Lower Florida Braces For Scheduled Hurricane

Mrs. Lois Pantages Found Guilty Of Manslaughter

Wife Of Theatre Magnate Will Be Sentenced To Pen

No Recommendation Made By Jury For Leniency In Second Degree Murder Case At Los Angeles

Women Jurors Weep

Sentence Will Range From One To Ten Years In The State Penitentiary, Law Of California States

(By Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Sept. 25.—Mrs. Lois Pantages, wife of the theatrical magnate, was convicted of manslaughter tonight by a jury which heard her trial on a charge of second degree murder. The jury made no recommendation for leniency. The sentence for manslaughter is fixed by California law from one to ten years in the penitentiary. Three women jurors wept as the verdict was read.

Defendant Collapses
Mrs. Pantages collapsed as the verdict was read, and Dr. E. C. Shbaugh, her physician was summoned. The woman was hysterical and apparently completely unresponsive. She was removed from the courtroom to an adjoining room by members of her family where physicians attended her.

Judge Gandy granted Mrs. Pantages her freedom under \$50,000 bond and postponed at the time the charges were filed, pending promulgation of sentence at 2 p. m. today.

Denunciation Of Tariff Measure Heard In Senate

Flexible Provisions Are Attacked As Aftermath To Statement Of Hoover On Principle Retention

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Denunciation of the flexible provisions of the tariff bill resounded in the senate today as an aftermath of President Hoover's statement urging retention of the principle in the Hawley-Smoot measure.

Senators LaFollette of Wisconsin, a republican independent, and George of Georgia, a democratic member of the finance committee, attacked the President for "breaking his long silence" on the tariff question at a time when the most important flexible provisions were at issue and flayed the principle with vigor.

Repeal Hoped

A majority of the democrats hoped to repeal the flexible provisions with the aid of the republican senators from the farm states.

In a speech lasting merely three hours, LaFollette traced the history of the operation of the flexible clause since its enactment in 1922 and asserted "intrigue, political influence of Presidents Harding and Coolidge, and Cabal had destroyed the usefulness of the tariff commission and resulted in tragic failure of the flexible provisions."

President Flayed

The President, he said, had not spoken to indicate whether he approved the pending bill or that the measure complied with his "ambiguous" message to the special session, but had "violated the admonition" of Senator Watson of Indiana, the republican leader, "only to indicate his desires on retention of the flexible provisions."

Prohibition Agent Fatally Wounded When Attacked By Armed Gang Wednesday In Gun Battle

Another Is Sought

Insidious Methods Of Big Organized Bootleg Ring Thought Uncovered After Arrest Of Four

(By Associated Press) SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 25.—Charged with the murder of prohibition officer, Charles Stevens, who was fatally wounded when attacked by an armed gang on the Pleasanton road, six miles from San Antonio, early today, Joe Hoeber, believed to be the "king" of San Antonio bootleg circles, was lodged in county jail along with Alice Smith and Pedro and Louisa Guadalupe late Wednesday afternoon. All were charged with murder, the charges being filed by Sheriff Alfonso Lewis, Jr., in the court of Justice Louis Holt.

Robert Lee Bobbitt Takes Oath Of Office As New Texas Attorney General To Succeed Claude Pollard

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Sept. 25.—Robert Lee Bobbitt, former speaker of the house of representatives and more recently district attorney at Laredo, was appointed attorney general by Governor Moody today. He succeeds Claude Pollard who resigned effective September 17, but who continued to hold office pending appointment of his successor.

In making the announcement Governor Moody read a telegram from Wright Morrow of Houston expressing appreciation for the governor's offer to

make him attorney general and pledging to decline it. Bobbitt took the oath of office, administered by Judge Morrow, whose former home was in Hillsboro, where he was a long time friend of the Bobbitt family, in Governor Moody's office. Mrs. Bobbitt and their little son, Robert Lee, Jr., were present in addition to the Governor.

Bobbitt had been considered as a likely candidate for governor in the primaries next July.

