

Lester Seeks Change Of Venue For Murder Trial

Hamilton Testifies To Indirect Threats From Walton

Defendant Placed On Stand To Tell Story Of Slaying

Adjournment Of Court For Day Halts Description Of Actual Killing Of His Youthful Son-In-Law

Aids Defense Plea

Letters From Tom Walton To Theresa Hamilton Are Read Into Testimony Of Murder Trial Friday

WEATHERFORD, Tex., Nov. 1.—Although adjournment for the day cut short his story before he described the actual killing of Tom Walton, Jr., his son-in-law, R. H. Hamilton, former member of the Texas supreme court commission of appeals, on trial for the killing testified today he had received numerous indirect threats of violence from the young man.

This testimony was interpreted as defense preparation for the plea of self defense in "apparent danger," which Hamilton is expected to make when he describes the events which took place in his office on the day Walton came there supposedly to confess his secret marriage to Hamilton's daughter, and was shot to death.

Landed Into Story

Speaking confidently, in a clear carrying voice, Hamilton, one of the outstanding jurists of the state, launched into his story.

"When court had recessed Hamilton had had conversations with Walton just before the shooting and had begun reading letters which other witnesses declared had contained threats against Hamilton because of his opposition to Walton's request that he be allowed to marry Hamilton's daughter, then 17. Hamilton is to return to the stand tomorrow."

Had Met Twice

The accused man declared he met Walton twice before the young man was shot.

Hunting Cause Of Wounds To Eight

Two Nimrods Drop Dead In Pennsylvania As Season Opens; Only One Injured Seriously In Mishaps

HARRISBURG, Pa., Nov. 1.—Eight hunters were shot in accidents on the first day of the hunting season in Pennsylvania today and two nimrods dropped dead from heart attacks. Only one of the eight men was believed to be seriously wounded, but he and three others may lose the sight of one eye as a result of their injuries.

John D. Oak, 25, Allentown, is in a serious condition with gunshot wounds in the face and abdomen. The facial wound may cost him the sight of one eye. He was shot by a member of his hunting party who did not see him.

Shot In Face

Ray Mootz, 23, of Merida, and Leonard Herbig, 29, of Tampaque, were shot in the face by companions and may lose the sight of one eye.

Charles Eckert, 37, of Mechanicsburg, suffered gunshot wounds in the face and chest and may lose the sight of an eye.

Dead Shot

Paul Shattow, 15, of Carlisle, was shot in the head and back.

Samuel B. Himmelberger, of Pottstown, was shot by his son.

Death Held Accidental By Burger Justice Of Peace

FORGER, Nov. 1.—J. H. Harris, carbon plant worker, whose body was found entangled in machinery at the plant here today, met death accidentally, a justice of the peace held.

BODY IS MANGLED

The absence of blood around wounds at first led officers to suggest Harris might have met with foul play. His body was discovered in the machinery by two fellow workers.

Fall Draws Year Prison Term And Fine Of \$100,000

Former Official Asks For American People Not To Believe Him Guilty Of Accepting \$100,000 Bribe

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—Albert R. Fall was sentenced to a year in jail and fined \$100,000 today for accepting a bribe of \$100,000 as secretary of the interior for awarding a lease to the Elk Hills Naval Oil Reserve of his California friend, Edward L. Doheny.

The sentence was tempered with mercy as recommended by the jury. Justice William H. Taft permitted Fall his freedom on \$5,000 bond pending appeal, and announced that if the fall sentence were to be carried out at this time he would have suspended it because of Fall's ill health.

Statement Issued

A short while later at his hotel, Fall issued his first public statement concerning his part in the oil leases. He asked the American people not to "believe me guilty of the damnable crime of which I am innocent."

The lengthy statement said he was moved to break his long silence "by a deep desire to vindicate the faith of those who have loved, honored and trusted me."

Mercy Shown

Justice Hitz, in imposing sentence, said that had Fall been in good health he would have imposed the full penalty of \$200,000 and three years in jail. The justice ordered

Andre Tardieu About Ready With French Cabinet

PARIS, Nov. 1.—(P)—Andre Tardieu, stepping in where Aristide Briand declined to tread and where two other political leaders had failed, confidently assumed President Doumergue tonight he would be ready to present a cabinet list by 1:00 p. m. tomorrow.

Believing that the interests of France as a nation are more important than the interests of political groups, the more conservative elements of the republic are striving to bring into being under Tardieu a ministry which will at once command the respect of the nation and stand a reasonable chance of obtaining a majority in the chamber of deputies when votes are taken on national policies.

Russian Airmen Complete Moscow-New York Flight

Spectacular Ovation Given Four Fliers By Spectators

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—(P)—A courier of good will came to earth today in a spectacular ending of a flight from Moscow to New York. The courier was the giant monoplane "Land of the Soviets," which reached its goal after an adventure of 70 days in which its crew of four braved snow, typhoons and other dangers of a 12,500 mile journey across two continents and the north Pacific ocean.

The thrill and thrills of disaster, ever present during the journey, remained with the ship even when the goal was attained after the last leg of the flight—a hop from Detroit to New York.

Spectators Cheer

As the wheels of the craft struck the earth, 6,000 wildly cheering spectators stampeded over guard ropes and swept policemen off their feet in a rush for the plane, all unmindful of the two whirling propellers and a huge craft still traveling at a fast landing speed.

\$20,000,000 Firm Into Bankruptcy

Financial Organization Is Crashed With Filing Of Voluntary Petition; Was Built Up By W. B. Foshay

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 1.—An organization valued at more than \$20,000,000 built up through the financial wizardry of Wilbur B. Foshay, crashed today when a voluntary petition in bankruptcy was filed against the W. B. Foshay company, holder of public utility, industrial, banking and real estate properties.

Crash of the parent company carried with it subsidiaries in thirty states and in Alaska, Canada, and Central America and marked one of the greatest financial disasters in the north-west.

Utilities Named

Named with the Foshay company in the receivership action were the Public Utilities Consolidated, corporation, the utility operating subsidiary of the concern, and the W. B. Foshay Building corporation, which owns the company's office structures in various cities, including the 15 story Foshay tower here.

Joseph Chapman, Minneapolis banker and merchant, was named receiver of the vast interests in the receivership.

Examining Trial Scheduled Today For Joe Hawkins

District Attorney Durwood Bradley To Fight Effort To Obtain Freedom For Prisoner On Bond

DEFENDANT IS CHARGED WITH SHOOTING DOWN FATHER-IN-LAW FOR INTERFERENCE IN DOG FIGHT NEAR RAILS

EXAMINING trial for Joe Hawkins, charged with the murder in connection with the fatal shooting of his father-in-law, S. M. "Uncle Sam" Walker, 78, on a farm near Ralls last Monday afternoon, will be held at Crockett today, according to information reaching the Morning Avalanche last night.

