Cotton Market Is Uncertain

Austin, Texas, April 6—The U. S. cotton market's stability will remain uncertain until the federal government makes more definite statements regarding enforced cotton planting allotments and foreign policy, Dr. A. B. Cox, University of Texas cotton marketing expert, says.

There is a general feeling in the cotton industry that many farmers would like to reduce cotton acreage this year but are wary of prospective enforced government allotments which would cause excessive 1954 acreage reductions, he points out. The new Administration's evolving foreign policy could change foreign trade prospects, Dr. Cox adds.

School Tax Raise Carried Last Sat.

Voters of the Lorraine Independent School District last Saturday voted to raise the tax rate of the district from \$1.00 on the hundred dollar valuation to not to exceed \$1.50. The vote was 112 for the raise and 81 against it.

Voters also elected three trustees for the district, a county trustee at large and a county trustee for the commissioner's precinct.

Local trustees elected are Travis Hallmark, Varnell Templeton, both of whom were already members of the board, and Ira Beights. Hallmark received 118 votes, Templeton 111, and Beights 139. The other two candidates on the ballot were Roscoe Hudgins and C. A. Hughes. Hudgins received 102 votes and Hughes 77.

C. C. Thompson received 162 votes for county trustee at large and Jim Templeton received 70 write-in votes for precinct trustee.

Fear of Cancer Delays Seeing Doctor

Austin, Texas, April 6—Many people put off seeing their physician, when they suspect cancer, because they are afraid. And yet, this fear, resulting in delay, causes many deaths from cancer. One-half of the lives now being lost to cancer could be saved if sufferers would see their doctors in time, declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The sooner cancer is found, the less likely it is to have spread to other parts of the body, making cure impossible.

Most persons are familiar with the danger signs, such as a small sore on the skin, lip, or tongue that does not heal quickly; a mole, wart, or birthmark that suddenly changes in appearance; a painless lump or thickening, especially in the breast, lip, or tongue; persistent indigestion; or radical changes in normal bowel habits; any unusual bodily discharge or bleeding; and persistent hoarseness lasting more than a few weeks. When any of these symptoms show up between physical check-ups, go quickly to see your doctor. They are common indications that cancer may be starting.

You cannot tell if you have cancer without seeing a doctor. A regular thorough physical check-up by your family physician is your best guard against cancer, plus an examination when one of the danger signals, or warnings appear. The first symptoms of cancer are scarcely noticeable. You may notice just a slight change from the normal. But do not wait until you feel pain to see your doctor. It is characteristic of cancer that there is no pain in the first stages. Pain is usually a late symptom, and when it comes, the growth is often far advanced.

Livestock Shipments Decline In Texas

Austin, Texas, April 6—Total February shipments of Texas livestock dropped 26 per cent below January and 13 per cent below February, 1952, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Declines from January included hogs (77 per cent), calves (53 per cent), sheep (45 per cent), and cattle (16 per cent). In the February, 1952-February 1953 comparison, hog shipments declined 96 percent, calves 59 percent, and cattle 5 percent. Sheep shipments were up 17 percent.

Sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's PMA Cotton Branch, the Smith-Doxey program enables cooperating cotton improvement groups to get their cotton classed without cost. They also can get free market price quotations from which they can gauge local cotton values.

Application forms for the 1953 program can be obtained from the County Agent, the Abilene Cotton Classing Office, or local ginners. One application by the group leader covers all members.

Last year, 660 farmers in the county took advantage of these services, Matejowsky said.

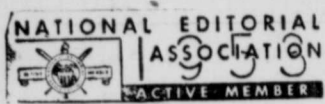

Veterans' News

Questions and Answers
Q. I meet all the eligibility requirements for training under the Korean GI Bill. However, I've recently gone back on active duty. May I take a correspondence course under the program, even though I'm now in uniform?

A. No. Even though you meet all the eligibility requirements, the law requires that you be a civilian when you take your training. Veterans back on active duty may not train under the law.

Q. Is there any time limit I have to meet, in starting training under the Korean GI Bill? I have just received my discharge.

A. You must begin your training within two years of the date of your discharge. Veterans discharged before August 20, 1952, however, must begin by August 20, 1954.

Q. I have quite a large number of bills I'm trying to pay. One of my creditors is getting impatient, and has threatened to take over my disability compensation, until his bill is paid off. Can he do this?

A. No. Disability compensation payments—as well as all other VA benefit payments—are exempt from the claims of creditors, under the law.

Q. Is a service-connected disability, incurred since Korea, enough in itself to entitle me to vocational training under Public Law 16? I have an honorable discharge.

A. No. In addition, you must have a need for training to overcome the handicap of your disability.

Seed Testing Procedure

There is an old farm maxim which states, "The harvest is no better than the seed." You don't have to be a Biblical scholar to recognize the origin and wisdom of that saying. And right now is the time to prepare for sowing good seed in order to reap a high production harvest this fall.

When you buy your seed from a dealer, the Tested Seed Tag required by law on all bags, tells you what to expect in germination quality and seed purity. Yet, what about that last year's crop of seed stored in the bin on

your farm? Wouldn't it be a good idea to know as much about the qualities of your farm-grown seed as that which you buy at the store?

If you plan to sell some of that stored seed, the Texas Seed Act says it must be state inspected and tested. But whether you intend to sell it or plant it, a comprehensive test of the seed will pay dividends at harvest time.

