

Governor Orders Rangers To Motley County Seat Water Rights Issue Defies Solution By Committee

Delegates Again Deadlock In Meet Held on Thursday

Solution of Difficulties Had
Been Expected But Op-
posing Elements Could
Not Agree.

KEMP IS OPTIMISTIC, YET HOPES FOR PEACE

Believes Further Facts On
Colorado River Water
May Point Way to Am-
icable Settlement.

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 1.—The all-
Texas water committee, contrary
to expectations, failed to reach an
agreement at the close of Thurs-
day of an all day meeting with
representatives of Hydro-Electric
power interests to discuss priority
rights in appropriating waters of
Texas rivers, chairman J. A. Kemp
of Wichita Falls announced after
adjournment.

The figures served to show that
the state board of water engineers
had granted to the syndicate power
company 1,200,000 acres feet of wa-
ter and to the Brownwood district
water for the irrigation of 25,000
acres. In addition there are other
large areas in the upper Colorado
basin which it is desired to irri-
gate. Consideration of the available
water showed that there was not
enough to meet all these demands, it
was stated.

The power interests estimate that
the economic development might
be made upon use of 50,000 acre
feet per year. It was then estimated
that enough water might be used
above the dams to irrigate at least
some acres of land and somewhat
in excess of this by more complete
impounding of flood waters. This
would permit the development of
25,000 acres of land at Brownwood,
and at least 45,000 at other loca-
tions. It was estimated that the
possibility considerably more with ex-
ceptionally complete storage of flood
waters, it was stated.

Chairman Kemp expressed hope
however that the further investiga-
tion of all the figures and facts
obtainable respecting the available
water supply of the Colorado river

GANDLAND'S AXIOM

"Dead Men Tell No Tales,"
Is Found to Be Rule

CHICAGO, Dec. 1. (AP)—That
"dead men tell no tales," is a gen-
eral axiom, the federal government
discovered when it indicted two of
the seventy odd persons arrested in
a prohibition, round up at Cicero a
year ago to testify against the others.

The two, Santo Celebreon and
John Castoreno, had agreed to ap-
pear as prosecution witnesses, their
attorney today told Judge James
H. Wilkinson of United States dis-
trict court. They did not do so be-
cause they were killed a week be-
fore the trial last April.

Temperature Is 16 In City Early Thursday Morn

Forecast of Generally Fair
For Today and Tomorrow
Is Given; Leaky Radi-
ators Tell of Freeze.

A forecast of "generally fair" for
Friday and Saturday indicated a
rising temperature for Lubbock
and the South Plains after the
thermometer had sunk yesterday
morning early to the lowest point
of the season, 16 degrees, accord-
ing to reports from the agricultural
experiment station.

The maximum yesterday was 48.
Ice was found in abundance.

PLAN CUT ON RADIOS

300 Stations May Be Left
Off List Next Year

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1. (AP)—A
wholesale eliminating of radio sta-
tions which may reduce their num-
ber by half during 1928, is con-
templated by the federal radio com-
mission.

In an announcement today upon
new policy the commission de-
clared its determination to deny li-
censes after February 1, to a large
number of stations. In an endeavor
to clear up the broadcasting situa-
tion and explained why it considered
such action advisable.

"Individual members of the com-
mission have, from the very first,
realized that the elimination of some
radio broadcasters was eventually the
only real solution for the present
overloading of the air channels," the
commission's statement said.

WOMAN ACQUITTED

Mrs. Lela Stepps Freed On
Charge Slaying Husband

CENTER, Tex., Dec. 1. (AP)—Mrs.
Lela Stepps was acquitted here
today of the murder of her husband
Aaron Stepps, a sawmill worker,
who was killed at Haslam, Texas,
on February 15, last.

The jury deliberated less than
an hour before it returned with the
verdict of not guilty which resulted
in freedom for the attractive moth-
er of two small children.

