Word was received from the Texas Highway Commission last week that the group had approved a go-ahead on preliminary plans toward the four laning of Highway 287 from Stratford south to the Moore County lines.

County Judge W.S. (Bill) Frizzell Jr., who was out of town when the initial go-ahead was approved last week, said Monday that his office had been informed that the Highway Commission moved Thursday to authorize the Texas Highway Department to participate in the purchasing of right of way and to proceed with advance planning and preliminary engineering for the project.

Stratford Chamber of Commerce urging the Court to acquire the right of way.

Highway Department traffic projections show that a four-lane road with a minimum of 250 feet of right of way should be built.

The new American Beef Packers Inc. plant located west of Highway 287 just south of the Sherman-Moore county lines, has already made an impact on

traffic between Stratford and Dumas.

The Highway Department recently completed work on construction of two left turn lanes along Highway 287, one near the entrance to American Beef Packers and the other at the entrance to the new plant of Delta Industries plant just south of Stratford.

A 13-member group met back in July with the Texas highway Commission asking approval for the four-laning of Highway 287 from Stratford to the Moore county line. This delegation, which included Judge Frizzell, Commissioners Joe Everett and Robert Ferguson, City Councilmen Ed Moore and Ron Hager, Stratford Independent School Trustee, V.O. Lasley, George Jeffcoat, manager of the Stratford Chamber of Commerce, Greg Pye, president, Delta Industries Inc., Dumas Chamber Representatives Jim Bennett and Ramon Dillow, along with Mrs. Robert Ferguson, Mrs. W.S. Frizzell and son, Blair, asked that the Commission act in all haste in working toward securing this approval as soon as possible in light of the increasing traffic hazards between Stratford and Dumas.

Members of the Court also authorized a Public Hearing to be set for October 14 for the purpose of ruling on scheduled pay increases for county employees. If approved the pay hike will go into effect January 1, 1975.

In other action Monday, Sherman County Commissioners approved the bond of newly appointed Sherman County Tax Assessor-Collector Marilyn Albert in the amount of \$38,300.

All members of the Court were present at Monday's meeting.

SISD Budget Approved For New School Year

Trustees for the Stratford Independent School District approved a budget for 1974-75 totalling \$1,043,360 with no tax increase scheduled, at their budget hearing held last week.

The new budget includes an increase over last year of about 7.2 percent. The last year's budget totalled 968,213. The new budget includes an increase of about 10 percent in salaries for teachers and auxiliary employees.

The tax rate for residents of the SISD remains set at \$1.20 per 100 evaluation.

In other business, the trustees changed their meeting time to 6:30 a.m. on the first Thursday of each month. The site will be the Headquarters Restaurant.

The board also discussed adult education and the possibility of offering several business courses for adults through the Amarillo College.

An organizational meeting for all persons interested in securing their high school education through Adult Education are urged to attend an organizational meeting to be

held in the high school cafeteria at 8 p.m. on September 30.

Last fall a total of 107 adults were enrolled in the Adult Education sessions and a total of 33 received their high school equivalency certificates via this route.

Supt. E.L. Bass added that meeting nights and times will be decided at this September 30 meeting and urges everyone interested to be on hand.

Anyone interested in taking part in a business course that

may be offered through Amarillo College is urged to contact the superintendent's office. There will have to be a total of 12 signed up to offer any single class for credit, Supt. Bass pointed out.

The trustees discussed the new lights which have been ordered for the football field. Supt. Bass reported the steel poles were shipped from Dayton, Ohio, last week and as soon as they arrive the work will be completed.

Elks Down Lynx In Opening Game

Stratford's Elks utilized hardnosed defense to take advantage of Spearman miscues to bomb the Lynx in the season opener for both teams 20-14 Friday night.

The Elks' offensive effort was lead by Ricky Howard, 146-pound speedster, who gained 156 yards during the night and accounted for two of the three Elk touchdowns.

The Lynx opened the scoring on their first play from scrimmage with Donnie Davis going 70 yards for the Spearman touchdown with 9:46 left in the first stanza. Mike Tucker booted the PAT to give the Lynx a 7-0 lead.

Coach David Bornstein's Elks came back quickly. After an exchange of punts following the Lynx initial touchdown, the Elks were seemingly in a big hole. Stratford took over on their own 6-yard line when Don Harris moved the ball out to the 11. On the next play Howard shook loose from a would-be tackler in the secondary and zipped 62 yards to the Spearman 27 before he was hauled down. Three plays later Howard had carried to the Lynx 15 for a first down at the Lynx 15. Three running plays left the Elks still at the Lynx 11-yard line when Quarterback Mark Beaty faked a run, lofted the ball to Leonard Duncan in the end zone for an 11-yard touchdown strike. Beaty added the PAT to tie the game with 29 seconds left in the first stanza.

The second Elk score came after the Lynx had intercepted an Elk pass at the Spearman 1-yard line. The Lynx had moved out to second and five from their own 6-yard line when a jarring tackle knocked Mark Fox loose from the ball and it was recovered by Elk Safetyman Beaty.

Taking over possession at Spearman's 5-yard line, Howard got the call and carried two defenders with him into the end zone with 5:40 left in the second quarter. Beaty booted the PAT with Will Allen holding to make it 14-7 at the half.

The third Elk score came in the third stanza after the Lynx took the second half kickoff. The Lynx were operating from their own 28 yard line when they fumbled the ball and Harris recovered for the Elks.

Taking over at the Lynx 25, Beaty hit Duncan for 13 yards on a pass. Howard got 8 yards to move the ball to the Lynx 4 and two plays later Howard went in for his second td of the night to make the score 20-7. Beaty's attempted PAT boot was wide.

Spearman's final touchdown came late in the fourth quarter after the Lynx took over on their own 20 following an attempted field goal by Beaty.

Spearman used 18 plays and most of the time left in the fourth quarter to move 80 yards before they were able to punch in for the touchdown.

The Elk defense had stiffened at the 15 yard line where they held the Lynx but an offside penalty gave the Lynx a first down and goal from the 8 yard line. On third down and less than a yard Fox went just barely into the end zone for the Spearman score. The PAT effort by Tucker was good and the score went to 20-14 with 3:56 left in the game.

