PD investigates death of man in apartments

Big Spring Police Department is investigating the apparent shooting death of a 19-year-old man, which took place over the weekend in the west side of town.

Police called for an ambulance after responding to a call at about 7:15 a.m. in reference to an unresponsive male at the Courtyard Apartments on Business 20.

Albert R. Gomez was pronounced dead at Scenic Mountain Medical Center emergency room by Justice of the Peace Marilyn Carson.

According to a brief police report, Gomez appears to have died of a bullet wound. Carson has ordered an autopsy, which has been scheduled for today in Lubbock.

Services are pending for Gomez with Head Family Funeral Home in Levelland.

38th annual Fly-In breakfast planned July 4 at Colorado City Airport

Colorado City will hold its 38th Fly-In breakfast at the Colorado City Airport on July 4. More than 500 people are expected to attend the annual event.

Pilots from across West Texas bring their families to visit, see other aircraft and sometimes watch impromptu airshows or skydiving.

The fly-in started in 1962 to call attention to a new air strip east of the community. It has

since continued at the old Webb Air Force Base auxiliary field northwest of Colorado City. It was originally held in the spring, but weather conflicts led organizers to eventually settle on July 4.

Breakfast will begin at 7 a.m. and is free to those who fly in. Others will be charged \$3 each. City National Bank will cook up the breakfast of eggs, bacon, Texas toast, jelly, cantaloupe, coffee and orange juice.

For several years, trophies have been awarded to the oldest

pilot, youngest pilot, oldest aircraft, most unusual aircraft and the aircraft coming the longest distance. Nancy Robinson of Abilene, a popular aviation

writer and pilot, will present the awards as well as conduct a patriotic program.

The oldest aircraft so far has been Tex Edwards' 1937 Grumman Goose from Big Spring. The most unusual aircraft have included Consolidated Catalina flying boats, YAK 18, Lockheed C130, the Grumman Goose and several homebuilts.

The longest distance traveled averages about 200 miles, though the record is from Anchorage, Alaska.

The fly-in is not a fundraiser. Any income generated is used to promote the airport and improve the fly-in.

Fly-in funds have been used to purchase a pump for the water well, repair the rotating beacon, poison weeks, erect and maintain signs, provide sound equipment and buy supplies for the event.

The fly-in is organized by the Colorado City Fly-In Association, a group of volunteers dedicated to promoting the Colorado City Airport.

Aggie bond prompts surprise endowment

There is little question that a bond exists between Texas A&M University's former students that perhaps no other institution of higher education can match.

But for two Aggies, Big Spring native L. Don Knight and local resident Sydney Clark, an even deeper bond exists — one that transcends generations.

Knight, now a prominent Houston lawyer, came back home over the weekend to honor a man that was mentor to him, a man that lit a fire in him many years ago.

Knight honored Clark, a 1949 Texas A&M graduate, with an endowment in his name that will be awarded to a graduating high school senior who will be attending Texas A&M University at College Station.

Clark was completely surprised when the presentation was made Saturday night at the Big Spring Country Club in front of some 168 family members and friends.

"It's usually pretty hard to keep a secret from me but this time she did a pretty good job," Clark said of his wife, Andrea's involvement in the tribute. "I really feel quite honored that he (Knight) would do something like this for me."

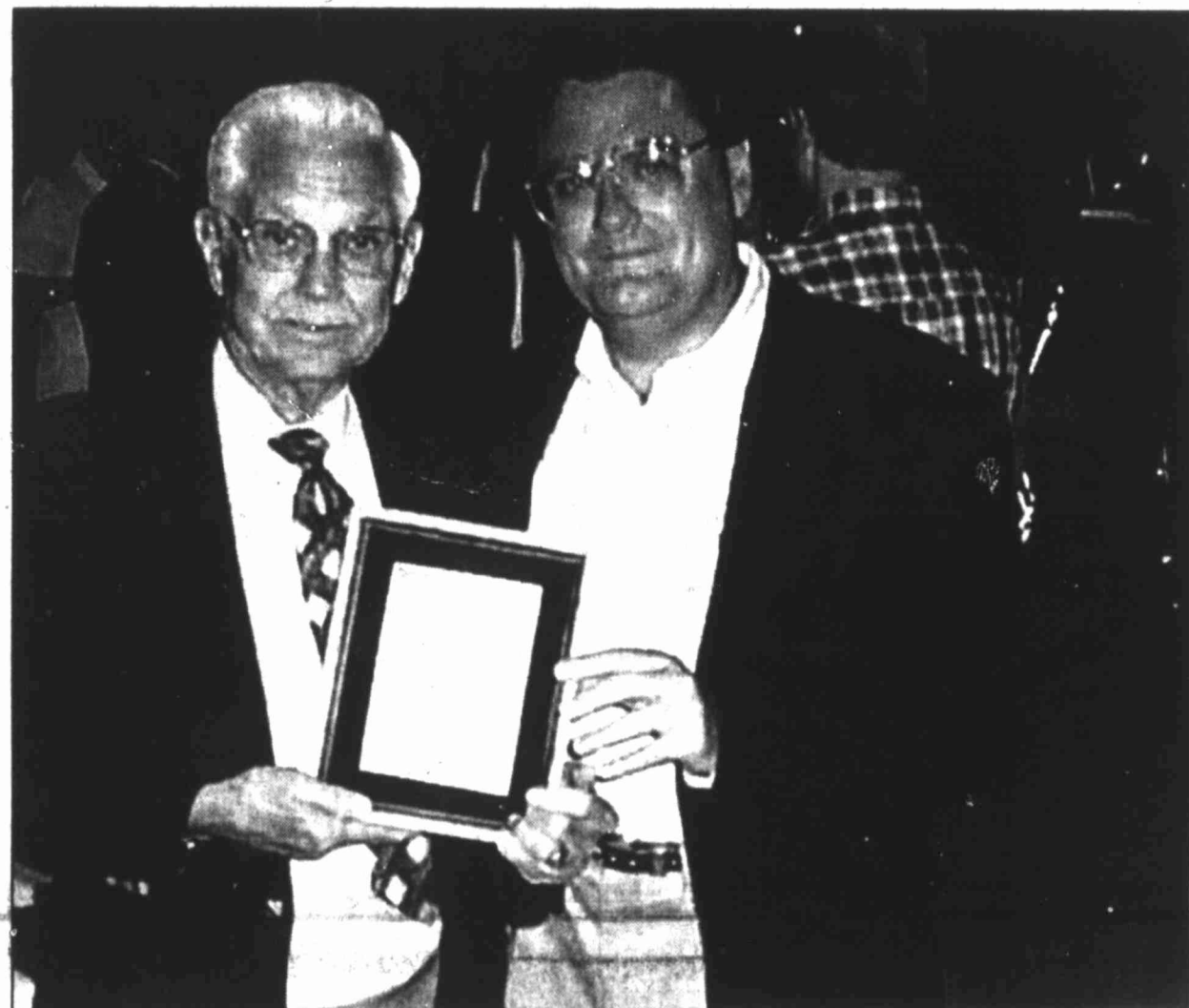
"I have known Don for a long time and he was just a kid that sort of stood out among others," Clark added. "He participated in activities in our church and at school. He was just always upright about everything and I have just had a soft spot in my heart for him ever since he was about 10 years old."

