NOTED SPEAKERS PRESENT PROHIBITION CAUSE SUNDAY

country. He spoke of the Anglo-Saxons as God's chosen people and said it had been shown to his satisfaction that the ten lost tribes of Israel mentioned as God's chosen people were the inhabitants of what is now Germany. The prosecutors of the British, the Germans and the Scandinavians. He closed with an appeal for the support and help of everyone in the fight.

Prohibition Here Favored. Practically everyone of the big congregation at the First Baptist Church raised his hand Sunday morning when Dr. Hall asked the question of all who wanted to see the saloon voted out of Wichita county. This demonstration came at the close of a very interesting service at which Dr. Hall was the principal speaker. The church was filled to capacity, the Germans and the Scandinavians. He closed with an appeal for the support and help of everyone in the fight.

Mass Meeting. The church was packed to its capacity for Sunday afternoon meeting and the big crowd manifested much interest in the proceedings without ever being aroused to anything approaching decided enthusiasm.

Dr. Hall of Los Angeles presided at the meeting and kept the crowd entertained thoroughly with a running fire of anecdotes, witty sayings, etc. His mannerisms are unlike those of the usual prohibition orator and he is possessed of a store of dry wit that kept his hearers laughing most of the time he was on the floor. The afternoon service opened with a prayer by Rev. C. C. Smith, after which Rev. R. C. Miller presented Dr. Hall as the presiding officer, referring to him as "Water Hall." Dr. Hall paid a tribute to Miss Buckingham and her accompanist, Miss May. Miss Buckingham, he said, was a member of the Church of the Nazarene "which believes just what the present day Methodists believe before they got respectable." Miss Buckingham at once proved herself an accomplished song leader, with methods, somewhat novel, of these revival song leaders. The first song was "The Old Time Religion," the hymn of the Republic, and the second was "The Old Time Religion." The church was packed to its capacity for Sunday afternoon meeting and the big crowd manifested much interest in the proceedings without ever being aroused to anything approaching decided enthusiasm.

Success in 30 Months. Dr. Hall spoke briefly to give Miss Buckingham time to get her breath. He said, "He was especially glad to see the women present here today because the liquor traffic is your enemy. It was man's job to vote it out, the speaker said, but he looked for an early day when the women would have an active voice in the matter. 'Fifty months from today there'll not be a legalized saloon under the United States flag,' Dr. Hall's prediction. It was greeted with cheers.

A song, "Columbia From Ruth Shall Be Free" was rendered very effectively by Miss Buckingham. Dr. Hall then introduced Judge Chaffin as a man "who would have been president of the United States if so many folks hadn't back-slidden between Sunday and Tuesday." He recounted what Arizona had done in enacting a prohibition law.

"One Standard of Morals" was Judge Chaffin's announced subject and in opening his talk he laid down this proposition: "You can never settle any question involving religion or morals until you do it on one standard of morals for every section of the country."

Experience With Slavery. The speaker cited first the slavery question; then the polygamy question, then the lottery question, as examples of the principle he laid down. Reviewing the history of abolition he told how Cass and Douglas had tried to dodge the abolition issue in California and Kansas by proposing to submit it to the people on the "popular sovereignty" or "home rule" basis. He told of the stand that Lincoln took, that a question of right or wrong was not one to be determined by majorities. Personal liberty was referred to rather sarcastically by the speaker in referring to the act of Congress relating to polygamy when that practice was general in Utah. Utah wanted to settle it on the local option basis, he reminded his hearers. He also recounted the history of the Louisiana lottery and how it was finally put out of business by the country as a whole.

There was one exception to the rule he had laid down, Judge Chaffin said, and that was the recent prohibition amendment that Congress had refused to submit. Some of the congressmen had opposed it on the ground of state's rights and on other issues, he said, he declared:

Tribute To Texans. "It is wrong to sell whiskey in one township, it is wrong to sell it in every township under the stars and stripes." Applause greeted this utterance. He advocated voting on the matter every ten days until it was voted out. Judge Chaffin in discussing the recent fight in Congress took occasion to pay a tribute to Sen. for Sheppard of Texas and Congressman Garrett of this State whom he said had done much for the prohibition cause in Congress.

