Our Congressional Platform.

In a former article in the Express, the suggestion was made that the nominating convention at New Braunfels establish a platform upon which the Congressional candidates will be required to place themselves, and on the occasion referred to we gave some hints as to some of the character of the platform. We make the following suggestions for the benefit of delegates that will be present at the Convention, should they see fit to profit by them:

1. Endorsement of the National Republican Platform.
2. Endorsement of President Grant and his administration.
3. Endorsement of Governor Davis and his administration.
4. Endorsement of all those administrative measures that are calculated to protect life and property, and to promote education.
5. Endorsement of the Governor's veto in opposition to Railroad subsidies.
6. Protection of the frontier at the expense of the United States Government.
7. No session of the Legislature in September but State and municipal elections this fall.

It is to be hoped that the Republicans of the Fourth District will give this matter serious attention and that the platform, as proposed, may be acceptable.

GOV. HOFFMAN is denounced by the Irish Democracy of New York.

TAN first ingredient in conversation is truth, the next good sense, the third good humor, and the fourth wit.

ALEXANDER STEVENS, who only weighs 25 pounds, wrote a five column editorial in his new paper lately, but it will take a robust man to read it.

THERE is one remarkable peculiarity of the New York riot, and that is that there has been no attempt made by the authorities to punish the guilty instigators of the attack on the procession. The killed and wounded were for the most part persons who were spectators, who should, however, have been more cautious than to venture into the vicinity of the procession.

To get an idea of the sentiment of the mob-bus has but to read the speeches made at a meeting at the Brevoort House, in New York, of the Irish Democracy of that city.

The man who did much to provoke the riot is a demagogue by the name of Steven I. Meeny, and hold an official position of considerable importance. Not satisfied with having provoked his more ignorant countrymen into a violation of the law, he still continues his inflammatory harangues. At the meeting referred to, he made use of the following language, which is a type of the entire speech:

"Shall Orangemen rule New York? No! Ireland, our dear native mother, they never shall—never! never! never!"

There are about two thousand Orangemen in New York City, and seventy thousand Irish voters, who are not Orangemen; and this bombastic Furioso calls upon his audience to swear that no Orangemen shall ever parade the streets again.

The meeting was largely attended and the speeches violently applauded. And this democratic official not only retains his office but is not even arrested for the part he took in bringing on the fight. This New York affair is the heaviest blow the Democracy has sustained in a long time, and the consequences will be a wave of reaction on the Tammany ring of New York that will sweep them from power at the next elections.

New York has a new horror. The boiler of a ferry boat with three hundred excursionists on board exploded. The concussion was terrific, the hurricane deck was blown overhead and many persons were drowned.

The entire number loss was supposed to be 150. The name of the boat was the Westfield and the accident happened on the 31st ult.

New we want the Democratic multiplicationists to tell us how they propose to beat our ticket?—State Journal.

We will tell you, by polling more votes and seeing that they are counted.—Galveston News.

Behold the results of "the departure," a leading Democratic journal advocating Massachusetts ideas without knowing it. The Democratic system of beating the Republican ticket is not by polling the most votes, but by voting at the most polls. This "departure" is enough to make even the most hopeful Nabby despair.

In the billiard tournament at Toronto, Dick Dun and Phelan played, Dick won. They twenty-two points.

The present Radical party is the direct successor of the old Federal party. Both alike clamor for a strong government. That party, as this was always ready in any pretext, to enlarge the plane of Congressional legislation. In those days the Democratic party stood on the Constitution, just where it stands now. In war times we all learned what it was to "stand your ground." If driven from one position, take up another; but stand your ground wherever you find yourself. So it is with the Democratic party—it stands on the Constitution. No matter what violence may be done to that instrument, it stands upon it; and, when it has maintained its position, seeks to regain lost ground.—Galveston News.