Clark said he doesn't do anything just to get praise or glory out of it.

"When I take a special liking to someone, they have to demonstrate to me they have that desire to excel, to achieve something of a higher nature," he explained. "This is something I saw in Don and that's the reason I would always try to sell him on someday going to A&M and becoming an Aggie."

Several people paid tribute to Clark before the presentation. Among those were Mayor Russ McEwen who proclaimed June 17, 2000, as Sydney Clark Day.

Also making a presentation was Francis Wheat, who represents Sen. Robert Duncan (R-Lubbock). Wheat presented two certificates on behalf of Duncan, congratulating Clark

for his achievements and accomplishments over the years.

Clark has served on the city council, as a deacon and usher at the First Baptist Church, in every office there is in the Optimist Club and was the Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce's president in 1982.

Also on hand to praise the honoree was James Balios, who has known Clark since 1963 and, like Clark, is an active member of the Big Spring Optimist Club.

"When I first met Sydney at a Chamber of Commerce meeting back in 1963, he made me feel

Senator calls on businesses to hire youth during summer

Sen. Robert Duncan (R-Lubbock), is asking for businesses in District 28, which includes Howard, Borden, Glasscock and Martin counties, to help with the Summer Jobs for Youth Program.

"We are asking each employer in the area to provide at least one job for a young person between the ages of 14 and 21," he said. "Each position should be at least 20 hours a week at a minimum wage, lasting for at least six weeks during the summer."

The Summer Jobs for Youth Program is a public or private business partnership between participating businesses and agencies working together to provide summer jobs for area youth. This is not a government-funded employment and youth are paid by the businesses that hire them.

"With your support, our young people will have the opportunity to learn valuable work skills that are essential to the development of a quality workforce in our area in the 21st Century," Duncan added. "In addition, your participating will help increase the number of summer jobs available to many area youth who would otherwise sit idle."

In addition to the business providing at least 20 hours per week, they must determine when the job(s) will start and end, complete a request form specifying the minimum qualifications required for the position(s) and any preferences they may have regarding the type of student they wish to employ. The business must also interview them.

"Although, I realize that many of you have suffered severe downturns and cannot

The average income per month of a family utilizing the MCCF is around \$550 to \$750 per month and many users' sole income is from Social

Security, said Bob Deavenport, who oversees the food bank.

"I feel that these people worked hard in their younger days and they still have their pride," Hazlewood said. "They are deserving."

Hazlewood, along with Mary Haislip, another volunteer for the MCCF, delivers food to eight to 12 people once a day every two weeks.

right at home," said Balios. "I have never heard one cuss word or him cutting someone down. That just wasn't his nature."

"Part of the Optimist creed goes, 'To give so much time to the improvement of yourself that you have no time to criticize others,'" Balios added. "It is a creed Sydney lives by every day."

But it was Knight who fittingly offered the highest praise, admitting he has no idea where he would be today had it not been for Clark's influence.

"If it had not been for Sydney Clark, I would never have gone to Texas A&M and certainly would not be where I am today," said Knight. "I grew up in a family where no one went on to college. We were a middle class family and lived pretty much like a lot of families do today, from paycheck to paycheck."

Sydney got me thinking about going on to college after high school, giving me 'Aggie' hats and shirts, taking me under his wing. After Sydney took me to my first Aggie Muster, I knew I was sold. I wanted to be an Aggie."

After he attended Howard College for a year, Johnnie Lou Avery, a Howard College vice-president at the time, told Knight about a little-known scholarship for those interested in attending Texas A&M.

Knight went on to A&M, graduating with the class of 1981. He then attended the University of Houston Law School, graduating in December of 1984.

Knight said he didn't know of anyone that would be more deserving and to be honored with a scholarship in their name than that of Sydney Thomas Clark.

"There is not another man other than my dad that I admire and look up to more than Sydney Clark," he explained. "He is truly deserving of this award. He has spent a lifetime recruiting for Texas A&M. I am looking forward to attending an Aggie football game with him this fall."

"It normally takes about an hour and a half to deliver food if they don't sit and talk with us," Haislip said.

But these ladies love to interact with their housebound clients, who to them and more than names on a list.

They include Emma Presley, a housebound client who was a cook for almost 44 years. Presley began work when she lost her mother as a teenager and retired when she was 67 years old.

"I could have gone on, but the supervisor wasn't fair and wouldn't give me a weekend off," Presley said.

Florida McCalister always looks forward to seeing Hazlewood and Haislip, she said.

"When I first started to work with Bob, he sent me to visit with the people I was going to deliver food and explain the food bank," Hazlewood said. "Many of them try to stay independent and would love to be

more independent but age has a lot to do with it." Hazlewood, who gives a minimum of six to eight hours a week, will come in early on the day they deliver food to individually sack each recipient's bag. She takes into consideration dietary needs of clients who have diabetes and individual tastes.

"Bob says I spoil them," she said.

Hazlewood's daughter donates money to the MCCF so her mother can sometimes buy a few extra things for her clients, she said.

"I lived in a children's orphanage home growing up, and people did things for me," Hazlewood said. "I want to give back and help someone."

Hazlewood grew up in Methodist Children's Home in Waco with close to 350 other children from the time she was the age of 8.

When she was 17, she went to live with her aunt and uncle in Martin County.

According to Hazlewood, growing up in the Methodist orphanage gave her a Christian foundation, strong work ethics and sensitivity to other people's conditions. Being a Methodist is roots to her, she said.

An active volunteer with the MCCF for close to two years, Hazlewood remembered the first time she delivered hygienic goods to people on her route.

"Food stamps don't cover things like toothpaste, detergent or paper goods," she said. "These are things they need. They appreciated those things more than the food."

"I came away in tears because I was so touched," she added.

One of her most touching Christmas presents was a large donation of money to the MCCF in her name from her son-in-law.

"I did not have to find a place to put it or hang it up," she said. "I really appreciated it."

Hazlewood is very active in her church. She also helps with the unloading of weekly food deliveries and will make special deliveries of perishable items to the clients.

Her volunteer work with the MCCF has taught her something about humanity, she said.