"Home rule has been in the history of this country been invoked in behalf of a righteous measure," he declared.

Then Judge Chaffin outlined the prohibition program, as set forth above.

Texas should lead," he declared in conclusion, describing the "push on Washington" that was being planned.

Funds Are Raised. At the conclusion of this talk Dr.

Hall explained what the prohibitionists are trying to do. It is proposed he said, to collect 2000 college men and women in the work of securing 5,000,000 pledges to support no party in 1916 that is not opposed to the liquor traffic. These young men and women, it was explained, would serve for the "army wages" of \$25 per month. Pledges were taken and a considerable sum raised, although Dr. Hall accused the audience of being considerably more willing to cheer than to contribute.

Ex-Governor St. John was then introduced and at Dr. Hall's suggestion gave the Chautauque salute as he came forward. The venerable speaker, whose voice and vigor both belie his eighty and some odd years, first told his hearers that he was part Indian because his wife was a cousin of Quasah Parker. He took a shot at the liquor traffic and then invoked the mightiest cheer of the afternoon when he declared that the state for which the heroes of San Jacinto and the Alamo died should never be divided.

Calla Wilson, "Half-Baked." Ignorance and prejudice, the speaker said, were very hard to overcome and he knew this because he had been both. Although he admitted that he was once a Republican, he referred to the G. O. P. as a "cowardly old-run-ridden party." He had praise for Secretary Daniel and Secretary Wilson for their efforts against the liquor traffic and referred to President Wilson as a half-baked pro who was still too much wedded to the local option theory.

Governor St. John spoke at some length of his experience of Kansas with prohibition and said that there was no possibility of the State ever going back to the old way. A man who had run for governor on an anti-prohibition platform, he said, had been defeated by over 400,000 majority. There were 96 counties in Kansas said the speaker, in which there was no common drunkard. Hundreds of school children who never saw a drunk man or a saloon. The speaker said Kansas had less men in the penitentiary in proportion to population than any other state, the lowest death rate of any state, the lowest per capita wealth, the largest number of automobiles in proportion to population. Governor St. John said he had investigated the claim of the distillers that prohibition would destroy the farmers' market for corn and had found that the distillers used one quart of shell corn for every quart of alcohol and that in the United States.

Two Kinds of Slavery. The speaker urged his hearers to get rid of their prejudices and to not worry about being sometimes in the minority. He spoke of the long night of this country of slavery and said there was a harder fight now to get rid of a worse form of slavery. "Under African slavery the slave had plenty to eat and a place to sleep, and when he got sick and a doctor or when he got hurt and a lawyer, the speaker said, the liquor traffic not only robbed a man of these things, but it destroyed his immortal soul as well. The Bible says no drunkard shall enter the kingdom of heaven."

He said that the man who refused to support a party that had declared against the liquor traffic was a coward. He urged his hearers in the name of humanity, morality and sobriety to join in the fight against the saloon.

A song by Miss Buckingham "Make Your Ballot Talk" followed and the meeting ended with the singing of "America" by those present.

Liquor and Health. At the Christian Church last night Mr. Chaffin addressed another audience almost as large as that which gathered for the afternoon meeting. His theme was "The Relation of the Liquor Traffic to Public Health." He argued for prohibition as a quarantine measure. Before Mr. Chaffin spoke ex-Governor St. John of Kansas made a brief talk. He said he had been making some investigations concerning the liquor traffic in Wichita county and had found that the revenue from saloons was \$21,000; the sales of liquor were estimated at \$241,000 annually. The difference he said represented what was worse than waste. He declared there was no greater fallacy than the statement that if you let whiskey alone it will get you alone, telling the story of a woman who had called upon him, governor of Kansas to pardon her husband who had killed a man while under the influence of intoxicants.

