Little Things May Start Big Wars

BOUNDARY CLASH MAY BE SPARK TO START DISASTROUS MIX

WITH HOOVER IN LATIN AMERICA—(By Cable)—A bullet fired in the little town of Sarajevo in August, 1914, proved the spark that touched a war that swept Europe and eventually reached out to blight the whole world.

Likewise, the recent clash between a handful of Bolivian and Paraguayan soldiers at Fort Vanguardia, on the disputed frontier between those two countries, may prove the spark that will touch off a disastrous South American war unless the mediation efforts at Washington succeed in bringing peace.

Even a visitor to South America can see that the volatility of contiguous nations is dangerous. Especially does this apply to Chile, which is proud, powerful and prepared for war and is on the most friendly terms with Little Paraguay, Peru, which fears Chile, is friendly to Bolivia for that reason. The sores of bygone wars are still being nursed.

In Fear Of Chile
It is the same fear of Chile, it appears, that has proved the sole check on Bolivia which, if opposed only by Paraguay in a war, would stand to clinch thousands of square miles of disputed territory on the frontier. This land contains possibly much oil, rich quebracho forests and would also afford more Bolivia a route to the sea, down the mighty Parana to the Atlantic.

The "Gran Chaco," as the disputed territory between Bolivia and Paraguay is known, is one of the most primitive areas in the world. Filled with alligators, huge poisonous snakes and strange beasts of many kinds, it is populated by roving Indians who follow the same customs and habits of life today as they did when Ferdinand Magellan sailed down the east coast of the continent four hundred years ago.

Chaco Likened To Hell
"When our ancestors invented hell they had no knowledge of the Chaco," John Foster Fraser, an English journalist, once wrote. He described the heart of this country as containing nothing more than swamps and forests, mosquitoes and fever and savage Indians who would run a spear through a white man without compunction. The

FEAR ANOTHER FLU OUTBREAK

MORE SERIOUS WAVE OF ILLNESS IS FORECAST LATER IN WINTER

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—Another outbreak of influenza more severe than the disease now prevailing is regarded as a possibility later in the winter by Surgeon General Cummings. He said that he viewed the situation at present as serious, but declared that the present wave is mild in character and that there is an apparent absence of complications.

There is little likelihood in the opinion of the surgeon general that the disease will not spread over the Atlantic states as it has the west and parts of the south.

He agreed with the estimate by public health officers that there were approximately a million and a quarter new cases in the United States during the week ending December 22.

Deaths from 58 cities for the week ending December 22 were 710 reports to the census bureau show, as compared with 475 deaths in 62 cities for the previous week.

Hoover Will Visit Texas, Is Prospect

DALLAS, Dec. 28 (P)—President-elect Herbert Hoover is expected to make a trip to Texas before his inauguration despite the fact that he is returning direct to Washington from his South American good-will tour, Leonard Withington, director of the republican state organization in Texas, said yesterday.

Withington said he had information from National Committeeman H. B. Cramer that he would seek to have Hoover visit the state.

ADAMS CASE HAS SECOND INDICTMENT ECHO

NEW FORGERY COUNTS FACE DALLAS PAIR

CHARGES, A F T E R M A T H OF FATAL SHOOTING AFTER ELECTION

DALLAS, Dec. 28.—Ben C. Richards, a former cyclops of the Ku Klux Klan, today was indicted for the second time in connection with an election bet that resulted in the shooting to death of Orville L. Mathews, Dallas banker, here Sept. 1. A second indictment, also charging forgery, was returned against A. A. Crabb.

The indictments today charged Richards and Crabb with having forced the name of Clyde R. Vest on a \$1,000 check held by Mathews as half of a bet on the Tom Connally-Earle B. Mayfield senatorial election. The previous indictments, returned about two weeks ago, charged Richards and Crabb with the same offense in connection with the other \$1,000 check.

All of the indictments against the two men are an aftermath of the trial of V. Ray Adams, Bartlett, farmer, for Mathews' slaying. A jury which heard testimony against Adams, who claimed he won the \$2,000 was unable to reach a verdict.