The Elks took over after the resulting kickoff and went from their own 35 yard line to the Lynx 28 when time finally ran out in the contest.

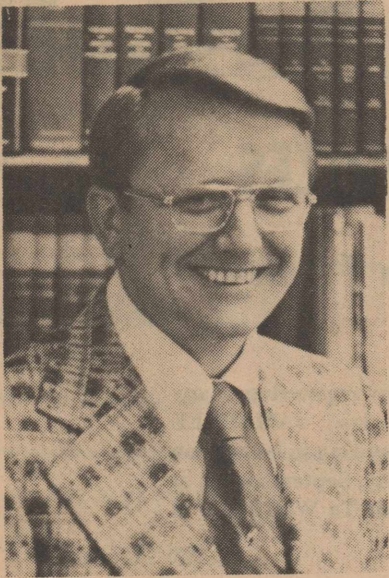

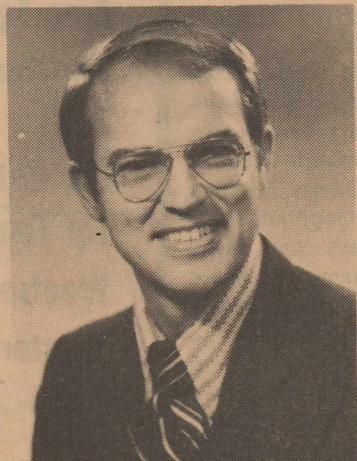

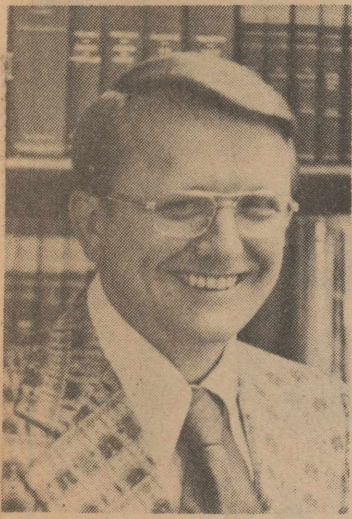

authority on ESP, psychic phenomena and the occult.

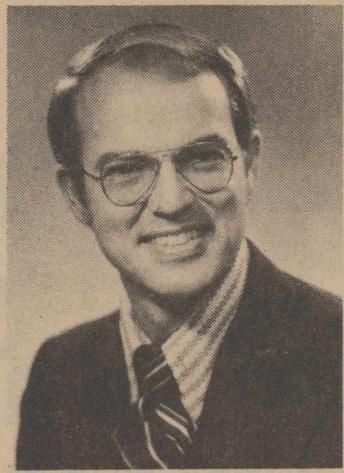

Agricultural Research that is not used is wasted. Many times this is the case because farmers are not aware that certain research projects are being conducted. The Annual Field Day and Open House of the High Plains Research Foundation, Halfway, Texas, scheduled for Thursday, September 12, is held to give area people an opportunity to see what is being researched that may benefit their own farming operation or the agricultural economy in general.

Field tours are set to begin at 1:30 p.m. A member of the scientific staff will conduct each tour and try to acquaint each group with most of the projects underway. One truck will depart each 20 minutes and the tour will last from 45 minutes to one hour. At the conclusion of each tour, a drawing will be held for a \$25.00 Savings bond, courtesy of area banks. An excellent equipment exhibit and farm show will be set up for those who want to see the latest in farm equipment, agricultural chemicals, seeds, fertilizers,

and other farm-related products.

Among specific projects to be seen on the tour will be a study on double-cropping with wheat and tritcale followed by four other crops, including sunflowers. A study to determine the effects of herbicide-insect-

icide interactions on grain sorghum stands and yields has shown some startling results and can be seen by Field Day visitors. These, along with tests on weed control, minimum tillage, irrigation, new crops, variety testing, insect control, and many others, will highlight a very informative tour.

Expenses for conducting the Field Day on September 12 will be paid by the Plainview Co-op Compress, First National Bank, City National Bank, and Hale County State Bank, all of Plainview.

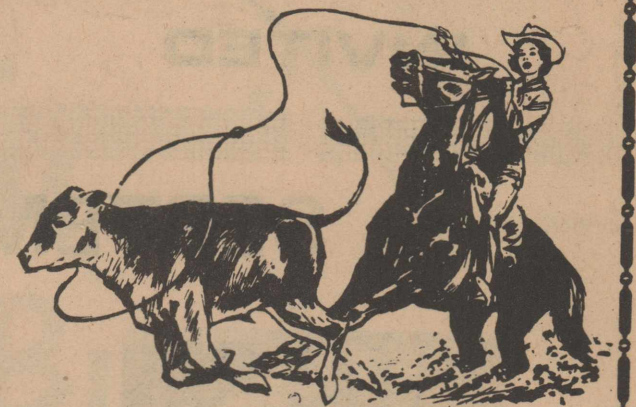

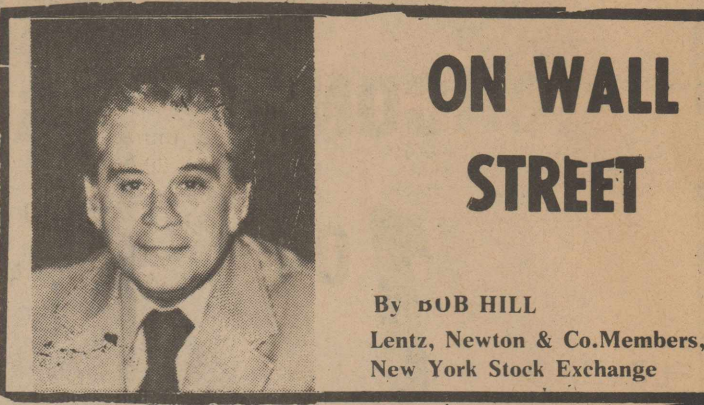
Q. I am a disabled widow with no children. I am 48 years old. Can I receive social security now on my deceased husband's record?
A. A disabled widow without children can get benefits as early as age 50.

