PARENT OF SIX CHILDREN FINDS PROBLEMS' SOLUTIONS IN DR. MYERS' ADVICE
"Dear Dr. Myers: Your daily articles seem to have been written just for me. The mother of six children, ranging in age from two to thirteen, I have many problems and so often I've been troubled to know just how to deal with a difficulty, only to find it answered for me in your column."

"The other evening was an exception, though, for I read your advice about the hours of study for home work. I have a practice that has proven a boon. No night work, all in bed at 7:30 and any studies are done bright and early the next morning. It's a sure cure. Another little plan we girls have in the washing of dishes. I do all the dishes except for the evening meal; they leave for school in a quiet, happy mood, and in the evening I am fancy free. Instead of the old fretful dishwashing period, they actually seem to enjoy being together. The little boys beg to carry the trays of dishes to their places, and even baby carries dishes over to the sink and away again."

"I do hope you may continue your excellent articles for years to come. I told my sister, who has one child of six, and apparently more problems than myself to solve, to find consolation in your advice. She's a devoted reader now and has a better understanding, she claims."

Answer: I want to thank you for your encouraging letter and the description of your ingenious scheme that seems to work; which goes to show that there are many ways of getting good results.

Unless you object, I am going to print your letter sometime in the future, in my column, without your signature.

Her reply: "Certainly you may publish my letter, and I do hope some little family may benefit by my idea, as I have by your column. Modified Judgment Given Turman Case

FORT WORTH, Dec. 29 (AP)—A modified judgment granting Mrs. Bert Turman a divorce from her husband, L. C. Turman, wealthy oil man, allowing her custody of their two minor children, and awarding her a judgment for \$333,000 and half of the community property was entered in district court by Judge Frank P. Culver, Jr. Saturday.

Rufus Garrett, attorney for Turman, immediately gave notice of appeal. The written order modifies to an extent the oral judgment given by Judge Culver a few weeks ago and overrules a motion for hearing filed by Turman since that time.

Although Mrs. Turman was granted permanent custody of the children, they will remain with their father during June, July and August, under the order of the court. Turman likewise is granted permission to keep them during two Saturdays and Sundays of each month, and will be allowed to visit them at "reasonable times." The last privilege was conditioned upon his furnishing a \$25,000 bond payable to Mrs. Turman.

Naval fliers warned on acrobatic flying.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29 (AP)—Naval aviators were warned today to confine their acrobatic maneuvers to altitudes above 1,500 feet.

David B. Ingalls, assistant secretary of the navy for air, wrote to all naval stations insisting that existing orders for safe flying be enforced. These provide that acrobatic maneuvers must be completed and normal flight resumed at not less than 1,500 feet altitude.

There are no exceptions to the order, he said.

Miss Martha Berry Devotes Life to Helping People

MT. BERRY, Ga., Dec. 12.—Modern women think that there is a new problem of marriage versus a career. They think that only these days of feminine freedom could bring about such a dilemma.

But 30 years ago this problem confronted a young southern girl, Miss Martha Berry, founder of the Berry Schools in Mt. Berry, Ga.—schools which today number a hundred buildings, teach 1000 southern mountain people each year, and have 8000 graduates all over the nation.

These schools are the result of Miss Berry's dilemma.

Back in 1900, Martha Berry was a young girl in Rome, Ga., the daughter of a wealthy cotton grower. She was brought up in luxury, educated by private tutor and finishing school. She was trained in the southern tradition that women should lead a sheltered life, should marry and bear children.

But driving leisurely home from church one Sunday, Martha Berry stopped her horse to greet three mountain boys. They were dirty, barefoot, ragged. She offered them lunch, but they merely a kindly impulse, but on it dangled the whole thread of her destiny.

She made conversation with the boys. Where did they go to school? They didn't. How about Sunday School? They had never heard of that.

Though these mountain people were of purest Anglo-Saxon stock, of aristocratic ancestry, they now lived, ignorant and isolated, in their mountain shanties. Martha Berry knew that, but now, suddenly in contact with such ignorance, she was moved.

"How would you like to stop at my home and hear some Bible stories?" she asked the boys.

Her classes grew. They loved it. The next Sunday they had two little sisters in tow. Martha looked at their dirty hands and faces and handed them a wash basin. She got out an old botanical microscope and focussed it on a drop of the dirty water.

"Why, that's bug in it," said one boy in astonishment.