District Attorney Durwood Bradley will leave Lubbock this morning for Crockett where he will direct the state's case. The trial will be held in justice court and it is understood that defense attorneys will attempt to obtain Hawkins' release on bail. District Attorney Bradley has announced that he will fight any such effort.

Hawkins is being held in the Crockett county jail following his arrest Monday afternoon shortly after the fatal shooting.

The shooting was said by witnesses to have followed a short altercation between the two men over a dog fight. Walker, according to witnesses, was returning to the house from work in his garden. Hawkins, together with several others, was watching a dog fight which was in progress and the older man asked him to stop the fight. Refusing to do so, Walker, according to the witnesses, was killed this afternoon when he was riding over the full charge lodged in the victim's left chest causing instant death.

Both of the men were farmers and lived at the same place, which was near the Hawkins' wife from her father.

Special Trains Carry Local Fans To Games

APPROXIMATELY 1,700 LUBBOCK

A football fans will be out of the city today with both the Matadors and the Westerners away on important gridiron missions.

Two special trains carry the majority of the grid enthusiasts to Waco and Amarillo where the games are to be played this afternoon, while many others are expected to drive through to the Panhandle city in automobiles.

725 To Waco

Seven hundred twenty-five Matador boosters boarded the Denver special at 7 o'clock last night to accompany the Tech eleven on its first football invasion of Baylor University. The college boosters will arrive at Waco this morning at 7:30 and the return trip will start at 11:50 Saturday night. Sunday noon is the time set for the trippers to arrive back home.

Thousands Expected

High school authorities have predicted a crowd of 1,000 fans for the Amarillo special which leaves here this morning at 8 o'clock. Led by Superintendent M. H. Duncan, the high school band and pep squad, the Lubbock delegation is expected to take Amarillo by storm when the train arrives at the Sandie stronghold shortly after 11.

Both games today are scheduled to start at 3 o'clock. The Lubbock delegation to the Western-Sandy classic will start back at 7:30 to-night.

A play-by-play report of the Lubbock-Amarillo game will be broadcast by the Avalanche-Journal at the publication offices on Texas Avenue. Reports on the Tech-Baylor fracas will be received by quaters.

Bus drivers between here and Amarillo report the roads have dried up sufficiently for speedy travel. This will allow local motorists to drive through to witness the battle today.

Defendant Denied Bail In Habeas Corpus Hearing Before Presiding Judge Clark M. Mullican

Prejudice Claimed

Defense Counsel Declares Fair Trial Impossible In Lubbock Due To Wide-spread Discussion

THE defense counsel of Schenck & Triplett will seek a change of venue when Clay Lester, charged by grand jury indictment with murder in connection with the fatal shooting October 24 of his wife, Mrs. Virgie Lester, is brought to trial in 99th district court here Monday morning, Charles C. Triplett announced last yesterday.

Triplett's announcement followed Judge Clark M. Mullican's denial of bail for Lester at conclusion of a habeas corpus hearing Friday afternoon.

Claim Prejudice

"We will seek a new location for the trial on the grounds that there is too much prejudice existing in this county against the accused man," said Mr. Triplett. "We do not think that Lester could receive a fair and impartial trial in Lubbock, after there has been such widespread discussion of the shooting."

Mr. Triplett declined to answer when asked what kind of defense plea would be made for Lester.

No Argument

The defense offered no argument at close of the testimony. Except for the lengthy questioning of Mrs. Eva Paschall, who was a partner with Mrs. Lester in operation of a small cafe at 413 Avenue H, Lester's attorneys were apparently giving most of their attention to State witnesses.

Mrs. Paschall, extremely nervous, all but collapsed on the stand after

Pilot Is Injured When Plane Falls

Arthur Robertson Of S. A. T. Air Mail Service Taken To Hospital After Crash Near Houston

HOUSTON, Nov. 1. (AP)—Arthur Robertson, air mail pilot for the Southern Air transport, is in the Baptist hospital here following a crash last night ten miles from Houston.

Robertson, whose home is in Little Rock, suffered a fractured pelvis, fractured right arm and numerous abrasions and bruises. Reports from the hospital were that he was in no danger.

Robertson said he had taken the 4:30 p. m. air mail out of Houston and flown to Waco, where he transferred his cargo and took on southbound mail. The weather was foggy and visibility practically nil. In trying to make a landing his plane overturned.

Robertson walked to a farmhouse carrying the mail and was hurried to Baptist hospital where he later made delivery of the mail to postal authorities. The mail was undamaged. The plane was slightly damaged.

Floydada Prepares
For Turkey Trade

Poultry farms are ready for opening of season. Hatcheries are making number of improvements.

FLOYDADA, Nov. 1.—Preparation to handle thousands of turkeys is well under way here. The movement of these birds will begin Monday with the price determining the number of turkeys which will be placed on the market at this time. Local hatcheries are making improvements also in preparation for an exceptionally good year.

One poultry firm here has announced that a larger number of pickers will be employed and all turkeys will be shipped dressed. Substations have been established in a number of nearby towns and communities and will ship turkeys here to be dressed and sent to market.

The turkey season alone always brings several thousands of dollars to farmers and poultry raisers in this section of the South Plains. Buyers estimate that not less than \$100,000 will be paid out to these people during the season which lasts through the months of November and December.

