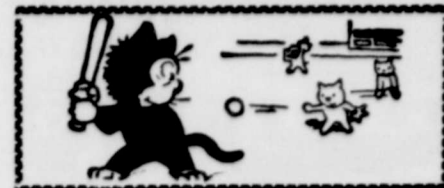

Carriers To Hand Out Survey Cards

Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman reminds rural patrons of the Burk Burnett Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey Cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," the Postmaster explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the areas livestock and poultry holdings."

Carrier assisting with the survey are Bill Jenkins, Route 1.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions, Zimmerman concludes.

Albert Reynolds Returns Home After Tour Of Duty Off Vietnam



Gunner's Mate Petty Officer Second Class Albert Reynolds has recently returned home after a seven-month tour of duty on board the destroyer U.S.S. Perkins (DD-877) off the coast of Vietnam. While serving as Mount Captain on one of the Perkins' three dual five-inch thirty-eight caliber gun mounts on 4 November, 1966, Petty Officer Reynolds promptly and expertly exercised positive control over his crew and guns to deliver rapid, continuous, and accurate gunfire upon North Vietnamese shore batteries

which had opened fire on the Perkins. For this action he has received a Commander-in-Chief United States Pacific Fleet Commendation Citation.

Petty Officer Reynolds has served aboard a fleet tug, and ammunition, rescue, and salvage ships during his Naval career. He has been on board men-of-war for the past three years.

Commenting on his citation, Petty Officer Reynolds said, "I am very proud to have been of service to my country."

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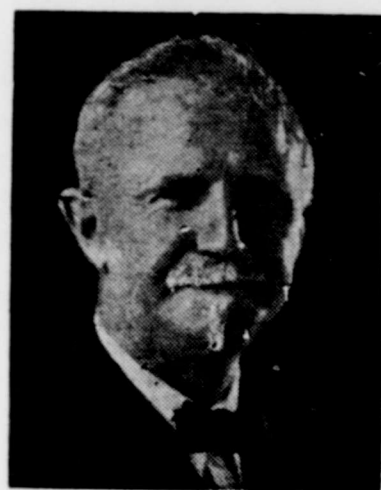

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OUTLAWING THE STATESEmpowering the federal government to regulate inter-
state commerce has proven to be an open door through
which federal authorities have moved to limit the sov-
ereign rights of the states.Further undermining of state authority resulted
from 1966 amendments to the Fair Labor Standards Act
extending federal minimum-wage standards to hundreds
of thousands of state and local employees of schools,
hospitals, nursing homes and institutions for the men-
tally or physically handicapped. This extension of fed-
eral control of state wage standards was made on the
grounds that state institutions concerned were involved
in interstate commerce through purchase of supplies
and equipment. Action has been brought by Maryland
and 25 other states to test the legality of this legislation.
The Attorney General of Texas has observed that, "If
hospitals and schools can be the subjects of regulation,
then the public health department, the police, the high-
way department, even the legislature (of a state) would
be subject to regulations at the whim of Congress."The question raised is the right of the states to
regulate the wages of their own employees. It is evi-
dent that if the theory that anyone who buys an article
that has been shipped across a state line is to be con-
sidered engaged in interstate commerce then it would be
well nigh impossible to find any organization, busi-
ness enterprise or individual not subject to federal reg-
ulation if some agency of government wished to im-
pose it.**CHANGES RECOMMENDED**Government monopoly in any field of enterprise is
no guarantee of good public service, and nowhere is the
truth of this more evident than in the postal department.
Another hike in postal rates is going to cost U. S. citi-
zens \$800 million a year, doubling, trebling, and quadru-
pling postal rates of but a few short years ago. The new
Zip Coding System may eventually speed the mails but
more likely will merely permit our postal system to
flounder along avoiding total collapse in a rising flood
of mail. Meanwhile postal patrons faced with another
major price increase have been arbitrarily forced to as-
sume a big share of the cost of the processing their own
mail. Postmaster General O'Brien suggests that a way
out of the problem might be to abolish the Post Office
Department as a Cabinet agency and convert it into a
non-profit government corporation in order to promote
efficiency and get rid of dead timber.Postal reforms may eventually be adopted, but at
present, the postal department has no regulatory authori-
ties to investigate its operation, and no competition
except in one branch of its operations — parcel post.
Here a publicly-regulated, taxpaying express company
competes for business with the tax-subsidized parcel post
system. That it has been successful in doing so simply
demonstrates again the soundness of the principle on
which the first express business was founded — service
and convenience to the shipper.The growth of express is based on its ability to
streamline its operations utilizing all forms of transport
to provide at minimum cost the most efficient and flexi-
ble handling of its customer's shipments. Greater sim-
plicity and economy for the shipper will continue to be
the result. This is in sharp contrast to the Post Of-
fice Department which offers its customers dubious ser-
vice, increasing complexity and higher cost on a take or
leave it basis.Safety experts report that driving at night is more
than twice as dangerous as driving during the day, says
"Today's Health," the magazine of the American Medi-
cal Association. In 1965, there were 10 persons killed for
every 100 million vehicle miles traveled in darkness —
four dead for every 100 million miles traveled in day-
light.Counterfeiting of U. S. currency reached an all-time
high in 1966. Recovery of counterfeit money and arrests
for counterfeiting were also at an all-time high. The
Secret Service recovered \$9 million in counterfeit cur-
rency last year. Only \$900,000 of this amount ever pass-