Two laboratories are operated by the Texas Department of Agriculture for purity and germination tests. No charge is made for testing field seed of

Texas residents but a fee of 25 cents per sample is levied for all vegetable and flower seed.

To expedite testing operations, a few suggestions are offered to the sender:

1. How to Take Samples. Only samples of re-cleaned seeds can be accepted. When you have five bags or less of seed, take a sample from each bag. If there are more than five bags, send samples from at least every fifth bag, but never less than five bags should be sampled. In sampling bulk seed, thrust your hand or a long probe into the bin in at least seven uniformly distributed spots.

2. Sizes of Samples. Send 2 ounces of small seed like white or alsike clover and most grasses; 5 ounces of red or crimson clover, alfalfa, lespedeza, ryegrass, bromine, millet, flax, rape or seeds of similar size; 1 pound of sudan grass, sorghum seeds, proso and like sizes; 2 pounds of

corn, cotton, cereals, vetches, cowpeas or larger seeds.

3. Information Needed. Print your name and address, include the kind and variety of seed (the lab does not make varietal identification); the lot number or stock identification; the month and year of harvest and where grown; the test desired (whether purity, germination or both). If the seed has been treated, give name of material and rate of application.

4. Forwarding Samples. Samples should be mailed in cloth bags or strong cardboard containers. Paper bags and ice cream cartons are unsatisfactory since they usually burst in transit. Depending on your location, samples may be sent to either of the following addresses: Seed Laboratory, Texas Dept. of Agriculture, Austin, or Seed Laboratory, 116 Agriculture Bldg., Texas Tech College, Lubbock.

5. Tested Seed Labels. Labels

His studies revealed the surprising fact that money had little to do with making a town or city a good place to live, and the per capita wealth for the citizens was not as important as the way in which they spent whatever money was at their disposal. The town or city where people spend their money on homes, providing schools for education, supporting the business places, is unselfish in its gifts for religion is a good place to live.

A town first must have the support and good will of its citizens. The story of an American lady who was traveling in Europe is a good illustration. She was a most charming and well-mannered person who won the admiration of many people that she met. One such individual who was taken with her charms and fine manners said to her: "I can't understand your being from Chicago. I naturally assumed you were from Boston." "What gave you that idea?" she asked. Her acquaintance told her that he was under the impression that all intelligent and cultured Americans were from Boston. "What made you think that?" the lady asked. "Oh, I don't know," he answered. "I think a Boston lady once told me so."

The pride of this Boston lady in her city is something we could well imitate. Perhaps our town is not better than any other of its class and perhaps the people who live here are no better than people who live elsewhere, but in my opinion I think we are fortunate in having the finest town of its class in the country, and the best people in the whole wide world live here.

Towns where the people are kind and neighborly and have an interest in the welfare of others are better than cities of

greater wealth where selfish interests prevail. It is the quality of the citizens who make up a city which is more important than the amount of their incomes. Any town, our town, becomes a good place to live if the people make it so. The city advances only upon the efforts and achievements of the individual. You are the individual.

I wonder how many persons seriously consider the full responsibility of every citizen to his community. Most people believe that public service is the sole responsibility of elected civic leaders. And many individuals believe their duty and interest in community affairs ends after they have fulfilled their civic obligation of voting. Every individual has a responsibility to his community that goes beyond mere voting for city officers. He must cooperate with those officers and the police and the fire department and other agencies of the city so that his town will be well run. He should join in community enterprises and cooperate in all undertakings designed to make his community more progressive.

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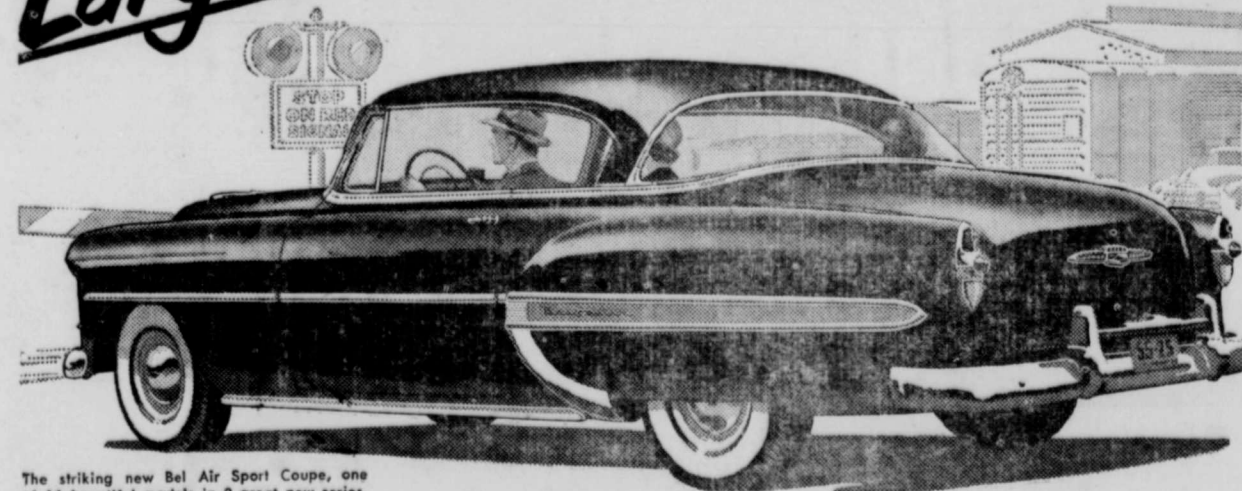