Martha explained about germs and cleanliness. The Sunday School class proceeded. Next Sunday there were ten pupils. The following week a whole train of horses; parents had come too for the Sunday lady's stories.

None of her family took Martha Berry's classes seriously. But she had chosen a career. From her father she had inherited a 6000-acre tract of woodland. On this, with her own money, she built a one-room school house. In six months she had added two additions. In two years, at the pleading of other mountain people too far away to come, Martha had established four day schools at various points. Her sister Frances and a friend, Elizabeth Brewster, agreed to help.

Signed Over Her Land. But there always were other children who lived too far from any of the day schools. So Martha began to burn her bridges. She went to her family lawyer to deed over her woodland tract to the Berry Schools. She was going to build a dormitory with her own capital. The lawyer was aghast.

"Think what you're doing, Martha. Ruining your future. Tying yourself up for life."

That was exactly Martha's intention. A career rather than marriage. Her dormitory accommodated twelve boys whose parents reluctantly consented to let them live there. They were to pay their board by doing all the work, gardening, housework, everything. The boys began eagerly. The fame of the Sunday Lady spread throughout the mountains. Children began to come to school. And her school was full. Martha had no more money.

She decided to go to New York, the home of wealth. After a week she had received only \$51. Then came a letter from a man in Wall Street.

"And what," he said, when she had told her story, "is your salary?"

"Nothing," she said. "I shall be paid by the results of my work."

Won His Cooperation. "You asked for \$50," the man said. "Here's a check. And each year there will be another."

The check was for \$500. Martha knew that her school could go on.

That was in 1902, and many times since Miss Berry has faced the same problem. The needs of her school outgrowing its facilities.

Like all successful careers, hers has been a constant battle. But each time she has won, until now there are three boarding schools—Mount Berry School for Boys, The Martha Berry School for Girls, and Berry Junior College. The hundred buildings nearly all have been built by student labor. The ten miles of streets in the campus and farms were paved by the boys. The students grow all their own food. There is a large stock farm—started many years ago by the boy who brought a team of oxen as tuition.

The schools are industrial, educational, spiritual. And some of the 8000 graduates now have schools of their own.

CO-OP ACTION IN MARKETS DEFENDED

LETTER TO McNARY IS EXPLANATION OF BOARD'S WORK

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—Defending its operations in the cotton and grain futures markets, the farm board has written Chairman McNary of the senate agriculture committee, that they were necessary to prevent large financial losses and to avoid "seriously disturbing" market conditions.

The letter was a reply to congressional criticism of the board for allowing its agents to deal in futures and laid the ground work for defending the board's against attacks which may come after congressional reconvenes.

Meanwhile Senator Steiwer, Oregon, Republican, advocated a higher tariff on wheat, rather than imposition of a temporary embargo as suggested by Chairman Legge of the board.

"It is absolutely essential that adequate steps be taken at once to exclude imports of wheat," Steiwer said, "because the farm board has pegged the price and if the foreign market goes down to a point where we can import over the duty we would be buying Canadian wheat at the pegged price."

Seiwer said he feared an embargo on wheat would disturb our foreign relations and he saw no reason why the tariff commission should require much time to investigate the adequacy of the present 42 cent tariff.

Forced To Markets
The farm board letter to McNary said the wheat and cotton marketing associations had been forced to use the future markets because of the system which had been set up by private operators.

"The cooperative marketing associations in wheat and cotton are agencies set up by farmers to market their products in competition with private merchants," it said. "In order to compete for business on even terms, these cooperatives must be in position to give the same services and enjoy the same advantages as a private merchant."

Must Use Facilities
"To do this they have found it necessary to make use of existing marketing facilities, of which, under existing conditions, futures trading operations are an integral part."

"Resort to hedging operations, insofar as they find it possible and desirable to do so, greatly reduces their problem of financing their operations."

"In the past six months when wheat prices have been almost constantly declining, the Farmers National Grain corporation would have suffered disastrously heavy losses if it had not hedged its wheat supplies."

Is Essential
"The board has not deemed it wise to insist that cooperatives should abandon these practices; on the contrary, the board is of the opinion that, under present conditions, appropriate use of the futures market by the cooperatives is essential to their successful operation and is even a means of minimizing speculation."

The letter said the only alternative to operating in the futures market would be for the stabilization corporation to "assume the burden of a much greater portion of the market supply." It pointed out, however, "this might easily result in tying up, in grain operations alone, an amount exceeding the entire revolving fund authorized by the agricultural marketing act."