WHAT LIES AHEAD FOR
LIVING COSTS**Babson Park, Mass. — You'll
be paying 2.5% more for con-
sumer goods and services by
the end of this year than you
were at the beginning. That's
what the government econo-
mists predict, and it looks as
though they may be right on
the button. Or very, very close
to it. Here are some of the rea-
sons the forecast seems to be
logical, even if a trifle discour-
aging to the householder.**Recent Living-Cost
Slowdowns Temporary**Since last fall consumer prices
have been comparatively
stable, enough so to make the
Pollyannas hope that the buy-
ing power of their pocketbooks
might grow stronger. But most
of the slowdown has been due
to lower prices in certain foods
— such as eggs, fruits, vege-
tables, and pork. This has ten-
ded to offset to a fair degree the
basic increase in most other
prime goods and services. But
the cost of beef, milk, cheese,
etc., is on the way up, and it
won't be long before other
foods follow.Then the climb in over-all liv-
ing costs will be resumed. It
won't be a mad inflationary run-
away, but the advances will be
persistent and will involve just
about every item in the consum-
er price index. The value of
your dollar is going to be nick-
ed away during the rest of 1967,
and probably well beyond that.
Some "mods" among the Ad-
ministration will console you
with the claim that this gradu-
al price inflation will help to
keep business strong. But you
will feel it in the pocketbook;
that they can't deny.**Items Heading Upward**Along with foods, there will
be upward pressure on the price
of apparel, shoes, gasoline,
many household goods, and en-
tertainment. It will become
steadily more expensive to eat
out, even at restaurants thathave thus far sustained the
"bargain" image. It is going to
cost more for housing, whether
you rent or buy. The promise
of some softening in mortgage
interest rates will not be able
to balance out the continuing
hike in building costs, insur-
ance rates, and property taxes.While medical expenses are
not a regular family outlay,
they are bound to show up
when least expected and must
be considered as a part of
every budget. Over the past
twelve months medical costs
have skyrocketed over 8%, and
this may well be only a begin-
ning. Doctors will keep raising
their pay sights, while nurses
are organizing to ensure steady
gains as well as shorter hours.
Naturally, all this is going to
be passed along to the patients
needing hospital treatment.**Appliances, Autos—
Down Then Up**Cutbacks in residential build-
ing have slowed sales of color
TV and other household ap-
pliances, with resultant weaken-
ing of prices. It should be not-
ed, however, that housing
starts are once again on the
rise, and gentler mortgage in-
terest rates are making for
more optimism. As this trend
intensifies, prices of appliances
will be nudged upward again
in an effort to lessen the pro-
fits squeeze that has tormented
many companies.Lagging turnover in autos
has also placed downward pres-
sure on prices of both used
and new models. Dealers are
frantic to reduce their inven-
tories, even if it means sharp los-
ses for the time being. Until
fall this price sag will prevail,
but then will come the 1968
models that will be approxi-
mately \$100 more expensive than
those of 1967. Hence, autos will
add their strength to the gen-
eral climb in costs of all retail
goods and services.**Raises Will Push
Prices Up**So far, many concerns have
been covering their increases
in labor costs from their ear-
lier healthy profits. But outlays
for labor are still soaring to-
ward new highs, and many ma-
jor industries will have to give
wage boosts this year and
next. The result will be more
and more "passin' of the buck"
to the consumer in the form of
higher prices. So there is as
yet no end in sight for the
rise in living costs.every

