Absentee Voting For Gen. Election

Urge Screwworm Program Continue

Program to eradicate screwworms from the southwest is underway. Efforts are made to reduce the screwworm population thru the release of sterile flies. In areas where the flies have been released it has proved successful and has helped to control the screwworm population here.

Efforts have been only partially successful, due to the lack of funds. In order to continue the work it is necessary that more donations be made, according to vocational agriculture teachers and county agents.

Anyone having screwworms are urged to contact the local ag teacher, where facilities are available to take samples for identification with other recommendations to follow.

TALCO TROJANS STUN HONEY GROVE BY 28 TO 14 VICTORY

The Talco Trojans, staging another last half brilliant offensive and defensive show of ability, came from behind 8 to 0 to score four touchdowns—two in each quarter—to defeat Honey Grove 28-14 Friday night at Honey Grove.

For the second straight Friday night Sidney Bonds, halfback, got the Trojans rolling by returning another punt for 55 yards to pay dirt. This could become a habit of Bonds, as he has the speed to break loose at any time, along with a fine group of offensive players leading the way before him.

The first quarter opened with Talco receiving and immediately they started to move the ball. At the 29 yard line however, they fumbled and Honey Grove took over, but they were forced to punt and Bonds took the punt and raced 60 yards before being tackled down on the 20 yard line. On Tries by Bonds and Jackie Dixon the Trojans moved to the 3. They then were set back to the 11 and bogged down back on the 3 yard line.

Honey Grove Warriors again could not move the ball and had to punt out deep in Trojan territory. The first quarter ended with the Trojans in possession of the ball, which they had been for nearly 90% of the time.

Early in the second quarter the Warriors took the ball on the Trojan 20 yard stripe and proceeded to drive all the way to the goal line with Mac O'Dea making the final yard for the first TD of the night. The extra point try was good and the Warriors led 8 to 0, much to the surprise of Trojan followers.

Both teams now bogged down and the scoreboard read 8 for Honey Grove, 0 for Talco as the first half ended.

After a somewhat sleepy first half for the Trojans, they awoke and stopped Honey Grove on their first attempt to move after Talco kicked off to start the last half. Nelson, the Trojan quar-

terback, received the punt by Honey Grove on the 45 yard line and handed off to Bonds and he was off for the goal line for a 55 yard scamper after picking some fine blocks. Extra point try failed and the score was 8 to 6. But this run seemed to spark the Talco eleven and a few plays later Ronnie Nelson received another punt. This time keeping the ball, he nearly duplicated Bonds' jaunt, but was tackled on the 10 yard line. A penalty set the ball back to the 25 and from here Nelson passed to Bonds in the end zone for the TD. Power running fullback Rodney Russell went thru the line for the 2 point try and Talco was on their way to victory, now leading 14 to 8 at the close of the third quarter.

Starting on their own 30 early in the fourth quarter, Talco started moving for another touchdown, and 14 plays later Ronnie Nelson, on a quarterback keeper, went over from the 8. Russell again added the extra points to make the score 22 to 8.

Honey Grove, now seeming to be determined to score again advanced to the 10 yard line after a 45 yard pass play from Ivy to Ricky Glover. Ivy now passed again into the end zone and Talco's Nelson batted the pass down, but Johnny Underwood made a diving catch of the falling ball and the Warriors had scored again. Points try was stopped and the game was 22 to 15 in favor of the Trojans.

Now after nice runs by the Trojan backfield, the ball was carried to the 10 and Russell, on a power run up the middle and carrying a few tacklers with him, scored the final Trojan TD and the game ended 28 to 14 in favor of Coach Jack Allen's Trojans.

Austin. — Texas doctors are about to open a campaign for legislative approval of a constitutional amendment bringing Texas under the Kerr-Mills program.

Through it the Federal and State governments would jointly pay hospital and medical bills of all retired persons receiving less than \$1,800 a year and unable to qualify for old age assistance. Uncle Sam would pay 75 per cent; the State, 25 per cent.

Doctors believe there are 350,000 Texans over 65 who would be eligible.