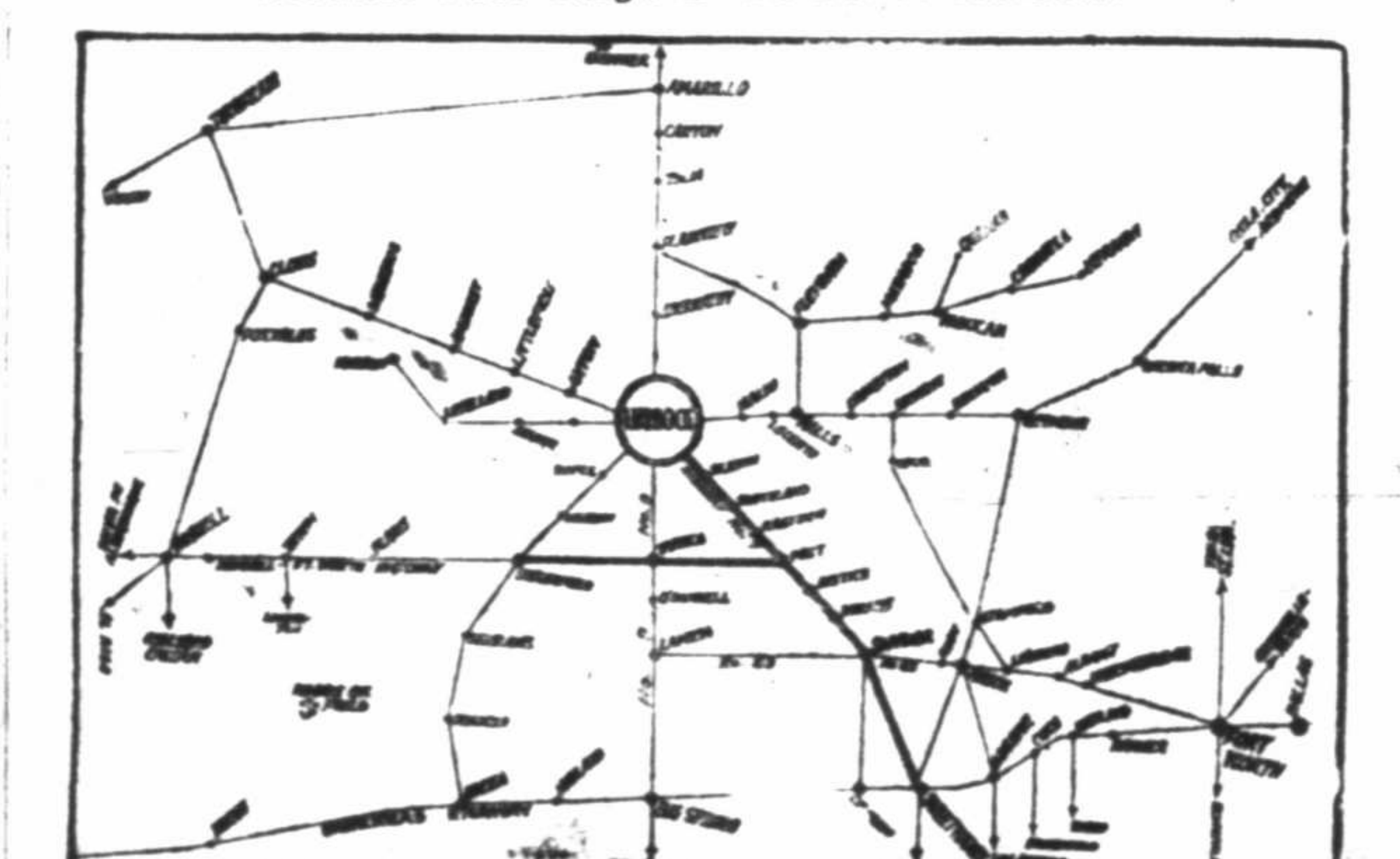

All Washington Stirred By Mystery Of McPherson Girl's Death; Officers Try To Solve Murder Or Suicide Puzzle

BY RODNEY DUTCHER, NEA Service Writer.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—No killing short of a presidential assassination has ever excited the national capital as has the mysterious death of Virginia McPherson.

The McPherson case has all the important elements of any half dozen good mystery novels. It is crammed full of suspects, bungling police, scores of witnesses, love angles, psychological problems, screams in the night, medical phases, alibis, theories of murder, an examination, domestic discord, parental love and all the other human emotions.

The mystery and its complications, which have cost some of the highest police officials their jobs and now threaten the post of the superintendent of the force, have attracted the interested attention of the White House, the Senate, the Attorney General and everyone else in town. Everyone in Washington, it seems, has a theory as to whether Mrs. McPherson was murdered, whether her indicted husband, Bob McPherson, committed that strange crime.

Strangled to Death

Mrs. McPherson, 24, was a nurse, pretty blonde, vivacious, popular and attractive to various men. On the night of Thursday, Sept. 12, or the early morning of Friday 13, she was strangled with a silk pajama cord tied into a surgical knot.

Bob McPherson found the body Saturday noon in the bedroom of their three-room flat. It lay, half clad in a pajama jacket, against the closed door leading to the living room.

The hands weren't clenched and there was no sign of struggle. And yet a coroner later testified that it must have taken her 15 minutes to die.

The scene was laid in the Park Lane Apartments on Pennsylvania Avenue, just two blocks north of the Department of Commerce. The McPherson apartment was on the second floor, its windows some two feet above the roof of a small one-story section from which it's an easy jump into the alley which separates the Park Lane from the Lombardy Apartments.

Bob McPherson is a handsome, dark-haired, hard-boiled book-keeper in a bank. His mother has been confidential secretary to Secretaries of War Weeks, Davis and Coolidge.

Husband's Story Supported

He said he had last visited Virginia between 7:30 and 8 o'clock Thursday night to arrange the financial details of their separation. He then had gone to attend a meeting of his football team. The meeting broke up about 11 and McPherson rode around with some friends, sleeping at an auto about 11:30 and reaching the home of his parents at 12:30 or 12:45. He talked with his father until after 1 o'clock and went to bed. His story is well supported by witnesses.

The police called it a suicide. Virginia had previously attempted suicide at least once. A coroner's jury confirmed the verdict.

Suddenly appeared Patrolman Robert J. Allen, 23-year-old insurance agent who previously had been a storm center on the force and on

whose boat lies the Park Lane, to reporting anything to his superiors. He said that while patrolling he had seen a man leave the McPherson window, cross the low roof and disappear into the alley. At a result Senator Wendell and disappear into the alley. McPherson's home state, called some time after midnight early on on the district attorney for action. The 13th Allen had conducted his own private investigation without a grand jury met, heard evidence and voted 13 to 10 to indict McPherson for first degree murder.

The star witness had been located by newspapermen in the person of Garnett Frye, taxi driver, who swore he had taken a man whom he identified as McPherson to the Park Lane between 1 and 3 a.m. on Friday the 13th.

No one saw McPherson enter or leave at or about that time. Frye said McPherson was extremely agitated. Yet McPherson was so calm that he did not even attend his wife's funeral.

Besides indicting McPherson the grand jury asked the District of Columbia commissioners to take action against Inspector W. S. Shelly, chief of detectives. The Senate then passed a resolution to investigate the police department. The district attorney called on Attorney General Mitchell for help and later as many as 20 Department of Justice operatives have been working on the case in one time. They have interviewed nearly 300 witnesses, examined the body from its North Carolina grave and examined it with results thus far kept secret.

Phone Message Reported

What happened after McPherson left the apartment early in the evening? Well, Virginia telephoned her mother-in-law that Bob had been there and talked about financial details of the separation. "But tell him not to bring the money," she said, "I'm going away."

Shortly before 9 o'clock came a call from Eleanor Sheppard, a nurse and friend who is the last person known to have talked with the girl. It was some time after Virginia answered the phone.

Lillian Conway, the Park Lane's blonde telephone operator, had listened in on both calls. She knew the McPhersons had quarreled frequently. She says she went to their apartment after Eleanor's call and found the living room dark and no light coming from the bedroom door.

Then there's Dr. Tom Ballard of New York, who has been closely questioned by the Department of Justice. He said he had been engaged to Ballard but they were having a misunderstanding about the time McPherson began his successful

two-month courtship. Ballard admitted a continued affection.

