Radical Right is not so much the enemy of Communism as it is the enemy of freedom. It opposes the only programs that fight the real Communist threat—which festers on the miseries of the people of Asia, Africa and Latin America—and focuses instead on a strawman specter at home. The resulting fear undermines public confidence in the very institutions of popular government, in the men of Congress, the Supreme Court and the Presidency itself."

I plead guilty to being the enemy of programs which are most diabolical, anti-God conspiracy. I have no confidence in President Johnson, Vice President Humphrey their rubber stamp Congress, the Supreme Court, or most of all, in "Look" magazine.

Lyndon Johnson is the most power-hungry, amoral and vindictive President who has ever occupied the office. His chosen

Vice President is a rabid Socialist. We who oppose Johnson's "consensus" are smeared as hate mongers, extremists, kooks, psychiatric cases, according to all the left-wing news media.

During the presidential cam

paign, a group of psychiatrists "psychoanalyzed" Goldwater from "news"-paper reports and prescribed, by mail psychiatric help for him.

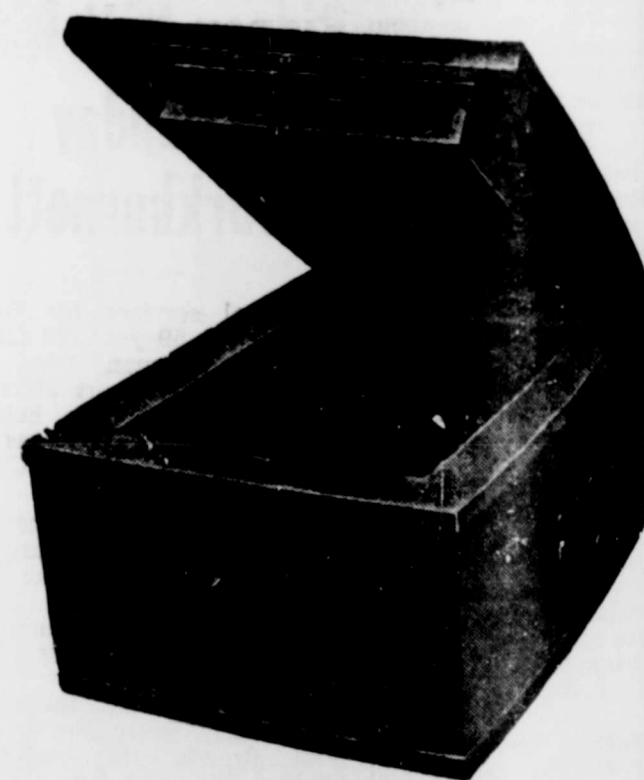

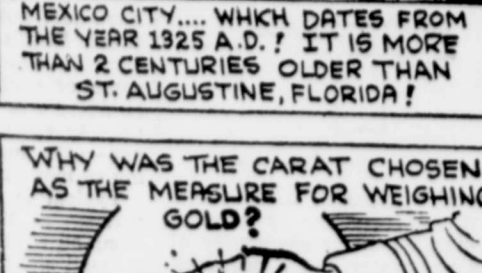

## History and Beauty Emphasized For Six Flags' Summer Season

More than half a million dollars is being expended on SIX FLAGS Over Texas for the 1965 season with the emphasis centered on historical values and landscaping.

Numerous guest surveys taken at SIX FLAGS last year indicated that these two objectives be placed in the focal point of this year's expansion program.

Historical memorabilia that has made Texas and the Nation so proud of its heritage will be found in evidence at strategic locations inside the 114 acre theme Park.

Other attractions have been added including a new ride for the Mexican Section named "El Sombrero." An aviary containing approximately 100 of the most exotic birds found anywhere on the globe will be featured in the Animal Kingdom

scaping changes, especially in the Mall area, just inside the front gate. Six Flags will have a tall structure this year that looks like an early 1900 West Texas courthouse. In reality, behind that facade is an ice making facility easily capable of producing the 4,500,000 pounds of ice used at the Park each season. Letting your imagination run a bit, this is enough ice to build a 20 acre skating rink sixteen inches thick.

Trees have always held an important place in man's way of life. They provide early man his weapons with which to hunt his food and defend himself. Trees also helped provide food, shelter and fuel.

### WASHINGTON'S MASTER ARTILLERYMAN

Revolutionary War Heroes...

Seven thousand British troops held Boston in the winter of 1775-76 while the American army sat helpless only three miles away. The patriots needed heavy guns to bombard the city, but their lone artillery regiment existed in name only.