Idea developed at a meeting between State Welfare Director John Winters, Texas Medical Association committees, insurance agents and insurance company representatives. Plan would be to handle the proposition thru an insurance company, as the medicare program for old age assistance now is done. This would amount to an insurance premium of \$3,000,000 a month, based on the \$8.68 now paid Blue Cross for each of the 222,000 on old age assistance.

HIGHER EDUCATION—Texas Commission on Higher Education heard presidents or other spokesmen for 20 State colleges and universities voice objections to proposed cuts in their budget requests for 1964-65. As a result, the Commission will reconsider its recommendations at a meeting on October 23.

Three doctoral programs in teacher education were approved for the University of Houston, which will become a senior college next year. Four graduate programs were approved for East Texas State College.

Rex Baker, Commission secretary, opposed this latter action on grounds that it went against policy of concentrating such programs in the University of Texas and A&M College. Dispersal of such programs, Baker said, would lead to general mediocrity.

Commission member Elizabeth Koch's reply was that they were necessary to attract teachers of eminence.

CREDIT LIFE INSURANCE—Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler

says buyers in the state's \$200,000,000 Veterans' Land Program are signing up for credit life insurance arranged by the Veterans' Land Board.

The Board, of which Sadler is chairman, secured terms of \$5.76 per thousand dollars of outstanding principal. Same terms and conditions to age 65 apply to future purchasers, as well as the 28,000 who already have acquired tracts.

SPECIAL EVENTS LISTED—A total of 407 events of general public interest are listed in a new 16 page booklet just released by the Texas Highway Department. Texas Calendar of Events is the title of the booklet.

More than half of the activities recorded are in the fine arts field. Included are concerts, ballets, operas and stage productions.

Also mentioned, however, are such gala festivals as El Paso's Southwestern Sun Carnival, Tyler's Rose Festival, Edinburg's Pan American Bronco Days, Mission's Citrus Fiesta, and Brownsville's Charro Days.

EARLY BALLOTING—With absentee voting at hand (Oct. 17) comes the realization that the Nov. 6th General Election is almost here. Little enthusiasm has been stirred by either the Democratic or Republican candidates.

Capitol observers predict a tight vote. That, they feel, would be to the advantage of the Republican candidates since it is conceded that the anti-administration voters will go to the polls en masse.

NOSE COUNTING—Population in fast-growing Texas will increase 2,150,000 by 1970. Texas Research League predicts 11,800,000 people for Texas by the end of the present decade. The 1960 census showed the state's population as 9,650,000.

By 1985 Texas' population will have soared by 16,000,000. Most explosive trend, says the League, will be the rise in the college-age group—expected to rise 53.4 per cent.

SALES TAX INCOME LOW—Texas' limited retail sales tax law, passed by the 57th Legisla-

ture, accounted for only 10.31 per cent of the state's revenue during the fiscal year ended Aug. 31. So reports Robert S. Calvert, State Comptroller.

During this first-year period it produced a total of \$14,660,600.57, to rank fourth in the major income sources of the State.

STORMS ABREWING?—That same quietness that precedes a storm seems to hang over the State Capitol. It's a physical as well as a spiritual calmness.

Capitol observers have sensed it now for several weeks.

Could be due to the upcoming elections and the resulting change in the Administration. Or the coming session of the Legislature. Or to an outbreak of news from an unexpected source.

Time will tell!
THREE POLIO CASES—State Health Department advises that three new cases of polio were reported during the first week of October.

A total of 223 cases, 169 paralytic and 54 non-paralytic, have been recorded so far this year.

SLANT WELL SUITS—Assistant Attorney General Linward Shivers reports that between 50 and 150 penalty suits for slant well drilling will be filed in the near future.

Shivers, who has headed the investigation, says he will file separate suits on each violation, where an illegally slanted well is found. Law provides penalties up to \$1,000 a day for each day of violation.

SHORT SNORTS
Texas Supreme Court has refused to issue a court order requiring a district judge to cancel an October 30 election contest in Starr County.

General revenue fund deficit is \$41,250,349—up \$19,300,000 from the last call—according to State Treasurer Jesse James.

State Textbook Committee has declined to recommend adoption of any new economics textbooks for use in Texas high schools.

Eight applications for permits to sell \$2,766,590 in securities in Texas were filed with the State Banking Commission the past week.