LONG SEARCH ENDS
World-Wide Hunt Results In New Zealand Arrest

TEMPLE, Tex., Sept. 25.—(AP)—A world-wide search carried on by City National bank here which had been swindled out of a large sum of money has resulted in the arrest of A. B. Crouch in Helensville, New Zealand.

Crouch, alleged to have obtained \$150,000 from banks here in 1916 had been living in the New Zealand town since 1918.

Crouch for many years operated a grain business here. Officers claim he used his influence in forging railroad bills of lading on Temple banks and netted \$150,000.

Crouch disappeared March 16, 1918, and the forgeries were not discovered until a few days later.

Crouch's secretary, a married woman, disappeared also at the time of the alleged forgeries. She died several years ago.

Sanitation Group Halts Opening Of Dawson Exposition

Annual County Fair Brought To Halt By Representative Of State Sanitation Commission At Lamesa

Claim Unfairness

Livestock Turned Back At Gates Rather Than Have To Be Confined For Required Quarantine

(Special To The Avalanche) LAMESA, Sept. 25.—The Dawson County fair, scheduled to open today, was disrupted by action of a representative of the state livestock sanitary commission, according to an announcement tonight by fair officials. All livestock, including dairy cattle, hogs and poultry were turned back at the gates by order of the commission or else be confined in quarantine during the time required to test the cattle for tuberculosis, hogs for cholera, and poultry for white diarrhea.

The Dawson county fair only lasts two days and, as the cattle would be confined for a longer period under the quarantine, according to A. J. Lewis, of the state commission and Dr. Y. J. Aiken, veterinarian of Lubbock, a conference of fair officials, business men and stockmen resulted in the abandonment of the livestock show.

Others Not Halted
Long distance calls to other county fair officials, whose fairs are now open or have already closed, revealed that no interruptions and no advice from the state livestock sanitary commission had been received by them. Dawson county has 32

Waggoner's Bond Is Set At \$100,000 Wednesday

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Charles D. Martial Law For Borger Imminent

Brigadier General Wolters Leaves For Austin To Lay Report On Situation Before Governor Moody

(By Associated Press) BORGER, Sept. 25.—Brigadier General Jacob Wolters, who came here today to decide whether martial law would be necessary to curb lawlessness which resulted in the assassination September 12 of District Attorney John A. Holmes, started back to Austin by automobile tonight to lay his report before Governor Moody.

General Wolters refused to indicate the nature of his conclusions when asked whether he would return at the head of troops replied, "I hope not."

Calhoun Silent
Clem Calhoun, special prosecutor, appointed by Governor Moody, accompanied the general and was as silent as Wolters when asked whether the party left by automobile and did not indicate whether the journey would be broken at some town en route, or whether it would push on to Austin.

Wall Street Has Hectic Sessions

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Wall street had a bad case of nerves today when high priced stocks broke \$5 to \$25 a share, and it looked as though the bottom had fallen out of the market. Speculative confidence was quickly restored and prices bounded upward at the close, wiping out or cutting down most of the declines, and leaving the general level of prices only moderately lower.

So great was the rush to sell and buy at times that the ticker fell 20 minutes behind the market. The day's sales fell short of 5,000,000 shares.

Widespread circulation of all sorts of rumors, involving not only the financial stability of some of Wall street's largest operators but of some of the large brokerage houses as well, contributed to the panicky conditions.

Precautions Taken

Weather Bureau Predicts Storm Will Strike Coast Before Daylight; Radios, Newspapers Warn

(By Associated Press) AMPLIFY warned and resignedly ready for whatever eventuality, residents of the lower Florida east coast last night awaited the advent of a tropical cyclone roaring in from the Bahamas.

Weather bureau warnings, broadcast by radio, telephone, courier and newspapers went to the remotest communities with word that the disturbance apparently of hurricane intensity, would likely strike the southeast Florida coast near Miami.

Precautions Taken
The population hastened to take all necessary precautions to avert disaster if the storm should prove severe. With that done, there was nothing to do but wait and watch the descending barometers that presaged the coming of the phenomenon.