"I learn to be a little more humble because it's pretty humbling to go into someone else's home and compare what I have to them," she said. "I don't have all that much."

Western, southern states forecast to gain House seats in 2020

WASHINGTON (AP) — By 2020, New York stands to lose five House seats while California, already the largest state delegation with 52 members, would add nine if current Census Bureau population projections hold true, a private statistical group predicts.

Overall, 25 of the House's 435 seats could shift between now and 2020, with the South and West gaining at the expense of the Northeast and Midwest, researchers at the Population Reference Bureau report.

"It is a continuation of recent population trends," said Mark Mather, an analyst at the non-profit, Washington-based organization.

The group forecast the size of states' House delegations based

on population projections for 2020.

Among the findings:

—California, already No. 1 with a population of 32.6 million, could grow by 17 million over the next two decades. The state could gain one seat after this year's census and nine seats by 2020, increasing the delegation from the current 52 to 61.

—New York's delegation stands to drop from 31 now to 26 in 2020, even though statisticians estimate the state's population will have grown from 7.6 percent between 1990 and 2020, from 17.9 million to 19.3 million. By comparison, California's predicted growth rate is 52 percent.

—Also projected to lose seats

by 2020 are Pennsylvania (four), Michigan and Ohio (three each) and Illinois (two). Their current size: Pennsylvania with 21 House members, Illinois with 20, Ohio with 19 and Michigan with 16.

—Forecast to add House members are Texas (five), Florida (three) and Georgia and Arizona (two each). Their current size: Texas with 30 House members, Florida with 23, Georgia with 11 and Arizona with six.

—Montana, which has one at-large representative now, would gain a second seat after this year's census and would keep the seat through 2020.

"We have to be careful we don't exaggerate the influence and the corresponding lack of clout because a state loses num-

bers in a congressional head count," said G. Terry Madonna, political science professor at Millersville University in Millersville, Pa.

"While more is better, I'm not convinced you'll have a small or medium-sized state that doesn't have significance in national legislation."

Kim Brace of the Washington-based Election Data Services Inc., which projects House seats no more than 10 years ahead, said, "Overall, this shows trends of what might be potential."

"The problem you have in projecting way out to 20 years down the road is that there's a lot of things that can happen in between," he added. "Long-term projections should be treated

only as potential change."

For instance, Brace's forecast of the 2000 reapportionment shows Georgia keeping the House seat that Mather projects Montana would gain.

"We wanted to look far enough in the future so that you have some exciting change to look into, but not too far off so that it's not beyond the lifetime of the people who are interested in it," said John Hagga, another analyst at the Population Reference Bureau.

Brace's count is based on 2000 census population projections, while Mather's forecast for 2000 is based on 1999 population estimates.

The Constitution requires a distribution of House seats as fairly as possible among the

states, based on census data, every 10 years. For many years, the House of Representatives has been fixed by law at 435 members. That means that when one state gains a seat, another must lose one.

Last year, the Supreme Court ruled that this process — known as reapportionment — must be based on actual, raw population figures, instead of statistically adjusted data.

Those raw figures from the 2000 census will be released by Dec. 31, and the House seats will be reapportioned soon after. Mather's analysis projected reapportionment after this year and in 20 years.

Overall, eight seats could change states after this year's count, and 25 by 2020.

Waco wrongful death trial against government to begin

WACO (AP) — Opening statements could begin as early as Tuesday in the trial that will decide whether the government shares responsibility for the deaths of more than 80 Branch Davidians in its 1993 raid and siege of the group's compound.

Jury selection was scheduled to begin at 1:30 p.m. CDT Monday, and both sides said a jury could be seated by the end of the day. The trial is expected to last about four weeks.

Survivors and family members of those killed contend in a \$675 million lawsuit that federal agents used excessive force in the Feb. 28 raid and may have contributed to the cause of the deadly April 19 compound fire. The government denies the accusations.

U.S. District Judge Walter Smith has to pare the group down to a panel of six jurors and one alternate. Smith will

begin questioning the pool of 50 potential jurors Monday afternoon, but attorneys likely will not be allowed to ask follow-up questions.

The jury will act as an advisory panel to the judge, and may or may not have influence over the final verdict.

"The judge has made it clear that he wants (the trial) to go quickly," said U.S. Attorney Michael Bradford, lead counsel for the government.

The ordeal began on Feb. 28, 1993, when agents of the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms tried to serve members of the Branch Davidians with search and arrest warrants for suspected firearms violations.

A gunfight ensued; four agents and six Davidians were killed. Twenty-eight agents were injured, along with an unknown number of Davidians,

including sect leader David Koresh. The FBI took over the situation and a standoff between the Davidians and the government agents began.

Early on April 19, the FBI launched a tear gas operation to end the siege. Fire broke out around noon and the compound burned to the ground. No firefighting equipment was allowed near the compound.

The trial will deal with four issues:

— Whether Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms agents used excessive force in the initial raid on the Branch Davidian compound.

— Whether government agents helped caused fires that destroyed the compound.

— Whether the government was negligent by withholding firefighting equipment.

— And whether using tanks to push into the compound deviat-

ed from the operations plan approved by Attorney General Janet Reno.

Smith last week removed what could be the most contentious issue of the lawsuit — whether government agents shot at Davidians during the final hours of the siege.

He said the issue would not be addressed during the trial — or considered by a jury — because a court-appointed expert was unable to attend the trial due to illness.

Houston attorney James Brannon, who represents the estates of three children, said he is disappointed that the gunfire issue will not go before the jury.

"But we will have the issues remaining in the trial heard presumably by a group of American people, not connected in any way with the government," he said.

Investigators key on scientists with access to secure vault

WASHINGTON (AP) — The investigation into the disappearance — and mysterious reappearance — of two computer hard drives holding nuclear secrets at the Los Alamos weapons laboratory is narrowing on several scientists who have given contradictory answers, government officials say.

The scientists being scrutinized most closely are among 26 people who had free access to a high-security vault in the New Mexico complex where the data storage disks vanished more than six weeks ago, only to be found under suspicious circumstances Friday.

Analysts hoped, possibly as early as Monday, to determine definitively whether the material on the two drives had been compromised, copied or in any way tampered with. The devices were flown to Washington on Sunday for electronic analysis.

Energy Secretary Bill Richardson, while acknowledging the devices were found in a

room already searched several times, said he had "no evidence that they ever left the X Division" — the high-security part of the lab where nuclear weapons designers work.

The discovery of the two hard drives — and Richardson's assurances that security is his top priority — did little to ease the sharp criticism by congressional Republicans of the Clinton administration over security lapses in the nuclear weapons programs and elsewhere.

