## Quarterbacks List Yearly Expenditures

Colorado City's Quarterback Club spent a total of \$2,324.86 during the past year in promoting athletics at Colorado High School. President Bill Quimby said this week.

The expenses included \$226.75 for payment of a bank note; \$531.36 for rental on chartered buses for transportation of the CHS football team; \$217.17 spent on promotion of a Negro football game; \$1,018.75 banquet expenses; \$208.30 purchase of a car plus insurance and car expenses and \$122.53 for other expenses.

Income for the preceding year totaled \$2,354.18, leaving a balance for the past year of \$33.55.

New officers for the Quarterback Club, elected May 11 and installed July 1, include Quimby, president; Fred McKay, first vice president; Curtis Latimer, second vice president; R. K. Sneathen, third vice president and Joe Ed Boatright, secretary.

Others are Trevelyn Kelley, treasurer; Joe Salter, Jeff Taylor, A. M. Holman and Ed Rothwell, directors.

This is the first time the club has had a board of directors.

A newsletter, the first of its kind to be issued by the club, was sent out this week.

## Loraine Board Names Marcum Superintendent

In a meeting last Friday night the Loraine school board elected D. V. Marcum as superintendent of the Loraine Schools for the 1957-58 school year.

He replaces Don Robbins, who has resigned to take a position with the Mesa Grande Oil Company in South America. Robbins had been Loraine superintendent for three years.

Marcum formerly served as Loraine High School coach during the 1954-55 school year. Since that time, he has held the position of superintendent of schools at Benjamin.

Marcum will move to Loraine early in August with his wife and three children, Tim, Jim and Sandy.

He holds a master's degree from Hardin Simmons University in Abilene.

The Loraine board has also named Guy Phillips, a former instructor at Eagle Pass, as a language teacher for the coming year.

After supper the Scouts were allowed to go anywhere they wished and the Colorado City delegation split up into small groups.

Dois Pace and Jimmy Costin wandered around downtown Washington; Dan Latimer, Bill Cowan and Mike Robinson went back for sightseeing in the Union Station area and John Merritt and Barton Smith went swimming in the beautiful Ambassador Hotel Pool.

## Seven Will Get FFA Degree at Conclave

A total of seven Mitchell County youths will be awarded the Lone Star Farmer Degree, the highest degree that may be earned by members of state FFA chapters at the FFA state convention in Fort Worth Thursday night.

Included in the seven are four boys from Colorado City and three from the Loraine chapter.

The boys' records and qualifications for the Lone Star Farmer award were approved at an area FFA convention early in June.

The boys receiving the degrees are Richard Keathley, Morris Hammond, Gene Blasingame and Keith Neff of the Colorado City chapter and Billy Cornett and George and Gerald Martin of the Loraine chapter.

In order to qualify for the Lone Star Farmer Degree, the candidate must have earned at least \$500 from supervised farming programs and must have a satisfactory record of leadership in school and in the FFA organization.

Only two per cent of all boys enrolled in vocational agriculture courses in school and in the FFA can qualify for the degree.

For the Loraine chapter, the three latest awards will make a total of 32 boys from Loraine who have received Lone Star Farmer Degrees. The chapter ranks among the top 25 chapters in the state in the number of degrees awarded to members.

The four Future Farmers from Colorado City have earned a combined total of approximately \$2,500.

The presentations to the four Colorado City boys will make a total of 57 degrees presented to members of the local chapter.

The local chapter ranks fifth in the state in number of degrees.

## Missouri Valley At Work

Work has started at Lake Colorado City on a new 175,000 kilowatt unit destined to make the local Texas Electric Service Company power plant one of the largest in the entire Texas Electric system.

The new 175,000-kilowatt unit at the Morgan Creek power plant will bring the capability of the plant to 330,000 kilowatts, more than double its present capability of 158,000 kilowatts, J. B. Thomas, Texas Electric president, said Saturday.

Completion is scheduled for the spring of 1959, Thomas said.