Mrs. Stepps, at the time of the
shooting, was keeping house for
Will Dickinson a widower, with
five small children. Both Mrs.
Stepps and Dickinson denied, on
the witness stand, that they had
been intimate.

League Begins On Efforts to Secure Arms Limitation

Warning Against Regional
Pacts Is Issued at First
Session of Preparatory
Disarmament Board.

(By Associated Press)
GENEVA, Dec. 1.—Before an
audience of two mighty non-mem-
ber nations—the United States and
Russia—the League of Nations to-
day began efforts to arrange in-
ternational affairs so that the war
lords will be driven out of business
for lack of customers.

The security committee of the
preparatory disarmament commis-
sion held first session today. It
was promptly warned by Joseph
Paul Boncour, chairman of the
French parliamentary commission
on national defenses and president
of the foreign relations committee
of the chamber of deputies, that re-
gional agreements are becoming a
menace to world peace because they
tend to introduce the pre-war sys-
tem of alliances.

Federal Reserve Directors Named

Nominees Dissident Bank-
ers Lose Out In Election;
Milam and Forest Those
Chosen.

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Dec. 1.—Joe H. Forest
of San Antonio, was elected chair-
man of the Federal Reserve
bank of Dallas, to succeed himself
and J. B. Milam, of Waco, was
elected a director to succeed Frank
Kell of Wichita Falls, it was an-
nounced tonight after a mail bal-
lot had been tabulated.

Mr. Forest and Mr. Milam will
qualify at the regular meeting of
the board of directors to be held
January 7, it was announced.

What effect, if any, the replace-
ment of Mr. Kell on the board will
have on the board's attitude to-
wards the tenure of Lynn P. Tal-
ley, as governor of the bank was
not apparent tonight.

Members of a group of dissat-
isfied West Texas bankers who crit-
icized the bank's cotton loan policy
had previously announced the in-
tention of electing two new direc-
tors to the board, in the hope of
ousting Governor Talley. Whether
they can effect a change on the
face of the election results will
probably not be known until the

NUMEROUS CITIES ARE AFTER 1928 CONCLAVE

Dawes Reiterates that He
Will Not Be Candidate
and Expresses Favor To
Frank O. Lowden.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—Accel-
erated by the policy session of the
republican committee to select a
convention city, politics came in for
its full share of attention today
with speculation divided as to
where the convention will be held
and the part to be taken by Pres-
ident Coolidge in next year's cam-
paign.

Leaders professed to see little
beyond a slight diversion of op-
inion. Many of the early arriving
committeemen expressed the hope
that the president would give a
clearer definition of his Black Hills
"do not choose" statement, it was
apparent that many were looking
for a statement from Mr. Coolidge
received by the committee at the
White House as an opportunity
to raise the uncertainty which
some of them believe is restricting
their activities.

Others however were of the
opinion that the president would
not elaborate on his position.
Dawes Not Candidate.

The reelection by Vice-President
Dawes at the White House today
that he is not a candidate for
president and favors Frank O.
Lowden, served as a basis for con-
siderable discussion, but while
various candidates were mentioned,
the disposition of the part of many
was to keep the field clear so long
as Mr. Coolidge is undisposed to
clarify his own position.

Defense Asks For Directed Verdict Of "Not Guilty" In Lilliendahl Case

Trial Appears Headed For Speedy Termination After
Tumultuous Scene In Court Session Thursday; Only
65 of 100 Witnesses Called Go On Stand

(By Associated Press)
MAYS LANDING, Dec. 1.—The
Lilliendahl murder trial moved
today toward a speedy conclusion after
a tumultuous scene just before
adjournment when a defense attor-
ney asked the court for a directed
verdict of "not guilty" and Mrs.
Lilliendahl broke down and sobbed
in court. The state's side of the case
against the widow and Willis
Beach, charged with the murder of
the woman's aged husband opens
Monday, and is expected to con-
tinue into next week.

Only 65 of the 100 witnesses the
state had said it would call had ap-
peared the stand when Prosecutor
Hinks suddenly turned to the judge
and said:

"The state rests."