"They are worried more about political correctness," Rep. Porter Goss, R-Fla., chairman of the House Intelligence Committee, said Sunday on NBC's "Meet the Press." He cited not only the Los Alamos incident, but loss of a classified laptop computer at the State Department and disclosure that a former CIA director often took classified information home and left it in his unsecured computer.

Earlier this year, the Justice

and Energy departments and the FBI were strongly criticized for their handling years of investigations into alleged theft of nuclear weapons secrets by China.

The probe focused on Los Alamos scientist Wen Ho Lee, who has been charged with illegally copying secret documents and awaits trial. But there has never been enough evidence to charge Lee or anyone else with espionage.

Goss and Sen. Richard Shelby, R-Ala., chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee, who also made the television talk show rounds Sunday, called on Richardson to resign over security lapses in the nuclear weapons programs.

"He's not the man for the job," Shelby said on CBS' "Face the Nation."

Richardson has dismissed such a notion. And White House spokesman Jim Kennedy said: "We have full confidence in Secretary Richardson, who is working hard to get to the bot-

tom of this. And that kind of a partisan finger-pointing should not be taken too seriously."

Richardson launched a vigorous defense of his yearlong effort to improve security at the labs and said he wanted to avoid "a partisan food fight" over the latest controversy. In a few days, "we will know what happened," he predicted.

Beanbag rounds fired at anarchists in Oregon

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Police fired beanbag rounds and arrested at least 22 anarchists who took to the streets after smashing an effigy of a police officer.

Marking the anniversary of a 1999 anarchist riot here, about 80 anarchists marched through downtown Eugene on Sunday evening.

Dozens of officers in full riot gear broke up a crowd of anarchists playing a game in the street, firing several beanbag rounds from shotguns before dividing the crowd into smaller groups.

At least 22 people were arrested, according to Eugene Police Lt. Rick Siel. Most were charged with disorderly conduct; it was unclear whether they remained in custody overnight.

The march on Eugene came after more than 400 protesters calling for an end to capitalism gathered in a park and smashed a dummy of a police officer with potatoes, skateboards and their feet.

Earlier, a dozen anarchists using papier-mache puppets re-enacted violence that erupted a year ago during an anti-capitalist march.

Eugene, about two hours south of Portland, is considered headquarters for Oregon's anarchist movement — which was involved in the December riots in Seattle during the meeting of the World Trade Organization.

For the past few days, the Eugene anarchists have staged events to commemorate the 1999 march, which erupted into clashes with police. Nineteen people were arrested after anarchists staged a rally to "reclaim the streets" and then went on a window-breaking rampage.

On Saturday night, police arrested 40 anarchists who took to the streets after watching a video of the WTO riots in Seattle.

In Sunday's puppet show, staged in the park where rioters were tear gassed last year, anarchists holding puppets representing police officers shouted at a half-dozen other anarchists, who responded by hurling rocks at the puppets. One was singled out and destroyed.

"The cops have made it clear that it's not Nazi Germany, but it's still a police state," said Zack Cox, 19.

Heritage groups wave their flag for history

AUSTIN (AP) — Dressed in widow's black circa 1865, Ginny Anderson wiped her brow in the 90-degree heat.

The special education teacher from Dripping Springs said she was in mourning. Not for anyone in particular, but for her heritage.

Anderson was one of about 50 people Friday dressed in Civil War garb and carrying rebel flags to protest the removal of two plaques with Confederate symbols from the state Supreme Court building.

"We are in mourning," she said. "We're mourning the removal of the plaques. A piece of history has died."

Angered by the removal of the plaques without a public hearing, Confederate heritage groups have kept a daily vigil outside the courts building. And they vow to keep it up at least several days a week until the November presidential election.

The plaques that were

removed quoted Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee and had images of the Confederate battle flag and the seal of the Confederacy.

Republican Gov. George W. Bush's office started working on a plan to take them down after the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People called for their removal earlier this year. Bush is the presumptive GOP nominee for president.

The plaques were replaced June 9 with new ones that say equal justice is available to all Texans "regardless of race, creed or color." They note that the building was constructed with money taken from a Confederate pension fund and dedicated to Texans who served in the Confederacy.

Bush spokesman Michael Jones said the new plaques demonstrate respect for the state's history and diversity and would assure all Texans that courts deliver fair and impar-

tial justice.

The protesters, however, are angry that Bush and state officials ignored their demands for a public hearing before removing the plaques. Many carried signs that said "Gov. Bush, why do you hate my heritage?"

"Everything needs to be brought into view," said Vernon Holliman, of Palestine. Wearing a full wool Confederate cavalry uniform, the state prison guard traveled the 200 miles from his home in Palestine to wave the battle flag and sing "Dixie" on the courts building courtyard.

"You just don't do something when it's on a government building. Who's to say what's next?" Holliman said.

Texas' state buildings are full of references to the Confederacy.

The Capitol rotunda has the seal of all the nations that once claimed Texas, including the Confederacy, in its marble floor.

Aggies say they are considering alternative bonfire

COLLEGE STATION (AP) — The official decision at Texas A&M is that no Bonfire will be built for the next two years, but Aggies are talking among themselves about keeping the tradition going on their own.

Texas A&M president Ray Bowen made the announcement last week of a moratorium until at least 2002 because of the tragedy on campus on Nov. 19 in which 12 people were killed and 27 were injured in a collapse of the giant wooden stack.

Don Ganther, who owns Dixie Chicken and five other estab-

lishments in College Station, said he is discussing with students the idea of an alternative bonfire.

"I just disagree with a two-year moratorium," said Ganther, 60, an Aggie alumnus. "I just don't believe the tradition should be interrupted. It should be held this year to honor those fallen children. ... Texas is a big state. There's lots of places you could go. Good Lord, I could even envision 50 bonfires going around the state of Texas."

He said the alternative bon-

fire should be a solemn family-oriented event, with no alcohol. He said he will decide by September if he will hold one and said other Aggies are also considering creating bonfires.

Bowen encouraged students to make sensible decisions about attending renege bonfires. He said they could be dangerous, and there could be liability should anything go wrong.

Will Clark, who collected more than 8,000 signatures and e-mails for a petition in favor of the bonfire, said he would support a safe, alternative bonfire.

The new, new Gore and the new, new Bush

Reinvention was a signature issue for Al Gore as vice president. It has become one for Al Gore as candidate in his often restyled presidential campaign. Gov. George W. Bush has done some remodeling, too.

So far, 2000 has been the year of the campaign makeovers. In the latest episode, the campaign chairman Gore named 13 months ago to retool a slow-starting operation has resigned, blaming health problems.

Tony Coelho is out, Secretary of Commerce William M. Daley is in. Coelho has been hospitalized for an intestinal ailment. He also faces a government ethics investigation.