Preparations for the winds went on the largest scale ever. Merchants and householders boarded up windows and doors and set their properties in shape for a blow. Ships and boats sought the safest anchorage. Emergency relief bodies

Insurrection In China Is Broken

Nationalist Government Is Relaxing Censorship Of Press Dispatches About Serious Revolts

(By Associated Press) SHANGHAI, China, Sept. 25.—The Nationalist government tonight claimed the insurrection in Hupoh province had been broken with the revolt of the "Ironsides" division surrounded at Lichow.

At the same time censorship was relaxed to permit a flood of press dispatches from Hankow which confirmed the reports of yesterday that General Chang Pak-Wei, commander of the "Ironsides," had dealt Nationalist forces a severe blow before evacuating Ichang.

Casualties Heavy
The government statement tonight said a defeat with heavy casualties had been inflicted on the soldiers of Chang when they were caught up with near the border of Hunan province.

Yesterday Chang was reported to have captured three transports on the Yangtze river below Ichang, capturing 5,000 Nationalist troops and huge quantities of ammunition and rifles.

The Nationalist troops took over Ichang in the wake of the evacuating rebels and established martial law; the city was described as quiet today.

Senate's Propaganda Sifting Deeper Than Shearer Case; Untold Tales Of Naval Struggle May Be Revealed In Probe of Shipbuilding Industry

 WASHINGTON, Sept. 25. (P)—By an unprecedented sequence of circumstances, William B. Shearer, who became the leading figure almost overnight in the international naval limitations drama.

Yes, his only actual naval experience or service of record was a hitch as an enlisted electrician back in Spanish war days, and limited special services as a civilian engineer in navy employ during the world war.

Has Deeper Reason
 Obviously, the desire of President Hoover and of Senator Borah for investigation of Shearer's activities has a much deeper significance than study of the writings of any individual.

They want to know whether three great shipbuilding companies concerted through Shearer to prevent by propaganda, American entry into international competition to reduce and limit its naval power.

Shearer Gives Impetus
 Shearer himself gave original impetus to the inquiry. His suit against the shipbuilders to recover \$250,000 or so as alleged unpaid balance for his services focused upon him the attention of President Hoover and the senate.

The services involved were rendered by Shearer at Geneva during the abortive three-power naval conference. What the Borah resolution seeks to explore is the exact nature and purpose of those services.

Ordered All Probed
 And what was indicated when the senate ordered its investigation was a far-ranging examination of all prospective naval contractors whose future business might be impaired by reductions of the navy.

Neither in the Borah resolution nor in any White House statement was there an intimation that violation of law might be involved, except that President Hoover referred the issue to Attorney General Mitchell.

May Counteract
 So the senate inquiry presumably is to develop facts upon which possible future restrictive statutes might be founded. Or it may be merely to counteract big navy propaganda.