**New Lake Planned**  
As part of the plan for the new unit and for anticipated future expansion of this generating station, preliminary steps have been taken to create another reservoir to provide an additional source of cooling water.

To fill this need, a new lake is planned on Champion Creek, seven miles southeast of Colorado City.

The new lake will be near Lake Colorado City on Morgan Creek, Thomas said.

Facilities will be provided so that water impounded in the new lake can be pumped into Lake Colorado City for use by the power plant and by Colorado City for municipal purposes.

**Spur Line Started**  
Work has already started on the construction of a spur railroad track from the Texas & Pacific main line to the power plant.

The spur will start at Dome, west of Colorado City, where an unloading track was laid when the first units of the power plant were installed.

Construction of the three-mile stretch of track to the plant will be done by the W. A. Smith Construction Company of Houston under a contract with TESCO.

Grading of the roadbed for the new track has been underway for two weeks and is scheduled to be completed July 22, according to D. O. Walker, field supervisor for the W. D. Caldwell Construction Company of Big Spring which is handling that phase of the work.

**Joint Contract**  
A joint contract for the construction of the plant addition has been let to Missouri Valley Contractors of Leavenworth, Kan., and Winston Brothers Company of Minneapolis, Minn.

Engineers from the Missouri Valley firm have arrived in Colorado City to arrange preliminary construction details.

Gene Gosper, a company official, is in charge of the Missouri Valley office here.

Construction work on the water intake structures and other outlying facilities for the new unit is scheduled to start within the next four weeks, Thomas said.

The 4,000-foot-long discharge

## State Okays Local Speech Therapist

Texas Education Agency has authorized a speech therapist for Colorado City public schools.

And Supp. Frank Wilson has begun an immediate search for a qualified specialist for the position.

Wilson applied this month to the state agency for approval of a therapist for Colorado City schools. His request was submitted after the need for a therapist was pointed out by Parent-Teacher Association.

The PTA last spring, scheduled Dr. Empress Zedler, of the West State Teachers College, to conduct a survey of personal interviews among local students. The study by Dr. Zedler emphasized the need for a speech therapist and formed the

## COSDEN LOGS COUNTY WELLS

## Five Mitchell Producers Listed; Sharon Ridge Ventures Staked

Five completions were listed in Mitchell County oil fields this week and four new locations were spotted in the Sharon Ridge 1700 Field.

Two of the producers were reported by Cosden Petroleum Corporation on its Chalk lease in southwest Mitchell County at the end of the past week.

Cosden's No. 11 Chalk, 1,650 feet from south and 2,341 feet from east lines of section 90, block 29 of the W&NW Survey was reported unofficially to have made 36 barrels of oil per day on test.

The well is 12 miles southeast of Coahoma.

Cosden No. 12 Chalk spudded the last week in June. Looked good for 31 barrels per day in the shallow sand. It is located 990 feet from south and 1,681 feet from east line of section 90, block 29, W&NW Survey.

W. C. Russell No. 2-A Crawford pumped 52 barrels of 29-gravity oil and only a trace of water also in the Sharon Ridge 1700.

The well is located 330 feet

from west and 1,021 feet from north lines of subdivision .11, George J. Reiger Survey.

Total depth went to 1,717 feet with top of the pay zone at 1,672 on an elevation of 2,251 feet.

Standard Oil of Texas No. 10 M. W. Miller completed near Westbrook of 78 barrels of 28.3 gravity oil with six per cent water Wednesday.

The producer is located 1,850 feet from east and 990 feet from

south lines of section 11, block 28, T.N. T&P Survey.

Production was hit at 2,870 on a ground elevation of 2,120 and total depth measured 3,150. Perforations were from 3,026-54.

Simms & Wagner No. 8 J. D. Fuller, 330 feet from west and 1,320 feet from south lines of section 26, block 9, George J. Reiger & C. A. O'Keefe, pumped 38 barrels of oil and 48 per cent water for another Sharon Ridge completion Thursday.

Gravity measured 28.2.