Mathews was slain, testimony at Adams' trial showed, after he had said he was unable to pay the \$2,000 to Adams, having already paid it to "Vest" on the strength of allegedly forged affidavits.

Richards is at liberty under \$5,000 bond on the first indictment. Crabb has been held in jail.

Traveling Salesman Robbed Near Dallas

DALLAS, Dec. 28 (P)—His automobile crowded to the side of the highway by two men in a small coupe, Robert P. Keith of Dallas, traveling salesman, was held up and robbed of \$146 and a number of checks today near Kaufman. Several automobiles passed while he was being robbed. Keith said, but he was powerless to give the alarm.

Burglary Charge Facing Man Here

Charles Wheeler, alias Lee Jones, is in the city jail facing charges of burglary following his attempt Monday to peddle several articles of clothing and hardware in this city.

A representative of the Wilson Mercantile company of Wilson, Tex., yesterday identified a large number of articles found in Wheeler's store as stolen from that store Saturday night.

Explosion Claims Life Of Dallas Man

MARSHALL, Dec. 28 (P)—An explosion of a drum of compressed air, used in operating a paint spray gun, cost the life of Glenn Wade of Dallas here yesterday. The drum exploded as Wade was bending over it. The impact crushed his head and he died an hour later.

PEACE HOPES HANDED BLOW BY BOLIVIANS

TROOPS ADVANCE INTO PARAGUAYAN AREA, DISPATCH SAYS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—A note advising the state department that Bolivian troops had recaptured Fort Vanguardia, where the clash occurred on December 6 "which precipitated the present Bolivian-Paraguayan controversy, and that Bolivian forces had advanced 12 miles into Paraguayan territory," was transmitted to the state department today by the Paraguayan charge d'affaires, Juan Ramirez.

No overnight advice regarding this alleged military operation had as yet reached the Bolivian legation.

Paraguay in its communication to its legation here said that "a very grave situation has again been created, because Paraguay alone can not avoid new fighting."

SALE OF OIL LANDS TO BE MADE LATER

MOODY AND ATTORNEY GENERAL RULE DELAY AGREES WITH LAW

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Dec. 28.—Practically no chance for a special session of the legislature to forestall advertised leasing of valuable Texas university oil lands January 2, remained today after statements from Governor Moody and advices from the Attorney General's department to the state land office holding that the leasing can be deferred until later in January.

The governor said that he would not call a special session if there is any way to postpone the leasing, advertised under terms of the law by Land Commissioner J. T. Robinson. The governor said he would follow the ruling of the attorney general and that Robinson, who is out of the city, had agreed to do likewise.

Governor Moody would not definitely decide against a special session, however, until he had further opportunity to examine the opinion of Assistant Attorney General C. W. Trueheart to the land office advising that the leasing can be deferred. The regular legislative session meets January 8.

"These lands should not be leased at present, and I will do whatever is necessary to prevent the lease sales," the governor said. This was his stand at a recent conference with university regents.

With the sales deferred until later in January, the regular 41st legislature would have time to withdraw the lands from the market.

The governor later got in touch with Trueheart and asked him for an opinion as to whether a repealing law would be just as effective after the lease sale date of January 2, as before.

"If Trueheart says the lease law under which these lands are advertised can be repealed just as effectively, after January 2, I will not do it," the governor said.

HERESY MAY FACE PASTOR AT CAMERON

CAMERON, Tex., Dec. 28.—Rev. H. G. Kenney, pastor of the First Presbyterian church here, has been summoned to appear before the Central Texas Presbytery in Temple January 8 to answer allegations on which heresy charges may be predicated.

Rev. Kenney received the summons yesterday from the secretary of the presbytery.

"The charges, I understand, are based on excerpts from my sermons and addresses which possibly may have lost their meanings by separation from the context of the sermons," the 39 year old minister said. "However, I have trained myself to do my own thinking and do not intend to take my opinions from any man or body of men."