A Lone Investigation

Meanwhile, Patrolman Allen, bold youth, publicly stated that he was investigating the district attorney's office in connection with another case. Superintendent of Police asked Captain Doyle, precinct captain over Allen, for comment on the young cop. Doyle replied commending Allen. Pratt suspended both Allen and Doyle, pending a police trial. Senators Blaine and Overman have been demanding Pratt's suspension. Allen and Doyle have hosts of friends, so has Pratt. The fight has only begun.

Other interesting points in the case. It was possible for Virginia to strangle herself in the manner employed. The surgical knot often is used in operations; it cannot slip or come undone but can be easily untied. No other woman, however, has been found in the same condition of disarray that Virginia's body was in. At least six persons in the Park Lane claim to have heard screams that night. The negro janitor of the Lombardy, awakened between 2 and 3 a.m. by a piercing scream. He and his wife claim to have heard a man enter the McPherson apartment and say, "I told you I'd let me alone." He heard an automobile start and drive from the rear of the two buildings about ten minutes later.

Unanswered Question

Why should McPherson murder his wife when he had left her and was about to be permanently rid of her? Could the girl have desired death so much that she would have allowed herself to be found partially clothed? Were her one or more previous "suicide" attempts genuine or only calculated to impress McPherson? Was any man in the apartment that night after the murder? Could Virginia have let herself strangle with no conscious effort to release the cord? Did Allen tell the truth? Was the taxi driver mistaken? Did McPherson sneak forth into the night? Department of Justice agents are sure that many witnesses have lied. Which ones?

Lubbock is said to be definitely settled upon its style of attack and plan for halting the powerful assault of the Sandies.

Odds Lower On Sandies
Odds favoring the Sandies were slightly diminished here last night after the Westerners hit town. Fans who witness the game are certain to see a bitterly-fought contest from the first to the last whistle. Both teams have pointed their efforts all season to the battle tomorrow, and what a battle it will be!

A 16-coach special train, bearing a large Lubbock fan delegation, will arrive here shortly after 11 o'clock Saturday morning. The band and high school pep squad from the Hub City will be aboard the special and a parade through the downtown section of Amarillo will be staged immediately following their arrival in this city.

Interest in the game continues to mount and a crowd approaching 12,000 is indicated. Orders are pouring in for tickets from many points of the state. Both fans are buying seats in blocks and a colorful crowd is anticipated.

Pony Jinx Over Longhorns To Receive Severe Test In Battle

Grid Will Draw Thousands Today Throughout U. S.

Some Of Year's Greatest Gridiron Battles To Be Waged In Today's Program; Titles At Stake

NEW YORK, Nov. 1. (P)—Southern the thousands look on the millionth time in tomorrow along the football fronts, they should have no difficulty in detecting the thrills of some of the greatest gridiron battles of the year.

Close to 250,000 fans will see four of the teams foremost in the race for national championship honors—Southern California, Notre Dame, Pittsburgh and Dartmouth—run into a variety of powerful opposition that may abruptly reduce this "Big Four" to a "Big Two and a Half."

Upwards of 100,000 spectators will watch the undefeated Western conference eleven struggle to keep their status in defiance of Old Man Ux.

Big Six Has Big Day
The Big Six has its own trio of family quarrels. Texas and Southern Methodist fight the big battle of the day in the Southwest. The Southern conference slate shows at least two "rival bouts" for such of the forces as are not engaged for the day in interconference warfare.

To top all this off, there is the glamorous duel of all-American candidates at New Haven, where Yale's Albie Booth will attempt to show that a "good little man" can upset the old adage and beat a "good big man"—Dartmouth's Al Marsters.

Crowds of 70,000 or more will watch this Yale-Dartmouth battle at the Pittsburgh-Ohio State affair in Pitt Stadium and the Southern California-California game in Los Angeles Coliseum. Grant Field, in Atlanta, will accommodate around 35,000 for the last of the current series between Notre Dame and Georgia Tech.

These four games take the spotlight, so far as the main title aspirations are concerned, for Pitt's Panthers, Dartmouth's Indians, Notre Dame's Ramblers and the Southern California Trojans all have swept through October with clean slates.

Irish Mean Business

Feature Clash In Conference Group Promises Thrills

S. M. U. Out To Check Headlong Career Of The Strong Eleven In Dallas Today; Game Toss Up

DALLAS, Nov. 1. (P)—Southern Methodist University, using a 12-man line-up, will attempt to check the headlong career of one of Texas University's greatest gridiron units in tomorrow's featured Southwest conference battle here.

But for the presence of that extra warrior in the Mustangs starting away the powerful Longhorns unscored upon in five games, would be heavy favorites to capture their third conference decision. But this jinx, or what have you, that backs up the Methodist line and generally makes his presence felt against Texas eleven, renders the battle a toss-up.

Ponies Jinx Steers

Not since the year 1819 has a Texas team been able to overcome the Red and Blue. Even last season, when the Longhorns won the crown, they were branded by the up-starters, 6 to 2. In 1925, a Texas eleven gained a tie with the Mustangs, but that has been their best effort. There have been Orange teams that have been able to beat the Red and Blue, but none has been able to prove it on the field of battle.

Twenty-four thousand fans are expected to wedge themselves in Onby Stadium tomorrow to see if the spirit which the Ponies have held over the Steers still exists. There is little doubt that Coach Clyde Littlefield's mobile machine on the face of its record, has a decided edge. It is regarded by many as Texas University's greatest team. But the critics are wary of predicting it will overturn Wiley Ray Morrison and his performing Ponies.

Morrison has never lost a game to Texas, and he has indicated he has no intention of starting the practice at this late date.

S. M. U. Comes to Front

Had the game been played a week ago, Texas would have been a pronounced favorite, regardless of the jinx. Up to the time of their 32 to 0 victory over Mississippi, the Mustangs had shown no desire to stamp them little contenders. But they let the cat out of the bag that day. Uncovered, among other things, was an attack that left Ole Miss spellbound. The Ponies used perhaps 10 plays in that game, and 9 of them were reported to have at least 60 to show the Longhorns tomorrow. It also was revealed that in Weldon "Speedy" Mason sophomore flank, the Methodists have one of the most dangerous ball-carriers in the conference. He is the team's mainman.

From an offensive standpoint, the game promises to be one of the season's best. In Dexter Shelley, driving halfback, Texas has an outstanding star to match Mason. There are five or six other Longhorn backs almost on a par, including Nona Rees, a brilliant quarterback. Rees' generalship is expected to be a big factor. He received much of the credit for the Steers' victories over Arkansas, Oklahoma University and Centenary.

Other Games On Tap
While the section's attention will be centered on the tussle here, either by radio or in person, five other conference outfalls will be going through the motions against non-conference teams. It is the last week for that sort of thing. Starting Nov. 9 the battle-royal will be on, with three championship games scheduled weekly.

