No business was transacted and the floor was given to Coach Taylor who discussed last week's game as well as showing a film of the contest.

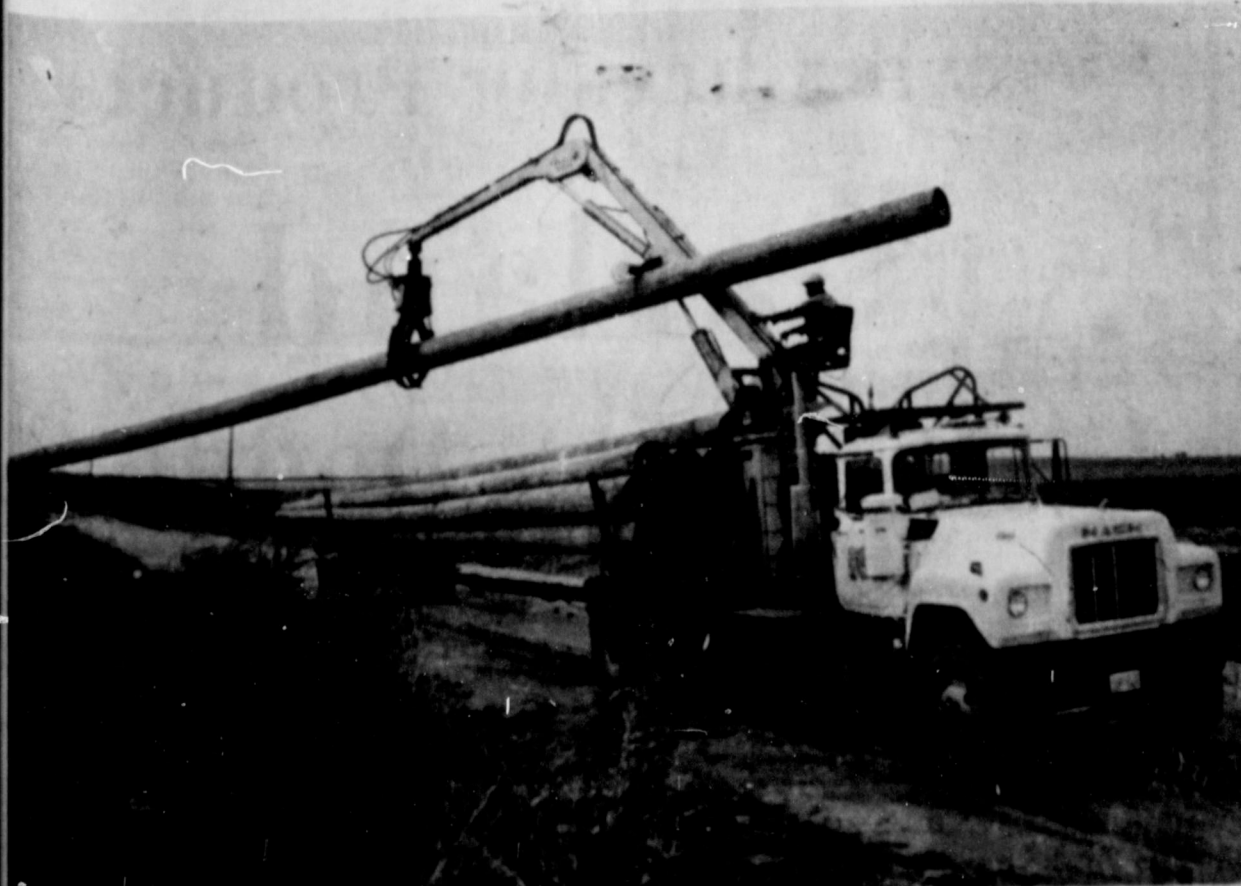
The Booster Club would like to invite all new members to attend these meetings.

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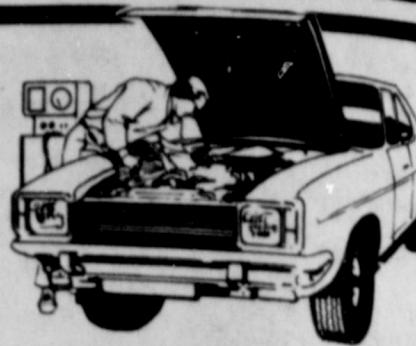

American Agriculture Movement

A spokesman for the American Agriculture Movement says farmers and ranchers are not responsible for increased costs of food to consumers as reported by the media Thursday.

Eugene Schroder, national spokesman for the AAM, advises consumers to look to the middlemen (large corporations that process and market food) to find the real culprits behind escalating food prices.

"Farmers are not responsible for the price of food going up. They never were and they never will be," Schroder said. "It's the monopolistic corporations in the middle that are raising the prices of food to maintain their profit margins."

The effort of corporations to maintain their profits at whatever cost is the actual cause of inflation, Schroder maintains.

Schroder said farmers and ranchers are not responsible for inflation. For example, he said, in 1947, farmers received \$2.85 a bushel for wheat, and bread cost 11 cents a loaf. Now, the farmers get \$2.70 a bushel for wheat, but the price of bread is 60 cents a loaf.

The American Agriculture spokesman made his remarks in response to testimony before a House subcommittee on banking Tuesday. Schroder agreed with a

statement made by Howard W. Hjort, USDA economist that, "Consumers will pay 4.5 to 5 per cent more at food store, even if the farmer receives not one penny more for what he has produced."

But, Schroder said, in response to Hjort's remark that a halt in food prices would require either end inflation, or a cut in farm prices, "Farmers are already getting prices for their products below the cost of production. We need to curb inflation by curbing the middlemen take, not by hurting farmers and ranchers."

