YEATS GETS 5 YEARS FOR ABDUCTING GIRL

NOWATA, Okla., Nov. 29.—Joseph E. Yeats, former minister, was convicted and given five years in the penitentiary today for eloping with Georgia Fields, a 14-year-old school girl. This is the highest penalty the jury could inflict on such a charge in this state. The jury was out only fifteen minutes.

After one of the most sensational trials ever held here, the case went to the jury at 11:20 this morning, and within fifteen minutes the jury reported a verdict of guilty and fixed the punishment at the highest penalty.

Yeats took the verdict calmly and declined to make a statement. A. W. Fields, father of the girl in the case, said, "I thank God our name has been vindicated. Yeats got what was coming to him, and we are satisfied with the verdict."

Fields thanked the jurors, all of whom shook hands with him, and some of whom stated they wished they could have given the defendant more than five years. There was no demonstration in the court room, although the large crowd was apparently pleased with the verdict.

The argument in the case began last night and was concluded this morning. A. T. Anglin, county attorney, in one of the most dramatic pleas ever heard in the court house of this city, asked the jury to give Yeats the maximum of five years. The prosecuting attorney bitterly scored the defendant, constantly referring to him as "a snake in the grass," a despoiler of homes, and a seducer of children.

The defendant sat through the bitter arraignment with a handkerchief to his eyes dimmed with tears. He was very nervous and twitched in his chair while the attorney was speaking and heaved a sigh when the ordeal was over.

Attorney Gowdy, of Nowata, who assisted E. J. Giddings of Oklahoma City, in defending Yeats, made a plea of an hour and ten minutes this morning, preceding County Attorney Anglin, who closed the argument. Gowdy's main contention was that the information was faulty that the defendant could not take the girl out of the state for the purpose of marriage as he had already married her. The defense attorneys assailed the veracity of Georgia Fields, attacking her testimony.

NOWATA, Okla., Nov. 29.—Baring her innermost soul to the world, Georgia Fields, the 14-year-old school girl, yesterday afternoon took the stand and told the jury hearing the case against Joseph E. Yeats, an unfrocked Methodist minister, the pitiful, sordid story of deception practiced upon her by the minister.

According to the testimony of the girl, which was given in a loud, clear voice, she told how the minister had exerted an influence over her, "framed up" a weird story about improper relations with her own father, and had Georgia tell this to girl friends, hoping to keep her father from pursuing them, went through an alleged marriage ceremony and then took her from Alluwe to Texas.

The testimony of the girl fell like a thunderclap upon the crowded court room. She was perfectly calm as the attorneys for the defense drew from her a story of the deception practiced upon her parents at the behest of the minister. She testified that the minister told her to circulate a story that her father had had illicit relations with her and that she was not Fields' daughter, but the daughter of one Floyd Favor, who had been killed by Mrs. Fields' father because Favor would not marry Georgia's mother.

All these stories the girl said had been told her by Yeats with instructions for her to tell them to her girl friends. Despite the rigid cross examination by counsel for the defense, the girl remained firm in her declaration of what she declared were the facts in the case, and the defense attorneys failed to break down her testimony or cause her to make a contradiction.

Yeats took the stand in his own behalf and during the prisoner's stay on the witness stand questions flew thick and fast. Nervously toying with a handkerchief held in his hands, the prisoner told of how the girl came to him with a story of mistreatment at the hands of her father on one occasion, and fearing that same was about to occur again, she begged the minister to help her. Yeats said that he told Georgia that to marry her was the only way he could help her and while at an Epworth League social on Thursday night preceding the flight from Alluwe, he said for the marriage ceremony and she answered the questions which

TWO HELD FOR BOOZE HAULING

Cullen Busher and Horace Speer, two young men of the Winters country, were placed under \$1,000 bond each at Ballinger Saturday morning, following the filing of charges in justice court charging the parties with transporting intoxicating liquor. It is alleged in the information upon which the complaints were filed that Busher and Speer had in their possession five gallons of intoxicants when apprehended by officers from the sheriff's department. They waived examining trial and were placed under bond to await the action of the grand jury. Bond was readily made, and the defendants returned to Winters.

MAIL ROBBERS GET 25 YEARS

SAYS INSTRUCTORS ARE NEGLECTED

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 29.—Lee Clark, superintendent of the city schools of Gainesville, was elected president of the Texas State Teachers Association today, defeating J. H. Morgan, superintendent of the schools of Eagle Lake.

Bonner Frizzell, of Palestine, was re-elected as vice-president.

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 29.—Dr. George Works' criticism of Texas' educational system today brought a statement from J. A. Hill, president of the West Texas Teachers College at Canyon.

The educational survey assigns a very small niche in the Texas educational system to the teachers' college, Hill said. "We are not going to stand for it," Hill declared, asserting that he spoke for most of the teachers college presidents.

Hill pointed out that the survey asserted that the Agricultural & Mechanical College, and the College of Industrial Arts needed more dormitories, and other buildings, but did not mention the needs of the teachers' colleges, whose need Hill said was much greater.