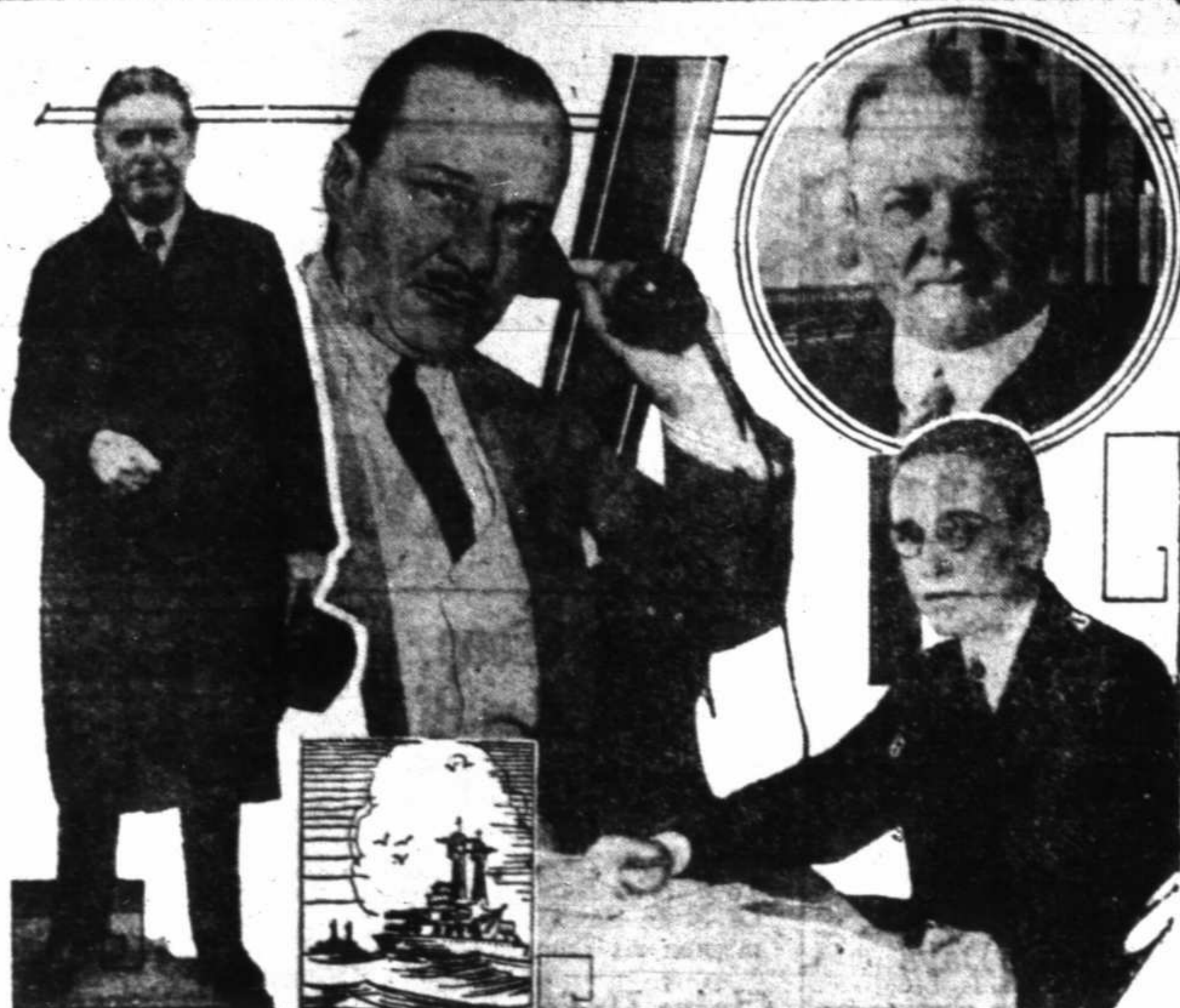
Shearer bobbed into prominence some years ago when he sought unavailingly a court stay of the sinking of the battleship Washington, scrapped under terms of the naval limitation treaty of 1921-22.

He said at that time that he had acted at the request of unnamed naval officers. It is possible the Senate Naval Committee will inquire into circumstances surrounding such action.

Reveal Untold Tales
 And another angle reasonably to be expected is the revealing in an official way of many untold tales of the cruiser deadlock between the United States and Great Britain at the Geneva conference.

Failure of that conference was what induced President Coolidge to lend his support to the bill authorizing construction of 15 cruisers of 10,000 tons within the next few years.

That financial burden lay on Mr. Hoover's doorstep when he entered the presidency.

Former Publisher Files Label Suit

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 25. (P)—Andrew M. Lawrence, former publisher of the San Francisco Journal, now defunct, filed a libel suit in the United States district court here today for \$750,000 against the Chronicle Publishing company. The suit alleges that several paragraphs in a recent Chronicle editorial damaged him.

The complaint asserted that the paragraphs, published last August 29 and entitled "Some Interesting Side Lights on the Passing of the Bulletin" are false, defamatory, untrue and injure the plaintiff as a journalist.

The editorial referred to was published in connection with recent purchase of the San Francisco Bulletin by William Randolph Hearst. The Bulletin, an afternoon newspaper, was suspended.

Lawrence asks actual damages of \$250,000 and exemplary damages of \$500,000.