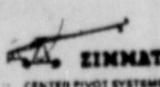

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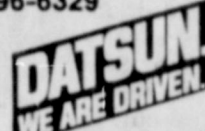

Everyone who applies for a Social Security card number must provide evidence of age, identity and U.S. citizenship or residence status, a social security spokesperson said recently.

This is so, regardless of the person's age, or place of birth. In addition, applicants age 18 or older must come into the social security office when applying, the representative said.

The idea behind these procedures is to protect a person's social security record, to prevent anyone from misusing or abusing another person's social security number, and to assure that the record is complete and accurate.

A person who needs a duplicate social security card to replace one lost or to show a new name must present evidence of his or her identity before the new card can be issued. In addition, the person's application will be checked against social security records before the new card is issued.

People should allow plenty of time to get a new social security card. It takes about 6 weeks to issue the number and deliver the card after all required evidence has been submitted.

The best evidence of a person's age is a birth certificate and U.S. citizenship. This should be submitted when ever possible. If this is not available, other documentary evidence can be used. Evidence of identity should include documents which show the person's picture, signature, date of birth or age, or any other identifying information.

People not born in the United States should submit evidence of their United State Citizenship or their immigration documents showing they are lawfully admitted to the United States.

A leaflet "Applying for a Social Security Number," can be obtained at any Social Security office. It tells what kinds of evidence can or can not be used. The address and

telephone number of the nearest office can be found in the telephone directory under "Social Security Administration."

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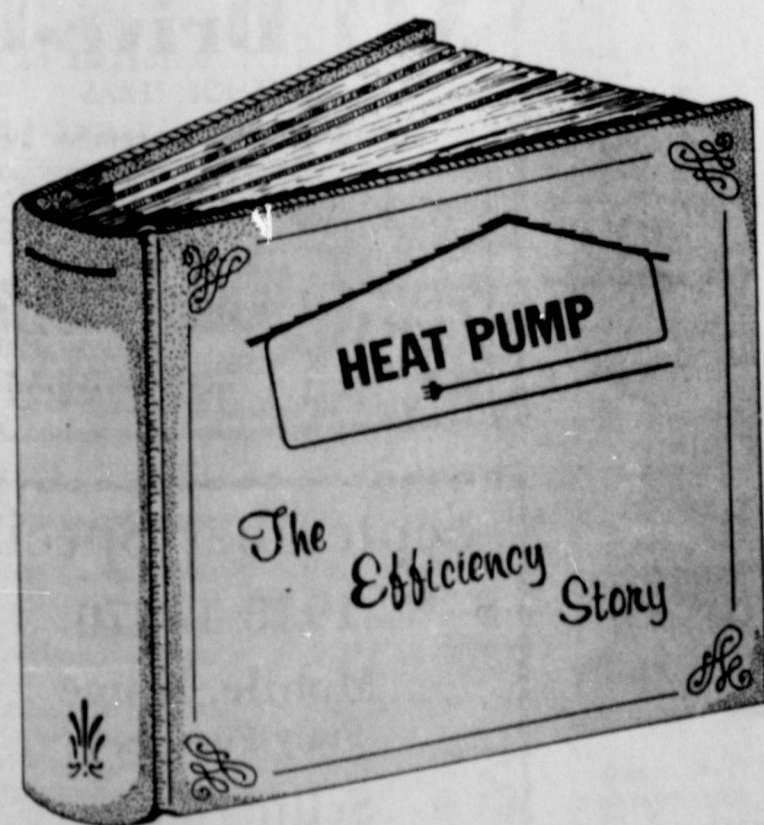

The season for active insect infestation of crops in Castro County is nearing its end, according to this week's report of Mark Powell, Extension entomologist.

COTTON—The past few days of warm weather have helped cotton to mature. The bollworm has pretty much cycled out. There are still large worms in the fields but these will soon burrow into the ground and pupate for the winter as brown cocoons.

CORN—Corn harvesting has picked up across the area. As time progresses more fields are beginning to lodge due to corn borer, spider mites and charcoal rot. However, more fields seem to be down to the spider mites and charcoal rot than to corn borer.

Again stubble destruction will be important this winter to suppress the corn borer population next season. If cattle are going to be grazed on the stubble, then the stubble should be plowed under by the middle of February.

SORGHUM—Headworms are still present in some sorghum fields. Many of these worms are large and will be entering pupation for the winter. Again the treatment level for headworms is 2 per head in grain fields and 1 per head in seed fields.

"Mad as a March hare" comes from the fact that hares are unusually shy and wild in March, which is their rutting season.

They soon decided without schools, churches, roads, and mail service that it was time to do something about it. About 1903-1904 they decided to move the store and post office to a common point and organize a town. They soon built a community church, or place of worship, where all the denominations could use the same building. At a great sacrifice to all that was concerned, they ordered and erected a huge bell and placed it in the church tower. On Sunday morning this huge bell could be heard for miles around, and was a constant reminder for everyone to come to church. Various things have happened to this old bell, but thru the graces of providence and a lot of loving care, this old bell remains a part of the community, and it's glorious sounds is a part of Olton, Texas.

Today, and for the past many years, this bell has been in the Church of the Nazarene, and sends out it's glorious warnings on Sunday at church time.

On Sunday, September 17, 1978, and the "50th anniversary of the Nazarene Church" in Olton, the "Lamb County Historical Society," thru a lot of gracious assistance placed a historical marker at the church.

When the big ranches were formed from the XIT in Lamb and adjoining counties in the early days of the 19th century, only a small acreage in the north east part of the county was available for settlement. A few years later a group of courageous and hardy pioneers ventured on the land seeking a better way of life.

Dedication services were attended by a large group of admirers and God loving people.