The local pastor is a great admirer of Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, noted for his modernistic ideas.

"Those who have made the charges will be called on to appear at the trial, which I have no doubt will take place and there I intend to challenge their competency on both moral and intellectual grounds," the pastor declared.

He expressed the opinion that all of the trouble was due to "a little clique" which resented being "unable to run the church."

Vet's Old Pistol Checks Bandit

CHICAGO, Dec. 23 (P)—There aren't any more bullets in Joseph M. Adler's old army pistol today, but there is one less bandit alive.

Adler came out of the World War with the revolver and a wooden leg. Last night, when four men held up his drug store, the war veteran, who was in his living quarters above the store, took the gun from a drawer and hobbled downstairs.

Through a peephole Adler saw his clerk being held off by revolvers of the four robbers. Pushing open the door and bracing himself with his wooden leg, Adler opened fire. His first shot went through the heart of one of the bandits, later identified by finger prints, as Harry Cassel, 24. Another man was wounded and had to be dragged from the store by his companions, who returned Adler's fire without effect.

ARRESTS ARE BASED ON TALK DURING SLEEP

DEL RIO, Dec. 28.—Falling through other channels to solve slaying of an unidentified aged woman, whose battered body was found last February by a Comstock ranchman, authorities tonight turned their attention to an investigation of sleep talking by two prisoners, which may implicate several persons in the crime.

Sheriff Whistler left Monday for Sweetwater to quiz two suspects, a man and a woman, both of whom are asserted to have conversed while asleep about the slaying and to have mentioned names of at least two men for whom officers have been searching secretly.

FOUR DIE IN GRADE CRASH

CROSSING MISHAP NEAR LAKE CHARLES IS FATAL TO PARTY

LAKE CHARLES, La., Dec. 28.—Four persons are dead and another is suffering slight injuries as a result of a crossing tragedy yesterday near Iowa Junction.

The dead are: Mrs. Louise Plaisance, 40, Beaumont, Texas; Miss Jeannie Plaisance, 18, Miss May Plaisance, 16; Ridley Robichaux, 21, of Saratoga, Texas; Woodney Gaudet, 22, Boling, Texas, escaped with minor injuries. The car was demolished.

The party was returning to Beaumont from a visit with relatives at Raceland and Lockport, LaFourche Parish. Since the accident occurred a few miles across the boundary lines in Jefferson Davis Parish, Dr. V. A. Miller, surgeon of that parish, deposed Dr. W. L. Fisher, coroner of Cadeaux Parish, to view the bodies.

Miss Jeannie Plaisance died immediately of a broken neck, and the other three of internal injuries.

Home Burns; Toll Is Four Cremated

GASTONIA, N. C., Dec. 28 (P)—J. W. Vanderburg, a farmer, his wife and three of their children were killed, and their bodies were burned today in their home near here.

A 17 year old son is held suspected of having slain the five and set fire to the home in an effort to hide the crime. Police said they had been informed that the son had become angered about something and become violent.

\$1000 BOND SET FOR BARBEE CASE

Bonds of \$1000 each were set this morning in the case of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Barbee, charged with the sale of intoxicating liquor. They had not made the bonds this morning.

They were arrested Wednesday at Fort Worth and returned here yesterday by Deputy Cap Moore where they face indictments of liquor violations. It is alleged that they operated an alleged "road house" in the southwest part of the city last summer, and that they left here during an investigation by the district grand jury.

POSSES HUNT FOR CONVICT AS MURDERER

FEAR GIRL SLAIN AND BODY HIDDEN BY NEGRO TRUSTY

PARCHMAN, Miss., Dec. 28.—J. D. Duvall, 55, a carpenter sergeant at the state prison farm here, was found murdered today, his 18 year old daughter, Ruth, was missing and was believed to have met with foul play, and a negro trusty who had been working in the Duvall home was sought by posses with blood hounds.

Duvall was found by his wife about 3:30 a. m., when she discovered he had not retired. His throat was slashed and he was suffering from wounds on the head inflicted by a hammer.