Aged General Is Claimed By Death

Harry Foote Hodges Victim Of Heart Attack At Age Of 69; Known As "Genus Of Panama Canal"

CHICAGO, Sept. 25. (P)—Major General Harry Foote Hodges, U. S. A. retired, and spoken of by Major General George Goethals as "The genus of the Panama canal," died suddenly of a heart attack tonight at his home in Lake Forest. He was 69 years old.

In 1901 the then Lieutenant Colonel Hodges was with General Leonard Wood of the American Army of Occupation in Cuba, serving as chief engineer. Six years later he went with General Goethals to the Canal Zone, spending seven years there designing and constructing the locks and dams.

He served as commanding officer of the Atlantic coast artillery until 1917.

At the declaration of war by the United States General Hodges was commanding the 76th division at Camp Revons, Mass., and he led that unit overseas.

Two daughters and a son, all of Lake Forest, survive.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 25. (P)—Mothers of America are "the source of effective defense of our nation as well as of its material and spiritual development in time of peace," General Charles P. Summerall, chief of staff, U. S. A., said in an address tonight before the seventh national convention of American war mothers.

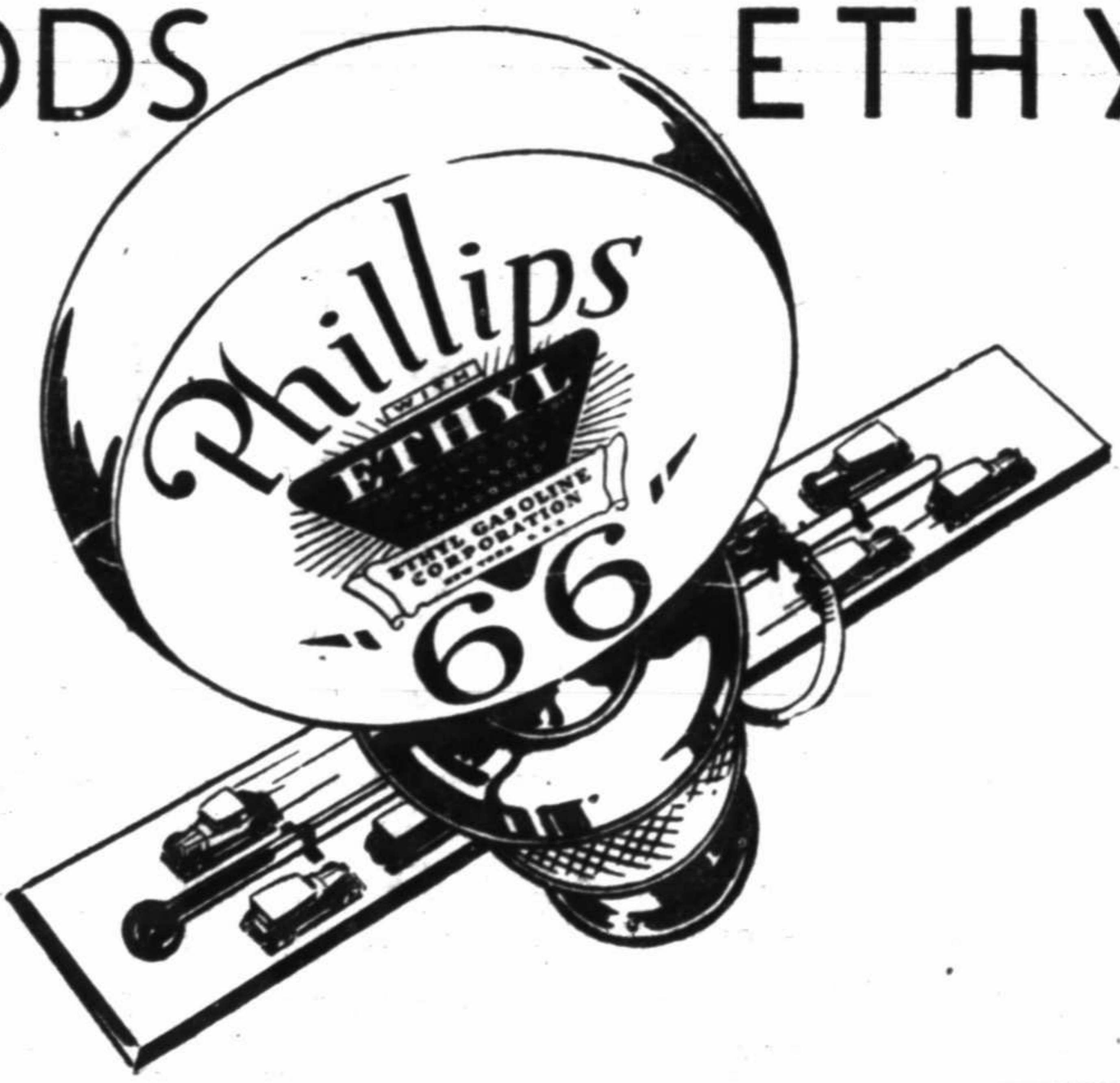

The discipline learned in the homes made possible the American army, he declared, in paying tribute to the mothers of soldiers.

Achievements of agriculture and livestock on the South Plains this year are holding the spotlight of public favor for the next two weeks, with five county fairs under way this week and the Panhandle-South Plains fair ready to open next week.

The Hockley county fair at Levelland after a successful two days, closed yesterday, while at Tahoka, the Lynn County Free fair opened yesterday with prospects for a record attendance.

Fair At Snyder

At Snyder, the ninth annual county fair will be started this morning with indications for a banner array of exhibits and attendance.

Friday will be the opening day of the Terry County fair at Brownwood to last for two days while at Forton, on Saturday, the Cochran County fair will be held.

Exhibitors in the various fairs report that they are gathering all material for the fair here and will be in Lubbock by Friday to prepare booths for the exposition.

Annual Scurry County Fair Is Opened