Baylor and Texas Christian, who, like the Mustangs and Longhorns, boast a clean conference slate, face fairly stiff opposition tomorrow, but are doped to win. Baylor, defeated by Centenary in last week's big upset, tackles the Texas Tech Matadors at Waco. The Christians meet the North Texas Teachers at Fort Worth. The game should afford Cy Leiland an opportunity to close in on the conference's leading scorers, McCreath and Wilson of Baylor.

Forkers Have Chance

Arkansas Razorback's will have an opportunity to help their conference standing against Louisiana State at Shreveport. They, like the Aggies, however, are hopelessly out of the chase. The Aggies take on the Stephen F. Austin Teachers at College Station, and the score should run high.

The most dedicated game of the day is scheduled at Houston, where the Rice Owls encounter St. Edward's university. The Owls have dedicated the tilt to their new coach, Jack Meagher, former coach at St. Edwards. Not to be outdone, the Saints came right back and dedicated their share of it to their young mentor, Al Sarafiny. It promises to be a close battle.

INTRODUCTION

"The very idea of the power and right of the people to establish government presupposes the duty of every individual to obey the established government."—George Washington.

"Let reverence for law become the political religion of the nation—No one can undermine respect for law without being to that extent an enemy to orderly government."—Abraham Lincoln.

"Free government has no greater menace than disrespect for authority and contemptuous violation of law."—Calvin Coolidge.

"Loyalty to rulers is to me an essential branch of religion."—John Wesley.

LAWLESSNESS

One of the most alarming features of present-day American life is the wide-spread lawlessness, which has increased at an appalling rate in recent years. To make the situation worse, a great many prominent men and influential newspapers are encouraging this lawlessness. Instead of condemning it because it tends to undermine the foundations of civilized society, they condone it. They make excuses for it. They say that it is due to the Eighteenth amendment and the Volstead law, which must necessarily prove a failure because "you cannot make men good by law." The real purpose of the prohibition act is not to make men good by law, but to protect society at large from those who insist upon demonstrating that they will not be made good by law.

PHARISEES AND HERODIANS

"And they sent unto him certain of the Pharisees and of the Herodians." The Herodians were the royal party in favor of the dynasty of Herod the Great as a buffer against Roman authority. The Pharisees, on the contrary, were fiercely opposed to the Herods as puppets of Rome, and of course were bitter enemies of the Roman rulers. The Herodians were Cadducees, liberals in religion. The Pharisees were strict in all matters of faith and practice. But these men, the very opposite in belief, were united in hatred of Jesus. Their aim was to entrap Jesus into some statement that could be made to bear the aspect of sedition and perhaps of treason to the Roman government.

TRIBUTE TO CAESAR OR NOT?

"Is it lawful to give tribute unto Caesar, or not?" "Caesar" is the same as the title "Kaiser" and "Czar." It was the official title of the Roman emperor, at this time, Tiberius. Tribute was the annual poll tax levied on the people for the treasury of the Roman emperor, and collected by the hated publicans. The dilemma in which Christ was placed was very real. If he answered yes, the people would turn against him, for they loathed the tax as a symbol of their subordination to Rome, a condition from which they expected their Messiah to free them. If he replied,

no, the entire force of the Roman Empire would be instantly bent on crushing him.

THE DENARIUS (PENNY).

The denarius was the silver coin in which the poll tax is paid. It was worth from fifteen to seventeen cents, and was the day's wage of a common laborer, equal in purchasing power to about two dollars of our money. The Roman emperor usually had his portrait stamped on the coins issued during his reign, and the custom is followed by many modern nations. The "superscription" included the emperor's name and titles.

A WISE ANSWER

"Render unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and unto God the things that are God's. No more sound, and sagacious reply was ever made. The burden of the decision was thrown back on individual consciences, as is always the case with Christ. If they decided that Caesar had no right to a tribute, they were not to pay the tax; if they concluded that he had such a right, they should pay it. At the same time our Lord clearly implied that the Roman government had a just claim on the Jews—a claim represented by that little silver coin. They were using Roman civilization and power, by which the Jews benefited. So long as they were using these Roman facilities and advantages, as honest men they owed Rome some return, the payment of some tax. But, on the other hand, they were God's people. Jehovah had placed his stamp on their souls. He had given them life, intelligence, love, the countless blessings of their existence, and they used all these things freely and gladly. Therefore they were in debt to God, heavily in debt, and owed to God whatever dues he might require.

"THE POWERS THAT BE"

It is a common-place that the Greeks stand for beauty, the Romans for law, and the Hebrews for religion; but in Paul's letter to the Roman Christians is the world's finest characterization of law, and it was written, in Greek, by a Hebrew of the Hebrews. In our lesson on obedience to law it is well to study this masterly passage.

Let every soul be in subjection to the higher powers. That is, to the civil authorities. "It was easy for a certain type of mind to argue that, since Jesus and his Messianic kingdom would soon displace all the institutions of the present evil age, the civil government had no legitimate authority. The fact that the civil authorities were often connected officially with pagan worship would contribute to this feeling. The feeling might express itself in open disregard of government regulations or in secret tax dodging (vs. 6, 7). The unspeakable tyrant, Nero, was emperor of Rome at this time, but he was just beginning his horrible career. Still, even at his worst, he represented law and order. Paul, in his great and extended work, was often protected by Roman officers. All the Roman centuries of the New Testament were men of fine character. When a Christian is commanded to do wrong, then obedience to the Higher Authority must take precedence. Thus the apostles, when commended by the authorities to cease preaching Christ, replied firmly, "We must obey God rather than men." (Acts 5:29.)

PROHIBITION LAW

THREATENED

Before prohibition "the liquor business had been carried on in the open and there was at the outset no visible way of violating the law on a large scale. Hence the year 1920 brought a fairly effective prohibition regime—not because the government had at that time learned how to enforce the law vigorously, but because potential criminals had not yet learned how to break it. Presently this situation was changed. Little by little a gigantic illicit industry was developed, backed by unbelievable resources and entrenched to an alarming degree within the political organization of the country. It needs to be emphasized, however, that the outbreak of liquor lawlessness, serious as it is, has by no means carried us back to where we were in the days of the saloon. To say that reverses of enforcement mean the failure of the law is quite absurd."

"PERSONAL LIBERTY"

The "personal liberty" so much lauded by the wets is a "cloak of wickedness." The badge of the slaves of Satan. Real liberty lies in obedience to law and loving service of one's brothers. The liberty of another man to enjoy health and economic and social welfare. Ask the wife of the working man who wants full "personal liberty" to drink whether this would increase her personal liberty. She cut out all technicalities and go straight to the main point—that her husband's personal liberty to drink takes away her personal liberty to eat.