Because the colonists had not intended, at first, to wage an all-out war for independence from England, they found themselves ill-prepared to contend with the mighty British army. Yet six years later, American artillery forced the British to a decisive surrender at Yorktown. All because of Henry Knox, a jovial 300-pound Boston bookseller who became head of the Continental Army's artillery without ever having been in a battle.

Knox went to work in a bookstore at the age of 12 to support his widowed mother. In his spare hours he read widely, particularly books on the use of artillery. By the time he joined the army in June, 1775 — just before his twenty-fifth birthday — he was a self-made military tactician. Barely five months later, he was named colonel in charge of the Continental Army's artillery.

Before anything could be done about the Boston deadlock, Knox had to find artillery to command. Nearly all the field guns available to him were at Fort Ticonderoga, 300 miles to the north. It was November of a severe winter, but Knox set out at once on a perilous trek to bring the cannons to Boston. He and his small force heaped more than 60 tons of ordnance onto ox-sleds and struggled through the treacherous wilderness to Framingham. This staggering feat enabled the Americans to fortify Dorchester Heights and blast the British from Boston at last.

It was just the beginning. Given a handful of raw recruits and an ill-assorted collection of field guns, Knox hammered out a tough, mobile artillery force that could be counted on to stand and fight, and fire straight — at Boston, Trenton, Princeton, Monmouth, and finally at Yorktown.

Yorktown was the real test, and Knox was ready for it. His guns battered Cornwallis' troops incessantly from October 9th through 17th, 1781, when the British, unable to get near their own guns to fire back, surrendered. After six years of bitter, uphill struggle, American victory was assured.

In his report to Congress, General Washington paid grateful tribute to his brilliant artilleryman, saying "the resources of his genius supplied the deficit of means." Shortly thereafter, Knox became the youngest American major general in the Continental Army.



The war ended in 1783, but the tireless Bostonian was far from through. He went on to serve his newborn nation, and President Washington, as America's first Secretary of War.

Henry Knox is one of seven heroes of the Revolution featured in Cinema '76 — light-hearted educational screen show at the Continental Insurance Pavilion at the New York World's Fair. Their tales are told in spirited songs created by noted composer and choral arranger Ray Charles.

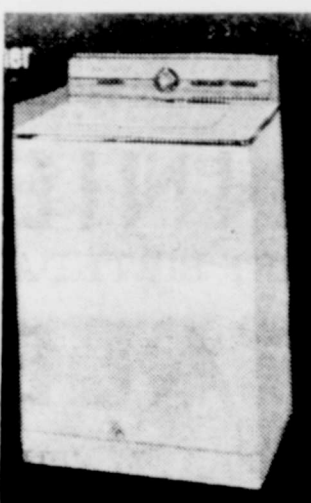

Now is the time to halt bugs and diseases before the tiny invaders injure plants and raise havoc with your garden. You can keep one step ahead of them with timely counter blows—the earlier you start the better.

Healthy plants, of course, resist disease and insect attacks far better than weak, puny ones. It pays dividends to buy good seeds and starter plants and make sure that planting beds are

properly prepared. After plants start growing, hearty survival depends on an ample supply of food and water and a pest-free, disease-free existence.

Flowers need the most food just as growth starts and again as they start blooming. Your dollar goes further if you apply several light applications of fertilizer instead of stuffing the same amount of food into one or two yearly feedings. Like people, plant roots use only a certain amount of food in a given period. Then the rest of it leeches away and becomes unavailable.

Most plants need an inch of water every week to keep them growing properly. Moisture dissolves the food and carries it down to the roots where it's taken up and distributed through the plant. Rains, of course, may do the job for you, but generally

every year there are periods when gardens put out an SOS for water.

Pruning diseased growth helps to halt the spread of disease. Pruning excess growth lets in sunshine and promotes good circulation, making healthier plants and reducing the places insects can hide and multiply. By cutting down on their breeding places, you'll be able to control them more effectively than trying later to wipe out their millions of offsprings.

## The Pests Are Coming!

The most important offensive action against pests and disease is to lay down a protective barrier of chemicals before the culprits attack. The National Sprayer & Duster Association suggests that by using a multi-purpose insecticide-fungicide spray or dust every other week from early spring throughout the growing season, you can control most garden pests.

Confused about whether to spray or dust? Either does a good job, but each has advantages. That's why most knowledgeable gardeners like to do some of each. The enticement to dusters is that they're light, easy to carry, always ready to use—the dusts require no mixing or measuring.