At Scurry, the opening day for the ninth annual Scurry county fair was held last night when a mass meeting was held at which H. S. Mobley, international known dairy expert, talked on "Make the Cow Your Partner." The speaker stressed the need of diversified farming against the one-crop method and proved his theories with illustrated charts.

The fair is creating more attention than any ever held here. Ten communities, including Duan, Flinn, Dermott, Union, Blon, Gorman, Ennis creek, Gannaway and Ire are fighting for community exhibit honors totaling \$150. This exhibit exceeds last year's total by four.

Entries Heavy

According to Harrie Winston, general superintendent of livestock, 10 head of jersey and beef cattle have been entered and 100 head of sheep.

All classes of Snyder high school vocational agriculture have separate booths vying with 4-H club and some demonstration contest.

The most unusual exhibit is that of Texas Mammoth Wonder wheat with a total of 105 bolts 65 which are open and 40 mature stalks unopened. This variety was developed by C. W. Vonroeder, of Scurry county, and grown on a neighbor farm of Gilmore Darr.

The stalk is well limbed and mated, of medium height.

5,000 Expected.

More than 5,000 people are expected to witness the opening convocation football game between Snyder high school and the Snyder team.

Total premium list of prizes this aggregate \$1,600 and nearby communities are showing interest. Prizes will be given each day of the fair.

Arizona Lowlands Inundated Again

Second Cloudburst Sweeps Southern Area of State; Rivers Swell Banks And Bridges Wash Out

PHOENIX, Ariz., Sept. 25. (AP)—The lowlands of southern Arizona were inundated again today, the second time this week. They had not yet recovered from cloudbursts and floods of Monday night when more water poured upon them yesterday.

Rivers which ordinarily at this time of the year are small streams were tearing at their banks. Several bridges had been torn from their piers and others were weakened, and rail, air and highway traffic were disrupted.

Resembles Lakes. In many places the lowlands resembled lakes. Douglas, near the Mexican border, was surrounded by great sheets of water. Bridges over the Rillito river and Pantano wash were weakened, and highways leading out of the city were impassable. Many motorists were marooned.

The Santa Cruz river at Tucson was nearly out of its banks and threatening to course through the city's streets. Two standard airlines planes, plying between Los Angeles and El Paso, were marooned in the mud of Tucson airport, unable to take off.