Mrs. Duvall then called her daughter, and receiving no answer, went to her room. She was not there, although there were evidences she had retired.

L. T. Fox, superintendent of the penitentiary, expressed the opinion that the trusty, Charley Shepherd, had killed Duvall and his daughter and had carried her body away.

ROAD CAMPAIGN TO BEGIN SOON

A definite campaign is expected to be launched in the near future in the interest of the \$1,000,000 road bond issue to be voted on January 12.

C. E. Maedgen, chairman of the organization which sponsored the bond election, stated shortly after the election was called that the campaign proper would begin soon after Christmas. The original plans called for the campaign to be carried to all parts of the county in an effort to pass the bonds, which would care for the county's part in paving the state and federal highway through Lubbock county.

Mr. Maedgen said this morning that he had been telling friends long and the nothing definite had been done. The election date is two weeks from tomorrow.

George R. Bean, chairman of the executive committee, was out of the city this morning and could not be reached for a statement.

Native Of Belgium Dies At Brownfield

Joe Herzey, 57, who was born in Belgium and who lived 12 miles southeast of Brownfield died at his home about 3 o'clock this morning.

Mr. Herzey came to this country at the age of 14, living five miles north of Lubbock for more than twenty years before moving to Brownfield.

The body was brought here today and funeral services will be held at the Bynum Brothers chapel at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Other than his wife he is survived by four sons: Gus, P. H. V. L. and Earl, all living near Brownfield; two daughters, Rose and Lilian, who live at the family residence; two brothers, Robert and August Herzey and a mother and sister, all of Kansas.

King George Has Turn For Worse

LONDON, Dec. 28. (P)—King George has regained some of the ground which he lost yesterday, but his condition was fraught with anxiety, and in well-informed circles it was thought that his Majesty still has a hard fight for life ahead of him.

The king's physicians reported this morning that while the condition of the affected lung region had definitely improved, his general condition has not shown the same progress. In other words weakness and a deficiency of recuperative power persist to a serious degree. A lengthy consultation was held this morning by five of the noted specialists who have been attending his Majesty.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Fashion's greater insistence upon things feminine is reflected in the season's preference for the two-piece frock. It is so short a time since everything was one-piece that it is astonishing how everything, even to chic bathing suits, are adopting the two-piece style that is more likely to emphasize the waist line. In reality, it is fundamental in this swinging of fashions towards a more figure that acknowledges more contours than the boyish form had. Mode affects formal gowns. Even evening gowns bow to this

trend. I have, in my collection, several costumes that use two fabrics to fashion them, with the bodice separate from the skirt. The little jackets show this trend. And daytime frocks exploit it.

Most of the jumpers, overblouses or belted tunics today stress the feminine neck line also. Lingerie touches play no small role in new styles. Bows are as ubiquitous as ever. Collars have a way of expressing originality in their cut, or in the way they join the blouse, either front or back.

Among my Palm Beach frocks all of these points are noticeable. A Gailahad blue frock has its overblouse fitted below a tailored belt to fashion a tight yoke. Its lower edge is scalloped. It has a sweet little irregular collar of fine cream batiste, hand tucked and hand embroidered with tiny black polka dots. This batiste makes a little ruffle that sticks out of the side closing the blouse and fashions turned back cuffs. Crystal buttons are its only other trim.

A little hand made and extremely

chic frock is of Sweet William-red French crepe, with a hand embroidered fashioning a collar and cuffs that have smart pointed shape. A big bow tie of the silk makes a girlish neck of this frock. This frock also uses crystal buttons.

The cut of this frock should be mentioned also. For it shows a tendency towards both hip and shoulder yokes that spring in expression. The yoke points down on each shoulder and in the back has a very deep single point.

Ensemble Illustrates Style
A white flat crepe three-piece ensemble illustrates some of the points I have made. Its jumper is very intricately cut, with its lower band pointing up in graduated heights in a decorative manner. It has a novel little front yoke that ties into a little bow. The back has exactly the same kind of a little yoke and bow, showing the way costumes this year do not slight the rear.