The court room was thrown into
a buzz of excitement as all wit-
nesses expressed their relief or dis-
appointment and others bowed their
way out.

Robert H. McCarty, counsel for
Mrs. Lilliendahl, recalled one state
witness for two questions of cross-
examination and then made his
plea for a directed verdict. As he
delivered an impassioned argument
to sustain his motion Mrs. Lilliendahl
began to cry bitterly and then
her shoulders shook with convul-
sive sobs. Her 5-year-old son, Al-
fred, ran to her side and as she
embraced him, fervently, he also
wept.

Soon after Justice Campbell de-
clined the motion for a directed ver-
dict, motive and sanity gained con-
trol of themselves. The boy ran
back to the spectators seat where

FLOODS IN NEW YORK Heavy Rains Send Rivers Raging In North State

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 1. (AP)—The
western half of New York state
tonight watched with apprehension
the gradual encroachment of flood
waters from scores of streams and
lakes upon the settled communities
and farm lands lining their banks.
With one death indirectly attrib-
uted to the flood, many families
temporarily homeless and facing
hardships with the prospect of
colder weather, transportation fa-
cilities badly crippled and the im-
pact of the rise noticed in some places
widely separated communities were
bending every effort to check dis-
astrous flood such, as a month ago,
spread over Vermont and New
Hampshire.

Remus Angry, Not Insane in 'Spells' Prosecution Says

Seek to Disprove Defense
Contention that ex-Booze
King Was a Victim Of
Transitory Mania.

(By Associated Press)
CINCINNATI, O., Dec. 1.—The
prosecution in George Remus' trial
today set about proving that the
outbursts of the defendant which
nearly a score of witnesses had
testified indicated insanity were
nothing more than fits of anger
common to him long before he had
heard anything concerning the al-
leged misconduct of the wife he
killed.

Willie H. Haar, Savannah, Ga.,
former bootlegger, who served a
sentence in the Atlanta federal peni-
tentiary at the same time Remus
was sent there for violating the
prohibition law was in the witness
box as a defense witness.

"Didn't Remus get very mad when
the prisoners in the Atlanta peni-
tentiary would cry out 'who ate
the cheese' and answer themselves
with 'Remus the rat'?" asked Carl
E. Basler, assistant prosecutor on
cross examination.

The defense objected strenuously
Charles H. Elston, co-counsel with
Remus, asserting that the only pur-
pose of such an interrogation was
to prejudice the jury or cause
it to feel toward Remus.

"We want simply to show these
spells of temper were anger and
not insanity," Basler told the court.
"We want to show that Remus had
them long before anything came up
about Mrs. Remus."

Attacked Basler

Remus who had sat quietly all
day hounded to his feet with an
attack on Basler.

"There was not a prisoner down
there large or powerful enough to
attack me," he said.

SEEK TEXAS ROBBER

Roads Guarded As Net Is
Spread for Thug

WRITS OF Habeas Corpus Sought In Effort to Free Two of Six Held In The County Jail Here.

PORT WORTH, Dec. 1. (AP)—
Every highway leading out of Port
Worth was closely guarded to-
night while police and plainclothes-
men were combing the cheaper ho-
tels and rooming houses of the
city in an effort to find the young
man who shortly before noon to-
day slugged, kidnapped and robbed
Gus Shaw, member of the firm of
Shaw Brothers creamery company
of \$1,500.

Shaw stepped into his automo-
bile, parked in front of his plant at
11:30 o'clock this morning to carry
the receipts of the firm to his bank
as he was driving off, according
to police reports of eye witnesses,
a young man waved to him.

Dispatches from Austin to the
writs of habeas corpus for two of
the six men held in the Lubbock
county jail in connection with the
recent slaying at Flomot, Motley
county, of Constable Lee Staggall,
were developments in this murder
case last night.

Questioning of the six men held
here in connection with the affair
continued fruitless, no statement of
consequence having been secured
up to last night.