Mr. Chaffin in his address said it was recognized as the first duty of a government to protect the lives and health of its people. He said that here was no question of which man had the right to use to the injury of the public. When prohibition was voted he proposed that a commission be appointed to go over the country and assess the value of the breweries and distilleries; then that this same commission report up the damages that have resulted from these institutions and to pay the owners of the breweries and distilleries the difference.

Question of Regulation. Discussing proposals for the regulation of the liquor traffic he said "You can't regulate a saloon any more than you can make a vegetable out of a bed bug." Science, he said, had absolutely outlawed the liquor traffic. He quoted from eminent scientists to show that alcohol was never a stimulant, but was an irritant. He told a story when a boy was once bitten by a snake and he jumped a fence; the bumble bees were in the vicinity. There wasn't a doctor in town, he said, who had a patient who couldn't be gotten out of bed with bumble bees. He declared that the scientific phase of the liquor problem had been recognized in the Wisconsin state constitution which absolutely outlawed it. The laws of that state he said would send a physician who prescribed alcohol in any form to jail; if a patient to whom a doctor had given alcohol in any form died, the physician was subject to a charge of manslaughter.

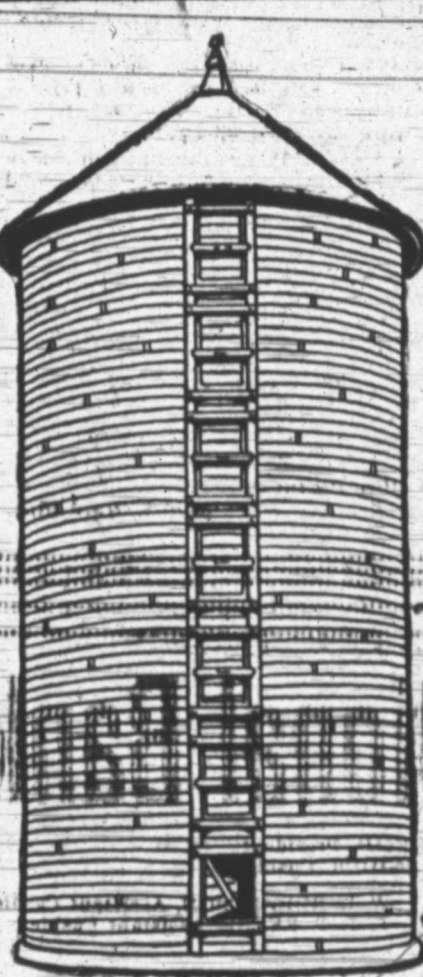

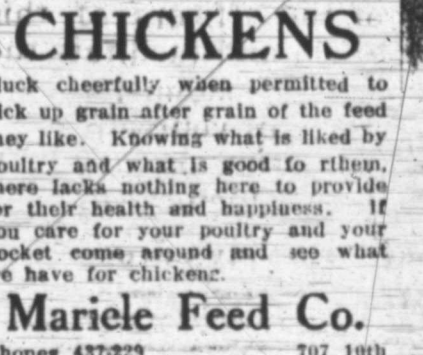

Col. E. M. House of Austin, as the personal unofficial representative of the President of the United States, has sailed for Europe for the special purpose of visiting all the European capitals where it is expected that he will gather information that will be of great value to President Wilson in case he is called upon by warring nations to name terms of peace. President Wilson, however, is quoted as having said only a few days ago that if there was a peace movement in view he knew nothing definitely of it.