Some frocks even button down the back, a style that it might be well to note. For by summer this may be very popular.

HOOVER HAS PLENTY WORK

SELECTION OF CABINET AND WRITING OF ADDRESS LEFT

(By Associated Press)
ABOARD U. S. UTAH, Dec. 28.—With the labors of his presidential campaign and his good-will trip through Latin-America behind him, Herbert Hoover faces another strenuous period during the less than two months which remain before his inauguration.

The president-elect has before him the selection of his cabinet, the mapping of the policies of his administration and the preparation of his inaugural address. To write this address one of the most important of his career, which he will deliver at his inauguration March 4. Mr. Hoover will go from Washington to Florida in the middle of January to take up his residence on the quiet Pennycuik estate on an island near Miami.

Mr. Hoover naturally has been giving his thoughts to his cabinet, but if he has made any definite selections he has kept them entirely to himself. Even his closest adviser on the American tour assert he has given no indication of his appointments.

The general belief is, however, that Secretary Mellon will remain as the head of the Treasury Department and possibly one other member of the cabinet of President Coolidge will be retained.

It was reiterated today that Mr. Hoover will make no effort during his stay in the national capital to influence legislation pending before the present session of Congress and that the calling of an extra session of the new congress depends upon what the present session does, especially with respect to farm legislation.

The president elect is continuing to rest aboard the Utah after his strenuous activities and arduous trips through Central and South America. He already is absent less of the physical strain which was evident when he sailed from Rio de Janeiro last Sunday night.

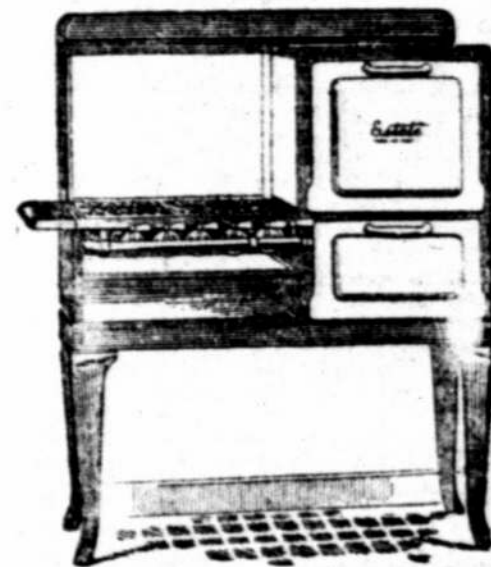

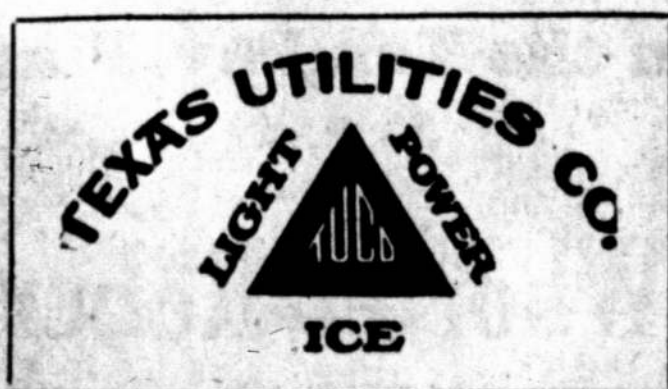

ONCE MIGHTY EASTERN TEAMS ALL SUFFER FROM REVERSES

NEW YORK, Dec. 28 (AP)—Undeclared season was few when the football season came to a close but they will be even scarier in intercollegiate basketball if upsets continue to take as heavy a toll as they have in early season games.

"Of course, you can't take away any of the credit from Georgia Tech and Tennessee for those victories, but I am sure that too much all-star talk seeped into the ranks and played an important part in the defeats. Especially our close defeat by Tennessee this year."