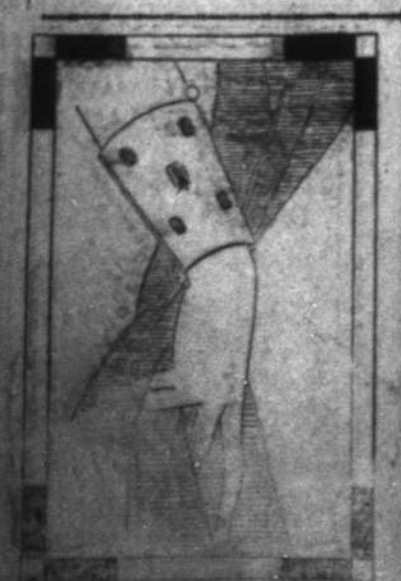

At a meeting of a western medical association, occasion was taken by one of the members to denounce the use of certain cosmetics as harmful. Chief among these were hair dyes.

Now there are innumerable people who dye their hair because they wish to escape that first significant betrayal of the loss of youth. Hundreds of persons have used advertised dyes successfully, but they do not rush into print and tell all their friends of their success.

Of course not. They do not even wish it to be known that they dye their hair. So you never hear of those cases. But now and then someone buys a dangerous article, does not follow directions, develops a skin trouble as a result, and lo, a great howl goes up from her and her friends.

As a matter of fact, most hair dyes, if they are effective at all, are composed of ingredients that are more or less dangerous, particularly if they are not applied just in the right manner. If the hair could be removed from contact with the scalp, nicely dyed, and then replaced on the head, all would be well. But this, unfortunately, cannot be done.

Since the manufacturers do not wish to take the world into their confidence as to the composition of their preparations for tinting the hair, they do not print the ingredients on the label. And even if they did, the average buyer would not be any the wiser. So he is decidedly in the dark, with respect to his purchase.