Reinventing government was part of Gore's day job, and he says it succeeded, saving more than \$100 billion and cutting the bureaucracy to the lowest payroll in 40 years. Those numbers have been questioned by critics and dismissed by Republicans.

"They haven't reinvented the government bureaucracy, they have simply reshuffled it," Bush says.

There has been some reinventing and some reshuffling on both their presidential campaigns.

Presidential candidates always change in the process of running, altering tactics and styles to fit their situations. But it usually happens quietly and gradually, not abruptly, with announcements that the

candidate is now going to try something different.

These candidates have been above the fray, tough, nice, tough, nice again.

Gore changed his campaign address to Nashville, Tenn., and his clothes to casual. Bush was more conservative than compassionate until he had the Republican nomination locked away. Since then, he has pushed proposals aimed at claiming the political center, while Gore contends his rival is still far to the right.

Nothing harsh or personal, though.

The latest Gore strategy is to avoid all that. "I choose not to attach any elegant epithets to my opponent," he said in an interview with The New York Times.

This while Bush was working with his advisers on plans for a Republican National Convention with a positive script, minus the programmed attacks on the opposition that usually are part of the fare.

Earlier, Bush planners had even talked of forbidding so much as the mention of Gore's name during the convention, before realizing that nobody could keep Republicans from talking like Republicans for four days.

When he clinched the Democratic nomination more than three months ago, Gore said he wanted a general election campaign of ideas, not insults. But he did not spare the latter — Bush was arrogant, smug, inexperienced, reckless, irresponsible, he

jabbed.

Then he changed tone.

Without sparing his criticism of Bush's proposals, he stopped talking about his opponent by name. That is being left to others, notably his allies in the Clinton Cabinet and White House.

"I don't know how many times you're able to reinvent yourself in the course of a campaign," Bush said of that shift, nearly three weeks ago.

Two or three times, anyhow, because Bush has had that many remodelings himself.

He started as the candidate who was going to change the tone of campaigning, keep it positive and above personal conflicts. That worked at first; indeed, when he belatedly appeared in a 1999 campaign debate, he volunteered a good word for Sen. John McCain, then one of five rivals for the nomination. "He's a good man," Bush put in for McCain when the senator faced hostile questions.

That was before the competition got real and the tactics got tough.

"The days of smiling and letting John McCain define me are over," Bush said after his defeat in the New Hampshire presidential primary.

The new Bush was more conservative than compassionate, on the offensive until he clinched the nomination. Then he remodeled again, moving back to the center, the classic strategy for a Republican. The art, as Richard M. Nixon once said, is to move far enough

right to win the nomination and then far enough left to win the election.

Gore's reinventions began with his effort to manage the dual role of candidate and vice president, seeking the advantages of office but in his case, seeking to shed the baggage of President Clinton's personal scandals.

He also began as the lofty leader, not deigning to mention Bill Bradley's name until the challenger began closing in last fall. Then he overhauled his whole show, moved his campaign headquarters out of Washington, adopted a new, more casual wardrobe trying to shed the stiffness image.

He said he would campaign like an underdog. He challenged Bradley to weekly debates, later upping it to two a week and still later making it a challenge to Bush.

After beating Bradley, Gore turned down the volume on his campaign, just as the new Bush began offering catalog of programs that edged into usually Democratic territory on issues such as housing, health care for the poor, the environment, education.

Gore denied that his campaign was drifting again. But he does have another new look, his three-week set of prosperity and progress speeches, telling what he calls the economic success story of the past eight years, and saying he is the candidate who can continue it.

Reinventions aside, that is what he was saying in the first place.

FBI is on the securities markets investigation

In March we reported about underworld involvement in the securities markets, and now the U.S. Attorney's office in New York has reported the filing of charges against 120 individuals allegedly involved in securities fraud. They are accused of having ties to the mafia and have cost investors more than \$50 million.

We wrote: "High-placed sources tell us that the FBI has launched an investigation into the Russian mafia's involvement in U.S. stock markets, including both the manipulation of trading and the laundering of billions of dollars."

"Before the fall of the Soviet Union, capitalism was last practiced there prior to the Russian Revolution of 1917, and

peacetime capitalism was last seen there before World War I began in 1914, just after the age of the Robber Barons in America. So the reintroduction of capitalism during the 1990s was something of a time warp, complete with Robber Barons and criminals who cheated their way to billions. And those criminals became collectively known as the Russian mafia.

"But where does their money go? Surely reinvesting in the Russian economy makes no sense in a day when all economic roads lead to America. However, the sums are so vast that the usual outlets — prostitution, loan sharking and the like — do not provide large enough economic universes. The booming drug trade and the booming stock markets do."

What is not clear from the current arrests is the extent of the Russian mafia's connection, but sources tell us that connection will soon materialize. Its connections to and competition with the American

mafia are continuing to be scrutinized. Oddly enough, one significant difference between the American and Russian mafias is that the latter is considerably more violent, most probably because, being newer, it lacks a developed sense of criminal sophistication.

Perhaps it was their lack of sophistication that led to the current arrests, because many people in positions of authority have doubted the resolve of our regulatory and enforcement agencies to cope with the situation.

In March, we addressed this point: "We asked Mr. Cameron Funkhouser, vice president of Market Regulation for the National Association of Securities Dealers (NASD), why such manipulation is allowed to go on and who we could call at the Securities Exchange Commission (SEC) and FBI. He said, 'I would be happy to give you their phone numbers, but it won't do any good.' Apparently, he believes, they do not have sufficient staff to concern themselves