Allow us to interpret the foregoing as we understand it. A father had a bad little son that didn't know what was good for him, his papa told him to eat his soup, sonny refused and kicked his papa. Papa then got a little switch and turned sonny, who "departed" and accepted the situation, took the soup which did him good; next day "being driven from one position he took up another," and again refused to take his soup, another little application of the switch and sonny takes some more soup and feels better. Sonny thinks that when papa gets sick or old, then he will "seek to regain lost ground," but papa never gets sick, and long before he gets old, sonny will be a man and have more sense than to refuse his soup or kick his papa; but just now he is not able to take care of himself if he were turned loose.

This, we believe, is the popular way that the new "departure" is looked at by the people.

The article continues to assert that "the Republican party is the party of centralization." We were aware of this fact before, and it was this that has caused us to fight the party as we have done. All its other peccadilloes are local and temporary, compared with this. There is a great deal said about universal education. But universal education has no more concern with one party than with another. The Democratic party is as earnest an advocate of universal education as is the Republican. In fact, all the best school systems of the United States were framed when the States were under Democratic rule. The Express says that "the idea of a despotism is laughable." The idea may be the subject of merriment, but the realization will be found a very serious matter. And it is much closer at hand than the world generally allows.—Galveston News.

In the days of democratic ascendancy the African race was in servitude, there was no security for life and property in the south, and freedom of speech and of the press was a myth. This was the state of things under democratic constitutionalism through which the country was and is to be protected from despotism, (according to the News.) "That transcendent thing" the constitution as it was, has been torn to tatters and the centralizing power of Republicanism is becoming stronger every day, but perfect civil and religious liberty becomes more secure at the same time. Under Democratic Constitutionalism abolitionists were long by the mob for speaking their sentiments; under radical centralization (the despotism of the News) Jeff. Davis makes treasonable speeches and he is not hung—but laughed at.

Under Democratic Constitutionalism there is no free speech but under Republican centralization there is security even to the abusers of free speech.

Yet the News says "we are drifting into Despotism."

The Express office was burned by a Democratic mob for saying the same thing.

O! for a forty parson power to chant thy praise, Hypocrisy.

"The San Antonio Express needs an editor. That sterling Republican organ should not be allowed to lose its old prestige for want of talent and discretion."

The above is reproduced word for word from the State Journal of the 1st inst. The delicate compliment of the "Journal" is appreciated. We shall spare no pains to keep the Express fully up to the standard of "a sterling Republican Organ." But we object to being complimented at the expense of former editors of the Express. The Express never had "a prestige for want of talent and discretion." On the contrary our predecessors were men of consummate ability, and as we are on friendly terms with two of them (we never had the honor of Major Moore's acquaintance) we dislike to see any animadversions on their editorial career in the Official Journal, even when coupled with a recognition of our humble efforts.

The first sentence of the above should, however, be transposed, and then the whole may be quickly understood.

It is gratifying to learn that Judge Hancock does not "depart" but perhaps the judge will be around one of these days and let us know what he thinks about it himself. For the present we take the following from the Gazette and present it to our readers for what it is worth.

Judge Hancock is the nominee of our party. He recently spoke at Salado and, also, at Belton. One who "heard him at both places" says the "Judge planted himself fairly and squarely on the January platform of the Texas Democracy," and appealed to his countrymen to remember the principles of 1776 and to apply them in 1871. "That don't sound much like the slogan of the 'newly departed,' does it? It is the Gazette's creed in a nutshell. It is the outpourings of true Democracy. The People ask no more."

We are, candidly, of the opinion, however, that Mr. Newcomb, by attending and manipulating "primary meetings," has got the inside track on Mr. Democracy, and is evidently in the wrong place and doing with the wrong People.—Gazette.

Anti-Slavery Letter.

Congressional politics—The issues to be met—The Republican Party on its march.

AUSTIN, August 1, 1871.