THE LORD'S SECOND COMING

Finally, Paul urges upright and law-abiding conduct on the most solemn and impressive of all grounds, the second coming of the Lord. It is near, with every day it is nearer. The long night of waiting is far spent; the day of the Son of righteousness is at hand. It is time to cast off the works of darkness, such deeds as the saloon foster, drunkenness, reveling, licentiousness, intemperance of all kinds. It is time to live beautifully, as befits the beautiful day of its appearing, and to put on a Christly character as an armor of light. Toward this glorious end nothing in the world's history has carried mankind farther than the Prohibition Amendment to the United States Constitution.

JUDGE MULLICAN'S COURT ORDER

NOW THAT THE HEARING is over, and the smoke of legal battle has cleared away, The Morning Avalanche wants to say a word in regard to the court order which barred Lubbock county newspapers from printing the direct testimony in Judge Clark's habeas corpus hearing here yesterday.

When Judge Clark M. Mullican, presiding in 20th District court, issued the order from his standpoint he acted wisely. Had any Lubbock county newspaper published the testimony many prospective jurors in the final trial of the case would have been disqualified because they would, from the newspaper reports, have reached an opinion. Had either the Morning Avalanche, or the Daily Journal published the testimony, practically every man in the country would have read the story and it would have been impossible to secure a jury in Lubbock county for the trial of the Lester case.

That would have meant just one thing. A change of venue would have been inevitable and would have cost thousands of dollars in witness fees, mileage fees and other expenses which would not be encountered in the trial held here in Lubbock county. Judge Mullican's order was given not in an effort to stifle the press, but to keep the facts from the public, but instead, to operate the court upon a less expensive and more business-like basis.

This newspaper is like any other. It is in the business of disseminating news—selling it, if you please—to the public. Therefore, it sorely regrets its inability to print testimony of witnesses in the Lester case yesterday. Yet at the same time we see Judge Mullican's point and are fair enough to bring it out publicly.

When the Lester trial is called, whether it be in Lubbock county or not, The Morning Avalanche and its associated publications will carry full reports of the testimony, part of which will be read yesterday's gist from yesterday's testimony. Nothing which occurred in yesterday's testimony will be left out when Judge Mullican's order is considered that during the trial of the Lester case this newspaper will carry full reports. The Morning Avalanche feels that in abiding by the court order, willingly and without false action, it has aided in fostering efficient court action in this community. It feels that the leading newspapers of the South Plains have thus served a responsibility which falls upon the shoulders of any respectable publication.

BANKS AND PROGRESS

To people unacquainted with the inside workings of banking it appears that the bank as far as progress is concerned, stands still. Change with in the structure, of course can take place but slowly, and for this reason it seems to many that the bank of today is pretty much the same in its essential characteristics, and the methods of this generation with which the great-grandfathers of this generation did business. The American bank, however, could not have stood still. Its importance in the economic scheme of the nation has forced it to grow with the country.

There are evidences that American banking is approaching an era of great improvement. Constructive banking movements now under way throughout the country promise to make stronger banks, more efficient banks, banks offering a wider service, better understanding of banking both in and out of the cage, closer alliances between banks and public, greater respect for the banking profession and wider spending and more systematic saving.

Communities are vitally interested in bigger and better banks. The old-fashioned, tradition-bound bank that refused to adjust itself to changed conditions not only throttles its own development but that of the territory it professes to serve. An efficient, progressive, helpful banking institution reflects itself in a prosperous and industrious community.

The fact that the United States and its thousands of cities have prospered and made progress is due to the fact that its banks have not stood still. To the development of the country traceable to the functions ably assumed by its providers of credit. Bankers must keep step with progress, and usually do.

Do we have the courage, or the sense, to face our own shortcomings to admit to ourselves and to all concerned our errors and mistakes?

There is no shame in admitting failure or mistake, either to ourselves or to observers. We cannot delude those who watch, and they will respect us the more highly if we frankly confess, when we puff the ball, that it was our fault.

As long as we are not too vain to face the facts of our conduct there is hope for us. But we will never be useful to our communities in life as long as we hypnotize ourselves into belief that we have just made a home with the bees full after we have just struck out.

LAW ENFORCEMENT COMMISSION
EXPLAINS ITS SECRETEVENESSBy CHARLES P. STEWART
Central Press Staff Writer

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—The trouble with President Hoover's National Commission on Law Enforcement and Enforcement is its secretiveness. It is too mysterious to be popular. Highbrow and stuck up—some critics call it.

On investigation, I believe this to be an undeserved reputation. The commission simply is misunderstood. It seems to me. It is not the kind of commission people expected. Whether it is the right or the wrong kind is a question which was not left to the commission itself to determine.

I cannot attribute my information to any particular individual, because, as I have said, the commission is darn mysterious. Its members all are pledged to anonymity except Chairman George W.ickersham.

As for Chairman Wickersham, he spoke out loud just once, to Governor Roosevelt of New York, and has been regretting it ever since.

He puts his finger on his lips if you ask him about the weather.

Nevertheless, it's first-hand information—guaranteed to be the commission's honest-to-goodness self-analysis, straight from headquarters.

If, then, the N. C. on L. O. and E. knows its own fix, this is it:

"We are trying to start a real science of criminology. We begin with hardly any facts to go on. Having dug up a few, maybe we arrive at certain definite conclusions from them."

"Suppose we publish these conclusions; what then?"

"Why, having dug up a few additional facts perhaps we find our previous conclusions completely upset by them, and have to reverse ourselves."

"This is bound to happen time and again. At about the 'steenth repetition of it, the entire public gives us the h-h-h. We never can get another one of our conclusions accepted seriously."

"We are mysterious because we have not yet formulated any conclusions whatever that we feel fairly sure of—as sure as doctors or astronomers or any other class of scientists feel concerning their conclusions. When we do take it from us, we shall broadcast the tidings."

Is it fair to inquire—

How happens it that the N. C. on L. O. and E. is attempting to spread its message so broad a field of crime?

The N. C. on L. O. and E. is operating on a \$250,000 appropriation provided by congress on the strength of a resolution introduced by Senator Carter Glass of Virginia, who states that he meant it all (and he ought to know what he meant by his own resolutions) to be spent investigating prohibition.

Yet here is the N. C. on L. O. and E. investigating crime in general.

How come?

To which the N. C. on L. O. and E. answers promptly:

"All we know is that President Hoover appointed us; not Senator Glass of Virginia. The president said, 'Less crime'—in general."

Who cares what Senator Glass meant?

Okay—but creating a new science sounds like a large order.

"Oh, all we aim to do," explains the N. C. on L. O. and E., "is to drive a mere peg to hang the science on."

"Hanging it there will be a job of generations." Another problem presents itself. As the N. C. on L. O. and E. (or some future N. C. on L. O. and E.) proceeds with its task, may it not hit upon the discovery?

That certain crimes are caused by certain conditions.

As, for instance—

How could there be thefts—without private property.

Supposing such a discovery, will it be the commission's duty to recast society and economies, so as to end crime by eliminating the reasons for it?