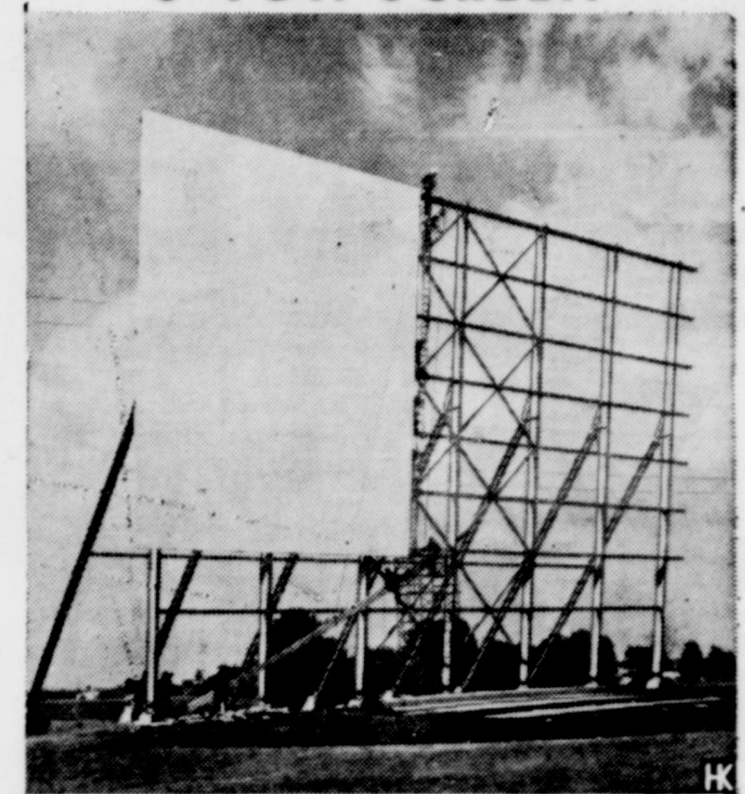

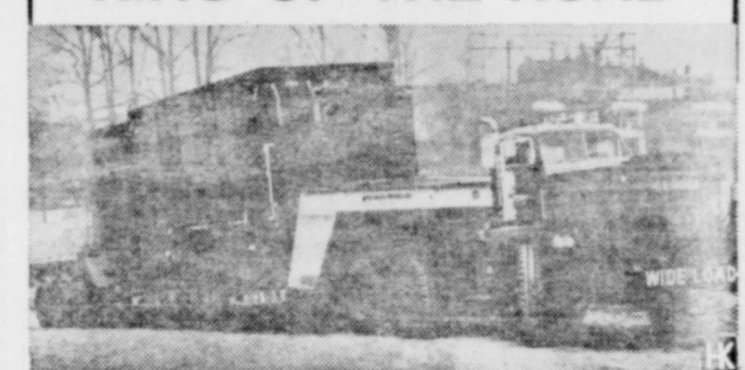

Each panel is 12 inches wide and 50 feet long and the vertical seam between panels is virtually invisible. A tough steel frame supports the eight-ton screen.

Anywhere the monster operates it requires special permits because of its size and weight. The average tractor-trailer combination normally seen on the highway weighs about 70,000 lbs. fully loaded.

which are sailed out to sea. About one mile out, a Coast Guard Cutter waits. The fleet sails around it, then back toward the shore, where the flowers are placed on the water.

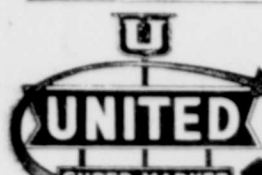
Flowers will be set on the sea for the twenty-second time this year. Last year, 20,000 persons took part.

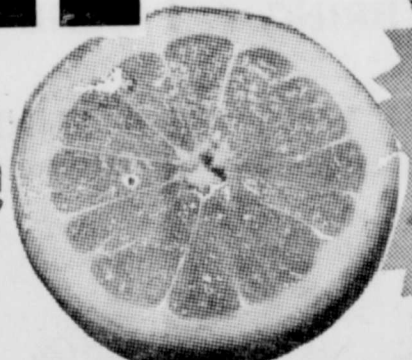

Texas Tourism Enters Group Of 'Billion-Dollar' Industries

Postmaster W. T. Zimmerman, Chairman of the Tourism Committee of the Chamber of Commerce and his committee pass the following information on to the people of Burkburnett.

"The Texas Highway Department's 1966 visitor industry report reveals that tourism entered the select circle of 'billion-dollar' industries last year. A record 19,236,000 persons came to Texas by all forms of transportation spending a total of \$1,080,000,000.

"Again in 1966 the automobile was the overwhelming choice of transportation of the Texas visitor. The department's survey shows a total of 14,157,000 out-of-state persons traveling by automobile visited the state in 1966, spending \$723,847,000.

"The Texas Tourist Council, an Austin association of travel-related businesses, estimates another 5,079,000 persons visited the state last year through the facilities of commercial carriers. The council estimates the commercial carrier contribution to the total spending at \$356,155,000.