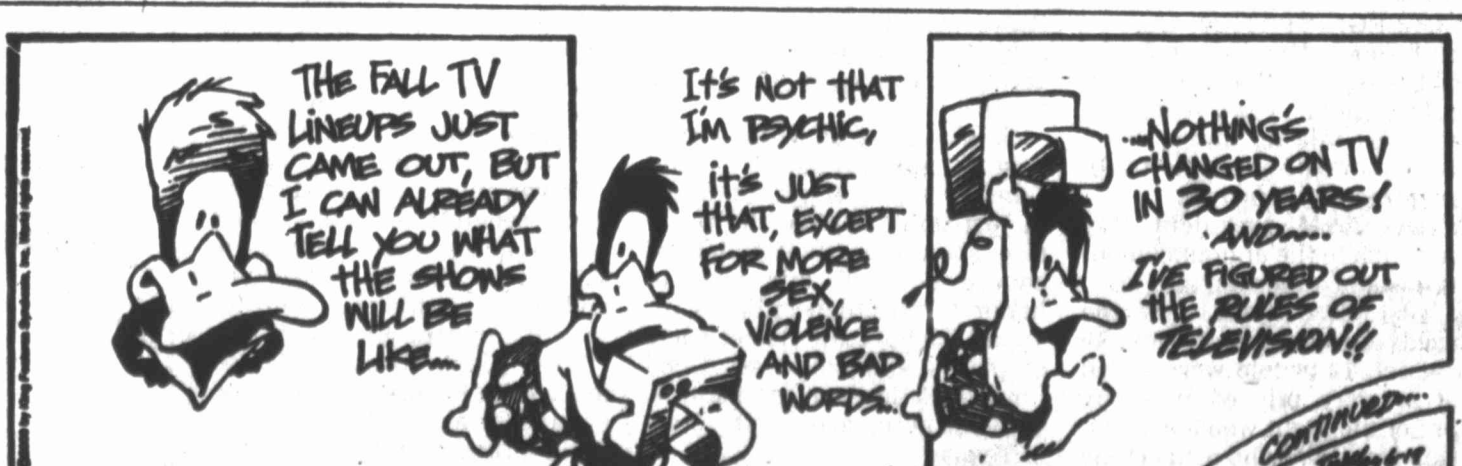
with small Over-the-Counter Bulletin Board (OCBB) companies. Our sources say otherwise. The FBI is on the job."

Indeed, the FBI was on the job and continues on the job. We can report that more arrests may be expected and Russians will be involved. For criminals, the allure of easy money to be gained in the securities markets is being overshadowed by the complexity of those markets. The authorities who seemingly ignore unusual activities are in fact monitoring the situation, and the authorities who investigate those activities have once again proven that the absence of apparent activity is not the same as the absence of activity.

The securities markets are critical to the financial well being of the nation. Because any manipulation of them affects so many people and companies, the FBI will not falter in its duty to protect them. So once again, we are pleased to report: The FBI is on the job.

Pacers believe all things are possible going into Game 6 tonight

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Jalen Rose doesn't see one large, forbidding task facing the Indiana Pacers in Southern California this week. He sees two goals, each quite achievable.

"We're completely focused on winning Game 6, because that will put us right where we want to be, right where nobody thought we could be," the Indiana forward said. "We've broken it down in our minds and (coach) Larry (Bird) has told us. We win Game 6, and all things are possible."

There's no denying the Pacers are in a jam. They need to win twice in three days in the NBA Finals. Both games are at the home of the Los Angeles Lakers, the team expected since December to

win the league title.

The first, Game 6 at Staples Center tonight, will be played against a Lakers team eager to atone for its 33-point loss in Game 5 and in front of a Los Angeles crowd screaming for its first NBA championship since 1988.

It's a tall order, but few teams would be more equipped to try to fill it than the Pacers. They have a high-scoring, tough veteran roster with years of playoff experience, and thanks to three strong performances at Consecro Fieldhouse, they know the Lakers are nowhere close to unbeatable.

Even the most confident teams can be turned fragile in the heat of the playoffs, but the Pacers insist they're the team to

mount one of the most remarkable finals upsets in history.

"It's tough trying to make history. We're probably the biggest underdogs in history," Rose said. "Any time you beat a team by 30 you have momentum, but any time you're the team with three wins you have the cards in your favor."

"We need to find a way to turn the tide, and once we get into a Game 7 anything can happen."

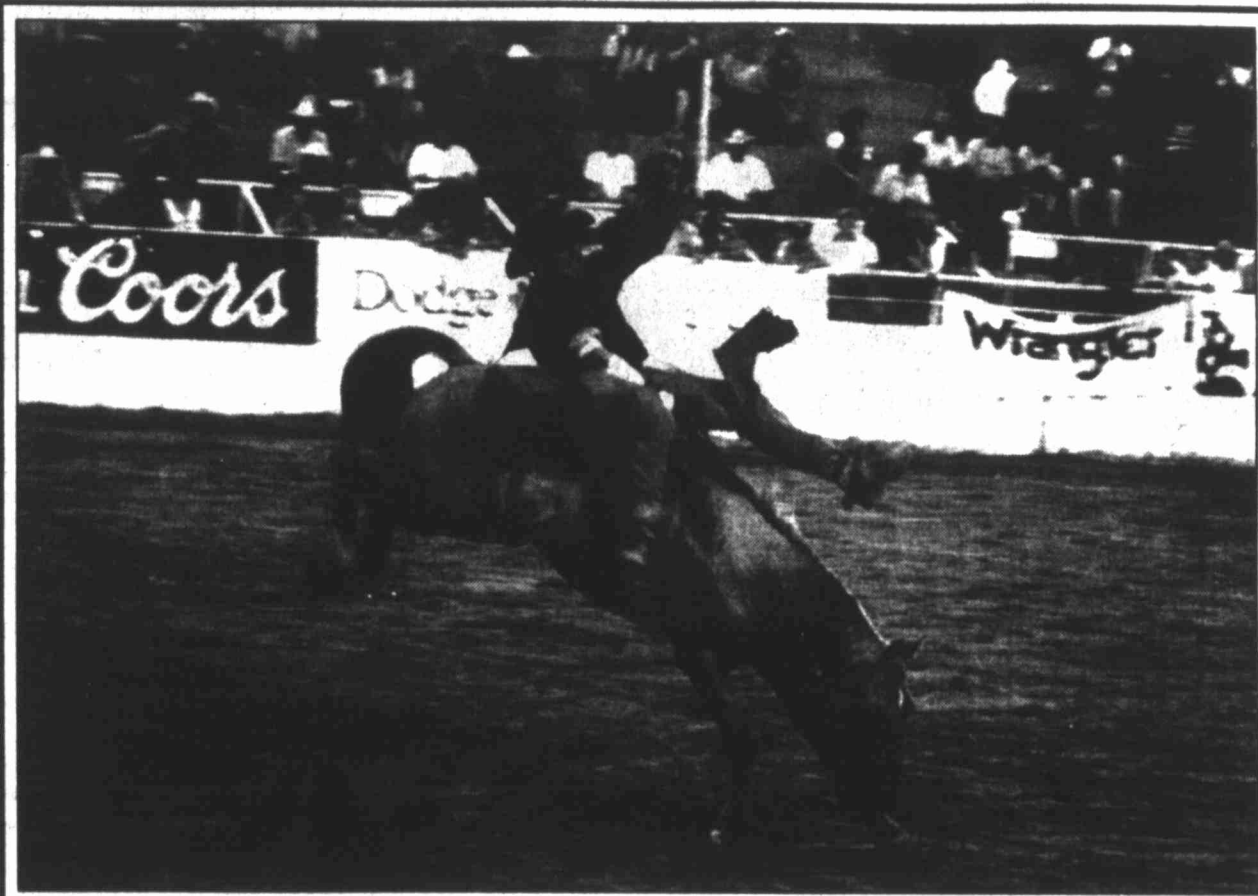
The Lakers were the NBA's most consistent team during the regular season, losing consecutive games only three times on the way to a league-best 67-15 record. But during the playoffs, the Lakers have routinely taken nights off — particularly when the final victory of a

series was in sight.