"We propose to view crime from today's standpoint," rejoins the N. C. on L. O. and E. "We cannot speak for the future—a possible revolution or two."

The N. C. on L. O. and E. consists of five practicing lawyers of the most exalted standing, three federal judges, the chief justice of a state supreme court, the dean of a law school and the woman president of a women's college.

Query:

With the exception of Frank L. Loesch, who may have had some practical experience, as vice president of Chicago's crime commission, how can these eleven bookworms possibly have the least comprehension of the lawbreaking psychology?

"We have our experts," counters the N. C. on L. O. and E., triumphantly. "A doctor does not have to be a germ to understand him, under a microscope."

PEOPLE OF BYGONE DAY HAD ODD NOTIONS ABOUT TOOTHACHE

When a tooth aches the trouble is usually due to an infection around the root, inflammation of the gums, or a cavity which leaves the nerves exposed. These are the facts in the case, actually discovered only in the last century.

Because the people of an earlier day did not know the cause of toothache, they developed all sorts of superstitions as to their causes. It was thought that one could be exposed to the Evil Eye with a resultant toothache. There were supposed to be special gods who presided over the teeth and who caused them to ache as a means of revenge or to command respect.

It must be remembered that Pharaoh was punished according to the Biblical text by being afflicted with the plagues.

In order to appease the gods who caused toothache, all sorts of gifts were taken to the shrines and there deposited. It is not reported, however, that the gods were especially successful in curing toothaches.

Among many people it was believed that toothache was caused by a demon that was identified with a worm. The worm, it was thought, got into the gum and irritated the tooth. Writings as late as the middle of the eighteenth century discussed the possibility of finding these worms. When the famous founder of microscopy, Leeuwenhoek, discovered the wrigglers and germs of various kinds in the tartar scraped from between the teeth in 1683, it was believed that he had verified this fact.

In many European countries today, uneducated people still think that a worm is the cause. The reason probably is that a tooth which was pulled had some of the pulp hanging at the end and this has a worm-like appearance.

Raskob Blamed By Sen. Robinson For Break In Market

Republican Solon Charged With Playing Politics After Playing Democratic National Chairman

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1. (AP)—Placing a share of the blame for America's orgy of stock speculation on the public statements of Chairman John D. Raskob, of the democratic national committee, Senator Robinson, republican, Indiana, no sooner con-

cluded an address than he was called to task in the senate today, Senator Robinson, democrat, Mississippi, accusing him of "playing politics" with the nation's "delicate economic situation."

Robinson spoke in reply to the public statement Wednesday by Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, democratic leader. The Arkansasian had attributed the stock market situation to the "unduly and repeated" prosperity statements of President Hoover, Calvin Coolidge and Secretary Mellon.

Hoover Not Responsible
The Indiana republican asserted the president, former president and the secretary of the treasury were "no more responsible" for the stock market condition "than the man in the moon."

He described Raskob as a stock

market "plunger" and quoted from printed articles of the democratic chairman which he said "encouraged Americans everywhere" to buy stocks.

"What has Raskob to do with this situation?" retorted Senator Harrison.

Advantage Sought
"The senator thinks he can get a political advantage by accusing Raskob of being a great speculator. The whole situation in America is of such delicate tincture it seems to me we could employ our talents to better advantage at this critical time than by criticizing this or that individual."

Both Harrison and Robinson expressed confidence in the economic soundness of the nation and in the ability of financial leaders to right the present situation.

Cause Unknown
Harrison contended no one could name the cause for the stock market collapse and added "I don't propose to do anything by vote or expression, that will retard in the restoration of economic stability."

Abstention Urged In W.C.T.U. Plea

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex., Nov. 1. (AP)—Resolutions urging the people of Texas "to follow the example of president and Mrs. Hoover in abstaining from the use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage," and a recommendation that in elections next year the organization "work for the nomination and election of officials who live dry and vote dry," were adopted by the State Women's Christian Temperance union at the concluding session here today.

The organization also went on record condemning efforts to repeal the state enforcement codes, condemning the "attitude of a small section of the American bar who have deliberately organized to defend without charge men arrested for violation of the Jones-Stalker law," and pledged an educational campaign "for law observance and increased moral support from all the people."

Cotton Is Quiet Friday When Prices Fluctuate Within Range Of Eight Or Ten Points; Reactions Follow Rise

Offerings Light And Mart Steadies Under Buying After Southern Selling And Local Realizing

NEW YORK, Nov. 1. (AP)—Cotton was quiet today and prices fluctuated within a range of 8 or 10 points. Early advances on unfavorable features in the weather news were followed by reactions with January selling off from 18.06 to 18.00 and closing at 18.02. The general market closed steady, net unchanged to 2 points lower.

The opening was steady at an advance of 2 points to a decline of 2 points. A little buying on relatively steady Liverpool cables and unfavorable weather reports, appeared to be supplied by some piled by some southern selling and local realizing at the start. The offerings were light, however, and the market soon steadied up on buying accompanied by reports that there were trade buying orders in the market slightly below prevailing prices.

December contracts sold up to 17.86 and March 18.37, making net gains of about 5 to 7 points, but the demand tapered off at these figures and the market was very quiet later in the day with prices sagging under a little realizing and Southern selling.

Heading was very little in evidence except for some selling at the opening and again at the close when it became somewhat more active and seemed largely responsible for the decline to 17.89 for October and 18.30 for March. That prices were 3 point or two up from the lowest on the water and early spring months.

Securities Closed

With New York securities closed and with holidays in New Orleans and Havre, trading locally was restricted and traders seemed to be waiting for further developments with some uncertainty expressed as to the showing of approaching ginning and crop figures.

Visible Supplies Of Wheat Likely To Break Records

Elevator Wheat On Cheaper Basis Than New Arrivals; Export In Breadstuffs Continues On Big Scale

BY JOHN F. BOUGHAN, (Associated Press Market Editor.) CHICAGO, Nov. 1. (AP)—Prospects that record breaking big visible supplies of wheat in this country will commence to be dwarfed next week helped to enhance wheat values today. It appears that domestic mills have started to draw in earnest on terminal elevator stocks, and that elevator wheat which has been the market for many weeks is now on a cheaper basis than fresh arrivals. Furthermore, export business in breadstuffs from North America continued today on a large scale.

Closing quotations for wheat were unsettled 5-8 to 1-1-8 cents higher than yesterday's finish. Corn closed 3-8 to 3-4 cents down, oats unchanged to 1-8 to 1-4 cents and provisions showing 5c to 2c to 2-1/2c advance.

Large amounts of wheat were exported today. The 1935 probable yield of corn is about 43,000,000 bushels in excess of the government forecast a month ago. Oats sympathized with corn weakness.

Behind The Scenes As Stock Mart Prices Crashed In Near Panic

Feverish Activity Of Wall Street Shown By NEA Writer

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—At the entrance of the New York Stock Exchange, Jake—the carnation man who decorates the buttonholes of a thousand Wall Street traders—contemplated sadly his stock of left-overs.