This paper doubts very much that if the whole matter of dividing Texas and creating the new state of Jefferson was left entirely up to Senator Johnson with the assurance that he should be chosen as the first governor of the newly created state that he would vote for the division. Johnson is not built that way. He is too loyal a citizen of grand old Texas to even consider seriously of dividing her. The way it looks to us is that Johnson wanted to call attention to the way this part of the State had been neglected and snubbed when the matter of selecting her state officials are considered, and if that was his object in introducing the bill, he has succeeded in his purpose. Texas will never be divided, but in the future we may expect this part of the state to receive more political recognition than has been the case.

WEALTHY WICHITA

Hon. R. H. Huff of Wichita Falls has just dropped a few lines to State Press by way of letting the world know via this channel that Wichita Falls paid more poll taxes in 1914 than it paid in 1913, notwithstanding this is to be an off year in elections and notwithstanding times are said to be hard upon the vote-bearing animals of this State. In the city of Wichita Falls poll tax payments increased by 96, and in the county of Wichita as a whole the increase was 18. In practically every other city and county of Texas decrements are reported, therefore Huff has entire justification for looking upon his bustling community as sui generis, or even summum bonum. It is only a prosperous and patriotic city that can boast the fact that Wichita basin, for to avoid payment of available taxes is the second law of nature—coming directly after self preservation. But State Press for one is not surprised to hear that Wichita Falls and Wichita county increased their poll tax payments. Those folks out there like to vote, but more than that, they've got the money to pay their debts. Wichita County is not a single cropper. It doesn't depend on a single shot to bring down a year's provisions. It grows some cotton, a little corn, considerable oats, codies of maize and seeds of wheat. The result is that the Wichitans do not have to mortgage the milch cow every spring to feed the milch through the summer. —State Press in Dallas News.

TRIBUTE TO THE LATE A. D. MATHENY.

I have just been told of the death of A. D. Matheny, and feel constrained to contribute my words at acknowledgment of the virtues of a good man gone before. I knew him well—our acquaintance covering a period of some thirty years. By way of preface, I will relate an incident of "Math's" life that speaks volumes. While holding a job at Crosbyton, Texas two or three years ago I noticed Matheny among the crowd at a Christmas festival. He stood first on one foot and then on the other, apparently in indecision. Finally he approached a group of the ladies having in charge the distribution of presents. "Ladies," he said, "my name is Matheny; I am a printer and of course, a poor man—one of the toilers—but I am a great lover of children, and realizing that there are no doubt a number of children in Crosbyton whose little hearts will not be gladdened by a present, I beg you will use this for their benefit." He laid

down a five dollar bill and quietly walked out. "Math," it was his way of showing his great love for those whom Christ referred to as "God's people."

He has gone from the walks of men somewhere, somewhere, somewhere. But we who knew him best feel satisfied. Depending entirely upon the absolute justice of an All-wise Creator we seem to hear Him say: "Matheny, you have stayed down there long enough—come with me." "It's the use, not the abuse of alcohol," he declared, "that does the damage. Hundreds die from its use to whom one dies from its abuse." He quoted from life insurance statistics that the moderate drinkers out an average of four years from their lives.

In 1910, he quoted statistics, 72,000,000 babies were born in this country. Of these more than 300,000 died before they reached the age of twelve months. Of this 300,000, 250,000 died from diseases inherited from drunken ancestors. The liquor traffic last year killed more men than have been killed in all the battles of the world in 2,500 years. He said that a great authority on the American Indian had told him that no Indian baby had ever been born defective until the white man introduced the use of alcohol among them.

Banish and Alcohol.
Connie Mack, the great baseball general, he said, several years ago made a rule that no player should use intoxicants on the day of a game. Later he ruled that no player could drink during the season. Still later he required that players should not drink at all while under contract. Now he said Connie Mack would not sign a contract with a player who ever had been a drinker. Pretty soon, the speaker said, he expected to hear that Connie Mack would not sign a ball player whose parents ever had drunk. He declared that such a rule would be entirely justified by the facts of physiological science.

He cited many other scientific facts concerning alcohol and its effects on the human body and the human race and predicted that within ten years the use of alcohol would be absolutely prohibited in the United States.