Their most recent subdued performance came on Friday night in Game 5, the Pacers' 120-87 thrashing of Los Angeles.

"I don't know why we couldn't come back on them," the Lakers' Robert Horry said. "They just kept shooting the ball so well for so long. We never had that killer instinct to get back in it that we had the first two games out there."

While the Lakers didn't tank the game, Indiana's blistering shooting in the first half seemed to confuse and finally subdue Los Angeles well before the final buzzer. No matter, the Lakers seemed to be saying: we'll just go home and get it done.

Leads forged in early rounds stand up during rodeo finale

Saturday night's final performance of the 67th annual Big Spring Cowboy Reunion and Rodeo provided no real change on the event's leaderboard.

While a number of impressive performances were turned in during the finale, virtually all of the various event winners posted their scores and times during Wednesday's opening round of the rodeo.

Perhaps some of the most exciting action Saturday came in the bull riding event where Josh Bondurant of Weatherford and Justin Joiner of Odessa both turned in qualified rides that earned them 81 points.

Unfortunately, those 81-point rides were only good enough to share third-place money in the event with George Chapman of Christoval, thanks to the 88-point effort turned in by Gary Puckett of Post during Wednesday night's second session of bull riding.

The runner-up in bull riding, Corey Navarre of Weatherford, Okla., also posted his 84-point ride during the opening performance.

Almost the same scenario was played out in the bareback riding competition, where Australian Tony Hecksher posted a 78-point ride and Jason Mouton of Scott, La., added a 73-point effort, only to fall well behind Kirby Berry of Poolville.

Berry took the top bareback riding money with an 81-point ride he registered on Thursday night.

Saturday's best calf roping efforts — an 8.6-second clocking by Neal Felton of Mountain Home

and a 10.2 time from Dee Bland of Hawley — fell well short of the 17.0 total on two runs turned in by Ricky Canton of Cleveland on Wednesday and the same "average" registered by Keith Hudson of Sonora on Thursday.

None of the saddle bronc riders scheduled for Saturday night's performance managed to turn in qualified rides, meaning the 83 points earned by Cole Hardin of San Angelo on Thursday won the event, the 76-point rides turned in Wednesday by Bobby Griswold of Moore, Okla.; Ricky Anton of Cleveland, Texas; and Robert Etbauer of Goodwell, Okla., shared runner-up money.

Another Wednesday night mark that stood throughout the rodeo belonged to Alan Oehlert of Bryan, who posted a time of 8.3 seconds on two steer wrestling runs.

Saturday's best bulldogging run belonged to Martin Wall of Bandera, who was clocked at 5.6 seconds.

And for a fourth straight night, none of the women entered in the barrel racing competition could replace the clocking of 16.70 seconds turned in by Jimmy Kay Davis of Gonzales during Wednesday morning's slack competition.

In fact, the rest of the field was unable to break the 17-second barrier.

Mary Carter of Odessa made a solid run at a 16-second run, but finished with a time of 17.07 seconds. That was good enough, however, to take second-place money, edging out the 17.08 time Shaneae Turelock of Henderson had posted on Thursday.

The final performance's winner in the mutton bustin' competition for youngsters was Bryan Sizenbach of Big Spring, who turned in an 88-point ride.

Tiger wins U.S. Open rewriting record book

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) — In the first U.S. Open of a new century, Tiger Woods' only real competition came from guys who played more than 100 years ago.

And, just as he did against the Open field this week, Woods blew away his ancient rivals.

Woods turned the 100th Open into a one-man show Sunday, winning by 15 strokes over Ernie Els and Miguel Angel Jimenez for the biggest victory margin in the history of major championship golf.

In a performance even more dominating than his 12-stroke victory at the 1997 Masters, Woods tied the Open record with a score of 12-under 272. No one else in the field could break par.

"All week, I had a sense of calmness that I haven't had in quite a while," Woods said. "It was reminiscent of Augusta in '97. No matter what happened, I was able to keep my composure and focus on the shot I needed to make."

On Father's Day, Woods cradled the silver trophy in his left arm and thought about the man who taught him how to play golf.

"I can't wait to give this thing to my dad and let him rub it a little bit," he said.

Earl Woods watched on TV from his home in southern California as his son completed the fifth wire-to-wire victory in a U.S. Open.

"I can't tell you enough about what my dad meant to my golf. And to me, as a person growing up, and all the times that I had questions in life and all the guidance that he's given me," the younger Woods said.

"My dad always took me out and we practiced and played and had a lot of fun competing against each other. Those are the times you look back on and you reminisce and you miss."

Woods was so far in front of the field, he might as well have been playing by himself. Leading by a record 10 strokes at the start of the day, he had four birdies in a span of five holes on the back nine Sunday while relentlessly marching to his third major title.

Woods' 15-stroke margin not only shattered the Open mark

of 11 set by Willie Smith in 1899, but was the largest in any major championship — surpassing the 13-stroke victory by Old Tom Morris in the 1862 British Open.

Woods, the first player in Open history to finish 72 holes at double digits under par, also tied the lowest score in a U.S. Open. Jack Nicklaus shot 272 in 1980, and Lee Janzen matched that mark in 1993.

"Records are great, but you don't really pay attention to that," Woods said. "The only thing I know is I got the trophy sitting right next to me. To perform the way I did, and on one of the greatest venues in golf, it doesn't get much better than that."

Woods now has played in 14 majors as a professional and won three of them, including the 1997 Masters and the PGA Championship last August.

"I don't know how much more there is to say," Els said. "We've been talking about him for two years. I guess we'll be talking about him for the next 20. When he's on, we don't have much of a chance. He's near perfect, the way he played this week."

Woods had the lowest score in three of the four rounds of this year's Open.

"Tiger Woods was playing a different tournament after two rounds," Jimenez said. "After two rounds, I was playing against everybody else."

More history awaits next month. Woods goes to the British Open at St. Andrews with a chance to become only the fifth player — and at age 24, the youngest — to win all four major championships.

While the weather varied throughout the tournament — brilliant sunshine giving way to fog, wind rising and then disappearing — Woods was remarkably steady. Even the weather did little to challenge him Sunday, providing a mild, still day for his coronation.

In a tournament that marked the U.S. Open farewell of Jack Nicklaus after a record 44 straight years and began with an emotional tribute to the late Payne Stewart, Woods' dominance robbed the final round of any drama or tension.