Typical is the gardener who carries a lightweight duster along on his trips to the garden. A small plunger duster is handy for quick spot control. It operates intermittently, discharging dust on each forward stroke and puffing it accurately onto individual plants. Fan-operated dusters broadcast dust in a continuous cloud. They come in several hopper sizes.

Dusting should be done in the morning or evening when the air is calm and dew is on the plants. Moisture helps dust cling to leaves. The idea is to obtain a light, uniform coating by shooting the dust up through the foliage, letting it settle, and then giving a touchup shot from above.

The better sprayers and dusters have extension tubes and adjustable nozzles or orifices to direct the pesticide up, down, or anywhere between—extending your reach right into the center of plantings from a normal standing position.

Many gardeners prefer spraying because it usually costs less, it's easier to get complete coverage, and there is less drift. Spray forms a protective coating that sticks longer on leaves and bark, even through a light shower or two. Best time to spray is in the cool part of the morning before it becomes windy and hot.

Much outdoor garden spraying is residual: applying spray droplets to wet all plant surfaces. You can cover plants thoroughly by having enough pressure to swirl the spray through the foliage and by varying the direction and angle of the spray. The

pesticide either contacts insects directly or coats the surfaces on which the bugs crawl or feed.

For a few plants, a hand sprayer does nicely. But most gardeners prefer one with a bit more capacity, such as a compressed air sprayer. These are available in several tank sizes from 1½ to about 4 gallons. Most include an adjustable nozzle for directional control and an all-purpose cone tip that adjusts from fine to coarse spray.

Many include a fan tip, too, for flat-surface spraying on lawns or walls to attain even coverage from 20 inches or less. Rolling carts make it easy to transport a full tank of spray about the grounds.

Hose-end sprayers are convenient for spraying lawns with insecticides and fertilizers. Attached to the garden hose, such a sprayer operates by sucking a concentrated liquid chemical from a container and discharging it mixed with water from the hose.

To penetrate dense foliage and reach farther, hydraulic spray-

ers with higher pressure are your answer. These range from slide pumps that use separate or attached containers (some of them rollaboots) to the power sprayer on wheels. For gardeners seeking the most versatile equipment, a small power sprayer provides effortless, high pressure spraying at a moderate price.

When it comes to spraying or dusting fruits and vegetables, there are certain restrictions. Pesticides specifically recommended for edible plants should be used. And it's important to follow the manufacturer's instructions of discontinuing the control program for a certain number of days before harvest.

gelatin desserts for less by combining plain gelatin and unsweetened fruit juice.

"Consumers need to decide whether the calories saved in low calorie dietary foods are worth the extra cost," Miss Worger says.

Even though dieting, don't skip breakfast. When you skip breakfast, you miss a third of your day's energy—a very important third, says Miss Worger. The beginning of a new year is a good time to check your breakfast eating habits.

Research has shown that an adequate breakfast should supply a fourth to a third of the day's total food requirements and make a good contribution of most of the essential nutrients. That eliminates the doughnut and coffee type breakfast, which does not supply essential nutrients.

You need fruit, egg meat and or breakfast cereal, milk, bread and butter. Such a breakfast pattern is termed "basic" because it contains foods that

should be included in every morning meal. It is a basic on which a breakfast of any desired size may be developed.

Generally speaking, even when you include meat and eggs, breakfast is the cheapest meal of the day and the easiest to prepare.

Two of the reasons most often given for not eating breakfast are: "not enough time" and "have no appetite." Both are easy to overcome with practice. Go to bed a little earlier so you can get up earlier—in time to eat breakfast. Stimulate the appetite with a prosy glass of fruit juice or fresh fruit. If possible prepare juice the night before, cover and chill.

Colorful table mats or dishes, a simple attractive centerpiece of fruit, flowers or a plant will also stimulate appetite and add enjoyment to this important meal. Arrange the table the night before and save time in the morning.

Used as a spread, topping, sweetener, or in cooking, honey is known as a source of quick energy, according to Miss Worger.

This is because about four-fifths of extracted honey by weight is sugar, mostly in the form of simple sugar, which is easy to digest because it is already in the form that can be absorbed by the body. Most of the remaining weight is water. There are, in addition, small

amounts of protein, minerals and vitamins.

Honey is in good supply now, so enjoy this natural sweet in the extracted form as liquid, or crystallized honey, or in the comb form. Serve it when you need a lift in a hurry.