WORLD COURT TO HEAR PLEA OF HUNGARIAN ARCHDUKE SOON

(By Associated Press)
BUDAPEST, Dec. 28.—A suit for recovery of property valued at one billion dollars has been instituted before the permanent court of international justice at the Hague, it became known today.

The suit is that of Archduke Albrecht, pretender to the Hungarian throne, and is brought on behalf of his father, the Archduke Frederick, field marshal of the Austrian army during the war, and richest member of the House of Hapsburg. It is for recovery of property consisting of royal palaces, castles, villas, estates, antiquities, paintings, jewelry, furniture, gold and silver objects belonging to Frederick in Italy, Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia and Rumania, and sequestered by those states under the peace treaties.

Then came Santa Claus, a huge pack of toys on his shoulder, passing the trinkets to both young and old. After Santa had distributed his burden, Mr. Rockefeller gave out the more expensive gifts that were stacked about the tree.

BUSINESS GOOD IN RESERVE DISTRICT

(By Associated Press)

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 28.—Business conditions in the seven states of the tenth federal reserve district were reported more uniformly good in the monthly resume of the Kansas City Federal reserve bank, tonight, than at the close of any recent year.

Business displayed more activity than usual in November, said the report, and the volume was higher than in the preceding month or the same period last year. Retail trade continued heavy throughout November, and at the beginning of December, with the holiday trade at its height, was reported at the peak of the year.

The final crop estimate, issued late in December, reflected few important changes in estimated yields in the district from those reported in November. Indicated yields of winter and spring wheat, oats, barley, potatoes, grain sorghums, broom corn and cotton were larger than the 1927 crops, and estimates of corn, hay, potatoes and sugar beets were smaller.

"Demand for bank credit, reflecting expansion in industry and trade continued heavy through November and the forepart of December, with funds ample to meet all requirements and no apparent change in discount or interest rates," the report stated.

of the web of life," he declared, asserting that the great problem of plant protection is to determine what man can do to restore the unity of the natural order when his activity has disturbed it.

The restlessness of the earth's crust in the region of Central America and the Andes over a period of nearly half a billion years was described by Prof. Charles Schuchert of Yale.

"What stands out most clearly," he said, "is that there was no Gulf of Mexico 100,000,000 years ago."

It was formed millions of years later, he said, and was at

one time at least three times as large as it is now, covering northern Central America, most of the greater Antilles, all of eastern Mexico and all of the Gulf states from Texas north to Illinois and east to Florida.

erage layman. Airplanes that can remain in flight for thousands of miles through the air at 100 miles an hour with safety, would be of untold value to military and civil aviation.

The quartet of army fliers by obtaining fuel from another plane while in flight, plan to remain aloft 300 hours or more if their engines,

equipment and nervous systems can endure the strain.

If they remain in the air 300 hours they will fly more than 27,000 miles—a distance greater than the circumference of the earth. The army is not planning a globe-girdling flight without stop, but the significance of the flight in spanning comparatively shorter distances can be realized best from this startling comparison.

One reason the Question Mark will carry on its tests over California, rather than in some spectacular long-distance flight is that the Federation Aeronautique Internationale insists in its rules that a plane must return to the point of departure if it wants to claim a world record. The army plans to break the present world record for endurance and distance with the aid of refueling, a record now held by Belgium.

The greatest hazard in long distance flying across oceans and continents today, aside from bad weather, lies in the danger of crashing under the burden of heavy gasoline loads when taking off. If the refueling test is successful, future trans-Atlantic planes probably will get into the air with a small amount of gas and then receive their heavy load from another plane as they fly to sea.

Likewise transcontinental planes, carrying priceless cargoes of silks or gems now carried by fast heavily guarded trains, could continue their long journeys with greater speed and safety by obtaining fuel while in flight. Long distance could be cut down by taking a great circle course rather than route which must include well equipped fields at the bigger cities.