Rangers continue to struggle with 6-1 loss to Tampa Bay

The Texas Rangers are struggling, and the Tampa Bay Devil Rays took advantage.

The defending AL West champions lost for the 10th time in 11 games Sunday, falling 6-1 to the Devil Rays, who haven't been playing like a last-place team lately.

Texas halted a nine-game skid Saturday — its longest in five years — with good pitching and timely hitting. But the performance didn't carry over, as Tampa Bay overcame a slow start against Rick Helling (7-6) to hand the Rangers right-hander his fifth straight loss.

"Three years ago when I won 20 games, I said all year you don't have any control over wins and losses as a starting pitcher. You do the best you can to keep the games close and give your team a chance to win," Helling said.

"That year, I won a bunch of them. This year, so far I'm losing a bunch. Once the ball leaves your hand and the hitter does whatever he's going to do with it, you don't really have much control over it."

In other American League games Sunday, it was: Chicago 17, New York 4; Toronto 5, Boston 1; Oakland 21, Kansas City 3; Cleveland 9, Detroit 4; Anaheim 8, Baltimore 6; and Seattle 10, Minnesota 2.

In the National League, it was: Colorado 19, Arizona 2; New York 7, Milwaukee 3; Florida 5, Pittsburgh 4; Atlanta 5, Philadelphia 3; Montreal 4, Chicago 3 in 11 innings; Houston 4, San Francisco 2 in 11 innings; San Diego 8, Cincinnati 7; and Los Angeles 6, St. Louis 3.

The Rangers, who usually tear up Devil Rays pitching, were held to nine singles and finished with just two extra-base hits in the three-game series. Helling, who had been 4-0 at Tropicana Field, allowed six runs on eight hits in 6 2/3 innings.

The game got away from the Rangers in the seventh. Trailing 2-1, they looked like they might get out of the inning when Ozzie Guillen hit a sharp grounder to second baseman Luis Alicea.

But instead of turning it into an inning-ending double play, Alicea's flip for a force at second sailed over shortstop Royce Clayton's head and rolled into shallow left field.

Bobby Smith scored from first base,

and Bubba Trammell later doubled with the bases loaded to drive in three more runs and make it 6-1.

The Rangers finished 1-8 on a nine-game road trip, their worst stretch away from home since June 1993. Manager Johnny Oates said there's no secret to what it'll take to get back on track.

"Just good pitching and good hitting. That's sound baseball," Oates said.

"We'll be fine. We go through streaks like this every year. And we're going to have another good streak. We'll bounce back. We'll get the starting pitching straightened out, and we'll get home and get regrouped, and we'll be fine."

White Sox 17, Yankees 4

Jose Valentin's grand slam capped a nine-run first inning off Orlando Hernandez, and Chicago won its seventh straight overall and 11th in a row on the road.

While the two-time World Series champions are 37-33, a half-game behind AL East-leading Boston and just a half-game ahead of Toronto, the White Sox (44-24) lead second-place Cleveland by 7 1/2 games in the Central.

Chicago became the first visiting team to score 17 or more runs at Yankee

Stadium since Cleveland on Aug. 4, 1990. Valentin and Carlos Lee each had four RBIs.

Hernandez gave up nine runs, six hits and three walks, getting just two outs.

Blue Jays 5, Red Sox 1

Raul Mondesi homered twice and Frank Castillo (3-5) pitched seven shutout innings of three-hit ball at Fenway Park. Billy Koch got the final out, retiring Jose Offerman on a bases-loaded grounder for his 15th save.

Brad Fullmer also homered for the Blue Jays, who stole a season-high five bases. Jeff Fassero (6-3) gave up four runs and five hits in 3 1/3 innings.

Athletics 21, Royals 3

John Jaha, Terrence Long, Ramon Hernandez and Frank Menechino homered as the visitors scored the most runs in the major leagues this year.

Oakland, which won its season-best fifth straight, broke it open with 10 runs in the third and five in the fourth.

It was the largest margin of victory for Oakland, breaking the previous mark of 16 set at Milwaukee in 1985, and it was Royals' largest margin of defeat since they began play in 1969.

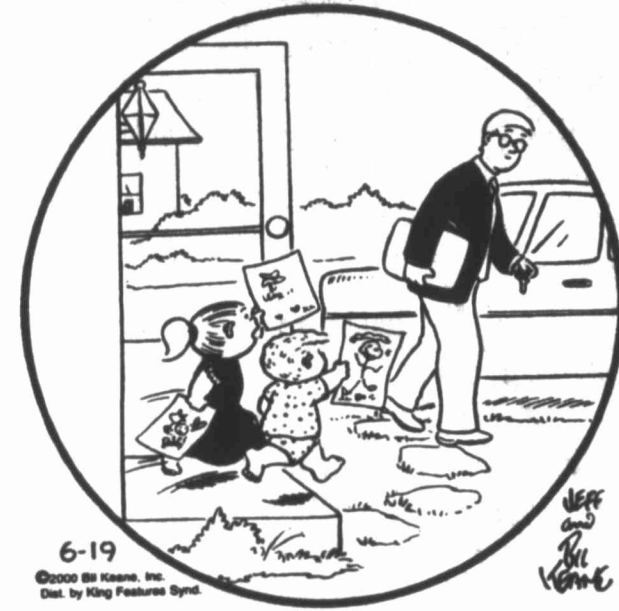

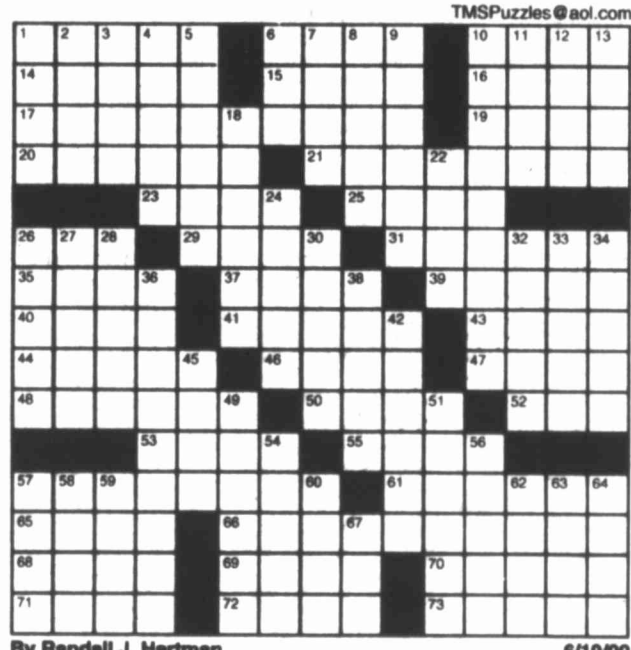