Q. I receive supplemental income payments. Do I have to notify the social security office if I move, even though my post office box address will be the same?
A. Yes. Persons getting supplemental security income payments should always notify social security if they move.

Q. My husband, age 68, is going to retire at the end of November. He has Medicare, but has not received any monthly benefits because of his earnings. How soon should we notify social security in order to get his checks started on time?
A. Call us about October 1, so the check for October, due November 3, will be on time.

Q. A neighbor who was working for the city sanitation division, retired recently. Benefits to him, his 16-year old son and his wife are slightly higher than his salary was. Is this possible?
A. Yes, in the lower income brackets, the maximum family benefits may exceed the worker's average earnings. However, it is rare for family benefits to be higher than the worker's salary at retirement.

When you talk about "hot money" you are talking about money that moves fast from one type of investment to another, always seeking the highest yield available. Since the highest interest rates available at the moment are on short term investments (less than 36 months), the bulk of the action has been in the short-term money market.

there's plenty of it going on. More and more major bank holding companies, finance companies, and even industrial corporations are tapping the small investor in large numbers by making it easy for him to invest.

"Hot money" was usually limited to large foreign investors who moved quickly from one currency into another as interest rates moved sharply up or down. But now everyone is getting into the act, even the little guy who suddenly discovered that he can get 11 percent or better with his \$5,000 get his funds when ever he wants them and do it in investments almost as safe as U.S. Government securities.

Disintermediation causes a problem for the savings and loans because they are forced to reduce lending activities if too much of their deposits leave. Deposits in the savings banks in the state of New York dropped over \$600-million in the month of July, the worst drop in a single month in over 150 years.

This growing awareness of attractive short-term investment opportunities is causing some serious problems for the savings and loan industry. Savings and loan associations are limited by regulation as to the maximum rates they can pay on accounts. And those rates are well below other more attractive investment opportunities. For instance, the U.S. Treasury came to market this month with over \$4 billion of notes bearing a 9 percent interest rate, the highest rate of interest the U.S. has had to pay for borrowed money since the civil war. The notes were snapped up by a flood of investors at a premium price which brought the yield down below 9 percent. This shift out of one type of savings institution into an entirely different kind of investment is called "disintermediation" and

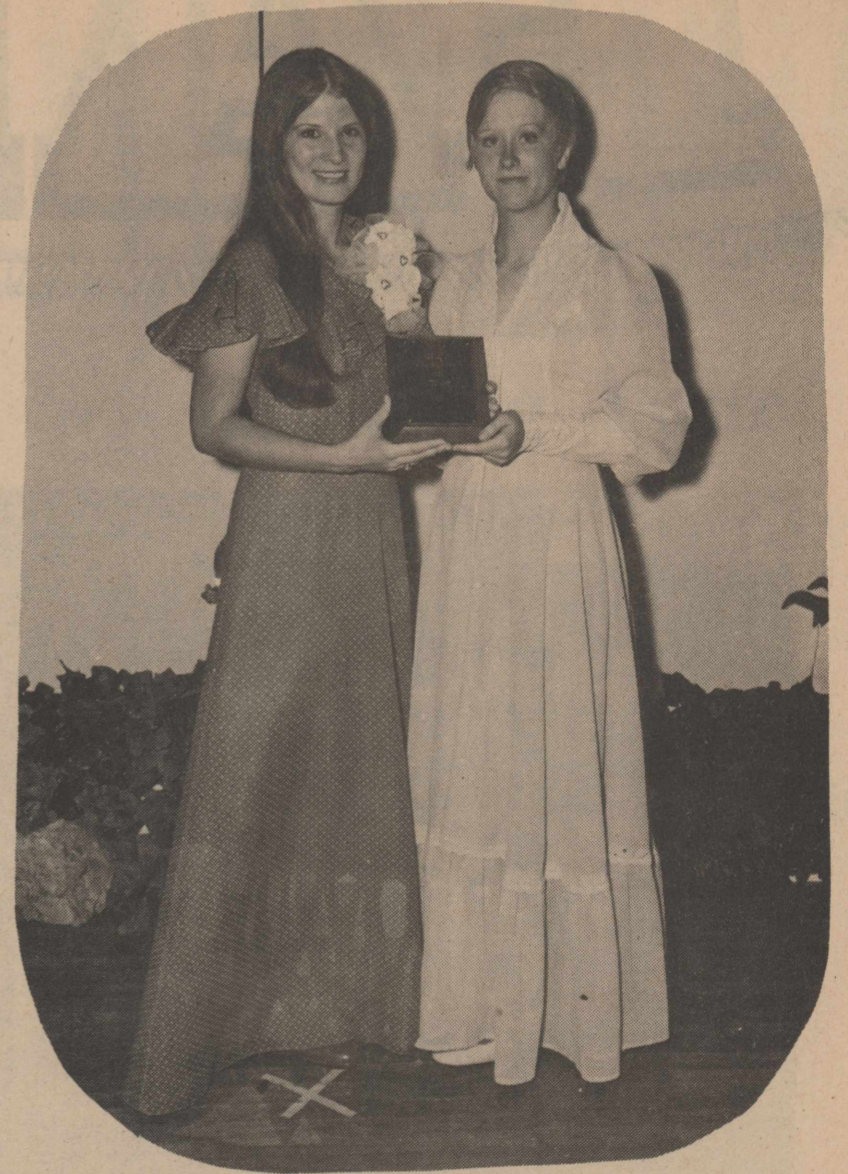

Timmie Brown, Dick McDaniel Rein Over Old Timers Events

Royalty of the Old Timers have been in the area for a total of 137 years but they are younger in heart than most anyone around! Timmie Baskin Brown and J.D. [Dick] McDaniel came here with their parents as young children. They will be riding in the parade and crowned King and Queen at the annual Old Timers program, Saturday, Sept. 14, 2:30 p.m. at Mary Allen Elementary Cafeteria.

Prospectus Study Club members will entertain all with a program, followed by refreshments. General chairman for the event is Jessie Dowda with all members serving on some committee.