Generally he is sold out before noon, and about 80 per cent of the lapsels on "the floor" are decorated with a bright posy. Now one could count the boutonnières. Thus, even before entering the squat grey building, one of the sinister off-stage notes could be found in the brusque manner with which most everyone brushed by. In their terrific haste they were forgetting completely a custom which raised Jake from the status of a shine-boy to that of an affluent flower merchant. Everyone was too busy to think of traditions.

For it was a typical day during the worst of the great stock slump. And the scene therein is one which is denied even to the eyes of the New Yorker. The average man who has been hit or missed by the costly break has little conception of the changes which have come into "the market" since it grew from a million-share-a-day institution into an arena which found something like eight-million shares dumping into its lap.

Curious Are Barred
To begin with, the ominous note reflected at the doorway was repeated by the super-caution of the array of guards sprinkled through the hallways. The visitors' gallery was empty. The order had gone forth that in these trying days the usual curious ones were to be barred. Where usually 50 or more persons look on, now only a guard wandered back and forth.

As he paced restlessly by, the giant tape which crawls across a huge glass cage registered a few stock symbols and a few numerals.

"There goes \$39,000,000," said the attendant. The tape slowly continued its revolutions. A few more millions wiped out—and then a few more. Before night it would record losses into the billions.

With such financial disaster in the air, one would expect to find some sign of panic upon the floor. Thanks to the movies and certain fictions, there is a notion that traders tear off their ties and their shirts and become slightly mad. Such things may have happened. But not at a time when calls are coming in faster than they can be filled and when the ticker is hours behind itself. Then the "carnation" becomes a fluttering world of notebooks with a very army of men scribbling at fever heat.

To Eeny For Emotions
They do not like to tear off calls or to be in the air. They are too busy making the changes and keeping in touch with the brokerage firms they represent.

It requires something like 1,100 securities to help them in this task. Of these, 700 are pace boys and 300 are phone boys. The phone boys stick to a series of parallel shushy-heels, like booths in a drug store. The pages wear uniforms with symbols on their sleeves—for there are quotation boys, squad boys, tube boys and floor reporters. They are the go-between for the hectic figures which fairly jam the vast space.

When they are wanted, signals flash on in the form of huge numbers on a giant board. Each man on the floor has his own signal.

If he decides to leave for a quick smoke, the trader leaves a boy to watch for his call number.

Expensive Smoking
There is a rule against smoking on the floor. The fine is \$25. But such has been the nerve strain that some gladly pay the money for the privilege of a cigarette. One member, who most meticulously follows the rule in ordinary times, so forgot himself that he had spent \$225 in fines in a single morning. To give proper air to the vast throng ozone is now pumped in by means of a mechanical process.

It is now necessary for a "boy" to memorize scores of new numbers and be able to take an examination on them—due to the large number of "32 brokers" that have dropped up in the last year. A "32 broker" is the

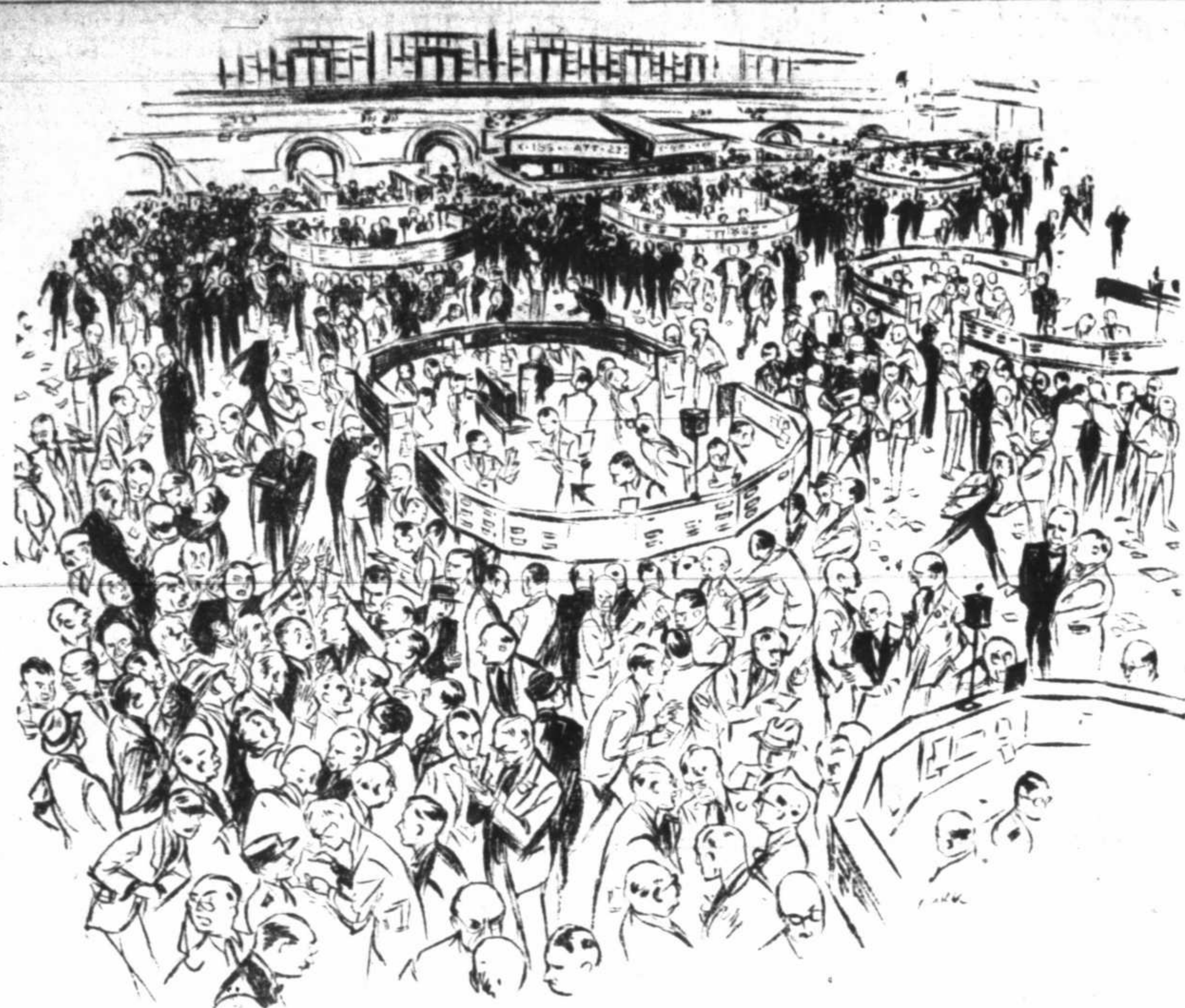