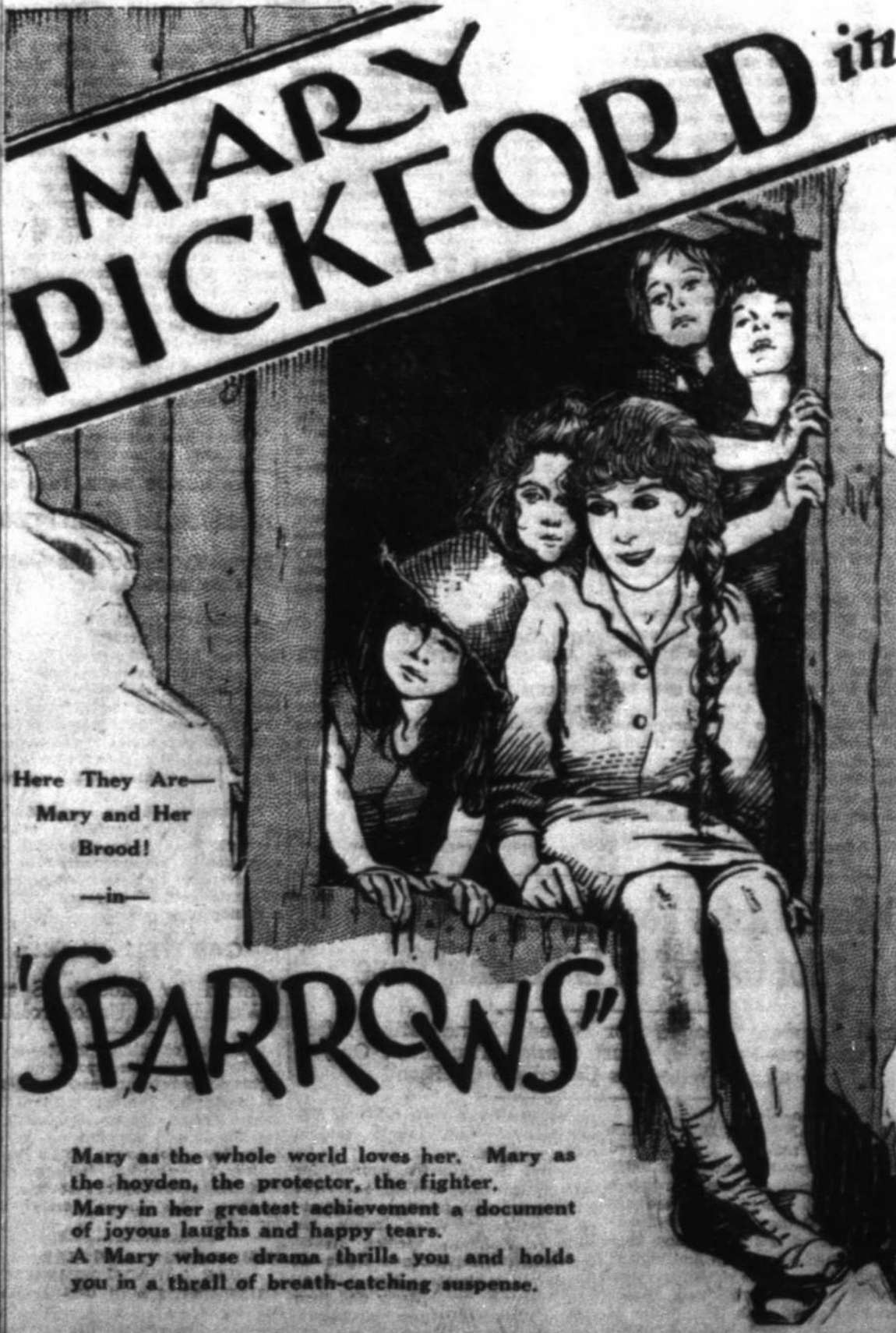

NEW ORLEANS COTTON.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 1. (AP)—Unfavorable weather, better demand for spots and cessation of liquidation caused the cotton market to advance 10 to 15 points here today. Liverpool cables were irregular and first trades here were two points down to three up. The market eased off 2 to 3 points right after the start, but soon rallied and at the end of the first hour January was trading 19.28 and May 19.63, 8 to 10 points up from the early lows.

The market continued to gain gradually until the close but speculative buying was held in check by fear of large shipments. All months made high near the end with January at 19.36 and May 19.72. The close was steady at or near the highs.

March opened at 19.36 and advanced to 19.56 in the late trading and closed at 19.56. Exports were 167,747 bales.

URGE INSURANCE

Time for Sharing In Paid Up Policies Expires Soon

HOUSTON, Dec. 1. (AP)—In a final effort to call the attention of ex-soldiers of the World War to their privilege of sharing in the U. S. Veterans adjusted compensation benefits in the form of paid up insurance policies, Major General John A. Hulen of Houston, commanding the Thirty-sixth Division, Texas National Guard, asks the public press to broadcast the fact that expiration of time for filing application occurs January 1, 1928.

In addition, national guard oficers, especially commanders of units, are requested to disseminate the same information to the men under them and in turn ask them to communicate the intelligence to those ex-service men known to them.

Plainview Seeks Large Creamery

Plant Costing \$20,000 Will Be Built by Hale County Dairy Assn.; Stock to Be Sold Members.

(Special To The Avalanche.) PLAINVIEW, Dec. 1.—A co-operative creamery owned by farmers is to be built in Hale county by the Hale County Dairy association which will cost from \$20,000 to \$25,000, and a series of meetings are being held in the county of the members of the organization at which stock subscriptions are being taken.

The Hale County Dairy association handles approximately quarter million dollars worth of dairy products annually which is estimated at practically one-half of the total product of the entire county. A. B. Duvvater, President of the association, heads a committee which has worked out a plan for the building of the co-operative manufacturing plant and that plan is being submitted to the 425 members of the association for their approval. The entire capital stock of the plant will be sold before a definite location is agreed upon.