Total depth went to 1,728 feet with top of pay at 7,641 feet, perforated from 1,664-70 and 1,679-87. It was completed naturally.

Four Ector Water Co. ventures were logged in the Sharon Ridge 1700 Field this week.

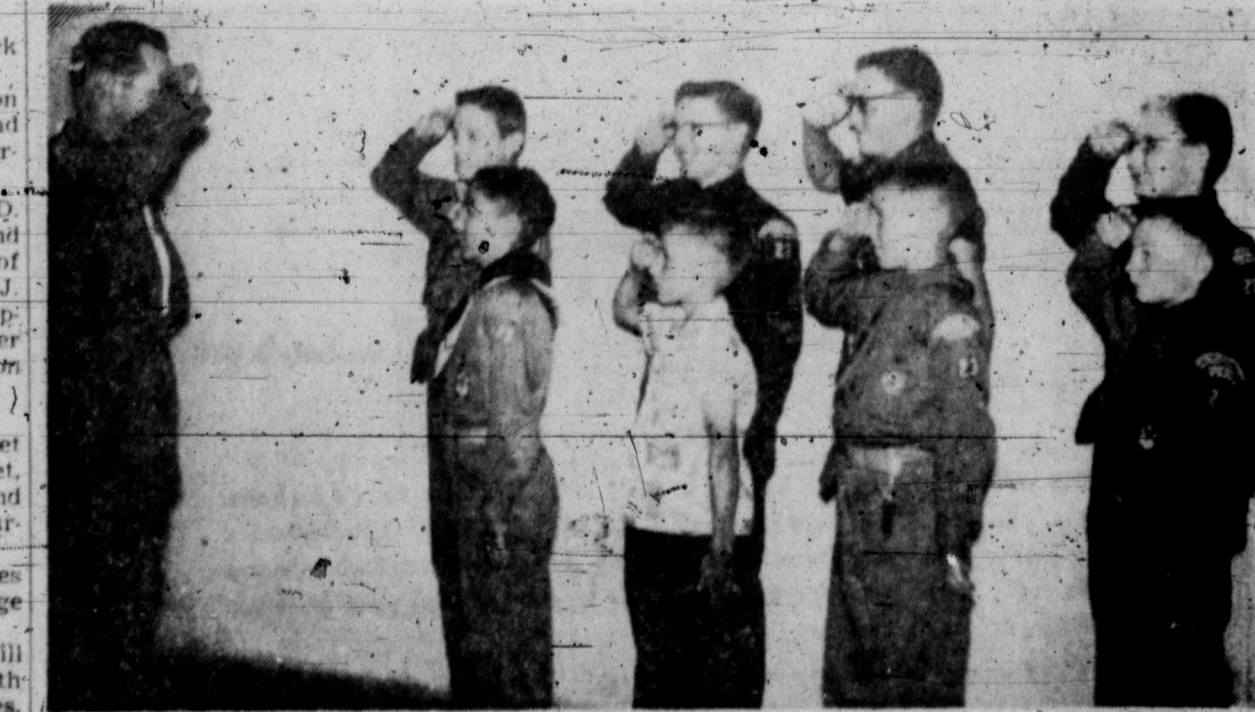

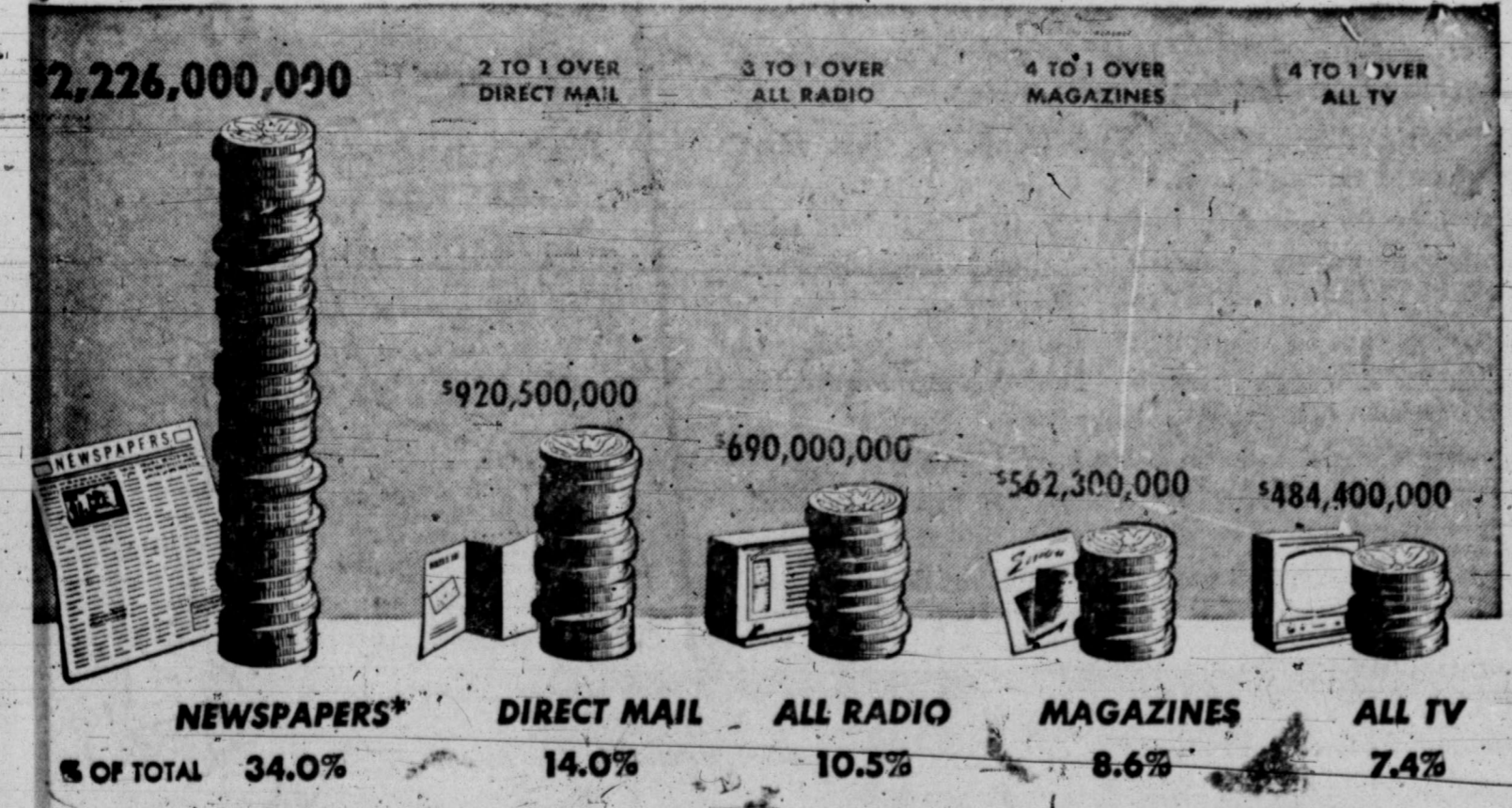

**200 Workers**  
 While comparatively few construction workers will be required for the earlier phases of the job, the number will increase as the work progresses.

Approximately 200 men will be employed on the project at the peak of construction during the summer of 1958.

The Morgan Creek power plant first began operating in the spring of 1950 with two 22,000-kilowatt units.

The plant had hardly started operating when work began on a 44,000-kilowatt unit which was put into operation in 1952.

The fourth unit with a capability of 70,000 kilowatts was added to the plant in 1954 giving it a total of 158,000 kilowatts.

The new unit will be the fifth to be constructed at TESCO's Morgan Creek power plant.

Speed limit signs have been placed in Ruddick Park, setting the park speed limit at 25 miles per hour.

City Manager Rollin K. Sneathen told the city council Monday night that the signs had arrived and would be put up in the park sometime this week.