Timmie was born in Clarendon, Texas, Aug. 23, 1898 where her mother died in 1903. Her father, T.F. Baskin, Sr., had acquired land in Sherman County in 1902 and he moved his family here in April 1903. Coming with him were Hilda, Thomas Frank, Jr., Timmie and Rueben Lee. Another daughter, Mattie, had married before the move and never lived in Stratford.

Timmie was raised by her father and brothers with the help of housekeepers. She attended Ruby School during early fall and spring, but in the winter she stayed with Mrs. E.M. Kerr in town. When about eight years old, she recalls begging to go to school during a snow storm with Mrs. Kerr finally consenting that she go with a professor. She wound up being carried piggyback. A snow storm didn't close the school in those days!

She attended Stave Normal School at Denton and West Texas State Normal College at Canyon. Don't know what it may mean, but in 1914 WT burned down while she was there!

On November 22, 1917 she married Joe Brown. He was a son of J.T. Brown who had also brought his family to Sherman County in 1902. Timmie had

been teaching school at Stevens. For a short time they lived near Conlen and except for that period, she has lived in Stratford her "whole life." She recalls working in the store with Joe as the Santa Fe railroad was being built. They provided groceries and meat for the crews for the time the road was being built from the Beaver to the Canadian River. She worked with Joe in the grocery business for about 22 years. Joe died in 1965.

The couple had two children, Marjo and Baskin. Marjo is the wife of H.L. Halle and they have three children, Marian, Lorelyn and Allan. They have two grandchildren.

Baskin and the former Betty Rhea Lee have two sons, Joe Ray and Jim Bob. They have two grandchildren.

In the past Timmie was an active member of the Inter Se Club and Panhandle #202, Order of the Eastern Star. She teaches the Lois Sunday School class at First Baptist and is a member of SCOT. Her hobby is reading and she has done china painting and needlework, but she mostly enjoys her family.

Marjo recalls when her mother cut her hair and had her first permanent in 1928. The machine looked like a monster from outer space and smelled even worse! All those burned, frizzy kinks were supposed to be glamorous!

Both Dick and Timmie were fascinated, along with most everyone else in town, when the three blocks of brick were laid on Main Street during the 30's the brick layer would arrange each row the width of the street without raising up!

James Dixon McDaniel was born near Jonesville, Va., Oct. 13, 1896. He came with his parents, the F.M. McDaniels, to Cimarron County, Okla. and the Bertrand Community when he was 13 years old. At 14 he started working a thrashing machine for his dad. This he did

for nine years. They thrashed wheat all one year at Keyes, then sold the machine to Frank Smith in Stratford. Two of his brothers, O.C. and Doc, would have "nothing to do with a tractor." Other brothers are Russell and Bob who live at Felt, Okla.

O.C. (Orban) was "walking" with Ermah Shireman at the Bertrand Community and younger brother, Dick, walked along with her younger sister, Neva. It turned out that brothers married sisters! Dick has just returned from a two week visit at McNeal, Ariz. with Orban and Ermah.

Dick and Neva moved to Stratford in 1924 and he was hired by T.F. Baskin, Sr. to be a tractor operator for the county. Mr. Baskin was serving as

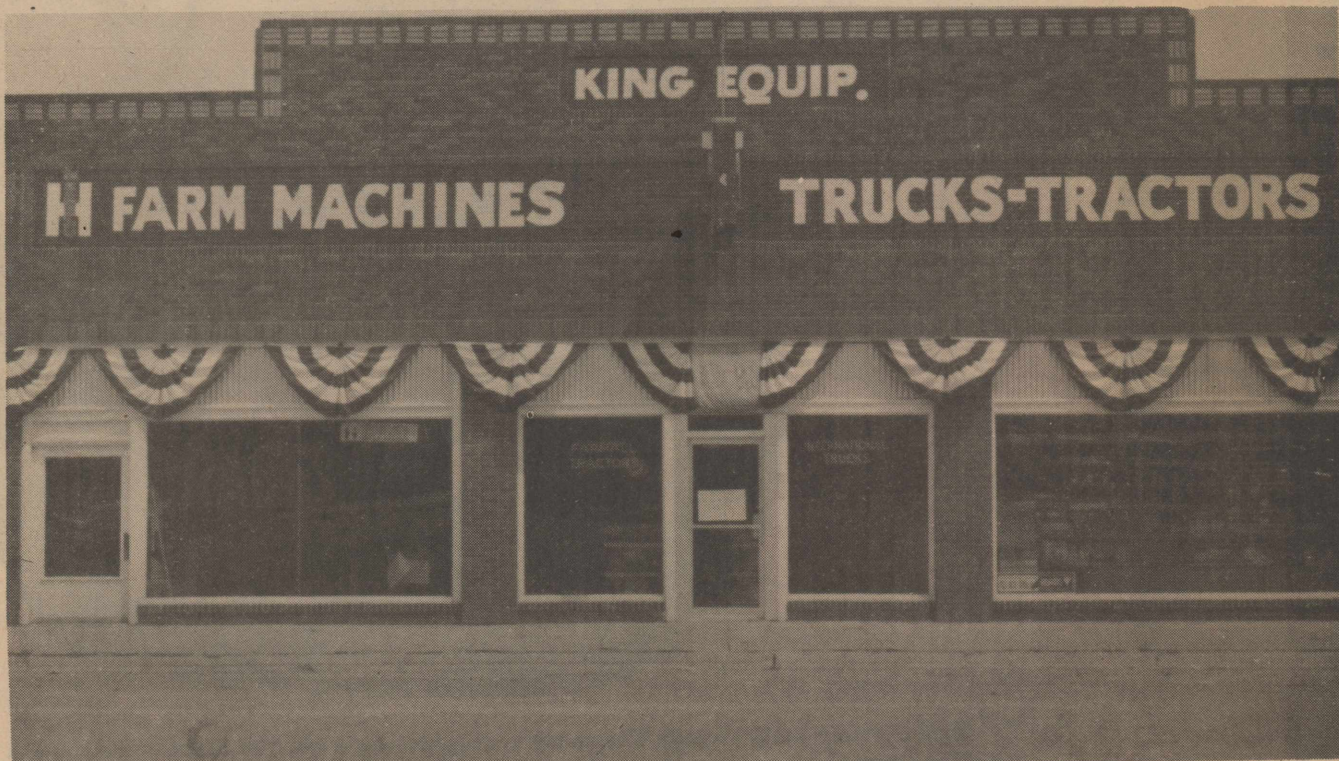
county commissioner at the time. Later that year he went to work for Texaco, becoming the consignee in 1926. He retired after 45 years of service in 1971.