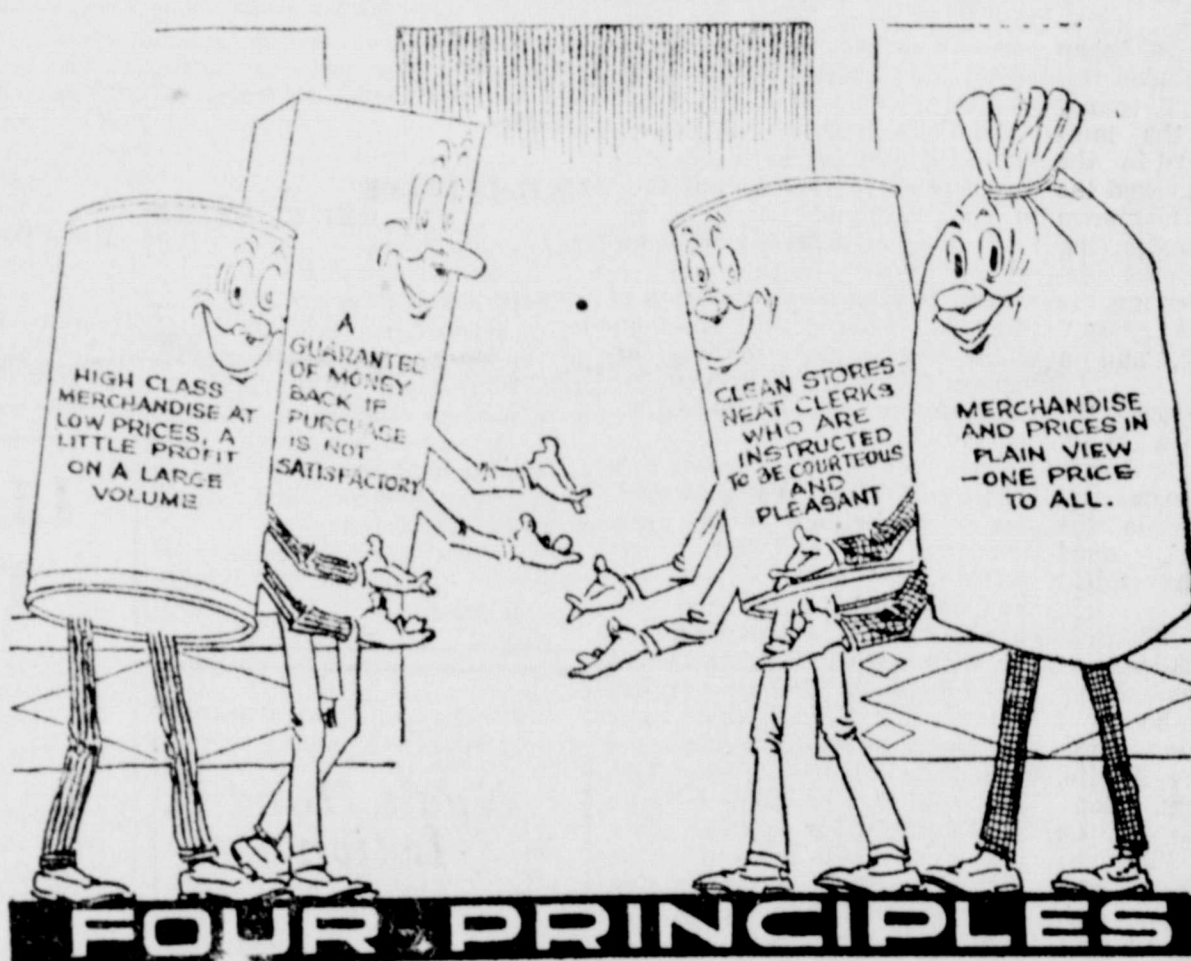

EGYPTIAN MUTINEERS SURRENDER TO BRITISH

CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 29.—The surviving mutineers at Khartoum have given in to the British officials, it was announced here today. It was said that the mutiny among the troops had been confined to two platoons of the Eleventh Sudanese Battalion, and the mutineers who survived surrendered after a bombardment of an Egyptian army hospital.

Two British officers were killed and eight men wounded.

made them man and wife. Yeats then detailed the trip of a week in an automobile to his parents' home in Winters, Texas, camping out every night.

When cross examined by the state's attorneys, Yeats was put through a severe grilling, and almost collapsed. He made an excellent witness for the state, giving evasive answers and continually contradicting himself. The witness was forced to admit by the state's attorneys that the marriage license was secured by him at Carthage, Missouri, signed by him, and names of witnesses to the marriage ceremony signed by him to the license in making the return to send the license back to Carthage.

Both sides rested late yesterday afternoon and arguments to the jury began in a night session of the court held last night.

The consensus of opinion is that the minister injured his own case when he testified, and this was followed by the dramatic declaration of Georgia Fields that he was responsible for her telling the stories about her parents, lends air to the belief that Yeats will be convicted of the charge upon which he is being tried. The court room has been packed throughout the trial of the case, which began Wednesday.

NOWATA, Okla., Nov. 29.—Alma Richardson, a girl friend of Georgia Fields, was a witness for the defense in the Yeats elopement case here. Alma told a tangled story of how Georgia came to her in confidence and told her that Floyd Favor, said to have been a half-brother of Yeats, was her father, and that A. W. Fields was not her father. The girl said that Georgia said Yeats had told her that Favor was slain before

she was born by the father of her mother, because Favor would not marry her mother.

The testimony was offered by the defense to strengthen the testimony of Yeats who said that Georgia had come to him for protection, stating that she had been mistreated by Fields.