K. C. S. HEAD QUILTS

J. A. Edson to Retire As President of Railroad

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 1. (AP)—The Kansas City Star today said J. A. Edson will retire as president of the Kansas City Southern railroad at the end of this month. The resignation, which the Star says was confirmed from New York will end a 22 year tenure in that office.

Pending action by the directors, probably Wednesday, the Star said, J. A. Edson, who is 72 years old, and A. M. Callahan, vice president and assistant to Mr. Edson, declined to discuss a probable successor.

CASE HERE AFFIRMED

First Murder Case Before Judge Pharr Upheld

The first murder case tried before Judge Homer L. Pharr, and the first one prosecuted by District Attorney Durwood Bradley received affirmation by the court of criminal appeals at Austin in proceedings held Wednesday.

Robert Lee Benton, alias Robert Stanley and son, Gibson, negro, were convicted of murder of B. E. (Bub) Morgan, prominent Dickens county farmer, last March 26, Benton was given death penalty and Gibson fifty years. The verdict and penalty of each was upheld by the court of criminal appeals.

Huge Irrigation Project Planned Near Eagle Pass

Bond Issue of Nearly Five Million Will Be Asked To Make Possible Watering Of 60,000 Acres.

(By Associated Press)
EAGLE PASS, Nov. 30.—An election has been called in Maverick County Water Improvement District No. 1, to be held December 19, to vote on a bond issue of \$4,800,000 with which to construct a gravity irrigation project for 60,000 acres of land.

The district has a permit from the State Board of Water Engineers to take 150,000 acre feet of water from the Rio Grande river, and the survey and all preliminary arrangements have been made.

It is proposed to take the water from the river through a canal which would have a nine inch fall of the mile through the length of the land running parallel with the river from one to three or four miles from the stream. At the place on the stream at which the headgate would be located river bank furnishes a high solid rock foundation which would bring the water out of the stream without any pumping facilities, and engineers said they would have a surplus fall of three inches, six inches being sufficient to carry the water through the full length of the canal.

A concrete-lined spill way is planned to be put in the canal a mile below the headgate which would carry the surplus water back into the river. There also would be gates with which overflows could be shut out. The bottom of the canal would be turned back into the river by which the canal would have five water at all times.

The lands of the district, which are now chiefly occupied with big cattle ranches, could be cut up into 40 acre farms, according to present plans, with a water gate on each farm, and sold to farmers who would improve and cultivate them.

'Golden Rule' Day Plan for Churches

American Families Will Give Donations for Near East Relief, December 4; 2000 Churches Included.

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Nov. 30.—Two thousand churches in Texas representing every city and town of size are completing arrangements to observe "Golden Rule Sunday," December 4.

"Golden Rule Sunday" is designated by the Near East Relief as the day on which American families are urged to remember the orphaned and starving disaster-stricken Bible lands.

The churches will participate in observance of the occasion by asking contributions and devoting part of the services to telling of the Near East Relief's work in training the orphans to be self supporting. The participating churches represent nearly all creeds.

Gov. Dan Moody is honorary chairman and Dr. Charles C. Stebbins of Dallas, active chairman of the state committee of Near East Relief. "Golden Rule Sunday" has been endorsed again this year by leaders of all religious faiths.

Having saved from starvation more than a million children, women and men, the philanthropic organization is now caring for 33,415 orphans, most of whom are not yet of teen age. Each child is fed at a cost of \$5 a month and a small additional sum takes care of his schooling in a practical trade. The three areas of operation are Greece and her islands, Armenia and Persia, Syria and Palestine.

Dairying Boomed In Dawson County

Campaign Is Fostered by Charles B. Martin, Farm Agent; Entries to Be Made in Tulsa.

LAMESA, Dec. 1.—Dairification of Dawson county is proposed by Charles B. Martin, county demonstration agent, in a campaign which has already reached significant proportions.