## From Congressman Graham Purcell

Dear Friends:

Seldom in an average person's lifetime does he have an opportunity to witness a history making event of such magnitude that it may leave an impact on mankind for all time.

I believe that such an event occurred in Baltimore this past week. Many of you had the opportunity to watch it on television. On that history making occasion, President Johnson stated an approach to foreign policy which is both unique and challenging.

Rarely have American ambitions and attitudes been so forcefully stated to the world. High aspiration and humane feelings have seldom been so successfully mixed with toughness and a determination to free a friend from the attacks of his neighbors.

The President combined a course of realism with American idealism in such a way that we can all be proud that we are Americans. He made it clear that we would honor our military commitments and protect a brave people who are our friends. He made it equally clear to the people of the world that we have more to offer than bombs and bullets. He pointed out for all to understand that our goals are free for a brave people, not conquest; our intentions are to construct, not destroy; we seek security for our friends, not domination of others.

To our friends and enemies alike, President Johnson let it be known that the United States remains ready to discuss "unconditionally" methods to bring freedom from strife and war to Southeast Asia. At the same time, the warning was clear. "We will not be defeated. We will not grow tired. We will not withdraw, either openly or under the cloak of a meaningless agreement."

The Communists should not misinterpret his statement. We placed an iron hand in the velvet glove. To interpret his message as a weakening of our determination to save South Vietnam from its enemies would be dangerous to both North Viet-Nam and Communist China.

One of the great lessons the free world had to learn all over again in World War II is that when you give in to aggression, you merely retreat to have to fight again. So it is in Southeast Asia. To fail to halt the Communist aggression now would mean that we would have to face the same problem all over again at a later date when the enemy may be stronger.

I have given the President all my support these past few weeks on his strong position in Viet-Nam. The strikes to the north which have been ordered by the President have been a proper response to the acts of hostility from North Viet-Nam. Our attacks have been properly ordered against the supplies and munition which support the war in the south, and the bridges, railroads and highways which make it possible to move the equipment to the south. This is in sharp contrast to the bombings and murder of innocent civilians by the Viet-Cong, and the communists from North Viet-Nam.

I continue to support the President's strong stand. I also support his efforts to introduce the waging of war by peaceful means. The American ideal has long been to settle disputes by law and reason. I like this approach, and I believe it can work. I am absolutely certain that communism cannot survive against democracy in peaceful competition.

The President offered positive support and concrete suggestions for a method whereby Southeast Asia can develop and grow free outside aggression and external pressures. He has offered a means for the two most powerful political philosophies in the world to "wage peace." He has found a road on which we can successfully bridge the gap between the approaches of those who would take "peace at any price" and those who would urge that the correct attitude is "better dead than red."

To my knowledge, nothing like this has ever been offered before. Never has any enemy been offered a choice between life and death where life can be the honorable choice. Let those who would seek to dominate others heed the words he repeated: "I call Heaven and earth to record this day against you, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing; therefore choose life, that both thou and thy seed may live."

SWISH! SKISH

Fishermen who suffer the seasonal affliction of "winter paralysis" in the casting arm should look to active competition to correct the ailment, rather than sullenly mope around 'til spring.

Skish provides the answer, say the fishing experts at Mercury outboards who, from their Wisconsin abode, can appreciate the problems caused by months of frigid weather.

Skish, as a name, fails to convey to most persons what it represents. This may be some of the reason off-season fishing "practice" has never really come into its own, though it is an exciting sport.

Regardless of labels, skish is an expertly devised game that puts an angler "through the paces" — testing his casting skills and pitting them in competition against his contemporaries. In fact, it might be called the next best thing to actually fishing.

Rules and equipment are simple. Use of a school gymnasium for an evening and a collection of old bicycle tires are all that is required. Regular fishing gear — casting, spinning or fly may be used.

Tires or other targets of 30-inch diameter are stationed at distances from 40 to 80 feet from a set casting point. Scoring is easy: drop the first cast inside the hoop and get six points; repeat on the same target and earn another four points. A perfect score on a five-target layout is 100 points — requiring two complete rounds of two successive casts at each target.

While such "dry land fishing" may seem rather tame, it takes a high degree of skill to make a decent score. And, add the guys at Mercury, it doesn't take long to make the embers of competition flare brightly.

You may never become a national champion, but a weekly workout on a skish course can make you a champ in the fish-catching department. You've cured that castin' arm itch, and fun has been had by all!