Trains Run Late. Trains were running late, and railway officials were discussing advisability of temporary cancellation of schedules. Washouts near Benson, Arizona, halted Southern Pacific and Santa Fe trains running over S. P. lines because of floods in New Mexico, stage lines detoured into Old Mexico and managed to

bring some passengers from the east, avoiding the Benson territory. At the Leupp Navajo agency, 26 miles north of Winslow, 400 Indian children were transported to higher ground when Little Colorado creek burst its banks. The Gila river at Ray Junction had risen more than 24 feet and the creek apparently had not been reached. The San Pedro river at

GENEVA, Sept. 25. (AP)—The assembly of the League of Nations today adjourned its tenth annual session. Delegates from more than 50 nations hailed the meeting as the most constructive and progressive during the ten years existence of the league.

The assembly agreed the spirit of conciliation and mutual concession reigned during this assembly marked a long stride forward in the movement for international peace and security, and disposed of the few remaining subjects on its program by approving committee reports.

Demand Of Hoover Declared Unfair

Senator Claims Request To Furnish Definite Facts Of Prohibition Violation Is Too Difficult

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25. (AP)—Senator Howell, republican, Nebraska, holds it "unfair" of President Hoover to call on him to furnish the department of justice "definite facts with time and place" to back up his statements in the senate last week that the dry law is being violated in Washington.

His assertion that the prohibition law was being violated here, but could be enforced if the chief executive insisted on it, brought a prompt statement from the White House expressing the president's assumption he "would not make these charges unless they were based upon definite facts" and his desire to have the capital made a model in the country for enforcement.

Unable To Furnish. Asserting he was not able to give such facts and that he felt they should not be demanded of a senator, the Nebraska senator supported President Hoover's prohibition views during the pre-election campaign, took his first opportunity to reply in the senate.

"I spoke from what is common knowledge," he said, "and what is believed outside of Washington to be the conditions inside Washington. I believe conditions here are vastly better than in other cities, but the fact remains bootlegging thrives in Washington."

He suggested that Major General Smedley Butler, commander of the marine post at Quantico, Virginia, now engaged in drying up the village which it surrounds, be brought to Washington for this purpose.

NOT TO RETURN. PARIS, Sept. 25. (AP)—Former President Plutarco Elias Calles of Mexico today informed the Associated Press correspondent he did not intend to return for the presidential election campaign, which has produced grave disorders between rival parties.

Cotton Price Firm; Stocks Erratic

Best Levels Are Reached In Late Trading Session

Reactions From Early Rise Followed By Renewed Firmness In Cotton Market At New York

NEW YORK, Sept. 25. (AP)—Reactions from an early advance were followed by a renewed firmness in cotton today with prices reaching the best levels in the late trading on trade buying and covering promoted by the stopping of October notices and unfavorable weather reports.

The opening was steady at a decline of 3 points on the old October contract, but generally 6 to 10 points higher in response to fairly steady Liverpool cable.

October notices covering 12,000 bales were issued here. New York notices were said to have reached 60,000 bales.

After a moderate opening advance prices eased off 13 to 19 points on hedge selling and realizing by buyers and net higher to 23 points in the late trading on fear of the storm and the stoppage of the October notices which caused shorts to cover with contracts scarce. December after advancing to 18.55 in the early trading eased off to 18.38 and later rallied to 18.50 closing at 18.57 or 11 points net higher for the day.

The market turned easier. October eased off to 18.14 and later showed gains of 7 to 8 points. The market improved in early trading. October traded up to 18.27 and January to 18.64 or 9 to 11 points above the previous close.

Authoritative Summary Of Crop Conditions In Corn Belt Indicate Smallest Yield Since 1924

BY JOHN P. BOUGHAN Associated Press Market Editor CHICAGO, Sept. 25. (AP)—Corn led the grain markets upward in price today, especially in the last hour. An authoritative summary of crop conditions prevailing throughout the corn belt indicated that the 1929 crop as a whole is practically made, but that the yield is to be the smallest since 1924.

Almost from the outset, the corn market today showed independent strength, owing a good deal to the forecast of wet weather over part of the corn belt, together with probable frost tonight northwest.