Two carloads of purebred Jersey—24 females and 5 males—have just been received. Previously 8 bulls had been brought in and enrolled in bull circles organized in the county. The latter shipment came from the celebrated E. G. Lassiter herd at Palfurrias, who said at time of shipment that it was the finest bunch ever consigned from there at one time. The females of the shipment descended from cows which have produced between 600 and 700 pounds of butter fat per season at the age of four years.

Since Martin came to the country a little over a year ago he has interested three men in Jersey breeding work—J. M. Peterson, "Doc" King and E. W. Hester. Next spring these men plan to put their herds on cow tests.

"My plan is to develop this industry as much as possible," Martin said. "We expect to demonstrate our resources and results with a carload of Jerseys at the spring show of Jerseys to be held at Plainview or Tulsa."

Martin is one of the organizers of the present Dawson County Fair Association whose first exposition held about three months ago proved a revelation here. He is now identified with the reorganization plans looking to a great annual fall fair here.

During the past year Martin was active in the campaign that brought 40 head of pure bred hogs into the country. It is now almost impossible to find a farm that has no hogs. A swine association was organized and hogs shipped co-operatively, the first car leaving Lamesa several weeks ago. Likewise Martin has been instrumental in the organization of horse clubs numbering 250 members. Moreover he was a promoter in the new Dawson County Co-operative Egg Marketing Association, which has enabled farmers to obtain the cream of prices for their product. Five thousand pounds of certified grain sorghum seed was brought in to improve the feed situation. Martin has been in Lamesa since May 22, 1926, coming from Keesee. His work has been thorough, accurate and progressive. The movements he has started are calculated to bring Dawson county quickly into special note in agricultural and livestock centers.

ECONOMISTS TO MEET

Texas University Educators Going To Washington

AUSTIN, Nov. 30.—Dr. J. Anderson Fitzgerald, dean of the school of business administration of the University of Texas, Dr. A. B. Cox, director of the bureau of business research; Dr. W. J. Reilly, associate professor of business administration; and Chester F. Lay, professor of accounting, are among the representatives from the University of Texas who will attend the group of business, economic and professional meetings to be held in Washington, D. C., December 27, 30.

About 16 groups, each independent national organizations for the furtherance of the interests of various phases of business, will meet concurrently in Washington at that time and will cooperate to a certain extent in some phases of the program and discussions, to be held throughout the week.

NORFLEET

The Manhunter's Own True Story

As told to Gordon Hines

Chapter Forty-seven

I had once asked Percy why he had not destroyed his contract with me, which was found in his deserted suit case at San Bernardino, and he replied that he had kept it to show to the boys at the school. He could have made their eyes stand out, he said by telling of how he had spied a Texas cowboy. 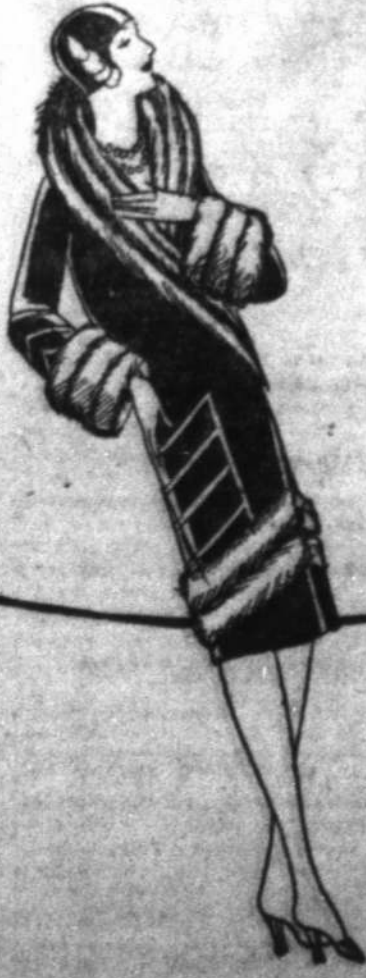
