

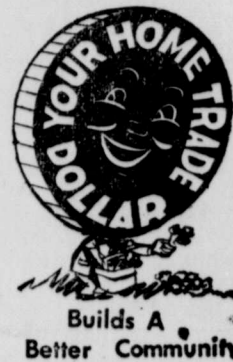

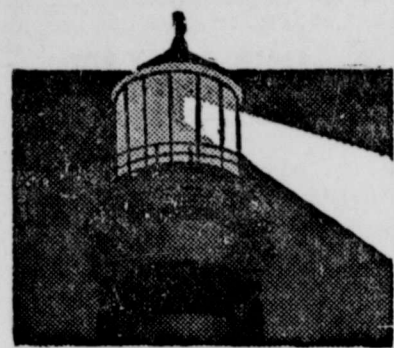

Mitchell County Gets More Rain Saturday

Mitchell county received some more of that good old rain last Saturday and a light sprinkle Sunday and Monday.

The rain covered a wide spread area ranging from 1 inch at Westbrook to 1.40 inches at Loraine. Colorado City Received .90 inches as of Sunday and Champion, southeast of Loraine received 1.65 inches. Maryneal, a few miles southeast of Champion, received only .80 inches.

There were some reported more and some less, but whether it be .10 of an inch or 4 inches, we haven't heard anyone complaining.

This publisher has been asked several times if he were responsible for bringing all this moisture with him when he moved to Loraine. Well he would (as well as others) like to take credit for it, but then there would be times when there was too much rain or not enough and he would get the blame for that. Proper Residue Use Will Yield Better Crop Production

The proper use of crop residue, where sufficient residue is produced, will give more overall production against wind and water erosion than any other practice that can be used. Research reveals that, where a good cover of crop residue is left on the surface of the soil, loss of soil during heavy rains may be reduced by as much as 80 percent; runoff reduced by one-half and loss of soil by wind erosion reduced as much as 90 percent.

These figures will be reduced as the residue diminishes but it has been determined that less than one ton of residue per acre gives impressive results. Sorghums, sudan and small grains are all high residue producing crops and may be grown for residue. When sufficient growth is obtained, they may be harvested or grazed leaving enough residue to manage for erosion protection.

The skip row method of planting cotton makes the growing and management of crop residue possible on cotton land. If the blank rows are planted to high

residue producing crops such as sorghums or small grain in the take enough moisture from the late summer or fall, they will not cotton crop to materially affect the cotton yield and will furnish erosion protection to the land.

In addition to erosion protection, the root system of these crops conditions the soil on which they grow to absorb water faster thereby reducing runoff. Cotton burs or other residue may be applied to the soil but it is usually more economical to grow the residue.

Seeding blanks in skip row cotton also offers an opportunity for beneficial crop rotation by planting one year's cotton on the residue seeded blanks of the year before.

On the James W. Bennett farm, north of Loraine, stubble is being used to control wind erosion, increase water intake during rainfall and maintain organic matter to improve soil tilth.

One mile south of Loraine, on the J. Wiley Walker farm, cotton burs were applied during harvesting season for wind erosion, to maintain organic matter and improve soil tilth.

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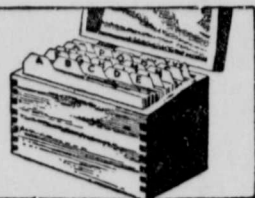
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FROM OUR FILES

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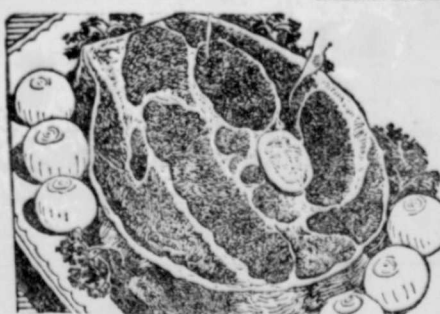

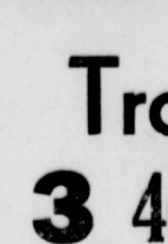

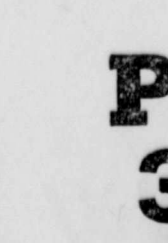