The Colonel set his plane down here at 1:10 p. m. today, concluding the first leg of the home-bound journey in his 7,000 mile aerial tour of the West Indies, South America, Central America and Mexico.

Inconsistency Of Business Men On Pro Law Attacked

Federal Commissioner Of Prohibition Claims Liquor Drinking Is Regarded As Evil Until Interference

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 25 (AP)—Dr. James M. Doran, federal commissioner of prohibition, today attacked as "inconsistent" business leaders who regard liquor drinking as evil for their employes but who feel the law should not interfere with their own drinking.

In an address prepared for delivery before the fifty-fifth annual convention here of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, Dr. Doran said it was encouraging to note that among those prominent in business "there is a growing conviction that they have individual responsibility as leaders and the laws should be respected and observed in good faith" by all.

General Parole Is Given to Kleinman

AUSTIN, Sept. 25 (AP)—A general parole was granted today by Governor Moody to William H. Kleinman, convicted of swindling in Webb county in 1927 and sentenced to serve a five-year sentence.

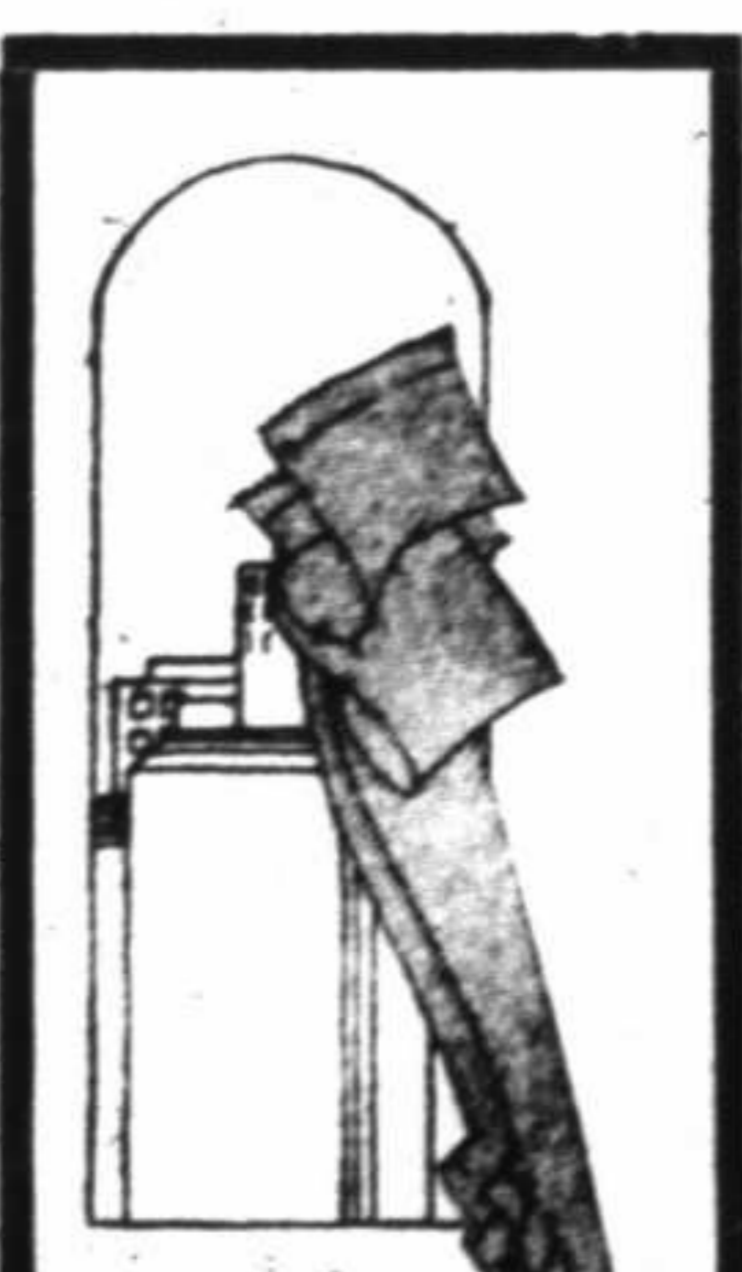