Dick and Neva had three children, Gail Dixon who died as an infant, Lloyd and June. Loyd lives in Boise City and June, the wife of Judge W.S. Frizzell, Jr., lives in Stratford. He has nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren [and another on the way].

In 1971 the McDaniels took two interesting trips together. The first was to Florida and along the East Coast to Pennsylvania and across the center states. The second was a tour of Hawaii to celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary on Dec. 24. They also enjoyed visiting with relatives and

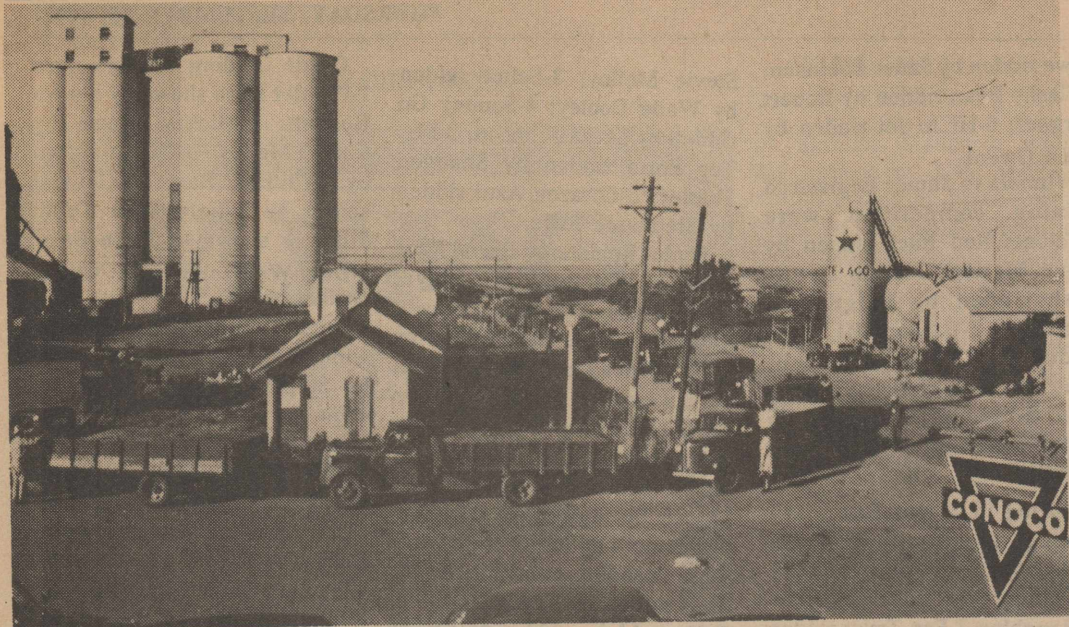

A record number of volunteers will call on local citizens to ask help for millions of children suffering from cystic fibrosis and other lung-damaging diseases.

Contributions to the annual Breath of Life Appeal help support patient care through 100 C/F Centers across the country, many in teaching hospitals affiliated with leading medical schools. C/F Centers offer expert diagnosis and treatment for children with C/F, as well as those suffering severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis and a condition sometimes called "Childhood emphysema."

Funds are also used for research conducted by scientists throughout the world to find the causes and a cure or more effective control for cystic fibrosis. - NAVY BEAN CASSEROLE**
- 1 lb. navy beans
 - 1 #2 can tomatoes
 - 1 large onion
 - 1 t. dry mustard
 - 1 t. baking soda
 - 1/2 lb. brown sugar
 - 1 lb. hamburger
 - 1 lb. salt pork

Soak beans in cold water overnight and drain; cover with fresh water; add soda and mustard and boil 2 minutes. Drain and cover with fresh water and add salt pork and boil gently for 1 hr. Saute hamburger and onions, adding tomatoes. Put in layers in 2 casseroles ending with pork and sugar on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 2 hours.

- GREEN ENCHILADAS**
- 1 medium size pkg. Fritos
 - 1 can cream of chicken soup
 - 1-4 oz. can green chilies
 - 1 tall can evaporated milk
 - 1 small onion

Chop onion and chilies; add soup and milk. Pour over fritos and mix well. Put into well greased casserole and sprinkle freely with grated cheese. Bake at 400 degrees for 30 minutes. Serve very hot.

- SWEET AND SOUR POT ROAST**
- 4-5 lb. beef blade pot roast
 - 2 T. shortening
 - 2 t. salt
 - 1/4 t. pepper
 - 2 med. onions, sliced 1/4 inch thick

1/2 t. celery seed
1/4 t. ground ginger
1/4 c. sweet pickle juice
1/2 c. sweet sliced pickles
Brown roast in shortening; pour off drippings and season roast with salt and pepper. Add onion, celery seed, ginger and pickle juice. Cover tightly and simmer for 3 hours. Add pickles and continue cooking until meat is tender. Remove meat and add enough water to liquid to make 4 cups. Thicken with flour for gravy.

SWPS Announces Update On New Unit

Ray Tolk, chairman and president of the Southwestern Public Service Company, announced today that the completion date for the second 350,000 kilowatt coal-fired generating unit at the company's Harrington Station, near Amarillo, has been moved up from 1979 to 1978.

"The area we serve continues to grow and this means more industry and more people. In order to continue to provide our customers with the electric service they need, we found it necessary to have the second unit at Harrington Station ready a year sooner than we had first planned," Tolk said.

The first coal-fired unit at Harrington Station is now under construction and is scheduled for completion in mid-1976. It is also a 350,000 kilowatt machine and construction is on schedule.