"In its survey to secure data on the state's rapidly developing visitor industry, the Texas Highway Department analyzed information from nearly 12,000 questionnaires returned by automobile visitors to Texas. These questionnaires were given to incoming tourists at the department's port-of-entry tourist information centers and were returned following completion of their trip. They provided data regarding expenditures, length of stay, purpose of visit, number in party, incoming groups, age groups and other information.

"While the total automobile visitors represented an 11.6 per cent gain over 1965, the biggest gain for Texas was in their expenditures which increased by 18.1 per cent or \$110,699,000.

"Average spending per person was \$8.80 per day, while the average spending per tourist party was \$25.52 per day. Spending per visitor increased 93 cents per day over the average in 1965.

"While the record 14,157,000 automobile tourists represented an increase of 11.6 per cent over 1965, the actual length of stay of the visitor decreased slightly. A record 6.1 days was recorded in 1965, compared to 5.8 days last year.

"At least a portion of the slight reduction in length of stay can be attributed to Texas' fine highway system. Today, Texas' visitors can drive between distant points much faster. This shrinking of the state's size has a tendency to cut down their length of stay within Texas' borders.

Burkburnett is the second largest port-of-entry into Texas and this committee feels like it should be called the "Gateway to Texas."

County H-D Agent News

Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent, reports the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service has indicated an extra plentiful supplies of cabbage, carrots, onions and citrus fruit for several weeks. Other salad makings are likely to become more plentiful as warm weather makes it's appearance.

There's also a bumper crop of eggs on the market, so you will find just the right ingredients for this Golden Slaw recipe. Use 4 hard-cooked chopped eggs, 3/4 teaspoon sugar, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons prepared mustard, 2 teaspoons vinegar, 1 1/3 cup chopped sweet pickles, 2 cups shredded cabbage and 1/4 cup cooked salad dressing. Combine ingredients and toss lightly. Chill. Serve on lettuce, garnish with pimiento strips or chopped parsley. Serves four.

The Cooked Salad Dressing used in this recipe is also good for many other kinds of salads. You can make this dressing with 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon mustard, 1 1/2 tablespoons flour, 1 egg (slightly beaten), 3/4 cup milk, 1/4 cup vinegar and 1 tablespoon butter or margarine. Combine the sugar, salt, mustard, flour, egg and milk in top of double boiler; blend thoroughly. Stir in vinegar gradually. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly until thick, about 10 minutes. Remove from heat, add butter or margarine and blend. Cool and store in refrigerator. Makes 1 1/4 cups.

VETERANS

Questions - Answers

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Veterans and their families are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.)

Q—I am presently attending college under the new G. I. Bill. I plan to marry soon. How should I notify the Veterans Administration that I have a dependent so that the rate of my educational allowance can be increased?

A—The Veterans Administration will pay the additional allowance for your dependent from the date of notification of your marriage. This may be done by letter. The additional allowance will not be paid, however, until a copy of the marriage certificate is furnished.

Q—I am planning a trip abroad next year and am making some arrangements concerning my financial matters. I receive a disability compensation check from the Veterans Administration each month. I understand that mail service in some foreign countries is a bit unreliable. Could I arrange to have my checks sent to my bank during my trip?

A—Yes. There is a procedure whereby you may have your checks sent to a bank for deposit to your account. Your bank will assist you in making the arrangements. The VA must know, of course, where to mail the checks and so a change of address must be submitted.

Q—I am a World War II veteran, and have just paid the last installment on my 20-year G. I. home loan. Am I entitled to another loan before the July 25, 1967, deadline for World War II veterans?

A—Full repayment of a G. I. loan does not, in itself, entitle you to another loan. However, your entitlement may be restored until July 25, 1967, if you are forced to sell for certain compelling reasons.

Q—My son, determined by the VA to be helpless, is being furnished training under the War Orphans program. This is the first month he has attended school and we have received checks both for the schooling and the regular \$80 a month compensation. Shouldn't one of these checks be returned to the VA?

A—No. In the case of a helpless child both the Dependency Indemnity Compensation and the War Orphans Act benefits are paid simultaneously.

Q—I am considering converting my term G. I. insurance to the new Modified Life Plan. I hear that I won't get any dividends on this plan. Is that true?

A—It's true you may not get a dividend on the Modified Life policy for several years, and then they will be small. Dividends should not influence your decision too much. Compare the rates for Modified Life and Term policies, especially on the Term policy after age 40. VA Pamphlet 2922, available at any VA office or by writing the VA, will give all comparative details.