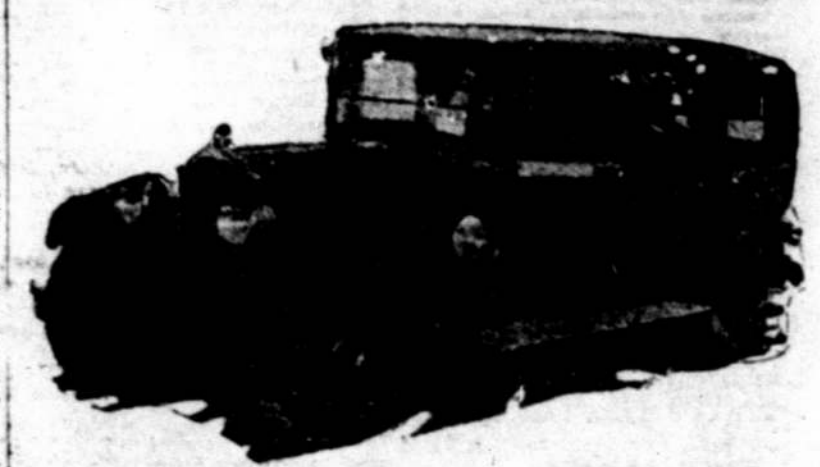

"There are three main reasons why this land should not be leased now," Governor Moody said: "first, because of the present low price of oil and the consequent prospect of getting low bids; second, if there is oil under the land and new production is brought in, the university's royalties probably would be depreciated because of increased production; third, the land leasing statute of 1925 is already antiquated. Should Repeal Law
"In my opinion, one of the first things the legislature should do is to repeal this 1925 law, and pass one allowing the university to get the full value of its mineral leases."

The lease sale advertised for January 8 offers 103,000 acres of unward, Winkler, Crane and Upton proved university lands located in counties. Recent Robert L. Holliday, of El Paso, said he expected the university would receive an average price of \$3 an acre for the land, if sold January 2. The school may be worth millions as mineral property, he contended.