Like eager troops, the opposing political forces are beginning to pitch into each other in good earnest already. The democracy have chosen five leaders and put them forth on the platform they propose to make the fight on, to wit: that the radical State Government is unconstitutional and oppressive, inasmuch as the Governor has enforced the law and brought murderers and thieves to justice through the police law—has appointed officials to fill vacancies and carry on the government under the enabling act; that the Legislature has ousted ku-klux members who came with the shreds of the American flag hanging about them, which had been torn and dragged in the dust in honor of the election; that it has established official organs and built up a Republican press in the State; that it tried to get rid of old Morgan Hamilton and put a military officer in his place; and finally, that this radical administration is taxing the people of Texas to build free-school houses, and by educating the masses forever destroy the hopes of the so-called democracy in Texas.

The Republican party has but one of its candidates in the field as yet, but it has accepted the challenge of the democracy and stands ready to uphold the State administration and the State policy of the party. Not a single county Convention has yet assembled but what has spoken out boldly and endorsed Gov. Davis and the police, militia, school and arms law, and other laws; the platform is already made, dyed and dyed by the determined voice of thousands of honest, fearless republicans; and the question naturally comes up: are the men who aspire to be our leaders abreast with the party, and ready to lead us to battle on those living, vital issues? Are they prepared to meet and overthrow the enemy in their attack upon the means to carry out the work begun; to stand by and defend the tax levy.

If there be any one who aspires to bear the banner of the Republican party in the coming contest, and expects to dodge every question of State policy, the rank and file of the party will tell him he "roasts too high to be of any use to the people of Texas, in Congress or out of it."

The issues are upon us and we must meet them; the Republican party must come before the bar of public opinion in Texas, and must defend its acts as a party in this State; and upon the force of this defense depends its success in the next as well as succeeding struggles. We feel no fear of the result. All we ask is a fair hearing from the people; and we know that the intelligence and patriotism of the country will sustain us.

Let no man bank upon personal popularity to carry him through; that day has passed in Texas; we have become a thinking, exacting people, and judge men not only by their professions but by their actions, and look upon political leaders as exponents of principles, not tickled "humans" who are placed on exhibition for a prize. The party is on its mettle and ready for the onset. Let the tender footed fall to the rear; there are thousands of unflinching hearts that will press to the front.

BEXAR.

FROM NAVASOTA.

SPECIAL TO THE NEWS.

Terrible Railroad Accident.

NAVASOTA, July 29, 1871.

The construction train, with wrecking car attached, in passing over the Navasota river bridge this evening about 4 o'clock, the derrick struck the lateral braces and rods causing the bridge to give way. The engine, with nine cars, went down forty feet. There were eighteen laborers on board, five of whom were killed. Their names are unknown. One white man and one negro, names unknown, are mortally wounded. Patrick Langin and R. A. Murphy, Engineer; Tom Lynch, Conductor, and several, are dangerously injured. Daniel Sullivan, of New York, had his leg broken. Thomas Jenison is seriously injured. Wm. D. Herrick, Jim Brown, and one other, names not known, are slightly injured. The dead and wounded have been brought here and are receiving all necessary attention.

On the 23d ultimo the Republicans of Cameron county held a meeting in Brownsville, for the purpose of electing delegates to the New Braunfels convention, and of adopting resolutions expressive of the sense of the meeting, on the prominent questions of the day. Mr. Crislar Carson was called to the chair. Resolutions were adopted endorsing the action of the Republican party generally, and the administration of Governor Davis.

Chas. J. Murphy and Eliha Golden, colored, were unanimously elected delegates to the convention. Fred Schlick and R. H. Quick, alternates.

R. B. Kingsbury was read out of the party.

Eloquent speeches were made by Hon. Franklin Cummings, Messrs. Charles J. Murphy, Albert Wood, J. S. Munroe and others. The meeting then adjourned sine die.

S. Brumberger, who claims to have been Private Secretary to Jeff. Davis during the war, was arrested for forgery of a check for \$150, as he was leaving on a vessel for Matamoros. He jumped over-board and was rescued with difficulty.

The Round Rock Sentinel, Williamson Co., of the 6th inst. says: We understand there was ball on last Thursday in the neighborhood of Faxon Bruce's which knocked down a great deal of his corn. No serious damage done.