When both units are completed and on the line, the SPS system generating capability will be increased to almost 3-million kilowatts, with the coal-fired units representing 22 percent of the total.

The turbine-generator for the 1978 unit will be made by Westinghouse and the boiler by Combustion Engineering, Inc. and these manufacturers have assured SPS that the equipment will be available.

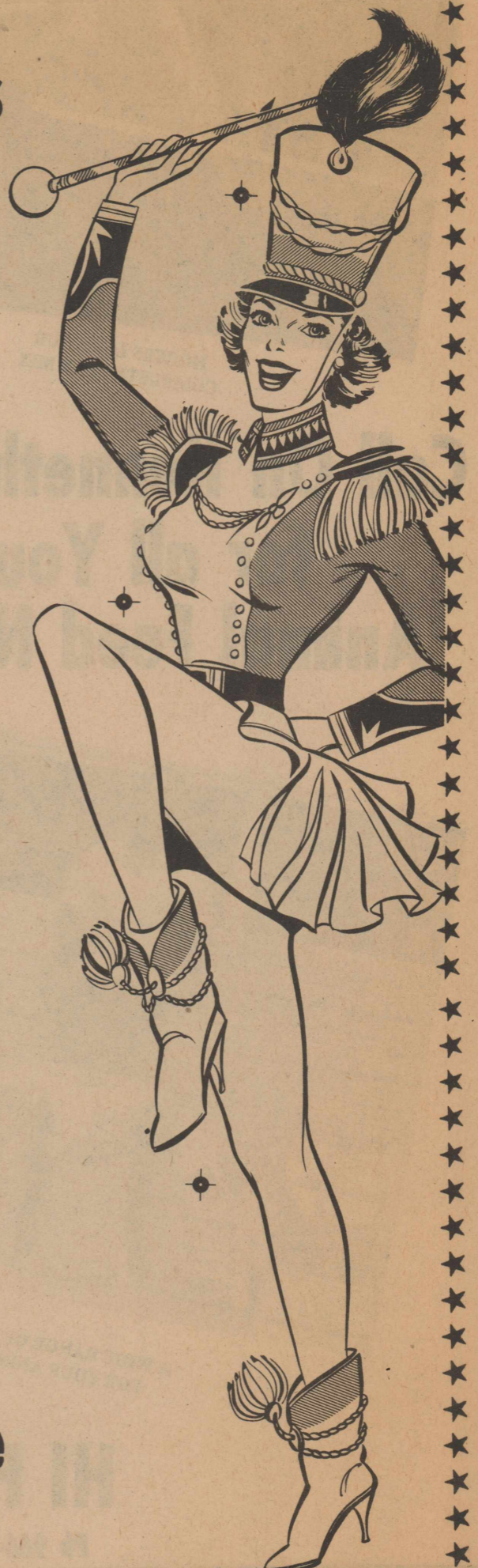

4-H Offers Opportunities For Adults

COLLEGE STATION--If volunteer programs are your "thing," then the Texas 4-H and youth program offers unlimited opportunities to help young people learn and develop. "4-H is the youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and focuses on the needs, interests and concerns of boys and girls between 9 and 19 years of age," points out Yvonne Garcia, Extension 4-H and youth specialist. "Its aim is to help young people develop through practical learning experiences like preparing a nutritious meal, building bookshelves or growing a vegetable garden."

Since young people do not develop their skills and attitudes overnight, they need and seek guidance from the 4-H volunteer who helps them probe the

"why" behind the "how to do it."

"Helping youth develop, however, requires different kinds of leadership," notes the Texas A&M University System specialist.

For those who prefer to work primarily with youth, 4-H offers leadership roles related to the organization, project or activity aspects of a 4-H group. While the organization leader guides the overall operation of a 4-H group, the project and activity leaders help boys and girls learn by involving them in a specific project--cothing, auto repair, bicycle safety--and related activities, such as safety clinics, exhibits and local tours. These leaders may, in turn, be assisted by junior and teen leaders who work closely with an adult or teen advisor.

Volunteers who prefer to work primarily with adults also have a wide range of choices. A 4-H project or activity chairman helps other leaders with a specific activity or project. A 4-H recruiter seeks out youth

and adults interested in becoming 4-H members or leaders, then allows the 4-H organizer to help the new group get started. Volunteers are also assisted by the 4-H trainer who helps train other leaders in the area and by the 4-H resource person who secures special materials or people from the community.

"If you are interested in young people, want to share your talents and hobbies, and enjoy meeting other adults with your same interests, consider being a 4-H volunteer," says Miss Garcia. "Contact your local county Extension agent for personal assistance to help you find a volunteer role that's right for you."