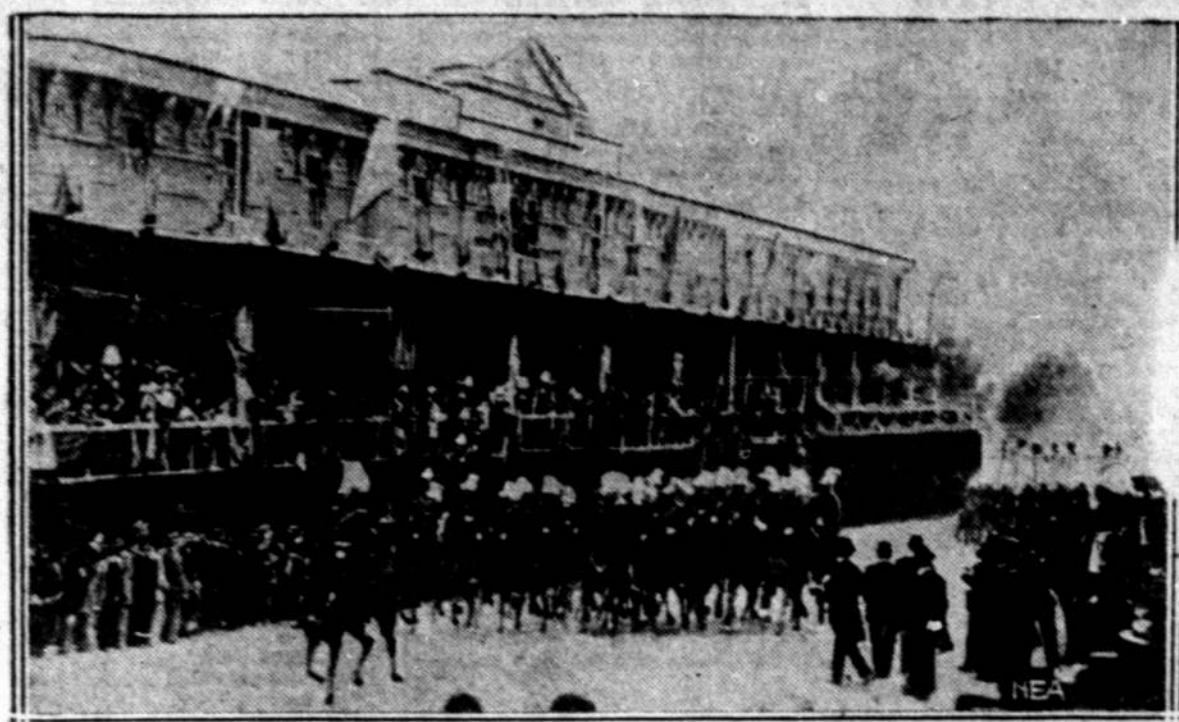

TEXAS PROF IN RESEARCH

AUSTIN EDUCATOR MAY AGAIN WIN PRAISE FROM SCIENTISTS

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Dec. 28 (P)—Pursuing the line of research which won a \$1,000 prize for the most valuable contribution to science in 1927, Dr. H. J. Muller, Texas University zoology professor, has gotten results from new experiments which support the theory of evolution. Dr. J. F. Patterson, zoology department director announced today.

Dr. Patterson and Dr. Muller will disclose his experiments in a paper today in New York before the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Still working with the fruit fly Dr. Muller has succeeded in causing breakages and translocations of chromosomes in the germ cells with the x-ray. This is significant, the latter scientist said. First, it provides more conclusive evidence that has never been shown before that the genes in a chromosome lie in a linear line. Second, it supports the theory of evolution. Dr. Patterson said, in this it demonstrated how new types of individuals having different arrangement of chromosomes may spring up, or have sprung up, in nature.

A chromosome is a minute particle containing the hereditary particle or gene within a cell.

The paper was prepared in collaboration with Prof. Edgar Altenburg of Rice Institute at Houston. Experiments were performed largely in laboratories here, with Dr. T. S. Painter assisting in the microscopic work.

Dr. Muller treated the fruit fly cell with x-ray so that the chromosomes within the cell would arrange themselves in an order different from their natural one, causing the new order to continue through successive generations. He found, after considerable experiment, that he was able to predict the sort of rearrangement that would take place when the x-ray was applied. Dr. Painter confirmed the predictions under the microscope in nearly every case.

Dr. Muller has been able to secure approximately 15 cases of breakages and translocations and has found that he is able to secure as many as one in ten.

It is declared that only one translocation in the history of science. This occurred by natural means some years ago.

LUBBOCK MAN AT OIL MEET

LAND OWNERS OF ALL WEST TEXAS DUE AT MIDLAND

MIDLAND, Tex., Dec. 28—Land owners from all sections of West Texas are expected here next Monday for a meeting of the Oil and Gas Bureau of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. At this meeting several matters of most vital importance to the land owners in the oil regions of West Texas will be discussed. Lubbock, Amarillo, Pampa, San Angelo and other places are expected to send large delegations.

S. C. Arnett, of Lubbock, member of the oil and gas department of the organization, will be among the delegates to attend the meeting.

The meeting will be the annual mid-winter session of the bureau. It was originally scheduled for two weeks ago but had to be delayed because of the hearing in Austin in which the attorney general asked for a change in Rule 37, regarding drilling within 150 feet of a river bed. Under the law these suits must be tried in the district court at Austin and efforts will be made to have the law changed so that the suits may be tried in the counties where the land is located.

Mexico Seeks End To Internal Debts

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 28 (P)—A law has been passed authorizing Mexican Portes Oil to negotiate with foreign governments for aggregate settlements covering all claims of their nationals against the Mexican government for revolutionary damages. The law is intended to fix Mexico's internal indebtedness.

The bill provides for the appointment of a committee to study and fix the total internal obligations after which the president will issue a law regulating the payments. All obligations will be funded into a single issue redeemable in not less than 45 years and bearing 5 per cent interest. The bonds will be secured by such revenues as the government may designate.