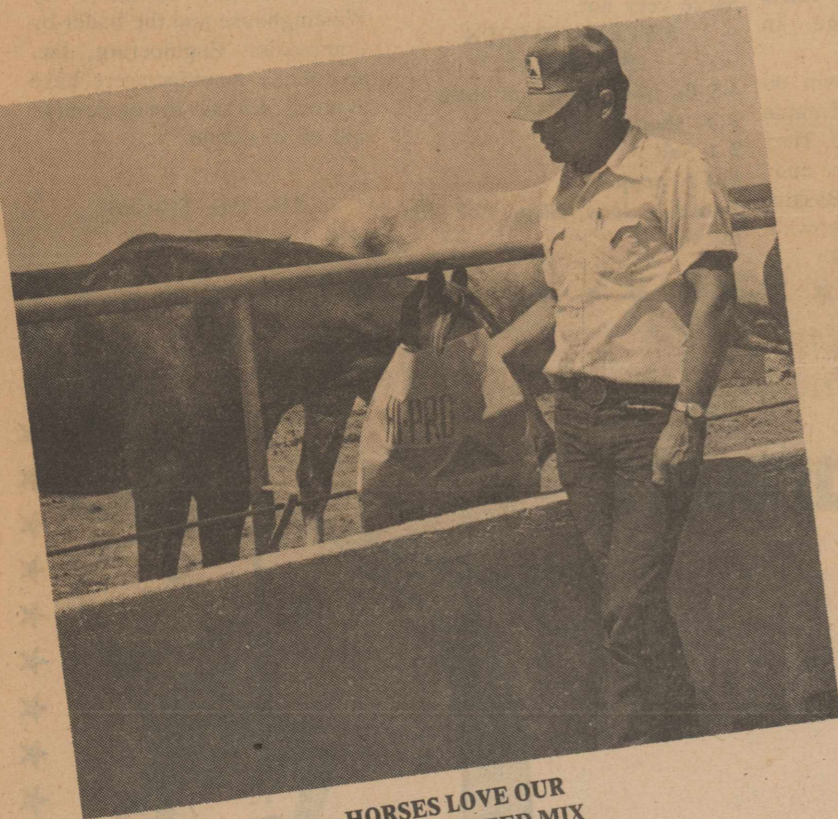

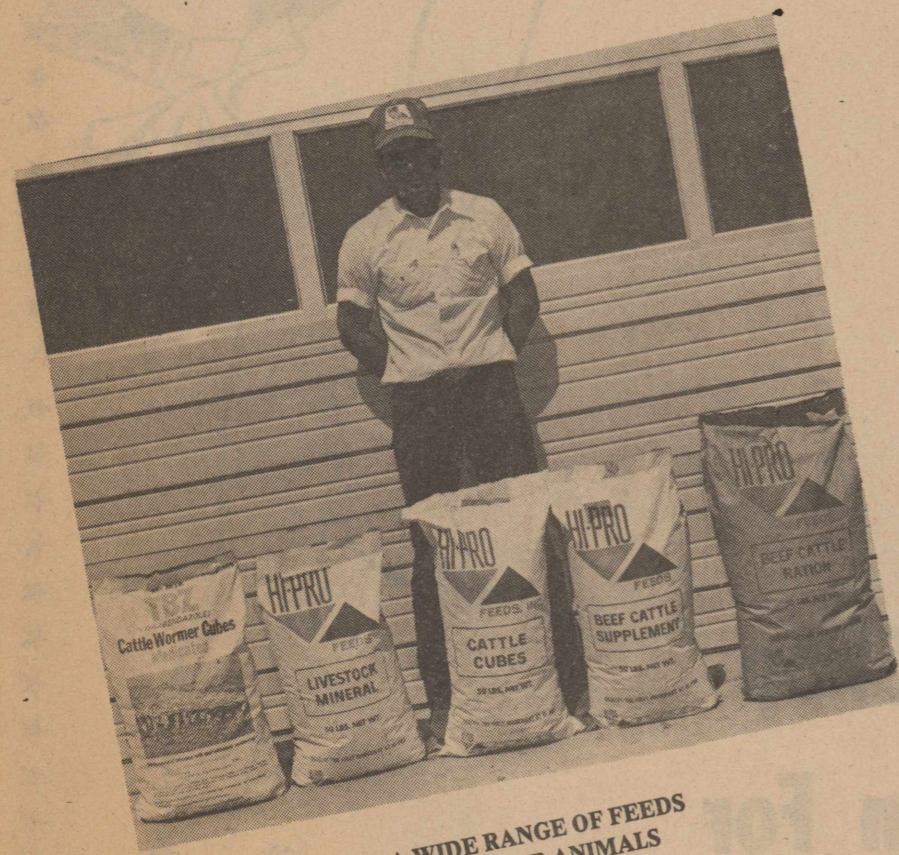

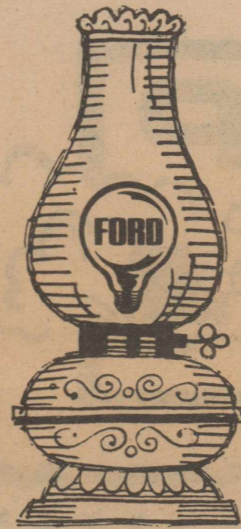

Bread Day Set Oct. 8 By TRA Group

Civic and service clubs and other organizations have a chance to focus attention on restaurants which give them exceptional bread service as well as enhance their own treasury in a new program being jointly announced by the Texas Wheat Producers Board and the Texas Restaurant Association. In addition, restaurants which believe that their bread service is exceptional because of quality, temperature, method or repetity of serving may also nominate themselves for consideration.

The project is in preparation for the annual "Day of Bread" which will be observed nationwide, October 8, 1974 according to Miss Mary Ellen Dambold, TWPB nutritionist. She said that the restaurant selected as the winner will receive a plaque for display in their establishment as well as have their name engraved on a permanent roster of such winners in the offices of the Board.

If the winning restaurant has been one nominated by an organization, that organization will also receive a \$25 cash award for their general treasury for making the recommendation.

Entry blanks for clubs and individuals to nominate a restaurant for the award may be obtained by calling or writing Miss Dambold at the Texas Wheat Producers Board office in Suite 600, Bank of the Southwest in Amarillo, 352-2282.

Announcement of the program is being made to the restaurants in the September issue of the "Chuck Wagon", the trade publication of the Texas Restaurant Association, according to W.W. Lively, Executive Vice President.

Sunflower Seed Turns Foe Into Friends

An old foe may turn into a new friend for High Plains farmers according to Dr. Doug Owen, High Plains Research Foundation Agronomist for oilseed research.

For years considered only an undesirable weed, the sunflower has been domesticated and developed into a highly desirable oil producing crop. Plant breeders now have developed hybrids with high seed yielding potential and high oil content. The oil is especially valuable for its excellent nutrition qualities as well as its fine flavor and good cooking characteristics. The hulls and residue left after the oil is extracted is used as cattle feed in the same manner as cottonseed hulls and meal.

The High Plains Research Foundation is in its second year of cultural studies with sunflowers sponsored by a grant-in-aid from the Plains Cooperative Oil Mill. These studies include a variety test containing twenty experimental hybrids; a fertilizer test containing seven treatments of nitrogen and phosphorus in various rates and ratios; and a date-of planting test having four planting dates beginning in April and ending the last week of July. Each date consists of five hybrids planted under dryland and irrigated conditions.

Tests conducted last year showed that both early (April) and late (July) plantings matured before frost and made satisfactory yields even after

sustaining severe hail injury. Some of the earlier plantings in 1974 received severe hail in June and recovered to produce large well-filled seed heads.

A special attachment to the combine header is necessary to minimize harvesting losses but these are available and may be purchased at reasonable cost. Losses estimated as high as 25 percent occurred in 1973 using a combine without the special attachment.

Two insects are economically important. The sunflower head moth is fairly easily controlled by timely application of the recommended insecticide. There is no insecticide known to be effective in controlling the carrot beetle, but damage from this insect may be limited to certain zones or areas. Large infestations of this insect can cause severe damage and loss, however, few insects have been detected in 1973 and 1974.

Research indicates that sunflowers are drought tolerant requiring less moisture than soybeans, sorghum, and corn; and apparently requiring less fertilizer than sorghum or corn thus costing less to produce. Yields ranging from two to three thousand pounds per acre have been obtained. "With prices at fifteen cents per pound these yield potentials make sunflowers a competitive crop for the High Plains, and the possibility of planting after wheat or ahiled-out cotton may provide a valuable alternate crop for area farmers."

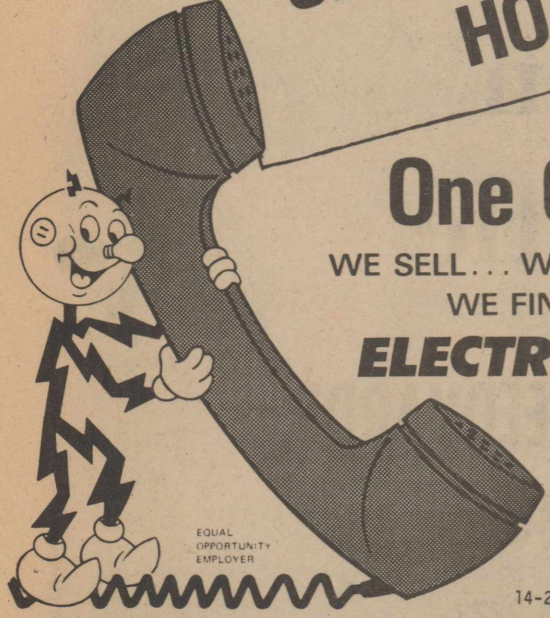
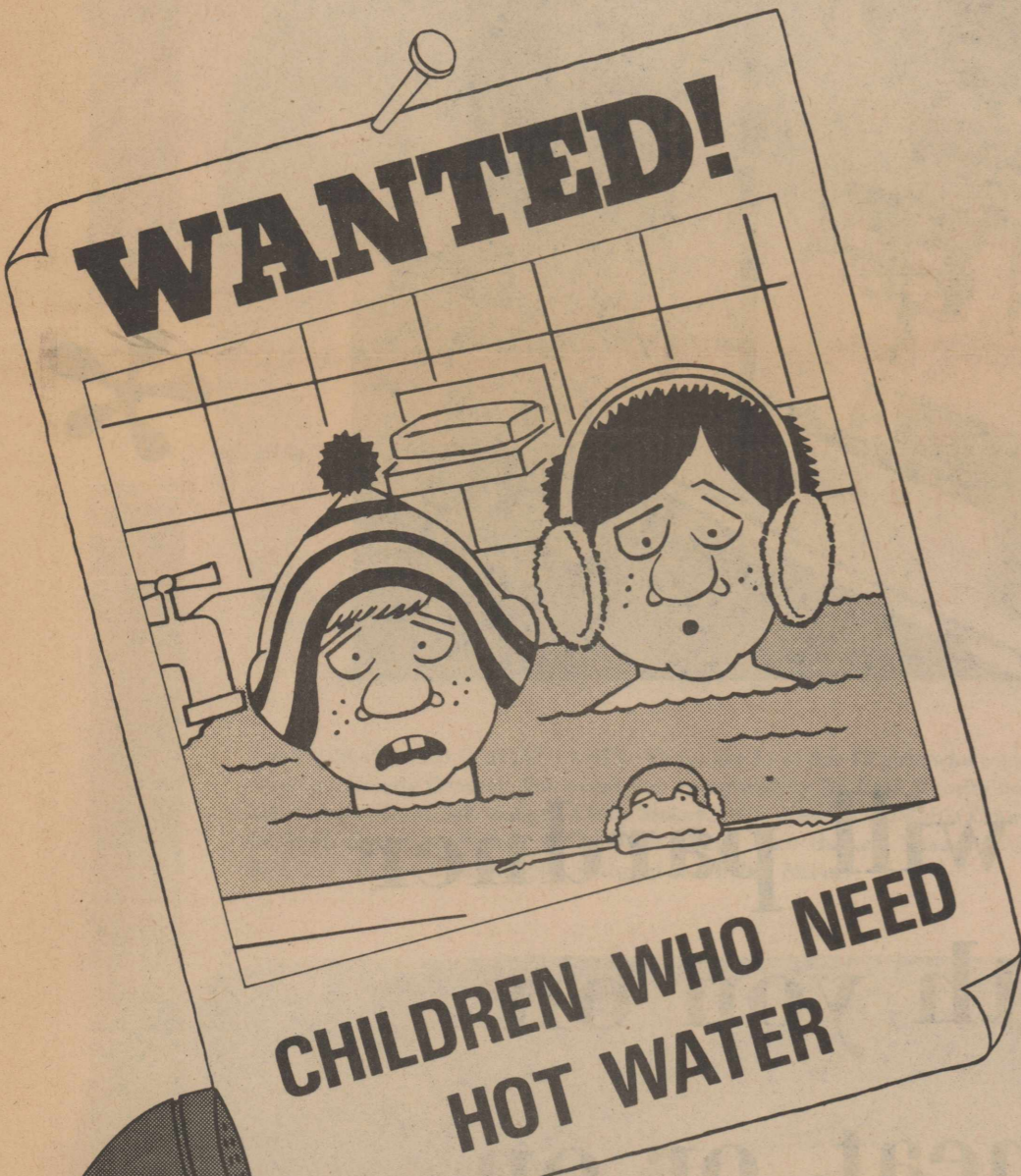
